AN ACT to amend the legislative law, in relation to the definition of the term "lobbyist"

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision (a) of section 1-c of the legislative law is amended by adding two new paragraphs (iii) and (iv) to read as follows:

(iii) Any individual who stands convicted of, or has (a) received a judicial or administrative order on the merits following a trial or hearing, which is (i) in favor of the complainant, or (ii) determines that the accused individual is liable, or (b) admitted liability to, a sex offense defined in article one hundred thirty of the penal law may not be retained, employed or designated by any client to engage in lobbying for compensation for a period of five years from the date of the judgment or finding.

(iv) Any individual who has (a) received a judicial or administrative order on the merits following a trial or hearing, which is (i) in favor of the complainant, or (ii) determines that the accused individual is liable, or (b) admitted liability in a claim related to sexual harassment under section two hundred ninety-six of the executive law, or found to have violated section seventy-four of the public officers law in an investigation of discrimination or harassment allegations, may not be retained, employed or designated by any client to engage in lobbying for compensation for a period of five years from the date of the judgment or finding.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
