- AN ACT to amend the social services law, in relation to the state assuming all of the costs for the benefits and services administered under the state's Medicaid program, to amend section 1 of part C of chapter 58 of the laws of 2005, authorizing reimbursements for expenditures made by or on behalf of social services districts for medical assistance for needy persons and the administration thereof, in relation to increasing expenditures; and to repeal certain provisions of the social services law relating thereto (Part A); to amend the social services law, in relation to eligibility for temporary assistance for needy persons and counting emergency assistance towards any other assistance a family may be eligible for under the social services law (Part B); to amend the social services law, in relation to simplifying investigation requirements when there are repeated unfounded CPS investigations, to no longer require investigations of education neglect for children over the age of twelve, to allow the county discretion in setting and determining staffing performance and criteria and to create an adoption incentives board and pilot program (Part C); to amend the education law, in relation to requiring that municipal administrative costs be covered by the state for programs operated under section 4410 of the education law and to allow municipalities to require income based financial participation by the parent or guardian of children enrolled in such programs (Part D); to amend the county law, the family court act and the civil practice law and rules, in relation to funding for indigent defense (Part E); to amend the executive law, in relation to authorizing the collection of administrative fees to support probation services; and to amend chapter 55 of the of 1992 amending the tax law and other laws relating to taxes, laws surcharges, fees and funding, in relation to the effectiveness of certain provisions (Part F); to amend the public health law, in relation to the funding for early intervention programs (Part G); to

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amend the executive law, the navigation law, the penal law, the correction law and the criminal procedure law, in relation to youth detention and allowing the county greater control of where youths are sent for detention; and to repeal certain provisions of the criminal procedure law, the vehicle and traffic law, and the penal law relating thereto (Part H); and to amend the retirement and social security law, in relation to allowing additional contributions to be made by members who joined the retirement system after July 27, 1976 and to preclude overtime hours from being calculated in retirement allowances (Part I)

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. This act enacts into law major components of 1 legislation 2 which are necessary to enact the New York state mandate relief for coun-3 ties act. Each component is wholly contained within a Part identified as 4 Parts A through I. The effective date for each particular provision 5 contained within such Part is set forth in the last section of such Part. Any provision in any section contained within a Part, including 6 the effective date of the Part, which makes reference to a section "of 7 8 this act", when used in connection with that particular component, shall 9 deemed to mean and refer to the corresponding section of the Part in be which it is found. Section four of this act sets forth the general 10 11 effective date of this act.

12 S 2. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "New York state 13 mandate relief for counties act".

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PART A

15 Section 1. Section 368-a of the social services law is REPEALED and a 16 new section 368-a is added to read as follows:

17 S 368-A. STATE REIMBURSEMENT. THE DEPARTMENT SHALL REVIEW THE EXPENDI-18 TURES MADE BY SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS FOR MEDICAL ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY 19 PERSONS, AND THE ADMINISTRATION THEREOF, BEFORE MAKING REIMBURSEMENT. BEFORE APPROVING SUCH EXPENDITURES 20 FOR REIMBURSEMENT, THE DEPARTMENT 21 DUE CONSIDERATION TO THE RESULTS OF THE REVIEWS AND AUDITS SHALL GIVE 22 CONDUCTED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH PURSUANT TO SUBDIVISION TWO OF 23 THREE HUNDRED SIXTY-FOUR OF THIS TITLE. IF APPROVED BY THE SECTION 24 DEPARTMENT, SUCH EXPENDITURES SHALL NOT BE SUBJECT TO REIMBURSEMENT ΒY 25 THE STATE PURSUANT TO SECTION ONE HUNDRED FIFTY-THREE OF THIS ARTICLE OR THIS CHAPTER OTHER THAN THIS SECTION, BUT SHALL BE 26 ANY PROVISION OF 27 SUBJECT TO REIMBURSEMENT BY THE STATE IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION 28 AND THE REGULATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT, AS FOLLOWS:

29 NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION OF LAW, BY JANUARY FIRST, TWO 30 THOUSAND NINETEEN THE STATE SHALL ASSUME ONE HUNDRED PERCENT OF THE SHARE OF COSTS FOR BENEFITS AND SERVICES PROVIDED UNDER THE 31 NON-FEDERAL 32 STATE'S MEDICAID PROGRAM PURSUANT TO THE PROVISIONS OF SUBDIVISION THREE 33 HUNDRED SIXTY-EIGHT-AA OF THIS TITLE.

34 S 2. The social services law is amended by adding a new section 368-aa 35 to read as follows:

36 S 368-AA. STATE ASSUMPTION OF NON-FEDERAL SHARE MEDICAID COSTS. 1.
37 NOTWITHSTANDING ANY OTHER PROVISION OF LAW THE STATE SHALL ASSUME ONE
38 HUNDRED PERCENT OF THE NON-FEDERAL SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS BY JANUARY
39 FIRST, TWO THOUSAND NINETEEN.

2. (A)(I) BEGINNING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND FIFTEEN THE MEDICAL 1 ASSISTANCE EXPENDITURE AMOUNT FOR THE SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE 2 3 CAPPED, FOR A PERIOD OF FIVE YEARS, AT AN AMOUNT EQUAL TO THE PREVIOUS CALENDAR YEAR'S MEDICAL ASSISTANCE EXPENDITURE AMOUNT.

5 (II) THE STATE BY AND THROUGH THE GOVERNOR MAY CHOOSE TO OVERRIDE SUCH 6 CAP DURING THE YEARS TWO THOUSAND FIFTEEN--TWO THOUSAND TWENTY, HOWEVER 7 ANY INCREASES TO EXPENDITURES APPROVED BY THE GOVERNOR SHALL BE FUNDED 8 THROUGH THE STATE BUDGET.

9 (B)(I) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND SIXTEEN THE LOCAL 10 SHARE/COUNTY SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL 11 ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE REDUCED BY TEN 12 PERCENT UNDER THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

(II) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND SIXTEEN THE STATE SHARE 13 14 OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR 15 SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE INCREASED BY TEN PERCENT OVER THE 16 PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

17 (C)(I) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND SEVENTEEN THE LOCAL 18 SHARE/COUNTY SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL 19 ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE REDUCED BY 20 TWENTY PERCENT UNDER THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

21 COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND SEVENTEEN THE STATE (II) 22 SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE INCREASED BY TWENTY PERCENT OVER 23 24 THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

25 (D)(I) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND EIGHTEEN THE LOCAL 26 SHARE/COUNTY SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL 27 ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE REDUCED BY 28 FIFTY PERCENT UNDER THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

29 (II)COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND EIGHTEEN THE STATE 30 SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE INCREASED BY FIFTY PERCENT OVER 31 32 THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

33 (E)(I) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND NINETEEN THELOCAL 34 SHARE/COUNTY SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL 35 ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE REDUCED BY SEVENTY-FIVE PERCENT UNDER THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE. 36

37 (II) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND NINETEEN THE STATE SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AMOUNT 38 39 FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE INCREASED BY SEVENTY PERCENT OVER 40 THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

(F)(I) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND TWENTY THE LOCAL 41 SHARE/COUNTY SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL 42 43 ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE REDUCED BY ONE 44 HUNDRED PERCENT UNDER THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE.

45 (II) COMMENCING STATE FISCAL YEAR TWO THOUSAND TWENTY THE STATE SHARE OF MEDICAID COSTS EXPENDED THROUGH THE MEDICAL ASSISTANCE AMOUNT FOR 46 47 SOCIAL SERVICES DISTRICTS SHALL BE INCREASED BY ONE HUNDRED PERCENT OVER 48 THE PREVIOUS YEAR'S EXPENDITURE RESULTING IN THE ENTIRE EXPENDITURE FOR 49 MEDICAID COST BEING FUNDED BY THE STATE.

50 STATE BY AND THROUGH THE GOVERNOR MAY CHOOSE TO OVERRIDE THE (G) THE 51 CAP ESTABLISHED IN THIS SECTION AFTER THE YEAR TWO THOUSAND TWENTY HOWEVER ANY INCREASES TO EXPENDITURES APPROVED BY THE GOVERNOR SHALL BE 52 FUNDED THROUGH THE STATE BUDGET. 53

54 AS USED IN THIS SECTION THE FOLLOWING TERMS SHALL HAVE THE FOLLOWING 55 MEANINGS: (1) LOCAL SHARE/COUNTY SHARE SHALL MEAN THE PORTION OF ANY

EXPENSES COVERED BY COUNTIES FOR THE ADMINISTRATION, BENEFITS AND 1 2 SERVICE PROVIDED UNDER THE STATE'S MEDICAID PROGRAM.

3 Subdivision (c-1) of section 1 of part C of chapter 58 of the S 3. 4 laws of 2005 authorizing reimbursements for expenditures made by or on 5 social services districts for medical assistance for needy behalf of 6 persons and the administration thereof, as added by section 1 of part F 7 of chapter 56 of the laws of 2012, is amended to read as follows:

(c-1) Notwithstanding any provisions of subdivision (c) of this section to the contrary, effective April 1, 2013, for the period January 8 9 10 1, 2013 through December 31, 2013 and for each calendar year thereafter, 11 the medical assistance expenditure amount for the social services district for such period shall be equal to the previous calendar year's 12 medical assistance expenditure amount[, except that: 13

(1) for the period January 1, 2013 through December 31, 14 2013, the 15 previous calendar year medical assistance expenditure amount will be 16 increased by 2%;

(2) for the period January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2014, the 17 previous calendar year medical assistance expenditure amount will be 18 19 increased by 1%]. (c)] resides in a family that would otherwise be eligible for family assistance except that at least one adult or minor head of household has 39 40 41 been determined in accordance with section one hundred thirty-two of 42 this article to be abusing illegal substances or engaging in the habitual and excessive consumption of alcoholic beverages, or [(d)] (C) is under the age of eighteen, not living with his or 43

44 her 45 child and has no adult relatives with whom to reside, or

46 [(e)] (D) resides in a family in which a person required to submit to screening or evaluation for use of illegal drugs or excess alcohol 47 48 consumption pursuant to section one hundred thirty-two of this article 49 refused to comply, or

[(f)] (E) resides in a family which includes a person disqualified 50 from receiving assistance pursuant to paragraph (f) of subdivision four 51 52 of section one hundred thirty-two of this article, or

53 [(g)] (F) is a qualified alien who is ineligible to receive assistance funded under the temporary assistance for needy families block grant 54

solely because of section four hundred three of the federal personal

2 responsibility and work opportunity reconciliation act of 1996 (P.L. 3 104-193) or is an alien who is permanently residing under color of law 4 but is not a qualified alien. 5 Section 350-j of the social services law is amended by adding a 2. S 6 new subdivision 6 to read as follows: 7 6. Paragraph d of subdivision 10 of section 4410 of the educa-9 tion law, as amended by chapter 705 of the laws of 1992, subparagraph 10 (ii) as amended by section 58 of part H of chapter 83 of the laws of 11 2002 and subparagraph (iii) as amended by section 63 of part A of chap-12 ter 60 of the laws of 2000, is amended to read as follows:

13 d. (i) At the beginning of the school year, the commissioner shall 14 allocate funds for reimbursement of allowable administrative costs, as defined in regulations of the commissioner, incurred by a board pursuant 15 to this section. Such allocation shall be in an amount equal to a school 16 17 district's pro rata share of the statewide base year count of preschool 18 children as a percent of federal funds available for such reimbursement, 19 as determined by the commissioner. In January of any school year in which additional federal funds are determined by the commissioner to be 20 21 available for such reimbursement, the commissioner shall equitably allocate such funds for reimbursement of allowable administrative costs, 22 in 23 a manner determined by the commissioner which is consistent with federal statutes and regulations governing the use of federal funds, to school 24 districts which have demonstrated a need for such additional funds. 25 At close of the school year for which such funds were allocated, each 26 the 27 board shall submit, in a form prescribed by the commissioner, a statement of the allowable administrative costs incurred pursuant to this 28 section. [A board may, subject to approval of the commissioner, 29 submit 30 any allowable administrative costs for which federal funds are not allo-31 cated to that school district pursuant to this subdivision to the appropriate municipality or municipalities for reimbursement pursuant to subdivision eleven of this section.] 32 33

34 (ii) Boards may submit reasonable costs incurred pursuant to para-35 graphs a through d of subdivision seven of this section to the [appro-36 priate municipality] COMMISSIONER for reimbursement. Boards may also 37 submit to the [appropriate municipality] COMMISSIONER for reimbursement 38 of reasonable costs incurred pursuant to paragraph e of subdivision 39 seven of this section: (A) in an action or proceeding brought by another party or (B) in an action or proceeding brought by the board, other than 40 41 action or proceeding brought against the state, a department, board an or agency of the state or a state officer, except where such state 42 defendant is joined as a necessary party to such action or proceeding, 43 if, upon final disposition of the action or proceeding, the board 44 45 receives a judgment in its favor annulling the determination or order of state review officer. The municipality shall be reimbursed for 46 the 47 payment of such costs pursuant to subdivision eleven of this section. 48 (iii) On or after July first, nineteen hundred ninety, and annually

49 thereafter until June thirtieth, two thousand one, municipalities shall 50 be eligible for reimbursement for administrative costs incurred during 51 the preceding year of fifty dollars for each eligible preschool child 52 served in such year pursuant to this section. On or after July first, 53 two thousand one, and annually thereafter, municipalities shall be 54 eligible for reimbursement for ALL administrative costs incurred during

the preceding year [of seventy-five dollars for each eligible preschool 1 2 child served in such year pursuant to this section]. Each municipality 3 shall submit a claim in a form prescribed by the commissioner. Upon 4 approval, reimbursement shall be made by the commissioner from appropri-5 ations available therefor. Such reimbursement shall be made in the first 6 instance from any federal funds designated under federal law for local 7 use, as determined by the commissioner, that are available after satis-8 fying the provisions of subparagraph (i) of this paragraph. To the extent that such federal funds are not sufficient or available to reim-9 10 burse a municipality for such costs, reimbursement shall be made with 11 state funds.

12 S 2. Paragraph a of subdivision 11 of section 4410 of the education 13 law, as amended by chapter 474 of the laws of 1996, is amended to read 14 as follows:

15 a. The approved costs for a preschool child who receives services pursuant to this section shall be a charge upon the municipality wherein 16 17 child resides. COMMENCING THE BEGINNING OF THE SCHOOL YEAR IN THE such 18 YEAR TWO THOUSAND FIFTEEN THE MUNICIPALITY IS HEREBY AUTHORIZED ТΟ 19 REOUIRE FINANCIAL PARTICIPATION BY THE PARENT OR LEGAL GUARDIAN OF ANY 20 CHILD ENROLLED IN A PROGRAM UNDER THIS SECTION. SUCH FINANCIAL PARTIC-21 IPATION COLLECTED BY THE MUNICIPALITY SHALL BE UTILIZED TO FUND ONE 22 HUNDRED PERCENT OF THE MUNICIPALITY'S NON-ADMINISTRATIVE COSTS FOR THE 23 OPERATION OF PROGRAMS IN THIS SECTION. THE COMMISSIONER IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE LOCAL BOARDS SHALL DEVELOP AN INCOME BASED 24 FINANCIAL PARTIC-25 IPATION SCHEDULE FOR TUITION WHICH SHALL BE PAID BY THE PARENT OR LEGAL 26 GUARDIAN OF ANY CHILD ENROLLED IN A PROGRAM UNDER THIS SECTION. THE 27 COMMISSIONER IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE LOCAL BOARDS SHALL ADDITIONALLY 28 INVESTIGATE THE FEASIBILITY OF ACCEPTING THIRD PARTY INSURANCE PAYMENTS 29 FOR SERVICES RENDERED UNDER THIS SECTION AND WHERE APPLICABLE BILL SUCH THIRD PARTY INSURANCE FOR SERVICES RENDERED UNDER THIS SECTION. All 30 approved costs shall be paid in the first instance and at least quarter-31 32 ly by the appropriate governing body or officer of the municipality upon 33 vouchers presented and audited in the same manner as the case of other claims against the municipality.
