AN ACT to amend the executive law, in relation to establishing the chief disability officer; and to repeal article 19-E of the executive law relating to the office of the advocate for people with developmental disabilities

## The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Article 19-E of the executive law, as added by a chapter of 2 the laws of 2021 amending the executive law relating to establishing the office of the advocate for people with disabilities, as proposed in 3 legislative bills numbers S. 1836 and A. 3130, is REPEALED.

- § 2. The executive law is amended by adding a new section 4-b to read 6 as follows:
- § 4-b. Chief disability officer. 1. Persons with disabilities comprise a major segment of the state of New York's population and their 9 particular needs and concerns must be considered as an integral part of 10 the planning and implementation of all state programs and services 11 affecting their lives and well-being. The office of the chief disability officer shall advocate on behalf of persons with disabilities and ensure 12 13 that persons with disabilities are afforded the opportunity to exercise 14 all of the rights and responsibilities accorded to citizens of this 15 state.
  - 2. For purposes of this article:

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- 17 (a) "Persons with disabilities" shall mean any person who has a disability as defined in subdivision twenty-one of section two hundred nine-18 ty-two of this chapter. 19
- 20 (b) "State agency" or "state agencies" shall mean any state depart-21 ment, board, bureau, division, commission, committee, public authority, 22 <u>public corporation, council, office or other governmental entity</u> 23 performing a governmental or proprietary function for the state, except 24 the judiciary or the state legislature.
- 25 3. (a) The governor shall appoint a chief disability officer. The 26 chief disability officer shall advise and assist state agencies in

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developing policies designed to help meet the needs of persons with disabilities. The chief disability officer shall be appointed by the governor and receive a salary to be fixed by the governor within the amounts appropriated therefor.

- (b) The chief disability officer shall: (i) be the state's coordinator for the implementation of the Americans with Disabilities Act; (ii) coordinate state activities to ensure that state programs do not discriminate against and are accessible to persons with disabilities; (iii) ensure that such programs provide services to individuals with disabilities in the most integrated setting appropriate to their needs; and (iv) work with state agencies to develop legislation and potential regulatory changes to help effectuate the duties and responsibilities required in this article, and any other changes that may significantly affect the lives of persons with disabilities in the state.
- (c) The chief disability officer shall, to the extent practicable, review and report to the governor upon proposed legislation and requlations. The chief disability officer shall submit comments, where appropriate, to the state agency which referred such proposed legislation and regulations evaluating: (i) the impact of the proposed legislation or regulation upon persons with disabilities; (ii) the relationship and impact of such proposed legislation or regulation on existing programs affecting persons with disabilities; and (iii) any modifications that would help persons with disabilities or aid in the implementation of the new proposal. All state agencies shall cooperate with the chief disability officer to ensure that the chief disability officer is able to fulfill the requirements under this section.
- § 3. Subdivisions 1 and 2 of section 702 of the executive law, as amended by a chapter of the laws of 2021 amending the executive law relating to establishing the office of the advocate for people with disabilities, as proposed in legislative bills numbers S. 1836 and A. 3130, are amended to read as follows:
- The most integrated setting coordinating council is hereby created within the executive department to have and exercise the functions, powers and duties provided by the provisions of this article and any other provision of law. The council shall be comprised of the commissioners of: the department of health, the office for people with developmental disabilities, the office of mental health, the department of transportation, the office of children and family services, the office of addiction services and supports, the department of education, and the division of housing and community renewal. In addition, the council shall consist of the director of the office for the aging, the [director of the office of the advocate for people with disabilities ] chief disability officer, three consumers of services for individuals with disabilities, one to be appointed by the governor, one to be appointed by the temporary president of the senate, and one to be appointed by the speaker of the assembly, three individuals with expertise in the field of community services for people of all ages with disabilities, one to be appointed by the governor, one to be appointed by the temporary president of the senate, and one to be appointed by the speaker of the assembly, and three individuals with expertise in or recipients of services available to senior citizens with disabilities, one to be appointed by the governor, one to be appointed by the temporary president of the senate, and one to be appointed by the speaker of the assembly.

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2. The [director of the office of the advocate for people with disa-2 **bilities**] **chief disability officer** shall serve as chairperson of the council.

§ 4. This act shall take effect on the same date and in the same 5 manner as a chapter of the laws of 2021 amending the executive law 6 relating to establishing the office of the advocate for people with 7 disabilities, as proposed in legislative bills numbers S. 1836 and A. 8 3130, takes effect.
