24	I'm voting no on this, not only because I
25	don't believe in taking life, but I also

believe that protecting life, the unborn, is also very important. That's why I oppose abortion, and that's why I'm opposing this one, because I want to be consistent in protecting life.

So life is sacred during inception, and life is sacred at the end. So I'm voting no.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Diaz to be recorded in the negative.

Senator Schneiderman.

SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: Thank you, Mr. President.

I just want to note that a lot of other jurisdictions in the country are actually moving away from the ideology of the death penalty.

And I would like to call the attention of this body to the evidence that was adduced at a hearing we held in Suffolk County a few months ago demonstrating that through absolute stone-cold exonerations of people who were wrongfully convicted through DNA evidence, we've established that 25 percent of those people who are exonerated

1 pleaded guilty to crimes they did not commit.

In most cases, we do not have DNA evidence to determine whether people are guilty or not. But given these statistics and the growing body of evidence that not only are there innocent people going to jail, but there are people who are innocent who are pleading guilty to crimes they didn't commit, we have to really take a hard look at this.

And I really think it's regrettable that this house is going to move forward towards the death penalty knowing, knowing -- unless we willfully choose to disregard the evidence in front of our eyes -- that under such a system innocent people will be put to death.

I vote no, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Schneiderman to be recorded in the negative.

Senator Connor, to explain his

vote.

SENATOR CONNOR: Thank you,

23 Mr. President.

Mr. President, I rise once again to oppose the death penalty. I understand the

concern for the victims, in this case police 1 officers who are brutally murdered. 2 also understand that we have a fallible system 3 4 of justice -- perhaps the best system of 5 justice anywhere, but nonetheless administered by human beings and therefore fallible. 6 7 And it's been pointed out there 8 have been exonerations in cases of murder, even in cases of confession. There's a whole 9 10 body of psychology about why people falsely confess. And I say again, as I've said before 11 12 on this floor for many, many years, no to the death penalty. It's unworthy of a civilized 13 14 society. It's not a penalty we should impose. 15 I will never vote for the death penalty under

SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you,
Mr. President.

I rise also to go on record that I will not vote for a death penalty bill, now,

last year, next year. 1 2 But I am concerned that this bill 3 popped up on our calendar so late today so 4 that some of us who might have chosen to 5 prepare more documentation of why we know that the death penalty is a flawed model of 6 7 criminal justice would have had the 8 opportunity to make that presentation. 9 So again, I vote no. Thank you, 10 Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Senator 12 Krueger to be recorded in the negative. 13 Senator Maziarz, to explain his 14 vote. 15 SENATOR MAZIARZ: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 16 I feel just as passionately as some 17 18 of my colleagues on the other side of the 19 aisle in favor of this legislation. 20 You know, it was just about a year and a half ago that we had the widow of 21 22 Trooper Joseph Longobardo sitting right there 23 talking about what great service her husband did. 24 25 It was interesting in the Buffalo

News just two or three days ago, there was a 1 2 front-page article about the individual, Ralph "Bucky" Phillips, who murdered Trooper Joseph 3 4 Longobardo, how he's in prison -- and of 5 course he escaped justice -- how he's in prison and he's complaining about the care 6 7 that he's receiving in the Department of 8 Corrections. And the Department of Corrections 9 10 reported that he's been sanctioned at least nine or ten times already, including 11 12 attempting to make a homemade bomb to injure corrections officers. 13 This bill should become law in this 14 15 state. Unfortunately, it won't, because of some -- the narrow-mindedness of some of my 16 colleagues here and in the other house. 17 18 I definitely, affirmatively vote in the positive on this legislation. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Maziarz to be recorded in the affirmative. 21 Senator Golden, to explain his 22 23 vote. 24 SENATOR GOLDEN: Thank you, 25 Mr. President.

It is a privilege to stand before you today and to ask my colleagues to join us in passing a piece of legislation that would make a difference for the lives of the people that live in this great city and this great state.

Last week we stood outside this
very institution and we went to the Police
Memorial Wall and we met with many of the
parents and the loved ones of those that have
lost police officers and state troopers across
this great city and state.

It's sad to see the numbers, how great they are. And it's important that we as a body, a legislative body, give the tools not only to the police departments across this great state but to the people, the 19.5 million people that live in this great state, that they can feel secure in that we have passed legislation that will defend the police officers and their families as they go to work each and every day.

This bill provides swift and severe and certain punishment for those that murder police officers. This bill will do something

about the 1,385 police officers that have been killed in this state -- the 508 that have been by gunfire, the 61 by assault, the three from a bomb, the 34 that were stabbed, the 49 by vehicle assaults.

Nationwide, this past year, there were 39 line-of-duty deaths, including two here in New York.

Academic studies show the death penalty has a deterrent effect. It shows that each additional execution decreases homicides by five to six. Each additional commutation increases homicides by the same amount. And an additional removal from death row generates one additional murder.

Arguments against the death penalty essentially are that criminals are not rational enough to behave according to incentives. But criminal activity declines as the price of such activity increases. We already have proof of this. Increased arrests, more police officers reduce crime. Crime is serious --

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Golden, excuse me.

May we have order in the house out
of respect for our speaker. Thank you.

Senator Golden, you may continue.

SENATOR GOLDEN: If I just focus on the City of New York, they are down 5,000 police officers, and crime is creeping up in that city and across other cities here in the State of New York.

We've seen officers that were here last Wednesday. Police Officer Timoshenko, who was killed in the City of New York, his parents were here as they went over to the wall to see their son on that wall.

We've seen two auxiliary police officers gunned down in the City of New York because a crazed gunman thought that they were police officers and went back and put two shots into his head as he was laying on the ground.

The only way, the only deterrent is to put the death penalty into effect for those that would kill police officers and state troopers, correction officers, and those that are peace officers in the line of duty that are doing their work.

1	We believe it's the right piece of
2	legislation. How many more police officers
3	have to die here in this great state before we
4	as a body and the Assembly do something so
5	that we can send to the Governor a piece of
6	legislation that works and brings down crimes,
7	brings down murders, and brings down murders
8	of the police officers across this great
9	state?
10	I vote aye, Mr. President, and I
11	thank you for your dedication.

It seems to me that we have 16 proof positive that the carnage on our roads, 17 18 especially amongst young people, 6,000 of which die every year as a result of auto 19 20 crashes -- let me repeat that number. 21 thousand young people die every year because 22 of automobile crashes, the leading cause of 23 death in that age range. That's more than our brave troops, 24 25 all of our brave troops that have died in

Afghanistan and Iraq since of the beginning of the war. This happens every year on our roads.

We had five people in Rochester, five young women in Rochester die. Records showed that they were either sending or receiving a text message as the incident occurred.

This is an outrage that has to be stopped. We're not trying to hurt anybody, we're trying to save lives. We're trying to get an educational component put in the driver education program, a question on the driver education test.

We want to make parents aware that they've got to talk and communicate to their youngsters when they give them that car, which is a missile, which can be a lethal weapon when not used appropriately, that they must take into consideration that they must watch the road and pay attention. Texting is a more dangerous distraction than anything else, because you've got to take both hands off the wheel and both eyes off the wheel to read the message.

That means that this bill is charging a person on parole \$1,860 in a year just for being on parole. It doesn't say what would happen to a person that refuses to pay the money.

Even though the bill says -- even though the bill says that this bill is amended to establish that these new fees shall not be a condition of probation, but the bill doesn't say -- if this will not be a condition of probation, the bill doesn't say what's going to happen to a person who refuses to pay close to \$1,800 a year for being on probation.

Three different fees. One for drug testing, one for administrative costs, and one for electronic monitoring.

I mean, the parents have no right to decide if their 13-year-old daughter would have like to have an abortion, so we've taken that right away. So at 13 years old, a girl could have an abortion and the parents have nothing to do, have nothing to say. We're taking those rights away.

I mean, you know, enough. Enough. Parents are parents, and they will never end being parents. My children, my youngest one is 35 years old, my youngest one, and I'm still being a parent. I am his father, and I will never end being a parent. And I would like to know what it is they're doing, even though they're already married.

So if those kids -- I'm going to repeat myself again -- if those students live under that roof and those parents are paying

for that education, there's nothing wrong for the parent to find out and for the college to report to the parent if those children are missing school, are playing hookey and the parents are wasting their money.

So yes, I'm voting yes, and I congratulate the sponsor on this.

SENATOR ADAMS: Thank you,

Mr. President.

I want to add my voice also to vote yea on this bill. I think that Senator

Krueger does raise an issue, but I think that it's important that independence doesn't come with age, it comes with status. And as long as a young person is in the home of their parent and they're not paying their own tuition, then they don't have independence.

They still are dependent on their family.

But in addition to that, I don't believe there are any rights of privacy in a household, and I think far too often we find out too late what our children are involved in

is because we believe they have some 1 constitutional right to privacy inside the 2 home of their family. 3 4 Not only do I believe we should 5 know the grades they're having, but we need to search their rooms. We need to see what's 6 7 inside their rooms. We need to be gainfully 8 involved in what a child is doing. 9 And I think this bill is the first 10 step of identifying if there is some academic issue with a child. You don't want to wait 11 12 until they are on academic probation and removed from school to determine that there 13 14 was a problem. 15 College is too expensive to play games. You can get F's sitting at home. And 16 17 if you want your parents to pay your tuition, 18 then you need to turn over those grades. 19 vote aye. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Adams to be recorded in the affirmative. 21 Senator Connor, to explain his 22 23 vote. 24 SENATOR CONNOR: Thank you, 25 Mr. President.

As I said last time we debated this, as someone who went through college in the '60s, that wonderful generation where we fought for all sorts of rights for 18-year-olds, I candidly admit that 20 years ago I would have voted no for this. But as a parent of two sons who are in college, a whole other spectrum opens up.

You know, I laugh when we get mail at home, my boys are usually away at college, they go away to college. You know, they get mail at home, all sorts of important mail from the schools. You know, we wouldn't open their mail. We send it on to them. You know, then you find out later that one was about some insurance thing that they missed a deadline for, or the other was about some other important deadline or opportunity for them.

But it's oh, yeah, "Did you get that thing in the mail?" "Yeah, yeah, I didn't read it yet." Or "Yeah, I read it, the deadline was whenever." Eighteen-, 19-, 20-year-olds are what they are.

The one thing that comes addressed to me, though, twice a year for each of them

is the bill. They don't seem to have any problem sending that to the parents.

And, you know, it's not just about, hey, I pay the tuition, room and board, you know, I want to see your grades and if you're not doing well, I'll stop paying. And I certainly don't want to threaten if they don't tell me their grades that, you know, I'm not going to pay for them anymore.

The real concern is, you know, sometimes suddenly failing grades are an indication of a problem in that child's life. And yeah, legally adults at 18. What parent, what parent doesn't want to know that their 18-, 19- or 20-year-old is experiencing some difficulty, emotional or otherwise, that's affecting their ability but, more importantly, could be jeopardizing their lives?

And I certainly know other parents who have discovered, unfortunately too late, that their child had developed a drug problem or whatever, and they would have known had they seen how poorly they were suddenly doing in school. Really bright kids go off with great expectations, get good grades for a

semester or two, and the grades crash. 1 2 information parents ought to have to do their 3 job. 4 Because, you know, your job doesn't 5 end on that 18th birthday. They're always your children. They're always certainly dear 6 7 to your heart. And you always feel 8 responsible to try and assist them when they are in need. 9 10 So I think it's important, and I'm 11 supporting this legislation because from the perspective I now have, I want to know those 12 grades, I want to know how my kids are doing. 13 14 And it's not just I pay, it's I care about 15 them.
