AN ACT to amend the executive law, in relation to the racial and ethnic makeup of the board of parole

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 1 of section 259-b of the executive law, as amended by section 38-a of subpart A of part C of chapter 62 of the laws of 2011, is amended to read as follows:

- 1. There shall be in the department a state board of parole which shall possess the powers and duties hereinafter specified. The board shall function independently of the department regarding all of its 7 decision-making functions, as well as any other powers and duties specified in this article, provided, however, that administrative matters of 9 general applicability within the department shall be applicable to the 10 board. Such board shall consist of not more than nineteen members appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate. 11 12 Provided, however, beginning August first, two thousand nineteen, the 13 number of members appointed shall be at least nineteen. The term of office of each member of such board shall be for six years; provided, 14 15 however, that any member chosen to fill a vacancy occurring otherwise 16 than by expiration of term shall be appointed for the remainder of the 17 unexpired term of the member whom he is to succeed. In the event of the inability to act of any member, the governor may appoint some competent 18 informed person to act in his stead during the continuance of such disa-19 Provided, further, that all new appointments shall be made so 20 bility. 21 that the racial and ethnic makeup of such board resembles the racial and
