AN ACT to amend the criminal procedure law, in relation to setting bail for defendants that pose a threat to public safety

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The opening paragraph of subdivision 1 of section 510.10 of the criminal procedure law, as amended by section 2 of subpart A of part VV of chapter 56 of the laws of 2023, is amended to read as follows:

When a principal, whose future court attendance at a criminal action or proceeding is or may be required, comes under the control of a court, such court shall impose a securing order in accordance with this title. 7 Except as otherwise required by law, the court shall make an individualized determination as to whether the principal poses a current physical danger to the safety of any crime victim, person or the community and 10 make an individualized determination as to whether the principal poses a risk of flight to avoid prosecution[7]. The court shall consider the 11 12 kind and degree of control or restriction necessary to reasonably assure 13 the principal's return to court and the safety of any crime victim, 14 person or the community, and select a securing order consistent with its 15 determination under this subdivision. The court shall explain the basis for its determination and its choice of securing order on the record or 16 in writing. In making a determination under this subdivision, the court 17 18 must consider and take into account available information about the 19 principal, including:
