AN ACT in relation to requiring notification to certain federal and state agencies when certain persons with diplomatic immunity violate the law

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

- 1 Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "diplomat-
2 ic immunity notification act".
3 S 2. 1. Each incident, occurrence or circumstance where a person
4 protected from detention, arrest, and/or prosecution by diplomatic immu-
5 nity was in fact stopped, questioned, detained and/or arrested by a law
6 enforcement or police agency concerning a potential violation of the
7 penal law of the state of New York shall be reported by such agency to
8 the following:
9 (a) the secretary of state of the United States;
10 (b) the secretary-general of the United Nations;
11 (c) the ambassador or chief diplomatic officer to the United States of
12 such individual's home country and of the country employing such indi-
13 vidual in a capacity through which such individual enjoys diplomatic
14 immunity;
15 (d) the governor;
16 (e) the attorney general; and
17 (f) the chief elected officer of the locality in which such incident,
18 occurrence or circumstance occurred.
19 2. Such report shall include, but not be limited to, the name of the
20 person protected by diplomatic immunity; the person's title, position
21 and/or assignment in the United States; and the date, time, location and
22 nature of the incident, including the potential penal law violations

3 3. Every law enforcement and police agency shall issue a biannual
4 update listing any and all incidents to:
5 (a) the secretary of state of the United States;
6 (b) the secretary-general of the United Nations;
7 (c) the ambassador or chief diplomatic officer to the United States of
8 such individual's home country and of the country employing such indi-
9 vidual in a capacity through which such individual enjoys diplomatic
10 immunity;
11 (d) the governor;
12 (e) the attorney general; and
13 (f) the chief elected officer of the locality in which such incident,
14 occurrence or circumstance occurred.
15 S 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
