- AN ACT to amend the economic development law, in relation to establishing entrepreneurship assistance centers; to amend the economic development law and the labor law, in relation to making technical corrections relating thereto; and to repeal article 9 of the economic development law relating thereto

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

39	SERVICES TO ELIGIBLE CLIENTS, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO:
40	(A) ORIENTATION AND SCREENING OF PROSPECTIVE ENTREPRENEURS;

7 1. MONITOR THE PERFORMANCE OF EACH ENTREPRENEURIAL ASSISTANCE CENTER 8 AND REQUIRE PERIODIC AND ANNUAL REPORTS FROM EACH ENTREPRENEURIAL 9 ASSISTANCE CENTER AT SUCH TIME AND IN SUCH A MANNER AS PRESCRIBED BY THE 10 COMMISSIONER.

SUCH 15 REPORT SHALL DISCUSS THE EXTENT TO WHICH THE CENTERS SERVE MINORITY 16 GROUP MEMBERS, WOMEN, INDIVIDUALS WITH A DISABILITY AND DISLOCATED WORK-ERS; THE EXTENT TO WHICH THE TRAINING PROGRAM IS COORDINATED WITH OTHER 17 ASSISTANCE PROGRAMS TARGETED TO SMALL AND NEW BUSINESSES; THE ABILITY OF 18 19 SUCH PROGRAM TO LEVERAGE OTHER SOURCES OF FUNDING AND SUPPORT; AND THE 20 SUCCESS OF THE PROGRAM IN AIDING ENTREPRENEURS TO START UP NEW BUSI-21 NESSES, INCLUDING THE NUMBER OF NEW BUSINESS START-UPS RESULTING FROM 22 THE PROGRAM. SUCH REPORT SHALL RECOMMEND CHANGES AND IMPROVEMENTS IN THE 23 TRAINING PROGRAM AND IN THE QUALITY OF SUPPLEMENTAL TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE OFFERED TO GRADUATES OF THE TRAINING PROGRAMS. 24

25 3. SUBMIT TO THE DIRECTOR OF THE DIVISION OF THE BUDGET, THE CHAIR-PERSON OF THE SENATE FINANCE COMMITTEE AND THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE ASSEM-26 27 BLY WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE AN EVALUATION OF THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE 28 PROGRAMS ESTABLISHED UNDER THIS ARTICLE PREPARED BY AN ENTITY INDEPEND-29 ENTOF THE DEPARTMENT. SUCH EVALUATION SHALL BE SUBMITTED BY SEPTEMBER FIRST, TWO THOUSAND SIXTEEN AND BY SEPTEMBER FIRST 30 EVERY FOUR YEARS 31 THEREAFTER.

37 S 2. Paragraph (c) of subdivision 37-b of section 100 of the economic 38 development law, as added by chapter 524 of the laws of 2005, is amended 39 to read as follows:

40 (c) Subdivision two of section two hundred [thirteen] TWELVE OF THIS 41 CHAPTER, submitting the results of the annual evaluation of the entre-42 preneurial assistance programs established under article nine OF THIS 43 CHAPTER.

44 S 3. Subparagraph (iii) of paragraph (c) of subdivision 2 of section 45 591-a of the labor law, as amended by section 1 of part Z of chapter 57 46 of the laws of 2013, is amended to read as follows:

47 (iii) are participating in self-employment assistance activities approved by the department and by the department of economic development 48 49 which include but need not be limited to entrepreneurial training, busi-50 ness counseling, and technical assistance, including financing assist-51 ance for qualified individuals as appropriate, offered by entrepreneurship [support] ASSISTANCE centers established pursuant to section two 52 hundred [twelve] ELEVEN of the economic development law, state universi-53 54 ty of New York small business development centers, programs offered by 55 community-based organizations, local development corporations, and 56 boards of cooperative educational services (BOCES) as established pursu1 ant to section one thousand nine hundred fifty of the education law; 2 and, unless otherwise required by federal law or regulation, no individ-3 ual shall be prohibited from or disqualified from eligibility for the 4 program if prior to applying for the program, an individual has printed 5 business cards or has a website that is designed but not active, and 6 neither are being used to solicit or conduct business;

7 S 4. This act shall take effect immediately; provided that the amend-8 ments to subparagraph (iii) of paragraph (c) of subdivision 2 of section 9 591-a of the labor law made by section three of this act shall not 10 affect the repeal of such section and shall be deemed to repeal there-11 with.
