the proclamation issued on the first day of 1 2 July, two thousand nine, pursuant to the power 3 vested in me by Article IV, Section 3 of the 4 Constitution, convening the Senate of the 5 State of New York in Extraordinary Session, at the Capitol, in the City of Albany, on the 6 7 fourth day of July, two thousand nine, to 8 change the time for such extraordinary session from three o'clock p.m. to eleven o'clock a.m. 9 10 "Given under my hand and the Privy Seal of the State in the City of Albany this 11 12 third day of July in the year two thousand nine, by the Governor, David A. Paterson." 13 14 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 15 Senator Smith. SENATOR SMITH: Yes, Madam 16 17 President. Would you please recognize my 18 colleague Senator Skelos. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 19 20 Yes, certainly. Senator Skelos, excuse me just one 21 22 moment. The proclamation having been read, 23 24 the Senate is in extraordinary session.

Senator Skelos. 1 2 SENATOR SKELOS: Thank you. Good 3 morning, Senator Stewart-Cousins. 4 This extraordinary session is 5 convened at the call of the Governor, in keeping with the decision of the court. 6 7 On June 8th, a majority members of 8 this body elected Senator Pedro Espada as temporary president and myself as majority 9 10 leader. Under the rules adopted that day, we 11 do not recognize you as the appropriately 12 designated presiding officer. Despite that, I would still like to 13 point out your beautiful scarf in celebration 14 15 of Independence Day and would like to wish everybody a happy Fourth of July. 16 That being said, I would remind 17 18 everybody that we will be joining each other tomorrow at the call of the Governor at 19 20 6:00 p.m., and I would ask at this time that the bills be laid aside and move that we 21 adjourn this extraordinary session sine die. 22 23 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 24 Thank you, Senator.

Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Madam President, duly recognized.

I would like to read a brief statement in the spirit of today. As we know, this is the Fourth of July. Our colleagues are here looking refreshed, looking forward to getting to spend time with their family.

But I do just want to remind us that 236 years ago, on this day, a band of courageous patriots, representing the hearts and minds of a new world, gave birth to our nation. Founded upon the sacred principles of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness, an ideal was born, one that has lit the world over two centuries.

Today that idea lives on in each and every one of us. It is heard in this chamber when a Senator stands up to speak on behalf of his or her constituents, as it is demonstrated around the globe by brave men and women of our armed services who have chosen to put themselves in harm's way to protect our country.

We may celebrate this day with barbecues, fireworks, salutes to our Flag, but more than that, it is also about the declaration that was signed by 56 individuals of the Continental Congress, including four New Yorkers, two of which became members of this esteemed body, Senator Philip Livingston and Senator William Floyd.

Madam President, this is a great day for our country, it's a great day for all of us. To all of my colleagues, to my friends, to those who are visiting, to all those who are now seeing and hearing us vis-a-vis the media, I wish each and every one of you a wonderful Fourth of July. God bless you. We will all continue to pray for you as we move forward.

In regard to that, Madam President, I ask that we adjourn sine die.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Thank you, Senator Smith.

Before we adjourn, I did want to recognize Senator Morahan. I know you were here as a veteran, and I think I neglected to
