AN ACT to amend the vehicle and traffic law, in relation to driving
while ability impaired by fatigue and aggravated driving while ability
impaired by fatigue

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assem-
bly, do enact as follows:

1 Section 1. The vehicle and traffic law is amended by adding a new
2 section 1212-a to read as follows:

3 § 1212-a. Driving while ability impaired by fatigue; aggravated driv-
4 ing while ability impaired by fatigue. (a) Driving while ability
5 impaired by fatigue. A person commits the offense of driving while abil-
6 ity impaired by fatigue when such person drives, operates or uses any
7 motor vehicle, motorcycle or any other vehicle propelled by any power
8 other than muscular power or any appliance or accessory thereof while
9 such person's ability or alertness is so impaired, or so likely to
10 become impaired, through fatigue as to make it unsafe for such person to
11 begin or continue to operate said motor vehicle, motorcycle or any other
12 vehicle propelled by any power other than muscular power or any appli-
13 ance or accessory thereof. Driving while ability impaired by fatigue is
14 prohibited.

15 (b) Aggravated driving while ability impaired by fatigue. A person
16 commits the offense of aggravated driving while ability impaired by
17 fatigue when such person commits the offense of driving while ability
18 impaired by fatigue as defined in subdivision (a) of this section and
19 such person thereby causes: (i) serious physical injury as defined in
20 subdivision ten of section 10.00 of the penal law; or (ii) the death of
21 any person. Aggravated driving while ability impaired by fatigue is
22 prohibited. Aggravated driving while ability impaired by fatigue is a
23 misdemeanor.

24 § 2. This act shall take effect on the first of November next succeed-
25 ing the date on which it shall have become a law.
