

PROCEEDINGS 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 3 Senate will please come to order. 4 I ask everyone present to please 5 rise and recite with me the Pledge of Allegiance. б 7 (Whereupon, the assemblage recited 8 the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 9 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 10 Today's invocation will be provided by Rabbi Yaakov Kellman, from the Jewish Educational 11 Resources of New York, here in Albany. 12 Rabbi. 13 RABBI KELLMAN: 14 Jerusalem, 15 reunited as a holy city for people of all faiths, 43 years ago today. Jerusalem: 16 The 17 city of peace, the city of wholeness, the city 18 of respect -- for three faiths. 19 We bless you, we pray for you, we 20 ask God's beneficence to this convening body, that the peace of Jerusalem shine upon each 21 one of you now and forever. 22 23 Amen. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 24 The 25 reading of the Journal.

Third Reading Calendar 506. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 3 Substitutions ordered. 4 Senator Klein. 5 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I believe there's a resolution at the desk by 6 7 Senator Perkins. I ask that the resolution be 8 read in its entirety and move for its 9 immediate adoption. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Klein, has this resolution been deemed 11 12 privileged and submitted by the office of the Temporary President? 13 14 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has, 15 Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: By Senator Perkins, Senate Legislative Resolution 19 20 mourning the death of legendary singer, dancer, actress and civil rights activist Lena 21 Mary Calhoun Horne. 22 "WHEREAS, It is the sense of this 23 Legislative Body to pay tribute to the lives 24 25 of those esteemed individuals of world renown

1	who distinguished themselves through their
2	life's work; and
3	"WHEREAS, Born in Brooklyn,
4	New York, Lena Horne was the first black
5	performer to be signed to a long-term contract
б	by a major Hollywood studio and went on to
7	achieve international fame as a singer. She
8	died at the age of 92 on Sunday, May 9, 2010;
9	and
10	"WHEREAS, Lena Horne's timeless
11	legacy will forever be celebrated as part of
12	the fabric of American popular music. Her
13	striking beauty often overshadowed her talent
14	and artistry; and
15	"WHEREAS, Lena Horne was largely
16	raised by her grandparents as her mother, Edna
17	Horne, who pursued a career in show business,
18	and father, Teddy Horne, separated. Lena
19	dropped out of high school at age 16 and
20	joined the chorus line at the Cotton Club, the
21	fabled Harlem night spot where the
22	entertainers were black and the clientele
23	white. She left the club in 1935 to tour with
24	Noble Sissle's orchestra, billed as Helena
25	Horne; and

"WHEREAS, The talented Lena Horne 1 2 once said, 'I was unique in that I was a kind 3 of black that white people could accept ... I 4 was their daydream. I had the worst kind of 5 acceptance because it was never for how great I was or what I contributed. 6 It was because 7 of the way I looked.'; and 8 "WHEREAS, Actress Liza Minelli's 9 father, director Vincente Minelli, brought Lena Horne to Hollywood to star in 'Cabin in 10 11 the Sky, ' in 1943. In the 1940s, Lena Horne 12 was one of the first black performers hired to sing with a major white band, to play the 13 14 Copacabana nightclub in New York City. And 15 when she signed with MGM, she was among a few black actors to have a contract with a major 16 Hollywood studio; and 17 18 "WHEREAS, In 1943, MGM Studios temporarily transferred her to 20th Century 19 20 Fox to play the role of Selina Rogers in the all-black movie musical 'Stormy Weather.' 21 Her rendition of the title song became a major hit 22 and her most famous tune; and 23 24 "WHEREAS, In her first big Broadway 25 success, as the star of 'Jamaica' in 1957,

reviewer Richard Watts, Jr., called her 'one 1 of the incomparable performers of our time.' 2 3 Songwriter Buddy de Sylva dubbed her 'the best 4 female singer of songs'; and 5 "WHEREAS, Ms. Horne's voice was not particularly powerful, but it was extremely б 7 expressive. She reached her listeners 8 emotionally by acting as well as singing the romantic standards like 'The Man I Love' and 9 10 'Moon River' that dominated her repertory. 11 The person she always credited as her main 12 influence was not another singer but a pianist and composer, Duke Ellington's longtime 13 14 associate Billy Strayhorn; and 15 "WHEREAS, Lena Horne had married MGM music director Lennie Hayton, a white man, 16 in Paris in 1947 after her first overseas 17 18 engagements in France and England. An earlier marriage to Louis J. Jones had ended in 19 20 divorce in 1944 after producing her daughter, Gail, and her son, Teddy. Lena's father, her 21 22 son, and Hayton all died in 1970 and 1971; and 23 "WHEREAS, While at MGM, Lena Horne 24 starred in the all-black 'Cabin in the Sky,' 25 but in most movies, she appeared only in

musical numbers that could be cut when shown in the South, and she was denied major roles and speaking parts. She had appeared in the role of Julie in a 'Show Boat' scene in a 1946 movie about Jerome Kern, and was deemed a logical choice for the 1951 movie, but the part went to a white actress, Ava Gardner, who did not sing; and

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9 "WHEREAS, Lena Horne was only two 10 when her grandmother, a prominent member of 11 the Urban League and the National Association 12 for the Advancement of Colored People, enrolled her in the NAACP. However, Lena 13 avoided activism until 1945, when she was 14 15 entertaining at an Army base and saw German prisoners of war sitting up front while black 16 17 American soldiers were consigned to the rear. 18 That pivotal moment channeled her anger into something useful; and 19

20 "WHEREAS, Roger Edens, the composer 21 and musical arranger who had been Judy 22 Garland's chief protector at MGM, had heard 23 the elegant Lena Horne sing at Cafe Society 24 and also went to hear her at the Little Troc. 25 He then insisted that Arthur Freed, the

producer of MGM's lavish musicals, listen to 1 Ms. Horne sing. Mr. Freed insisted that Louis 2 3 B. Mayer, who ran the studio, hear her too, 4 and when he did, she had soon signed a 5 seven-year contract with MGM; and "WHEREAS, With Lena Horne being the б 7 trailblazer, the NAACP celebrated that 8 particular contract as a weapon in its war to get better movie roles for black performers; 9 10 and "WHEREAS, Perpetually frustrated 11 12 with racism, Lena Horne got involved in various social and political organizations, 13 14 and, partly because of her friendship with 15 singer-actor-activist Paul Robeson, was blacklisted during the Red-hunting McCarthy 16 By the 1960s, she was one of the most 17 era. 18 visible celebrities in the civil rights movement, once throwing a lamp at a customer 19 20 who made a racial slur in a Beverly Hills restaurant, and, in 1963, joining 250,000 21 22 others in the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom when Martin Luther King, Jr., gave his 23 'I Have a Dream' speech. She also spoke at a 24 25 rally that year with another civil rights

leader, Medgar Evers, just days before his 1 2 assassination; and "WHEREAS, Lena Horne's 1981 3 4 one-woman Broadway show, 'Lena Horne: The 5 Lady and Her Music, ' won a special Tony Award 6 and two Grammy Awards. In it, the 64-year-old 7 singer used two renditions, one straight and 8 the other gut-wrenching, of 'Stormy Weather' to give audiences a glimpse of the spiritual 9 10 odyssey of her five-decade career; and 11 "WHEREAS, A true asset to society, Lena Horne's life and works will endure as an 12 13 inspiration and legacy to all who had the 14 privilege and honor of knowing her. She is 15 survived by her daughter, journalist Gail Buckley; now, therefore, be it 16 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 17 18 Body pause in its deliberations to mourn the death of legendary singer, dancer, actress and 19 20 civil rights activist Lena Mary Calhoun Horne; and be it further 21 "RESOLVED, That a copy of this 22 resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted 23 to Gail Buckley." 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:

Senator Perkins, on the resolution. 1 2 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you, Mr. President. I'll just make a brief few 3 observations. 4 5 First, you know, in the resolution there is a quote from Lena Horne that I just б 7 want to emphasize because it is kind of tragic 8 that she herself had to acknowledge that it was not her talent but her race that seemed to 9 10 be so much a part of her acknowledgment by the 11 public. Even though she was, you know, a 12 beautiful woman, but she was not just accepted for her talent. 13 And I think that she reminds me and 14 15 so many of us that unfortunately there have been so many other actors and actresses and 16 scientists and doctors and writers and others 17 18 who have had to experience that kind of tokenism or racism. 19 20 And I just would like to say that hopefully that past will be left in the past 21 22 and that we will be able to move forward and 23 begin to recognize each other for what we really represent and that our talents will 24 25 really be that which we focus on.

And so I'm honored to have had the 1 2 opportunity to experience her. I want to 3 thank her for that which she contributed even 4 in the civil rights movement. And I would 5 hope that my colleagues would join me in supporting this resolution. б 7 Thank you. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 9 you, Senator Perkins. 10 Senator Montgomery, on the resolution. 11 12 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Yes, Mr. President, I rise to thank my colleague 13 Senator Perkins for introducing this 14 15 resolution. And as we all know, anyone who had 16 ever laid eyes on Lena Horne knows that she 17 18 was one of the most beautiful women in the But she was not only physically 19 world. 20 attractive, but she was also a beautiful human 21 being. She started her life in Brooklyn, 22 23 in my own district, and so she's probably one of the most outstanding people in theater from 24 25 the community, the village of

1 Bedford-Stuyvesant.

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2	And I appreciate the fact that she
3	was not simply an actress who was looking to
4	be the most famous actress. She had
5	tremendous talent, but she also utilized that
6	talent to benefit her community and her people
7	in a very significant way. So she lived her
8	life both in terms of her profession but also
9	in terms of her significant place in society
10	to make a statement on behalf of her people.
11	So I commend her and I celebrate
12	her life. And again, I thank my colleague for
13	introducing this in commemorating the life and
14	death of Lena Horne.
15	Thank you.
16	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank
17	you, Senator Montgomery.
18	Are there any other Senators who

(No response.) 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 3 resolution is adopted. Senator Perkins has indicated he 4 5 would like to open this resolution up to the entire body for cosponsorship. Any Senator 6 7 wishing not cosponsor the resolution please 8 inform the desk. 9 Senator Klein. 10 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I believe there's a resolution at the desk by 11 Senator Breslin. I ask that the title of the 12 resolution be read and move for its immediate 13 14 adoption. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Klein, has this resolution been deemed 16 privileged and submitted by the office of the 17 18 Temporary President? 19 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has, 20 Mr. President. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 22 Secretary will read. 23 THE SECRETARY: By Senators Breslin and Parker, Senate Legislative 24 25 Resolution commemorating the observance of

Yom Yerushalayim, Jerusalem Day, on May 12, 1 2010. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 3 4 Senator Breslin, on the resolution. 5 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you very much, Mr. President. б 7 I rise because today is the 8 celebration of Jerusalem Day and Jerusalem Day, in particular, the first time we have 9 10 celebrated in the Capital District, this area. And it celebrates the anniversary 11 of the unification of Jerusalem, which took 12 place 43 years ago, 43 years ago after the 13 14 culmination of the Six-Day War in Israel. 15 And tonight, at Temple Israel, we'll bring together a number of different 16 groups, twenty in all, from different 17 18 religious backgrounds, from different faiths, to commemorate the peaceful transition in 19 20 Jerusalem. And tonight at Temple Israel we'll 21 be honoring several individuals, including 22 Bill Adams, the deputy director of the Bridges 23 for Peace in the United States; Dr. Stephen 24 25 Berk, a professor of history at Union College;

Dr. Arthur Brenner, a professor of Judaic 1 studies at the University of Albany; and my 2 3 dear friend Michael McNulty, the former 4 Congressman for this area -- all four of whom 5 have been instrumental in the peaceful process that's taken place in Jerusalem. б 7 And I ask all to think of this day 8 as a commemoration of the peaceful unification of the wonderful city of Jerusalem. 9 10 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 11 12 you, Senator Breslin. Senator Parker, on the resolution. 13 14 SENATOR PARKER: Mr. President, 15 on the resolution. Yom Yerushalayim, or Jerusalem Day, 16 is a recent addition to the Hebrew calendar. 17 18 It commemorates the reunification of Jerusalem after the Six-Day War in 1967. 19 20 As you know, I represent the 21st Senatorial District in Brooklyn, which is 21 Flatbush and East Flatbush, Midwood, Ditmas 22 Park, Kensington and Boro Park, and as such I 23 24 represent probably the largest population of 25 Jews by anybody who's not Jewish in the State

of New York. So this day is a really 1 important day for people in my district, and 2 3 it's important for me, especially having 4 visited Jerusalem two years ago and seeing the 5 kind of history and culture that exists in the City of Jerusalem. б 7 Jerusalem is a city today that is 8 sacred to not just Jews but also Christians and Muslims, and all live there in relative 9 10 peace, for the most part. Today, May 12th, Temple Israel in 11 12 Albany, as Senator Breslin has indicated, is going to have the Christian Zionist community 13 celebrating the 43rd anniversary of the 14 15 Jerusalem reunification. And so we want to congratulate them and really just be 16 respectful of the history of Jerusalem and so 17 18 much that that history has given not just to the people of my community but the people of 19 20 New York and the people of the world. 21 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 22 Thank you, Senator Parker. 23 24 Are there any other Senators who 25 wish to be heard?

Seeing none, the question is on the 1 2 resolution. All in favor signify by saying 3 aye. 4 (Response of "Aye.") 5 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: б Opposed, nay. 7 (No response.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 9 resolution is adopted. 10 Senator Breslin has asked that the 11 resolution be opened for cosponsorship. Any member wishing not to be a cosponsor should 12 13 notify the desk. Senator Klein. 14 15 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I 16 believe Senator Breslin has another resolution 17 at the desk. I ask that the title of the 18 resolution be read and move for its immediate 19 adoption. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 Senator Klein, has this resolution been deemed 22 privileged and submitted by the office of the 23 Temporary President? 24 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has, 25 Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 1 Secretary will read. 2 3 THE SECRETARY: By Senators 4 Breslin and Parker, Senate Legislative 5 Resolution commending the first Capital District community commemoration of Yom б 7 Yerushalayim, Jerusalem Day, on May 12, 2010. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Breslin, on the resolution. 9 10 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 11 12 Again, I would be repeating much of what I said in my explanation of the prior 13 14 resolution. Again, it's commemorating in a 15 very peaceful way the unification of Jerusalem 43 years ago after the Six-Day War. 16 And Temple Israel, in the Capital 17 18 District, is bringing together a peaceful group, twenty in all, of organizations that 19 20 will celebrate it tonight at Temple Israel. And I know I've been invited, and I'll be 21 22 there. And I hope many of the people who are listening to this will also be there. 23 And again, Temple Israel, 6 o'clock. 24 25 Thank you very much, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 1 2 you, Senator Breslin. 3 Are there any other Senators who wish to be heard? 4 5 Seeing none, the question is on the resolution. All in favor signify by saying б 7 aye. 8 (Response of "Aye.") 9 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 10 Opposed, nay. 11 (No response.) 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The resolution is adopted. 13 Senator Breslin has also asked that 14 15 this resolution be open to cosponsorship. Any Senator wishing not to cosponsor the 16 resolution should notify the desk. 17 18 And at this point, with unanimous consent, I'd like to welcome Joel Lion, the 19 consul for media affairs to the Consulate 20 21 General of Israel, to please come forward and 22 make a few statements. 23 CONSUL LION: Senators, as the 24 official representative of the State of Israel 25 now here in the Capital City of Albany, it is

an honor to thank you, all of you, for your 1 solidarity to the State of Israel, for your 2 solidarity with our capital, Jerusalem, and, 3 4 as it was said in the resolution, we hope that 5 also we will find a way to have peace, peace in our region. It's not easy. But I hope б 7 that we are now on a good way to have it. 8 Thank you very, very much for 9 everything. 10 (Applause.) ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 11 Senator Klein. 12 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I 13 believe that there are four resolutions at the 14 15 desk by Senator Ruth Hassell-Thompson. I ask that the title of each resolution be read and 16 move for its immediate adoption. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Klein, have these resolutions been 19 20 deemed privileged and submitted by the office 21 of the Temporary President? 6	SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank
7	you, Mr. President.
8	I rise to ask this body to
9	celebrate with me the lives of these four
10	women who are members of my church, which is
11	Grace Baptist. And also, because she is a
12	staffer, we're not allowed to do resolutions,
13	but also I'd like to include the name of Lisa
14	A. Copeland, who is also being honored as one
15	of the five women.
16	The five women represent the five
17	women who began the Church of Grace. And many
18	years ago, the pastor began to create awards
19	for those members who showed leadership beyond
20	their contributions to the church but for the
21	their work in the community at large.
22	In the names of these five women,
23	in the persons of Lisa Copeland, of Deacon
24	Gwendolyn Youngs, Rita Strayhorn, Deacon Wanda
25	Michael Peters, and Deacon Myrtle Elaine

Mitchell -- the fact that these women are 1 2 called deacons, as opposed to deaconesses, also talks about the progressiveness of the 3 4 church that looks at women's ability to serve 5 in any role within the ministerial life of the church. б 7 And so to these four deacons and to 8 Lisa Copeland, I give honor and praise for the work that they do and would ask that those who 9 10 would wish would sign onto this resolution. Thank you, Mr. President. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 13 you, Senator Hassell-Thompson. 14 Are there any other Senators who 15 wish to be heard? Seeing none, the question is on the 16 resolutions. Secretary will read. 1 2 THE SECRETARY: By Senator 3 Savino, Legislative Resolution Number 5182, 4 memorializing Governor David A. Paterson to 5 proclaim May 15th through June 15th, 2010 as 6 Tourette Syndrome Awareness Month in the State 7 of New York. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: All in 9 favor of adopting the resolution please 10 signify by saying aye. (Response of "Aye.") 11 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 12 13 Opposed, nay. 14 (No response.) 15 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The resolution is adopted. 16 Senator Savino has offered 17 18 cosponsorship to all Senators. Anyone wishing 19 not to be a cosponsor of 5182 please notify 20 the desk. 21 Senator Klein. 22 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, I 23 have two motions. Presently we have enhanced penalties for theft or vandalism that occurs 19 20 within a religious house of worship, but unfortunately it's not covered for statues or 21 22 menorahs or things that are outside. 23 So I think this is a very tough and 24 common-sense approach to have a Class E felony 25 for vandalism of all types of property outside

a house of worship. My hope is that we'll no 1 2 longer consider this just a prank by young people, but take it seriously.
