AN ACT to amend the criminal procedure law, in relation to the issuance of securing orders and in relation to making conforming changes

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. Subdivisions 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 of section 500.10 of
2 the criminal procedure law are amended and a new subdivision 3-a is
3 added to read as follows:

4 1. "Principal" means a defendant in a criminal action or proceeding,
5 or a person adjudged a material witness therein, or any other person so
6 involved therein that [~~he~~] the principal may by law be compelled to
7 appear before a court for the purpose of having such court exercise
8 control over [~~his~~] the principal's person to secure [~~his~~] the princi-
9 pal's future attendance at the action or proceeding when required, and
10 who in fact either is before the court for such purpose or has been
11 before it and been subjected to such control.

12 2. "Release on own recognizance." A court releases a principal on
13 [~~his~~] the principal's own recognizance when, having acquired control
14 over [~~his~~] the principal's person, it permits [~~him~~] the principal to be
15 at liberty during the pendency of the criminal action or proceeding
16 involved upon condition that [~~he~~] the principal will appear thereat
17 whenever [~~his~~] the principal's attendance may be required and will at
18 all times render [~~himself~~] the principal amenable to the orders and
19 processes of the court.

20 3-a. "Release under non-monetary conditions." A court releases a prin-
21 cipal under non-monetary conditions when, having acquired control over a
22 person, it authorizes the person to be at liberty during the pendency of
23 the criminal action or proceeding involved under conditions ordered by
24 the court, which shall be the least restrictive conditions that will

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1 reasonably assure the principal's return to court. Such conditions may
2 include, among other conditions reasonable under the circumstances:
3 that the principal be in contact with a pretrial services agency serving
4 principals in that county; that the principal abide by reasonable, spec-
5 ified restrictions on travel that are reasonably related to an actual
6 risk of intentional flight from the jurisdiction; that the principal
7 refrain from possessing a firearm, destructive device or other dangerous
8 weapon; that, when it is shown pursuant to subdivision four of section
9 510.45 of this title that no other realistic monetary condition or set
10 of non-monetary conditions will suffice to reasonably assure the
11 person's return to court, the person be placed in reasonable pretrial
12 supervision with a pretrial services agency serving principals in that
13 county; that, when it is shown pursuant to paragraph (a) of subdivision
14 four of section 510.40 of this title that no other realistic non-mone-
15 tary condition or set of non-monetary conditions will suffice to reason-
16 ably assure the principal's return to court, the principal's location be
17 monitored with an approved electronic monitoring device, in accordance
18 with such subdivision four of section 510.40 of this title. A principal
19 shall not be required to pay for any part of the cost of release on
20 non-monetary conditions.

21 4. "Commit to the custody of the sheriff." A court commits a principal
22 to the custody of the sheriff when, having acquired control over [~~his~~]
23 the principal's person, it orders that [~~he~~] the principal be confined in
24 the custody of the sheriff during the pendency of the criminal action or
25 proceeding involved.

26 5. "Securing order" means an order of a court committing a principal
27 to the custody of the sheriff[7] or fixing bail, where authorized, or
28 releasing [~~him on his~~] the principal on the principal's own recognizance
29 or releasing the principal under non-monetary conditions.

30 6. "Order of recognizance or bail" means a securing order releasing a
31 principal on [~~his~~] the principal's own recognizance or under non-mone-
32 tary conditions or, where authorized, fixing bail.

33 7. "Application for recognizance or bail" means an application by a
34 principal that the court, instead of committing [~~him~~] the principal to
35 or retaining [~~him~~] the principal in the custody of the sheriff, either
36 release [~~him on his own~~] the principal on the principal's own recogni-
37 zance [~~or~~], release under non-monetary conditions, or, where authorized,
38 fix bail.

39 8. "Post bail" means to deposit bail in the amount and form fixed by
40 the court, with the court or with some other authorized public servant
41 or agency.

42 9. "Bail" means cash bail [~~or~~], a bail bond or money paid with a cred-
43 it card.

44 § 1-a. Section 500.10 of the criminal procedure law is amended by
45 adding two new subdivisions 21 and 22 to read as follows:

46 21. "Qualifies for electronic monitoring," for purposes of subdivision
47 four of section 510.40 of this title, means a person charged with a
48 felony, a misdemeanor crime of domestic violence, a misdemeanor defined
49 in article one hundred thirty of the penal law, a crime and the circum-
50 stances of paragraph (b) of subdivision two of section 530.60 of this
51 title apply, or any misdemeanor where the defendant stands previously
52 convicted, within the past five years, of a violent felony offense as
53 defined in section 70.02 of the penal law. For the purposes of this
54 subdivision, in calculating such five year period, any period of time
55 during which the defendant was incarcerated for any reason between the
56 time of the commission of any such previous crime and the time of

1 commission of the present crime shall be excluded and such five year
2 period shall be extended by a period or periods equal to the time served
3 under such incarceration.

4 22. "Misdemeanor crime of domestic violence," for purposes of subdivi-
5 sion twenty-one of this section, means a misdemeanor under the penal law
6 provisions and circumstances described in subdivision one of section
7 530.11 of this title.

8 § 2. Section 510.10 of the criminal procedure law, as amended by chap-
9 ter 459 of the laws of 1984, is amended to read as follows:

10 § 510.10 Securing order; when required; alternatives available; standard
11 to be applied.

12 1. When a principal, whose future court attendance at a criminal
13 action or proceeding is or may be required, [~~initially~~] comes under the
14 control of a court, such court [~~must~~] shall, in accordance with this
15 title, by a securing order[~~, either~~] release [~~him~~] the principal on
16 [~~his~~] the principal's own recognizance, release the principal under
17 non-monetary conditions, or, where authorized, fix bail or commit [~~him~~]
18 the principal to the custody of the sheriff. In all such cases, except
19 where another type of securing order is shown to be required by law, the
20 court shall release the principal pending trial on the principal's own
21 recognizance, unless it is demonstrated and the court makes an individ-
22 ualized determination that the principal is a significant risk of inten-
23 tional flight to avoid prosecution. If such a finding is made, the court
24 must select the least restrictive alternative and condition or condi-
25 tions that will reasonably assure the principal's return to court.

26 2. A principal is entitled to representation by counsel under this
27 chapter in preparing an application for release, when a securing order
28 is being considered and when a securing order is being reviewed for
29 modification, revocation or termination. If the principal is financially
30 unable to obtain counsel, counsel shall be assigned to the principal.

31 3. In cases where the most serious offense with which the defendant
32 stands charged in the case before the court or a pending case is an
33 offense that is not a class A felony defined in the penal law or a felo-
34 ny enumerated in section 70.02 of the penal law (other than burglary in
35 the second degree as defined in subdivision two of section 140.25 of the
36 penal law or robbery in the second degree as defined in subdivision one
37 of section 160.10 of such law or reporting a false incident in the
38 second degree as defined in section 240.55 of such law) or a misdemeanor
39 defined in article one hundred thirty of the penal law, the court shall
40 release the principal pending trial on the principal's own recognizance,
41 unless the court finds on the record or in writing that release on the
42 principal's own recognizance will not reasonably assure the principal's
43 return to court. In such instances, the court shall release the princi-
44 pal under non-monetary conditions, selecting the least restrictive
45 alternative and conditions that will reasonably assure the principal's
46 return to court. The court shall explain its choice of alternative and
47 conditions on the record or in writing.

48 4. Except as provided in subdivision five of this section, in cases
49 where an offense with which the defendant stands charged in the case
50 before the court or a pending case is a felony enumerated in section
51 70.02 of the penal law (except burglary in the second degree as defined
52 in subdivision two of section 140.25 of the penal law or robbery in the
53 second degree as defined in subdivision one of section 160.10 of such
54 law or reporting a false incident in the second degree as defined in
55 section 240.55 of such law) or a misdemeanor defined in article one
56 hundred thirty of the penal law, the court, unless otherwise prohibited

1 by law, shall release the principal pending trial on the principal's own
2 recognizance or under non-monetary conditions, or fix bail. In such
3 instances, the court shall select the least restrictive alternative and
4 conditions that will reasonably assure the principal's return to court.
5 The court shall explain its choice of alternative and conditions on the
6 record or in writing.

7 5. In cases where an offense with which the defendant stands charged
8 in the case before the court or a pending case is a felony sex offense
9 as defined in section 70.80 of the penal law, a felony terrorism offense
10 under section 490.10, 490.15, 490.30, 490.35, 490.37, 490.40, 490.45,
11 490.47, 490.50 or 490.55 of the penal law, a class A felony offense
12 defined in the penal law, a felony offense of witness intimidation under
13 section 215.15, 215.16, or 215.17 of the penal law, a felony offense
14 where a required element thereof is an intent to cause serious physical
15 injury or death to another person and causing such injury or death to
16 such person or a third person, or a felony for which the defendant would
17 be eligible for sentencing under section 70.08 of the penal law, the
18 court, unless otherwise prohibited by law, shall release the principal
19 pending trial under non-monetary conditions, or fix bail, or commit the
20 principal to the custody of the sheriff. In such instances, the court
21 shall select the least restrictive alternative and conditions that will
22 reasonably assure the principal's return to court. The court shall
23 explain its choice of alternative and conditions on the record or in
24 writing.

25 6. Notwithstanding the provisions of subdivisions three, four and five
26 of this section, with respect to any charge for which bail or remand is
27 not ordered, and for which the court would not or could not otherwise
28 require bail or remand, a defendant may, at any time, request that the
29 court set bail in a nominal amount requested by the defendant in the
30 form specified in paragraph (a) of subdivision one of section 520.10 of
31 this title; if the court is satisfied that the request is voluntary, the
32 court shall set such bail in such amount.

33 7. When a securing order is revoked or otherwise terminated in the
34 course of an uncompleted action or proceeding but the principal's future
35 court attendance still is or may be required and [he] the principal is
36 still under the control of a court, a new securing order must be issued.
37 When the court revokes or otherwise terminates a securing order which
38 committed the principal to the custody of the sheriff, the court shall
39 give written notification to the sheriff of such revocation or termi-
40 nation of the securing order.

41 § 3. Section 510.20 of the criminal procedure law is amended to read
42 as follows:

43 § 510.20 Application for [~~recognizance or bail, making and determi-~~
44 ~~nation thereof in general~~] a change in securing order.

45 1. Upon any occasion when a court [~~is required to issue~~] has issued a
46 securing order with respect to a principal [~~, or at any time when a~~] and
47 the principal is confined in the custody of the sheriff as a result of
48 the securing order or a previously issued securing order, [he] the prin-
49 cipal may make an application for recognizance, release under non-mone-
50 tary conditions or bail.

51 2. (a) The principal is entitled to representation by counsel in the
52 making and presentation of such application. If the principal is finan-
53 cially unable to obtain counsel, counsel shall be assigned to the prin-
54 cipal.

55 (b) Upon such application, the principal must be accorded an opportu-
56 nity to be heard, present evidence and to contend that an order of

1 recognizance, release under non-monetary conditions or, where author-
2 ized, bail must or should issue, that the court should release [~~him on~~
3 ~~his~~] the principal on the principal's own recognizance or under non-mon-
4 etary conditions rather than fix bail, and that if bail is authorized
5 and fixed it should be in a suggested amount and form.

6 § 4. The criminal procedure law is amended by adding a new section
7 510.25 to read as follows:

8 § 510.25 Rehearing after five days in custody.

9 1. In addition to any other available pre-conviction motion or proce-
10 cedure, a principal for whom bail is authorized and was fixed, or who was
11 remanded to the custody of the sheriff but is legally eligible for
12 release, and who is in custody five days thereafter, shall be brought
13 before the court the next business day for a hearing on the securing
14 order.

15 2. The people must establish by clear and convincing evidence that the
16 principal poses a significant risk of intentional flight to avoid prose-
17 cution, and that no condition or combination of conditions will reason-
18 ably assure the principal's return to court. Where the principal has not
19 been indicted, and reasonable cause has not previously been established
20 pursuant to the relevant provisions of sections 180.60, 180.70, 180.75
21 and 180.80 of this chapter or this section, the people must also estab-
22 lish probable cause that the principal committed the charged offense.

23 3. If the people fail pursuant to subdivision two of this section to
24 establish that the principal poses a significant risk of intentional
25 flight to avoid prosecution and that no other condition or combination
26 of conditions will reasonably assure the principal's return to court, or
27 in a case where there is no indictment and no previous finding pursuant
28 to sections 180.60, 180.70, 180.75 and 180.80 or this section and the
29 people fail to establish probable cause that the defendant committed the
30 charged offense, the court shall, by a new securing order, release the
31 principal on the principal's own recognizance or, where authorized
32 pursuant to this title and articles one hundred seventy and one hundred
33 eighty of this chapter, under non-monetary conditions, except where
34 another type of securing order is shown to be required by law.

35 4. At the hearing, the principal shall have the right to be repres-
36 ented by counsel and, if financially unable to obtain counsel, to have
37 counsel assigned. The principal shall be afforded an opportunity to
38 testify, present witnesses, cross-examine witnesses who appear at the
39 hearing and present information by proffer or otherwise. The prose-
40 cution must present competent, reliable evidence and may not rely on
41 hearsay evidence to satisfy its burden.

42 5. Prior to the hearing, in addition to the discovery required by
43 section 240.44 of this chapter, and subject to a protective order, the
44 prosecution shall disclose to the principal, and permit the principal to
45 discover, inspect, copy or photograph, on an ongoing basis continuing
46 after such hearing, all statements and reports that relate or related to
47 the prosecution's request for continued detention which are in the
48 possession, custody or control of the prosecution, or persons under the
49 prosecution's direction and control, including:

50 a. the charging documents, such as the complaint and any information,
51 and the documents and materials supporting the charging documents;

52 b. police and law enforcement reports;

53 c. all statements, written or recorded or summarized in any writing or
54 recording, and the substance of all oral statements, made by the princi-
55 pal or a co-defendant;

1 d. all statements, written or recorded or summarized in any writing or
 2 recording, made by persons whom the prosecutor knows to have evidence or
 3 information that relates to the subject matter of the case or proceed-
 4 ing;

5 e. all statements or reports on which, as applicable, the prosecution
 6 intends to rely or relied at the hearing; and

7 f. all facts, evidence and information favorable to the principal,
 8 including but not limited to information that tends to negate risk of
 9 flight or the principal's guilt or that tends to mitigate the princi-
 10 pal's culpability as to a charged offense, or that tends to support a
 11 potential defense thereto, or that tends to support a motion to suppress
 12 evidence on constitutional or statutory grounds, or that is relevant to
 13 a witness's credibility, without regard to the materiality of the infor-
 14 mation, or that would tend to mitigate or reduce punishment if the prin-
 15 cipal were convicted.

16 6. This process shall continue with additional rehearings, held
 17 promptly on reasonable written request of defense counsel, made on
 18 notice to the people.

19 § 5. Section 510.30 of the criminal procedure law, subparagraph (v) of
 20 paragraph (a) of subdivision 2 as amended by chapter 920 of the laws of
 21 1982, subparagraph (vi) of paragraph (a) of subdivision 2 as renumbered
 22 by chapter 447 of the laws of 1977, subparagraph (vii) as added and
 23 subparagraphs (viii) and (ix) of paragraph (a) of subdivision 2 as
 24 renumbered by section 1 of part D of chapter 491 of the laws of 2012,
 25 and subdivision 3 as added by chapter 788 of the laws of 1981, is
 26 amended to read as follows:

27 § 510.30 Application for [~~recognizance or bail~~] securing order; rules of
 28 law and criteria controlling determination.

29 1. [~~Determinations of applications for recognizance or bail are not in~~
 30 ~~all cases discretionary but are subject to rules, prescribed in article~~
 31 ~~five hundred thirty and other provisions of law relating to specific~~
 32 ~~kinds of criminal actions and proceedings, providing (a) that in some~~
 33 ~~circumstances such an application must as a matter of law be granted,~~
 34 ~~(b) that in others it must as a matter of law be denied and the princi-~~
 35 ~~pal committed to or retained in the custody of the sheriff, and (c) that~~
 36 ~~in others the granting or denial thereof is a matter of judicial~~
 37 ~~discretion.~~

38 2. ~~To the extent that the issuance of an order of recognizance or bail~~
 39 ~~and the terms thereof are matters of discretion rather than of law, an~~
 40 ~~application is determined on the basis of the following factors and~~
 41 ~~criteria:~~

42 (a) With respect to any principal, the court in all cases, unless
 43 otherwise provided by law, must [~~consider the~~] impose the least restric-
 44 tive kind and degree of control or restriction that is necessary to
 45 secure [~~his court attendance~~] the principal's return to court when
 46 required. In determining that matter, the court must, on the basis of
 47 available information, consider and take into account[+]

48 (i) ~~The principal's character, reputation, habits and mental condi-~~
 49 ~~tion;~~

50 (ii) ~~His employment and financial resources; and~~

51 (iii) ~~His family ties and the length of his residence if any in the~~
 52 ~~community; and~~

53 (iv) ~~His~~] information about the principal that is relevant to the
 54 principal's return to court, including:

55 (a) The principal's activities and history;

56 (b) If the principal is a defendant, the charges facing the principal;

1 (c) The principal's criminal conviction record if any provided that
 2 the court must also consider and take into account the time that has
 3 elapsed since the occurrence of such crime or crimes and the age of the
 4 principal at the time of the occurrence of such crime or crimes; [and

5 ~~(v) His]~~ (d) The principal's record of previous adjudication as a
 6 juvenile delinquent, as retained pursuant to section 354.2 of the family
 7 court act, or, of pending cases where fingerprints are retained pursuant
 8 to section 306.1 of such act, or a youthful offender, if any provided
 9 that the court must also consider and take into account the time that
 10 has elapsed since the occurrence of such delinquency or youthful offen-
 11 der conduct and the age of the principal at the time of such delinquency
 12 or youthful offender conduct; [and

13 ~~(vi) His]~~ (e) The principal's previous record [if any in responding to
 14 court appearances when required or] with respect to intentional flight
 15 to avoid criminal prosecution; [and

16 ~~(vii)]~~ (f) If monetary bail is authorized, according to the
 17 restrictions set forth in this title, the principal's individual finan-
 18 cial circumstances;

19 (g) Where the principal is charged with a crime or crimes against a
 20 member or members of the same family or household as that term is
 21 defined in subdivision one of section 530.11 of this title, the follow-
 22 ing factors:

23 [~~A)]~~ (i) any violation by the principal of an order of protection
 24 issued by any court for the protection of a member or members of the
 25 same family or household as that term is defined in subdivision one of
 26 section 530.11 of this title, whether or not such order of protection is
 27 currently in effect; and

28 [~~B)]~~ (ii) the principal's history of use or possession of a firearm;
 29 and

30 [~~viii)]~~ (h) If [~~he]~~ the principal is a defendant, [~~the weight of the~~
 31 ~~evidence against him in the pending criminal action and any other factor~~
 32 ~~indicating probability or improbability of conviction, or,~~] in the case
 33 of an application for [~~bail or recognizance]~~ a securing order pending
 34 appeal, the merit or lack of merit of the appeal[~~, and~~

35 ~~(ix) If he is a defendant, the sentence which may be or has been~~
 36 ~~imposed upon conviction].~~

37 [~~b)]~~ 2. Where the principal is a defendant-appellant in a pending
 38 appeal from a judgment of conviction, the court must also consider the
 39 likelihood of ultimate reversal of the judgment. A determination that
 40 the appeal is palpably without merit alone justifies, but does not
 41 require, a denial of the application, regardless of any determination
 42 made with respect to the factors specified in [~~paragraph (a)]~~ subdivi-
 43 sion one of this section.

44 3. When bail or recognizance is ordered, the court shall inform the
 45 principal, if [~~he]~~ the principal is a defendant charged with the commis-
 46 sion of a felony, that the release is conditional and that the court may
 47 revoke the order of release and may be authorized to commit the princi-
 48 pal to the custody of the sheriff in accordance with the provisions of
 49 subdivision two of section 530.60 of this chapter if [~~he]~~ the principal
 50 commits a subsequent felony while at liberty upon such order.

51 § 6. Section 510.40 of the criminal procedure law is amended to read
 52 as follows:

53 § 510.40 [~~Application for recognizance or bail, determination thereof,~~
 54 ~~form of securing order and execution thereof]~~ Court notifi-
 55 cation to principal of conditions of release and of alleged
 56 violations of conditions of release.

1 1. ~~[An application for recognizance or bail must be determined by a~~
2 ~~securing order which either:~~

3 ~~(a) Grants the application and releases the principal on his own~~
4 ~~recognizance; or~~

5 ~~(b) Grants the application and fixes bail; or~~

6 ~~(c) Denies the application and commits the principal to, or retains~~
7 ~~him in, the custody of the sheriff.~~

8 ~~2-]~~ Upon ordering that a principal be released on [~~his~~] the princi-
9 pal's own recognizance, or released under non-monetary conditions, or,
10 if bail has been fixed, upon the posting of bail, the court must direct
11 [~~him~~] the principal to appear in the criminal action or proceeding
12 involved whenever [~~his~~] the principal's attendance may be required and
13 to [~~render himself~~] be at all times amenable to the orders and processes
14 of the court. If such principal is in the custody of the sheriff or at
15 liberty upon bail at the time of the order, the court must direct that
16 [~~he~~] the principal be discharged from such custody or, as the case may
17 be, that [~~his~~] the principal's bail be exonerated.

18 [~~3-~~] 2. Upon the issuance of an order fixing bail, where authorized,
19 and upon the posting thereof, the court must examine the bail to deter-
20 mine whether it complies with the order. If it does, the court must, in
21 the absence of some factor or circumstance which in law requires or
22 authorizes disapproval thereof, approve the bail and must issue a
23 certificate of release, authorizing the principal to be at liberty, and,
24 if [~~he~~] the principal is in the custody of the sheriff at the time,
25 directing the sheriff to discharge [~~him~~] the principal therefrom. If
26 the bail fixed is not posted, or is not approved after being posted, the
27 court must order that the principal be committed to the custody of the
28 sheriff. In the event of any such non-approval, the court shall explain
29 promptly in writing the reasons therefor.

30 3. Non-monetary conditions of release shall be individualized and
31 established in writing by the court. At future court appearances, the
32 court shall consider a lessening of conditions or modification of condi-
33 tions to a less burdensome form based on the principal's compliance with
34 such conditions of release. In the event of alleged non-compliance with
35 the conditions of release in an important respect, pursuant to this
36 subdivision, additional conditions may be imposed by the court, on the
37 record or in writing, only after notice of the facts and circumstances
38 of such alleged non-compliance, reasonable under the circumstances,
39 affording the principal and the principal's attorney and the people an
40 opportunity to present relevant, admissible evidence, relevant witnesses
41 and to cross-examine witnesses, and a finding by clear and convincing
42 evidence that the principal violated a condition of release in an impor-
43 tant respect. Following such a finding, in determining whether to
44 impose additional conditions for non-compliance, the court shall consid-
45 er and may select conditions consistent with the court's obligation to
46 impose the least restrictive condition or conditions that will reason-
47 ably assure the defendant's return to court. The court shall explain on
48 the record or in writing the reasons for its determination and for any
49 changes to the conditions imposed.

50 4. (a) Electronic monitoring of a principal's location may be ordered
51 only if the court finds, after notice, an opportunity to be heard and an
52 individualized determination explained on the record or in writing, that
53 the defendant qualifies for electronic monitoring in accordance with
54 subdivision twenty-one of section 500.10 of this title, and no other
55 realistic non-monetary condition or set of non-monetary conditions will
56 suffice to reasonably assure a principal's return to court.

1 (b) The specific method of electronic monitoring of the principal's
2 location must be approved by the court. It must be the least restric-
3 tive procedure and method that will reasonably assure the principal's
4 return to court, and unobtrusive to the greatest extent practicable.

5 (c) Electronic monitoring of the location of a principal may be
6 conducted only by a public entity under the supervision and control of a
7 county or municipality or a non-profit entity under contract to the
8 county, municipality or the state. A county or municipality shall be
9 authorized to enter into a contract with another county or municipality
10 in the state to monitor principals under non-monetary conditions of
11 release in its county, but counties, municipalities and the state shall
12 not contract with any private for-profit entity for such purposes.

14 mum period of sixty days, and may be renewed for such period, after
15 notice, an opportunity to be heard and a de novo, individualized deter-
16 mination in accordance with this subdivision, which shall be explained
17 on the record or in writing.

18 A defendant subject to electronic location monitoring under this
19 subdivision shall be considered held or confined in custody for purposes
20 of section 180.80 of this chapter and shall be considered committed to
21 the custody of the sheriff for purposes of section 170.70 of the chap-
22 ter, as applicable.

23 5. If a principal is released under non-monetary conditions, the court
24 shall, on the record and in an individualized written document provided
25 to the principal, notify the principal, in plain language and a manner
26 sufficiently clear and specific:

27 (a) of any conditions to which the principal is subject, to serve as a
28 guide for the principal's conduct; and

29 (b) that the possible consequences for violation of such a condition
30 may include revocation of the securing order and the ordering of a more
31 restrictive securing order.

32 § 7. The criminal procedure law is amended by adding a new section

11 the principal's counsel upon written request. Any such blank form ques-
12 tionnaire, instrument or tool regularly used in the county for such
13 purpose or a related purpose shall be made available to any person
14 promptly upon request.

15 (b) Any such questionnaire, instrument or tool shall be:

16 (i) free from discriminatory and disparate impact on detention and
17 other outcomes based on age, race, creed, color, national origin, sexual
18 orientation, gender identity or expression, military status, sex, mari-
19 tal status, disability, or any other constitutionally protected class,
20 regarding the use thereof; and

21 (ii) empirically validated and regularly revalidated, with such vali-
22 dation and revalidation studies and all underlying data, except personal
23 identifying information for any defendant, publicly available upon
24 request.

25 4. Monitoring by a pre-trial services agency may be ordered as a non-
26 monetary condition pursuant to this title only if the court finds, after
27 notice, an opportunity to be heard and an individualized determination
28 explained on the record or in writing, that no other realistic non-mone-
29 tary condition or set of non-monetary conditions will suffice to reason-
30 ably assure the principal's return to court.

31 5. Each pretrial service agency certified by the office of court
32 administration pursuant to this section shall at the end of each year
33 prepare and file with such office an annual report, which the office
34 shall compile, publish on its website and make available upon request to
35 members of the public. Such reports shall not include any personal iden-
36 tifying information for any individual defendants. Each such report, in
37 addition to other relevant information, shall set forth, disaggregated
38 by each county served:

39 (a) the number of defendants monitored by the agency;

40 (b) the length of time (in months) each such person was monitored by

51 (g) the court disposition in each monitoring case, including sentenc-
52 ing information.

53 § 9. Section 510.50 of the criminal procedure law is amended to read

1 1. When the attendance of a principal confined in the custody of the
2 sheriff is required at the criminal action or proceeding at a particular
3 time and place, the court may compel such attendance by directing the
