AN ACT to amend the penal law, in relation to assault on a member of the military or reserves

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. Section 10.00 of the penal law is amended by adding a new 2 subdivision 22 to read as follows:

- 22. "Member of the military or reserves" means (a) a member of the United States army, navy, air force, marines, coast guard, army national guard, air national guard and/or reserves thereof or (b) a member of the New York guard or the New York naval militia.
- § 2. Section 120.08 of the penal law, as added by chapter 632 of the laws of 1996, is amended to read as follows:
- § 120.08 Assault on a peace officer, police officer, fireman [ex], emergency medical services professional or a member of the military or reserves.

A person is guilty of assault on a peace officer, police officer, fireman [ex], emergency medical services professional or a member of the military or reserves when, with intent to prevent a peace officer, police officer, a fireman, including a fireman acting as a paramedic or emergency medical technician administering first aid in the course of performance of duty as such fireman, [ex] an emergency medical service paramedic or emergency medical service technician, or a member of the military or reserves, from performing a lawful duty, he causes serious physical injury to such peace officer, police officer, fireman, paramedic [ex], technician or a member of the military or reserves.

- Assault on a peace officer, police officer, fireman [ex], emergency medical services professional or a member of the military or reserves is a class C felony.
  - § 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
