AN ACT to amend the insurance law, in relation to prohibiting insurers from restricting or imposing delays in the distribution of antiretroviral prescription drugs to certain persons

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subsection (i) of section 3216 of the insurance law is amended by adding a new paragraph 39 to read as follows:

(39) No policy that provides coverage for antiretroviral prescription drugs prescribed for the treatment or prevention of the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) or acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) shall subject such drugs to prior authorization.

§ 2. Subsection (l) of section 3221 of the insurance law is amended by adding a new paragraph 22 to read as follows:

(22) Every group or blanket policy delivered or issued for delivery in this state that provides coverage for antiretroviral prescription drugs for the treatment or prevention of the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) or acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) shall not subject such drug to a prior authorization requirement.

§ 3. Section 4303 of the insurance law is amended by adding a new subsection (vv) to read as follows:

(vv) Any contract issued by a medical expense indemnity corporation, a hospital service corporation or a health services corporation that provides coverage for antiretroviral prescription drugs for the treatment or prevention of the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) or acquired immunodeficiency syndrome (AIDS) shall not subject such drug to a prior authorization requirement.

§ 4. This act shall take effect on the one hundred eightieth day after it shall have become a law.
