(Whereupon, the assemblage 11 12 respected a moment of silence.) 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The reading of the Journal. 14 15 The Secretary will read. THE SECRETARY: In Senate, 16 17 Monday, March 1, the Senate met pursuant to 18 adjournment. The Journal of Sunday, February 28, was read and approved. On 19 20 motion, Senate adjourned. Cross, LaGrangeville. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 9 Senator Kruger. 10 SENATOR CARL KRUGER: Thank you, Mr. President. Will you please move those 11 nominations. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The question is on the nominations. All those in 14 15 favor please signify by saying aye. 16 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 17 18 Opposed, nay. 19 (No response.) 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 21 motion carries. The nominations are confirmed. 22 Returning to the order of business, 23 reports of select committees. 24 25 Communications and reports from

state officers. 1 2 Motions and resolutions. 3 Senator Klein. 4 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I 5 believe Senator Sampson has a resolution at 6 the desk. I ask that the resolution be read 7 in its entirety and move for its immediate 8 adoption. And I believe Senator Diaz wants to 9 speak on this resolution. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Klein, has this resolution been deemed 11 12 privileged and submitted by the office of the 13 Temporary President? 14 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has, 15 Mr. President. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: By Senator 19 Sampson, legislative resolution expressing sincerest heartfelt condolences to the victims 20 21 of the devastating magnitude 8.8 earthquake 22 and tsunami which hit Chile on February 27, 23 2010. "WHEREAS, On February 27, 2010, a 24 25 magnitude 8.8 earthquake struck the coast of

1	Chile. This horrific natural disaster has
2	taken the lives of at least 700 people and has
3	displaced more than 2 million Chileans; and
4	"WHEREAS, The Chilean earthquake
5	was followed by more than 76 aftershocks
6	greater than 4.9 magnitude and by a tsunami
7	that struck the coast of Chile and some of
8	Chile's Pacific island communities, causing
9	loss of life and property damage; and
10	"WHEREAS, This devastating
11	earthquake and tsunami are estimated to have
12	caused as much as \$30 billion in damage to
13	Chile's economy, more than half of which is
14	from the State of Santiago, which contains
15	Chile's capital, Santiago; and
16	"WHEREAS, New York State and
17	particularly New York City are home to a large
18	and thriving community of Chileans. And this
19	Legislative Body joins those communities in
20	solidarity during this time of sorrow; and
21	"WHEREAS, The Chilean community of
22	the State of New York maintains close ties
23	with family and friends in their native land
24	and are concerned about their health, safety,
25	and quality of life; and

1	"WHEREAS, This natural catastrophe
2	was 500 times more powerful than the
3	devastating Haitian earthquake of January 12,
4	2010, but by great good fortune, the loss of
5	life is thankfully much less; and
6	"WHEREAS, The United States has
7	prepositioned resources to assist Chile if, or
8	when, it asks for international assistance;
9	and
10	"WHEREAS, This Legislative Body
11	recognizes the epic devastation that has been
12	and continues to be caused by the natural
13	disaster that hit Chile, and particularly the
14	City of Concepcion and the Province of
15	Santiago, and the far-reaching loss of life
16	and damage that has been sustained by the
17	victims of this tragedy throughout the country
18	of Chile; and
19	"WHEREAS, On behalf of the people
20	of the State of New York, the members of this
21	Legislative Body offer their deepest
22	condolences to the families and loved ones of
23	those who were killed or injured, and pledge
24	their heartfelt support through this time of
25	grief, sorrow, and rebuilding; and

"WHEREAS, Above all else, the 1 2 generous people of the State of New York, as 3 represented by this Legislative Body, will be 4 steadfast in their solidarity with the victims 5 of this tragedy until stability returns to their country and hope is restored to their б 7 lives; now, therefore, be it 8 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 9 Body pause in its deliberations to express 10 sincerest heartfelt condolences to the victims of the devastating earthquake and tsunami that 11 12 hit the country of Chile, and to encourage New York's citizens, nonprofit humanitarian 13 14 organizations, the state and governmental 15 subdivisions to render humanitarian aid to our neighbors in Chile; and be it further 16 "RESOLVED, That copies of this 17 18 resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted to the Chilean Consul-General in New York 19 20 City; the Chilean President, the Honorable Michelle Bachelet; and the Chilean 21 President-Elect, Sebastian Pinera." 22 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Diaz. 24 25 SENATOR DIAZ: Thank you,

Mr. President.

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2	Mr. President, as you know, Haiti
3	some time ago, a few months ago, was
4	devastated by a hurricane {sic}. And the love
5	and the humanitarian action of the people of
6	the State of New York and this body was great.
7	I remember that I conducted a marathon in the
8	Bronx, and even our Governor, Governor David
9	Paterson, showed over there to help me
10	publicly ask for help.
11	So we all know that the people of
12	the State of New York and the members of this
13	body, when there is when we have been
14	needed, we have been there.
15	Now, on February 27th, Chile was
16	devastated. A hurricane {sic} of a magnitude
17	of 8.8 that was a biggie. And I just want
18	to ask, to all of you to thank you first,
19	all of you, for your help, for your prayers,
20	for all the things that you do when times like
21	this come. And that the same way we have done
22	it for every other country and every other
23	city, now Chile and the Chilean people are in
24	desperate need.
25	So, ladies and gentlemen, I thank

you one more time. And I thank you, 1 Mr. President. And I am just asking, I'm 2 3 trying to encourage the people of New York, 4 the not-for-profit humanitarian organizations, 5 the state, and governmental agencies to render whatever humanitarian help we could do for б 7 Chile and for the Chilean people. 8 There is many, many, many Chilean people living in the State of New York. 9 And 10 this body has always, has always been there for the needy people. 11 12 So thank you for this opportunity. And one more time, I thank you all, ladies and 13 14 gentlemen, and I ask you to join me in this 15 resolution and to be part of it, and to help and to pray, to pray for the people of Chile 16 that are going through difficult times. 17 18 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 19 20 you, Senator Diaz. The question is then on the 21 22 resolution. All those in favor please signify by saying aye. 23 (Response of "Aye.") 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

Opposed, nay. 1 2 (No response.) 3 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 4 resolution is adopted. 5 Senator Sampson has indicated that 6 he would like to open this resolution up to 7 the entire body for cosponsorship. Any 8 Senator wishing not to be on the resolution 9 please signify that fact by coming to the 10 desk. Senator Klein. 11 12 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I 13 believe Senator Sampson has another resolution at the desk. I ask that the title of the 14 15 resolution be read and move for its immediate adoption. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 17 18 Senator Klein, has this resolution been deemed 19 privileged and submitted by the office of the 20 Temporary President? 21 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has, 22 Mr. President. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The Secretary will read. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: By Senator

Sampson, Legislative Resolution Number 4040, 1 2 memorializing Governor David A. Paterson to 3 proclaim March 6, 2010, as Lymphedema 4 Awareness Day in the State of New York. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The question is on the resolution. All those in 6 7 favor please signify by saying aye. 8 (Response of "Aye.") 9 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 10 Opposed, nay. 11 (No response.) 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 13 resolution is adopted. Senators Sampson and Adams have 14 15 indicated that they would like to open this resolution up to the entire body for 16 cosponsorship. Any Senator wishing to not be 17 18 on the resolution please inform the desk. Senator Klein. 19 20 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I 21 believe Senator Stavisky has a resolution at 22 the desk. I ask that the title of the resolution be read and move for its immediate 23 adoption. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:

Senator Klein, has this resolution been deemed 1 2 privileged and submitted to the office of the 3 Temporary President? 4 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has, 5 Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: б The 7 Secretary will read. 8 THE SECRETARY: By Senator 9 Stavisky, Concurrent Resolution of the Senate and Assembly providing for the election of six 10 Regents of the University of the State of 11 New York. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 14 Secretary will call the roll on the concurrent 15 resolution. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, 16 17 will you please recognize Senator Larkin. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Excuse Senator Larkin. 19 me. 20 SENATOR LARKIN: Thank you, Mr. President. 21 22 You know, to be appointed to this 23 position is very, very important to all the members of our state. It's also important 24 25 that they, in their capacity as this appointed

official, that they positively respond to the 1 2 constituents. 3 Now, in my district, the Hudson 4 Valley, Mr. Phillips met with us and the 5 Chancellor, and she assured us that not only would things change but they would be at the б 7 next meeting of the whole Hudson Valley, seven 8 counties. It came and it went, and we got nothing from Mr. Phillips. 9 10 Mr. Phillips has never showed up at one of our meetings, our annual or quarterly, 11 12 never has responded to correspondence I sent to him. And so I'm offended that they want to 13 14 reappoint somebody who just cast aside seven 15 counties in the Hudson Valley. This is a serious appointment. 16 17 This is a very responsible appointment. But 18 there's no positive response of what the people of the Hudson Valley need. 19 The 20 commitments that were made by the Chancellor, when she said "We will be there, we will 21 22 answer you, and we will do this, this, this" -- fine. Talk is cheap. People in the 23 Hudson Valley are asking a lot of questions: 24 25 What do you do with Congress? What are you

doing with the state? But there was nobody 1 2 there to respond. 3 So in all good conscience, if we're 4 putting all of them on the same ballot, I have 5 to vote no. Why? Because we've been let down. We've had someone who was appointed, б 7 now wants to be reelected, and he hasn't 8 fulfilled his obligations. 9 And everybody said, "We will. We 10 understand that we weren't there, but we'll make it." Mr. President and my colleagues, 11 how do you vote for someone who doesn't 12 fulfill his responsibilities? I say no. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 14 Thank 15 you, Senator Larkin. Senator Maziarz. 16 SENATOR MAZIARZ: 17 Thank you very 18 much, Mr. President. 19 A little bit of the opposite end of 20 the spectrum of my good colleague Senator 21 Larkin. 22 I rise to speak in favor of one of 23 these appointments, Bob Bennett from Western New York, a former chancellor of the Board of 24 25 Regents.

Bob Bennett is extremely positive 1 2 for the Western New York community. Whenever 3 you want to meet with Regent Bennett, invite 4 him into the schools, he's always been 5 extremely accommodating in just returning phone calls, willing to meet with individual б 7 constituents, entire school districts. He 8 visits schools throughout Western New York. 9 I don't think there's any request 10 that I have ever made of Regent Bob Bennett 11 that he has not responded to in most 12 instances, when he could, in a very favorable 13 and positive way. 14 So, Mr. President, we have to vote 15 on all of these individuals together, and I just want to put in a very positive word for 16 Robert Bennett from Erie County for his 17 18 reappointment as a Regent to the State Education Department. 19 20 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 21 Thank 22 you, Senator Maziarz. 23 Senator Marcellino. SENATOR MARCELLINO: 24 Thank you, 25 Mr. President.

I also rise in a positive vein, 1 2 although I do recognize my learned colleague Senator Larkin's comments and I do appreciate 3 4 his point of view. If you have someone who 5 has said that they will do certain things and then don't fulfill their obligations, I agree б 7 you want to speak up and, in his case, vote 8 against. 9 I, on the other hand, have a 10 Regent, Roger Tilles, who is from Nassau County and has been just the opposite -- been 11 12 attentive, been outgoing, willing to meet with every school group and PTA and school board 13 that you could name, has been around the 14 15 district, been around the state, thoroughly enjoys his job and I think does it with honor 16 and with credibility. 17 18 He, I believe, is the only Regent with children in the school systems, actually 19 20 has children in the public schools. So I 21 think that's a grounds alone to keep him 22 there, because it brings the perspective of a 23 parent to the situation and to the Board of 24 Regents. 25 Roger is a very capable fellow, and

I know him for a long period of time. 1 He's honorable, he's capable. His family have been 2 3 well-known. He used to be the president of 4 Long Island University, so he is known for his 5 attention to educational matters both at the secondary, elementary, and the upper levels. б 7 He is an excellent Regent, has 8 acquitted himself well and I know will acquit himself in the future very well. He is an 9 10 excellent appointment, and I'm proud to 11 support him. 12 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 13 Thank 14 you, Senator Marcellino. 15 Senator Ranzenhofer. SENATOR RANZENHOFER: 16 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 17 18 I'd also like to rise in support of one of Regents, Robert Bennett, who is a 19 20 resident of my district. I've only been in the Senate here 21 for a short time, but in the 13 months that 22 I've been working with Mr. Bennett, he is very 23 attentive to the needs of the district. 24 We 25 had a meeting just a couple of weeks ago where

he didn't have to attend, but not only did he 1 2 attend but he was one of the leaders at the 3 forum. 4 He is known throughout Western 5 New York for his leadership, for his expertise. He has been a Regent for a number 6 7 of years and just has a reputation that is 8 beyond reproach, will continue, in my 9 judgment, to do an excellent job representing 10 the State of New York. 11 Thank you. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank you, Senator Ranzenhofer. 13 Senator LaValle. 14 15 SENATOR LaVALLE: Thank you, Mr. President. 16 I think it has been a long time 17 18 since this house has passed a concurrent resolution to deal with the election of the 19 20 members of the Board of Regents. I think 21 Warren Anderson was the majority leader the 22 last time that this was accomplished. 23 I want to speak on the reelection 24 of Roger Tilles, who has spent a good part of 25 his life, both in the State of Michigan and

here in the State of New York, dealing with 1 2 education issues. 3 Roger has distinguished himself in 4 many ways. One, I believe we in the Tenth 5 Judicial District are very, very fortunate to have such a hardworking and dedicated Regent. б 7 A lot of people in the State of 8 New York do not know that there is a Board of 9 Regents and that they have, in their judicial 10 district, a Regent. We, on Long Island, I think a high percentage of people know of the 11 12 work of Roger Tilles. Whenever there's a meeting, a gathering on education issues, 13 14 Roger is there, articulates on the board point 15 of view for the people in the Tenth Judicial District. 16 He is a smart guy who brings a lot 17 18 of class to the Board of Regents, and we are indeed fortunate to, by concurrent resolution, 19 20 reelect Roger Tilles. 21 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 22 Thank 23 you, Senator LaValle. Senator Little. 24 25 SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you,

Mr. President.

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2 I rise in support of Regent James Dawson, who is from the town of Peru and has 3 4 been a member of the Board of Regents -- I 5 believe this will be his fourth term, at least his third term, if not his fourth term, in б 7 office. 8 And in that time, despite the fact that his Regents school district I believe 9 10 covers 170 school districts or something and is one of the largest in the state, he visits 11 12 each of those schools every year and has certainly been available to anyone who wanted 13 to talk to him about issues that were 14 15 important to their school. So I appreciate his attentiveness, 16 and I also appreciate his experience in the 17 18 elementary and secondary schools as well as he has served as a professor at SUNY Plattsburgh 19 20 in their geology department and certainly knows the issues at our SUNY system as well. 21 22 So I thank him for his work in the 23 past, and I am proud and pleased to stand in support of him for another term on the Board 24 25 of Regents.

Thank you. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 3 you, Senator Little. 4 Senator Stewart-Cousins. 5 SENATOR STEWART-COUSINS: Yes, thank you, Mr. President. б 7 I rise to, I'm sorry to say, 8 disagree with my good friend and colleague 9 Senator Larkin with regard to my constituent 10 and trustee Harry Phillips. 11 He has been extraordinary in terms 12 of being available. I was surprised, actually, to hear what has happened. 13 And I 14 can only say is that whether it is a community 15 meeting about what's going on in the present or the future, the focus on technology, the 16 focus on creating opportunities, the focus on 17 18 keeping ahead of the curve has always been what has underscored what Trustee Phillips has 19 20 brought to the Regents. So I certainly wholeheartedly 21 22 endorse his reappointment and certainly will work with Senator Larkin to make sure that he 23 has the great experience that I've had with 24 25 Regent Harry Phillips.

ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 1 2 you, Senator Stewart-Cousins. 3 Senator Stavisky, to close. 4 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. This is a unique situation where 6 7 Regents can be chosen either through a joint 8 session or by concurrent resolution. And I'm delighted that we have chosen this pathway 9 10 this year, because it makes it almost more 11 personal. 12 We have six Regents being reappointed today. And if you think about it, 13 they bring a sense of concern for young 14 15 people, a spirit of volunteering. They don't get paid, they get reimbursed for actual 16 expenses. This is an unpaid position, a 17 18 position that goes back, incidentally, to the days of Alexander Hamilton, who served as a 19 20 Regent of the State of New York. The history is a long and glorious 21 22 one. They have a caring attitude toward young 23 people. But for the most part, they are available to meet with their constituencies. 24 25 And I will absolutely call Regent Phillips to

find out what the problem is, because I am 1 2 sure that he is as concerned as everybody else about the future of young people. 3 4 But think about the variety of the 5 people who we are confirming here today. We have the president, for example, Karen Brooks 6 7 Hopkins, who heads the Brooklyn Academy of 8 James Dawson is a geologist. Music, BAM. 9 Robert Bennett was the CEO of a large 10 not-for-profit. Harry Phillips, an insurance broker. 11 12 Roger Tilles, a lawyer and an investment banker. And let me add one other 13 job that he held; he worked for the Michigan 14 15 Legislature. So he understands the role of the Legislature and the individual 16 legislators. He's an attorney who worked I 17 18 believe for the speaker of the Michigan State House. 19 20 And we have Dr. Lester Young, who 21 lives in my district, a respected -- retired, 22 but respected educator. He was a community 23 school district superintendent who rose through the ranks to become a leading educator 24 25 in New York State.

So I am delighted to support all 1 2 six of the nominees. I think they bring 3 dignity and grace and dedication to the office. 4 5 And all you have to do is go across the street to the State Education Department, б 7 attend one of their meetings, and everything 8 is so seeped in history that you watch the 9 deliberations and you realize this is a 10 history that goes back to the founding of our nation. And I'm just delighted that today 11 we're going to continue that tradition as we 12 confirm, in a concurrent resolution, these six 13 individuals. 14 15 So thank you, Mr. President, and I move the nominations. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 17 18 you, Senator Stavisky. The Secretary will call the roll on 19 20 the concurrent resolution. (The Secretary called the roll.) 21 Ayes, 59. 22 THE SECRETARY: Nays, 23 1. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 24 The 25 resolution is adopted.

Senator Klein. 1 2 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at 3 this time I move that we pass the Resolution 4 Calendar in its entirety, with the exception 5 of Senate Resolutions 3646, 4062, 4067, and 4086. б 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: All 8 those in favor of adopting the Resolution Calendar in its entirety, with the exception 9 10 of Senate Resolutions 3646, 4062, 4067 and 4086, please signify by saying aye. 11 12 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 13 14 Opposed, nay. 15 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 16 The Resolution Calendar is adopted. 17 18 Senator Klein. SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at 19 20 this time I move we take up Senate Resolution 21 Number 4086, by Senator Sampson. I ask that the title of the resolution be read and move 22 23 for its immediate adoption. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 24 The 25 Secretary will read.

THE SECRETARY: By Senators 1 2 Sampson and Adams, legislative resolution 3 honoring New York Police Department Inspector 4 Timothy Pearson upon the occasion of his 5 selection as Person of the Year by the 6 Guardians Association of the New York City 7 Police Department on March 5, 2010. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Are there any Senators wishing to be heard on the 9 10 resolution? The question is then on the 11 resolution. All those in favor please signify 12 13 by saying aye. (Response of "Aye.") 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Opposed, nay. 16 17 (No response.) 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 19 resolution is adopted. 20 Senator Klein. 21 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at 22 this time I move we take up my resolution, Senate Resolution 4062. I ask that the title 23 of the resolution be read and move for its 24 25 immediate adoption.

ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 1 Secretary will read. 2 3 THE SECRETARY: By Senator Klein, 4 Legislative Resolution Number 4062, 5 commemorating the 40th Anniversary of the New York State Consumer Protection Board. б 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 8 Senator Klein. 9 SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you very, 10 much, Mr. President. 11 I'm proud to sponsor this 12 resolution honoring the 40th anniversary of the New York State Consumer Protection Board. 13 Since 1970, the New York State Consumer 14 15 Protection Board has worked very diligently to protect, educate, and represent the consumers 16 of our state. 17 18 I know firsthand. One of the pieces of legislation that I'm very proud of 19 20 that I worked very, very closely with the Consumer Protection Board is New York State's 21 "Do Not Call" List. I sponsored the bill in 22 23 the Assembly at the time; Senator Chuck Fuschillo sponsored the bill in this house. 24 25 And it's proved to be a very, very effective

tool in curbing all of those unwanted 1 2 telemarketing calls. As a matter of fact, the state law in New York was so successful that 3 4 it really proved to be a model for national 5 legislation which is now in effect. Again, they have done such a great б 7 job over their 40 years, the Consumer 8 Protection Board, in calling attention to a whole range of issues -- predatory lending, 9 10 identity theft, personal privacy issues --11 that I'm proud to recognize them on their 40th 12 anniversary. Also, I want to recognize a special 13 14 guest we have with us in the chamber today, 15 Mindy Bockstein, who is the chairperson and executive director of the New York State 16 Consumer Protection Board. I know Mindy has 17 18 been, over the years, a dedicated public servant. I remember when she worked for Dan 19 20 Feldman as his counsel in the State Assembly. And she's still serving our great state in her 21 22 new capacity. I thank you, Mindy. 23 And I thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The

question is then on the resolution. All those 1 2 in favor please signify by saying aye. 3 (Response of "Aye.") 4 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 5 Opposed, nay. 6 (No response.) 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 8 Senator Oppenheimer, on the resolution. 9 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: On the 10 resolution, please. Harry Phillips has been our Regent 11 12 in Westchester County. And I was listening to Senator Larkin, and there may have been some 13 disagreements there as far as perhaps him not 14 15 being as available up there. But I can only say there is no one more available in my 16 county. And whenever I call upon him, he is 17 18 always available. 19 And his expertise in the area of 20 computer science and his wish to see every 21 child in the State of New York educated 22 completely in the computer and, you know, the 23 world that is going to be facing them in the future. And he wants every child to be 24 25 totally computer literate.

So I feel he's an important member 1 2 of the Regents. And his particular expertise I think is something that we have to certainly 3 4 focus our attention on in coming years. So 5 I'm very happy to support Harry Phillips. 6 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 7 Senator Oppenheimer, your comments will be 8 incorporated by reference to the concurrent 9 resolution on the Regents. 10 Now we are back to Resolution 4062. All those in favor please signify by saying 11 12 aye. 13 (Response of "Aye.") ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 14 15 Opposed, nay. (No response.) 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 17 The 18 resolution is adopted. Senator Klein. 19 20 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I 21 have one brief announcement. 22 We were unable to do it yesterday 23 because we didn't know it at the time, but I 24 want to congratulate one of our colleagues 25 from Buffalo and Niagara. Yesterday was his

40th birthday. Senator Antoine Thompson, 1 2 everyone. 3 (Applause.) 4 SENATOR KLEIN: Also, 5 Mr. President, at this time if you can recognize Senator Andrea Stewart-Cousins, I 6 7 believe she has some special guests she'd like 8 to introduce. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 10 Senator Andrea Stewart-Cousins. SENATOR STEWART-COUSINS: Thank 11 12 you. Thank you, Mr. President. 13 I am just rising to recognize the 14 young people from Roosevelt High School of 15 Yonkers, New York, who are here with their teacher, Mr. Frank Leonetti. The three 16 students -- Maneka Phiri, Dominique Seabrooks, 17 18 Shanice Martin -- are part of a Skills USA 19 program. 20 Roosevelt has been outstanding in 21 participating in Skills USA and has brought 22 their message of teen dating violence and how 23 we must not ever, ever, ever think that we should be exposed to dating violence to their 24 25 peers.

The Skills USA team has gone from 1 2 Roosevelt across the country and has come in 3 second last year. I think these young ladies 4 will do it again and maybe even come in first. 5 But what's most important is that б they're starting at a very young age to be 7 advocates and to make sure that their peers 8 understand that it is never acceptable to be abused, even -- certainly -- not in the name 9 10 of love. So I wanted to congratulate them. 11 They're also here supporting a bill 12 that Senator Maziarz is sponsoring, and I'm a cosponsor, with many of my colleagues, and 13 14 that's Senate Bill 2537, which asks that 15 information about dating violence be included in the curriculum. 16 They understand that the economics 17 18 of our time might not allow for a complete curriculum change, and they are now working to 19 20 create policy that will just be part of what happens when kids go to school from 7 to 12 to 21 22 know that they are very precious and need never be subjected to violence. 23 So I did want to recognize these 24 25 three young ladies and their teacher and thank

them for taking the word about teen violence 1 2 and teen dating to their peers. Thank you so 3 much for your advocacy. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 5 you, Senator Stewart-Cousins. б And congratulations. 7 (Applause.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 9 Senator Klein. 10 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at 11 this time I move we take up Senate Resolution 12 Number 4067, by Senator Thompson. I ask that the title of the resolution be read and move 13 14 for its immediate adoption. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The Secretary will read. 16 17 THE SECRETARY: By Senator 18 Thompson, Legislative Resolution Number 4067, 19 memorializing Governor David A. Paterson to 20 proclaim March 2, 2010, as Minority/Women Business Enterprise Awareness Day in the State 21 of New York. 22 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 24 Senator Thompson. 25 SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you,

1	Mr. President. I am very humbled to be here
2	today to have the opportunity to speak on a
3	very important resolution. Today is Minority
4	and Women Business Enterprise Awareness Day in
5	the State Capitol. And we have businesspeople
6	here from all over the state, from the state
7	line, from one end of the state to the other
8	end of the state, from Buffalo all the way to
9	Long Island.
10	And these businesspeople, both men
11	and women, from every walk of life are in the
12	State Capitol pushing hard for expansion of
13	economic opportunities for minority- and
14	women-owned business enterprise development in
15	this state.
16	And so I'm really happy about
17	today. This has been a long time coming.
18	Many women-owned businesses and minority-owned
19	businesses have struggled for years to have
20	their fair share to access, to the procurement
21	market but not only as contractors and
22	construction firms but also as architects and
23	engineers, investment companies. And so I'm
24	really thrilled about this opportunity.
25	Last year we were able to work

together to make sure that we passed more than 1 2 four pieces of legislation through this 3 Senate. In one year last year we were able to 4 do that to help minority- and women-owned 5 businesses throughout this state. But we still have a lot of work to 6 7 do. And so today businesspeople came from 8 throughout the state saying that they want to 9 take advantage of the opportunities that this 10 state has to offer. And I say to them thank 11 you. 12 And to my colleagues who have worked hard -- my colleague Senator Andrea 13 Stewart-Cousins, who is the cochair of the 14 15 MWBE Task Force in the Senate, also my colleague Ruth Hassell-Thompson, who also has 16 been fighting this fight -- in addition to so 17 18 many people in this chamber who fought so hard for so many years. 19 20 We have a big job this year. People want to reform Article 15A, we want to 21 give it some more teeth, we want to expand the 22 road to opportunity, we want to make sure that 23 we increase the level of participation for 24 25 qualified minority- and women-owned

businesses.

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2	I can tell you, in closing, that
3	this is a tremendous day. And when I look at
4	the women builders group and I look at the
5	various construction and investment firm
6	business owners that are here today, I know
7	that we are on the right track. And this is
8	the third wave of the civil rights movement in
9	the United States of America, and it has
10	landed in Albany. And I'm telling you, I am
11	so happy to see it.
12	Thank you, and God bless.
13	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank
14	you, Senator.
15	The question is then on the
16	resolution. All those in favor please signify
17	by saying aye.
18	(Response of "Aye.")
19	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN:
20	Opposed, nay.
21	(No response.)
22	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The
23	resolution is adopted.
24	Senator Thompson has indicated that
25	he would like to open this resolution up to

the entire body for cosponsorship. 1 Any Senator wishing to not be on the resolution 2 please inform the desk. 3 4 Senator Klein. 5 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, can we please take up Senate Resolution 3646, б 7 by Senator Larkin. I ask that the title of 8 the resolution be read and move for its immediate adoption. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The Secretary will read. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: By Senator Larkin, Legislative Resolution Number 3646, 13 14 commemorating the 45th Anniversary of the 15 Selma-to-Montgomery March for Voting Rights that began on Sunday, March 7, 1965. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 17 18 Senator Larkin. 19 SENATOR LARKIN: Thank you, 20 Mr. President. You know, it just seems like 21 22 yesterday when this march took place. Mr. Costa had a full head of hair. I figure 23 I'd get somebody woke up. 24 25 You know, I look back on that march

and with thinking about what happened, you 1 know, we talk about the 7th, we talk about the 2 21st when it started. But, you know, the 14th 3 of March, 1965, a chief of police by the name 4 5 of Bull Connor had a bullhorn and had hoses on a bridge. And as the marchers came to the б 7 bridge, they blew them off with the hoses, and 8 everything was gone. 9 About three days later, in 10 Washington, the Army Chief of Staff called a meeting of quite a few people and said, "We're 11 going back." And, specifically: 12 "Bill Larkin, you're going back tomorrow. 13 And 14 you'll meet with the governor and all others, 15 and then we'll plan how this procession," as he called it, would start. 16 I had the fortune of going to see a 17 18 full colonel in the National Guard of Alabama, told him what my mission was, that I needed to 19 20 see the governor of the State of Alabama and 21 present him. Mr. Wallace took the proclamation 22 from the President of the United States and he 23 said, "Here, throw it in the fire. We won't 24 25 do anything."

1	Well, at midnight I went back and I
2	said, "Here are your orders, and you're
3	activated." And the governor was very shrewd
4	and arrogant is a better word, because he
5	said "I wouldn't activate these troops for
6	anything." But his rationale that he tried to
7	make public was the fact that by Alabama not
8	activating the troops, the United States
9	government would pay for all of the troops
10	from Alabama and every place else.
11	We brought units in from the State
12	of Washington, at that time one of the largest
13	communications centers ever. We brought
14	people in from Stewart, 24th Division, 101st
15	Airborne, the 11th Air Assault from Benning,
16	Military Intelligence, and Military Police
17	battalions.
18	You know, when we met with Bull
19	Connor, he was very nice and he looked at me
20	and he said, "You know, Major, go back there
21	to Montgomery, to Maxwell Field. We got a lot
22	of you over there. This is my town."
23	And, you know, there's things in
24	your life you remember and you like to say. I
25	said: "Yes. But, Mr. Connor, step out of

line and we'll put you in jail and charge you 1 with inciting a riot." 2 Well, we marched, and for five days 3 we never saw or heard of Connor. Did the 4 march go smooth? Yes. But one of my 5 grandchildren said, "Did you ever meet 6 7 Dr. King and speak to him?" I said yes, for 8 about ten short minutes. I dealt with Dr. Abernathy, who was a very sharp 9 10 individual, knew the march, how they were going to do, looked over the plans that we 11 12 worked on for the previous week, and everything moved. 13 14 You know, the sad part about it was 15 that on the 25th, when we completed it, the marchers were going back to Selma, some 16 marchers were venturing off the sides of the 17 18 road, and what happened? A lady from the United Auto Workers, Detroit, Michigan --19 20 Viola Liuzzo -- was killed. Sad. But other 21 than that, the march went along as we planned. As a matter of fact, for somebody's 22 23 information, one of the marchers in the first row that day was our Governor's father, Basil 24 25 Paterson.

But it's 45 years. Today, sad to 1 2 say, that of those who were on the 3 organization task force, I am the only one 4 still living. 5 This really was a great event in the fact that President Johnson couldn't get б 7 the votes so that we would have the Civil 8 Rights Voting Act in 1965. He had to go back 9 to the Republicans, led by Senator Nolan from 10 California, and Nolan gave him the votes in order to pass that bill. 11 12 Sad to say, a former vice president of the United States' father sat on his hands, 13 14 from Tennessee, and didn't support us. But 15 right after this, Nolan gave President Johnson the votes, and the Civil Rights Voting Act 16 took place. 17 18 So when you all talk about how bad we Republicans are, something like this 19 20 probably would have never happened, at least at that time. 21 Thank you very much, Mr. President. 22 23 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 24 you, Senator Larkin. 25 The question is then on the

resolution. All those in favor please signify 1 2 by saying aye. 3 (Response of "Aye.") 4 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 5 Opposed, nay. 6 (No response.) 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 8 resolution is adopted. 9 Senator Larkin has indicated that 10 he would like to open up the resolution for 11 cosponsorship by the entire house. Any Senator not wishing to be on the resolution 12 please notify the desk. 13 Senator Klein. 14 15 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, is there any further business at the desk? 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 17 18 Senator Klein, the desk is clear. 19 SENATOR KLEIN: There being none, 20 Mr. President, I move we adjourn until 21 Wednesday, March 3rd, at 11:00 a.m. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: There 23 being no further business to come before the Senate, on motion, the Senate stands adjourned 24 until Wednesday, March 3rd, at 11:00 a.m. 25
