#### CAPITAL PROJECTS BUDGET

### The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. a) The several amounts specified in this chapter for capital projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the
purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive
construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP),
purposes, and projects designated by the appropriations, and authorized
to be made available as hereinafter provided to the respective public
officers; such appropriations shall be deemed to provide all costs
necessary and pertinent to accomplish the intent of the appropriations

[-] is old law to be omitted.

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and are appropriated in accordance with the provisions of section 93 of the state finance law.

- b) Any amounts specified in this chapter for advances for capital projects, or so much thereof as shall be necessary to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, are appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes and projects designated by the appropriations as advances from the capital projects fund in accordance with the provisions of sections 40-a and 93 of the state finance law, and are authorized to be paid as hereinafter provided as an advance for a share, part or whole of the cost for such programs, purposes and projects hereinafter specified.
- c) The several amounts specified in this chapter as capital projects reappropriations, or so much thereof as shall be sufficient to accomplish the purpose of the appropriations, as appropriated by comprehensive construction programs (hereinafter referred to by the abbreviation CCP), purposes, and projects, being the undisbursed and/or unexpended balances of the prior year's appropriations, are reappropriated and unless otherwise amended or repealed in part or total in this chapter shall continue to be available for the same purposes as the prior appropriations or as otherwise amended for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 2017.

The capital projects reappropriations contained in this chapter may be amended by repealing the items set forth in brackets and by adding thereto the underscored material. Certain reappropriations in this chapter are shown using abbreviated text, with three leader dots (an ellipsis) followed by three spaces (... ) used to indicate where existing law that is being continued is not shown. However, unless a change is clearly indicated by the use of brackets [-] for deletions and underscores for additions, the purpose, amounts, funding source and all other aspects pertinent to each item of appropriation shall be as last appropriated.

For the purpose of complying with section 25 of the state finance law, the year, chapter and section of the last act reappropriating a former original appropriation or any part thereof is, unless otherwise indicated, chapter 55, section 1, of the laws of 2016 and, for the city university of New York and state university of New York, chapter 53, section 3, of the laws of 2016.

- d) No moneys appropriated by this chapter shall be available for payment until a certificate of approval has been issued by the director of the budget, who shall file such certificate with the department of audit and control, the chairperson of the senate finance committee and the chairperson of the assembly ways and means committee.
- e) The appropriations contained in this chapter shall be available for the fiscal year beginning on April 1, 2017 except as otherwise noted.

The not-for-profit organization serving as coordinator will assemble the antipoverty task force using the criteria outlined above. The money hereby appropriated is to be available to social services districts for child care assistance pursuant to title 5-C of article 6 of the social services law and shall be apportioned among the social services districts by the office according to an allocation plan developed by the office and submitted to the director of the budget for approval within 60 days of enactment of the budget. A district's block grant allocation, including any funds the office of temporary and disability assistance transfers from a district's flexible fund for family services allocation to the state block grant for child care at the district's request, for a particular federal fiscal year is available only for child care assistance expenditures made during that federal fiscal year and which are claimed by March 31 of the year immediately following the end of that federal fiscal year. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, any claims for child care assistance made by a social services district for expenditures made during a particular federal fiscal year, other than claims made under title XX of the federal social security act and under the food stamp employment and training program, shall be counted against the social services district's block grant allocation for that federal fiscal year. A social services district shall expend its
