I ask that the resolution be read 5 in its entirety and that Senator Diaz have an opportunity speak on his resolution. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 8 Secretary will read. 9 THE SECRETARY: By Senator Diaz. 10 Legislative Resolution Number 5167, 11 commemorating the second anniversary of Dr. Ma 12 Ying-jeou's Presidency of Taiwan. 13 "WHEREAS, May 20, 2010, will mark the second anniversary of Dr. Ma Ying-jeou's 14 15 inauguration as the twelfth President of the Republic of China (Taiwan); and 16 "WHEREAS, This Legislative Body 17 passed a resolution (Senate Number 4906) in 18 19 March of 2008 congratulating the people of 20 Taiwan for the successful conduct of their fourth direct and democratic presidential 21 election; and 22 "WHEREAS, Taiwan is one of the 23 strongest democratic allies of the United 24 25 States in the Asia-Pacific region; and

"WHEREAS, President Ma has 1 successfully enhanced mutual trust between the 2 United States and Taiwan since taking office; 3 4 and 5 "WHEREAS, Through cross-strait dialogues and flexible diplomacy, President Ma 6 7 has transformed the Taiwan Strait from a major 8 international flashpoint into a cornerstone for peace and prosperity for East Asia; and 9 10 "WHEREAS, The United States has 11 assisted Taiwan in participating in the World 12 Health Assembly as an observer in May of 2009, and will continue supporting Taiwan's 13 14 meaningful participation in other United 15 Nations-affiliated organizations; and "WHEREAS, President Ma took major 16 steps to enhance Taiwan's rule of law and 17 18 protection of human rights by ratifying the International Covenant on Civil and Political 19 20 Rights and the International Covenant on Economic, Social and Cultural Rights in May of 21 2009; and 22 "WHEREAS, President Ma is 23 24 determined to strengthen cooperation with the 25 United States in trade and investment,

students and cultural exchanges, tourism, 1 2 scientific research, and many other areas; and "WHEREAS, President Ma has 3 4 expressed his hope that Taiwan and the United 5 States will sign an extradition agreement, implement visa-free courtesies for Taiwanese 6 7 travelers to the United States, and resume 8 negotiation on a Trade and Investment 9 Framework Agreement in the near future; and 10 "WHEREAS, The United States and Taiwan share a close and long-standing 11 economic relationship, including \$61.6 billion 12 of bilateral trade in 2008, making Taiwan the 13 14 ninth largest trading partner of the United 15 States; and "WHEREAS, New York State exported 16 17 approximately \$1.5 billion worth of products 18 to Taiwan in 2008, making Taiwan the eighth largest foreign market for New York State; and 19 20 "WHEREAS, Many of the United States' top 500 companies headquartered in 21 22 New York have invested in Taiwan, including 23 IBM, Pfizer, Corning, Citigroup, MetLife, J.P. Morgan, and New York Life; and 24 25 "WHEREAS, The State of New York is

home to a large and thriving Taiwanese 1 2 community, and has a maintained a friendly and 3 fruitful sister-state relationship with Taiwan 4 for many years; now, therefore, be it 5 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative Body pause in its deliberations to commemorate 6 7 the second anniversary of President Ma 8 Ying-jeou's inauguration, and to express and 9 record its strong commitment to a closer 10 economic partnership with Taiwan." ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 11 Senator Diaz, on the resolution. 12 13 SENATOR DIAZ: Thank you, 14 Mr. President. 15 Ladies and gentlemen, I am very honored and proud today that we in the 16 New York State Senate are commemorating the 17 18 second anniversary of President Ma Ying-jeou's inauguration as President of Taiwan. 19 This 20 commemoration is not only a personal celebration for President Ma, but it is also a 21 22 celebration for democracy and a celebration for the people of Taiwan. 23 The accomplishments, dedication and 24 25 determination shown by President Ma have

yielded economic and cultural benefits for
Taiwan, for the United States, and for the
great State of New York. New York State and
New York City can also be proud today and
claim President Ma as one of their own, since
he obtained his master's in law degree from
New York University in 1976 and completed an
internship in a New York City law firm before
returning to Taiwan.

As we heard in the resolution, ladies and gentlemen, Taiwan is the eighth largest foreign market for New York State, and many top New York companies such as IBM, Citigroup, and J.P. Morgan have all invested in Taiwan.

Mr. President and ladies and gentlemen, we pause today to celebrate this important occasion with three dignitaries from Taiwan: Ambassador Andrew J.C. Kao, Director General of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office in New York; Director Simon Sung; and Director David Chien.

Ambassador Kao, Director Sung, and Director Chien, I am pleased to welcome you today to the New York State Senate chamber.

Mr. President, ladies and 1 2 gentlemen, in closing, I want to once again 3 offer my sincere congratulations to President 4 Ma, to Ambassador Kao, to Directors Sung and 5 Chien, and to the people of Taiwan from the New York State Senate on this very happy 6 7 occasion. 8 And I thank you, Mr. President, my colleagues, ladies and gentlemen, for giving 9 10 me the opportunity to bring to this chamber these distinguished people from the people of 11 Taiwan that have contributed to the economy of 12 this great state. And this resolution is open 13 14 for all the members to join on. 15 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 16 17 you, Senator Diaz. 18 Senator Stavisky, on the resolution. 19 20 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, 21 Mr. President. And thank you, Senator Diaz, for introducing this resolution. 22 And I too would like to welcome my 23 friends Ambassador Kao, David Chien and Simon 24 25 Sung to Albany. This is not their -- at least

I know Simon has been here before. And to tell you how proud I am, gentlemen, to represent so many Asian-Americans in the New York State Senate.

My district has more than a hundred thousand people from that part of the world who came to New York, who came to primarily Flushing, seeking a better life. And they have been such an important resource. They brought with them a rich cultural heritage. They brought with them their families, in some cases. But they have transformed much of Queens with their contributions both to the economy but also to the social and political life of our community.

We've always had a warm friendship with the government of Taiwan. It is a strong democracy in a part of the world where strong democracies do not exist. Taiwan has been our trading partner, an important trading partner for New York State. I believe it's our eighth most important trading partner.

But it also has revitalized the community of Flushing. Approximately 30 years ago, the stores in Flushing were boarded up,

businesses were moving. And people originally from Taiwan came to Flushing, and we've seen -- we call it the renaissance. Flushing is now a thriving community, construction is going on, jobs are being created.

And this, I hope, can be replicated throughout our state, because it's a message of hope for the future. And Flushing has become what we call a destination of choice, and it is due in large part to the contributions of the Asian-Americans who settled in this part of Queens.

But particularly, today, we're paying tribute to the Taiwanese government.

Ambassador Kao is the director general of the Taipei Economic and Cultural Office, but he carries the rank of ambassador. And some of you are wondering; we don't have diplomatic relations with Taiwan in the sense of exchanging ambassadorships. And that, to me, is unfortunate, because we have some such a long-standing friendship with the people of the Republic of China.

And I am so proud to welcome you to our Capitol and to thank you for everything

1	that you've done to make our country a better
2	country. And I look forward to working with
3	you in the days to come. [In Chinese.]
4	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank
5	you, Senator Stavisky.
6	Senator Schneiderman.

8	Mandarin-speaking State Senator here who I
9	hope will speak to us in English.

19	anniversary we celebrate today, is someone who
20	knows politics well. And you're welcome here.
21	He was the mayor and was the first elected
22	with very, very 51 percent of the vote,
23	came back and won big and went on to great
24	success. He was a party leader, someone who
25	would be very comfortable here with us.

So any time you want to come [in 1 2 Chinese]. 3 Thank you, Mr. President. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 5 you, Senator Schneiderman. Senator Padavan, on the resolution. 6 7 SENATOR PADAVAN: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. 9 And thank you, Senator Diaz, for 10 bringing this resolution before us again with 11 our guests that are here. 12 The sons and daughters of Taiwan have made, as has already been said, the part 13 of Queens known as Flushing and its 14 15 surrounding areas one of the most dynamic communities to be found anywhere in the 16 nation, not only economically but in terms of 17 18 art and culture, bringing to us -- and some great food, great restaurants -- bringing to 19 20 us a way of life that was foreign to many but today is so well accepted. 21 Political leaders -- our New York 22 City comptroller is a son of Taiwan. 23 first Republican member of the City Council, 24 25 Peter Koo, a son of Taiwan. So inroads into

our political process have been significant, and all for the better.

And we thank you for being here.

We have many firms in Queens who not only
export but also import -- Crystal Window is
one that you're familiar with -- exporting
their products to China and to the mainland.

And that interchange of trade is fantastic,
it's good for everybody.

So thank you so very much for being with us today.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank you, Senator Padavan.

Senator Duane.

SENATOR DUANE: Thank you very much, Mr. President.

I'm very pleased and honored to be in the presence of just wonderful leadership from Taiwan. As many of you know, I've been a visitor to Taiwan on more than one occasion.

And I admire their democracy, I admire their freedom generally, and I also now have come to know the innovative way in which they provide healthcare, which I think has many lessons for us here in the United States.

So I am very happy about the 1 friendship between our state and Taiwan, and I 2 3 wish for that to continue and to grow for many 4 years to come. 5 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 6 Thank 7 you, Senator Duane. 8 Senator Perkins. 9 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. I want to take a moment to extend 11 12 my welcomes and appreciation to the ambassador and to his colleagues and the people of 13 Taiwan. 14 15 I join in recognizing President Ma for his anniversary. I have had the privilege 16 of being his guest when I was in Taiwan at the 17 18 time he was the mayor, and he shared with us his town, and we went to the city council 19 20 where he also shared with us what his city council was doing. 21 I think the most memorable moment I 22 had with him was when we discussed jogging. 23 He is apparently an avid jogger. And in fact 24 25 when he visited New York City as a guest of

now-Comptroller John Liu, we had made arrangements to go jogging together -- but he forgot his sneakers, he said.

So I want to tell you how much we appreciate the fact that we have such an important relationship with your country. We look forward to seeing that relationship grow. And if the president is in town, I'm looking forward to sharing a loop around Central Park with him if he has the time.

Thank you so much, and wonderful to see you again.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank you, Senator Perkins.

Senator Squadron.

16 SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you,

17 Mr. President.

I rise to join the chorus welcoming our visitors and acknowledging the strong relationship that we have. As the Senator who represents Chinatown, in the heart of Manhattan, which really is in many ways the cultural center of the Chinese experience in America for Chinese-Americans and visitors, the relationship with Taiwan has for over a

hundred years been extraordinary. 1 2 relationship with what is now such an important island nation is one that has really 3 4 helped define the cultural life of the Lower 5 East Side, the cultural life of New York City, the cultural life of our state entirely. 6 7 And today is just another step in 8 what has been a relationship that has meant so much for so many. And so it's a great honor 9 10 to have you and to share the State Senate's sentiments that this is a relationship that we 11 12 all need, we all depend on, and we look forward to having many decades more of. 13 14 Thank you so much for being here. 15 Thank you to Senator Diaz for sponsoring this resolution and hosting you today. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 17 18 you, Senator Squadron. 19 As Senator Klein indicated, the 20 resolution was previously adopted by the house. 21 Senator Diaz. 22 23 SENATOR DIAZ: Mr. President, would you please allow Ambassador Kao to 24 25 address the chamber?

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: I will 1 2 certainly do that. 3 Before we do that, per your 4 request, the resolution is open to 5 cosponsorship by all members. She was 57 years old; and 9 10 "WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop moved to the Bronx in 1976, during the darkest days 11 12 of the borough's history, and worked as a community and housing organizer in the 13 Morrisania section of the Bronx; and 14 15 "WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop worked as a housing organizer and administrator for 16 the Fordham Bedford Housing Corporation; and 17 18 "WHEREAS, For the last 26 years, Meg Felice Charlop worked for the Montefiore 19 20 Medical Center where she was a borough-wide, citywide, and national leader in the fight 21 22 against childhood lead poisoning; and "WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop 23 conceived of the idea and founded the 24 25 Montefiore Hospital Lead Safe House, the first

in the City of New York and a citywide model funded by the former Bronx borough president, Fernando Ferrer; and

"WHEREAS, Since 1992, Meg Felice
Charlop was employed as the director of
community health for the Montefiore Hospital
school-based health program, where she worked
tirelessly to develop and promote health
education programs for the public school
children of the Bronx and advocated for policy
initiatives to help make the Bronx and the
city a healthier place to live; and

"WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop
actively promoted bicycle riding as an
alternative mode of transportation and a means
to promote a healthy lifestyle. She was
regularly seen riding her bike throughout the
Bronx and to meetings in Manhattan; and

"WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop was honored as a Paul Harris Fellow by the Bronx Rotary Club Gift for Life Program and as a Bronx Mother of the Year by former Mayor David Dinkins; and

"WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop lived and was employed her entire adult life in the

Bronx, always working tirelessly and passionately to make it a better and healthier place to live and work; and

"WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop and her husband, Richard Powers, raised their four children, Sarah, Zachary, Rachel and Aaron, in the Bronx and educated them in New York City public schools. They all survive her, as well as three foster children, Chanda, Alicia, and Chris; and

"WHEREAS, Meg Felice Charlop leaves behind a legacy of love, commitment and community involvement which inspires us to continue to support and fight for the causes which she so passionately believed in and worked so tirelessly for; now, therefore, be it

"RESOLVED, That this Legislative
Body pause in its deliberations to celebrate
the life and accomplishments of Meg Felice
Charlop, distinguished citizen and devoted and
beloved member of her community; and be it
further

"RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted

to the family of Meg Felice Charlop."

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:

Senator Espada, on the resolution.

SENATOR ESPADA: Thank you,

Mr. President.

And certainly I want to thank

Senator Klein and the house for giving me the opportunity to share some words regarding Meg Felice Charlop.

It was during the darkest moments of our beloved Bronx that I met Meg. And she took on the challenge of turning the burning Bronx, then the symbol of urban decay in the United States of America, into truly a story of urban renewal and renaissance, such that today there isn't a large tract of land that is vacant in the Bronx.

But it didn't stop there. All of her children, proud products of our public school system, her and her husband Richard did a great job with those children. But she always found time to do something for other children, leading the fight against childhood lead poisoning and involving herself in school-based health programs throughout the

Bronx. 1 2 It was indeed a tragic and 3 premature death, but it was a heroic life that 4 we celebrate today. And we thank this chamber 5 for giving us the opportunity to pay homage to this fine, wonderful lady. 6 7 Thank you. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 9 you, Senator Espada. 10 Senator Klein, on the resolution. 11 SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you, Mr. President. 12 It's my pleasure to join my 13 14 colleague Senator Espada in remembering the 15 life of Megan Charlop. I've also had the opportunity to 16 17 know and work with Megan many years ago. 18 previous life, I was in charge of a lead paint litigation unit in a law firm in Manhattan, 19 20 and I had the opportunity to work with Megan. While others were doubting the 21 22 causation between children eating lead paint 23 chips and all types of problems with motor skills and IQ scores, Megan was a fighter. 24

She understood early on the horrible

circumstances that were taking place in our communities, especially communities of color, when children were ingesting lead paint.

She was a leader in this movement, and I was very proud of the fact that I was actually at the ribbon cutting when she founded the Montefiore Hospital Lead Paint Safe House, which was the first in New York City.

She's someone who was dubbed the "Mother Teresa of the Bronx." She's someone who was also always there to lend a helping hand. And I think each and every day, when she got up in the morning, her only goal was to make a positive difference in people's lives.

I know Senator Montgomery, in our house, is certainly one of the big supporters of child health-based clinics in schools.

Well, Megan really led that cause in the Bronx. And when I was a member of the Assembly, I was very proud to open up several in Norwood schools, the area where Megan lived with her family.

I know we're joined here today by

Megan's daughter, Sarah Charlop Powers. 1 2 know all of us, especially myself, who had the 3 opportunity to know Megan for many years, I 4 know her daughter should be very, very proud, 5 because she was someone who really changed the way people looked at lead paint poisoning, 6 7 changed the way children received healthcare, 8 especially in the Bronx, and she's someone who I believe I'm a better person for having met 9 10 Megan Charlop. So thank you for letting me say a 11 few words, Mr. President. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 13 Thank 14 you, Senator Klein. 15 Senator Stewart-Cousins, on the resolution. 16 SENATOR STEWART-COUSINS: Thank 17 18 you, Mr. President. 19 I had heard about what happened to 20 this extraordinary woman. And certainly recognize her daughter as having been very 21 important in Yonkers as we move forward in our 22 23 development on the waterfront. But not having known her mom, 24 25 knowing the legacy, knowing the interest that

she had in all things community and all people, I just wanted to say that we do have legislation moving through both houses that address the cause of death. And I believe she was cycling and was hit by a bus.

So I say this only to say that we are conscious of types of hazards that could befall cyclists and are trying to do something that it will be safer for people to engage in what would ordinarily be a healthy activity, not only for themselves personally but for the environment.

So although this wonderful woman is gone, I am hoping that one of the things we will be able to do in this Legislature is make it safer for people like your mom, who enjoyed riding her bike, and that in that way her legacy will again be continued and remembered.

25 I just want to first acknowledge

the family for the wonderful work that your mother has given. Far beyond where she may have lived, her reputation was huge.

One of the great movements that took place in our city was the childhood lead paint poisoning prevention movement, which was a movement that had great resistance. It was sort of like a David and Goliath story because of those who were opposed to seeing that type of legislation that was so important to our children become law.

I know that she was in league with Lucy Billings, who is now a Supreme Court judge, and as well as Cordell Cleare, who's my chief of staff. They were amongst those whose children were poisoned. But instead of turning away in despair and cynicism, they turned towards government, they turned towards community organizing and community leadership to make a better day for not only their children but, more importantly, for the children that might unfortunately be exposed to that type of poisoning.

So she has a great legacy for us to remember here today. And in fact, I'm honored

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to say we have a childhood lead paint

He is someone who, under great odds, led this small country to the first successful revolt of any Caribbean nation, one of the most successful revolts, really, in the world's history in terms of throwing off the yoke of oppression.

He got a great deal of inspiration from his father, who was born free in Africa, and understood that slavery and bondage and oppression was not a natural state for people. He took the things that he had learned, you know, being in captivity and really not just forged greatness and a path for himself but also forged a great path for his people.

And so I just really want to take this moment to acknowledge his great works and the fact that it's meant so much to the people of the state.

I also want to take this moment because there's another privileged resolution coming up that I will forgo speaking on but

I'll take a couple of moments right now just to say that today is Haitian Flag Day, or Haitian Unity Day.

This is the day that is commemorated generally as the time that Haiti actually became a free nation and established itself by raising its own flag. And so as the who represents the 21st District in Brooklyn -- which is Flatbush and East Flatbush, Midwood, Ditmas Park, Kensington and Boro Park -- and functionally the largest concentration of Haitian people outside of Haiti, this is very important for the people of my district and my community.

Outside of Florida, the State of New York, which has a population of about 200,000 people of Haitian descent, is the largest population of Haitian people, again, outside of Haiti in the world.

And so those folks have -- the people of Haiti have given so much not just to New York but to the culture of the United States and the world. For instance, John Audubon. We're all familiar with the Audubon Society. Well, that's named after John

Audubon, who was of Haitian descent and is really the name that we put associated with avian life, birds, wildlife, conservation and, just an example of someone who many of us might not have known was Haitian, has given a great deal to our society. And so we remember Touissant L'Ouverture, we remember Haitian Flag Day.

And also today, in Rockland County, which outside of Brooklyn has the largest population, Rockland County and Spring Valley, New York -- and I'll say this, I didn't see him in the chamber, but I'll say this on behalf of Senator Thomas Morahan, who represents that community, that that is a thriving community exactly because of the Haitian community. They today celebrate Haitian Unity Day.

There are a number of members of that community who are here in Albany today, and we honor them and thank them for being part of this great experiment that we call New York and call America.

The advent of Malcolm X was such that he took you through many changes within his life. He was very much a part of my young years in terms of determining who I was and how I saw the world. And at the very time when Dr. King was talking about nonviolence, Malcolm X was preaching at whatever cost, whatever necessary to get the job done. When you're very impressionable, those are two very highly volatile thought processes to go through.

I like to believe that today I am a melding of both of those thought processes.

And that as we commemorate the life of this man, that we do so with an understanding that his place in history was very critical and important to the growth of African-Americans

in this society. And that even though those who did not believe in him or believe in his theory still had to take notice that the world was changing and he was very much a part of those changes.

So thank you, Mr. President, for the opportunity to present this resolution today. And I would like to open this resolution to any who would like to share with me in this moment.

SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you very much.

I just want to take a moment to briefly recognize that tomorrow is the 85th birthday of Malcolm X, who was a central figure in obviously African-American and therefore American history -- world history, for that matter.

And interestingly, today we had the honor of our invocation being made by a member of the Ghanaian community who happens to be Muslim. And as you know, Malcolm X was a

Muslim. And so it's a wonderful coincidence that he made history today by virtue of being the first of that faith to make an invocation at this place in this chamber.

Malcolm X was one of the most outspoken activists on behalf of obviously the civil rights movement, and I am honored to be a cosponsor of this resolution.

Just I want to mention a few quick things memorable for me, at least, about Malcolm X. He was well known for his ability to move a audience with his passion and veracity. He would often say, "If you don't stand for something, you'll fall for anything."

And another thing I'd like to just quickly point out is that as a society we were taught many lessons from Malcolm X, lessons that will endure long after his words were spoken. One particular message echoes in my mind every time I enter this chamber or I stand ready and willing to defend the rights of my constituents: "Power in defense of freedom is greater than power on behalf of tyranny and oppression, because power, real

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power, comes from our conviction, which
