AN ACT to amend the environmental conservation law, the parks, recreation and historic preservation law, and the state finance law, in relation to environmental assessment of historic preservation plan

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

1 Section 1. Subdivision 6 of section 8-0111 of the environmental
2 conservation law, as added by chapter 612 of the laws of 1975, is
3 amended to read as follows:

4 6. Lead Agency. When an action is to be carried out or approved by two
5 or more agencies, the DEPARTMENT SHALL BE DESIGNATED AS LEAD AGENCY AND
6 determination of whether the action may have a significant effect on the
7 environment shall be made by the [lead agency] DEPARTMENT having principal
8 responsibility for carrying out or approving such action and [such
9 agency] shall prepare[, or cause to be prepared by contract or otherwise,
10] the environmental impact statement for the action if such a
11 statement is required by this article. [In the event that there is a
12 question as to which is the lead agency, any agency may submit the question
13 to the commissioner and the commissioner shall designate the lead
14 agency, giving due consideration to the capacity of such agency to
15 fulfill adequately the requirements of this article.]

16 S 2. Paragraph (a) of subdivision 3 of section 70-0109 of the environmental
17 conservation law is amended by adding a new subparagraph (iii) to
18 read as follows:

19 (III) IN THE CASE OF AN APPLICATION FOR A STATE POLLUTANT DISCHARGE
20 ELIMINATION SYSTEM (SPDES) PERMIT ISSUED IN LIEU OF A NATIONAL POLLUTANT
21 DISCHARGE ELIMINATION SYSTEM PERMIT, SUCH DECISION SHALL BE MAILED ON OR
22 BEFORE THIRTY CALENDAR DAYS AFTER THE DEPARTMENT MAILED WRITTEN NOTICE TO
23 THE APPLICANT THAT THE APPLICATION IS COMPLETE OR ON OR BEFORE THIRTY
24 CALENDAR DAYS AFTER THE APPLICATION IS DEEMED COMPLETE PURSUANT TO THE
25 PROVISIONS OF THIS ARTICLE.

26 S 3. Subdivision 5 of section 8-0109 of the environmental conservation
27 law, as amended by chapter 252 of the laws of 1977, and the opening

1 paragraph as amended by chapter 749 of the laws of 1991, is amended to
2 read as follows:

3 5. After the filing of a draft environmental impact statement the
4 agency shall determine whether or not to conduct a public hearing on the
5 environmental impact of the proposed action. If the agency determines to
6 hold such a hearing, it shall commence the hearing within [sixty] THIRTY
7 days of the filing and unless the proposed action is withdrawn from
8 consideration shall prepare the environmental impact statement within
9 [forty-five] THIRTY days after the close of the hearing, except as
10 otherwise provided. The need for such a hearing shall be determined in
11 accordance with procedures adopted by the agency pursuant to section
12 8-0113 of this article. If no hearing is held, the agency shall prepare
13 and make available the environmental impact statement within [sixty]
14 THIRTY days after the filing of the draft, except as otherwise provided.

15 Notwithstanding the specified time periods established by this arti-
16 cle, an agency shall vary the times so established herein for prepara-
17 tion, review and public hearings to coordinate the environmental review
18 process with other procedures relating to review and approval of an
19 action. An application for a permit or authorization for an action upon
20 which a draft environmental impact statement is determined to be
21 required shall not be complete until such draft statement has been filed
22 and accepted by the agency as satisfactory with respect to scope,
23 content and adequacy for purposes of [paragraph] SUBDIVISION four of
24 this section. Commencing upon such acceptance, the environmental impact
25 statement process shall run concurrently with other procedures relating
26 to the review and approval of the action so long as reasonable time is
27 provided for preparation, review and public hearings with respect to the
28 draft environmental impact statement.

29 S 4. Subdivisions 3 and 4 of section 14.07 of the parks, recreation
30 and historic preservation law, as added by chapter 354 of the laws of
31 1980, are amended to read as follows:

32 3. THE COMMISSIONER SHALL DETERMINE WHICH PROPERTIES WITHIN THE STATE
33 ARE ELIGIBLE FOR INCLUSION ON THE STATE REGISTER. ELIGIBILITY SHALL BE
34 DETERMINED BY WHETHER THE EDGE OF A PROPERTY IS LOCATED WITHIN A MILE OF
35 ANY PROPERTY DESIGNATED AS A STATE HISTORIC PLACE OR NATIONAL HISTORIC
36 PLACE, OR A PROPERTY IS LOCATED IN AN AREA WHERE CULTURAL OR HISTORICAL
37 ACTIVITIES ARE LIKELY TO HAVE OCCURRED BASED ON ARCHAEOLOGICAL PRECEDENT
38 OR HISTORICAL EVIDENCE. THE COMMISSIONER SHALL UPDATE THE LIST OF ELIGI-
39 BLE PROPERTIES FOR THE STATE REGISTER EVERY THREE YEARS. THE INITIAL
40 LIST SHALL BE PUBLISHED IN DRAFT FORM AND MADE AVAILABLE FOR PUBLIC
41 COMMENT WITH A PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD OF NO LESS THAN SIXTY DAYS, AND BE
42 THE SUBJECT OF NO LESS THAN AT LEAST THREE PUBLIC HEARINGS THROUGHOUT
43 THE STATE. SUBSEQUENT ADDITIONS TO THE REGISTER OF ANY PROPERTIES SHALL
44 BE THE SUBJECT OF AT LEAST ONE PUBLIC HEARING AND A PUBLIC COMMENT PERI-
45 OD OF NO LESS THAN THIRTY DAYS. THE COMMISSIONER SHALL PUBLISH A MAP OF
46 ALL PROPERTIES INCLUDED ON THE LIST OF ELIGIBLE PROPERTIES FOR THE STATE
47 REGISTER ON ITS WEBSITE, AND PROVIDE A COPY OF SUCH MAP TO ALL STATE
48 AGENCIES, PUBLIC AUTHORITIES AND MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENTS.

49 4. Statewide comprehensive historic preservation plan. The commission-
50 er, in consultation with the board, shall prepare a statewide comprehen-
51 sive historic preservation plan. This plan may include proposals for the
52 preservation and use of registered property. The annual state plan
53 submitted to the Heritage Conservation and Recreation Service in the
54 United States Department of Interior may substantially be used in
55 preparing this plan. The agency preservation officers shall cooperate
56 and municipal officials may cooperate with the commissioner in the

1 promulgation of plans and proposals in relation to historic places with-
2 in their respective jurisdictions. The commissioner shall update the
3 plan annually. The commissioner shall annually notify every agency pres-
4 ervation officer and municipal official of the availability of the state
5 plan or the annual update and a copy of the annual plan or update shall
6 be sent to every agency preservation officer and municipal official
7 requesting such a plan or update.

8 [4] 5. From funds available from the federal government for historic
9 preservation purposes which may be used for reimbursement as hereinafter
10 provided, and funds appropriated by the state for the purpose of assist-
11 ing local and regional preservation programs, OR FOR THE PURPOSE OF
12 ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY AS MAY BE REQUIRED BY THE COMMISSIONER PURSUANT TO
13 PERMIT REQUIREMENTS UNDER ARTICLE EIGHT OR SEVENTEEN OF THE ENVIRON-
14 MENTAL CONSERVATION LAW, including funds for OTHER SUCH survey and plan-
15 ning, the commissioner may provide reimbursement to municipalities and
16 private organizations which undertake surveys and studies of historic
17 places and cultural resources, prepare local historic preservation
18 reports or otherwise assist the commissioner in carrying out his histor-
19 ic preservation responsibilities.

20 S 5. The state finance law is amended by adding a new section 99-w to
21 read as follows:

22 S 99-W. THE NEW YORK STATE ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY ASSISTANCE FUND. 1.
23 THERE IS HEREBY ESTABLISHED IN THE JOINT CUSTODY OF THE COMPTROLLER AND
24 THE COMMISSIONER OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION A FUND FOR THE REIMBURSE-
25 MENT OF COSTS ASSOCIATED WITH AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY, WHEN A MUNICI-
26 PALITY OR PRIVATE ORGANIZATION IS DIRECTLY REQUIRED BY THE COMMISSIONER
27 OF THE OFFICE OF PARKS, RECREATION AND HISTORIC PRESERVATION, THE
28 COMMISSIONER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION, OR ANY
29 RELATED STATE AGENCY HEAD IN THE STATE TO UNDERTAKE THE SURVEY. THE
30 ADMINISTRATION OF SUCH FUND SHALL BE THE SOLE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE
31 COMMISSIONER OF THE OFFICE OF PARKS, RECREATION AND HISTORIC PRESERVA-
32 TION.

33 2. THE FUND WILL CONSIST OF APPROPRIATED FEDERAL FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE
34 OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEYING OR APPROPRIATED STATE FUNDS FOR THE PURPOSE
35 OF ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEYING.

36 3. IN DEVELOPING THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE FUND, THE COMMISSIONER OF
37 THE OFFICE OF PARKS, RECREATION AND HISTORIC PRESERVATION, IN CONJUNC-
38 TION WITH THE COMMISSIONER OF THE DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVA-
39 TION, SHALL DEVELOP GUIDELINES FOR THE REIMBURSEMENT OF COSTS ASSOCIATED
40 WITH AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY UNDERTAKEN BY A MUNICIPALITY OR A PRIVATE
41 ORGANIZATION. SUCH GUIDELINES SHALL, AT A MINIMUM, PROVIDE THAT:

42 (A) IF AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY DOES NOT YIELD ANY HISTORICAL OR
43 CULTURAL ARTIFACTS, THE COSTS OF SUCH SURVEY SHALL BE FULLY REIMBURSED
44 BY THE FUND;

45 (B) IF AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY DOES YIELD HISTORICAL OR CULTURAL
46 ARTIFACTS AND THE COST OF SUCH SURVEY IS UNDER ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND
47 DOLLARS, AT LEAST HALF THE COST OF SUCH SURVEY SHALL BE REIMBURSED BY
48 THE FUND;

49 (C) IF AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY DOES YIELD HISTORICAL OR CULTURAL
50 ARTIFACTS AND THE COST OF SUCH SURVEY IS OVER ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND
51 DOLLARS, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE OFFICE OF PARKS, RECREATION AND HISTOR-
52 IC PRESERVATION SHALL DETERMINE AN APPROPRIATE REIMBURSEMENT LEVEL,
53 PROVIDED THAT SUCH REIMBURSEMENT BY THE FUND SHALL BE NO LESS THAN TWEN-
54 TY-FIVE PERCENT.

55 4. WITHIN NINETY DAYS OF THE EFFECTIVE DATE OF THIS SECTION, THE
56 COMMISSIONER OF THE OFFICE OF PARKS, RECREATION AND HISTORIC PRESERVA-

1 TION SHALL ESTABLISH RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ADMINISTERING THE FUND,
2 INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, AN APPLICATION PROCESS, A TIMELINE FOR
3 REIMBURSING MUNICIPALITIES OR PRIVATE ORGANIZATIONS THAT ARE DIRECTLY
4 REQUIRED TO UNDERTAKE AN ARCHAEOLOGICAL SURVEY, AND ANY OTHER RULES OR
5 REGULATIONS THAT THE COMMISSIONER DEEMS NECESSARY.

6 S 6. This act shall take effect immediately.
