AN ACT to amend the education law, in relation to school climate and codes of conduct on school property and disciplinary action following violation of such codes of conduct; and to amend the education law, in relation to making conforming amendments

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Judith Kaye School Solutions not Suspensions Act".

§ 2. Section 2801 of the education law, as added by chapter 181 of the laws of 2000, subdivision 1 as amended by chapter 402 of the laws of 2005, the opening paragraph, paragraph a and paragraph c of subdivision 2 and paragraph a of subdivision 5 as amended by chapter 380 of the laws of 2001, paragraphs l and m as amended and paragraph n of subdivision 2 as added by chapter 482 of the laws of 2010, and subdivision 3 as amended by chapter 123 of the laws of 2003, is amended to read as follows:

§ 2801. Codes of conduct on school property. 1. For purposes of this section, school property means in or within any building, structure, athletic playing field, playground, parking lot or land contained within the real property boundary line of a public elementary or secondary school, including a charter school; or in or on a school bus, as defined in section one hundred forty-two of the vehicle and traffic law; ~~and a~~ or a school's electronic files and databases. A school function shall mean a school-sponsored or school-authorized extra-curricular event or activity regardless of where such event or activity takes place, including any event or activity that may take place in another state.

2. The board of education or the trustees~~[, as defined in section two of this chapter,]~~ of every school district ~~[within the state, however created, and every]~~ or the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, and every board of cooperative educational services and ~~[county vocational extension board]~~ charter school, shall adopt and amend, as appropriate, a code of conduct for the maintenance of order on school property, including a school function, which shall promote and sustain a safe, respectful, and supportive school environment and govern the conduct of students, teachers and other school personnel as well as visitors and shall provide for the enforcement thereof. Such policy may be adopted by the ~~[school]~~ board of education or trustees, or the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, or other governing body only after at least one public hearing that provides for the participation of school personnel, parents, students and any other interested parties before its adoption. The school district, board of cooperative educational services, or charter school shall notify the school community and general public about the hearing at least fifteen days prior to the date of the hearing. Such notice shall include the date, time, and place of the hearing, the agenda, a copy of the proposed code of conduct, and information about a public comment period as determined by the school district, board of cooperative educational services, or charter school. The school district, board of cooperative educational services, or charter school shall take necessary steps to notify families who do not speak English and whose children attend a school in the district, a board of cooperative educational services, or a charter school. Such code of conduct shall define violations of the code of conduct and set clear expectations for student conduct on school property, including at school functions, and shall include, at a minimum:

a. provisions regarding conduct, dress and language deemed appropriate and acceptable on school property, including a school function, and conduct, dress and language deemed unacceptable and inappropriate on school property, including a school function~~[, and];~~

b. provisions regarding acceptable civil and respectful treatment of teachers, school administrators, other school personnel, students and visitors on school property~~[, including a]~~ and at school [function] functions, including ~~[the appropriate]~~ a range of age-appropriate graduated and proportionate disciplinary measures which ~~[may be imposed for violation of such]~~ must be considered in responding to a code violation, and the roles of teachers, administrators, other school personnel, the board of education or trustees, or the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, or other governing body, and parents.

b-1. provisions that require schools to use the least severe action necessary to respond to any violation of the code of conduct before imposing a removal or suspension. Such options may include restorative practices, social and emotional supports, and other interventions. Restorative practices may include class meetings, facilitated circles, conferences, peer mediation, and other interventions that can effectively address student misconduct, hold students accountable for their behavior, and foster healthy relationships within the school community. No student, however, shall be required to participate in a restorative practice without their consent. Reasonable attempts shall also be made to obtain the consent of their parents or persons in parental relations;

2 to respond to tardiness, unexcused absence from class or school, leaving  
3 school without permission, violation of school dress code, and lack of  
4 identification upon request of school personnel;

6 of willful disobedience. "Willful disobedience" shall mean disruptive,  
7 insubordinate, or rowdy behavior, including behaviors such as the use of  
8 foul or inappropriate language, gestures, comments, or refusal to follow  
9 directions;

10 c. provisions that prohibit the suspension of students in pre-kinder-  
11 garten through grade three, except if suspension is necessary to comply  
12 with applicable federal laws;

16 property, including a school function, of students and other persons who  
17 violate the code of conduct;

20 force, vandalism, violation of another student's civil rights and

29 detention, or suspended from school. When a student is suspended from  
30 school or removed from the classroom, the principal, or the principal's  
31 designee, in consultation with the student's teachers, shall, within  
32 twenty-four hours, create an education plan for the student for each  
33 class in which the student is enrolled, provided that if such twenty-  
34 four hour period does not end on a school day, it shall be extended to  
35 the corresponding time on the next school day. The education plan shall  
36 make provisions for a student's on-going academic instruction during the  
37 removal or suspension and shall include the steps the school will take  
38 to provide the student with a successful re-entry to school. The student  
39 shall have the opportunity to earn all academic credit they would have  
40 been eligible to earn had the student been in class, including the  
41 opportunity to complete any missed assignments or take any missed exam-  
42 inations or assessments during the student's removal or suspension. If  
43 an examination or assessment cannot be rescheduled, the student shall be  
44 allowed on school property to take such assessment or examination on the  
45 day and time that the assessment or examination is given;

~~k.]~~ m. circumstances under and procedures by which ~~[referral to]~~ a student may be referred to academic services, school-based support services, or appropriate human service agencies ~~[shall be made]; and~~

~~l. a minimum suspension period, for students who repeatedly are substantially disruptive of the educational process or substantially interfere with the teacher's authority over the classroom, provided that the suspending authority may reduce such period on a case by case basis to be consistent with any other state and federal law. For purposes of this section, the definition of "repeatedly are substantially disruptive" shall be determined in accordance with the regulations of the commissioner;~~

~~m. a minimum suspension period for acts that would qualify the pupil to be defined as a violent pupil pursuant to paragraph a of subdivision two-a of section thirty-two hundred fourteen of this chapter, provided that the suspending authority may reduce such period on a case by case basis to be consistent with any other state and federal law; and]~~

n. provisions to comply with article two of this chapter.

3. The ~~[district]~~ code of conduct shall be developed in collaboration with ~~[student, teacher, administrator, and parent organizations]~~ representatives from interested stakeholders including, but not limited to, students, teachers, administrators, parents, school safety personnel, collective bargaining units, and other school personnel and shall be approved by the board of education or trustees, ~~[or]~~ other governing body, or by the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York. In the city school district of the city of New York, each community district education council shall be authorized to adopt and implement additional policies, which are consistent with the city district's district-wide code of conduct, to reflect the individual needs of each community school district provided that such additional policies shall require the approval of the chancellor.

3-a. The board of education or trustees, chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, or other governing body shall provide professional development in accordance with this section for school personnel, law enforcement and public or private security personnel employed, retained or contracted with a school district or charter school regarding the code of conduct, the use of interventions, and graduated and proportionate discipline.

4. ~~[The]~~ At the beginning of each school year, the board of education or trustees, chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, or other governing body shall: translate the code of conduct into at least the three most commonly spoken languages of the children attending the school district,

3 cooperative educational services website, provide copies of a summary of  
4 the code of conduct to all students at a general assembly [~~held at the~~

7 ~~school year, and shall~~] or classroom lesson, mail a plain language  
8 summary of such code to all parents or persons in parental relation to

11 cellor of the city school district in the case of the city school  
12 district of the city of New York, or other governing body shall take  
13 reasonable steps to ensure community awareness of the code of conduct's

16 school district in the case of the city of New York or other governing  
17 body shall annually review and update the district's codes of conduct if  
18 necessary, taking into consideration the effectiveness of code of  
19 conduct provisions and the fairness and consistency of its adminis-  
20 tration. Each school district is authorized to establish a committee and  
21 to facilitate the review of the code of conduct and the district's  
22 response to code of conduct violations. Any such committee shall be  
23 comprised of similar individuals described in subdivision three of this  
24 section. The [~~school~~] board of education or trustees, the chancellor of  
25 the city school district in the case of the city of New York, or other  
26 governing body shall reapprove any such updated code only after at least  
27 one public hearing that provides for the participation of school person-  
28 nel, parents, students and any other interested parties.

30 ter school shall file a copy of its codes of conduct with the commis-  
31 sioner and [~~all~~] any amendments to such code shall be filed with the  
32 commissioner no later than thirty days after their adoption.

§ 3214. Student placement, suspensions and transfers. 1. ~~[School delinquent. A minor under seventeen years of age, required by any of the provisions of part one of this article to attend upon instruction, who is an habitual truant from such instruction or is irregular in such attendance or insubordinate or disorderly or disruptive or violent during such attendance, is a school delinquent.~~

2. ~~Special day schools]~~ Alternative learning schools. The school authorities of any city ~~[or]~~, school district, board of cooperative educational services, or charter school may establish schools or set apart rooms in ~~[public]~~ school buildings or properties for the instruction of ~~[school delinquents]~~ students removed or suspended for violations of the code of conduct, and fix the number of days per week and the hours per day of required attendance and instruction, which shall not be less than is required of minors attending the full time day schools.

~~[2-a. a. Violent pupil. For the purposes of this section, a violent pupil is an elementary or secondary student under twenty-one years of age who:~~

~~(1) commits an act of violence upon a teacher, administrator or other school employee;~~

~~(2) commits, while on school district property, an act of violence upon another student or any other person lawfully upon said property;~~

~~(3) possesses, while on school district property, a gun, knife, explosive or incendiary bomb, or other dangerous instrument capable of causing physical injury or death;~~

~~(4) displays, while on school district property, what appears to be a gun, knife, explosive or incendiary bomb or other dangerous instrument capable of causing death or physical injury;~~

~~(5) threatens, while on school district property, to use any instrument that appears capable of causing physical injury or death;~~

~~(6) knowingly and intentionally damages or destroys the personal property of a teacher, administrator, other school district employee or any person lawfully upon school district property; or~~

~~(7) knowingly and intentionally damages or destroys school district property.~~

~~b. Disruptive pupil. For the purposes of this section, a disruptive pupil is an elementary or secondary student under twenty-one years of age who is substantially disruptive of the educational process or substantially interferes with the teacher's authority over the classroom.~~

3-] 2. Suspension of a [pupil] student. a. (1) The board of education[, board of] or trustees [or sole trustee], the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, other governing body, the superintendent of schools, district superintendent of schools or principal of a school may suspend [the following pupils] students from required attendance upon instruction[+]

A pupil who is insubordinate or disorderly or violent or disruptive, or whose conduct otherwise endangers the safety, morals, health or welfare of others] as provided in paragraphs b, c, and d of this subdivision, in accordance with the code of conduct, provided that the suspension of such student is not prohibited by section twenty-eight hundred one of this chapter.

(2) School officials shall weigh the likelihood that a lesser intervention or discipline would adequately address the student's misconduct, redress any harm or damage, and prevent future violations of the code of conduct. Suspensions shall only be used as a last resort.

(3) The school shall conduct an investigation of any report of a violation of the code of conduct.

(4) The school shall inform any student that submission of a written statement is voluntary and that any statement by the student, written or oral, may be used against the student in a criminal, immigration, or juvenile delinquency investigation and/or proceeding and/or in a court of law. If a student has been arrested or if the school is considering referring the student to law enforcement, the school shall not request a statement from such student, except where there is imminent risk of serious physical injury to the student or other person or persons.

b. ~~(1)~~ In considering appropriate discipline measures, school authorities shall consider the facts of each case, including, but not limited to:

(1) the nature and impact of the student's alleged misconduct, including but not limited to the harm to the student or other persons, damage to personal or school property or threat to the safety and welfare of the school community;

(2) the student's age, ability to speak or understand English, physical health, mental health, disabilities, and provisions of an individualized education program as it relates to the student's behavior;

(3) the student's willingness to resolve the conflict and repair any harm or damage;

(4) the student's prior conduct, the appropriateness of prior interventions, and the effectiveness of any prior interventions;

(5) the relationship, if any, between the student's academic placement and program and the alleged violation of the code of conduct; and

(6) other factors determined to be relevant.

c. The board of education~~, board of~~ or trustees, ~~or sole trustee,~~ the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, other governing body, superintendent of schools, district superintendent of schools and the principal of the school where the ~~pupil~~ student attends shall have the power to suspend a ~~pupil~~ student for a period not to exceed five school days provided that the suspension of such student is not prohibited by section twenty-eight hundred one of this chapter. In the case of such a suspension, the suspending authority shall provide the ~~pupil~~ student with written notice of the charged misconduct including a brief explanation of the basis for the suspension and a description of the alleged behavior that violated the code of conduct that includes the date, time, and place of the scheduled informal conference with the principal, the right to appeal a suspension, and the procedures for appeal. ~~If the pupil denies the misconduct, the suspending authority shall provide an explanation of the basis for the suspension.~~ The ~~pupil~~ student and the parent or person in parental relation to the ~~pupil~~ student shall~~, on request,~~ be given an opportunity for an informal conference with the principal ~~at which~~. At the conference, the ~~pupil and/or~~ student and parent or person in parental relation shall be authorized to review all evidence of the alleged misconduct, present the ~~pupil's~~ student's version of the event ~~and~~, to ask questions of the complaining witnesses, and to be represented by an attorney or advocate. The aforesaid notice and opportunity for an informal conference shall take place prior to suspension of the ~~pupil~~ student unless the ~~pupil's~~

1 student's presence in the school poses a continuing danger to persons or  
2 property or an ongoing threat of disruption to the academic process, in  
3 which case the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's notice and opportunity for an  
4 informal conference shall take place as soon after the suspension begins

10 c. (1)] d. The board of education or trustees, the chancellor of the  
11 city school district in the case of the city school district of the city  
12 of New York, other governing body, superintendent of schools, or  
13 district superintendent of schools, shall have the power to suspend a  
14 student for a period not to exceed twenty school days, provided that the  
15 suspension of such student is not prohibited by paragraph c of subdivi-  
16 sion two of section twenty-eight hundred one of this chapter. No ~~[pupil]~~  
17 student may be suspended for a period in excess of five school days  
18 unless such ~~[pupil]~~ student and the parent or person in parental  
19 relation to such ~~[pupil]~~ student shall have had an opportunity for a  
20 fair hearing, upon reasonable written notice, ~~[at]~~ which shall include a  
21 brief description of the facts upon which the alleged violations of the

34 disability or a student presumed to have a disability, the provisions of

48 record. The entity or individual that conducts the hearing ~~[officer]~~  
49 shall make written findings of fact based on a preponderance of the  
50 evidence and shall make recommendations as to the appropriate measure of

52 officer shall be advisory only, and the board of education or trustees,  
53 the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city

56 all or any part thereof. ~~[An appeal will lie from the decision of the~~



~~superintendent to the board of education who shall make its decision solely upon the record before it. The board may adopt in whole or in part the decision of the superintendent of schools]~~ The board of education or trustees, the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, other governing body, superintendent of schools, or district superintendent of schools shall issue a written decision to the school and parent or person in parental relation to the student within three days of the hearing. The written decision shall state the length of suspension, if any, findings of fact, reasons for determination, length of suspension, if any, procedures for appeal, and the date by which the appeal shall be filed.

Where the basis for the suspension is, in whole or in part, the possession on school grounds or school property by the student of any firearm, rifle, shotgun, dagger, dangerous knife, dirk, razor, stiletto or any of the weapons, instruments or appliances specified in subdivision one of section 265.01 of the penal law, the hearing officer or superintendent shall not be barred from considering the admissibility of such weapon, instrument or appliance as evidence, notwithstanding a determination by a court in a criminal or juvenile delinquency proceeding that the recovery of such weapon, instrument or appliance was the result of an unlawful search or seizure.

~~[(2)]~~ Where a ~~[pupil]~~ student has been suspended in accordance with this section by a board of education, the board may in its discretion hear and determine the proceeding or appoint a hearing officer who shall have the same powers and duties with respect to the board that a hearing officer has with respect to a superintendent where the suspension was ordered by ~~[him]~~ the superintendent. The findings and recommendations of the hearing officer conducting the proceeding shall be advisory and subject to final action by the board of education, each member of which shall before voting review the testimony and acquaint ~~[himself]~~ themselves with the evidence in the case. The board may reject, confirm or modify the conclusions of the hearing officer.

~~[d.]~~ e. (1) Consistent with the federal gun-free schools act, any public school ~~[pupil]~~ student who is determined under this subdivision to have brought a firearm to or possessed a firearm at a public school shall be suspended for a period of not less than one calendar year and any nonpublic school pupil participating in a program operated by a public school district using funds from the elementary and secondary education act of nineteen hundred sixty-five who is determined under this subdivision to have brought a firearm to or possessed a firearm at a public school or other premises used by the school district to provide such programs shall be suspended for a period of not less than one calendar year from participation in such program. The procedures of this subdivision shall apply to such a suspension of a nonpublic school ~~[pupil]~~ student. A superintendent of schools, district superintendent of schools or community superintendent shall have the authority to modify this suspension requirement for each student on a case-by-case basis. The determination of a superintendent shall be subject to review by the board of education or trustees, other governing body, or the chancellor of the city school district in the case of the city school district of the city of New York, pursuant to paragraph ~~[e]~~ d of this subdivision and the commissioner pursuant to section three hundred ten of this chapter. 47 this section and those established in subsection (k) of section fourteen  
48 hundred fifteen of title twenty of the United States code and the feder-  
49 al regulations implementing such statute, such federal statute and regu-  
50 lations shall govern.

51 (ii) the board of trustees or board of education of any school  
52 district, other governing body, the chancellor of the city school  
53 district in the case of the city school district of the city of New  
54 York, a district superintendent of schools or a building principal shall  
55 have authority, provided that the suspension of such student is not  
56 prohibited by section twenty-eight hundred one of this chapter, to order

1 the placement of a student with a disability into an appropriate interim  
2 alternative educational setting, another setting or suspension for a  
3 period not to exceed five consecutive school days where such student is  
4 suspended pursuant to this subdivision and, except as otherwise provided  
5 in clause (vi) of this subparagraph, the suspension does not result in a  
6 change in placement under federal law.

7 (iii) the superintendent of schools of a school district, either  
8 directly or upon recommendation of a hearing officer designated pursuant  
9 to paragraph c of this subdivision, may order the placement of a student  
10 with a disability into an interim alternative educational setting,  
11 another setting or suspension for up to ten consecutive school days,  
12 inclusive of any period in which the student is placed in an appropriate  
13 interim alternative educational placement, another setting or suspension  
14 pursuant to clause (ii) of this subparagraph for the behavior, where the  
15 superintendent determines in accordance with the procedures set forth in  
16 this subdivision that the student has engaged in behavior that warrants  
17 a suspension, and, except as otherwise provided in clause (vi) of this  
18 subparagraph, the suspension does not result in a change in placement  
19 under federal law, provided that the suspension of such student is not  
20 prohibited by section twenty-eight hundred one of this chapter.

21 (iv) the superintendent of schools of a school district, either  
22 directly or upon recommendation of a hearing officer designated pursuant  
23 to paragraph c of this subdivision, may order the change in placement of  
24 a student with a disability to an interim alternative educational  
25 setting for up to forty-five days, but not to exceed the period of  
26 suspension ordered by a superintendent in accordance with this subdivi-  
27 sion, under the circumstances specified in subsection (k)(1) of section  
28 fourteen hundred fifteen of title twenty of the United States code and  
29 the federal regulations implementing such statute, provided that the  
30 suspension of such student is not prohibited by section twenty-eight  
31 hundred one of this chapter.

32 (v) the terms "day," "business day," and "school day" shall be as  
33 defined in section 300.9 of title thirty-four of the code of federal  
34 regulations.

35 (vi) notwithstanding any other provision of this subdivision to the  
36 contrary, upon a determination by the committee on special education  
37 that the behavior of a student with a disability was not a manifestation  
38 of the student's disability, such student may be disciplined pursuant to  
39 this section in the same manner as a nondisabled student, except that  
40 such student shall continue to receive services to the extent required  
41 under federal law and regulations, provided that the suspension of such  
42 student is not prohibited by section twenty-eight hundred one of this  
43 chapter.

44 (vii) an impartial hearing officer appointed pursuant to subdivision  
45 one of section forty-four hundred four of this chapter may order a  
46 change in placement of a student with a disability to an appropriate  
47 interim alternative educational setting for not more than forty-five  
48 days under the circumstances specified in subsections (k)(2) and (k)(7)  
49 of section fourteen hundred fifteen of title twenty of the United States  
50 code and the federal regulations implementing such statutes, provided  
51 that such procedure may be repeated, as necessary, provided that the  
52 suspension of such student is not prohibited by section twenty-eight  
53 hundred one of this chapter.

54 (viii) nothing in this section shall be construed to authorize the  
55 suspension or removal of a student with a disability from his or her  
56 current educational placement for violation of school rules following a



determination by the committee on special education that the behavior is a manifestation of the student's disability, except as authorized under federal law and regulations.

(ix) the commissioner shall implement this paragraph by adopting regulations which coordinate the procedures required for discipline of students with disabilities, and students presumed to have a disability for discipline purposes, pursuant to subsection (k) of section fourteen hundred fifteen of title twenty of the United States code and the federal regulations implementing such statute, with the general procedures for student discipline under this section.

§ 7. Paragraphs a, b and c of subdivision 3-a of section 3214 of the education law, as added by chapter 181 of the laws of 2000, are amended to read as follows:

a. Such teacher shall inform the ~~[pupil]~~ student and the school principal of the reasons for the removal. If the teacher finds that the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's continued presence in the classroom does not pose a continuing danger to persons or property and does not present an ongoing threat of disruption to the academic process, the teacher shall, prior to removing the student from the classroom, provide the student with an explanation of the basis for the removal and allow the ~~[pupil]~~ student to informally present the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's version of relevant events. In all other cases, the teacher shall provide the ~~[pupil]~~ student with an explanation of the basis for the removal and an informal opportunity to be heard within twenty-four hours of the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's removal.

b. The principal shall inform the parent or person in parental relation to such ~~[pupil]~~ student of the removal and the reasons therefor within twenty-four hours of the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's removal. The ~~[pupil]~~ student and the parent or person in parental relation shall, upon request, be given an opportunity for an informal conference with the principal to discuss the reasons for the removal. If the ~~[pupil]~~ student denies the charges, the principal shall provide an explanation of the basis for the removal and allow the ~~[pupil]~~ student and/or parent or person in parental relation to the ~~[pupil]~~ student an opportunity to present the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's version of relevant events. Such informal ~~[hearing]~~ conference shall be held within forty-eight hours of the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's removal.

c. The principal shall not set aside the discipline imposed by the teacher unless the principal finds that the charges against the ~~[pupil]~~ student are not supported by substantial evidence or that the ~~[pupil's]~~ student's removal is otherwise in violation of law or that the conduct warrants suspension from school pursuant to this section and a suspension will be imposed. The principal's determination made pursuant to this paragraph shall be made by the close of business on the day succeeding the forty-eight hour period for an informal hearing contained in paragraph b of this subdivision.

§ 8. This act shall take effect September 1, 2024; provided, however that:

a. the amendments to subdivision 3 of section 2801 of the education law made by section two of this act shall be subject to the expiration and reversion of such subdivision pursuant to section 34 of chapter 91 of the laws of 2002, as amended, when upon such date the provisions of section three of this act shall take effect;

b. the amendments to subparagraph 1 of paragraph c of subdivision 3 of section 3214 of the education law made by section four of this act shall be subject to the expiration and reversion of such subparagraph pursuant

1 to subdivision (a) of section 8 of chapter 430 of the laws of 2006, as  
2 amended, when upon such date the provisions of section five of this act  
3 shall take effect;

4 c. the amendments to paragraph g of subdivision 3 of section 3214 of  
5 the education law made by section four of this act shall be subject to  
6 the expiration and reversion of such paragraph pursuant to section 22 of  
7 chapter 352 of the laws of 2005, as amended, when upon such date the  
8 provisions of section six of this act shall take effect;

9 c-1. the amendments to clause (v) of subparagraph 3 of paragraph g of  
10 subdivision 3 of section 3214 of the education law made by section four  
11 of this act shall be subject to the expiration and reversion of such  
12 clause pursuant to subdivision d of section 27 of chapter 378 of the  
13 laws of 2007, as amended, when upon such date the provisions of section  
14 six of this act shall take effect; and

15 d. the amendments to paragraphs a, b and c of subdivision 3-a of  
16 section 3214 of the education law made by section four of this act shall  
17 be subject to the expiration and reversion of such paragraphs pursuant  
18 to section 12 of chapter 147 of the laws of 2001, as amended, when upon  
19 such date the provisions of section seven of this act shall take effect.
