AN ACT to amend the public health law, in relation to a standardized form for medical exemption from required immunizations

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

- 1 Section 1. Subdivision 8 of section 2164 of the public health law, as 2 amended by chapter 401 of the laws of 2015, is amended to read as 3 follows:
- 8. If any physician, nurse practitioner or physician's assistant licensed to practice medicine in this state [certifies] completes the required exemption form stating that such immunization may be detrimental to a child's health, the requirements of this section shall be inapplicable until such immunization is found no longer to be detrimental to the child's health by the child's physician, nurse practitioner or physician's assistant. The department or any other state agency, board or commission may not require any other condition or requirement for the medical exemption to immunization or immunizations provided for in this section for school admission.
- 14 § 2. Subdivision 8-a of section 2164 of the public health law is 15 renumbered subdivision 8-b and a new subdivision 8-a is added to read as 16 follows:
- 8-a. Any physician, nurse practitioner or physician's assistant who
 believes that such immunization may be detrimental to the child's health
 must complete the following form and file it with the child's school:

1 (e) I hereby certify that immunization against (poliomyelitis, mumps, measles, diptheria, rubella, varicella, Haemophilus influenzae type b (Hib), pertussis, tetanus, pneumococcal disease, influenza, meningococcal disease and hepatitis B) may be detrimental to the child's health.

5 This certification, once provided to the child's school, shall serve as an exemption to section 2164 of the public health law.
