- AN ACT to amend the general business law, in relation to the price gouging of medicine

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 2 of section 396-r of the general business law, as amended by chapter 90 of the laws of 2020, is amended to read as follows:

4 2. (a) During any abnormal disruption of the market for goods and 5 services vital and necessary for the health, safety and welfare of 6 consumers or the general public, no party within the chain of distrib-7 ution of such goods or services or both shall sell or offer to sell any 8 such goods or services or both for an amount which represents an uncon-9 scionably excessive price.

10 (b) For purposes of this section, the phrase "abnormal disruption of 11 the market" shall mean any change in the market, whether actual or immi-12 nently threatened, resulting from stress of weather, convulsion of 13 nature, failure or shortage of electric power or other source of energy, 14 strike, civil disorder, war, military action, national or local emergen-15 cy, <u>drug shortage</u>, or other cause of an abnormal disruption of the

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market which results in the declaration of a state of emergency by the 1 2 governor. 3 (c) For purposes of this section, the term "drug shortage" shall mean, with respect to any drug or medical product intended for human use, that 4 5 such drug or medical product is publicly reported as being subject to a 6 shortage by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. 7 (d) For the purposes of this section, the term <u>"goods</u> and services" 8 shall include [(a)] (i) consumer goods and services used, bought or 9 rendered primarily for personal, family or household purposes, [(b)] 10 (ii) essential medical supplies and services used for the care, cure, 11 mitigation, treatment or prevention of any illness or disease, and $\left[\frac{4}{4}\right]$ 12 (iii) any other essential goods and services used to promote the health 13 or welfare of the public. 14 (e) This prohibition shall apply to all parties within the chain of 15 distribution, including any manufacturer, supplier, wholesaler, distributor or retail seller of goods or services or both sold by one party to 16 17 another when the product sold was located in the state prior to the sale. [Goods] For the purposes of this subdivision, the term "goods and 18 services" shall also include any repairs made by any party within the 19 20 chain of distribution of goods on an emergency basis as a result of such 21 abnormal disruption of the market. 22 § 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
