AN ACT to amend the public health law, in relation to deeming central venous lines as medically necessary

## The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Section 2994-11 of the public health law is amended by adding a new subdivision 4 to read as follows:

4. Discharge of any patients who have a condition that requires a 4 central venous line. As part of discharge planning for patients who will 5 be discharged from a hospital with a central venous line, the identified caregiver shall be consulted as soon as possible, but not later than twenty-four hours prior to discharge, regarding his or her capabilities 8 and limitations in administering medications and providing proper central venous line care. In the event that the identified caregiver is 10 unwilling or unable to confidently provide proper care of the central venous line, appropriate services, which may include but not be limited to home health care services, shall be ordered.

12 § 2. This act shall take effect immediately; provided, however, that 13 14 effective immediately, the addition, amendment and/or repeal of any rule 15 or regulation necessary for the implementation of this act on its effec-16 tive date are authorized and directed to be made and completed on or 17 before such effective date.
