AN ACT to amend the education law, in relation to authorizing the administration of vaccines for hepatitis A, hepatitis B, human papillomavirus, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella and polio by a licensed pharmacist

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 7 of section 6527 of the education law, as amended by chapter 46 of the laws of 2015, is amended to read as follows:

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7. A licensed physician may prescribe and order a patient specific order or non-patient specific regimen to a licensed pharmacist, pursuant to regulations promulgated by the commissioner, and consistent with the public health law, for [administering immunizations to prevent influen-207 administering immunizing agents to prevent seasonal influenza to patients two years of age or older, for patients eighteen years of age or older to administer immunizing agents to prevent pneumococcal, acute herpes zoster, hepatitis A, hepatitis B, human papillomavirus, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, polio, meningococcal, tetanus, diphtheria or pertussis disease and medications required for emergency treatment of 14 anaphylaxis if the commissioner of health in consultation with the 15 commissioner of education determines that an immunization: (i) may be administered by pharmacists; (ii) is needed to prevent the transmission of a reportable communicable disease that is prevalent in New York

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state; and (iii) the immunization is recommended by the advisory committee on immunization practices of the centers for disease control and prevention. Nothing in this subdivision shall authorize unlicensed persons to administer immunizations, vaccines or other drugs.

- § 2. Subdivision 7 of section 6527 of the education law, as amended by chapter 110 of the laws of 2020, is amended to read as follows:
- 7. A licensed physician may prescribe and order a patient specific order or non-patient specific regimen to a licensed pharmacist, pursuant to regulations promulgated by the commissioner, and consistent with the public health law, for [administering immunizations to prevent influenza, administering immunizing agents to prevent seasonal influenza to patients two years of age or older, for patients eighteen years of age or older to administer immunizing agents to prevent pneumococcal, acute 14 herpes zoster, hepatitis A, hepatitis B, human papillomavirus, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, polio, meningococcal, tetanus, diphtheria, COVID-19, or pertussis disease and medications required for emergency treatment of anaphylaxis if the commissioner of health in consultation with the commissioner of education determines that an immunization: (i) may be administered by pharmacists; (ii) is needed to prevent the transmission of a reportable communicable disease that is prevalent in New York state; and (iii) the immunization is recommended by the advisory committee on immunization practices of the centers for disease control and prevention. Nothing in this subdivision shall authorize unlicensed persons to administer immunizations, vaccines or other drugs.
 - § 3. Paragraph a of subdivision 22 of section 6802 of the education law, as amended by section 2 of part DD of chapter 57 of the laws of 2018, is amended to read as follows:
- 27 28 a. the direct application of an immunizing agent to adults, whether by 29 injection, ingestion, inhalation or any other means, pursuant to a 30 patient specific order or non-patient specific regimen prescribed or 31 ordered by a physician or certified nurse practitioner, who has a prac-32 tice site in the county or adjoining county in which the immunization is 33 administered, [for immunizations to prevent influenza,] for immunizations to prevent seasonal influenza to patients two years of age or 34 35 older, for patients eighteen years of age or older to administer immun-36 izing agents to prevent pneumococcal, acute herpes zoster, hepatitis A, 37 hepatitis B, human papillomavirus, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, 38 polio, meningococcal, tetanus, diphtheria or pertussis disease and medi-39 cations required for emergency treatment of anaphylaxis if the commissioner of health in consultation with the commissioner of education 40 determines that an immunization: (i) may be administered by pharma-41 42 cists; (ii) is needed to prevent the transmission of a reportable commu-43 nicable disease that is prevalent in New York state; and (iii) the immunization is recommended by the advisory committee on immunization 44 45 practices of the centers for disease control and prevention. If the 46 commissioner of health determines that there is an outbreak of disease, 47 or that there is the imminent threat of an outbreak of disease, then the 48 commissioner of health may issue a non-patient specific regimen applica-49 ble statewide.
 - Paragraph a of subdivision 22 of section 6802 of the education law, as amended by chapter 110 of the laws of 2020, is amended to read as follows:
- a. the direct application of an immunizing agent to adults, whether by 54 injection, ingestion, inhalation or any other means, pursuant to a patient specific order or non-patient specific regimen prescribed or 55 ordered by a physician or certified nurse practitioner, who has a prac-

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tice site in the county or adjoining county in which the immunization is administered, [for immunizations to prevent influenza,] for immunizations to prevent seasonal influenza to patients two years of age or 3 4 older, for patients eighteen years of age or older to administer immun-5 izing agents to prevent pneumococcal, acute herpes zoster, hepatitis A, 6 hepatitis B, human papillomavirus, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, polio, meningococcal, tetanus, diphtheria, COVID-19, or 7 8 disease and medications required for emergency treatment of anaphylaxis 9 if the commissioner of health in consultation with the commissioner of 10 education determines that an immunization: (i) may be administered by 11 pharmacists; (ii) is needed to prevent the transmission of a reportable communicable disease that is prevalent in New York state; and (iii) 12 13 the immunization is recommended by the advisory committee on immuniza-14 tion practices of the centers for disease control and prevention. If 15 the commissioner of health determines that there is an outbreak of 16 disease, or that there is the imminent threat of an outbreak of disease, 17 then the commissioner of health may issue a non-patient specific regimen 18 applicable statewide. 19

- § 5. Subdivision 7 of section 6909 of the education law, as amended by chapter 46 of the laws of 2015, is amended to read as follows:
- 7. A certified nurse practitioner may prescribe and order a patient specific order or non-patient specific regimen to a licensed pharmacist, pursuant to regulations promulgated by the commissioner, and consistent with the public health law, for [administering immunizations to prevent influenza, administering immunizing agents to prevent seasonal influenza to patients two years of age or older, for patients eighteen years of age or older to administer immunizing agents to prevent pneumococcal, acute herpes zoster, hepatitis A, hepatitis B, human papillomavirus, measles, mumps, rubella, varicella, polio, meningococcal, tetanus, diphtheria or pertussis disease and medications required for emergency treatment of anaphylaxis if the commissioner of health in consultation with the commissioner of education determines that an immunization: (i) may be administered by pharmacists; (ii) is needed to prevent the transmission of a reportable communicable disease that is prevalent in New York state; and (iii) the immunization is recommended by the advisory committee on immunization practices of the centers for disease control and prevention. - § 7. This act shall take effect immediately; provided, however, that:
- (a) the amendments to subdivision 7 of section 6527 of the education law made by section two of this act shall take effect on the same date and in the same manner as section 1 of chapter 110 of the laws of 2020, takes effect;
- 9 (b) the amendments to subdivision 7 of section 6527 of the education law made by this act shall not affect the expiration of such subdivision 10 and shall be deemed to expire therewith; 11
 - (c) the amendments to subdivision 22 of section 6802 of the education law made by section four of this act shall take effect on the same date and in the same manner as section 2 of chapter 110 of the laws of 2020, takes effect;
 - (d) the amendments to subdivision 22 of section 6802 of the education law made by this act shall not affect the expiration and repeal of such subdivision and shall be deemed repealed therewith;
- (e) the amendments to subdivision 7 of section 6909 of the education 20 law made by this act shall take effect on the same date and in the same manner as section 3 of chapter 110 of the laws of 2020, takes effect; 22 and
- (f) the amendments to subdivision 7 of section 6909 of the education 23 24 law made by section six of this act shall not affect the expiration of 25 such subdivision and shall be deemed to expire therewith.
