AN ACT to amend the economic development law and the public officers law, in relation to the establishment of regional economic development councils; and to provide for the repeal of such provisions upon expiration thereof

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The economic development law is amended by adding a new
 section 11 to read as follows:
 S 11. REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCILS. 1. THE GOVERNOR SHALL
 ESTABLISH TEN REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCILS, ONE FOR EACH OF
 THE FOLLOWING REGIONS OF THE STATE:

(A) LONG ISLAND (WHICH CONSISTS OF SUFFOLK AND NASSAU COUNTIES);

7 (B) THE CITY OF NEW YORK (WHICH CONSISTS OF BRONX, NEW YORK, QUEENS, 8 BROOKLYN, AND RICHMOND COUNTIES);

9 (C) THE MID-HUDSON REGION (WHICH CONSISTS OF SULLIVAN, ULSTER, DUTCH-10 ESS, ORANGE, PUTNAM, WESTCHESTER, AND ROCKLAND COUNTIES);

11 (D) THE SOUTHERN TIER (WHICH CONSISTS OF STEUBEN, SCHUYLER, TOMPKINS, 12 CHEMUNG, TIOGA, CHENANGO, BROOME, AND DELAWARE COUNTIES);

13 (E) THE CAPITAL REGION (WHICH CONSISTS OF WARREN, WASHINGTON, SARATO-14 GA, SCHENECTADY, RENSSELAER, ALBANY, COLUMBIA, AND GREENE COUNTIES);

15 (F) THE MOHAWK VALLEY (WHICH CONSISTS OF ONEIDA, HERKIMER, FULTON, 16 MONTGOMERY, OTSEGO, AND SCHOHARIE COUNTIES);

17 (G) THE NORTH COUNTRY (WHICH CONSISTS OF CLINTON, FRANKLIN, ST. 18 LAWRENCE, JEFFERSON, LEWIS, HAMILTON, AND ESSEX COUNTIES);

19 (H) THE CENTRAL REGION (WHICH CONSISTS OF OSWEGO, CAYUGA, ONONDAGA, 20 MADISON, AND CORTLAND COUNTIES);

(I) THE FINGER LAKES REGION (WHICH CONSISTS OF ORLEANS, MONROE, WAYNE,
 GENESEE, WYOMING, LIVINGSTON, ONTARIO, SENECA, AND YATES COUNTIES); AND
 (J) THE WESTERN REGION (WHICH CONSISTS OF NIAGARA, ERIE, CHAUTAUQUA,

24 CATTARAUGUS, AND ALLEGANY COUNTIES).

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25 2. EACH REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL SHALL DEVELOP LONG-TERM
 26 STRATEGIC PLANS FOR ECONOMIC GROWTH WITHIN ITS REGION OF THE STATE.

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3. THE MEMBERS OF EACH REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL SHALL 1 BE 2 LOCAL EXPERTS AND STAKEHOLDERS FROM BUSINESSES, ACADEMIA, MUNICIPALITIES 3 AND NON-GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS WITHIN THE REGION. ALL SUCH MEMBERS 4 SHALL BE APPOINTED BY THE GOVERNOR, WITH THE ADVICE AND CONSENT OF THE 5 SENATE, AND SHALL SERVE AT THE PLEASURE OF THE GOVERNOR.

6 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCILS SHALL BE MEMBERS OF REGIONAL 4. ALL 7 SUBJECT TO THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION SEVENTY-THREE-A OF THE PUBLIC OFFI-8 CERS LAW.

9 S 2. Subparagraphs (ii) and (iii) of paragraph (c) of subdivision 1 of 10 section 73-a of the public officers law, as amended by section 5 of part 11 A of chapter 399 of the laws of 2011, are amended and a new subparagraph 12 (iv) is added to read as follows:

13 (ii) officers and employees of statewide elected officials, officers 14 employees of state departments, boards, bureaus, divisions, commisand 15 sions, councils or other state agencies, who receive annual compensation in excess of the filing rate established by paragraph (1) of this subdi-16 17 vision or who hold policy-making positions, as annually determined by appointing authority and set forth in a written instrument which 18 the 19 shall be filed with the joint commission on public ethics established by 20 section ninety-four of the executive law during the month of February, 21 provided, however, that the appointing authority shall amend such writ-22 ten instrument after such date within thirty days after the undertaking 23 of policy-making responsibilities by a new employee or any other employ-24 ee whose name did not appear on the most recent written instrument; 25 [and]

(iii) members or directors of public authorities, other than multi-26 state authorities, public benefit corporations and commissions at least 27 one of whose members is appointed by the governor, and employees of such 28 29 authorities, corporations and commissions who receive annual compensation in excess of the filing rate established by paragraph (1) of this 30 subdivision or who hold policy-making positions, as determined annually 31 32 by the appointing authority and set forth in a written instrument which 33 shall be filed with the joint commission on public ethics established by section ninety-four of the executive law during the month of February, 34 35 provided, however, that the appointing authority shall amend such writinstrument after such date within thirty days after the undertaking 36 ten 37 of policy-making responsibilities by a new employee or any other employ-38 ee whose name did not appear on the most recent written instrument[.]; 39 AND 40

(IV) MEMBERS OF REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCILS.

S 3. Section 74 of the public officers law, as amended by chapter 1012 41 of the laws of 1965, the opening paragraph of subdivision 1 and subdivi-42 43 sion 4 as amended by chapter 14 of the laws of 2007 and paragraph (d) of 44 subdivision 3 as amended by chapter 1 of the laws of 2010, is amended to 45 read as follows:

S 74. Code of ethics. 1. Definition. As used in this section: The term 46 47 shall mean any state department, or division, board, "state agency" 48 commission, or bureau of any state department or any public benefit 49 corporation or public authority at least one of whose members is 50 the governor or corporations closely affiliated with appointed by 51 specific state agencies as defined by paragraph (d) of subdivision five of section fifty-three-a of the state finance law or their successors. 52

The term "legislative employee" shall mean any officer or employee of 53 54 the legislature but it shall not include members of the legislature. 55 Rule with respect to conflicts of interest. No officer or employee 2.

of a state agency, member of the legislature or legislative employee OR 56

MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL should have any inter-1 2 financial or otherwise, direct or indirect, or engage in any busiest, ness or transaction or professional activity or incur any obligation of 3 any nature, which is in substantial conflict with the proper discharge 4 5 of his duties in the public interest. 6

3. Standards.

7 a. No officer or employee of a state agency, member of the legislature 8 or legislative employee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL should accept other employment which will impair his independ-9 10 ence of judgment in the exercise of his official duties.

11 b. No officer or employee of a state agency, member of the legislature or legislative employee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT 12 13 should accept employment or engage in any business or profes-COUNCIL 14 sional activity which will require him to disclose confidential informa-15 tion which he has gained by reason of his official position or authori-16 ty.

17 c. No officer or employee of a state agency, member of the legislature or legislative employee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT 18 19 COUNCIL should disclose confidential information acquired by him in the 20 course of his official duties nor use such information to further his 21 personal interests.

22 d. No officer or employee of a state agency, member of the legislature 23 or legislative employee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT 24 COUNCIL should use or attempt to use his or her official position to 25 secure unwarranted privileges or exemptions for himself or herself or 26 others, including but not limited to, the misappropriation to himself, herself or to others of the property, services or other resources of the 27 state for private business or other compensated 28 non-governmental 29 purposes.

e. No officer or employee of a state agency, member of the legislature 30 legislative employee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT 31 or 32 COUNCIL should engage in any transaction as representative or agent of state with any business entity in which he has a direct or indirect 33 the 34 financial interest that might reasonably tend to conflict with the prop-35 er discharge of his official duties.

36 f. An officer or employee of a state agency, member of the legislature 37 or legislative employee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL should not by his conduct give reasonable basis for the 38 impression that any person can improperly influence him or unduly enjoy 39 40 favor in the performance of his official duties, or that he is his affected by the kinship, rank, position or influence of any party or 41 42 person.

43 An officer or employee of a state agency OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL g. 44 ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL should abstain from making personnel 45 investments in enterprises which he has reason to believe may be directinvolved in decisions to be made by him or which will otherwise 46 lv 47 create substantial conflict between his duty in the public interest and his private interest. 48

49 h. An officer or employee of a state agency, member of the legislature 50 legislative employee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT or COUNCIL should endeavor to pursue a course of conduct which will not 51 raise suspicion among the public that he is likely to be engaged in acts 52 that are in violation of his trust. 53

54 i. No officer or employee of a state agency employed on a full-time 55 basis nor any firm or association of which such an officer or employee 56 is a member nor corporation a substantial portion of the stock of which 1 is owned or controlled directly or indirectly by such officer or employ-2 ee OR MEMBER OF A REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL, should sell 3 goods or services to any person, firm, corporation or association which 4 is licensed or whose rates are fixed by the state agency in which such 5 officer or employee serves or is employed.

6 4. Violations. In addition to any penalty contained in any other 7 law any such officer, member or employee OR MEMBER OF A provision of 8 REGIONAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL who shall knowingly and intentionally violate any of the provisions of this section may be fined, 9 10 suspended or removed from office or employment in the manner provided by law. Any such individual who knowingly and intentionally violates the 11 provisions of paragraph b, c, d or i of subdivision three of this section shall be subject to a civil penalty in an amount not to exceed 12 13 14 ten thousand dollars and the value of any gift, compensation or benefit 15 received as a result of such violation. Any such individual who knowing-16 ly and intentionally violates the provisions of paragraph a, e or g of subdivision three of this section shall be subject to a civil penalty in 17 18 amount not to exceed the value of any gift, compensation or benefit an 19 received as a result of such violation.

20 S 4. This act shall take effect immediately and shall expire and be 21 deemed repealed two years after such date.
