AN ACT to amend a chapter of the laws of 2017, directing the metropolitan transportation authority and the New York city transit authority to study aboveground transit infrastructure, as proposed in legislative bills numbers S. 5754-A and A. 7562-A, in relation to lead paint remediation reporting for the metropolitan transportation authority's and the New York city transit authority's aboveground transit infrastructure

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Sections 1, 2, and 3 of a chapter of the laws of 2017, directing the metropolitan transportation authority and the New York city transit authority to study aboveground transit infrastructure, as proposed in legislative bills numbers S. 5754-A and A. 7562-A, are amended to read as follows:

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Section 1. [The metropolitan transportation authority and the New York city transit authority, in consultation with the department of environ-8 mental conservation and the department of health, shall conduct a study to examine and evaluate aboveground stations, elevated trestles, and 10 clevated subway and railway tracks owned or controlled by the metropol- 11 itan transportation authority, regarding, but not limited to the follow-12 ing determinations:

(a) review past renovations to stations to determine the amount of 14 lead paint abatement;

(b) determine the degree to which the metropolitan transportation 15 16 authority complies with federal and state air quality laws and regu-17 lations;

(c) establish recommendations to further lead paint abatement, enhance 19 air quality controls, and to ensure protection of public health and the 20 environment; and

(d) determine the fiscal impact of any aforementioned recommendations. The metropolitan transportation authority and the New York city trans-23 it authority, in consultation with the department of environmental

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conservation and the department of health, shall limit such study to a statistically significant subset of the aboveground stations, elevated 3 trestles, and elevated subway and railway tracks to be representative of all aboveground transit infrastructure. Testing shall include all five 4 boroughs, low-income neighborhoods, and densely populated areas of the city of New York. On or before July 1, 2018, and every year thereafter, 7 the president of the New York city transit authority shall submit a 8 written report to the governor, temporary president of the senate, and speaker of the assembly that identifies all current or planned capital 9 projects that will involve the removal of existing lead-based paint from 10 and the repainting of any of the aboveground stations, elevated tres-11 tles, or elevated subway tracks operated by the New York city transit 12 authority. For each such project, the report will describe the work to 13 14 be undertaken and measures that the New York city transit authority will take to ensure adequate protection of public health and the environment 15 16 from lead particulates. The report shall also include a description of 17 the New York city transit authority policy for lead particulate management for such capital projects. 18 19

- § 2. [On or before March 1, 2018, the shairman of the metropolitan transportation authority and the chairman on the New York city transit authority shall submit a written report to the governor, temporary president of the senate, speaker of the assembly and mayor of the city of New York, with the findings and recommendations of the study conducted pursuant to section one of this act.
 - § 3.] This act shall take effect immediately.

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§ 2. This act shall take effect on the same date and in the same manner as a chapter of the laws of 2017, directing the metropolitan transportation authority and the New York city transit authority to study aboveground transit infrastructure, as proposed in legislative bills numbers S. 5754-A and A. 7562-A, takes effect.
