It includes fraud prevention, a whole host of consumer protections, and at the same time is fair to both the life insurance companies, many of whom are domiciled here in New York State, and the life settlement brokers and companies.

So I'm very pleased that at long last we've come to a conclusion on this legislation. I appreciate Senator

DeFrancisco's interest over the years; I know Senator Breslin has been involved.

We went through a process at NCOIL, the National Conference of Insurance
Legislators. This bill is basically the NCOIL model tailored to New York law.

We've set up this fund to deal with the fact that there 19 20 was not a lot of coverage for this very rapidly growing area of employment. 21 22 The Aminov case, which this bill 23 seeks to reverse, was based on the fact that there was a black car operator who logged in, 24 25 was on duty, available for assignments, was

driving into the city so that he could take an assignment, had not yet received a call for a specific assignment, and his car was slammed into.

The owner said: Oh, well, because he wasn't actually picking someone up or discharging them, he shouldn't be eligible for workers' compensation.

That was overturned, that assertion was rejected by the courts. And in fact, the Third Department in the Aminov case explicitly stated that the position of the owner and the position that would be established in law if we vote for Senator Libous's bill is that if a claimant has not received a specific assignment from the dispatcher, he is not in fact performing covered services.

Now, the problem with this is -and I understand the concern that you want to
make sure that black car drivers are not out
freelancing or taking their friends to lunch.
But if a black car driver is waiting for a
call or in between pickups, filling up his car
with gas or otherwise engaged in the
performance of his duties, you can't deprive

that person of the ability to collect from a workers' compensation fund.

This bill, which would in fact reverse the Aminov case, which is very clear and well-thought-out law, states that a dispatch, which is the key term, only means that you're in the course of picking up, transporting, or discharging a passenger or package.

Now, that means that anything in between, particularly the people who -- you know, we have a lot of black car drivers who live in my district and work in my district -- if you're waiting for a call and someone plows into you and cuts your head off, you're not eligible. You know, I mean, this is really, I think, something that has to be reworked.

It does provide that the board of directors of the fund can establish other regulations. But I don't think we can pass a law that would immediately deprive thousands of New Yorkers of the ability to seek compensation when they're injured on the job.

There is no question that someone who has dropped off a passenger and is

awaiting a call, is logged in, is in the performance of their duties. This would take away the rights of those people to compensation.

I'd suggest to the sponsor, who I know worked with great care on this, that we -- let's just let this bill go, let's rework it, let's do something that actually narrows the definition to make it clear that someone has to be on duty in the course of accepting assignments or eligible for assignments from the base -- not freelancing, not cover people who are off on a frolic or detour. The law is very well established in this area.

But let's not do something that unintentionally harms innocent people performing their work. A lot of hardworking New Yorkers drive in terrible traffic every day to support their families. Let's not hurt those working New Yorkers.

I would urge the sponsor to lay the bill aside, but I would also urge anyone who cares about working families in New York, who cares about basic economic and social justice,

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to vote against this bill.

And also, I mean, how could this possibly be monitored? I'm not even going to question how it could be monitored, because it can't be monitored.

I mean, you could have four kids and four parents, and they could arrange -- or five parents, and they could arrange to have a different mother pick up on Monday and another one on Tuesday and another one on Wednesday, pick up the five kids, and yet all five of these parents would be eligible to get money from the -- not just from the city, but of course we pay 57 percent of transportation

costs, we, the State of New York. 1 2 So I think this is not a good bill, 3 and -- I mean, for example, here's another 4 thought. If a mother is leaving her job and 5 on the way home passes the school at 5 o'clock, then she would be qualified to be 6 7 paid money. 8 And it doesn't say how the money is 9 In other words, if the parent says, you paid. 10 know, my gasoline costs X and another parent 11 says my gasoline costs Y -- I mean, it's just, 12 to me, a very bizarre bill, and I would hope that everybody would vote against it. 13 14 I'll be voting no. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Stavisky. 16 SENATOR STAVISKY: 17 Yes, Mr. 18 President, I have voted against it in the 19 past. 20 In addition to what Senator 21 Oppenheimer said about increasing the 22 pollution, the gas consumption, et cetera, and 23 whether that bus makes a run and picks up one student, it is no longer cost-effective. 24 25 What bothers me most about this

bill is the fact that you're taking scarce 1 2 education dollars from the classroom. As the 3 chancellor is cutting aid for the 4 schoolchildren in New York City, as less money 5 is coming into the classroom, you're going to have less available for programs that educate 6 7 the children. And it seems to me that that's 8 where it all happens, in the classroom. 9 And to divert money from the 10

And to divert money from the classroom I think is a very, very dangerous thing to do. And I am very troubled by the cuts in the New York City education budget. This is another one. And I urge that we oppose this bill.

Thank you.

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When I review this bill, it reminds me somewhat of the Mayor's proposal last year where he was paying parents to take their youngsters for dental care, to the doctor, to the zoo.

I think parents have a

responsibility, and the responsibility is to take care of their children. And I think as long as the Department of Ed attempts to make life easier for parents, then naturally they don't do their job.

I think that if we have money, it should be in the classroom. We always talk about the education, but yet now we want to pay parents to be drivers. It's the most ridiculous bill I've ever seen.

In 2006 I voted against this bill, but since then, with the advent of the Contract for Excellence, we now have schools throughout the City of New York that are providing extra hours, dozens of them. But I do not accept that if there are one or two or three fewer children on the bus because their parents have opted out, that we're actually decreasing our costs for bus transportation to and from school.

To be honest, I can be torn about this bill, because representing Manhattan, our constant frustration is that it seems that the Department of Education really wants to get out of the busing-children-to-school business completely, which is an enormous frustration. I have parents with children in pre-K and kindergarten who, even though they appear to live in a bus zone, are being told there are no buses for them.

So I empathize and even share, perhaps, the frustration of the sponsor. But because of the way the bill is written and the fact that we don't get to decrease the cost of the contract for the bus service because there are fewer children on that bus, I do believe

it would be an increased cost on the city 1 2 school system. I do think that we are in serious 3 4 financial trouble this year with our City of New York schools -- at least that's what the 5 chancellor keeps telling us, as they propose 6 7 cutting funding out of our schools. 8 And so even though I empathize with 9 the frustration for many parents not having an 10 easy scenario even trying to get their 11 children on the existing school buses, I don't 12 think this, as it is written, gets us where we 13 want to go. And I do feel it is a new unfunded 14 15 mandate on the city, and so I will vote no. Thank you, Mr. President. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 17 Is 18 there any other Senator wishing to be heard? 19 Debate is closed. The Secretary 20 will ring the bell. Senator Larkin, Senator Johnson requests an explanation.

SENATOR LARKIN: Senator Johnson, this bill makes some changes to Chapter 18 of this year.

A couple of things that it does specifically, and you remember from the hearing that we had down in Belmont. This clarifies the effective date, an issue that you worried about. So it says that they can't go past that 25 year until they come back to the Legislature. They can't just get it from Racing and Wagering, they can't get it an executive approval. They must come back to us.

It also clarifies the vendor fee at Aqueduct to make sure that NYRA will receive its racing support payments out of the vendors' fees. This is a constitutional concern, since ours requires that all net proceeds go to support education. Therefore, after the vendor's fee and the costs of administration are paid, then the balance must go to education.

The bill as written seems to indicate NYRA's support payments should be paid separately.

Now, it also contains an appropriation to allow the state to pay the property taxes. This was something we actually fought for in the legislation. And if you recall, when we were down at Elmont, one of the issues was how will we get paid for it. That's what we've covered in here.

And what we're doing now is we want to ensure that the state would pay so that localities would get their money on time as adjusted. In the past, NYRA, as we all know, has not been a good payer of these taxes. As my good friend Senator Hannon said that day, "Why don't we do something to ensure that they'll do it?" Well, we are now.

And we must also understand that right now NYRA, in their local area down there, is \$15 million behind. This bill doesn't have a provision for the Belmont advisory board. You talked to me the other day about it, and we took that out, that 15 and all of that. We put that for another day.

If you have a copy of it in front of you, it's page 10 on the bill, paragraph 3, lines 12 through 17. That's the specific reference.

I'm trying to get an understanding for legislative history purposes.

SENATOR LARKIN: You're talking about the total revenue on that 4 percent?

SENATOR CRAIG JOHNSON: That's correct. My question is this, though. And you see it.

Four percent of the total revenue wagered after payout for prizes to be deposited into an account of the franchised corporation "to be used for capital expenditures in maintaining and upgrading of Aqueduct racetrack, Belmont Park racetrack and Saratoga race course."

1	My question is, will that upgrading
2	and maintaining not only be the actual
3	racetrack
4	SENATOR LARKIN: The entire area.

This is a big issue for the residents of Elmont and Floral Park. There currently is no local advisory board for those residents to address the issues at the Belmont racetrack.

Obviously, a great way to address that if we're not going to address it in the omnibus bill is to very easily bring it out of Rules today, my bill, Senate Bill Number S6977, a simple, stand-alone piece of legislation that would create a local advisory board for the Belmont communities.

It has an Assembly sponsor,
Assemblywoman Michelle Schimel. It has
support in the Assembly.

We could pass it here today and accomplish what we wanted to set out and what we talked about to the Elmont community at that hearing: payment of the taxes and a local advisory board. It will be two bills,

not necessarily one, but this way everything is accomplished.

I would hope that as we wind down our Senate session, we take Senate Bill S6977 up and get that passed. But right before us is the bill we have before us, 8709.

And while I find it difficult and upsetting that it's clear to me that the Assembly has issues with the local advisory board in that piece, I thank Senator Larkin. Because it does show a commitment on paying the property taxes that are due and owing. It will help Nassau County. It will help the Town of Hempstead. It will help the Village of Floral Park. It will help the residents of Elmont. It will help the school districts and the special districts to finally get something back that they are due and owing.

So I will be voting in favor of the bill. I urge all my colleagues to vote in favor of it. But hopefully before the end of session we can also take up Senate Bill Number 6977, my bill for a local advisory board for Belmont Park, and pass that as well.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 1 Any 2 other Senator wishing to be heard? 3 Senator Hannon. 4 SENATOR HANNON: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. It is painfully obvious to anybody 6 7 who read reports of the Belmont Stakes how 8 ill-prepared, ill-equipped and ill-managed 9 NYRA has been in running Belmont. 10 When we passed the original legislation to, quote, bail them out back 11 earlier this session, I was on my feet saying 12 that this is an area close to the center of 13 14 the New York City metropolitan area that has 15 been left fallow, that the best use is the ignominious renting of the parking lot to 16 automobile dealers to store their cars, 17 18 instead of being a premier destination spot which could boost New York State racing and 19 20 boost our having a great tourist attraction. I would suggest to the people that 21 22 are running NYRA, I would suggest to the 23 executive branch that they take heed of the gross failures occurred during the Belmont 24 25 Stakes and work to improve this site, work to develop this site and make it something that

New Yorkers could be proud of.

This legislation does advance many of the goals, but it does not go as far as we want and it does not change the mind of the people who run NYRA to making this what we need.

SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you.

I appreciate the discussion. I appreciate my colleague Senator Craig

Johnson's analysis of what else we should be doing.

I'll vote for the bill, based on Senator Johnson's recommendation, but I need to stand up to point out yet again that in New York State we keep bailing out our gambling. We bail out our racetracks over and over again, we bail out gambling activities, we reduce the income coming into our school education funds by increasing the take held by the operators of VLT.

You can be agnostic about gambling as a legislator based on your belief that you're actually going to gain revenue for the State of New York.

And frankly, for the six years I've been here, the only thing we ever do around gambling in this state is bail them out and give them more of our money that should be going to schools. So I am continuously frustrated, regardless of the subissue within gambling, that we continue to apparently not know how to make money in gambling. And I thought that was the assignment if government was going to be participating in that business.

So I suppose I share my frustration with you all that if we're going to be in the business of gambling, then let's at least make some money for the people of New York State instead of continually having to pass bills to move more money out to the gambling entities.

But the one nickname that stands out more than any other is the "Forgotten Borough." We are forgotten by the City of New York in many issues. We are forgotten by the MTA on just about all of them. But there is no city agency that ignores us more and with greater frequency than the Health and Hospitals Corporation.

as "Diet Brooklyn," because of its huge number

And they're allowed to do that because they have no brick-and-mortar hospital in the County of Richmond. There is no physical public hospital to serve what is the fastest growing borough right now in the City of New York, with a population of close to a half a million people.

Ten years ago we had five not-for-profit and voluntary hospitals; we are now down to two. One of them is on life

support itself. And as a result of the fact that we do not have a brick-and-mortar facility on the island, we get no funding from the HHC.

We do not have a rape crisis center like the other public hospitals provide in the other boroughs. We do not get to participate in the colonoscopy free screening that's provided by the HHC. We don't get any of the benefits that the HHC provides to the rest of the City of New York, partially funded out of the taxpayers' pockets of Staten Islanders, because we do not have a brick-and-mortar facility.

Now, I don't disagree with Senator Krueger's assertion that perhaps this is not the way you allocate capital resources. But this may be the only way we get the attention of the mayor of the City of New York and the Health and Hospitals Corporation and force them to allocate a percentage of their budget for the health and welfare of the citizens of Richmond County.

And they have never done it, and we're going to continue to fight for it every

step of the way, including possibly suing the City of New York and the HHC to do that.

So I'm going to vote for this bill, Senator Lanza, because it is a good bill. And 10 percent, in my opinion, may not be enough.

I mean, that is amazing. 1 nation. 2 And what Senator Krueger is saying, 3 which makes a lot of sense, how do you 4 distribute 10 percent to Staten Island and to 5 the Bronx when the Bronx, with Lincoln Hospital, Bronx-Lebanon Hospital, Jacobi 6 7 Hospital, all the hospitals have more need? 8 More people living there, more people being attended, more need, more health needs than 9 10 Staten Island. Three times more. But, Senator Lanza, because of the 11 intention of the bill to force the City of 12 New York to spend money in healthcare 13 14 directly, we in the Bronx would take -- even 15 though not enough, not enough, 10 percent -we will take whatever we can. SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: 1 Thank you. 2 I just rise to thank Senator Volker for bringing this bill finally to the floor to 3 4 be voted on today. 5 This is a bill that will prevent debtors from freezing the bank accounts of 6 7 elderly poor people who may be surviving only 8 on their Social Security check or their disability check and, because of some dispute 9 10 that may or may not ever be resolvable, banks actually, under current law, freeze their 11 12 accounts. They can't pay their rent, they can't buy food, they can't pay for their 13 14 prescriptions. 15 This is a very important bill for many elderly poor New Yorkers. So I want to 16 thank him very much for moving this bill. 17 18 I'll vote yes. 2006, laws instructing the Executive to enforce the laws of the State of New York by collecting sales tax. Three Governors have chosen to ignore those laws that have existed.

So this is purposely presented as a penalty, not only to the state for its inaction for failure to fulfill the responsibilities incumbent with the executive office of the Governor in enforcing the law.

So while those numbers are being worked out, I thought it was important that we presented this forward, because we want to encourage that the law is obviously abided by and that the Governor in office, whoever it may be -- and at this time the current Governor -- really begin to take appropriate action. And if not, this would be a penalty for the State of New York.

So I recognize there would be a cost savings. But we were trying to come up with a new way without trying to face some constitutional crisis between the two branches, recognizing the separation of powers but also trying to emphasize the importance of this legislation and the fact that for three

1	Governors now, we have not seen any action.
2	So yes, there would be a cost, but
3	that is the impetus for this, not only to
4	offset the concerns expressed by the small
5	business community, but I actually think we
6	should even go farther and hold the
7	communities harmless too that are also
8	suffering because of this failure to collect
9	the sales tax.
10	SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you,
11	Senator Griffo.
12	Would the sponsor yield, Madam
13	President, for one last question.

tobacco dealers, retail tobacco dealers who 1 2 are in close proximity to a border state. 3 If we're trying to deal with the lost revenue that's not collected from Native 4 5 American reservations through the sale of bootleg cigarettes, why are we now including a 6 7 section on border states? 8 SENATOR GRIFFO: Madam President, 9 through you. 10 Senator Klein, we do have 11 reservations that are in bordering states that are close enough to our border that have that 12 13 type of an impact. 14 SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you very 15 much, Senator Griffo. Madam President, on the bill. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: 17 Senator 18 Klein, on the bill. 19 SENATOR KLEIN: I want to thank 20 Senator Griffo for raising this issue. But I think what we're doing in 21 22 this legislation is making a bad situation, if at all possible, somewhat worse. What we're 23 doing now is we're acknowledging that we can't 24 25 collect cigarettes on Native American

reservations, even though there's many laws written that say we can do that, and now we're losing all that revenue for the State of New York for untaxed cigarettes, and now we're giving a tax credit to these aggrieved businesses.

I don't think this is the best way to deal with the problem. Although, again, I do recognize Senator Griffo is looking out for his localities, who are going to wake up one morning without a tax base.

This is an issue that I've had a hong history with in our State Legislature.

As a matter of fact, one of the first bills that I passed in the Assembly was a bill that I did with Senator Libous when the problem was bootlegging of cigarettes that came from low-tax states. We dealt with that situation, but then the Native Americans got into the cigarette business and the issue has come about again.

I also wrote a law with Senator
Chuck Fuschillo which bans the sale of
cigarettes over the Internet and through mail
order. Again, a very important issue, because

not only are we losing a tremendous amount of tax revenue, but young people time and time again are able to gain access to cheap cigarettes over the Internet without having to give IDs or any proof of age.

So this is an issue that has become very, very important for two reasons. First, the State of New York is losing millions and millions of dollars in uncollected revenue.

But just as important, the way young people can buy cigarettes is through the Internet, through mail order. And the incentive to buy cigarettes at a cheaper price exists every day for them.

There are statistics that show every time we tax cigarettes, we do reduce the number of smokers. But I think when we look at those numbers, I think they're very difficult to calculate. Because what we're seeing is people who are buying cigarettes lawfully, and there maybe a drop-off, but I think indeed they're buying cigarettes over the Internet, they're buying cigarettes off the street from people who aren't collecting the tax.

Whether you like cigarette smoking or not, we can't ignore the fact that we generate a tremendous amount of revenue through cigarettes. And one of the ways we fund the HCRA fund in New York State -- which, as everyone knows, goes to healthcare and other important programs, the EPIC program, to just name a few -- is through cigarette taxes.

Also, our tobacco settlement money, which is again earmarked in New York State for healthcare causes, is based on legal cigarette sales. So every time a bootleg pack of cigarettes is sold, every time an untaxed carton that emanates from a Native American reservation is sold, that's less money that's calculated towards our tobacco settlement dollars.

So I think we really need to deal with this through legislation, if we can. But I'll be honest, I'm getting a little frustrated. I've passed two bills now in my tenure in the Legislature, and they haven't been enforced.

I think what we really need to do is work out an agreement with our Native

American neighbors where we do some type of 50/50 split where they collect the taxes, we take half. It's better than nothing. Or maybe we should actually have a health and education fund that the money is collected by Native Americans and is dedicated to a fund to make sure that the reservation uses it for education and healthcare.

But I think we shouldn't be the only state in the United States that has no tax agreement with our Native American neighbors. That's where we are right now. And I don't think, in this time of fiscal constraints, we can continue to ignore \$500 million, \$600 million in uncollected revenue.

And as I said earlier, I feel for the constituents that Mr. Griffo represents, as well as my colleague Senator Valesky.

Because it's very, very difficult to compete when an item is being sold and they're excluding taxes.

And I will say, and I guess I don't want to give some of the tribes some ideas, but there's nothing preventing them from

actually selling refrigerators or fur coats or 1 2 jewelry or anything else that has a very high 3 luxury tax. And what's going to happen one 4 day is we're going to wake up in a lot of 5 these communities, and they're going to lose their tax base. And I think it's incumbent 6 7 upon us to prevent that from happening. 8 So while I support the effort that's put forward in this bill, and I do vote 9 10 yes, I think we should be really doing a lot 11 more to finally hammer out an agreement with 12 our Native American agreements. I thank you, Madam President. 13 14 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Senator 15 Valesky. SENATOR VALESKY: 16 Thank you, Madam President. On the bill. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Senator Valesky, on the bill. 19 20 SENATOR VALESKY: Thank you, Madam President. 21 22 I appreciate Senator Klein's 23 efforts over the years -- particularly his leadership in the Assembly, before coming 24 25 here -- on this issue.

I can relate and speak firsthand to the frustration that Senator Klein speaks about in regard to this issue. And I want to thank Senator Griffo for bringing this bill before us today.

The impact certainly on convenience stores in Central New York as a result of the lack of enforcement of sales tax collection has been significant over the years. It has been even greater since passage of the budget earlier this year with the \$1.25 increase in the state excise tax on cigarettes.

This is the third consecutive administration in this state that has not followed through in enforcing the law.

Senator Griffo mentioned earlier that we have passed legislation in this house and in the other house on more than one occasion, and in numerous budgets, to direct the Commissioner of Taxation and Finance to collect sales taxes. That has not happened, and I commend Senator Griffo for taking this approach.

I would note in the bill, however, that Senator Griffo's bill would expire upon the collection of the sales tax imposed under

Article 20 of the Tax Law. So when laws that 1 2 are on the books are not being enforced, I 3 think it's certainly appropriate for us as a 4 Legislature to do everything we can to 5 encourage the Executive, whomever that might be, to enforce the laws of this state. 6 7 So, Senator Griffo, thank you for 8 bringing this piece of legislation before us. I encourage all of my colleagues to support 9 10 the bill. ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 11 12 you, Senator Valesky. Senator Nozzolio. 13 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: 14 Thank you, Madam President. On the bill. 15 Madam President and my colleagues, 16 Senator Griffo did not want to introduce this 17 18 legislation. I speak for myself; I did not want to support this legislation. 19 20 But unfortunately, the New York State Tax Department, being the biggest tax 21 scofflaw of all of New York State, requires us 22 to take this drastic action. 23 Under three Governors, the New York 24 25 State Tax Department has failed to comply with

a law that this house instructed them to comply with. This house voted to establish the level playing field when an Indian business, a Native American business, sells to a non-Native American customer, that is a transaction that this house and the other house, the Assembly, indicated should be the law of New York State.

Do you know of any other element of the New York State tax code that is ignored by the New York State Tax Department? I can think of no other.

We all know, and I'm sure we've heard from business after business that when non-Native American businesses, when they are in any way in arrears in their payments, what happens to them? Well, the New York State Tax Department is the first to show up, is the first to seize assets, is the first to take them to court, is the first to prosecute and is the first to convict.

But what happens when there are, as Senator Klein had indicated, literally thousands of transactions that are occurring each and every week that the New York State

Tax Department is required to collect taxation but refuses to do so?

The only thing worse than taxation is taxation that's administered unevenly, and that's what we have in this state. We have an uneven implementation of the New York State tax code by the New York State Tax Department. One set of rules for Native Americans who are selling to non-Native Americans. Even though the law requires there to be a set of rules for all business selling to non-Native Americans, the Tax Department continues to support duplicity.

Senator Griffo -- and I support his legislation -- has introduced this bill out of tremendous frustration. But his frustration and my frustration pales in comparison to the frustration of the everyday businessperson who is paying their taxes, who is complying with the law, who is trying to make ends meet, who is running a legitimate business but cannot compete toe to toe, head to head because there's a duplicity in the enforcement of our New York State tax code.

The frustration of that

businessperson -- the loss of revenue, the 1 2 loss of employment, the loss of their 3 business -- is extreme. That's why Senator 4 Griffo developed this procedure, to try to 5 level the playing field somewhat and somehow make up for the Tax Department's failure to 6 7 follow the law. 8 Senator Griffo, you've done an excellent job in putting this bill before us. 9 10 It's a measure that I believe everybody should support that cares about business in New York, 11 12 that cares about the upstate economy, that cares about those businesses that do follow 13 14 the law, that do pay taxes, that do obey the 15 rules. It is, at the very least, out of 16 frustration because of the Tax Department's 17 18 failure to comply with the law that this legislation becomes necessary. 19 20 And that, Madam President, is why I 21 rise to support it. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 23 you, Senator Nozzolio. Any other Senator wishing to be 24 25 heard?

The first principle of tax policy 9 is you treat equal transactions and equal 10 individuals or businesses equally. Unfortunately, the New York State 11 tax code is riddled with exemptions and 12 loopholes like this, which is why our 13 14 corporate taxes have high marginal rates but 15 generate very little income. I would love to have a way to 16 17 support the people in these jurisdictions that 18 are suffering; I can't support this particular method. I'm voting no, Madam President. 19 20 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: 21 Thank 22 you, Senator Schneiderman. 23 Senator Savino, to explain her 24 vote. 25 SENATOR SAVINO: Thank you,

Madam President.

I'm also voting against this bill, although I totally appreciate and understand the frustration of Senator Griffo and the other members of the Senate who represent areas that do have a large number of Native Americans selling cigarettes illegally. I am sympathetic.

However, for all of the reasons that Senator Klein laid out, the amount of revenue that is at stake, the amount of revenue that the New York State government loses every day because of these illegal sales, the amount of revenue that comes out of our HCRA fund, the amount of revenue that comes out of the tobacco settlement, the cost to New York State is incredible.

And what we have here right now is a situation where we are almost on the verge of aiding and abetting what is almost like an organized crime ring. Nowhere else would we apply this rule than to this particular group of people who are violating the law every day. Imagine if every one of us in this chamber decided that we were not going to pay our

taxes anymore, we were just going to stop. 1 2 Would any one of us be allowed to stop doing that? Would any group of retailers 3 4 in the City of New York decide to just stop 5 paying the sales tax that they are required to pay, or anywhere else in the State of 6 7 New York? No. 8 Our failure to enforce the legislation that we passed is somewhat 9 10 troubling, because we're allowing it to go on. 11 I understand what we're trying to do; we're 12 trying to provide relief directly to the unintended victims of our own failure. 13 what we should be doing is making sure that 14 15 when we enact legislation and the Governor signs it into law, that the agency's required 16 for implementing it actually does that. 17 18 I understand what you're doing, Senator Griffo, but unfortunately I cannot 19 20 vote for this legislation. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Senator Savino, how do you vote? 22 23 SENATOR SAVINO: No. ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: 24 Senator 25 Savino votes no.

Senator Winner, to explain his vote.

SENATOR WINNER: Thank you,

Madam President. I briefly want to explain my

vote.

I want to thank Senator Griffo for bringing this measure before us, ostensibly out of frustration with the failure of the administration -- three administrations -- to enforce the law that we have out there to collect the sales tax that is costing our taxpayers significant revenues that could be used for other purposes.

I mean, one of the last excuses that they used, the Tax Department used, was that they were enjoined from enforcing the law. Well, you know why they were enjoined from enforcing the law? The law said that you had to promulgate regulations, and the law said that you had to print revenue stamps in order for the law to be implemented and put in place.

And they said, well, we've been enjoined because we did -- because -- and therefore we can't go forward. Well, the

reason they couldn't go forward is because they didn't promulgate the regulations and they didn't print the revenue stamps.

So what kind of circular nonsense and excuse-hiding-behind is that particular message to all the legitimate businesses that are out there?

This measure is born out of frustration. It's hopefully a message that will be sent to the administration and others that are responsible for the enforcement of a legitimate statute that we have on the books to collect these necessary revenues for our legitimate state purposes.

And additionally, I want to commend Senator Griffo for recognizing the inequities that we have also on the border businesses that are dealing with states that have lower excise taxes that are causing us significant anti-competitive retail pressures within our state.

So this measure is a great measure to send a message out there that we really mean business about making sure that these revenues are collected and that we know that

we need to protect the legitimate businesses 1 2 in this state from unfair competitive 3 pressures. 4 So I vote aye. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 6 you, Senator Winner. 7 Senator Hassell-Thompson, to 8 explain her vote. 9 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank 10 you, Madam President. 11 I'm very confused because I thought 12 clearly that the agreements that were made on reservations could not be preempted by the 13 14 State Legislature. And yet the language that 15 is being used infers and implies that something illegal is happening on the 16 reservations. 17 18 I will be voting no for this bill primarily because I continue to see it as an 19 20 encroachment on and changing or attempting to change those agreements that have been made 21 with our reservations. 22 23 I do not agree that the competition should not in fact be more fair in terms of 24 25 surrounding communities, but I fail to see how

this in fact will make a justification for the 1 2 balance that you say that you want to create. I will not be voting for this bill. 3 4 Thank you, Madam President. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 6 you, Senator Hassell-Thompson. You will be 7 recorded as a no. 8 Senator Parker, to explain your 9 vote. 10 SENATOR PARKER: Madam President, 11 to explain my vote. 12 First, let me congratulate Senator Griffo for bringing this issue to the floor. 13 This is an issue, since I've been here, we've 14 15 been trying to address in several different ways and we've gone unsuccessful without 16 addressing it. So I stand in unity with 17 18 Senator Griffo as he tries to address a wrong that needs to be dealt with. 19 20 However, I'm not clear that this bill is actually the way that we ought to go 21 22 about it. 23 Frankly, my concern is really 24 simple, is that we are looking at lowering the 25 taxes on cigarettes after we have just raised

the taxes on cigarettes.

To tell you a quick story, there was a young man who was born in Harlem Hospital, grew up as an orphan, had an opportunity to get a good job and wound working for the Transit Authority. And having that full-time job at a living wage, with benefits, allowed him to marry his high school sweetheart and raise five children. You know, one of them actually became a State Senator.

And unfortunately, that man, after having this good life, died last year of a massive heart attack after suffering for six or seven years with emphysema, acute bronchitis, and other kind of ailments. And that man was my father.

I do not want to see people have to go through what my family has gone through after losing my father to smoking-related illness. We need to do everything that we can to in fact discourage people from smoking.

And if store owners and convenience store owners have to find other ways to produce revenues, then let's have that conversation, and I'm happy to figure out

1 other ways to do it.

But we no longer can in fact trade off economic development and jobs with the cost that it's costing us both in human lives and in the healthcare costs for smoking-related illnesses.

And so on one hand we're giving money and now we're giving away money, and on the other hand we're going to be spending money as we in fact encourage people to smoke all over the state.

Because of that, I have to vote no.

And I'm hoping that we can work together,
going forward, to figure out another way to
address this important issue.

As I read the bill, the applicant comes to the UDC for financing of this project, and then they can come to an agreement, the state agency and the project developer, wherein if they make an agreement to pay PILOTs to themselves instead of taxes for 40 years -- again, if I'm the developer in the deal and I make an agreement through this law where I will pay payments in lieu of taxes not to the state or the locality but in fact to myself for the project costs, then for 40 years I might not have to pay any actual taxes to the local government or the county or even the state.

And the way the bill is written, the locality only gets 45 days' notice to decide whether or not they want to object.

And if they haven't objected, this deal can go through. And the school district, which also then is losing the taxes for up to 40 years, also has only 30 days to make a determination.

And so this kind of deal could go through in what I would call the blink of an

Now, you know, this has got two purposes. One is to generate tax revenue.

One is create jobs. One is create housing, affordable housing. So jobs, housing. I can't think of all the other -- if you read the bill, one or two good reasons to do this, to revive the community, raise the community standards with employment, with new projects, construction work.

You're right, 3 percent of the total project cost will go to the school district initially. Now, if the locality doesn't want this project, they can veto the project. They can say "We don't want it."

But most people would like the jobs and the construction and the jobs which are generated from the project.

And a lot of income is created in that area, sales taxes are created. So don't think there's no benefit to the community; there is. The community will be revived, and

the revenue will flow from the other sources 1 2 which I mentioned to you. So I think it's a very clever idea to finance things without the 3 4 state going into debt to do it. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 6 you, Senator Johnson. 7 Senator Krueger. 8 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. 9 Thank you, Madam President. On the 10 bill. ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: 11 Senator 12 Krueger, on the bill. SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Well, of 13 course we all love the idea of economic 14 15 development that creates jobs. And housing, as the Senator said. Although this bill isn't 16 actually related to housing, this bill is 17 18 related to some kind of manufacturing-category plant, as opposed to housing. And it does 19 20 talk about creating jobs, although it can be relatively small numbers of jobs. But I 21 22 appreciate that in certain communities small 23 numbers of jobs are very important. 24 Again, my concern with this bill is 25 imagine you're a local government. The ESDC

has gone into a deal with someone. You have a maximum of 45 days to have a community discussion: Do you want this here? What are you giving up in taxes if you accept the project?

Because if you accept the project, there are no taxes owed to you for 40 years, 4-0, except for what's written into this bill of 3 percent payable at closing of the financing to the host community. That's a one-time 3 percent project cost. Three percent of the project costs to be paid to the school district. And 3 percent to ESDC. Well, you understand why they might like it; they get 3 percent of the project costs.

But again, with what I would define in the real world as almost no time for notice, you're walking into potentially having this enormous new project in your community with no time to evaluate what are the pluses and minuses for you. What are the advantages and the disadvantages of this big new project in your community, in your town, in your county? What are the impacts on your transportation system, on your school system,

on your environmental costs?

What does it mean to have just 45 days -- and even in the bill it lays out they're supposed to put letters around telling people about the meeting to have a public hearing -- 45 days, maximum, to make a determination about whether you're accepting this project and, if this project is accepted, you're locked into a 40-year deal where the project gets to keep the tax revenue for themselves through the payments in lieu of taxes? And you might not have even had time to do an evaluation for yourself about the impact in your community.

me. I represent a part of the City of

New York. We're a big city, we're a

sophisticated city with a very large local

government and zoning experts and

environmental experts and community boards.

And I would tell you that a 45-day timeline is

not nearly adequate for us in New York City to

make these kinds of determinations.

So imagine if I'm a small town in upstate New York who doesn't have all of these

staff resources, and suddenly I get notice that if I don't say "no" within 45 days, that's it, the deal is going through, this is coming in.

So I have a real concern about this imposing on local communities, sort of forcing them into economic development projects that again on the surface might sound great, but without the time and resources to evaluate what this impact would be for themselves.

And so we love having economic development projects. We support using bonds and notes to support the kinds of projects that are going to create real jobs and be good partners with our communities.

I'm not saying that any individual project that might be considered under this bill might not be a good project. Again, I asked the sponsor; there's no specific project in mind. It talks about putting them in brownfields areas. We like that. We want to do more creation of brownfields resolution.

But again, I think this is an attempt by the state to run over local governments' and local communities' rights to

make their own determinations about whether 1 large-scale projects are right for them or not 2 3 and what the costs and impacts will be on their communities. 4 5 And again, having just 45 days maximum -- 30 days for your school district --6 7 to determine whether you're giving up your tax 8 base on that area for 40 years doesn't seem 9 like a really great deal to me. 10 So with all due respect, I don't think this is the kind of legislation most 11 12 communities in New York State really want to see passed, because it locks them out of the 13 14 process. And we want more transparency and 15 more community participation, not less. So I'm recommending a no vote on 16 this bill. 17 18 Thank you, Madam President. ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 19 20 you, Senator Krueger. 21 Senator Hassell-Thompson. SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: 22 Thank you, Madam President. 23 Just an additional concern. 24 When the federal dollars used to come to the 25

states, there was something called the A-95 review. And what the A-95 review called for was that at least 90 days would be put in place to allow all concerned citizens and organizations and municipalities to be able to review, comment and respond.

This also triggered -- if there were complaints, it stopped the clock in terms of the time that was necessary. And also there was a mechanism put in place when complaints were registered that those complaints would be reviewed by the feds.

I'd like to make a suggestion that this bill and others like it seem to require, is that we establish for our IDAs, for our ESDCs, for our UDCs -- for any of our acronyms -- that we have something relevant to the A-95 review that requires a timely allowance for municipalities to set forth those complaints and concerns. And it ought to also trigger that the state have a mechanism in place that allows for those complaints and concerns to be appropriately reviewed.

A-95s worked well because they

allowed community groups to take a look at any monies that were coming into their communities to be reviewed and to make their concerns known. And it also allowed for sufficient time for the proper oversight local committees to register appropriate complaints.

So I just have a concern that, number one, 45 days certainly does not seem to be sufficient. But every bill that we pass seems to have their own numbers, and there's no statewide requirement that we really take a look at and review and allow our local communities to have the review process that we need in place.

So I will be voting -- you know, I don't want to stop this progress, but I want us to continue to review what it is we do and have some systematic way in which our agencies will function and that there will be an oversight review to follow up on complaints and concerns that are in fact registered by local communities.

I hear upstate and downstate communities talking about this, but nobody wants to bite the bullet and say we need to

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have a review process that is consistent in

And I might say, someone mentioned about 50 factory jobs. You could have up to 200, 300 jobs in finance or insurance and so on.

So I think this is a really good idea to create jobs and restore communities, and you don't have to worry about the payment because it's going to be covered by the PILOTs.

ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank you, Senator Johnson.

Senator Perkins.

Through you, 1 SENATOR PERKINS: 2 will the sponsor yield again for another 3 question. Senator 4 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: 5 Johnson, will you yield? So I would hope that the positive that you intend on experiencing with these projects does not repeat what has happened with the Yankees and the Mets. Because if that is going to be the models that you're using, then we're in trouble. And we'll be singing the blues next time that we get together.

So I again want to underscore my support of the vision that you have in mind, but I'm not quite sure that this approach is the approach that is as transparent and as accountable as we would need to assure the public.

So I'm going to not be able to support this legislation, because I think that we can do better. And I would like to see us move in a way that is more transparent, is more accountable, and that can therefore better service the people of the state in

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terms of its economic development needs.

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that's true. 1 2 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Okay. So, 3 Madam President, if the sponsor would continue 4 to yield for another question. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Senator Johnson, do you yield? 6 7 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Yes. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: The 9 Senator yields, Senator Montgomery. 10 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Thank you. Through you, Madam President. 11 12 Now, we just passed a bill which would put into law for the State of New York a 13 14 set of smart growth principles. And assuming 15 that the Governor will sign this legislation -- it's Senator Marcellino's bill 16 that we did today -- that would establish that 17 18 no project under UDC or any of the other agencies that would be similarly providing 19 20 financing for these megaprojects would be allowed to go forward except under these 21 22 principles. 23 So my question to you is, how do we reconcile this, which seems to be me to be --24 25 just looking at this bill, which provides that

UDC takes the lead, and they have very 1 2 different procedures than localities. Yet Senator Marcellino's bill requires that 3 4 localities are involved and that there are 5 certain principles that every development must adhere to. 6 7 How would we reconcile that 8 vis-a-vis your legislation, which does not take into consideration these principles? 9 10 does not take into consideration any 11 principles of the local involvement. 12 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Is that a 13 question? 14 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: I want to 15 know how would you reconcile this. Because your bill provides that UDC takes the lead. 16 17 As lead agency, we operate under their 18 guidelines. They have not yet adopted these principles. And how would we reconcile that 19 20 difference? ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: 21 Senator 22 Johnson. 23 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: 24 Senator, "smart growth" is a catchy phrase. 25 I've heard it many times. And what they like

to do is jam everybody into small areas so 1 2 they don't have to use cars, they can ride 3 buses or trains. But some areas of our state 4 don't have buses and trains, but they're areas 5 which need to be redeveloped. And certainly you can't just say 6 7 "if you can't do by smart growth principles, 8 you can't do it." That's not a law anyhow; 9 that's a proposed law. And so I'd say that the people 10 11 developing there certainly know that people 12 have to have access to the place and have access for employees to come to work. 13 14 got to be in an area where essentially smart 15 growth exists without anybody telling them it exists. 16 So I think there's no problem with 17 18 this, really. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 20 you, Senator Johnson. 21 Senator Montgomery. 22 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Thank you, 23 Senator. Madam President, on the bill. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Senator

1 Montgomery, on the bill.

SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Yes, I want to correct Senator Johnson on one thing that he said, and that is that smart growth is only a concept, it's a proposal.

But what we have in front of us is a bill that we just passed, and I think we voted unanimously to adopt these smart principles. And it is my understanding that the bill has already passed the Assembly.

So if that is the case, then we have in place for the State of New York, for these developments, any development -- it doesn't say that some developments in some regions, some areas, not in the urban centers, not in the suburban centers. It says that New York State now has a set of smart growth principles.

Which include, include that there are certain principles in every development that must be considered. And some of those are, i.e., whether or not this development meets local criteria for what communities view as important issues to them. It is in the law. It's very specific. And it doesn't

exclude anyone.

will take the lead -- and UDC, my experience has been, on one hand, they can be very positive. On the other hand, if UDC decides that it will not abide by local laws and zoning codes and considerations of local communities, but rather it supports the development as presented by the developer no matter what impact it's going to have on the future of that community, then we clearly have a problem.

And so I'm going to vote no on this, because it's not clear to me that Senator Marcellino's legislation, the smart growth principles -- which I certainly support. I think that we should have this bill, this law should be in place for our communities across this state. And I'm not convinced that UDC considers itself under this regulation.

I want to see it as part of this bill if it's going to pass at all. And certainly if UDC does not decide to adopt the principles of smart growth as it relates to

any development that would come under this 1 2 law, then we are in trouble. 3 So, Madam President, I'm going to 4 oppose this legislation because I have seen 5 personally, firsthand, the destructive aspect of when ESDC, which operates over UDC, does 6 7 not adhere to local considerations in 8 megadevelopments. And so we have essentially, in the case that I'm familiar with, where ESDC 9 10 is clearly siding with the developer against 11 the community that the development is proposed 12 to be in. So, Madam President, I vote no. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: 14 15 you, Senator Montgomery. Any other Senator wishing to be 16 heard? 17 18 Senator Johnson, on the bill. SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: 19 I just 20 want to clarify something. The local government has much to 21 22 say about what is built where in their community. You know that; right? the loan, we would have to, as the State of New York, through ESDC somehow.

And I am also concerned, as Senator Perkins was raising before, about the amount of off-the-books debt we continue to build up.

I'm also -- again, on the last connected bill, I was concerned about the locality had so little time to make an evaluation for themselves. On this bill I'm concerned the ESDC has so little time to make a determination.

Again, as the sponsor answered, these could be enormously large loan requests, for small ones, on simple proposals or on enormously complex proposals. But under this bill, the only fee paid to the ESDC/UDC is a thousand dollars, and they're opposed to make a determination within 30 days. I have not seen the UDC/ESDC make too many decisions about economic development projects within a 30-day period.

And while we might be frustrated that sometimes everything in government takes too long, I'm very concerned we're limiting them to 30 days to do full evaluation and

good-faith investigation to which whether this is a specific project we should be bonding out money and giving loans for.

I'm also very concerned that it ties into these hypothetical projects and we don't know what they are. But if you look at the bill we just dealt with -- and I voted against -- S8526B, there's reference in that bill language connecting it to this bill. In the final, actually, section of that bill and the final section of this bill, 8680. These clearly are intended to work together. They are legislated as being part of the same chapter and reference each other.

All the reasons I gave before about the prior bill not passing a smell test, I'm sorry, I also don't think we've thought this one through well enough.

I certainly understand the need for bridge loans in some circumstances for economic development. My understanding is we have some of these programs in place already, and this might be duplicative of other ESDC options.

But again, in theory, no specific

project, and yet these two bills play 1 2 together. And yet there are so many specifics 3 in it, it does seem that somebody must have a 4 specific project in mind, even though I'm not 5 privy to that information. I'm very hesitant for us to 6 7 continue to walk down the road of making 8 global decisions for localities on, quote, 9 unquote, projects we don't talk about, under 10 shorter and shorter timelines. If you were concerned about the first bill, as so many of 11 my colleagues were, I would recommend being 12 equally concerned about this parallel and 13 interrelated bill. 14 15 So I'm sorry, I will have to urge my colleagues again, vote no on this 16 legislation. 17 18 Thank you. 19 ACTING PRESIDENT YOUNG: Thank 20 you, Senator Krueger. 21 Any other Senator wishing to be heard? 22 23 Senator Perkins. 24 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you, 25 Madam President.

The drivers are independent contractors, or so often viewed as; the base 14 15 station employees are regular salaried employees. 16 The Governor's office and my office 17 18 and others have been working together to try to achieve this solution. 19 20 The only problem I have with the 21 bill that I do want to get on the record is that in Section 8 of the bill there is a 22 rebuttal of presumption of all the drivers 23 having the same salaries. 24 25 This is a very transient kind of

job where some people working part-time, some people work two jobs. And I guess for the sake of putting the bill together to get passage today, we achieved this sort of inartistic solution.

But as was said earlier, the perfect shouldn't be the enemy of the good. I think that on the whole this will help the industry -- the drivers, the owners, and the base station employees.

So I'll be voting aye.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 LaValle. 8 SENATOR LaVALLE: On the bill. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 10 LaValle, on the bill. SENATOR LaVALLE: 11 Mr. President, 12 this legislation Senator Golden has introduced -- and I'll talk about the purpose 13 for this bill -- as everyone can see is a C 14 15 version. And he has more than bent backwards to get my input, input from some of the 16 committee members. 17 18 This bill was not a bill that appeared on a Higher Education Committee 19 20 agenda. And had it, I think we would have had a longer dialogue and probably would have 21 gotten the bill correct. 22 The deans of the dental schools in 23 New York State have had an ongoing dialogue 24 25 that because dental practices have been or are

so lucrative, their contention is that they are having a difficult time attracting faculty.

And we could make an argument that maybe that is not the case and that they need to do some things to beef up their recruitment, offer the kinds of incentives that we need to have top-quality faculty teaching in our dental schools. And I know Senator Golden has made an effort to try and assure that that is the case.

We are at the end of the session, and language has been added to try and ensure -- and I can't honestly say to this body that we have achieved academic equivalency for an individual who is or has been licensed in a foreign jurisdiction and whether they are and have met that equivalency. We have made an attempt to do so, but I cannot say with absolute certainty that that is the case.

What is very upsetting -- and I think if we had time, we probably could have worked through an amendment to strengthen pieces of this bill. Because the most

important thing to all of us is that a student in our state is receiving the best possible education. And there's language on page 2 of this bill that I don't think goes far enough in achieving that goal.

It says "within the last five years, have two years of satisfactory practice as a dentist or have satisfactorily completed an advanced education program in general dentistry or a dental specialty, provided such program is accredited by an organization accepted by the department as a reliable authority for the purposes of accrediting such programs."

Have two years, have two years of experience. I'll tell you, unless I'm misreading this or -- I'm a little tired, it's the end of session and I'm grouchy or whatever, but I think two years has really reduced the bar.

There's another provision here that Senator Golden put in which I think is great, and I mean that. No current faculty member shall be displaced by the holder of a restricted dental faculty license. And I

think that's something in discussions that we had.

After looking at the whole issue of people who are double dipping, getting a waiver, a 211 waiver for those administrative positions in education, you know, we found that the commissioner was granting 211 waivers like you give out jelly beans.

So the question is, what kind of due diligence does a dean of a school of dental medicine have to go through to say, you know, I've looked high and wide to get someone to teach orthodonture medicine, dental medicine. Can't find one, but I have someone who we would like to recruit. And they come from a foreign jurisdiction, but we believe they're just terrific.

So it's like we've gone halfway and not the whole way. Could we do better in providing greater protections for the students of this state? Yes. Is this detrimental to them? No, not necessarily. It depends that our committee has always sought the highest standards, the highest protections for the education programs that are being delivered,

whether it be independent colleges, State 1 2 University, City University or our 3 professional schools. I thank Senator Golden for his 4 5 diligence in making amendments, making changes to bring this bill before us for 6 7 consideration, for a vote. And I don't know, 8 quite honestly, how I'm going to vote when the roll is called. But I felt I wanted, as 9 10 chairman -- because we didn't have an 11 opportunity as a committee to fully discuss this bill. 12 We unfortunately did not hold a 13 14 hearing, nor do we hold hearings on every 15 single bill. I know I hear the Minority all the time: Ah, we didn't hold a hearing. 16 Well, we don't hold hearings. But certainly 17 18 in some bills the hearing process or an open process does make the product, in the end, you 19 20 know, a better piece of legislation. 21 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 22 Senator 23 Stachowski. SENATOR STACHOWSKI: 24 Yes, 25 Mr. President. I find it troubling that the

chairman of the Higher Ed Committee gets up and, though this bill is on the calendar, says that their committee didn't take it up, they had no hearings.

We're now going to have people that practiced dentistry possibly for two years teaching future dentists.

I just had a tour of the University of Buffalo Dental School, and their only complaint is it's not about faculty members, it's about facilities. And they're trying to fix them up so that they can continue to be one of the better dental schools, and with a very experienced faculty and proud of it.

And I can't imagine them trying to reach out for people that have practiced dentistry for two years to make their dental school advance in academic achievement.

You know, years ago when

Georgetown, one of the top dental schools in

the country, didn't think they were getting

candidates that were strong enough, they

closed their dental school. They weren't

concerned about the fact that they had a great

faculty and a great program, they were

concerned that the quality of their applicants had been deteriorating, for whatever reason, so they closed their dental school rather than let it go down in any way.

So for us to be moving a bill that's going to just stick people in to fill faculty positions without much experience to teach people that -- I don't know, I consider dentistry and all the specialties that are combined with it to be very important. I would hate to think that we're going to be putting people out based on the teaching of maybe somebody that isn't very experienced themselves, so how do they competently teach students that are just entering that profession?

I am kind of baffled by this whole thing. I probably wouldn't have taken such notice had not Senator LaValle got up and pointed out all the things he pointed out.

I think it should be a warning shot to all of us that something of this importance, anytime it's got something to do with your medical health -- and as you know, maybe dentistry isn't life-threatening, but it

is very important and can lead to a lot of other problems if it's not done correctly.

I don't know why we're doing this bill. I think that we should take the warning that Senator LaValle gave us that maybe we should have hearings on this and go through this thoroughly before we change the way we're hiring dental faculty to the detriment, possibly, of all our students that are paying top dollar even in public schools, the public universities, to be educated, and they don't know that they have somebody that maybe practiced dentistry for two years.

I really, really have a problem with this bill, and I'm glad that Senator LaValle brought all these things up to our attention. And I would suggest that everybody takes a real hard look at this bill. And I don't know if that's the way we want to go with any dental schools that would have to hire their faculty based on this limited license.

My suggestion is that we don't vote this bill and we either take it off the floor or vote it down.

Thank you, Mr. President. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 3 Golden. 4 SENATOR GOLDEN: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. I rise to answer some of the 6 7 questions on the bill. Specifically to the 8 University of Buffalo, they have requested 9 that this be done. 10 New York's academic dental centers 11 are at a competitive disadvantage with other dental schools across the country which 12 currently are able to attract dentists with 13 outstanding credentials because other states 14 15 allow them to practice clinically while serving as faculty. New York State is driving 16 away the best and the most qualified. 17 18 We are only two of 48 states that do not do this. There are 32 positions that 19 20 have been unable to be filled here in the 21 State of New York for the past three years. 22 All of the dental hospitals have come together and have asked for this to happen. 23

Senator Golden has been very helpful. But I can't understand why 16 the last day of session this bill is suddenly 17 18 emerging. It's like a toothache that just sort of erupted. Perhaps that's a bad 19 20 example. 21 I am concerned that we may not be 22 attracting the best and the brightest through 23 this method with the two-year requirement that Senator LaValle spoke about. I find that 24

troubling.

1	And my instinct is to vote no on
2	this bill or to listen to what my colleagues
3	have to say. But I understand that the
4	dentists are going to be serving as full-time
5	faculty of one of the five academic
6	institutions, and they're going to have to
7	devote four days a week to teaching, to caring
8	for the patients, et cetera.

SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. 16 Mr. President, on the bill. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 18 Senator Krueger on the bill. 19 20 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Му colleague Senator Stavisky just pointed out 21 22 we're getting this at 4 o'clock on the last And that certainly ought to be a red 23 flag for us for any bills. 24 25 But more importantly I think was

listening to Senator LaValle, who's been such an activist chair of the Higher Ed Committee, and I serve on that committee. And he has been, as he said himself, very proud of making sure that here in New York State we hold ourselves to our highest standards for our licensed professions, including our healthcare professionals.

And really, when we're talking about healthcare and dentistry as a subuniverse of healthcare, we'd better hold ourselves to the highest standards, as we know.

So I have to say if it was just that they would be teaching in some kind of classroom setting, even though they only had two years of dental experience themselves, I might have been a little more comfortable supporting the bill, because I do believe that people can be great teachers even if they aren't expert clinicians.

On the other hand, when I hear that they will be actually providing dental care to the people who come to the dental clinics at our dental schools -- and I know for a fact,

as I think we all do, that it's the poorest

New Yorkers who are more likely not to have

private dentists and more likely to show up at

the dental clinics at the dental schools -- it

troubles me quite a bit that we seem to be

willing to set up a double standard: You

don't have to be qualified to be a real

dentist in New York State to treat people in

these clinics.

The last thing on earth I want to do is move legislation that creates a two-tier system of who provides healthcare in New York based on your income, and if you are low-income then you can get the people to serve you or to provide care for you that other New Yorkers wouldn't go to or even technically be allowed to go to under the dental licensing.

So while I am empathetic to a shortage of clinicians at our dental schools, there's got to be another model for solving that other than allowing people who we wouldn't give a regular dental license to to treat us to be the ones who are treating the people who have no choice but to go to

clinics. And so I'll be voting no. 1 2 Thank you, Mr. President. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Sabini. 4 5 SENATOR SABINI: Mr. President, on the bill. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 8 Sabini, on the bill. 9 Well, this bill, SENATOR SABINI: 10 as Senator LaValle points out, has at least one good aspect to it, which is that it allows 11 us to tap into the talent of those who are 12 licensed in other countries who have practiced 13 their craft and gone to university elsewhere 14 15 to practice here, as long as they meet all the requirements that licensure in New York would 16 17 require. 18 Senator Morahan and I and Senator Schneiderman have been working on an issue 19 20 that would tap into our immigrant community in an even bigger way. Our state has thousands 21 22 of people who are professionals who have come to our shores, and yet we can't tap into their 23 talents or, frankly, tax their higher income 24 25 because they're restricted from getting the

licenses to practice their craft.

The bill that Senator Morahan and I and Senator Schneiderman have crafted includes obstetrics, court stenographers -- why you have to be a citizen to be a court stenographer I'll never know -- engineers, pharmacists, veterinarians, midwives, anesthesiologists.

We're in need of professionals. We want people to have good incomes. This has been a number-one priority of the New York
Immigration Coalition this year. And yet we have failed to pass that bill. So that aspect of this bill is good.

But I am troubled by many of the questions that Chairman LaValle has raised and Senator Stavisky, our ranker, has raised about this two-year line. To me, it raises some issues as to whether or not we would want those people training people who we would then certify to be dentists in the future.

So that I think there's good and bad here. I think that the idea that we would tap into our new immigrants, who have the bona fides to be a dentist, I think that's great

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and we should be doing more of it.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 1 Senator 2 Johnson, on the bill. 3 SENATOR CRAIG JOHNSON: Thank 4 you, Mr. President. 5 Thank you, Senator Golden. I have to admit -- and I first want 6 7 to thank Senator LaValle for raising a number 8 of issues. 9 And this has been a very 10 informative debate, one, for a bill that I think deserves more debate and questions to be 11 12 answered. I think the last set of questions raises more questions. Because the bill talks 13 14 about dentistry, and what we understand going 15 to the dentist is -- you know, maybe a teeth cleaning, maybe checking for cavities. 16 17 But now, when it comes to surgery 18 and periodontal work, which requires putting a patient possibly under and having them go to 19 20 sleep under anesthesia, all of a sudden I wonder whether or not this bill covers that or 21 22 not. I appreciate the answers from Senator Golden; I'm just unclear from the bill itself 23 whether or not this is covered. 24 25 So I'm going to see if we have any

more debate on this issue, maybe some other 1 information, before I can consider my vote. 2 But I thank you, Senator Golden, 3 4 for your answers. 5 Thank you very much, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Ts 7 there any other Senator wishing to be heard? 8 Senator Diaz. SENATOR DIAZ: 9 Thank you, 10 Mr. President. 11 I just rise to thank Senator 12 Golden. I heard him saying something when he was asked if these restricted dental faculty 13 14 licenses will be issued to people from other 15 countries, and he responded that, as long as they're qualified, from any part of the world. 16 We all know, Mr. President, that 17 18 universities, the universities go all over the country, all over the world to find faculty. 19 20 And they are very -- there are professional, very qualified people -- from China, from 21 22 India, from Hispanic countries, Spain, Puerto Rico, Santo Domingo, Europe -- people 23 that they have hired to come to the state to 24 25 teach.

What Senator Golden in this bill is asking for is those people that are qualified to be issued a restricted dental faculty license. The department might issue a restricted dental faculty license to a full-time faculty member employed at an approved New York State school of dentistry.

I think that this is a wonderful bill. It goes along with what this state and this nation is all about: Open doors, help other people. And I ask my colleagues -- I congratulate Senator Golden for this bill.

And it is nothing new.

Universities again, I'm going to say, universities and schools, the Department of Education of the State of New York, they go out of the country to hire some people sometimes. So they are qualified immigrants, qualified people that come, that are invited from different institutions to come to the state, to the nation to teach.

And this bill not only covers the people, the American citizens, it also covers people that are invited from other universities to come and teach and be a part

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of the faculty of that university.

dire impacts on both the clinical capacity and

"New York Academic Dental Centers are at a competitive disadvantage with other dental schools across the country because we are unable to attract dentists with outstanding credentials because other states allow them to practice clinically while serving as faculty. New York State is driving away the best, most-qualified candidates."

This bill will rectify that. 1 2 very much needed. I'm happy to cast my vote in the affirmative, Mr. President. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 5 Robach to be recorded in the affirmative. Senator LaValle, to explain his 6 7 vote. 8 SENATOR LaVALLE: Thank you, Mr. President. 9 10 I certainly appreciate the discussion that we have had here on the floor. 11 12 One of the things that I think our committee has prided itself on is that when we 13 14 hear, I think on a daily basis here, you know, 15 New York is only one of three states or four states or the only state that hasn't adopted 16 this legislation, the committee once again 17 18 says, That's why we're the Empire State. act to amend the Insurance Law.
SENATOR KLEIN: Explanation.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 1 Senator 2 Klein requests an explanation, Senator Seward. SENATOR SEWARD: 3 Certainly, Mr. President. 4 Senate Bill 8624 extends or makes 5 6 permanent a number of important property and 7 casualty provisions which are currently due to 8 expire on June 30th of this year. 9 includes the New York Property Insurance 10 Underwriting Association, so-called NYPIUA. 11 This legislation would make NYPIUA permanent. The bill would also extend for 12 13 three years certain other property and 14 casualty provisions which have proven to be 15 important to insuring a very stable property and casualty market. 16 This bill also includes provisions 17 18 to authorize auto insurers to increase or decrease their private passenger auto 19 20 insurance premiums within a band of 5 percent up or down. 21 The bill, in addition, would make 22 23 some other changes to NYPIUA. It would direct NYPIUA to develop a program to provide 24 25 incentives for private-market insurers to

write homeowner's insurance in our coastal areas. And the bill would also authorize NYPIUA to write broader coverage in our coastal areas and other areas in the state and provide broader coverage when written in conjunction with a wraparound policy provided by a private carrier.

The legislation would also include a coastal market assistance program, the CMAP program, put that in statute. It would re-up the special advisory panel to look at problem areas of our state in terms of the availability and affordability of homeowner's insurance.

And finally, the legislation would require the superintendent of insurance to implement a program to attract more competitors to the state's homeowner's insurance market.

So this bill is a comprehensive bill which I believe will make a positive contribution to making property and casualty insurance available to more New Yorkers at an affordable rate.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 6 Senator 7 Breslin. 8 SENATOR BRESLIN: Senator Seward, 9 do you know of any studies other than the NAIC 10 report, any other studies that have been done on the allowance of increase in rates without 11 12 some sort of analysis? SENATOR SEWARD: 13 Well, 14 Mr. President, I think we can just look to our 15 own experience right here in New York State. Up until the year 2001, for many years we had 16 flex rating in New York State. In fact, it 17 18 was at a 7 percent band at that time, so it was actually a larger band. And we did see 19 20 premiums fall at that time. So I think our own experience here 21 22 in New York indicates that this is a positive policy. That law expired in 2001 and has not 23 been re-upped. That's what we intend to do in 24 25 this legislation, in conjunction with a whole

host of other changes that I have outlined. 1 2 SENATOR BRESLIN: And again 3 through you, Mr. President, if the sponsor 4 would continue to yield. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 6 Seward yields. 7 SENATOR SEWARD: Yes. 8 SENATOR BRESLIN: Through you, Mr. President, since 2001, can you tell us the 9 10 increase or decrease in automobile premiums in the State of New York? 11 12 SENATOR SEWARD: Well, Mr. President, after the flex rating that we 13 14 previously had in law expired, the two years 15 following that we saw auto insurance rise for the two-year period just over 13 percent. 16 Now, in more recent years we have 17 18 seen a increase in auto insurance in New York State, I think for a number of factors, one of 19 20 which is the department, administratively, is being much more aggressive in terms of 21 fighting fraud. 22 23 And one of the problems that we're 24 hoping to correct in this legislation, 25 Mr. President, is the fact that when an

insurance company -- in these times when we 1 2 have seen decreasing auto insurance rates, 3 we've had companies in this state that have 4 had pending applications for decrease of their 5 rates pending at the Insurance Department for months on end. And the consumers of our state 6 7 have been paying more than they should have 8 during those months. 9 So this is what we're attempting to 10 correct under this legislation. 11 SENATOR BRESLIN: Again through 12 you, Mr. President, if the sponsor would continue to yield. 13 14 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 15 Seward, do you yield? SENATOR SEWARD: Certainly. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 17 Senator 18 Breslin. 19 SENATOR BRESLIN: Can you tell 20 us, if you know, of the companies in New York State that are licensed to do business in the 21 automobile insurance, how many of them have 22 applied for a decrease in their rates during 23 24 the past year? 25 SENATOR SEWARD: I must say, I

don't have that information readily available 1 2 to me. 3 SENATOR BRESLIN: And again 4 through you, Mr. President, if the sponsor 5 would continue to yield. competitive disadvantage and they would lose 1 2 market share considerably because there are so 3 many other players that would be offering a 4 lower rate and that they would pick up that 5 market share. So I do not have the fears that you 6 7 have outlined because of the competitive 8 nature of our market. What does prior approval do? It scares the insurance company into doing their homework, and it allows them to come before the Insurance Department provide their analysis, and have professionals weigh in on that analysis.

However, in other states -Illinois is being one good example -- when
they have deregulated and left it to market
conditions, those market conditions have
worked extraordinarily well.

So I will, on this bill, vote overwhelmingly for the NYPIUA portion and somewhat grudgingly on the automobile portion. But in all, I will vote age on this legislation.

SENATOR KLEIN: 6 Again, I know 7 making this group permanent tends to be, I 8 gues, a benefit for people who have homeowner 9 insurance. 10 Can you just elaborate on how this would make it more effective for the homeowner 11 in being able to obtain reasonable homeowner 12 insurance if they live in a community that 13 14 happens to be a coastal community? 15 SENATOR SEWARD: Well, Mr. President, I'm a great believer in a 16 17 healthy insurance market. In other words, if 18 more carriers are willing to write in a region -- and we've seen some withdrawal in 19 20 the coastal areas. And if we provide for a more vibrant market in those regions, that --21 22 if you believe in market conditions affecting 23 the price, then that should impact, in a very positive way, these homeowners. 24 25 And that's why we, as I've said

before, direct NYPIUA to help provide 1 2 incentives to the private-market insurers to write more homeowner's insurance in these 3 4 regions and, once again, the superintendent to 5 do the same. So I cannot cite the specifics, but 6 7 we are doing -- what we are doing under this 8 legislation is we're setting the foundation and framework for going forward in a positive 9 10 way for those homeowners. 11 SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you, Senator Seward. 12 Mr. President, on the bill. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 14 Senator 15 Klein, on the bill. SENATOR KLEIN: I know Senator 16 Seward has the best intentions in making sure 17 18 that individuals both have reasonable car insurance and coastal insurance policies if 19 20 their homes happen to be near the water. The first half of the legislation I 21 22 think is only going to increase our car 23 insurance by actually bringing the flexible 24 rating system to New York on a permanent 25 basis.

According to a memo that was jointly prepared by NYPIRG, CFA, and Consumers Union, it found that -- Consumer Federation of America found that rates rose significantly more slowly over the last 20 years in states that require prior approval than in states with weaker regulatory systems.

So in other words, we're moving away from the prior approval system to the flexible rate. And I'm just concerned that it's going to cause our automobile policies to go up even further than they are. New York State presently has the dubious distinction of having the second-highest automobile insurance premiums in the country, and I'm afraid we may reach that number-one mark under this system.

The second area, dealing with the property casualty insurance, I think is missing a lot of very important components.

One of the things that I found last year and continues this year, in the areas that I represent -- and I also hear stories about it happening out on Long Island as well -- is that certain insurers were just arbitrarily not renewing policies to

homeowners in certain areas. What we did find out is if they had their automobile policy with the insurer as well their homeowner policy, they were left alone.

The Superintendent of Insurance,
Eric Dinallo, investigated that, and it
stopped happening. The problem is those
people who were canceled, those people who
weren't renewed, were forced to pay anywhere
from \$500 to \$1,000 more every year for their
homeowner policy.

So we're still in a situation now where some insurance companies are actually cherry-picking. They're going into communities that happen to be near the water and claiming that they're in a hurricane zone, without any real concrete scientific evidence to back that up, and not renewing policies.

So I think what we need to address in this legislative session -- and of course we're not going to be able to do it now, but hopefully over the summer -- is truly address the problem of people who are having their policies -- receiving nonrenewal notices from their insurance companies and if they choose

to go to another insurance company, they're paying hundreds and even thousands of dollars more for their homeowner policy.

matter of fact last year, which I think will deal with the problem. First, presently under New York State law any insurance company can only cancel up to 4 percent of their policies in New York State. I want to lower that number to 2 percent. Because clearly what Allstate and a lot of the other insurance companies are doing, time and time again, is they're getting very, very close to that 4 percent mark -- again, by cherry-picking the policies they don't want -- and people are losing their insurance, people who had their insurance for 25 or 30 years.

The next part of the legislation,
which I think is also just as important, I
think we need to force the insurance industry,
before they cancel or fail to renew a
homeowner's policy, to give a reason. They
have to give a cost-benefit analysis
explaining exactly why they're not renewing a
policy that never made a claim in 25 or

1 30 years.

And then finally, and this is the question I asked of Senator Seward, I think the Insurance Superintendent of the Department of Insurance in New York State should once and for all do an independent study to find out in coastal regions within the State of New York, if certain communities that I represent, and many of my colleagues, are truly in a hurricane zone.

I think what's happening here is the insurance industry is hoping that we can create sort of national panic, have a catastrophic damage fund where taxpayer dollars are paying for loss mitigation which you're paying for as part of your homeowner insurance.

So I think we need to do a lot more than we're doing in this legislation.

However, I think that in this piece the homeowner piece does make some improvements.

I vote no because I think the part which deals with automobile insurance will only raise our rates further than they are now.

1 number of ways.

The bill increases the medical minimum loss ratio from 75 to 80 percent for the small group market. This means that at least 80 cents of every premium dollar must go to pay health care claims for services.

The bill also establishes clear definitions and standards for calculating the medical loss ratios. It provides a specific method for calculating direct claims incurred. This is designed to eliminate the gaming that's used by certain health plans whereby they deliberately miscalculate their minimum loss ratios.

The current test for meeting the minimum loss ratios is ambiguous and subject to manipulation. This bill will assist the Insurance Department in better monitoring these plans.

The bill further strengthens certification requirements by requiring that the insurers affirm, under penalty of perjury, that their rate filing was prepared in accordance with generally accepted actuarial principles.

The legislation would reinstate prior approval for insurers who materially misrepresent their medical loss ratios in two consecutive years.

And finally -- two more points,

Mr. President -- the bill clarifies the
in-network, out-of-network charges by
prohibiting health insurers from charging a
patient out-of-network, more expensive rates
for hospital services in an in-network
hospital, even when the physician performing
the services may be out of network, and vice
versa, when the patient cannot be charged
under this bill out-of-network rates for
services performed by an in-network physician
even when it maybe be performed in an
out-of-network hospital.

And finally, Mr. President, the legislation reduces the required time for an insurer to pay claims for healthcare providers when the claim is submitted electronically. It goes from 45 days to 21 days. And that will not only encourage more claims to be submitted electronically but gets the money in the pocket of our local hospitals and

SENATOR BRESLIN: Again through 1 2 you, Mr. President, does this bill, other than 3 for the penalty for a carrier, allow anything 4 other than prior -- excuse me, prior approval? 5 SENATOR SEWARD: Mr. President, this bill maintains all of the current 6 7 sanctions that the department can impose. 8 it imposes the prior approval on, shall we say, the bad actors, to ensure -- what we're 9 10 attempting to do here is ensure that premium 11 payers in New York State do not pay one nickel 12 more than they should for their health insurance. 13 14 SENATOR BRESLIN: And again 15 through you, Mr. President, could you explain to us what the alternative to prior approval, 16 file and use, which has been going on for some 17 18 eight to 10 years, what that is? SENATOR SEWARD: Well, 19 20 Mr. President, each year the health plans file information, a whole set of data with the 21 22 Insurance Department, and also indicate the rates that they are going to charge for the 23 24 ensuing year. And under file and use, which is in 25

place currently, the department has an 1 2 opportunity, as the year goes by, to monitor 3 very closely the health plans to make sure 4 that they are meeting their medical loss 5 ratios. And then, in the event that they do not meet those loss ratios, under current law, 6 7 the plans are required to issue a refund. 8 And in fact, just recently there 9 was a \$50 million refund required to be paid 10 by one of the plans. And this legislation, in addition 11 12 to those types of sanctions it would impose, if this happens twice, then they've got to be 13 14 to go into the prior approval for three years. 15 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you, Senator Seward. On the bill. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator 17 18 Breslin, on the bill. SENATOR BRESLIN: 19 Thank you, 20 Mr. President. This bill cleans up the medical 21 loss ratio --22 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 23 Senator Breslin, excuse me. 24 25 Can we have some order, please.

1 Senator Breslin, on the bill.

SENATOR BRESLIN: It cleans up the medical loss ratio and makes it more consistent and directs that HMOs spend a certain amount of money for the medical services.

However, it continues a file and use policy. And HMOs, over the last number of years, have used this file and use policy.

Some people call it file and abuse.

And what does file and use allow a company to do? It really allows them to file a rate and then use it. And there isn't that strong check and balance where an HMO would say: Gee whiz, I've got to have this approved, and I've got to have this analyzed. So they tend, as most of us would, to file a higher rate than possibly is necessary.

And there was a study done which analyzed HMOs in New York State from 2001 to 2005 which showed that their profits increased just under 100 percent while, at the same time, the number of people they were serving decreased, the amounts of money they gave to providers, hospitals and doctors also

decreased, and at the same time, their 1 2 expenses went up. 3 File and use is abused. The proper 4 way to -- particularly when people are 5 spending tremendous sums of money for their health policies, where bargaining units for 6 7 unions, the most important thing is to keep 8 that health component. And if we know that 9 HMOs, as part of that component, are making 10 extraordinary amounts of money, it's unfair. The way to change that is to make 11 12 sure that there is prior approval. And accordingly, because of the lack of a prior 13 14 approval in this legislation and the 15 continuation of file and use, I will be voting in the negative. 16 Thank you, Mr. President. 17 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 18 Any other Senator wishing to be heard? 19 Debate is closed. ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 1 Oh, 2 Senator Schneiderman has asked for an 3 explanation. On the last day of session, an 4 explanation, Senator Nozzolio. Requested by 5 Senator Schneiderman on the last day of session. 6 7 (Laughter.) 8 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Thank you, 9 Mr. President. 10 I wish to thank Senator 11 Schneiderman for the tremendous opportunity to 12 inform my colleagues about this wonderful measure that is now before us for 13 consideration. 14 Unfortunately, it's before us for 15 consideration because of a loophole that 16 judges of this state exhibited that would have 17 18 resulted in freeing over 500 inmates onto the streets, many of whom are violent inmates, 19 20 without any parole supervision. This measure requires those courts, 21 22 which failed to properly impose sentences as 23 we have required by the states we have enacted, to immediately resentence those 24 25 inmates affected by those judicial errors;

establishes a procedure so that the Department of Correctional Services as well as the New York State Department of Parole can identify these cases that caused the courts to initiate resentences; puts a very specific time frame of which these must be acted upon; and also provides opportunities for the district attorneys to cure whether procedurally that's likely and possible to do.

That this measure highlights also, in our criminal justice system, the important role of parole supervision. Violent felons do their time, but it's very important once they are released -- and let me parenthetically state, we have aggressively established a zero tolerance for violence in this state.

Mr. President, this measure is one that's necessary, and that the parole officers who can ensure that appropriate supervision is placed upon those inmates who are let out of jail upon the conclusion of their sentence play a very, very important role in our entire criminal justice system.

Thank you, Mr. President.

18	This is actually a success story,
19	because the need for this legislation was
20	created by a Court of Appeals decision in a
21	called People v. Sparber.
22	Unfortunately, even though by
23	statute we require courts to impose sentences
24	if they are to include post-release
25	supervision that state at the time of

sentencing that they're including post-release supervision, some judges have gotten sloppy and would only write down on the commitment sheet that there was post-release supervision required.

The Court of Appeals ordered on April 29th that they were going to have to release a number of prisoners if we didn't correct these illegal sentences. There's strong public policy in New York State that you have to undo an illegal sentence.

So I want to compliment the sponsor and the staff and the Assembly staff who got together and in very, very quick order worked out a compromise bill that does provide an alternative sentence, does provide for a resentencing hearing where it is necessary.

And, you know, for whoever was doing this, Senator Nozzolio or the staff or the Codes Committee staff, you somehow got the Assembly Codes Committee to actually agree on, draft and pass a bill that is going to increase certain people's sentences. I have been here nine years. I don't think I've ever seen that, ladies and gentlemen.

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So it's fine that we were able --

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 3 4 Senator Thompson, to explain his vote. 5 SENATOR THOMPSON: Yes, to 6 explain my vote. 7 First, I do support the bill. 8 want to first congratulate my colleague --9 Senator Marcellino has worked on this for a 10 long time -- in addition to Governor Paterson and Judith Enck and Commissioner Pete Grannis, 11 and all the business and environmental 12 advocates, for coming together and moving this 13 legislation forward. 14 15 I do believe that there are a lot of good things in this bill. Not everyone is 16 totally happy, but I think we've accomplished 17 18 a number of positive things in this bill. 19 The first, I think, very important 20 reform measure is that this bill will create 21 an advisory board to deal with brownfields The other thing is I know that this 22 issues. 23 is a very difficult issue for a number of people. But politics is often the art of 24

compromise. And that one of the important

compromises here provides some type of cap on some of the businesses and projects coming into this program.

I also believe that there are some other things that we can be proud of as well. While we did not reach the 10 percent additional credit for being in a BOA, or a Brownfield Opportunity Area, we do provide 2 percent. And I do think that's a start. Rome wasn't built in a day. But I think it moves us forward.

number of groups that did support this bill.

I also believe that in moving forward there are some things that I believe will be helpful for business. And hopefully by the time they move to the regulation process of this bill, that issues like -- not only because it's gone to the Department of State for the BOA program, but I think we need to have better timelines. When businesspeople and residents and stakeholders put in an application, they want to know what the time frame is.

And that's something I think that I'd like to work with my colleagues on both

sides of the aisle, is making sure that when 1 2 they put that application in, that whether 3 it's through the BOA program or it's through a 4 Brownfield Cleanup Program, that we have a 5 clear, clean and defined time frame. Because sometimes it's very frustrating dealing with 6 7 government. 8 So without further ado, I support 9 this bill. I think it's a bold step forward. 10 Many reforms were addressed. And we still have some work to do. 11 12 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 13 14 Senator Thompson will be recorded in the 15 affirmative. Senator Stachowski. 16 SENATOR STACHOWSKI: 17 Yes, 18 Mr. President. I too would like to explain my 19 vote. 20 I think it's a great compromise. There was some fear that this bill wouldn't be 21 22 done. 23 Obviously in Western New York, as 24 you very well know, there's a lot of 25 brownfields that are open to possible

development. I know that the grandfathering 1 2 in of some in Western New York is very important to those people involved in those 3 4 projects, and that the new parameters that 5 will focus a lot more on cleanup will make the development of brownfields in Western New York 6 7 that are available to be cleaned and 8 developed, many of which are along the 9 waterfront, and it will provide a great 10 opportunity to make the waterfront in Western New York, particularly in some of my area, a 11 12 much better place. It's a very important bill. 13 14 glad we got to this compromise. I'm glad 15 we're moving forward, albeit the last day. And I'd just like to congratulate everybody 16 involved in getting this bill to the floor and 17 18 moving ahead and helping to redevelop areas that we thought would not be developed for 19 20 quite some time. 21 So I vote yes. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Senator Stachowski will be recorded in the 23

SENATOR STEWART-COUSINS: 1 Yes, 2 thank you, Mr. President. 3 I rise too to also commend Senator 4 Marcellino and the Governor and all who were 5 involved in this. This was extremely important, as both of my colleagues before me 6 7 have mentioned. 8 Those of us who have important 9 revitalization projects going on in our 10 district, those of us who have had commitments by developers based on the tax credits were 11 12 very, very concerned that suddenly the game would be changed midstream. 13 This allows for certainly many of 14 15 the projects in Yonkers and Tarrytown and throughout the state that had already been in 16 process to continue in that process, and also 17 18 gives the added impetus so that we will continue to reclaim those brownfields that 19 20 could indeed be revitalized so that we can use them so the economic prosperity continues. 21 22 So I certainly vote in the 23 affirmative, and I'm very happy for the compromise. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Stewart-Cousins will be recorded in 1 2 the affirmative. 3 Senator Robach. 4 SENATOR ROBACH: Yes, 5 Mr. President, to explain my vote. I am going to support this bill. 6 7 And certainly this is a very, very important 8 issue. 9 And we all know, those of us from 10 upstate New York, that the current brownfields 11 bill, while it was very good for cleaning up 12 very, very expensive properties in New York 13 City, was not meeting the mark in upstate urban areas, which also have a tremendous 14 15 amount of brownfield areas, things that could be redeveloped for economic development as 16 well as cleaned up. 17 18 So this bill does go with the new parameters to some degree to at least make 19 20 upstate cities like Rochester, Buffalo, Syracuse a little bit more competitive. 21 This 22 is a step in the right direction. 23 And for that reason, I will support the bill, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Robach will be recorded in the affirmative.

Senator Oppenheimer.

SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Thank you,

Mr. President. On the bill.

I'll be supporting this bill. And I'm very pleased to see that something that had me very distressed previously on the brownfield law has been corrected -- not as much as I would have liked, but it's been corrected quite a bit -- and that is that we had seen misuse of these funds.

I am thinking of one particular developer who remediated a tiny portion of the property and received funds for that and then had same amount percentage given to him for the redevelopment of what turned into a very magnificent structure, very high income, on which he would have made, with or without these credits, multiples of millions. And that was just so fraudulent, and yet it was within our law.

But now we have separated out the costs going -- the repayment going to brownfields and the amount of money that will

be going to development. And I think that is a move in the right direction.

And I see a project on the list that is in my Senate district in a place that is so intensely polluted that, without this kind of assistance, it would never, never be remediated.

So I'm very pleased to be supporting this bill.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Oppenheimer will be recorded in the affirmative.

Senator Maltese, to explain his vote.

SENATOR MALTESE: Mr. President,

I must admit I had serious doubts about the

bill. And in reading the entire bill, I

commend, of course, Senator Marcellino for all

his work and working with the Governor and

working with the Speaker of the Assembly.

I realize that the Governor and all parties had to deal with severe fiscal constraints. Quite frankly, listening to my good colleague Senator Thompson, and realizing his position, and with some doubts in

realizing how much more needs to be done, I am 1 2 disappointed, I admit. 3 Usually brownfields are not 4 connected, perhaps, with Queens County, but 5 the fact is that we have many areas that must 6 be cleaned up, many areas that need, severely 7 need economic development. To name just 8 three, we have Gotham Center, the Atlas Park, 9 and the Silvercup Studios. 10 I was disappointed that these were not included, specifically, in those areas 11 that would receive the most assistance. I am 12 hopeful that in the future something can be 13 14 done to remedy that. 15 And therefore, Mr. President, I 16 vote aye. ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 17 18 Senator Maltese will be recorded in the affirmative. 19 20 Senator Marcellino, to explain his 21 vote. 22 SENATOR MARCELLINO: Thank you, 23 Mr. President. 24 I do appreciate the comments of my 25 colleagues. I do appreciate the input that I

received in the negotiations with this bill.

Senator Thompson was cordial and pleasant
enough to sit down with my staff and his staff
and to discuss some issues relative to this
legislation. Commissioner Grannis was very
helpful, and his staff. The Governor's staff
has been very helpful. Assembly staff has
been very helpful.

Our Senate staff has been working day and night, day and night on this piece of legislation for a long, long time.

It has been a labor of hard work, but frankly a labor of love. Because those of us who have been involved with this brownfields program since 2003 wish it to go and continue on.

This program is a two-way street.

Not only do we clean up sites that are insulting our communities with their pollution and sickening our people, but they create jobs, they create a future, they open up inner cities. The potential is phenomenal. I've said this all along with the first bill, and I'll say it again: This bill has the potential to be the greatest

environmental-cleanup bill in the history of this state as well as the greatest economic development bill in this state's history.

This is a good bill. Is it perfect? No. No. Does it go as far as I would like it to go? No. We'd like more. But it's a good first step, and we'll continue the process. With the brownfields board created in this bill, we have a mechanism to monitor the progress and to monitor the procedures and to recommend changes to the departments.

Moving the BOA program to the

Department of State is a great move. That

department is better suited for that kind of a

program than DEC. And this was done

voluntarily. DEC gave it up and the state

accepted it. Nobody had to have their arms

twisted; it was a voluntary move.

This is a good thing. Brings the communities into the program. Brings public input into the program. Accountability and transparency, this is what it's all about.

So again, I thank everybody that was involved. Work was hard, but I think the

result is a good one. 1 2 Mr. President, I proudly vote aye. ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 3 Senator Marcellino will be recorded in the 4 5 affirmative. 6 Senator Stavisky. 7 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. 9 I have a parcel in my Senate 10 district that has been grandfathered in under 11 the provisions of this legislation. It's just to the east of Shea Stadium, along Roosevelt 12 Avenue. It's the old Con Ed site, and it's 13 14 being developed by Muss Development. 15 It's going to provide jobs, it's going to provide 800,000 square feet of retail 16 space, a thousand housing units, and it's 17 18 going to generate more than \$20 million in tax revenue during the construction phase alone. 19 20 So this legislation will obviously benefit 21 this property. I have another brownfields -- this 22 was a brownfield site. I have another 23 brownfields site, a 60-acre parcel in the same 24 25 general area known as Willets Point. And I

hope that we can use some of the brownfields 1 2 credits to help alleviate the brownfields in 3 the Willets Point section of Queens. I thank Senator Marcellino for his 4 5 work on this issue. It is appreciated by everybody. Sometimes I think you spend long 6 7 hours and figure nobody really appreciates it. 8 People do. And the real people who are thanking you are the people who are going to 9 10 benefit from the entire scope of this legislation. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Senator Stavisky will be recorded in the 13 affirmative. 14 15 Senator Krueger. SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you, 16 Mr. President. 17 18 I also rise to say --ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 19 20 Senator Krueger, to explain her vote. 21 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. To explain my vote. Thank you, Mr. President. 22 So a few weeks ago a number of us 23 had a press conference saying if we didn't get 24 25 this done before we went home, shame on us.

So we waited till the last few minutes of the last day, but we're getting something done. And that is a good thing.

And many of my colleagues have already spoken about how important these changes are.

When we passed the first brownfields bill when I was first in the Senate, a number of us thought, Hmm, this isn't going to work, we're going to have to fix it. And it didn't take very long to realize that was right.

It did take a while to get to this day. It took about four years to finally get to the point where we're making some fixes and we are moving forward as we should.

So the sponsor said this is a great bill, and I hope this time we're closer to getting it right. Thank you very much, Senator Marcellino.

Senator Antoine Thompson did a yeoman's job pushing for the BOA issues and importance of recognizing that not only do we need to clean up land, but we need to maximize our ability to ensure that in poor communities and in urban centers, we have really the

ability to do brownfields and combine it with 1 2 economic activity in communities that so 3 desperately need it. 4 Particularly I want to recognize 5 DEC and Commissioner Grannis, who fought very, very hard, before he was the DEC commissioner 6 7 and since he's been there, to try to get us to 8 this point. 9 So yes, everyone's right, it's not 10 the ultimate bill. We probably will need to 11 come back and revisit pieces of it again. But 12 I am delighted that we are moving this bill this afternoon before we go home. And I think 13 14 that we all get to say, okay, this time we did 15 it right. A little late, but we did it right. I will be voting yes. Thank you. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 17 18 Senator Krueger will be recorded in the affirmative. 19 20 Announce the results. 21 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 62. Nays, 0. 22 23 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: The 24 bill is passed. 25 Senator Libous.

SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 1 2 can we now go to Calendar 2179, controversial. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: The 4 Secretary will read. 5 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 2179, by the Senate Committee on Rules, Senate 6 7 Print --8 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: 9 Explanation. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Senator Winner, an explanation has been 11 requested by Senator Krueger. 12 13 SENATOR WINNER: Thank you, Mr. President. 14 15 This legislation would allow a company that is located in Watervliet and has 16 purchased a silicone manufacturing facility to 17 18 be able to obtain the Empire Zone benefits of a significant regional project that it thought 19 20 it was eligible for, but for certain timing mistakes had acquired the facility prior to 21 its final certification by Empire State 22 23 Development Corporation. This bill as a measure has a 24 25 message of necessity. It is obviously agreed

1	upon by the Second Floor. And as such, this
2	is not any kind of an unusual hit to the
3	state's treasury, because these are benefits
4	that were intended to be provided to this
5	company. This company has met all of the
6	requirements to be eligible as a significant
7	regional regionally significant project,
8	were it not for some technical timing glitches
9	in its application.
10	ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
11	Senator Krueger.
12	SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you.
13	ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
14	Senator Winner, will you yield for a question
15	from Senator Krueger?

21	My understanding on Empire Zone
22	rules, you are creating new jobs. How many
23	new jobs will they create beyond what's

1	acquired a company that has over 750 jobs.
2	They now have 1100 jobs there.
3	And in order to be eligible as a
4	regionally significant project, they would
5	have had to acquire a facility that had
6	750 jobs. And as such, they more than
7	adequately meet the eligibility requirements
8	as a regionally significant project.
9	SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Mr.
10	President, through you, will the sponsor
11	continue to yield.
12	ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
13	Senator Winner, would you yield for a question
14	from Senator Krueger?
15	SENATOR WINNER: Yes, I do.
16	ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
17	Senator Krueger.
18	SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you.
19	Well, as you just explained, in
20	order to qualify as regionally significant in
21	this bill, they would have 750 jobs or more.
22	How many new jobs are they committed to
23	creating at this site if they are to get the
24	Empire Zone advantages?
25	SENATOR WINNER: Well, they've

created enough additional jobs to be eligible were they to be starting anew, Senator Krueger.

So under the other provisions of what constitutes a regionally significant project, if you are going to create over 50 jobs, in certain circumstances, you're eligible to be so designated. They in fact acquired a company with over 750 jobs, and therefore are eligible under those circumstances as well.

And in fact they've employed a significant number of additional people since their acquisition of the property. Which they would, were it not for the filing -- were it not for the final certification by Empire State Development Corporation, in the understanding of everyone involved in this project, they would have been eligible for and be in receipt of these benefits.

SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Mr.

President, if through you the sponsor would continue to yield.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
Senator Winner, would you yield for a question

from Senator Krueger? 1 2 SENATOR WINNER: Certainly. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 4 Senator Krueger. 5 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: So as I'm understanding this, Company X existed, had 6 7 750 jobs or more, sold to a new company. The 8 new company is adding jobs or has added jobs beyond the 750 and is now applying for Empire 9 10 Zone that was never finished for the previous 11 owner or was never processed for the previous 12 owner? I'm looking for clarification 13 14 still. 15 SENATOR WINNER: In fact, Senator Krueger, this company is -- they're 16 eligible for the benefits by virtue of the 17 18 fact that they were acquiring a company of over 750 jobs. 19 20 Additionally, they have created over 50 jobs as well, which would otherwise 21 22 make them eligible for a regionally significant project. And in fact, the level 23 of their employment would then be determinable 24 25 as to the extent of the benefits that they are 1 afforded.

In every instance, they would have met the criteria to become eligible for a regionally significant project, but for the final couple of week glitch of not receiving the final certification from Empire State

Development Corporation because of some holdup in some local actions involving hearings or the like.

They acquired this company in good faith, having every expectation of receiving the designation as this project. In fact, they would have had no problems, again, were it not for this technical filing glitch. And as a result, that is why this legislation is before you.

SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Mr.

President, if through you the sponsor would continue to yield.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Winner, would you continue to yield to another question from Senator Krueger?

SENATOR WINNER: Yes.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

Senator Krueger.

SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Okay. So as I understand it, they would have been eligible as a regionally significant project under the old existing law with 750 jobs.

They're adding, according to this bill, the creation of at least 50 more jobs.

How much will the tax exemptions and credits from this bill cost the State of New York and over what time period?

SENATOR WINNER: Obviously, it depends on the level of the wage tax credits and the other types of benefits you get under the existing program. I don't know exactly what the level of the benefits are.

But again, this is not any kind of new money, Senator. Again, I repeat myself for the fourth time, were it not for the technical glitch in the timing of the application's final certification, they would have had these benefits and we wouldn't be talking today.

This is not sliding anything under the door. This is not providing any special benefit for a company that is not similarly situated. This is correcting a glitch to

benefit a company that was promised and 1 2 induced by the existence of these benefits to 3 acquire this company and to come into the 4 State of New York, employ a significant number 5 of additional people, and retain a significant number of jobs. In fact, 1100 people are 6 7 currently employed in this facility. 8 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you, Mr. President. On the bill. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 11 Senator Krueger, on the bill. 12 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. I appreciate the sponsor's tolerance in my 13 14 trying to clarify the deal. 15 And he may be right that it's nothing that, all things being equal, the old 16 company might not have been eligible for. 17 18 guess my frustration is I don't really like these Empire Zone deals to start with, and 19 20 I've been consistent on that. I was hoping we'd deal with Empire 21 Zone reform before we left session. At least 22

we got brownfields reform. That's good.

we didn't deal with Empire Zone reform, and we

particularly didn't deal with the esoterica of

23

24

Empire Zones that allow for these regionally specific projects to self-declare themselves, to move the borders, to move from one side of the street to the other, to have a company sold and then claim perhaps it's new jobs when it's under a new corporate name when the jobs were already there.

I don't know if my information was correct. I was told that this deal could cost us \$40 million over 10 years, \$4 million a year. I'm not questioning that the sponsor knew something that he didn't answer. But that was someone who gave me that information.

And I have to say, a bill that allows, if you have 50 more jobs, to potentially get \$40 million of New York State taxpayers' money is something that concerns me.

It also concerns me, as we discussed with previous bills that I debated on the floor today with Senator Johnson that seemed to relate to a particular mall, the Carousel Mall outside of Syracuse, that every time we make one of these deals not only are we giving up state and local tax revenue,

we're actually creating an unfair playing field for the businesses who can't fall into those categories.

So if you get your taxes reduced or exempted, then you have a business advantage over anyone else who's trying to do the same kind of work who doesn't get the deal.

So as I think I am consistent with on the floor of the Senate, I go both ways on Empire Zones. Either don't have them or make the whole state an Empire Zone so that everybody has a fair shot in business.

Because I feel that for these special deals that we make, even respecting the sponsor's analysis that under the existing rules they might have been eligible for this -- although obviously they needed some fix, because we're here in the Legislature with a message of necessity in a three-way deal at the last minute to fix it for them -- that we are doing something wrong here.

That we are not having equal taxation, that we don't have an even playing field for businesses, that we still end up disproportionately giving tax advantages to

the largest businesses when in fact all the data and research shows that it is small and medium-sized businesses who create the most jobs in the State of New York.

And we all seem to give a lot of lip service to the problems of small business but in fact when we make major tax policy decisions, and in fact government policy decisions, it's always for the larger ones, not the smaller ones.

So again, my frustrations are across the board on these policies and in fact on Empire Zones more specifically than perhaps the details of this bill. But again, I feel if it wasn't dated June 20th and it didn't come with a message of necessity and people had more time to look and evaluate and ask questions, maybe I'd have more concerns about this specific bill.

Right now I'll just vote no because
I just don't like these Empire Zone deals.

23	video games are a form of protected speech and
24	that mandatory prohibitions are
25	unconstitutional and frankly wrong and that

voluntary ratings and compliance are a much more, if you will, American way to go.

And of course the marketplace would probably make the best decisions about this anyway, at least at this point.

But, you know, just some of the other things that I think are important and again, the reason -- though not my primary reason for voting no, which is on the First Amendment issue -- but which are also important is that the newer consoles either do or will have parental blocking. And we see that with cable television and DVRs, that sort of thing, and even filtering that are on computers. And parents actually provide guidance to their children on this.

There are some, I think, problems with some of the sections of the bill also in the way they're written, even if the intention is not such. You know, things like mandatory labeling of all games. I'm not sure how that's going to work.

Also -- I mean, just already there's voluntary ratings, you know, software ratings. I'm not big for playing these games,

but there's already a voluntary ratings system in effect by the companies that create these.

And I just also think that when you wholesale block content because of how they're being rated, it really is a slippery slope.

And I just think that over time -- and I hope that our state is a leader in video games generally, nothing to do with violent video games, but just video games in general. I think this could be an impediment with our competitive edge.

And all those are very good reasons to vote no for this legislation. And, just to go back, the overarching issue of the constitutionality of this and the erosion of free expression.

So, you know, it's the last day of session. I think we could go back and look and see what we need to do. Cooler heads could prevail then. I think that we should vote no on this, give ourselves more of a chance to -- and I know we've had hearings and I know we've had conference committees, but I think the job is not done.

And I think that we need to buy

ourselves more time and have a more informed
and a less constitutionally threatening people
piece of legislation. So I'll be voting no
and encouraging my colleagues to vote in the
negative as well.

ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:

SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank
you, Mr. President.

I feel somewhat sorry that this is one of the few times that Senator Duane and I are in total disagreement on a bill. But that's what life is about.

One of the reasons that I am pleased about this bill is because I'm one of the cosponsors, along with Senator Lanza.

If many of you may remember, last year we had quite a bit of confrontation on this bill because we were very concerned, I particularly, about how do we ensure that we create the opportunity for parents to have the proper level of notification about the kind of

games that their children are purchasing and try to be sure that we disallow children from having access to games, many of which are extremely violent.

The more violent the games are and the more you win, the levels get deeper and deeper. So that as you win each level, the level of violence increases. And it's a major problem for our young people, who really are not able to make the discernment necessary to differentiate between that which is real and that which is not real.

What we've asked for in this bill -- and I'm sorry that Senator Lanza is not here to assist me in defending this bill. But one of the things that we worked very hard with all of the toy companies and video game people on was that they would agree to come into communities and assist us in having meetings where we had the opportunity to explain to parents what the games are really about and how do we ensure that at least parents have some knowledge and some say in what is going into the hands of their children.

So what we've asked for, in the 1 2 final analysis of this bill, is merely to have the ability to ensure that games will be 3 4 labeled. We have taken out penalties, we have 5 taken out a lot of other things that we felt strongly should have been in the bill 6 7 initially. And we have modified the bill, not 8 to satisfy the toy companies but to at least try to meet the thresholds of 9 10 constitutionality. I think this is an excellent bill. 11 12 Certainly it was very clear that at some point last year it was thought that Senator Lanza 13 14 and I were going to actually come to 15 fisticuffs, actually going to come to fisticuffs about this bill. But we are both 16 17 parents and grandparents who really care about 18 that which our children are exposed to. And therefore, it is in the best interest of 19 20 parents, at least, to have the ability to know what their children are viewing. 21 Thank you, Mr. President. 22 23 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Senator Hassell-Thompson will be recorded in 24 25 the affirmative.

Senator Bruno.
SENATOR BRUNO: Mr. President,
can we ask the Senate to suffer an
interruption for a very worthy cause.

Senator here, who is now the Governor and the
great Governor of this great state, and we

GOVERNOR PATERSON: Thank you.
I opened the session standing here,
so I didn't think it would be really
inappropriate if I closed the session standing

But I wanted to thank all of you
during what was a very difficult transition in

our state, in the midst of a national sliding 1 recession, for all of the cooperation that you 2 gave to me, to these two fine leaders who are 3 4 standing here, and really to the residents of 5 the State of New York. This body, along with the Assembly, 6 7 in the last week passed 21 substantive pieces 8 of legislation in the last week. And no one 9 can find a time when anyone passed a third of 10 it, in anyone's recent memory. So 11 congratulations to all of you. 12 (Applause.) GOVERNOR PATERSON: And before 13 14 wishing all of you a pleasant and peaceful 15 summer and a very successful year, meaning that we'll see you back here next year, I 16 wanted to thank --17 18 (Scattered applause; laughter.) GOVERNOR PATERSON: So someone's 19 20 having a real problem. 21 (Laughter.) GOVERNOR PATERSON: 22 I wanted to thank Senator Malcolm Smith for his 23 leadership, for his assistance to me, for the 24 25 great work of his conference, and for his

friendship over these years.

And I wanted to lend my voice to all those who are wishing the best for our great, great leader who served in the Senate for 32 years, most recently in the last 14 years as Majority Leader of the Senate -- someone who I always called a leader but was blessed enough to call him a friend in the last few years, and someone whose imprint on legislation and process will be remembered for years to come.

Let's just go back to those days when session started an hour and a half to two hours before we scheduled it, when no one could ever be sure to be at a meeting on time. And he changed all that in 1995 when he came in as Majority Leader. But he changed a lot of things -- programs, stadiums named after him --

(Laughter.)

GOVERNOR PATERSON: A man of international acclaim, someone whose picture will probably be on future currency --

GOVERNOR PATERSON: Before I 6 7 leave -- I'm going to the broadcasters' 8 convention in Lake George, at the Sagamore, so 9 I may not be exactly in Senator Bruno's 10 district. But I wanted to point out that in 11 12 1995, I was very fortunate enough to have been appointed the Deputy Minority Leader by 13 Senator Connor. And I was the floor leader, 14 15 and I sat across from an individual who was appointed the Deputy Minority Leader -- Deputy 16 Majority Leader. And we, for eight years, 17 18 debated, worked the floor together, and generally, we thought, followed the direction 19 20 of the leader and made the process in this 21 place work a little better. 22 And so I am very much looking 23 forward -- of course, I can't predict the future. But next year I am going to rewrite 24 25 the Constitution.

(Laughter.)

GOVERNOR PATERSON: But before that time comes, I just wanted to extend well wishes to my friend, Senator Dean Skelos.

(Extended applause.)

GOVERNOR PATERSON: And finally, to all of the staff that works here, to those who have kept this chamber in the beautiful condition and made it the great landmark that it is, to our sergeant-at-arms, to the analysts that work here, to the members of the Senate and to the leaders of the Senate, should you ever be thrown into a situation as suddenly and as, in some ways, tragically as I was, and you're looking for some direction and you're trying to figure out what is the right thing to do, there's one old adage that serves true.

And it has to do with all the work that we conducted together, with my understanding that even though we differ sometimes on approach, that if we all drew a picture of the New York that we imagine, it would look very much the same. It's the respect for not only those of you who are

1	Senators, but the Assembly members as well who
2	make the Legislature and work with the
3	Executive branch to make law.

5	how to govern this state, when I started to
6	sit down and have lunch and realized I might
7	be Governor in a few hours, I remembered that
8	adage: Don't forget where you came from.

providing information to parents who make tough choices every day with respect to what's appropriate for their children.

I listened to Senator Duane's comments on the bill, and he raised concerns about the First Amendment and speech, talked about the marketplace and competitive edge, and the industry here and their right to participate in the marketplace here in New York.

And I agree with all those concerns, Senator Duane. I think, however, if you look closely at this bill, they're not valid.

And let's start with speech.

There's all kinds of speech. If you take an old-fashioned pinball machine and we plunked it down in the chamber, we'd look at it and no one would call it speech. But when we put that up on a video screen, it does become speech, and I acknowledge that. And it deserves protection under the Constitution.

I think, though, there's some confusion with respect to what this bill actually accomplishes. I think the word

"prohibition" was talked about. I want to be clear. This bill does not prohibit the sale of any video to anyone.

There has been legislation proposed, both in this state and in other states, that would do just that, that attempted to say you must have a rating on a video game and then, based on that rating, you can only sell the video games to certain age groups. Or, in the alternative, you couldn't sell a video game to someone based on a rating.

This doesn't do that. This simply says that every video game sold in the State of New York should simply have a rating consistent with what the ESRB does presently in a voluntary way.

I know Senator Duane talked about the fact that we do have a voluntary system. It does work. But the problem with voluntary is that tomorrow someone can change their mind. Someone could decide tomorrow to no longer place ratings on these games.

And so this is not prohibiting the sale, this is simply about providing

1 information to parents.

You know, I know when I'm in a store and I'm with my wife and the kids and they want a video game, and there's a lot going on in life and things are hectic, and you have that thing shoved in front of your face, and your son or your daughter asks once or twice or three times or four times, five times -- I have two minutes, correct? Getting near the end -- you know, if you're able to look at that video game and very quickly determine what kind of game it is, the decision that you have to make is a lot easier.

And that's what this does. It provides information. Information is good.

I want to commend Senator

Hassell-Thompson for her work. We worked over
the last two years on this legislation. Her
insights and her work on this bill I think got
us to the point where we have a very workable,
comprehensive approach.

Last year's version, where there was a three-way agreement, included a provision that would have made it an E felony

1	to sell these games. We all thought it was
2	wrong. We took that out. We worked with the
3	industry, we worked with the Assembly.
4	And we do have an agreement here on
5	a piece of legislation that I think will go a
6	long way in allowing parents to make good
7	decisions with respect to what is and what is
8	not appropriate for their children.

New York, we're saying we're going to pass a bill that does away with their tax revenue, and we didn't even ask them about it. Because we're arguing, apparently, since I was asking behind the scenes, that we don't need a home rule because we view tax policy as a statewide issue.

And I have to say I'm a little confused about that, because when we pass sales tax increases on the counties, we always get asked is there a home rule, and we have to have one. But when we're going to actually reduce the taxes on five counties, the City of New York, we don't have to ask them.

So I'm going to -- I don't know what to do. Because again, I think if the city was asked, they might support -- I know the City of New York not only wants fewer cars, they want better-emission cars. But we're not saying we're giving up our revenue, we're saying to them they have to give up their revenue, and we're not even asking them.

You know, so I'm -- I have to vote no. Because I don't think we should do this to a locality. I think I'm a strong believer

in home rule and when we take way their tax 1 2 revenue, we ought to ask them and they ought 3 to want us to. Because again, we argue here 4 consistently about unfunded mandates, we argue 5 about wanting to make sure we respect our local governments. 6 7 But right now we're passing a bill 8 that will say: City of New York, you've lost your local sales and compensating use taxes, 9 10 and we didn't ask you your opinion about it. So I'll vote no. 11 Thank you, Mr. President. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: 13 14 Senator Krueger will be recorded in the 15 negative. SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: Thank you,
Mr. President.
I'm going to encourage everyone to
vote against this bill. I don't think it's
likely to accomplish much, since it doesn't
have a sponsor in the Assembly. But this is a

direction when it comes to the taxation of sales through the Internet.

For many, many years we have been discriminating against companies that actually have places of business in New York by allowing companies that sell through the Internet to avoid taxes. We've taken steps in the last few years to correct that.

This bill would take a particular type of Internet sales that's called an affiliates program and exempt it again from taxes, costing the State of New York \$50 million a year.

As far as I'm concerned, if you're selling in New York, you should be subject to New York sales tax. The only evidence proffered is that one company decided not to use its affiliates program because of our existing law that requires all Internet sales companies to be taxed.

We don't need to be creating a \$50 million hole. We don't need to be giving Internet companies in other states an advantage over the actual businesses in our state that employ our citizens.

1 I encourage everyone to vote no, 2 including the sponsor, Senator Rules. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Senator Schneiderman will be recorded in the 4 5 negative. Senator Krueger, to explain her 6 7 vote. 8 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you 9 so much, Mr. President. 10 Well, I have to agree completely 11 with my colleague Senator Schneiderman. I really think Senator Rules needs 12 to understand, one, we just put this law into 13 14 effect three months ago in the budget. 15 Two, we've planned for \$50 million in revenue from Internet sales, where we would 16 have to go and cut \$50 million somewhere now 17 18 if this law went into effect. But third, and I think most 19 20 important, again, my theme for the day: about being fair in tax policy to all the 21 businesses in New York State? What about the 22 23 small businesses that are employing people? Because if you don't have to pay 24 25 your tax by ordering online, why are you going

to go to your local community store and buy it there? They already find themselves in an economic unfair situation as far as having limited ability to purchase at a lower cost compared to the large national and even international guys.

And now we're saying, if we change this law, Oh, yeah, and if you go to your neighborhood store in your downtown on your main street in your small community or in your large city, if you go to the store to buy the product, then you're going to have to pay tax. But if you do it over the Internet, then you save that money and you lose us jobs right here at home.

Again, Senator Rules needs to understand, this is bad for small business and it's uneven and unfair tax treatment of business in New York State. I urge everyone, don't go down this road. We finally fixed this. Vote no here tonight.

I have a word here from the

Physical Therapy Association, and they are
opposing this bill. And they are opposing it
because "New York State has had a very long
tradition of insulating our healthcare
professionals from profit pressures, which are
created by the ownership of professional
organizations by unlicensed individuals or
corporations.

"Free of professional obligations, unlicensed individuals or corporations will pressure licensed healthcare professionals to put profits before care."

I think that's something we all worry about, profits before care. This bill erodes the public protection provided by the ban on corporate practice, and it subjects children served under the Early Intervention Program -- which this bill does, it's for the youngest children -- to the profit motives of unlicensed individuals.

It further grants them two
representatives on the Corporate Practice
Advisory Panel, and yet licensed healthcare
professionals have no representation on the
panel.

I think this is something that we

I think this is something that we worry about a lot. We worry about profits taking the place of good healthcare. And this is an instance where our youngest, our children who are in the Early Intervention Program, will be subjected to those pressures where profits may take precedence over care.

So I'm voting no, and I would like everyone to be voting no. Thank you.

SENATOR HANNON: There's something on the bill I'd like to explain.

This bill is prompted by a program bill that was put in by the Department of Health which exposed some fissures, some rifts among the providers of early intervention.

Early intervention for 20 years has functioned

in an exemplary way, treating young children, infants so that later on in their life they do not have medical problems.

What this bill does is simply take those rifts and hold them still. It does not create any new rights. All of the people who now practice can continue to practice while the Department of Health and the Department of Education have some ongoing talks to figure out how they can harmonize their regulation, how we can continue this program to move forward.

In essence, this is a standstill bill. It's not something that changes, I reiterate. I hadn't seen the memo that Senator Oppenheimer read. I wish she had brought it to my attention. Because as far as I know, it contains some serious factual errors, from her reading of it out loud.

I would recommend this bill. It will solve problems. It will continue early intervention, delivering services to kids in this state. And it means that we will revisit these very issues in the near future when we can get our regulatory agencies to act in a
