legislation would allow any local government 1 2 entity to waive the fees, penalties and interest for the redemption of foreclosed 3 4 residential real estate that's been caused by 5 financial hardship as a result of military activation. 6 7 We know of a number of military 8 personnel who have served multiple tours abroad, and on a number of occasions they've 9 10 either lost their job or they've been away from their job for such a long period of time 11 12 that they fell behind on the payments of their mortgages and in some cases threatened to lose 13 their home through foreclosure. 14 15 This very important piece of legislation, which we also approved last year, 16 will enable those particular families to have 17 18 the peace of mind and to give the local governmental entities the ability to waive the 19 20 penalties, fees and interest if in fact the homes are foreclosed. 21 22 In a number of examples, 23 Mr. President, that will result in a savings of literally thousands upon thousands of 24 25 dollars. And this is our way as the state

government to enable the localities to help 1 2 those particular families to save those homes. 3 Thank you, Mr. President. I vote in the affirmative. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank you, Senator Foley. б 7 Senator Foley to be recorded in the 8 affirmative. 9 Announce the results. 10 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 58. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 23 Announce the results. 24 25 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 58.

ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 1 2 bill is passed. 3 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 4 243, substituted earlier today --5 SENATOR KLEIN: Lay the bill aside for the day, please. б 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 8 bill is laid aside for the day. Senator Klein, that completes the 9 10 reading of the noncontroversial calendar. Senator Klein. 11 12 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, can we now please go to a reading of the 13 controversial calendar. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The Secretary will ring the bell. 16 Members are asked to come to the 17 18 chamber for the controversial reading of the calendar. 19 20 The Secretary will read. 21 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 22 226, by Senator Oppenheimer, Senate Print 23 5523A, an act to amend the Education Law and the General Municipal Law. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Explanation,

please.

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2 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 3 Senator Oppenheimer, an explanation, please. 4 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Yes, thank 5 Happy to provide it. you. This is something that's very long 6 7 coming. And indeed, we have voted on very 8 similar legislation. There was a Saland bill, I think, two years ago; much of it had -- was 9 10 contained in that, not all of it. And I think on many occasions we have discussed these 11 12 bills individually. And I think what we're trying to do 13 14 is respond to the outcry that we're hearing in 15 our neighborhoods, not just my neighborhood. And I'm hearing from parents and from school 16 board members and from superintendents. 17 And 18 everybody is saying we have to do something. 19 And we've been talking about 20 mandate relief forever, at least a couple of decades. And now is the time to act. Because 21 if we don't have the revenues to send down to 22 our school districts, then we have to relieve 23 them of some of the expenses. And that is the 24 25 whole theory behind this bill.

1	I'll briefly go through the various
2	provisions of the bill.
3	First, it prohibits the
4	implementation of new state mandates after the
5	start of a school fiscal year unless for
6	specific reasons, like if it's an executive
7	order or to comply with a federal rule.
8	Second, it authorizes school
9	districts to get into shared contracts with
10	other school districts for transportation
11	through private contractors. That most of the
12	us commonly call piggybacking, and it's
13	certainly a way to cut costs by sharing.
14	It requires a BOCES to convene, on
15	or before July 1st of 2011, committees of
16	school and community leaders in cooperation
17	with the district superintendent that's the
18	BOCES superintendent to create a report to
19	the commissioner examining options for
20	consolidation and shared services, looking for
21	opportunities for things like regional
22	administrative costs, you know, back office
23	costs, joint transportation possibilities,
24	purchasing of health insurance, conceivably
25	purchasing of bulk supplies of prescription

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1	medicines. In other words, trying to bring
2	the benefits of many groups working together
3	to reduce the costs of each of these groups.
4	Next, it has in it authorizing
5	internal and claims auditing as an aidable
6	shared service.
7	Now, you may remember that in 2002,
8	under fiscal accountability legislation, we
9	did allow schools to use BOCES for claims
10	auditing purposes. But what you probably
11	didn't focus in on is that it was never
12	aidable, so therefore it wasn't utilized
13	because it wasn't a figure that could be
14	aidable by the state, so it wasn't utilized.
15	So what we're saying here is it should be
16	aidable.
17	Next, we amend the calculation of
18	the contingency cap to use a five-year rolling
19	average of the Consumer Price Index, the CPI.
20	And that is a more accurate measure. And
21	maybe if schools had reserve funds, we
22	wouldn't need it. But what this does and
23	most actuarial firms use this the five-year
24	rolling average smooths out the variations
25	from year to year, makes it more accurate.

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And in this case, it's essential, because the 1 2 CPI last year was a negative figure. And so the school budgets, if they went to 3 4 contingency, would be required to have a 5 negative factor over the prior year's budget. We really had never counted on б 7 deflationary time, and we are in it, and so we 8 have to act accordingly. 9 Next, we amend the General 10 Municipal Law to authorize the creation of reserve funds for future employer 11 12 contributions to the TRS, the Teacher Retirement System. 13 14 As you all know, the reserve funds 15 already exist for ERS, for the Employee Reserve System. And it really doesn't -- I 16 think it was just an oversight that it was not 17 18 done for the TRS when it was done for the ERS. 19 Well, those are the main features. 20 So I will finish. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 22 you, Senator Oppenheimer. 23 Senator Libous. SENATOR LIBOUS: Would you please 24 25 recognize Senator Saland.

ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Sure. 1 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 5 Senator Saland. SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, 6 Mr. President. 7 8 Senator Oppenheimer, as I read this 9 bill --10 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Would you like Senator Oppenheimer to yield to a 11 12 question? SENATOR SALAND: Yes, thank you, 13 14 Mr. President. My apologies. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Oppenheimer, will you yield to Senator 16 Saland? 17 18 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Yes, happy to do so. 19 20 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you. 21 Senator Oppenheimer, as you noted in your opening remarks, some of the 22 derivation of this bill comes from bills that 23 I had helped draft in prior sessions. 24 25 But as I read this bill, I found

particularly interesting on the first page, 1 2 you talk about, beginning at line 13, the fact 3 that a mandate shouldn't be imposed during a 4 school year. And as you may well recall, the 5 genesis of that was action taken by the Board of Regents, maybe it was December of '06 or 6 December of '07, when they required local 7 8 school districts in the midst of a school year to pay for these math and science calculators, 9 10 which I think statewide wound up costing them some \$100 million. 11 And this house has, I believe 12 unanimously, passed in response to that abuse 13 14 this particular language. 15 The issue which I would raise is not what you intend to do with this particular 16 language, but in the absence of any other 17 18 qualifying language, basically this bill is saying that mandates are deferred, not 19 20 eliminated. They're not banned, but they're deferred. 21 22 There is no qualifying language which we have seen in other bills which 23 prohibits unfunded mandates or caps them at 24 25 very limited amounts, such as \$10,000 per

municipality or some million statewide. 1 2 So in the absence of that language, notwithstanding the fact that I believe we've 3 4 seen that other bill, were this bill to pass 5 both houses and get to the Governor's desk without that language, additional language б 7 being in here, we would not have banned 8 mandates, we merely would have deferred them for a period of up to one year. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 11 Senator Oppenheimer. 12 SENATOR SALAND: Would you agree 13 with my interpretation? And I would pose that 14 as a question. 15 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Yes, actually I would. 16 17 But I would put a caveat saying 18 that in this case it would probably be something like a federal regulational 19 20 requirement that we would have to probably do. In other words, it would be something that 21 22 would be almost mandated upon us. But you're right, it would have to 23 24 wait -- unless it was extraordinary, it would 25 have to wait until the end of the school year.

Well, I would 1 SENATOR SALAND: 2 hope that you would entertain an amendment, if 3 there's some reciprocity or interest from the 4 other house, that would basically require the 5 elimination of mandates except in those exceptions where some other state body -б 7 i.e., the Regents or the Ed Department --8 attempts to impose something which would fall after the start of a school year. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Oppenheimer, do yield to an additional 11 12 question from Senator Saland? SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: 13 Yes, we 14 will be happy to discuss that with you. 15 Now, is there another question? SENATOR SALAND: So you would be 16 amenable to that? 17 18 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Yes, I would be happy to sit down and talk with you. 19 20 SENATOR SALAND: Over on page 3 of the bill --21 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 22 Are you asking Senator Oppenheimer to yield again? 23 SENATOR SALAND: No, I haven't 24 25 gotten to my point yet. Then I'll ask her to

yield. I'm bringing her attention to where 1 2 I'm going. 3 Through you, Mr. President, if you 4 would take a look at Section 6, the language 5 added at line 32, under "aidable shared services, claims auditing or internal auditing б services." 7 8 The intent of the bill is one which I certainly -- this section, I certainly 9 10 wholeheartedly agree with. And the question which I have -- and I believe I may have seen 11 another bill, either today in committee or 12 perhaps through the Education Committee, which 13 is an SED bill that makes claims auditing 14 15 state aidable. Is there a separate bill that does 16 that as well? 17 18 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: That's a stand-alone bill. There were two bills that 19 20 involved auditing. And one was the permitting deputy claims auditors within school 21 districts, and the other is to have a 22 centralized, regionalized center for claims 23 auditing through BOCES. And then having that 24 25 service, which was permitted as of '05, then

having that purpose aidable. As all other 1 2 BOCES services are. 3 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, 4 Senator Oppenheimer. 5 On the bill, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: б 7 Senator Saland, on the bill. 8 SENATOR SALAND: Mr. President, I 9 certainly would not want to suggest that 10 there's anybody who should, for the reasons that I've discussed, have problems with this 11 12 bill or not support this bill. 13 But nonetheless, there are problems 14 with this bill that require being addressed. 15 Because when we act on this bill, assuming it were to become law, we will have not banned 16 unfunded mandates, we merely would have 17 18 deferred them for one year. 19 And what I find particularly 20 interesting with regard to making the claims 21 auditing state aidable, when this bill was negotiated -- at that time I believe the 22 23 comptroller was Comptroller Hevesi -- there were negotiations involving the Executive, the 24 25 Comptroller and the Assembly as well. I had

1	insisted that the claims auditing function be
2	state aidable and was assured by the State
3	Education Department that it was state
4	aidable. And I had told them that there was
5	no way that I would attempt to move the bill
6	unless that function was state aidable. And
7	based upon their assurances, we moved the
8	bill.
9	Subsequently, they took the
10	position for reasons known only to them
11	that this was not a function that could be
12	state aidable.
13	So I'm certainly pleased once again
14	to try and impress upon everybody the
15	importance of this being state aidable. And
16	notwithstanding the tardiness of the State
17	Education Department in coming to a conclusion
18	that they previously had come to and
19	abandoned, I welcome their support, if in fact
20	they're supporting this, and believe it's long
21	overdue.
22	Thank you, Mr. President.
23	ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank
24	you, Senator Saland.
25	Are there any other Senators

wishing to be heard? 1 2 Senator Oppenheimer. 3 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: I just want to corroborate what Senator Saland said. 4 5 The commitment that was made, you are absolutely right, has not been followed б 7 through. And that's why we are putting this 8 in this bill, and hopefully we can see that commitment honored. 9 10 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 11 Are 12 there any other Senators wishing to be heard? Hearing none, the debate is closed. 13 The Secretary will please ring the bells. 14 15 Read the last section. THE SECRETARY: Section 9. This 16 act shall take effect immediately. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Call the roll. 19 20 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 21 Announce the results. 22 23 THE SECRETARY: Those recorded in the negative on Calendar Number 226 are 24 25 Senators Duane and Huntley.

Absent from voting according to 1 2 Rule 9: Senators Adams, Bonacic, Sampson and 3 McDonald. 4 Ayes, 52. Nays, 2. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The bill is passed. б 7 The Secretary will continue to 8 read. 9 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 10 228, by Senator Oppenheimer, Senate Print 11 5637, an act to amend the Education Law. 12 SENATOR LIBOUS: Explanation, 13 please. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 14 15 Senator Oppenheimer, an explanation has been requested. 16 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: 17 Okay. This 18 bill would allow the school districts to appoint a deputy claims auditor to perform the 19 20 same duties as the claims auditor. And the reason for this I think is 21 easy to understand. If the claims auditor 22 23 within the district is ill or away on a holiday, there is nobody that's going to 24 25 approve the claims. And as you know, it is

the school boards that are supposed to do it, 1 2 but in the place of school boards, now we have 3 auditors and the claims auditor certifies the 4 claims. But if something happens to the 5 original claims auditor, there's nobody to б approve the payment of bills. 7 So this says that there should be a 8 deputy claims auditor. It doesn't have to be a separate position, it can be in addition to 9 10 another position that someone on staff holds. 11 But there needs to be more than one person. 12 And that's why we're putting in this request for a deputy claims auditor. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 14 Thank 15 you, Senator Oppenheimer. Senator Saland. 16 SENATOR SALAND: Will Senator 17 18 Oppenheimer yield to one question? 19 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 20 Senator Oppenheimer, do you yield to a question from Senator Saland? 21 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: 22 Sure. 23 SENATOR SALAND: I notice that this bill is at the request of the State 24 25 Education Department. And apropos of the

exchange that we had a bit earlier regarding 1 2 the auditing function being state aidable, is 3 there anything in this bill -- that, again, is 4 a program bill from SED -- that makes that 5 claims auditing function state aidable? SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: б Through 7 you, Mr. President. Actually, as I had 8 mentioned a moment ago, the person may not necessarily have to be an additional 9 10 personnel; it might be someone in the same 11 department or in another department. But they 12 would be there to certify that the claims are to be paid and to review them. And it doesn't 13 14 necessarily have to be another position. 15 So I would say the question of aidability, like with BOCES, that's a 16 different issue. 17 No. 18 SENATOR SALAND: If the Senator would continue to yield. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Oppenheimer, would you continue to 21 22 yield for Senator Saland? 23 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: 24 You 25 may proceed.

SENATOR SALAND: So the long and 1 2 the short of it is that there's nothing in 3 this bill that would make that function, whether it be the claims auditor or an 4 5 appointed deputy claims auditor, a state-aidable function. 6 7 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Through 8 you, Mr. President, I would think that this is 9 just another issue that comes before us in our 10 school budgets and we the voters make our decision. 11 12 But no, I don't believe that there's anything that has been written in 13 about auditors. 14 15 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you very much, Senator Oppenheimer. 16 On the bill. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Senator Saland, on the bill. 19 20 SENATOR SALAND: I won't repeat my comments with the earlier bill. Suffice it 21 22 to say that the issue of state aidability for 23 this auditing function is one that continues to be a rather sore spot, continues to be not 24 25 merely a breach of faith by the State

Education Department but in fact a complete 1 2 180-degree turnabout. You could effectively say one of 3 4 two things. Either they were extraordinarily 5 stupid, dumb, or whatever other matter of similar fashion you want to describe them when 6 7 they said that this function would be state 8 aidable -- perhaps duplicitous. I have no 9 idea. 10 But now we get a State Education Department bill which is a relatively 11 innocuous bill if this is how they want to 12 13 deal with the issue. They say, okay, you can 14 have a deputy. But still they continue not to 15 benignly neglect the issue of state aidability, they continue to ignore it. 16 Is there not anybody there what has the slightest 17 18 sensitivity to taxpayers? 19 There's no reason for anybody to 20 vote against this bill. It borders on being 21 mindless pap. But the simple fact of the 22 matter is that the State Education Department 23 for a period of now several years has breached its promise, breached its representation, 24 25 continues to ignore an issue which basically

takes money out of the pockets of local 1 2 taxpayers. 3 This doesn't make it any worse. It 4 certainly doesn't make it any better. But 5 I've got to tell you something. What they're doing is just grossly inept. б 7 Thank you. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Thank 9 you, Senator Saland. 10 Are there any other Senators wishing to be heard? 11 12 Hearing none, please ring the bells. 13 Read the last section. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: Section 17. This act shall take effect immediately. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Call 17 18 the roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 19 20 THE SECRETARY: In relation to 21 Calendar Number 228: Ayes, 54. Nays, 0. 22 Absent from voting according to Rule 9: Senators Adams, Bonacic, McDonald and 23 24 Sampson. 25 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The

bill is passed. 1 2 Senator Klein, that completes the 3 controversial reading of the calendar. 4 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at 5 this time can we please move to a reading of the Supplemental Calendar 21A. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 8 Secretary will read. 9 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 10 255, by Senator Oppenheimer, Senate Print 3874A, an act to amend the Education Law. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Read the last section. 13 THE SECRETARY: 14 Section 17. This 15 act shall take effect immediately. ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Call 16 the roll. 17 18 (The Secretary called the roll.) THE SECRETARY: 19 Ayes, 58. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The bill is passed. 21 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 22 258, by Senator Oppenheimer, Senate Print 23 6777, an act to amend the Education Law. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Read

the last section. 1 2 THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This 3 act shall take effect July 1, 2010. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Call 5 the roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 6 7 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 58. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The 9 bill is passed. 10 Senator Klein, that completes the reading of the Supplemental Calendar A. 11 12 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at this time can we please move to a reading of 13 Supplemental Calendar 21B. 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: The Secretary will read. 16 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 17 18 264, by Senator Griffo, Senate Print 4375, an act to amend the Uniform Justice Court Act. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT BRESLIN: Read 21 the last section. 22 THE SECRETARY: Section 2.
