ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The Senate will come to order.

Everyone pleasant -- present. Yes, it would be nice if everyone would be pleasant. And everyone present, too, please rise and repeat with me the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

(Whereupon, the assemblage recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.)

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The invocation will be given by Rabbi Debora Gordon, from Congregation Berith Sholom in Troy.

(The rabbi sang in Hebrew.)

RABBI GORDON: May the One who blessed those who came before us, our family and community ancestors, those whose leadership roles have created stability and order and those whose leadership has inspired positive change, may this same One also bless this august body as it comes today to do the work of governance.

Bless its soul, its spirit, your breath, which gives voice to truth through the

interchange of your many opinions and points of view. Bless its heart -- in Hebrew, its leb, seat of both intellect and emotion. May your hearts be full of passion and of reason, banishing fear and ignorance.

On this Valentine's Day, a holiday derived not from my own tradition but embraced as part of the American culture in which I live, on this day may the love that we each share with our own families be enlarged and shaped into building blocks of love and respect for all our families, for families of choice as well as families of origin. SENATOR HOFFMANN: Mr. President,
may we please return to reports of standing

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Return

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Opposed,
nay.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The

Senator Hoffmann.

SENATOR HOFFMANN: May we please take up Calendar 249.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The Secretary will read Calendar 249.

THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 249, by Senator Spano, Senate Print 6539, an act to amend the Labor Law, in relation to defining "week of employment."

SENATOR PATERSON: Explanation, please.

SENATOR HOFFMANN: Is there a message of necessity at the desk?

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: There is.

SENATOR HOFFMANN: I move to accept the message of necessity.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: All those in favor of accepting the message of necessity signify by saying aye.

(Response of "Aye.")

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Opposed, nay.

(No response.)

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The message is accepted. The bill is before the

house.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: Explanation,
please.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator
Spano, an explanation has been requested by
Senator Dollinger.

SENATOR SPANO: Mr. President,
this bill is the -- makes technical amendments
to the Labor Law to ensure that workers with
significant employment in only one quarter,
particularly the construction industry, and
low-wage seasonal workers would be able to be
eligible -- continue to be eligible for
unemployment insurance benefits under the
current wage reporting system.

It's a bill that we had -- we
passed, I think it was unanimously, last year.
The Governor vetoed this bill. And it's a
bill that has been negotiated between the
Governor and the two houses.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator
Dollinger.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: Mr.
President, through you, if Senator Spano will
yield just to one question.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator Spano, do you yield for a question?

SENATOR SPANO: Yes.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The sponsor yields.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: Through you, Mr. President. It's my understanding that the veto from the Governor was motivated in part by -- to add some penalty provisions for misreporting, misrepresentations in the reporting process.

Could you just show me where in the bill that language is located? This is -- I assume this is the new language added since we did this same concept in December; is that correct?

SENATOR SPANO: On page 3 of the bill, Section 4 relates to the Unemployment Insurance Control Fund, Senator Dollinger. And that's the language that you're referring to.

As well as Section 4 and Section 5 of the bill. And it continues on, related to penalties, in Section 7 as well.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: That language

was -- again, through you, Mr. President, if
Senator Spano -

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator
Spano, do you continue to yield?

SENATOR SPANO: Yes.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The
sponsor yields.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: That's the
language that was added in response to the
Governor's veto of the bill? Those sections,
4, 5, and 7?

SENATOR SPANO: It wouldn't be
fair to say that was language that was put in
specifically because of the Governor's
objection. This has basically been a new bill
that's been written, starting with the bill
that we already passed, with some additions.
But it was negotiated between both houses.

So it was the -- not only the
Governor but also the Assembly as well that
had their input into the process.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: Okay. But
again, through you, Mr. President, just so I
make sure I understand.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator

Spano, do you continue to yield?

SENATOR SPANO: Yes.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The sponsor yields.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: That's the new language from the version we passed back in December, I think unanimously in this house, is that correct, those three sections?

SENATOR SPANO: That language, amongst some other changes in the bill, minor changes. But yes, that's correct.

SENATOR DOLLINGER: Okay. Thank you, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Read the last section.

THE SECRETARY: Section 17. This act shall take effect immediately.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Call the roll.

(The Secretary called the roll.)

THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 50.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The bill is passed.

Senator Hoffmann.

SENATOR HOFFMANN: At this time

may we have the reading of the
noncontroversial calendar.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The
Secretary will read the noncontroversial
calendar.

THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number
104, by Senator Larkin, Senate Print 681A, an
act to amend the Real Property Tax Law, in
relation to refiling.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Read the
last section.

THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This
act shall take effect immediately.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Call the
roll.

(The Secretary called the roll.)

THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 50.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The bill
is passed.

THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number
109, by Senator Farley, Senate Print 4704, an
act to amend the Banking Law, in relation to
conforming the personal loan limitations.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Read the
last section.

THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The bill is passed.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The bill
is passed.

act to amend the Penal Law, in relation to
computer networks.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Read the
last section.

THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This
act shall take effect on the first day of
November.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Call the
roll.

(The Secretary called the roll.)

THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 53.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The bill
is passed.

THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number
179, by Senator Rath, Senate Print 6173A, an
act to amend the Criminal Procedure Law, the

Executive Law, the Family Court Act, and the Penal Law.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Read the last section.

THE SECRETARY: Section 7. This act shall take effect January 1.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Call the roll.

(The Secretary called the roll.)

THE SECRETARY: Those recorded in the negative on Calendar Number 179 are Senators Breslin, Dollinger, Duane, Hevesi, Markowitz, Oppenheimer, Paterson, Santiago, Schneiderman, Smith, and Stavisky. Ayes, 42. Nays, 11.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The bill is passed.

THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 202, by Senator Libous, Senate Print 2091, an act to amend the Mental Hygiene Law, in relation to disqualification.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Read the last section.

THE SECRETARY: Section 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Call the roll.

(The Secretary called the roll.)

SENATOR DOLLINGER: Lay it aside, please.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Lay the bill aside.

Senator Hoffmann, that completes the reading of the noncontroversial calendar.

SENATOR HOFFMANN: Thank you, Mr. President. Now may we have the reading of the controversial calendar, please.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The Secretary will read the controversial calendar.

THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 202, by Senator Libous, Senate Print 2091, an act to amend the Mental Hygiene Law, in relation to disqualification.

SENATOR PATERSON: Explanation, please.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator Libous, an explanation has been requested of Calendar 202 by Senator Paterson.

SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr.

President.

I look forward to this moment every year when Senator Paterson asks for an explanation of this particular piece of legislation. And each year I convince myself that I would convince Senator Paterson of supporting this, but I have failed. Let me try it again this year.

Senator, as you know, this legislation is fairly simple. And basically it allows a physician on the staff of a private hospital to admit a person who is mentally ill to that hospital.

One of the changes we have made over the years is to put a three-year sunset on the legislation. We have a number of agencies who have reported it. And in light of Kendra's Law and some of the circumstances that have taken place over the years, it is much more difficult for these institutions to have two physicians making sign-off and referral.

And I think in light of what this body passed last year, Mr. President, I would hope that Senator Paterson and any of his

colleagues who have had questions in the past would be supportive.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator Paterson.

SENATOR PATERSON: Mr. President, I want to put to rest the rumor that I just get up and debate against this bill every year because I just would like to get together with Senator Libous but he keeps declining my invitation so I have to talk to him here.

If the Senator would yield for a question.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: Senator Libous, do you yield for a question?

SENATOR LIBOUS: Yes, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT MEIER: The sponsor yields.

SENATOR PATERSON: Senator, do we have any information detailing the number of individuals who have been denied the care that they should have received from an affiliated hospital because of the fact that they had to wait a period of time to have this certificate signed by two physicians?

SENATOR LIBOUS: You know, Mr. President, I would believe that, you know, the information is available. I don't seem to have it right here.

But it's probably very similar to the information -- you know, when Kendra's Law was being drafted, there was a lot of discussion of how many individuals are we talking about -- numbers of 3,000, 4,000, 5,000 individuals who would be involved in court-ordered appointments. And yet we heard the Commissioner say the other day 20 individuals have been involved so far.

So, Mr. President, while I don't have a specific number, I do know that in the case of providing adequate care on an involuntary system, that we believe that for these particular facilities it would make sense, again, to have just one attending physician be able to make that diagnosis.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Paterson.

SENATOR PATERSON: Mr. President, if the Senator would yield, I actually have a question I don't believe I've ever asked

before.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Libous, do you continue to yield?

SENATOR LIBOUS: I'm quite
anxious, Mr. President, to hear this.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Paterson.

SENATOR PATERSON: In my research
this year, Mr. President, I found that there
are 23 state psychiatric hospitals that
actually use this procedure right now. I
didn't know that before.

If the Senator would explain for us
why we had a different procedure for the
for-profit hospitals than we did for the state
psychiatric hospitals, that would be very
helpful.

SENATOR LIBOUS: The procedure is
different, and that's what we're trying to
change right here in the law, Senator. There
actually is a different procedure. It isn't
statute. And we're trying to address that
issue right now.

The private psychiatric hospitals
have a different situation than the state-run

hospitals. And that's actually something that was recommended by the Commission on Quality Care, that this legislation make that adjustment.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Paterson.

SENATOR PATERSON: Thank you, Mr. President. If the Senator would yield for one last question.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Libous?

SENATOR LIBOUS: Sure.

SENATOR PATERSON: And this is a pivotal question.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Paterson.

SENATOR PATERSON: Senator, is there any provision in this bill for disclosure to the patient that one of the two physicians that signed what they call the 2PC certificate, the two-physician certificate, is actually affiliated personally with the hospital?

SENATOR LIBOUS: No, sir, there is not.

SENATOR PATERSON: Thank you,
Senator.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Read
the last section.

THE SECRETARY: Section 4. This
act shall take effect immediately.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Call
the roll.

(The Secretary called the roll.)

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
Senator Paterson.

SENATOR PATERSON: Mr. President,
please note, for the record, I vote aye.

(Laughter.)

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
Senator Paterson will be recorded in the
affirmative.

THE SECRETARY: Those recorded in
the negative on Calendar Number 202 are
Senators Duane, Hevesi, Schneiderman, and
Stavisky. Ayes, 53. Nays, 4.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: The
bill is passed.

Senator Hoffmann.

SENATOR HOFFMANN: Is there any

housekeeping at the desk?

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: There is no housekeeping at the desk.

SENATOR HOFFMANN: There being no further business to come before the Senate, I move we adjourn until Tuesday, February 15th, at 11:00 a.m.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: On motion, the Senate stands adjourned until Tuesday, February 15th, at 11:00 a.m.
