AN ACT to amend the education law, in relation to authorizing tuition assistance program awards for students enrolled in short-term credential programs offered by certain public institutions

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

- Section 1. The education law is amended by adding a new section 667-c-2 to read as follows:

- 4 Notwithstanding any law, rule or regulation to the contrary, the pres-5 ident of the higher education services corporation is authorized to make

- 2. For purposes of this section, a short-term credential program is one that:
- a. provides not less than one hundred fifty, and not more than six hundred, clock hours of instructional time over a period of not less than eight weeks and not more than fifteen weeks;
- b. provides training aligned with the requirements of high-skill,
 high-wage, or in-demand industry sectors or occupations in the state, as
 determined by the commissioner, in consultation with the department of
 labor; and
- 22 c. provides a student, upon completion of the program, with a recog-23 nized postsecondary credential that is recognized by employers in the 24 relevant industry, including credentials recognized by industry or 25 sector partnerships in the relevant industry in the state;
- 3. a. For students enrolled in a short-term credential program as defined in this section, the award shall be calculated as provided in

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section six hundred sixty-seven of this article and shall be in an amount equal to the enrollment factor percent of the award the student would have been eligible for if the student were enrolled full-time at a degree-granting institution or registered not-for-profit business school qualified for tax exemption under section 501(c)(3) of the internal revenue code for federal income tax purposes. The enrollment factor 7 percent is the percentage obtained by dividing the number of hours the student is enrolled in, as certified by the school, by the number of 9 hours required for full-time study, at a degree-granting institution or 10 registered not-for-profit business school qualified for tax exemption 11 under section 501(c)(3) of the internal revenue code for federal 12 income tax purposes, for a semester, quarter, or term, as defined by the 13 commissioner.

b. Any award a student receives pursuant to this section shall be counted as the enrollment factor percent of a semester, quarter or term toward the maximum term of eligibility for tuition assistance awards pursuant to section six hundred sixty-seven of this article. The total period of study for which payment may be made shall not exceed the equivalent of the maximum period authorized for that award.

§ 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
