AN ACT to amend the education law, in relation to opting out of certain state assessments

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

- Section 1. Section 305 of the education law is amended by adding a new 2 subdivision 60 to read as follows:
- 60. a. The commissioner shall ensure that school districts provide
 notice to parents of students in grades three through eight of the
 parent's right to opt their student out of the grade three through eight
 English language arts and math state assessments. Such notice shall be
 developed by the department, written in clear and concise language and
 translated in the six most common languages in the state. The notice
 shall be made available on the department's website.
- b. The commissioner shall ensure that school districts provide parents of students in grades three through eight with the notice pursuant to paragraph a of this subdivision. Such notification shall be given no later than thirty days after the start of the school year.
- c. The school district shall honor a parent's decision to exercise
 their right to opt their student out of the grade three through eight
 English language arts and math state assessments. The school district
 shall be prohibited from taking punitive measures against a student
 whose parent has chosen to opt their student out of the grades three
 through eight English language arts and math state assessments.
- 20 <u>d. Any violation of this subdivision may be subject to an appeal to</u>
 21 <u>the commissioner.</u>
- 22 § 2. This act shall take effect on the first of July next succeeding 23 the date on which it shall have become a law.
