AN ACT to amend the public health law, in relation to patient notice of the provision of observation services

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- Section 1. The public health law is amended by adding a new section 2 2805-w to read as follows:
  - S 2805-W. PATIENT NOTICE OF OBSERVATION SERVICES. 1. EVERY GENERAL HOSPITAL SHALL PROVIDE PATIENTS WHO ARE PLACED INTO OBSERVATION SERVICES BY SUCH GENERAL HOSPITAL WITH AN ORAL AND WRITTEN NOTICE WITHIN TWENTY-FOUR HOURS OF SUCH PLACEMENT THAT THE PATIENT IS NOT ADMITTED TO THE HOSPITAL AND IS UNDER OBSERVATION STATUS. SUCH WRITTEN NOTICE SHALL BE SIGNED BY THE PATIENT OR THE PATIENT'S LEGAL REPRESENTATIVE TO ACKNOWL-EDGE RECEIPT AND SHALL INCLUDE, BUT NOT BE LIMITED TO, THE FOLLOWING INFORMATION:
- 11 (A) A STATEMENT THAT OBSERVATION STATUS MAY AFFECT THE PATIENT'S MEDI12 CARE, MEDICAID AND/OR PRIVATE INSURANCE COVERAGE FOR THE CURRENT HOSPI13 TAL SERVICES, INCLUDING MEDICATIONS AND OTHER PHARMACEUTICAL SUPPLIES,
  14 AS WELL AS COVERAGE FOR ANY SUBSEQUENT DISCHARGE TO A SKILLED NURSING
  15 FACILITY OR HOME AND COMMUNITY BASED CARE; AND
- 16 (B) THAT THE PATIENT SHOULD CONTACT HIS OR HER INSURANCE PLAN TO 17 BETTER UNDERSTAND THE IMPLICATIONS OF BEING PLACED IN OBSERVATION 18 STATUS.
- 19 2. THE COMMISSIONER SHALL DEVELOP AND MAKE AVAILABLE GUIDANCE ON THE 20 NOTICE AS DESCRIBED IN THIS SECTION.
- S 2. This act shall take effect immediately, except that subdivision 1 of section 2805-w of the public health law, as added by section one of this act, shall take effect on the ninetieth day after this act shall have become a law.
