AN ACT to amend the education law, in relation to a mental health education curriculum

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Legislative intent. The legislature recognizes the impor-1 2 tance of providing a quality education to all New York students. Quality 3 education must continue to include comprehensive health education. While 4 schools presently provide instruction in health education, the legisla-5 finds it important that the law provide the flexibility to reflect ture 6 current learning standards and curriculum development as administered by 7 the New York State Education Department and local school districts. Furthermore, it is important that statute recognize developing technolo-8 9 gy and existing curriculum materials to ensure that schools and teachers 10 are provided with the most beneficial health education information, and that both health and mental health are taught with the idea of 11 12 cure and control and without stigma or emotional harm. The prevention, 13 law should provide flexibility to allow the commissioner of education to 14 respond to the changing needs of the educational community to provide 15 students with the tools and resources to live healthy lives, as it will 16 only serve to improve educational performance and student outcomes.

17 S 2. Section 804 of the education law, as added by chapter 982 of the 18 laws of 1977, the section heading as amended and subdivision 3-a as 19 added by chapter 401 of the laws of 1998, subdivision 3 as amended by 20 chapter 674 of the laws of 2004, and subdivision 4 as amended by chapter 21 181 of the laws of 2000, is amended to read as follows:

22 S 804. Health education [regarding alcohol, drugs, tobacco abuse and 23 the prevention and detection of certain cancers]. 1. All schools [shall] 24 ARE ENCOURAGED TO include, as an integral part of health education, 25 instruction [so as to discourage the misuse and abuse of alcohol, tobac-26 and other drugs and promote attitudes and behavior that enhance CO, 27 health, well being, and human dignity.] IN THE UNDERSTANDINGS, ATTITUDES 28 AND BEHAVIORS WITH REGARD TO THE SEVERAL DIMENSIONS OF HEALTH. THIS

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INSTRUCTION SHALL RELATE TO ALCOHOL, TOBACCO AND OTHER DRUGS, SAFETY, 1 2 MENTAL HEALTH, NUTRITION, DENTAL HEALTH, SENSORY PERCEPTION, DISEASE 3 PREVENTION AND CONTROL, ENVIRONMENTAL AND PUBLIC HEALTH, CONSUMER 4 HEALTH, FIRST AID, AND OTHER HEALTH-RELATED AREAS. SUCH HEALTH EDUCATION 5 SHALL BE ADMINISTERED AND ASSESSED WITH THE GOALS OF PROVIDING STUDENTS 6 WITH THE NECESSARY KNOWLEDGE AND SKILLS TO: ESTABLISH AND MAINTAIN PHYS-7 ICAL FITNESS, PARTICIPATE IN PHYSICAL ACTIVITY; AND MAINTAIN PERSONAL 8 HEALTH; ACQUIRE THE KNOWLEDGE AND ABILITY NECESSARY TO CREATE AND MAIN-9 TAIN A SAFE AND HEALTHY ENVIRONMENT; UNDERSTAND AND MANAGE PERSONAL AND 10 COMMUNITY RESOURCES TO SUSTAIN OVERALL HEALTH.

11 1-A. SUCH HEALTH EDUCATION SHALL BE PROVIDED IN AN AGE-APPROPRIATE 12 MANNER BY THE REGULAR CLASSROOM TEACHER, OR BY A TEACHER CERTIFIED TO 13 TEACH HEALTH EDUCATION.

14 1-B. THE COMMISSIONER SHALL PROMULGATE REGULATIONS TO FULFILL THE 15 REQUIREMENTS OF THIS SECTION AND TO ENSURE THAT STUDENTS ARE PROPERLY 16 INSTRUCTED IN THESE AREAS VITAL TO ENSURING CONTINUING DEVELOPMENT OF 17 HEALTH SKILLS AND PROVIDING ACCESS TO AVAILABLE RESOURCES FOR PROMOTING 18 HEALTHY LIVING.

19 Instruction regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs shall be 2. included in the health education provided for all elementary school 20 shall be taught by the regular classroom teachers or by 21 pupils and 22 teachers certified to teach health education. Such instruction shall be 23 designed according to the needs and abilities of the pupils at successive grade levels with the purpose of developing desirable health behav-24 25 ior, attitudes, and knowledge as well as self-reliance and problem solv-26 ing capacity.

3. Instruction regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs, 27 in addi-28 tion to continued health guidance in the junior high school grades and 29 the senior high schools, shall be an integral part of a required health education course at each of these levels in the secondary schools 30 curriculum. [Students shall be required to demonstrate knowledge in the 31 32 subject area through the use of a test, graded project or report, or any 33 other means prescribed by the school authorities regarding alcohol, drugs, and tobacco.] Any such course shall be taught by teachers holding 34 35 a certificate to teach health. Related courses in the secondary school curriculum shall be taught in a manner supportive of health education 36 37 regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs. In addition, instruction regarding the dangers of driving while under the influence of alcohol or 38 39 drugs shall be an integral part of a required health education course in 40 senior high schools. Such instruction shall be provided in all the senior high schools whether or not these schools also provide driver 41 42 education courses.

43 Instruction regarding methods of prevention and detection of 3-a. 44 certain cancers, including but not limited to breast cancer, skin cancer, testicular cancer and other cancers where certain preventive measures have become generally accepted and certain detection methods 45 46 47 have been adopted and recommended generally to the public. Such instruc-48 tion shall be an integral part of a required health education course at 49 the senior high school level, in addition to continued health guidance 50 senior high schools. Any such course shall be taught by teachers in 51 holding a certificate to teach health.

4. a. [The commissioner may prescribe in regulations such health education courses which include instruction regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs as the commissioner may deem necessary and desirable for the welfare of pupils and the community] THE COMMISSIONER SHALL PROMUL-GATE REGULATIONS TO FULFILL THE REQUIREMENTS OF THIS SECTION AND TO

ENSURE THAT STUDENTS ARE PROPERLY INSTRUCTED IN THESE AREAS VITAL 1 TO 2 DEVELOPMENT OF HEALTH SKILLS AND PROVIDING ACCESS TO AVAIL-CONTINUING 3 ABLE RESOURCES FOR PROMOTING HEALTHY LIVING, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED 4 TO INSTRUCTION ON THE IMPORTANCE OF SEEKING COUNSELING TO ADDRESS MENTAL 5 HEALTH ISSUES THAT ARE IMPACTING A STUDENT'S ABILITY TO LEARN. The 6 contents may be varied to meet the needs of particular school districts, 7 or portions thereof, and need not be uniform throughout the state, 8 provided, however, that school districts shall utilize either the curriculum for health education instruction [regarding alcohol, tobacco 9 10 and other drugs] prescribed by the commissioner or a course approved by 11 the commissioner in accordance with criteria established by the commis-12 sioner.

b. The commissioner shall make available an interpersonal violence prevention education package for grades kindergarten through twelve, which package may consist of student pamphlets, parent pamphlets, videotapes and other informative materials to be distributed to school districts, and shall encourage the use of such material as part of the health or other related curricula or programs.

19 c. The regents shall review the health curriculum requirements in 20 existence on the effective date of this paragraph for the purpose of 21 streamlining such curriculum and identifying any outdated components 22 that may be eliminated or consolidated in order to ensure that students 23 have sufficient time and instruction to develop skills to address issues of violence prevention and mental health. To the extent appropriate, the 24 25 regents shall modify the existing curriculum to provide greater focus on 26 the development of skills, by no later than middle school, that are needed to recognize, cope with and address potentially violent inci-27 dents, including an understanding of student's roles in emergency situ-28 29 ations, what to do when confronted with another student who is [experi-30 encing a mental health problem, and other related skills designed to reduce the threat of violence in schools.] EXHIBITING BEHAVIOR THAT 31 32 CAUSES CONCERN OR ALARM FOR THE SAFETY OF THE STUDENT OR OTHERS.

5. School authorities shall provide the needed facilities, time, and place for the instruction set forth herein and shall provide learning aids and curriculum resource materials which contribute to effective teaching methods and learning in health education [regarding alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs].

6. All pre-service training programs in the state for elementary teachers shall include adequate preparation regarding the instruction in alcohol, tobacco, and other drugs set forth herein, and no teacher shall be licensed except upon satisfactory demonstration of the competencies included in the institutional proposals approved by the education department.

44 7. Nothing contained in this section shall be deemed to diminish or 45 impair the duties of the commissioner with respect to the continuing program for critical health problems established by chapter seven 46 47 hundred eighty-seven of the laws of nineteen hundred sixty-seven as amended. The commissioner shall coordinate actions taken under authority 48 49 of this section with the provisions of said chapter as they relate to 50 health education in schools, inservice training and training programs, and curriculum or syllabus development [regarding the deleterious 51 52 effects resulting from the use, misuse, and abuse of alcohol, tobacco, 53 and other drugs].

54 S 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
