AN ACT making appropriations for the support of government (Part A); making appropriations for the support of government (Part B); making appropriations for the support of government (Part C); making appropriations for the support of government (Part D)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. This act enacts into law major components of legislation  
2 which are necessary to implement the state fiscal plan for the 2017-2018  
3 state fiscal year. Each component is wholly contained within a Part  
4 identified as Parts A through D. The effective date for each particular  
5 provision contained within such Part is set forth in the last section of  
6 such Part. Any provision in any section contained within a Part,  
7 including the effective date of the Part, which makes a reference to a  
8 section "of this act", when used in connection with that particular  
9 component, shall be deemed to mean and refer to the corresponding  
10 section of the Part in which it is found. Section three of this act sets  
11 forth the general effective date of this act.

17 Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for state  
18 operations, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the

22 b) Where applicable, appropriations made by this chapter for

23 contrary, the \$500,000 appropriated herein available for career and  
24 technical education (CTE) programs shall be awarded, pursuant to a

26 the budget, to provide CTE programs with support and resources to  
27 eliminate barriers to students with special needs and English language  
28 learners from participating in such programs, as well as promote  
29 gender diversity in CTE programs.

30 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the  
31 contrary, the \$1,000,000 appropriated herein available for QUALITYs-  
32 tarsNY shall be used, pursuant to a plan approved by the director of  
33 the budget, to support implementation of a statewide system to  
34 assess, improve, and communicate the level of quality in early  
35 education and care settings throughout the state. Notwithstanding  
36 any provision of law to the contrary, upon approval of the director  
37 of the budget, the \$1,000,000 of funding appropriated herein for  
38 QUALITYstarsNY may be suballocated, interchanged, transferred or  
39 otherwise made available to the office of children and family  
40 services for the sole purpose of administering such system. Provided  
41 that, for the 2016-17 [and 2017-18] through 2018-19 school years, a  
42 portion of these funds shall be used to support programs identified  
43 by the office of children and family services, the department of  
44 health and mental hygiene of the city of New York, or the department  
45 as needing extraordinary quality support.

46 Provided further that, notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of  
47 law, subject to the approval of the director of the budget, funds  
48 appropriated herein may be interchanged with the appropriation for  
49 School District Performance Improvement grants within the general  
50 fund local assistance account office of pre-kindergarten through grade  
51 twelve education program.

52 Notwithstanding section 40 of the state finance law or any provision  
53 of law to the contrary, this appropriation shall lapse on March 31,  
54 [2018] 2019... 250,000,000 ..... (re. \$126,748,000)

55 Funds appropriated herein shall be used to provide competitive grants  
56 pursuant to a request for proposals, developed by the commissioner  
57 and approved by the director of budget, to those school districts  
58 that are participating in the race to the top program and/or which  
59 demonstrate satisfactory progress, as determined by the commissioner,  
60 towards implementation of elements such as high quality student  
61 assessments; use of data to improve instruction and student performance  
62 and provision of professional development to improve teacher  
63 performance; and that those eligible districts also demonstrate the  
64 most improved academic achievement gains and student outcomes such  
65 as establishing or expanding participation in college level or early  
66 college programs; and other appropriate measures of student performance;  
67 provided further that in determining the amount of the award

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2 to be made from the funds appropriated herein for those school  
3 districts identified as making the greatest achievement gains and  
4 eligible for such award, the maximum grant award available to each  
5 school district shall be based upon the size of the district meas-  
6 ured by public school enrollment of the district; and provided further  
7 that such amount shall be adjusted based upon measures of district

34 however, that no school district shall receive any portion of the  
35 funds appropriated herein unless it shall have submitted  
36 documentation that has been approved by the commissioner by September  
37 1 of 2013 and of each school year in which a payment to such district  
38 from this appropriation would otherwise be made demonstrating that it  
39 has fully implemented new standards and procedures for conducting

41 building principals to determine teacher and principal effectiveness.

42 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the  
43 contrary, the \$12,500,000 appropriated herein available for full-day  
44 and half-day pre-kindergarten grants shall be awarded, based on a  
45 request for proposals developed by the commissioner and approved by  
46 the director of the budget, to school districts to establish new full-  
47 day and half-day pre-kindergarten placements and/or to convert  
48 existing half-day pre-kindergarten placements into full-day place-  
49 ments; provided that preference shall be granted for full-day place-  
50 ments while ensuring that a portion of grants include half-day  
51 placements based on eligible applications; and provided, further, that  
52 such grants shall only be used to supplement, not supplant existing  
53 pre-kindergarten programs, and provided further, however, that any

28 teacher-student interactions and child outcomes, and ensure that any  
29 such assessment of child outcomes shall not be used to make highs-  
30 takes educational decisions for individual children. Provided,  
31 further, that no school district shall receive more than forty  
32 percent of the total pre-kindergarten grant allocation.

33 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the  
34 contrary, the \$10,000,000 appropriated herein available for school-  
35 wide extended learning grants shall be awarded to school districts  
36 or school districts in collaboration with not-for-profit communi-  
37 ty-based organizations based on responses to a request for proposals  
38 for planning and implementation grants that is (i) developed by the  
39 commissioner; (ii) approved by the director of the budget; and (iii)  
40 issued by the commissioner. Provided, further, that such grants shall  
41 be awarded based on factors including, but not limited to, the  
42 following: (i) the school district's proposal to target the schools  
43 and students with the greatest need, and (ii) proposal quality.

16 contrary, the \$7,500,000 appropriated herein available for community  
17 schools grants shall be awarded, based on a request for proposals  
18 (i) developed by the state council on children and families in coord-  
19 ination with the commissioner, (ii) approved by the director of the  
20 budget and (iii) issued by the commissioner, to school districts, or  
21 in a city with a population of one million or more an eligible enti-  
22 tity, to improve student outcomes through the implementation of commu-  
23 nity schools programs that use school buildings as community hubs to  
24 deliver co-located or school-linked academic, health, mental health,  
25 nutrition, counseling, legal and/or other services to students and  
26 their families. In a city with a population of one million or more,  
27 eligible entities shall mean the city school district of the city of  
28 New York, or not-for-profit organizations, which shall include not-  
29 for-profit community-based organizations. An eligible entity that is  
30 a not-for-profit may apply for a community school grant provided  
31 that it collaborates with the city school district of the city of  
32 New York and receives the approval of the chancellor of the city  
33 school district of the city of New York. Provided, further, that  
34 such grants shall be awarded based on factors including, but not  
35 limited to, the following: (i) measures of school district need,

20 such plan shall include an application for award of such grants to  
21 such eligible school districts to provide annual teacher excel-  
22 lence fund performance awards of up to \$20,000 to eligible teachers rated  
23 as "highly effective" on the most recent annual professional  
24 performance review, in accordance with the requirements of section  
25 3012-d of the education law and the regulations of the commissioner,  
26 pursuant to such districts' approved applications; provided that in  
27 making such grants the commissioner shall prioritize school  
28 districts' applications based on factors including but not limited  
29 to (i) the extent to which the school district's application would  
30 recognize and reward such teachers in school buildings with the  
31 greatest academic need, in difficult-to-staff subject or certifi-

48 notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, such  
49 \$23,500,000, plus any other amounts so designated in other items of  
50 appropriation within the general fund local assistance account office  
51 of pre-kindergarten through grade twelve education program, shall  
52 constitute the competitive awards amount authorized for the 2015-16  
53 school year.

54 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the  
55 contrary, the \$15,000,000 appropriated herein available for grants  
56 to full-day and half-day pre-kindergarten programs for three-year-  
57 old and four-year-old children shall be awarded, based on a request  
58 for proposals developed by the commissioner and approved by the  
59 director of the budget, to school districts to establish new full-  
60 day and half-day pre-kindergarten placements for three-year-olds and  
61 four-year-olds; provided that such grants shall only be used to  
62 supplement, not supplant existing pre-kindergarten programs; and  
63 provided further, however, that any portion of such \$15,000,000 that  
64 is not awarded shall remain available for subsequent awards in the  
65 2015-16 school year or for full-day and half-day pre-kindergarten  
66 grants to be awarded in subsequent school years. Provided, further,

2 that such grants from funds appropriated herein shall be awarded based  
3 on factors including, but not limited to, the following: (i) measures  
4 of school district need, (ii) measures of the need of students to be  
5 served by each of the school districts, (iii) the school district's  
6 proposal to target the highest need schools and students, (iv) the  
7 extent to which the district's proposal would prioritize funds to  
8 maximize the total number of eligible children in the district served  
9 in pre-kindergarten programs, and (v) proposal quality. Provided,  
10 however, that full-day and half-day pre-kindergarten grants  
11 appropriated herein shall only be available to support programs (i)  
12 that provide instruction for at least five hours per school day for  
13 full-day pre-kindergarten programs and at least two and one-half  
14 hours per school day for half-day pre-kindergarten programs; (ii)  
15 that agree to offer instruction consistent with the New York state  
16 pre-kindergarten foundation for the common core standards; (iii) that  
17 ensure that, to the extent community-based providers are part of such  
18 program, such providers meet the requirements of paragraphs d-1 and  
19 d-2 of subdivision 12 of section 3602-e of the education law; and (iv)  
20 that otherwise comply with all of the same rules and requirements as  
21 universal pre-kindergarten programs pursuant to section 3602-e of  
22 the education law except as modified herein; provided that  
23 notwithstanding paragraph c of subdivision 1 of section 3602-e of  
24 the education law notwithstanding, for the purposes of this  
25 appropriation, an eligible child shall be a resident child who is  
26 three years of age on or before December first of the year in which  
27 he or she is enrolled. Provided, further, that as a condition of  
28 eligibility for receipt of such funding for three-year-olds, a school  
29 district must currently offer a pre-kindergarten program for four-

53 for individual children. Provided, further, that no school district  
54 shall receive more than forty percent of the total pre-kindergarten  
55 for three-year-old and four-year-old children grant allocation.  
56 Provided, further, that notwithstanding any provision of law to the  
57 contrary, the \$2,500,000 appropriated herein available for an  
58 expanded master teachers program shall support the award of stipends  
59 of \$15,000 per annum over four years to individual high-performing  
60 teachers, and of related costs, administered by the state university  
61 of New York pursuant to a plan developed in consultation with the  
62 commissioner, who shall consult with appropriate state organizations  
63 representing K-12 public school teachers and approved by the director  
64 of the budget, to build a corps of outstanding teachers in order  
65 to improve the quality of instruction at public secondary schools.  
66 Such plan for use of funding appropriated herein shall: (i) allocate  
67 at least 80 percent of such stipends to high performing teachers in

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2 math, science, and related fields and up to 20 percent of such  
3 stipends to high performing teachers with an extension to their  
4 content area certificate in bilingual education or who hold certifi-  
5 cation in English as a Second Language and high-performing teachers  
6 with dual certification in a content area and special education;

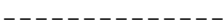
Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of law, the amount herein appropriated may be transferred to any other appropriation within the office of children and family services and/or the office of temporary and disability assistance and/or suballocated to the office of temporary and disability assistance for the purpose of paying local social services districts' costs of the above program and may be increased or decreased by interchange with any other appropriation or with any other item or items within the amounts appropriated within the office of children and family services general fund - local assistance account with the approval of the director of the budget who shall file such approval with the department of audit and control and copies thereof with the chairman of the senate finance committee and the chairman of the assembly ways and means committee.

A district's block grant allocation, including any funds the office of temporary and disability assistance transfers from a district's flexible fund for family services allocation to the state block grant for child care at the district's request, for a particular federal fiscal year is available only for child care assistance expenditures made during that federal fiscal year and which are claimed by March 31 of the year immediately following the end of that federal fiscal year. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any claims for child care assistance made by a social services district for expenditures made during a particular federal fiscal year, other than claims made under title XX of the federal social security act and under the food stamp employment and training program, shall be counted against the social services district's block grant allocation for that federal fiscal year.

A social services district shall expend its allocation from the block grant in accordance with the applicable provisions in federal law and regulations relating to the federal funds included in the state block grant for child care and the regulations of the office of children and family services. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, each district's claims submitted under the state block grant for child care will be processed in a manner that maximizes the availability of federal funds and ensures that the district meets its maintenance of effort requirement in each applicable federal fiscal year (13907) .....

10 Notwithstanding any other provision of law,  
11 the money hereby appropriated including  
12 any funds transferred by the office of

17 ance to needy families block grant funds  
18 at the request of local social services  
19 districts and, upon approval of the direc-  
20 tor of the budget, transfer of federal

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$1,286,800 may be available for services and expenses of child care provider training.

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$2,048,000 may be available for services and expenses of child care scholarships education and ongoing professional development.

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$400,000 may be available for services and expenses of the development and maintenance of automated systems in support of licensing and oversight of child day care providers.

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$117,200 may be available for services and expenses to make awards through a competitive grant process for start-up expenses and for the promotion of child health and safety, including equipment and minor renovations.

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$60,000 may be available for services and expenses for the establishment and/or operation of child care services in the state's courts.

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$404,000 may be available for services and expenses of subsidy and quality activities at the state university of New York including community colleges and state operated campuses.

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$404,000 may be available for services and expenses of subsidy and quality activities at the city university of New York, including community colleges and senior colleges.

Of the amounts appropriated herein, up to \$150,000 may be available for suballocation to the department of agriculture and markets for services and expenses of child care services provided to children of migrant workers in programs operated by non-profit organizations under contract with the department of agriculture and markets to provide such care.

Of the amount appropriated herein, up to \$10,000 may be available for services and expenses of conducting a market rate

(a) the extent to which the proposed capital project will contribute to the integration of health care services and long term sustainability of the applicant or preservation of essential health services in the community or communities served by the applicant;

- (i) the extent to which the proposed capital project addresses potential risk to patient safety and welfare.

Disbursement of awards made pursuant to this appropriation shall be conditioned on the awardee achieving certain process and performance metrics and milestones as determined in the sole discretion of the commissioner. Such metrics and milestones shall be structured to ensure that the health care transformation and provider sustainability goals of the project are achieved, and such metrics and milestones shall be included in grant disbursement agreements or other contractual documents as required by the commissioner.

The department shall provide a report on a quarterly basis to the chairs of the senate finance, assembly ways and means, senate health and assembly health committees. Such reports shall be submitted no later than sixty days after the close of the quarter, and shall include, for each award, the name of the applicant, a description of the project or purpose, the amount of the award, disbursement date, and status of achievement of process and performance metrics and milestones pursuant to subdivision 5 of section 2825-b of the public health law.
