We know that the first Girl Scouts troop was organized just about a hundred years ago, and about 60 years ago Congress chartered the Girl Scouts of the USA. As of this year, there are 3.7 million Girl Scouts in the world, 2.7 million girls and 928,000 adults working primarily as volunteers.

Paterson to proclaim September 12-13, 2009, as Heritage 6 7 Weekend in the State of New York, and 8 September 7-13, 2009, as Heritage Week in the 9 State of New York. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Serrano, on the resolution. 11 12 SENATOR SERRANO: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 13 This is really a wonderful 14 15 resolution, and I hope that my colleagues join me in supporting it. Heritage Week is a very 16 important initiative which will help attract 17 18 visitors to our state's wonderful tourist destinations. 19 20 Heritage Week takes place from September 7th through the 13th, and during 21 22 this time museums, historical societies, parks 23 and other tourist attractions throughout the 24 state have all agreed to provide reduced rates

to special events and visitors.

It's important to know, within my role as chair of the Committee on Cultural Affairs and Tourism, how important it is as an economic development tool that we have people utilizing our state parks, our cultural attractions which we have so many of.

And during the past, during times of fiscal downturn as what we are experiencing now, usage at state parks, museums, and other historical and heritage locations goes up. I think the term "staycation" -- meaning you go on vacation but you stay close to home -- really does explain what many families will be doing during this summer break.

And I think it's wonderful that we have Heritage Week as a real opportunity to showcase all of the wonderful tourist attractions that we have here in our very own State of New York. Whether it be downstate, upstate, on the western edge, there is really so much to be done. And I really look forward to Heritage Week and also ensuring that people take advantage of it.

I spoke a bit about statewide the 1 2 importance of this, but a little bit closer to 3 home where I represent, in East Harlem and the 4 South Bronx, during the 1970s the community 5 was in many ways abandoned. There was so much blight throughout the community. 6 7 And when you think about how we 8 recovered as a community, in many ways our cultural institutions brought in much-needed 9 10 resources, whether it be the Bronx Zoo, the Botanical Gardens, the museums. It really did 11 12 aid in the overall recovery of our community. Now, East Harlem and the South 13 14 Bronx, with emerging and growing and 15 strengthening cultural corridors, are becoming hotbeds of tourism and cultural activity. 16 17 So I thank you very much, 18 Mr. President, for your indulgence in letting me speak on this resolution, and I hope all my 19 20 colleagues join me in supporting it. 21 Thank you. 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Thompson, Legislative Resolution Number 1604, 1 2 urging the New York State Congressional delegation to aid in the appropriation of the 3 \$475 million called for in President Obama's 4 5 budget for a Great Lakes restoration initiative, and to provide the economic 6 7 investment and revitalization that the Great 8 Lakes system needs. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 10 Senator Thompson. SENATOR THOMPSON: 11 Thank you. 12 Thank you, Mr. President. That sounds good. Great ring to it. And the Deputy Majority 13 Leader, I want to thank him for giving me just 14 15 a couple of quick moments. Today is Great Lakes Lobby Day in 16 Albany, and it's really important, 17 18 particularly up in upstate New York and 19 Western New York, where we have two Great 20 Lakes, Erie and Ontario. They play a vital 21 role in New York State's economy. In addition to that, more than 3 million New Yorkers 22 23 receive drinking water from the Great Lakes as 24 well.

The EPA is really moving forward under President Obama to help clean up many of our Great Lakes. This year in the state budget we're able to provide funding through the Environmental Protection Fund to improve our Great Lakes as well.

In the Great Lakes, there are thousands of islands. In my part of the state we have Grand Island, which is an area that many people live in, and it's a really great place as well.

In addition, to Cayuga Island we were able to provide some funding through the Biodiversity Stewardship Program through the EPF as well.

I encourage everyone to support this resolution. In addition, waterfront revitalization this year was increased in the Environmental Protection Fund. And that's a really big issue in many communities in upstate New York, waterfront revitalization, particularly as the shoreline abuts the Great Lakes.

So I would encourage everyone we've

got to protect our water. I was just recently 1 2 in Atlanta, and as many people remember, last 3 year they couldn't even water their grass for 4 most of the summer. They couldn't wash their 5 cars as well. And we have a precious commodity in 6 7 terms of an abundant supply of water. And we 8 must protect that water, because in the next 10 to 25 years our Great Lakes are going to be 9 10 one of the most sought-after things in the United States of America. 11 12 Thank you. I ask that the resolution be 10 read in its entirety and move for its immediate adoption and allow Senator Perkins 11 12 to speak on his resolution. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The Secretary will read. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: By Senator Perkins, Legislative Resolution Number 1618, 16 honoring the many contributions of the 17 18 New York State farmworkers and recognizing their need for fair labor practices. 19 20 "WHEREAS, It is the sense of this Legislative Body to commend the efforts of our 21 22 farmworkers as they continue their hard work 23 in cultivating the land, facing the many 24 challenges of nature such as flood, drought

and heat, in order to grow our food; and 1 2 "WHEREAS, Attendant to such 3 concern, and in full accord with its 4 long-standing traditions, this Legislative 5 Body is justly proud to honor the many contributions of the New York State 6 farmworkers and to recognize their need for 7 8 fair labor practices; and 9 "WHEREAS, Friday, May 1, 2009, is 10 International Labor Day. The campaign for an 8-hour work day and a 40-hour work week 11 12 launched by the American Federation of Labor on May 1, 1890, continues to this day for 13 farmworkers in New York State; and 14 "WHEREAS, Farmworkers directly 15 contribute billions of dollars of economic 16 productivity to the New York economy and are 17 18 the backbone for the 'buy local' movement now coming into vogue. The denial of equal rights 19 20 and protections to farmworkers in 2009 relates fundamentally to our country's original sin of 21 22 slavery; and 23 "WHEREAS, Over 70 years ago, the 24 New Deal labor regime, as conceived by

New York leaders President Franklin Delano
Roosevelt, Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins,
and Secretary Robert Wagner, directed Congress
to pass basic wage and hour protections for
industrial and agricultural workers.

"Despite a majority, these
protections were passed only by accommodating
the demands of Southern segregationists who
objected on the grounds that the protections
would put farmworkers, a primarily
African-American workforce, on an equal
footing with their white counterparts in other
industries. As a result, the farmworkers fell
victim to political expediency and were left
out of the New Deal and subsequent labor and
employment protections; and

"WHEREAS, New York State then
patterned its own labor laws after the
New Deal, repeating those particular
exclusions. This state of affairs stands in
contrast to New York's ideals, history, and
contemporary popular opinion; and

"WHEREAS, Ending this shameful era of exclusion would restore pride to the 'Pride

of New York' program and truly honor the 1 2 industrious farmworkers of New York State; 3 now, therefore, be it 4 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 5 Body pause in its deliberations to honor the many contributions of New York State 6 7 farmworkers and to recognize their need for 8 fair labor practices; and be it further 9 "RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted 10 11 to the Rural and Migrant Ministry and to the 12 Justice for Farmworkers Campaign." 13 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 14 Senator Perkins, on the resolution. 15 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 16 And I hope I can get the support of 17 18 my colleagues on this resolution. 19 Every day in our lives we are 20 fortunate enough to receive the benefits of 21 the hard work from others -- education from teachers, safety from firemen and police, and 22 23 health from doctors. The benefits from their 24 hard work are clear to see, and they are much

appreciated. 1 2 It's critical that we see the hard 3 work of farmworkers through that same lens. 4 Farmworkers are as equally important as the 5 professions I just mentioned. 6 Unfortunately, the fruits of their 7 labor and their hard work are often 8 underappreciated. We see the product of their 9 work every day in our supermarkets and on our 10 dinner tables. It's time we value those who provide for us by providing them with fair 11 labor practices. 12 13 So for me, this is not simply about fair labor practices, but frankly this is 14 15 about civil rights, this is about human rights. And I would hope that my colleagues 16 would join me in showing respect and support 17 18 for the farmworkers. 19 Thank you. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 21 you, Senator Perkins. 22 Senator Schneiderman, on the 23 resolution. 24 SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: Thank you.

I am pleased to stand in support of this resolution also. And I would urge my colleagues, ladies and gentlemen, this is a matter of fundamental justice. And in the history of the United States we've seen over and over again that you can delay justice, but ultimately you cannot deny justice.

Farmworkers deserve protections
that are available to every other union
member, to other workers in the State of
New York. It is appalling that in 2009 we
still have the antiquated system in place that
exists under our state laws.

I would urge everyone to support the resolution. But also let us act on this resolution. We have two more months of session. Let's not leave here without dealing with the rights of farmworkers once and for all in the great State of New York.

But one of the things that becomes important about our zoo and I don't want us to lose sight of -- which is what this bill really is about -- is that the zoo is more than a recreational facility, it is a science area as well. And one of the things that over the many years that the Bronx Zoo has attempted to do is to not only give a free day to our senior citizens but to our children to ensure that they have an opportunity to be able to come, study and enjoy the animals in this relative captivity.

We do recognize, and so does the zoo, the importance. But I just appreciate their understanding and the sacrifices that staff has been willing to make to adjust their own salaries in order to continue to accommodate the children of our community, not only in the Bronx but across this state.

The Bronx Zoo is a treasure to the 1 2 Bronx but, as well, to the State of New York. It is part of a wildlife zoological experiment 3 that does extensive work with animals. 4 5 not just for the animal lover, but it is a place where people can learn about those 6 7 animals that are becoming extinct and the 8 efforts on the part of the zoo to connect to the Congo and to other areas where the animals 9 10 come from. It is as much an educational opportunity as it is a joy and a pleasure. 11 So for those of you who supported 12 this bill today, I appreciate it, as a 13 representative of the Bronx and of the zoo. 14 15 But certainly I do recognize, as all of you do, what a difficult time this is. 16 But if we take every educational 17 18 opportunity and every pleasure away from the people in our communities, it will make it 19 20 that much more difficult for us to get through these difficult times. 21 22 Thank you, Mr. President. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 24 Senator Hassell-Thompson to be recorded in the

And I think clearly Senator Adams' 21 22 bill, which is very good, anyone with any concern for this population group or any 23 modicum of logic would know that if you don't 24

have a residence and you're denied that, there is absolutely no address to keep confidential.

So I would hope that all my colleagues, again on both sides of the aisle, would vote to amend this bill to make Senator Adams' very good bill that much stronger and further protect the advocates who have been working on this piece of legislation for some time.

Thank you, Mr. President.
