AN ACT to amend the education law, in relation to continuing early college high schools in the state

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

The Legislature hereby finds and Section 1. Legislative intent. 1 2 declares it necessary to preserve and continue early college high 3 schools in the State that provide various students, including those traditionally underrepresented in post-secondary education, with the 4 opportunity to access college-level courses and college degree credits 5 б at the high school level with the combined support of high school and 7 college staff and resources. The early college high school program not only increases these students' access to higher education, but also 8 reduces potential costs for these students in completing college degrees 9 10 allowing them to either complete a degree upon graduation from high by school earned college 11 or to apply their credits towards а Baccalaureate's degree. This innovative program provides incentives to 12 13 high school students to proceed to college and to earn a college degree by accelerating their overall completion of such a degree. It also 14 better prepares them for college-level coursework, which, will in turn, 15 increase their academic performance. Ultimately, this program increases 16 graduation rates both at the high school and college levels. 17

18 The Legislature hereby finds and declares it necessary to provide 19 funding for these schools to ensure that they continue in operation and 20 continue to provide students with these valuable services. Although 21 early college high schools are public high schools, the cost of providing college-level courses, including the costs of instruction at a part-22 nering college and college-level books and materials, exceeds the costs 23 24 a traditional public school. At the same time, the Legislature of 25 recognizes that accelerating the completion of a student's college 26 degree at the high school level will result in a student requiring less tuition assistance funds (TAP) to complete their degree at the post-sec-27

ondary level. Therefore, these schools ultimately result in significant 1 cost-savings to TAP funds. Furthermore, given these students' increased 2 3 preparedness for post-secondary education, which should, in turn, equate 4 to enhanced academic performance in school, they are a great investment 5 of TAP funds. S 2. The education law is amended by adding a new section 667-d to 6 7 read as follows: 8 S 667-D. SUPPLEMENTAL TUITION ASSISTANCE AWARDS FOR EARLY COLLEGE HIGH 9 SCHOOL PROGRAMS. 10 NOTWITHSTANDING ANY RULE, REGULATION, OR LAW TO THE CONTRARY, THE 1. PRESIDENT SHALL BE AUTHORIZED TO MAKE ANNUAL TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM 11 12 TO APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOLS IN THE STATE THAT OPERATE AWARDS 13 APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAMS ON BEHALF OF ELIGIBLE 14 STUDENTS ENROLLED IN SUCH PROGRAMS. 15 2. FOR PURPOSES OF THIS SECTION: 16 A. "APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM" MEANS AN EARLY COLLEGE 17 HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM, APPROVED BY THE COMMISSIONER IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE 18 REGULATIONS OF THE COMMISSIONER, WHICH PROVIDES ELIGIBLE STUDENTS 19 ENROLLED AT SUCH PROGRAM WITH HIGH SCHOOL COURSES LEADING TO THE GRANT-20 HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA AND COLLEGE-LEVEL COURSES LEADING TO THE ING OF A 21 GRANTING OF A POST-SECONDARY DEGREE OR DIPLOMA AT A PARTNERING COLLEGE 22 APPROVED BY THE DEPARTMENT; AND 23 "APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL" MEANS A PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL Β. 24 THAT OPERATES AN APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM; 25 C. "ELIGIBLE STUDENT" MEANS A STUDENT WHO: 26 (I) IS A RESIDENT OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT IN WHICH THE SCHOOL IS LOCATED AND IS ENROLLED IN SUCH SCHOOL DISTRICT; 27 28 REGISTERED TO ATTEND THE ELEVENTH OR TWELFTH GRADE AT SUCH (II) IS 29 HIGH SCHOOL FOR THE ACADEMIC YEAR IN WHICH THE TUITION ASSISTANCE AWARD IS BEING SOUGHT BY SUCH SCHOOL; 30 31 (III) ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE FREE OR REDUCED PRICE LUNCH IN ONE OF WAS 32 THE TWO PRECEDING SCHOOL YEARS; AND 33 (IV) IS EITHER MATRICULATED IN AN APPROVED PROGRAM LEADING ΤO THE 34 GRANTING OF A POST-SECONDARY DEGREE OR DIPLOMA, OR WHO HAS DEMONSTRATED 35 THE SATISFACTION OF THE COMMISSIONER THE ABILITY TO TO COMPLETE WORK IN ACCORDANCE WITH SUBDIVISION THREE OF THIS 36 COLLEGE-LEVEL COURSE 37 SECTION. 38 D. "EXCESS COST PER STUDENT" MEANS THE ADDITIONAL COST OF PROVIDING AN 39 ELIGIBLE STUDENT WITH COLLEGE-LEVEL COURSE WORK, AS DETERMINED BY THE 40 COMMISSIONER IN ACCORDANCE WITH A METHODOLOGY PRESCRIBED BY THE COMMIS-41 SIONER. TUITION ASSISTANCE 42 3. THE PRESIDENT SHALL MAKE PROGRAM AWARDS TO 43 APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOLS IN THE FOLLOWING MANNER: 44 COMMENCING WITH THE TWO THOUSAND TWELVE--TWO THOUSAND THIRTEEN Α. 45 ACADEMIC YEAR, AN APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL MAY APPLY THE ΤO 46 CORPORATION FOR AN ANNUAL TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM AWARD IN AN AMOUNT 47 NOT TO EXCEED THE PRODUCT OF: (I) THE TOTAL NUMBER OF ELIGIBLE STUDENTS 48 ENROLLED IN AN APPROVED EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM IN SUCH SCHOOL 49 AND (II)EITHER FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS OR THE EXCESS COST PER STUDENT, 50 WHICHEVER IS LESS. 51 4. A STUDENT SHALL BE CONSIDERED A STUDENT WITH THE ABILITY ТΟ COMPLETE COLLEGE-LEVEL COURSE WORK IF HE OR SHE MEETS AT LEAST TWO 52 REQUIREMENTS PRESCRIBED BY THE COMMISSIONER IN THE REGULATIONS OF 53 THE 54 COMMISSIONER, WHICH SHALL INCLUDE, BUT NEED NOT BE LIMITED TO, THE 55 FOLLOWING:

1 A. THE STUDENT HAS SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED A SPECIFIED NUMBER OF HOURS 2 OF COLLEGE-LEVEL INSTRUCTION AT AN APPROVED PARTNERING COLLEGE, AS 3 DETERMINED BY THE COMMISSIONER;

4 B. THE STUDENT HAS OBTAINED A TEST SCORE OF AT LEAST THE EIGHTIETH 5 PERCENTILE ON ALL REGENTS EXAMINATIONS ADMINISTERED TO SUCH STUDENT IN 6 THE NINTH AND TENTH GRADES; AND

C. THE STUDENT HAS DEMONSTRATED THE ABILITY TO COMPLETE COLLEGE-LEVEL
COURSE WORK THROUGH HIGH SCHOOL LEVEL COURSE WORK IN MATHEMATICS,
ENGLISH AND SCIENCE, INCLUDING TESTS, HOMEWORK, AND LAB WORK.

10 5. NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION OF LAW, RULE OR REGULATION TO 11 THE CONTRARY, THE PAYMENT OF A TUITION ASSISTANCE AWARD PURSUANT TO THIS 12 SECTION ON BEHALF OF AN ELIGIBLE STUDENT SHALL NOT BE CONSTRUED TO LIMIT 13 THE AMOUNT OR DURATION OF A TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM AWARD AVAILABLE 14 TO ANY SUCH STUDENT.

15 6. AN EARLY COLLEGE HIGH SCHOOL SHALL NOT OTHERWISE BE SUBJECT TO THE 16 REQUIREMENTS FOR RECEIVING PAYMENT ON A TUITION ASSISTANCE PROGRAM AWARD 17 PURSUANT TO THIS ARTICLE.

18 S 3. This act shall take effect immediately, provided that if this act 19 shall have become a law on or after July 1, 2012, it shall be deemed to 20 have been in full force and effect on and after July 1, 2012.
