AN ACT to amend the economic development law, in relation to establishing the office of the caregiving economy

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The economic development law is amended by adding a new article 4-D to read as follows: 2

ARTICLE 4-D

OFFICE OF THE CAREGIVING ECONOMY

Section 147. Definitions.

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147-a. Office of the caregiving economy established.

147-b. Director and employees of the office.

147-c. Powers and duties of the office.

- 9 § 147. Definitions. As used in this article, the following terms shall 10 have the following meanings:
- 1. "Office" shall mean the office of the caregiving economy estab-11 lished pursuant to section one hundred forty-seven-a of this article. 12
 - 2. "Director" shall mean the director of the caregiving economy appointed pursuant to section one hundred forty-seven-b of this article.
- 3. "Caregiving economy" shall mean and include the industry of direct care, home care, child care, adult care, private and non-profit residential health care facilities as defined by section twenty-eight hundred one of the public health law, family caregivers, and other entities as 18 determined by the director that support formal and informal caregiving.
- 20 § 147-a. Office of the caregiving economy established. There is hereby 21 established within the department an office of the caregiving economy for the purpose of promoting and supporting the state's caregiving needs 23 by developing the caregiving economy in the state.
- § 147-b. Director and employees of the office. The head of the office 24 25 shall be the director of the caregiving economy, who shall be appointed 26 by the commissioner, and who shall have expertise and experience in the caregiving economy. The commissioner may appoint such officers and 27

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employees having experience in the caregiving industry, including individuals with experience working with organized labor organizations and informal caregivers, as the commissioner may deem necessary to carry out 4 the provisions of this article and prescribe their duties.

- § 147-c. Powers and duties of the office. 1. The office shall have the power to:
- (a) Advise the commissioner on incorporating caregiving into the department's mission, with the goal of making support for the caregiving economy a fundamental principle of the state's economic development approach, including but not limited to, implementing the provisions of section eleven of this chapter, providing solutions to any relevant findings of the reimagining long-term care task force established pursuant to chapter seven hundred fifty-eight of the laws of two thousand twenty-one, and ensuring robust funding opportunities for caregiving economy projects;
- (b) Ensure that caregiving economy careers are included as part of all appropriate workforce development efforts undertaken by the department, including developing materials to help jobseekers learn more about such careers, programming to include jobseekers in all outreach by the department, and training for department staff to keep jobseekers up-todate on career options;
- (c) Work with organized labor and other stakeholders to ensure that careers in the caregiving economy are sufficiently funded and supported;
- (d) Encourage innovation in the caregiving economy, including but not <u>limited</u> to, models for delivering services and sustainable approaches to long-term care;
- (e) Conduct research on the reach and value of the caregiving economy in New York state, including but not limited to gathering data on the individuals served by each sector of the caregiving economy, and any areas of the state having a population that is underserved by the existing caregiving economy; and
- 32 (f) Coordinate the department's duties under subdivision fifty of 33 section one hundred of this chapter.
 - 2. On or before January thirty-first of each year, the office shall submit an annual report to the temporary president of the senate and the speaker of the assembly detailing the economic impact of formal and informal caregiving on the state, and any savings achieved by public investment in the caregiving economy.
 - § 2. Section 100 of the economic development law is amended by adding a new subdivision 50 to read as follows:
- 50. to promote and support the caregiving economy, as defined by 42 section one hundred forty-seven of this chapter, in New York state, 43 including but not limited to, workforce development supporting existing 44 caregiving providers, and attracting new caregiving providers into the 45 state's caregiving economy.
- § 3. This act shall take effect on the ninetieth day after it shall 46 47 have become a law. Effective immediately, the addition, amendment and/or 48 repeal of any rule or regulation necessary for the implementation of 49 this act on its effective date are authorized to be made and completed on or before such effective date. 50
