9	believe you have a resolution at the desk. I
10	ask that the resolution be read in its
11	entirety and move for its immediate adoption.
12	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

14	privileged and submitted by the office of the
15	Temporary President?
16	SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has,
17	Mr. President.
18	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The

20	THE SECRETARY: By Senator
21	Breslin, Legislative Resolution honoring the
22	Twin Rivers Council upon the occasion of
23	celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Boy
24	Scouts of America.
25	"WHEREAS, It is the sense of this

Legislative Body to honor the youth of today, and leaders of tomorrow, whose character and achievements best exemplify the ideals and values cherished by this great state and nation; and

"WHEREAS, The Boy Scouts of America and its members are dedicated to the development of character and leadership in the youth of this nation; and

"WHEREAS, attendant to such concern, and in full accord with its long-standing traditions, this Legislative Body is justly proud to honor the Twin Rivers Council upon the occasion of celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America; and

"WHEREAS, to observe this auspicious anniversary, the Twin Rivers
Council has planned numerous events, some of which have already taken place and some to occur. On February 8, 2010, the official birthday of BSA will be celebrated with Centennial Scouting Day. A scouting display at the New York State Museum will showcase scouting memorabilia and historic scouting

In March of 2010, the Scout Mall artifacts. 1 Show will exhibit the great things benefitted 2 3 through scouting to all shoppers at numerous 4 venues. In June of 2010, the Centennial Eagle 5 Recognition Dinner will be held to both recognize current Eagle Scouts and identify 6 7 and energize Eagle alumni of all ages. 8 September of 2010, the pilgrimage to Silver Bay on Lake George, the site of scouting's 9 10 first camp and training site, will include a dinner, historical reenactment, silent 11 12 auction, and limited-issue memorabilia. the year-long celebration will culminate with 13 14 the 100th Anniversary Camporee, to be held 15 October 1-3, 2010, at Saratoga State Park; and "WHEREAS, The purpose of the Boy 16 17 Scouts of America, incorporated on February 8, 18 1910, and chartered by Congress in 1916, is to provide an educational program for boys and 19 20 young adults to build character, to train in 21 the responsibilities of participating citizenship, and to develop personal fitness; 22 23 and "WHEREAS, The Twin Rivers Council 24 25 provides scouting within the following 13

Albany, Clinton, Columbia, Essex, 1 counties: Franklin, Fulton, Hamilton, Montgomery, 2 3 Rensselaer, Saratoga, Schenectady, Warren, and 4 Washington; and 5 "WHEREAS, Community-based organizations receive national charters to use 6 7 the scouting program as a part of their own 8 youth work. These groups, which have goals compatible with those of the Boy Scouts of 9 10 America, include religious, educational, civic, fraternal, business, labor 11 12 organizations, governmental bodies, 13 corporations, professional associations, and 14 citizens' groups; and 15 "WHEREAS, In 2009, over 500,000 hours of community service were completed by 16 Scouts and volunteers throughout the State of 17 18 New York; and "WHEREAS, Furthermore, over 350,000 19 20 youth were served by more than 60,000 adult volunteers who coached, guided and led them 21 22 through scouting programs; and 23 "WHEREAS, There are more than 6,000 24 Boy Scouts of America units -- packs, troops, 25 crews, posts, and groups -- which are

chartered by schools, churches, service clubs, 1 fraternal orders, and other community groups 2 across the State of New York; and 3 4 "WHEREAS, This year, over 60,000 5 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts, and leaders 6 participated in approved camping programs in 7 New York State, and over 700 Scouts earned the 8 prestigious rank of Eagle Scout; and 9 "WHEREAS, The Boy Scouts of America 10 have so manifestly contributed to the preservation of those treasured ideals of 11 12 compassion, honor, preparedness and concern for others which are so paradigmatic of our 13 14 American heritage; now, therefore, be it 15 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative Body pause in its deliberations to honor the 16 Twin Rivers Council upon the occasion of 17 18 celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America; and be it further 19 20 "RESOLVED, That copies of this 21 resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to the Twin Rivers Council, Boy Scouts of 22 America." 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: I'11 24 25 take liberties of the chair for a moment and

welcome Steve Silverman, the director of the 1 Twin Rivers Council, Bob Bullock, the chair of 2 3 the 100th Anniversary events, and an old and 4 dear friend of not only myself but the entire 5 Legislature, former Assemblyman Fred Field. In addition, New York State is the 6 7 home and the Boy Scouts of America were 8 founded here. There are over 350,000 Boy Scouts and alumni, either existing Boy 9 10 Scouts or alumni. The first headquarters was 11 in New York City, at the YMCA. And their 12 first summer camp in the United States was at Silver Bay on Lake George, in the district of 13 14 Senator Betty Little. 15 So let's all welcome the Scouts for being here, and in recognition of the 100th 16 Anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. 17 18 (Applause.) ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 19 20 Senator Smith. SENATOR SMITH: 21 Thank you very 22 much, Senator Breslin. 23 I do want to make a comment about the Boy Scouts. Prior to, I do just want to 24 25 acknowledge the fact that I have a University

of Albany ambassador that is shadowing me today by the name of Debby Brown. And Debby just wanted to say hello to everybody. She is learning the ways of the Senate. I told her this is a very quiet time for us as a body.

(Laughter.)

But with regard to the resolution,
I do want to congratulate Senator Breslin for
this resolution honoring the Boy Scouts on
their hundredth year. I myself was a Boy
Scouts, spent some time at Ten Mile River, got
thrown in the lake, and that's where I learned
how to swim.

But I do want you to understand that being a Boy Scout is a very honorable thing. It's something that you should enjoy. It teaches you a lot to deal with discipline and respect. And especially during these times when peer pressure is very high from your friends who might want you to think that being a Boy Scout isn't cool -- well, being a Boy Scout is being cool. It's being cool because you know what you stand for, you have

the strength within yourself to stand up to 1 2 anyone who wants to say something that is not positive about you, and you know how to handle 3 that. 4 5 I myself have indicated to many people that if it wasn't for the Boy Scouts, I 6 7 probably wouldn't be standing on this floor 8 today, notwithstanding other influences in my 9 life. 10 So, Senator Breslin, I want to 11 thank you for honoring them. In a way, I feel 12 like I'm being honored myself, because I am a true Boy Scout myself. And it is so good to 13 14 see so many of you here. 15 Thank you, and God bless. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 16 17 you, Senator Smith. 18 Senator Larkin. SENATOR LARKIN: Thank you, 19 20 Mr. President. Thank you so much for taking the time to ensure that we haven't forgotten a 21 quarter of Americans, the Boy Scouts. 22 23 Now, 2 percent of the Scouts, as you all know, become Eagle Scouts. 24 25 veteran of 23 years of active duty, with my

good friend on the end, Roy McDonald, active.

A lot of others here served associated with
Scouts.

I guess the first time I got involved with Scouts was in Germany when a two-star general said, "We're going to build a camp for Scouts." And I said, "That's a good recon unit." He said, "No, idiot, that's the Boy Scouts of America."

So after that I learned a lot. I participated and was a director of Boy Scouts of America's National Jamboree in 1960 in Denver, Colorado.

You know, the military been a great fostering place. I know a Congressional Medal of Honor in Vince Leibell's district, Paul Bucha. When you talk to Paul, he'll say "I was appointed because they read the bottom of my resume asking to go to West Point because it said, very clearly, I am an Eagle Scout." And his Congressman said, "The only reason I appointed you was you were an Eagle Scout." He is a Congressional Medal of Honor winner and still alive today.

Scouting is very important to us.

Too often people don't think of it. I tell
Scouts when I meet them, "Don't sit down in
the back of the car so somebody won't see you,
sit up tight and straight. Let your mothers
and fathers and grandparents and aunts and
uncles see you and know that you're doing
something that is right for you, for your
family and America."

One hundred years. We want to make sure that that generation starting today will stand tall, because numbers and numbers and numbers of our armed forces -- for our men it's the Eagle, and for our females it's the Gold Award. So don't forget your sisters in service for scouting.

ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank you, Senator Larkin.

Senator Little.

19 SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you,

20 Mr. President.

I would like to join my colleagues in recognizing the Twin Rivers Scout Council, in that they represent -- all six of my counties are members of Twin Rivers. And Silver Bay, yes, is on beautiful Lake George

within my district. 1 2 But in doing so, I'd also like to 3 thank all of the people, the leaders who have 4 volunteered so many hours in the past 5 100 years and who are currently doing so. And I'd also like to thank all the 6 7 parents who take the time to see that their 8 youngsters become members of scouting. And 9 whether it's from Cub Scouts or to Eagle 10 Scout, every young man learns something and benefits by being a member of scouting. 11 12 So congratulations upon 100 years of Boy Scouts in our country, and thank you 13 for coming down. 14 Thank you. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank you, Senator Little. 16 17 Senator Farley. 18 SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you, Senator Breslin. 19 20 I rise also in support of your resolution. And I thank you for bringing this 21 forward on the hundredth anniversary of the 22 Boy Scouts. 23 24 Now, the Twin Rivers Council, which 25 your resolution speaks to, represents

13 counties, four of which are in my district. 1 2 And I'm sure that there's some constituents in the gallery of mine and of yours and so many. 3 4 But scouting is one of the most 5 valuable things in our society. These Eagle Scouts go on to become the cream of our 6 society and rise to the highest levels in our 7 8 society because of what they learned in scouting. The Twin Rivers has been one of the 9 10 most successful Boy Scout councils in the United States. It also has one of the most 11 beautiful facilities, Lake George. 12 And not only do we welcome them 13 here, I wish them well. And I know that 14 15 they're a very, very large part of our state and of our nation, and we're very, very 16 pleased to rise in support of this resolution. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank you, Senator Farley. 19 20 Senator Golden. SENATOR GOLDEN: 21 Thank you, Mr. President. 22 23 I too rise in support of the 24 resolution. Scouting has been a great tradition for over a hundred years. And the 25

unfortunate reality is they keep diminishing. Their numbers are coming down because they've been forced out of some of our public schools and public sectors because of their Scout oath and for other reasons.

They no longer have the meeting halls they used to be able to have, and being able to congregate. Which is unfortunate, because they are really a great organization.

I have a Scout Troop 20 that's meeting in the same hall for 100 years, the New Utrecht Reformed Church, when they started back a hundred years ago. Troop 20 is still meeting at that location. That is something that we are all very, very proud of.

And you know what, you may not grow up to be an Eagle Scout, but there is scouting in many of our corporate leaders, and many of our battlefield generals and battlefield commanders today have scouting tradition within them.

Even Senator Schneiderman, I understand, has some scouting in him -- I don't know how, but he does. And I don't know if he went to Eagle Scout -- did he? No, he's

a good man. He's a good man. I congratulate him for being in scouting.

But I will tell you that in our area down in Brooklyn, New York, and Staten Island, the kids from around the City of New York, they get an opportunity to go to a place called Camp Pouch. Now, this is in the middle of Staten Island. It's beautiful. And the scouting world and the scouting, I guess, corporate is getting ready or contemplating closing that location.

And I need the support, and I know we have the support of Senator Savino and Senator Lanza here in this body to make sure that that doesn't happen, that this tradition of Pouch remains in our community in Staten Island and that the kids from the inner city get an opportunity to see what scouting is all about. It's like Ten Mile River, it's really gorgeous. I mean, when you see this, it's really something to be proud of.

And I appreciate this resolution today, because it sends a signal to all of these young men and women that we support their efforts and that there should be more

scouting going on here in this great state and 1 2 across this nation. 3 I commend their efforts, and I commend the efforts of all of the volunteers 4 5 that go out there each and every week and each and every month to make a difference. 6 7 So we need your support to make 8 sure that Camp Pouch stays as part of scouting tradition in the future and that they do not 9 10 get a chance to take that away from our kids across the tristate area and across the City 11 12 of New York. 13 Thank you. 14 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 15 you, Senator Golden. Senator Foley. 16 SENATOR FOLEY: 17 Thank you, 18 Mr. President. I stand also in strong support of 19 20 this resolution and wish to commend the Boy Scouts of America for a hundred 21 22 outstanding years. It's one of the greatest movements here in our country and in fact 23 across the world. 24 25 Having been the former chair of the

Sunrise District on Long Island, which at one time was one of the largest districts anywhere in our country, I can tell you that the families that have been involved in scouting -- in some cases for over four generations -- have made a huge difference in the communities that we find scouting.

Attending, as we all do, a number of Eagle Courts of Honor, I think it's one of the joyful procedures that we have as elected officials to take part in those particular undertakings. And I can tell you I was at one two weekends ago, well over 200 community members were at that particular event.

And it is one of the organizations, one of the wholesome organizations that communities, families, a whole host of groups can rally around, because we know that scouting so well prepares our young people for adult lives and whatever they may do accordingly. So as one State Senator, I wish to say congratulations to this particular council.

We have out in Suffolk County Camp Baiting Hollow, which similar to what Senator

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Golden mentioned earlier, at times the scouts

And it says 10 11 any non-for-profit corporations that provide a 12 service to a county. That's pretty darn broad and it's got to be an absolute administrative 13 14 nightmare for any county. 15 Granted, they say the county can impose whatever restrictions they want. But 16 if they can impose whatever restrictions they 17 18 want, can they say no, we just don't want to do this? So I just think it's too loosely 19 20 worded, and I'm going to vote no for that 21 reason. I think this is very disrespectful to the Governor, who has given us a week. And immediately the Assembly, to show their political muscle, they put it on the floor with no discussion. And yes, they passed an amendment. Well, that amendment doesn't go far enough either, because there's no financial disclosure in that amendment.

Mr. President, I'm very upset with the way this procedure is taking place. This is something that should be discussed more openly and more publicly, and it must go much, much further before the public ever accepts the accountability that's not in this bill.

There were amendments that were offered by this side of the aisle, 19 20 amendments that were offered by way of equity. We all acknowledged that we could do better. 21 And in fact the Governor's veto has 22 afforded us the opportunity to do that, to do 23 it in a fashion that's bipartisan, do it in a 24 25 fashion includes people from both sides of the aisle, both houses, as well as the executive, and to come up with a product that vastly exceeds the product that we are now in the process of sustaining a gubernatorial override on.

And I would certainly hope that when the dust settles, the same zeal that presented itself when we dealt with the original bill -- notwithstanding the reluctance based on some of its shortcomings -- will address itself to dealing with the issue in the form of a five-way -- both sides of the aisle, both houses, and the Governor -- coming up with something that the people of the State of New York can be proud of.

We shouldn't accept the minimalist position that was the only game in town when we were asked to vote on it. We can do better, we will do better, and we can do it in a bipartisan fashion.

24	you're voting against this override, you're
25	voting against a bill that would require for

the first time the reporting of independent expenditures. You're voting against a bill that would stop them from redacting our income categories, so the public can see how much we make. You're voting against a bill that for the first time would require that any lobbyist or client of a lobbyist that pays money to one of us has to disclose that.

You're voting against a lot of good stuff. And everyone concedes these are all positive steps.

And you're voting against it, even though on January 20th every one of you voted for it, because you say it doesn't far enough and we should have negotiations. Well, I'm for negotiations. I'm ready to negotiate.

Senator Libous said we should have five-ways and that there's been an effort to get five-ways. If there's been an effort to get five-ways, no one ever told anyone over here. So let's clarify that right now. I'm the sponsor of the bill. There's no five-way been called.

We can go into negotiations now.

But we are going in, if you refuse to help us

override, without locking in this first positive step, without showing everyone we can get this done, without making a statement that the days of gridlock are over.

Ladies and gentlemen, I have a lot of affection and regard for many of my colleagues on the other side of the aisle.

But you were in charge for decades and you never took any of these steps towards improving ethics or the campaign finance laws in this state. You never made any of these efforts.

I'm glad you're now willing to go further. I would like to go further. Every time we moved any of these provisions to the floor or attempted to bring them to the floor by a motion, you bloc-voted against them.

We're now in the majority, and instead of just bloc-voting down every reform, we are actually moving things.

I think it's a shame not to lock in these changes and then go forward. If you want to deal with lawyer disclosure, I sponsor a bill, Senate 6794 -- please sign on -- that requires lawyer disclosure.

21	THE SECRETARY: Senator Seward.
22	SENATOR SEWARD: To explain my
23	vote.
24	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:
25	Senator Seward, to explain his vote.

1 SENATOR SEWARD: Yes,

Mr. President, I will be voting no to override the Governor's veto. But I feel in doing so I'm voting yes for a better and stronger ethics law in the State of New York.

And I would disagree with those who would say that, well, this is the best that we can do at this particular time. Because the Governor has in fact indicated his willingness to reopen discussions in a bipartisan way so that we can get to a better and stronger ethics bill soon.

And I would further disagree with Senator Schneiderman and say that nothing has been done in the past. Many of us were here and voted for the original financial disclosure law a number of years ago, and there have been improvements along the way.

So I'm voting no, Mr. President, to override the Governor's veto. But I feel in doing so I am voting yes for a better and stronger ethics bill in the very near future.

ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

Senator Seward will be voting yes and no.

(Laughter.)

2	excuse me, Senator Seward will be recorded in
3	the negative.
4	SENATOR SEWARD: Correct.
5	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The
6	Secretary will continue to read.
7	THE SECRETARY: Senator Skelos.
8	SENATOR SKELOS: Mr. President.
9	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:
10	Senator Skelos, to explain his vote.
11	SENATOR SKELOS: Mr. President,
12	in these days of high ethics and morality, I
13	have to comment on this legislation and why
14	I'm going to vote to sustain the Governor's
15	veto.
16	When this bill first came to the
17	floor for a vote, a number of amendments were
18	put up by the Senate Republicans which we
19	believe would have greatly improved the
20	legislation. Those amendments were defeated
21	by the Democrats as they went lockstep with
22	each other.
23	The people of this state are
24	looking for openness, transparency, and
25	greater accountability, more bipartisanship

and disclosure. Last year's budget, which was negotiated behind closed doors, which increased taxes by \$11 billion -- payroll taxes, license plate taxes, et cetera -- and spending increases by about \$13 billion, we were told and the public was told that you didn't need Republicans in the room because ethic is controlled by Democrats in New York State. And we saw the disaster, economic disaster of that approach.

What's happening today with the attempt to override the Governor's veto, now -- one of the individuals that was in the room -- it's been decided by the two legislative branches that they're not happy with him, that he's hurting politically, so they're going to just give it to him a little bit more. Rather than sitting down with him and showing him the respect as Governor -- it could have been this afternoon, could have been tomorrow -- showing him the respect as Governor to sit down and at least afford him the opportunity to present his point of view in legislation and sit down with the four leaders, staff, and really discuss the

legislation to see if a compromise could be 1 2 achieved. 3 Now, just about every newspaper in 4 the state has weighed in against overriding 5 the Governor's veto. The Daily News said legislators should come up with something 6 7 better. The New York Times, which I know many 8 of my good Democrat friends from Manhattan 9 just do whatever it says -- they wake up with 10 it, they go to sleep with it, they walk with it, they just follow that blindly --11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Skelos, how do you vote? 13 14 SENATOR SKELOS: Excuse me? 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: How do you vote? 16 SENATOR SKELOS: Yeah, I'm just 17 18 finishing my statement. I think, Mr. 19 President, a number of people went over the 20 two minutes. And this is an important piece of legislation, if I could comment. 21 22 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 23 There's been one who person who we identified going over, and you're the second. So we'll 24 25 let you finish.

SENATOR SKELOS: Thank you for 1 2 the courtesy. 3 I'll go through them. Syracuse 4 Post-Standard, Rochester Democrat & Chronicle, 5 Albany Times Union, New York Post, Buffalo News all said that it should not overridden 6 7 and that we should sit down in a bipartisan 8 way and make it a stronger bill. 9 Many of them have called for 10 specific improvements. For example, allowing 11 the attorney general to be the chief enforcement officer. Good government groups 12 such as Common Cause have said it could be 13 improved. And the New York City Bar 14 15 Association has also called for more disclosure by attorneys, basically saying that 16 attorneys shouldn't be treated as a privileged 17 18 class when it comes to disclosure. 19 So if the veto is sustained, I 20 would hope that we can start negotiating five 21 ways, in a bipartisan way, and really improve this legislation, because so many -- so many 22 23 questions have been raised. Enforcement --ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 24

Senator Skelos.

1	SENATOR SKELOS: in the Board

	Senator Skelos, how do you vote?

7	Mr. President, again for the courtesy of
8	allowing me to extend my comments a little
9	longer than they should be, and I will be
10	voting to sustain the Governor's veto.
11	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

14	The Secretary will continue to
15	read.
16	THE SECRETARY: Senator Smith.
17	SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very
18	much, Mr. President.
19	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:
20	Senator Smith, to explain his vote.
21	SENATOR SMITH: Yes,
22	Mr. President, just very briefly.
23	While I understand the
24	consternation that the minority has on this
25	day, it is obvious from reading many

editorials that the people of the State of
New York want us to do something. When they
talk about dysfunction, dysfunction is
relative to not completing a task or not
showing the effort to complete a task or not
having the will to do so.

Senator Schneiderman, Senator

Sampson and our colleagues here have worked

hard -- Senator Squadron. And while more

needs to be done, at the end of the day the

fact that we have a number of initiatives

within this ethics bill that will tell the

public that we are clear about their feelings

about how this chamber is run, this is a day

that I believe the override is in order.

Can we talk later with the Governor and the other side of the aisle? Absolutely. It has been done for years where you will make one step to make two steps.

So I'm going to be voting aye,
Mr. President. And I would hope that there is
at least one or two members on the other side
of the aisle, our friends, who understand that
this is not about show, this is about getting
something done.

Thank you, Mr. President. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 3 Senator Smith will be recorded in the affirmative. 4 5 The Secretary will continue to read. 6 7 THE SECRETARY: Senator Squadron. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Squadron, to explain his vote. 9 10 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 12 I rise today in support of the override of the Governor's veto. As has been 13 pointed out, this bill is far from perfect. 14 15 But it is also the farthest that Albany has ever gone. And that's why I hope -- almost 16 every member in this room voted for it just a 17 18 couple of weeks ago. Hopefully that wasn't just to talk about it, hopefully it wasn't 19 20 just to get one good headline. Hopefully it 21 was because you believe as I do that this is actually about fundamentally how we function, 22 which leads to our ability to make a 23 difference in a state that desperately needs 24 25 us right now.

And let's be very clear, there's a 1 2 lot more to do. We need to be negotiating and working to do more immediately, without a 3 4 doubt. But a vote against the override is a 5 vote for the status quo. It is a vote for the weakest ethics oversight, campaign finance 6 7 oversight in the nation. 8 And I don't think that's good 9 It's certainly not the way that we're enough. 10 going to rise out of the old Albany tradition 11 of failing to do important things, and it's 12 not the way that we're going to recreate people's faith in our state government. 13 So I'll be disappointed if it 14 15 doesn't pass today. Hopefully we'll get a chance again in this term. And I will vote 16 17 yes. 18 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 19 20 Senator Squadron will be recorded in the 21 affirmative. The Secretary will continue to 22 23 read. THE SECRETARY: 24 Senator 25 Stachowski.

1	SENATOR STACHOWSKI: Yes.
2	THE SECRETARY: Senator Stavisky.

4	Senator Stavisky, to explain her vote.
5	SENATOR STAVISKY: Yes, thank

7	I notice that the other side that
8	brought up the issue of the amendments. What
9	I find amazing is that these amendments were
10	not brought up last year or the year before or
11	even the year before that.
12	In fact, as people have noticed,
13	progress is often incremental. A long journey
14	begins with a single step. And we have, I
15	believe, had more progress in the last
16	12 months than has existed in the last
17	12 years.
18	I am not totally satisfied with
19	this bill, but I don't think anybody is. But
20	that's not a reason not to enact it. That is
21	not a reason not to override the Governor's
22	veto.
23	I vote aye.
24	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

11	Senator Thompson, to explain his vote.
12	SENATOR THOMPSON: Yes, I think
13	that it's unfortunate today that we are not
14	going to have the votes to override the
15	Governor. I think it's unfortunate.
16	But I do want to just state for the
17	record that since last year, this side of the
18	aisle, with the help of votes on the other
19	side of the aisle in some respects they
20	have, and in some respects they have not
21	helped pass a number of other reforms. And
22	hopefully before this session is over this
23	year, we will pass ethics reforms.
24	One of the things that was very
25	important that this side of the aisle has been

concerned about was mortgage foreclosure reform. The reform for the birth delivery rights for incarcerated women, I think it was the Unshackled bill that Senator Montgomery sponsored last year. I didn't necessarily agree with this bill, I thought we could have done with it more transparency, but there was pension reform that was passed last year as well.

Something that many people wanted to see for a number of years was Rockefeller Drug Law reform. I thought it could have been a little stronger, but I think it was a good bill and it helped many people.

So in the area of trying to help fix Albany, I think we made some progress. We still have a long way to go. And I hope that by the time this year is done that we will also enact more reform that we can do in a bipartisan way. Thank you.

And I vote to support overriding the Governor.

ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

Senator Thompson will be recorded in the affirmative.

24	THE SECRETARY: Senator Volker.
25	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

Senator Volker, to explain his vote. 1 2 SENATOR VOLKER: Mr. President, 3 I'd just like to make a comment on some of the 4 nonsense that has been spoken of in this 5 state. There are some Western states have 6 7 no ethics and reporting statutes at all. And 8 New York has been way ahead of many of the states in the union in reporting and in ethics 9 10 statutes. The statute that we passed here 11 some years ago, which has been in force for 12 many years where there's been reporting -- the problem, by the way, is we're trying to 13 14 compare it, for instance, with the federal 15 legislation that is all one-sided reporting. And interestingly enough, the Supreme Court 16 just threw it out. 17 18 I think if we're going to do a real ethics and responsible piece of legislation, 19 20 we should all get together. Let's get together and let's do it. And let's what I 21 22 call stop fooling around. 23 So I vote no. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 24 25 Senator Volker will be recorded in the

negative. 1 2 The Secretary will continue to 3 read. 4 THE SECRETARY: Senator Winner. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Winner, to explain his vote. 6 7 SENATOR WINNER: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. You know, a number of years ago, 9 10 contrary to Senator Schneiderman had indicated, the Legislature did get together on 11 12 a bipartisan basis and pass what was then heralded by Common Cause as being the 13 strongest and the most effective and the most 14 15 vigorous ethics legislation in the country. And while things have changed over 16 the years to a certain degree, do any of you 17 18 really believe that in the event that this veto is overridden and this becomes law that 19 20 Sheldon Silver will sit down and negotiate a stronger ethics bill? I mean, that's 21 22 preposterous. 23 So if the only way you're going to 24 get him to the table and get the Assembly --25 which, by the way, for those of who you don't

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know, is controlled by the Democrat Party in
