AN ACT to amend the insurance law and the public health law, in relation to prohibiting accident and health insurers from offering incentives to health care providers to prescribe a specific drug or medical product

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 Section 1. Section 3217-b of the insurance law is amended by adding a
2 new subsection (j) to read as follows:
3 (J) NO INSURER SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ARTICLE SHALL, BY
4 CONTRACT, WRITTEN POLICY OR PROCEDURE OR ANY OTHER AGREEMENT, PROVIDE
5 PAYMENT OR ANY OTHER INCENTIVE TO A HEALTH CARE PROVIDER TO ISSUE OR
6 CHANGE A PRESCRIPTION FOR A SPECIFIC DRUG OR MEDICAL PRODUCT. VIOLATIONS
7 OF THIS SUBSECTION SHALL BE PUNISHABLE AS PROVIDED IN SECTION ONE
8 HUNDRED NINE OF THIS CHAPTER.
9 S 2. Section 4325 of the insurance law is amended by adding a new
10 subsection (k) to read as follows:
11 (K) NO INSURER SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ARTICLE SHALL, BY
12 CONTRACT, WRITTEN POLICY OR PROCEDURE OR ANY OTHER AGREEMENT, PROVIDE
13 PAYMENT OR ANY OTHER INCENTIVE TO A HEALTH CARE PROVIDER TO ISSUE OR
14 CHANGE A PRESCRIPTION FOR A SPECIFIC DRUG OR MEDICAL PRODUCT.
15 VIOLATIONS OF THIS SUBSECTION SHALL BE PUNISHABLE AS PROVIDED IN SECTION
16 ONE HUNDRED NINE OF THIS CHAPTER.
17 S 3. Section 4406-c of the public health law is amended by adding a
18 new subdivision 5-e to read as follows:
19 5-E. NO HEALTH CARE PLAN SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ARTICLE
20 SHALL, BY CONTRACT, WRITTEN POLICY OR PROCEDURE OR ANY OTHER AGREEMENT,
21 PROVIDE PAYMENT OR ANY OTHER INCENTIVE TO A HEALTH CARE PROVIDER TO
22 ISSUE OR CHANGE A PRESCRIPTION FOR A SPECIFIC DRUG OR MEDICAL PRODUCT.
23 S 4. This act shall take effect on the ninetieth day after it shall
24 have become a law.
