AN ACT to amend the insurance law, the public health law, and the education law, in relation to prescription drugs

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1	Section 1. Subsection (i) of section 3216 of the insurance law is
2	amended by adding two new paragraphs 28-a and 28-b to read as follows:
3	(28-a) (A) Any policy that provides coverage for prescription drugs
4	and also provides coverage for cancer chemotherapy treatment shall
5	permit each insured to fill any covered prescription under paragraph
6	twelve-a of this subsection that may be obtained at a network partic-
7	ipating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy, at the insured's
8	option, from a network participating oncologist providing services in
9	accordance with section sixty-eight hundred seven of the education law.
10	Any policy providing such coverage shall not impose a co-payment fee or
11	other condition on any insured who elects to purchase oral anticancer
12	medications from a prescribing network participating oncologist which is
13	not also imposed on insureds electing to purchase drugs from a network
14	participating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy. The policy shall
15	not exclude from network participation any oncologist dispensing or
16	involved in the provision of pharmacy services in accordance with
17	section sixty-eight hundred seven of the education law due to their
18	dispensing or the provision of said pharmacy services. This paragraph
19	shall also apply to any pharmacy benefits manager as defined in section
20	two hundred eighty-a of the public health law.
21	(B) For the purposes of this paragraph, "oncologist" shall mean a
22	licensed or registered physician who is board certified or board eligi-

23 ble in medical oncology, radiation oncology, hematology, or another

3	(28-b) (A) Any policy that provides coverage for prescription drugs
4	and also provides coverage for human immunodeficiency virus infection
5	and acquired immune deficiency syndrome treatment shall permit each
6	insured to fill any covered prescription that may be obtained at a
7	network participating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy, at the
8	insured's option, from a network participating physician providing
9	services in accordance with section sixty-eight hundred seven of the
10	education law. Any policy providing such coverage shall not impose a
11	co-payment fee or other condition on any insured who elects to purchase
12	antiretroviral medications from a prescribing network participating
13	physician which is not also imposed on insureds electing to purchase
14	drugs from a network participating mail order or other non-retail phar-
15	macy. The policy shall not exclude from network participation any physi-

24	§ 2. Subsection (1) of section 3221 of the insurance law is amended by
25	adding two new paragraphs 18-a and 18-b to read as follows:
26	(18-a) (A) Any policy that provides coverage for prescription drugs
27	and also provides coverage for cancer chemotherapy treatment shall
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	permit each insured to fill any covered prescription under paragraph
29	twelve-a of this subsection that may be obtained at a network partic-
30	ipating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy, at the insured's
31	option, from a network participating oncologist providing services in
32	accordance with section sixty-eight hundred seven of the education law.
33	Any policy providing such coverage shall not impose a co-payment fee or
34	other condition on any insured who elects to purchase oral anticancer
35	medications from a prescribing network participating oncologist which is
36	not also imposed on insureds electing to purchase drugs from a network
37	participating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy. The policy shall
38	not exclude from network participation any oncologist dispensing or
	involved in the provision of pharmacy services in accordance with
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40	section sixty-eight hundred seven of the education law due to their
41	dispensing or the provision of said pharmacy services. This paragraph
42	shall also apply to any pharmacy benefits manager as defined in section

50	(18-b) (A) Any policy that provides coverage for prescription drugs
51	and also provides coverage for human immunodeficiency virus infection

53	insured to fill any covered prescription that may be obtained at a
54	network participating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy, at the
55	insured's option, from a network participating physician providing
56	services in accordance with section sixty-eight hundred seven of the

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education law. Any policy providing such coverage shall not impose a 1 co-payment fee or other condition on any insured who elects to purchase 2 3 antiretroviral medications from a prescribing network participating 4 physician which is not also imposed on insureds electing to purchase 5 drugs from a network participating mail order or other non-retail pharб macy. The policy or a pharmacy benefit manager, as defined in section 7 two hundred eighty-a of the public health law, shall not exclude from 8 network participation any physician dispensing or involved in the 9 provision of pharmacy services in accordance with section sixty-eight 10 hundred seven of the education law due to their dispensing or the 11 provision of said pharmacy services. This paragraph shall also apply to any pharmacy benefits manager as defined in section two hundred eighty-a 12 13 of the public health law. 14 (B) For the purposes of this paragraph, "antiretroviral medication" shall mean a drug used in the treatment of human immunodeficiency virus 15 16 infection and acquired immune deficiency syndrome. 17 § 3. Section 4303 of the insurance law is amended by adding two new subsections (kk-1) and (kk-2) to read as follows: 18 19 (kk-1) (A) Any contract that provides coverage for prescription drugs and also provides coverage for cancer chemotherapy treatment shall 20 21 permit each insured to fill any covered prescription under subsection (q-1) of this section that may be obtained at a network participating 22 mail order or other non-retail pharmacy, at the insured's option, from a 23 network participating oncologist providing services in accordance with 24 section sixty-eight hundred seven of the education law. Any policy 25 26 providing such coverage shall not impose a co-payment fee or other 27 condition on any insured who elects to purchase oral anticancer medications from a prescribing network participating oncologist which is not 28 29 also imposed on insureds electing to purchase drugs from a network 30 participating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy. The policy shall 31 not exclude from network participation any oncologist dispensing or 32 involved in the provision of pharmacy services in accordance with section sixty-eight hundred seven of the education law due to their 33 dispensing or the provision of said pharmacy services. This paragraph 34 35 shall also apply to any pharmacy benefits manager as defined in section 36 two hundred eighty-a of the public health law. 37 (B) For the purposes of this paragraph, "oncologist" shall mean a 38 licensed or registered physician who is board certified or board eligible in medical oncology, radiation oncology, hematology, or another 39 oncology specialty recognized by the American board of medical special-40 41 ties, or a surgeon who consults predominantly with patients who have a 42 cancer diagnosis. (kk-2) (A) Any contract that provides coverage for prescription drugs 43 and also provides coverage for human immunodeficiency virus infection 44 45 and acquired immune deficiency syndrome treatment shall permit each 46 insured to fill any covered prescription that may be obtained at a network participating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy, at the 47 insured's option, from a network participating physician providing 48 services in accordance with section sixty-eight hundred seven of the 49 education law. Any contract providing such coverage shall not impose a 50 51 co-payment fee or other condition on any insured who elects to purchase antiretroviral medications from a prescribing network participating 52 53 physician which is not also imposed on insureds electing to purchase 54 drugs from a network participating mail order or other non-retail pharmacy. The contract or a pharmacy benefit manager, as defined in section 55 56 two hundred eighty-a of the public health law, shall not exclude from

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1	network participation any physician dispensing or involved in the
2	provision of pharmacy services in accordance with section sixty-eight
3	hundred seven of the education law due to their dispensing or the
4	provision of said pharmacy services. This paragraph shall also apply to
5	any pharmacy benefits manager as defined in section two hundred eighty-a
6	of the public health law.
7	(B) For the purposes of this paragraph, "antiretroviral medication"
8	shall mean a drug used in the treatment of human immunodeficiency virus
9	infection and acquired immune deficiency syndrome.
10	§ 4. Subdivisions 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, and 17 of section 238 of the
11	public health law are renumbered subdivisions 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18,
12	and 19 and two new subdivisions 11 and 12 are added to read as follows:
13	11. "Oncologist" shall mean a licensed or registered physician who is
14	board certified or board eligible in medical oncology, radiation oncolo-
15	gy, hematology, or another oncology specialty recognized by the American
16	board of medical specialties, or a surgeon who consults predominantly
17	<u>with patients who have a cancer diagnosis.</u>
18	12. "Oncology group practice" shall mean a group practice in which
19	each practitioner who is a member of the group is an oncologist.
20	§ 5. Subdivision 4 of section 238-a of the public health law, as added
21	by chapter 803 of the laws of 1992, paragraphs (a), (b), and (c) as
22	amended by chapter 591 of the laws of 2000, and paragraph (d) as amended
23	by chapter 443 of the laws of 1993, is amended to read as follows:
24	4. An ownership interest or an investment interest shall not be
25	subject to subdivision one of this section if:
26	(a) the health care provider authorized to provide clinical laboratory
27	services, pharmacy services, radiation therapy services, physical thera-
28	py services or x-ray or imaging services is in a rural area and the
29	referring practitioner or the patient is in such rural area; or
30	(b) the clinical laboratory services, pharmacy services, radiation
31	therapy services, physical therapy services or x-ray or imaging services
32	are provided by a general hospital, the referring practitioner is
33	authorized to perform services at such general hospital and the owner-
34	ship or investment interest is in the general hospital itself and not
35	merely in a subdivision thereof; or
36	(c) the clinical laboratory services, pharmacy services, radiation
37	therapy services, physical therapy services or x-ray or imaging services
38	are provided by an ambulatory surgical center issued an operating
39	certificate pursuant to article twenty-eight of this chapter in conjunc-
40	tion with a surgical procedure performed by the referring practitioner
41	at the ambulatory surgical center; <u>or</u>
42	(d) the pharmacy services are provided to a cancer patient of an
43	oncology group practice by a pharmacy licensed under subdivision two of
44	section sixty-eight hundred eight of the education law, the ownership or
45	investment interest of which is held exclusively by practitioners of the
46	oncology group practice, of which the prescribing practitioner is a
47	member; or
48	(e) the pharmacy services are provided to a human immunodeficiency virus infection or acquired immune deficiency syndrome patient of a
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50 51	group practice by a pharmacy licensed under subdivision two of section
51	sixty-eight hundred eight of the education law, the ownership or invest-
52 52	ment interest of which is held exclusively by practitioners of the group
53 54	practice, of which the prescribing practitioner is a member; [(d)] (f) and if each practitioner who is an interested investor in a
54 55	health care provider within a category specified in paragraph (a), (b)
55 56	$[er]_{,}$ (c), (d) or (e) of this subdivision and who makes a referral of a
50	[] [(c)] (u) or (e) or chirs subdivision and who makes a referral of a

patient to such health care provider discloses to the patient, in a 1 2 brief and reasonable form and manner specified in regulations proposed by the commissioner after consultation with representatives of consumer 3 4 and physician organizations and adopted by the public health council, 5 subject to approval by the commissioner, the practitioner's, or family б member's ownership interest or investment interest in the health care 7 provider and the patient's right to utilize a specifically identified 8 alternative health care provider if any such alternative is reasonably 9 available.

10 § 6. Section 6509-a of the education law, as amended by chapter 555 of 11 the laws of 1993, is amended to read as follows:

§ 6509-a. Additional definition of professional misconduct; limited 12 13 application. Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of this article 14 or of any other provision of law to the contrary, the license or regis-15 tration of a person subject to the provisions of articles one hundred 16 thirty-two, one hundred thirty-three, one hundred thirty-six, one hundred thirty-seven, one hundred thirty-nine, one hundred forty-one, 17 one hundred forty-three, one hundred forty-four, one hundred fifty-six, 18 one hundred fifty-nine and one hundred sixty-four of this chapter may be 19 20 revoked, suspended or annulled or such person may be subject to any 21 other penalty provided in section sixty-five hundred eleven of this 22 article in accordance with the provisions and procedure of this article 23 for the following:

24 That any person subject to the above enumerated articles, has directly 25 indirectly requested, received or participated in the division, or 26 transference, assignment, rebate, splitting or refunding of a fee for, 27 or has directly requested, received or profited by means of a credit or 28 other valuable consideration as a commission, discount or gratuity in 29 connection with the furnishing of professional care, or service, includ-30 ing x-ray examination and treatment, or for or in connection with the 31 sale, rental, supplying or furnishing of clinical laboratory services or 32 supplies, x-ray laboratory services or supplies, inhalation therapy service or equipment, ambulance service, hospital or medical supplies, 33 physiotherapy or other therapeutic service or equipment, artificial 34 35 limbs, teeth or eyes, orthopedic or surgical appliances or supplies, 36 optical appliances, supplies or equipment, devices for aid of hearing, 37 drugs, medication or medical supplies or any other goods, services or 38 supplies prescribed for medical diagnosis, care or treatment under this chapter, except payment, not to exceed thirty-three and one-third per 39 centum of any fee received for x-ray examination, diagnosis or treat-40 41 ment, to any hospital furnishing facilities for such examination, diag-42 nosis or treatment. Nothing contained in this section shall prohibit 43 such persons from practicing as partners, in groups or as a professional 44 corporation or as a university faculty practice corporation nor from 45 pooling fees and moneys received, either by the partnerships, profes-46 sional corporations, university faculty practice corporations or groups 47 by the individual members thereof, for professional services furnished by any individual professional member, or employee of such partnership, 48 corporation or group, nor shall the professionals constituting the part-49 50 nerships, corporations or groups be prohibited from sharing, dividing or 51 apportioning the fees and moneys received by them or by the partnership, 52 corporation or group in accordance with a partnership or other agree-53 ment; provided that no such practice as partners, corporations or in 54 groups or pooling of fees or moneys received or shared, division or 55 apportionment of fees shall be permitted with respect to care and treatment under the workers' compensation law except as expressly authorized 56

by the workers' compensation law. Nothing contained in this chapter 1 shall prohibit a medical or dental expense indemnity corporation pursu-2 3 ant to its contract with the subscriber from prorationing a medical or 4 dental expense indemnity allowance among two or more professionals in 5 proportion to the services rendered by each such professional at the б request of the subscriber, provided that prior to payment thereof such 7 professionals shall submit both to the medical or dental expense indem-8 nity corporation and to the subscriber statements itemizing the services 9 rendered by each such professional and the charges therefor. Nothing in 10 this section shall prohibit any person subject to the above enumerated 11 articles from participating in an arrangement permitted in section two hundred thirty-eight-a of the public health law. 12 13 7. Subdivision 18 of section 6530 of the education law, as added by S 14 chapter 606 of the laws of 1991, is amended to read as follows: 15 18. Directly or indirectly offering, giving, soliciting, or receiving 16 or agreeing to receive, any fee or other consideration to or from a third party for the referral of a patient or in connection with the 17 performance of professional services[+]. This prohibition shall not 18 19 include arrangements permitted in section two hundred thirty-eight-a of 20 the public health law; 21 8. Section 6802 of the education law is amended by adding three new § 22 subdivisions 27, 28, and 29 to read as follows: 23 27. "Oncologist" shall mean a licensed or registered physician who is 24 board certified or board eligible in medical oncology, radiation oncolo-25 gy, hematology, or another oncology specialty recognized by the American 26 board of medical specialties, or a surgeon who consults predominantly 27 with patients who have a cancer diagnosis. 28 28. "Oncology group practice" shall mean a group practice in which 29 each practitioner who is a member of the group is an oncologist. 30 29. "Group practice" shall mean a group of two or more practitioners 31 organized as a partnership, professional corporation, foundation, not-32 for-profit corporation, faculty practice plan or similar association. 33 § 9. Section 6807 of the education law, as amended by chapter 881 of 34 the laws of 1972, the section heading as amended and subdivision 3 as 35 added by chapter 573 of the laws of 1999, subdivision 1 as designated 36 and subdivision 2 as added by chapter 18 of the laws of 1990, paragraph 37 b of subdivision 1 and paragraph a of subdivision 2 as amended by chap-38 ter 538 of the laws of 2001, is amended to read as follows: 39 § 6807. Exempt persons; special provisions. 1. This article shall not 40 be construed to affect or prevent: 41 a. Unlicensed assistants from being employed in licensed pharmacies 42 for purposes other than the practice of pharmacy; 43 b. Any physician, dentist, veterinarian or other licensed health care 44 provider legally authorized to prescribe drugs under this title [who is 45 not the owner of a pharmacy or who is not in the employ of such owner], 46 from supplying his patients with such drugs as the physician, dentist, 47 veterinarian or other licensed health care provider legally authorized to prescribe drugs under this title deems proper in connection with his 48 49 practice, provided, however, that all such drugs shall be dispensed in a 50 container labeled with the name and address of the dispenser and 51 patient, directions for use, and date of delivery, and in addition, such 52 drug shall bear a label containing the proprietary or brand name of the 53 drug and, if applicable, the strength of the contents, unless the person 54 issuing the prescription specifically states on the prescription in his 55 own handwriting, that the name of the drug and the strength thereof 56 should not appear on the label; provided further that if such drugs are

controlled substances, they shall be dispensed pursuant to the require-1 ments of article thirty-three of the public health law; 2 c. Any merchant from selling proprietary medicines, except those which 3 4 are poisonous, deleterious or habit forming, or materials and devices 5 specifically exempted by regulations of the department or by the public б health law; 7 d. Any personnel in an institution of higher learning from using pres-8 cription-required drugs on the premises for authorized research, exper-9 iments or instruction, in accordance with the department's regulations 10 and, if such drugs are controlled substances, in accordance with title 11 III of article thirty-three of the public health law; or 12 e. The necessary and ordinary activities of manufacturers and whole-13 subject to the provisions of article thirty-three of the public salers, health law. 14 15 2. a. Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph b of subdivision 16 one of this section, [no] a prescriber [who is not the -owner of a phar-17 macy or who is not in the employ of such owner, may] shall not dispense more than a seventy-two hour supply of drugs, except for: 18 19 (1) persons practicing in hospitals as defined in section twenty-eight 20 hundred one of the public health law; 21 (2) the dispensing of drugs at no charge to their patients; 22 (3) persons whose practices are situated ten miles or more from a 23 registered pharmacy; 24 (4) the dispensing of drugs in a clinic, infirmary or health service 25 that is operated by or affiliated with a post-secondary institution; 26 (5) persons licensed pursuant to article one hundred thirty-five of 27 this title; 28 (6) the dispensing of drugs in a medical emergency as defined in 29 subdivision six of section sixty-eight hundred ten of this article; 30 (7) the dispensing of drugs that are diluted, reconstituted or 31 compounded by a prescriber; 32 (8) the dispensing of allergenic extracts; or 33 (9) the dispensing of drugs pursuant to an oncological or AIDS proto-34 col. 35 b. This subdivision shall not be construed to affect or prevent: 36 (1) An oncology group practice from holding an ownership or investment 37 interest in a pharmacy licensed under subdivision two of section sixty-38 eight hundred eight of this article, the ownership or investment interest of which is held exclusively by practitioners of the oncology group 39 40 practice, to dispense drugs, pursuant to an oncological protocol, to a 41 patient of the oncology group practice; or 42 (2) A group practice from holding an ownership or investment interest 43 in a pharmacy licensed under subdivision two of section sixty-eight 44 hundred eight of this article, the ownership or investment interest of 45 which is held exclusively by practitioners of the group practice, to 46 dispense drugs, pursuant to a human immunodeficiency virus infection and 47 acquired immune deficiency syndrome protocol, to a patient of the group 48 practice. 49 c. The commissioner, in consultation with the commissioner of health, may promulgate regulations to implement this subdivision and may, by 50 51 regulation, establish additional renewable exemptions for a period not 52 to exceed one year from the provisions of paragraph a of this subdivi-53 sion. 54 3. A pharmacist may dispense drugs and devices to a registered profes-55 sional nurse, and a registered professional nurse may possess and admin-

56 ister, drugs and devices, pursuant to a non-patient specific regimen

1	prescribed or ordered by a licensed physician or certified nurse practi-
2	tioner, pursuant to regulations promulgated by the commissioner and the
3	public health law.
4	§ 10. This act shall take effect immediately.
