- AN ACT to amend the arts and cultural affairs law, in relation to providing educational services aid to eligible museums, historical societies and other cultural institutions chartered by the board of regents for the provision of curriculum-based educational programs for students and teachers in grades pre-kindergarten through twelve and adults enrolled in continuing education programs in low-income urban, suburban and rural communities

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF NEW YORK, REPRESENTED IN SENATE AND ASSEMBLY, DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Statement of legislative findings and intent. The legislature finds and declares that the state of New York has the greatest museums, historical societies, zoos, botanical gardens, aquariums and cultural arts institutions in the United States, and that these organizations are major tourism and economic drivers with a wealth of ways to engage children and adults and instill in them a lasting love of learning.

8 The legislature finds and declares that museums, historical societies, 9 zoos, botanical gardens, aquariums and cultural arts institutions 10 attract millions of visitors each year and provide vitally important 11 instructional services to the schoolchildren of this state, and that

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1 children, in grades pre-kindergarten through twelve and adults enrolled 2 in continuing education programs should have broad and equal access to 3 such services.

The legislature finds that over 1,500 museums, historical societies, 5 zoos, botanical gardens, aquariums and cultural arts institutions in 6 this state now provide instruction to over six million children, and 7 that these institutions now receive no direct state support to initiate, 8 expand and enhance these educational services through access to museum 9 collections, scholarship and virtual learning.

10 The legislature finds that students living in low-income communities 11 in urban, suburban, or rural settings benefit from having access to the 12 type of learning provided by museums, historical societies, zoos, botan-13 ical gardens, aquariums and cultural arts institutions and that fair and 14 equal access to these types of institutions will provide enhanced learn-15 ing opportunities to these students.

The legislature finds that museums, historical societies, zoos, botanical gardens, aquariums and cultural arts institutions, in collaboration with teachers and schools, must design new and innovative museum programs to address such pressing issues as science, anthropology, history and arts literacy, and under-resourced schools.

21 the intent of the legislature that the state provide financial It is 22 assistance to museums, zoos, botanical gardens, aquariums and other 23 cultural institutions located in low-income urban, suburban or rural 24 communities, so that these major tourist attractions can extend their 25 uniquely valuable educational resources to the children and lifelong 26 learners of the state, especially those in low-income urban, suburban or 27 rural communities, or that provide educational services to students from 28 such communities.

29 S 2. Short title. This act shall be known and may be cited as the 30 "museum education act".

31 S 3. The arts and cultural affairs law is amended by adding a new 32 section 61.15 to read as follows:

33 S 61.15. EDUCATION GRANTS FOR MUSEUMS. 1. THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCA-34 TION SHALL DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT, WITH CONSULTATION AND INPUT FROM REPRESENTATIVES FROM THE MUSEUM AND CULTURAL INSTITUTION COMMUNITY, 35 Α 36 MUSEUM AND CULTURAL ORGANIZATION EDUCATION GRANT PROGRAM, AND SHALL 37 AWARD, WITHIN THE AMOUNTS APPROPRIATED FROM THE GENERAL FUND FOR SUCH 38 COMPETITIVE GRANTS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THIS SECTION FOR THE PURPOSE, 39 PURPOSES OF ESTABLISHING OR IMPROVING EDUCATION PROGRAMS IN MUSEUMS AND 40 CULTURAL ORGANIZATIONS DESIGNED TO IMPROVE STUDENT PERFORMANCE IN PUBLIC SECONDARY SCHOOLS. SUCH GRANTS 41 AND NONPUBLIC ELEMENTARY, MIDDLE AND SHALL BE EXPENDED TO SUPPORT THE PRODUCTION OF CURRICULA, ACQUISITION OF 42 43 SPECIALIZED EDUCATIONAL OR INTERPRETIVE SKILLS, ACQUISITION AND IMPLE-44 MENTATION OF TECHNOLOGY, AND PREPARATION OF SPECIALIZED EXHIBITION OR 45 PUBLIC PROGRAMS THAT ARE TAILORED TO ELEMENTARY, MIDDLE SECONDARY AND STUDENTS; THE DEVELOPMENT AND DELIVERY OF CONTINUING EDUCATION 46 SCHOOL 47 PROGRAMS; PROVISION OF STUDENT TRANSPORTATION; AND OTHER PROGRAMS THAT 48 SUPPORT THE DEVELOPMENT AND DELIVERY OF CURRICULUM-BASED PROGRAMS IN 49 MUSEUMS WITH COLLECTIONS.

50 2. AS USED IN THIS SECTION, "ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION" SHALL MEAN: (A) Α INSTITUTION CHARTERED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS, OR OTHERWISE 51 NONPROFIT INCORPORATED AS A MUSEUM, HISTORICAL SOCIETY, NATURE CENTER, ZOO, BOTAN-52 ICAL GARDEN, ARBORETUM, AQUARIUM OR OTHER CULTURAL EDUCATION 53 INSTITU-54 TION, OR A PRIVATELY OR MUNICIPALLY OPERATED INSTITUTION THAT MEETS THE 55 APPLICABLE REGISTRATION STANDARDS ESTABLISHED BY THE BOARD OF REGENTS 56 FOR MUSEUMS OR HISTORICAL SOCIETIES WITH COLLECTIONS, AND THAT IS 1 LOCATED IN A LOW-INCOME URBAN, SUBURBAN OR RURAL COMMUNITY OR PROVIDES 2 EDUCATIONAL SERVICES TO STUDENTS AND ADULT LEARNERS FROM LOW-INCOME 3 URBAN, SUBURBAN OR RURAL COMMUNITIES; OR

4 (B) A PRIVATE NOT-FOR-PROFIT COMMUNITY BASED ORGANIZATION, INCLUDING 5 AN INCORPORATED INSTITUTION THE SOLE OR PRIMARY PURPOSE OF WHICH IS THE 6 SUPPORT OF MUSEUMS, HISTORIC SITES OR HISTORICAL SOCIETIES LOCATED IN A 7 LOW-INCOME URBAN, SUBURBAN OR RURAL COMMUNITY OR THAT PROVIDES EDUCA-TIONAL SERVICES TO STUDENTS AND ADULT LEARNERS FROM LOW-INCOME URBAN, 8 SUBURBAN OR RURAL COMMUNITIES; EXCEPT THAT INSTITUTIONS OPERATED BY 9 10 STATE OR FEDERAL GOVERNMENT AGENCIES SHALL NOT BE CONSIDERED ELIGIBLE 11 UNDER THIS SECTION.

3. THE GOVERNING BODY OR OFFICER OF AN ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION REQUESTING 12 A GRANT PURSUANT TO THIS SECTION SHALL SUBMIT AN APPLICATION AT SUCH 13 14 TIME, IN SUCH FORM AND CONTAINING SUCH INFORMATION, AS THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION MAY REQUIRE. SUCH COMMISSIONER SHALL ESTABLISH THE CRITERIA 15 AND STANDARDS BY WHICH APPLICATIONS FOR GRANTS TO BE AWARDED PURSUANT TO 16 THIS SECTION WILL BE EVALUATED AND GRANTS MADE TO ELIGIBLE INSTITUTIONS. 17 THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION IS AUTHORIZED TO PROMULGATE REGULATIONS 18 19 FOR THE DEVELOPMENT AND SUBMISSION OF APPLICATIONS FOR COOPERATIVE OR COLLABORATIVE GRANTS, PROVIDED THAT A SINGLE INSTITUTION SERVES AS THE 20 21 APPLICANT FOR SUCH A GRANT AND FOR MULTI-YEAR GRANTS.

4. THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION SHALL AWARD GRANTS, SUBJECT TO AVAIL-22 ABLE APPROPRIATIONS, IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED THE ALLOWABLE COSTS OF 23 THE ELIGIBLE INSTITUTION AS DETERMINED BY SUCH COMMISSIONER, PROVIDED 24 25 THAT THE ALLOWABLE COSTS FOR MUSEUM EDUCATION GRANTS SHALL NOT EXCEED FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS PER YEAR FOR A MAXIMUM OF THREE YEARS. 26 ALLOWABLE COSTS SHALL INCLUDE, BUT NEED NOT BE LIMITED TO, THE REASON-27 ABLE COST OF SALARIES AND FRINGE BENEFITS, MATERIALS AND EQUIPMENT. 28 THE 29 COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION SHALL ALLOCATE A MINIMUM OF TWENTY-FIVE 30 PERCENT OF THE AMOUNT APPROPRIATED FOR SUCH GRANTS TO AWARD TO INSTI-TUTIONS WITH AN OPERATING BUDGET OF BETWEEN TEN THOUSAND DOLLARS AND ONE 31 32 HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS PER YEAR. THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION SHALL ALLOCATE A MINIMUM OF TWENTY-FIVE PERCENT OF THE AMOUNT APPROPRI-33 ATED FOR SUCH GRANTS TO AWARD TO INSTITUTIONS WITH AN OPERATING BUDGET 34 OF BETWEEN ONE HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND ONE DOLLARS AND FIVE HUNDRED THOU-35 SAND DOLLARS PER YEAR. THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION WILL ALLOCATE A 36 MINIMUM OF TWENTY-FIVE PERCENT OF THE AMOUNT APPROPRIATED FOR SUCH 37 38 GRANTS TO AWARD TO INSTITUTIONS WITH AN OPERATING BUDGET OF BETWEEN FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND ONE DOLLARS AND ONE MILLION DOLLARS PER YEAR. 39 THE 40 COMMISSIONER OF EDUCATION SHALL ALLOCATE A MINIMUM OF TWENTY-FIVE PERCENT OF THE AMOUNT APPROPRIATED FOR SUCH GRANTS TO AWARD TO INSTI-41 TUTIONS WITH AN OPERATING BUDGET IN EXCESS OF ONE MILLION DOLLARS PER 42 43 YEAR.

5. ON OR BEFORE MARCH FIFTEENTH, TWO THOUSAND EIGHTEEN AND ON OR 44 45 BEFORE MARCH FIRST OF EACH YEAR THEREAFTER, THE COMMISSIONER OF EDUCA-TION SHALL SUBMIT TO THE CHAIRS OF THE SENATE FINANCE AND THE ASSEMBLY 46 WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEES, AND THE DIRECTOR OF THE BUDGET, A REPORT 47 DETAILING THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS SECTION, THE 48 EXTENT OF PARTICIPATION BY ELIGIBLE INSTITUTIONS, THE RELATIONSHIP OF 49 50 THE PROGRAMS PROVIDED TO SCHOOL CURRICULA, AND THE GEOGRAPHIC DISPERSION OF FUNDS AND PARTICIPATING INSTITUTIONS. 51

52 S 4. This act shall take effect one year after it shall have become a 53 law.
