AN ACT to amend the general business law, in relation to requiring issuers of credit cards to give the cardholder at least thirty days notice before closing, cancelling, or terminating the cardholder's account

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The general business law is amended by adding a new section 520-f to read as follows:

§ 520-f. Issuer cancellation. 1. Notice required. No issuer shall close, cancel, or terminate a holder's account with the issuer for the extension of credit through the use of a credit card without providing the holder written notice via email, text message, or written letter at least thirty days before the effective date of such closure, cancellation, or termination.

2. Exceptions. The provisions of this section shall not apply if an issuer closes, cancels, or terminates a holder's account with the issuer for the extension of credit through the use of a credit card because of:

(a) fraud, misuse, identity theft, or unauthorized use affecting the account;

(b) delinquency, default, or other failure by the holder to comply with the terms and conditions governing the account;

(c) the holder's bankruptcy, insolvency, receivership, death, legal incapacity, or inability to repay or otherwise perform obligations under the credit card agreement; or

(d) any federal, state, or local law, regulation, court order, legal process, sanctions requirement, anti-money-laundering obligation, or
