It would institute a system of prior approval on rates, but it would ensure that 23 only the people who are pressing the limit, 24 25 are raising their rates far too much on their

premium payers, would be subject to it.

It would also make sure that the Superintendent of Insurance had sufficient powers to ensure that those who are the most costly insurers would come under its provisions.

It would also add a definition of what is called the medical loss ratio.

Because under the current proposal before us, there is no definition.

And that's really necessary because the Federal Healthcare Reform Bill, which was passed under President Obama's championship, requires that there be a federal medical loss ratio, and that federal medical loss ratio must be established before the end of this year and may well be established before that, because Health and Human Services Secretary Sebelius has asked the National Association of Insurance Commissioners to come up with one very soon, and they have said they'll do it by the end of this month or the end of next month. So we would cure that.

In addition, we would make sure that only the highest costly insurers are

covered. If they were not, then they would not have to go through the prior approval process. It would simplify the process. It would be cheaper for the state because, if they're meeting the goal of this bill, then they would not have to go through a costly application and the department would not have to go through a costly review procedure.

For those reasons, Madam President, I would submit the amendment ought to be accepted. This is something that was proposed as part of the Executive Budget. It's not necessary to do as part of the one-week extension of the budget, and therefore putting this off to get the amendment printed could be accomplished easily.

And it fails to mesh with the federal new regulation of insurance. It does not have a definition of medical loss ratio in here. It gives untoward powers to the Superintendent of Insurance, which if done wisely is fine, but that's not always been the case.

For those reasons, while I am supporting the bill, I am putting on the record my doubts that this scheme will work properly.

Thank you.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Breslin, to explain his vote.

SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you very much, Madam President.

I think this is a very bright day
for New Yorkers. For the last ten years, we
have learned to live under bad policy, and
that's file and use. For those who don't
know, an HMO, when they want a rate increase
for the last number of years have filed a
sheet of paper and used that rate increase
that they filed on that sheet of paper. Maybe
a year and a half, a year later the Insurance
Department might have discovered that the

raise was not appropriate. They have fined various insurance companies for that. But unfortunately, because those rates went up, people were driven off the insurance rolls.

And in the last ten years we've also learned, not only statewide but federally, that deregulation doesn't work.

And I'll give us an example, the AIG nationally. AIG as a financial institution failed because it wasn't regulated. Its insurance arms worked just fine because there was sufficient regulation and sufficient reserves.

The prior approval that we pass here today will allow the Insurance

Department, within a 60-day period -- as opposed to the bill that was used during the 1990s, the prior approval, this one will have 60 days for the Insurance Department to make a decision on whether a rate is justified or not.

The Insurance Department will have an opportunity to just not look at the minimum loss ratio, but will have the chance to look at the solvency of the company, the way

profits are going, are they going up and down, are there particular health insurance products that they have that need a review and some direction. This will take care of that.

And the minimum loss ratio is above the federal. It's at 82. And it is somewhat unclear in the statute we're passing here today. But there's a number of different things -- we want to make sure that health programs don't have the unintended consequences of being eliminated, that they would be included in the minimum loss ratio. There's also the situation with taxes that health insurance -- that health maintenance organizations use. So there will be a rule-making process within the department to accomplish those goals.

But today we satisfy small businesses. We satisfy chambers of commerce who have been crying out for better healthcare at a more affordable price. And this is the day that we will now have it.

Thank you, Madam President.

But it certainly violates the

law, the letter of the law and the spirit of the law of 2007 which called for an open public process.

And the amazing part about all of this is that the mere fact that these cuts take place, you can't prioritize in this budget extender how these cuts compare to maybe other areas that could be cut. Maybe there's a better way to do it. Maybe if the public participated and there was discussions open among all the conference committees of members of this house, maybe there would be an idea how you wouldn't have to cut certain areas of this budget that are being cut by this miraculous process.

In addition, there are other areas of potential cuts. And at the next extender bill that's on the agenda there's going to be some suggestions, some amendments, since the Republican minority was not allowed to participate in the process. Senator Skelos and Assembly Minority Leader Kolb are invited to the five-way leaders' public show that goes on where nothing is decided. But where it really matters, behind closed doors, and where

it really would matter, at conference committees, they're not participating.

But we've got other suggestions which I've got a feeling -- I just have this feeling, I don't know where I get it from -- they're probably not going to be accepted by the majority party. But in any event, we're going to make that attempt later on.

So here we are doing a piecemeal budget. And when you do a budget -- at least I thought when a family does a budget, the state should do it the same way. Namely, you've got to make priorities. What -- maybe some of these cuts are not the cuts that are the most logical ones to be made when you consider the other 60 percent of the budget.

So apparently the process this year is going to be do 40 percent today, maybe 20 percent next week, maybe another 15 percent the week after that, and at some point in time we'll get to 100 percent by a piecemeal process that is totally violative of the rules and regulations by statute that were provided in 2007.

So for the reasons that I just

mentioned -- the process is faulty, it violates the law, the result is faulty because 2 we're not laying one potential cut against another potential cut, we're not making priorities, we're just doing bits and pieces -- and who knows there might not be 7 other cuts to healthcare in the next segment of our extenders -- no one in good conscience could vote on 40 percent of at budget not knowing what remains in the last 60 percent. Nobody can if you're being honest with 11 yourself.

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And I made the analogy with families. Can you imagine if you had a problem in your family as far as the budget is concerned and this week we're going to do 40 percent of it and we'll worry about the next 60 percent next week or 20 percent a week thereafter?

You may make mistakes in the first And I've got a feeling and you'll see round. from our potential amendments that a lot of mistakes were made in this particular extender.

So for I don't know what straight

Madam

Today, as we're talking about very severe, significant substance, not even an indication by the chairman of the Finance Committee relative to the potential for additional tax hikes is forthcoming.

And when you are pursuing a budget on such a piecemeal basis, I believe that's the only conclusion that one can draw, that because all the information isn't before us, because all the spending plan is not in place, this body is voting in the dark on whether or not there is in fact a major tax hike coming down as a result of this spending plan.

I know Senator Kruger believes

there is a better way; at least I would hope 1 2 he would. Certainly the members on this side 3 of the aisle, the Republicans, believe that at 4 the very least the lack of transparency in 5 what's being proposed is unconscionable. 6 Madam President, one can only 7 conclude that the taxpayers are going to be 8 significantly hurt by this horrendous lack of 9 transparency, by this cavalier attitude that a 10 measure can go forward without any 11 explanation, without any assurances, without 12 any concrete evidence that in effect there will be no tax hike as a result. 13 I think those who vote for this 14 15 measure are very likely to be voting for tax hikes. And that, Madam President, is what the 16 taxpayers of this state can least afford. 17 18 That's why I will be voting against this measure and urge my colleagues to do the same. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 21 Nozzolio to be recorded in the negative. 22 Are there any other Senators 23 wishing to be heard on the bill? SENATOR HANNON: Thank you, Madam President.

New York State, because of

Medicaid, is facing unprecedented budget gaps
in the next two years, for this budget year
and for next year. And there needs to be
unprecedented addressing of the problem that
Medicaid has.

A program that has afforded so many quality healthcare has to be, at a time when we have less money, intelligently pruned, intelligently managed, changed to a system that is a health system instead of something that is simply a bill-paying system. And that's all we have right now.

We have offered some amendments that will increase the savings from that system, and we will offer in part of those

amendments things that will address problems that are now in the main bill that I think are counterproductive, that are unwise, and will actually drive up the cost of Medicaid to the taxpayers of this state.

As part of our amendments we want to close the eligibility loopholes for certain services, we want to cap personal-care services, we want to reinstate some of the expansions of eligibility that were done just last year -- not talking about things done in the past decade, prior administrations, prior majorities -- just done last year, something we had a hand in.

We'd also want to do that in regard to postponing the expansion of Family Health Plus enrollment to well beyond any benefit that is offered to anyone in any other state.

We want to remove the readmission provision that's in the main bill. We want to evaluate the optional services and see what the priorities are of what's the most essential at a time of need. We want to establish the long-term-care financing demo program, because the long-term-care program in

this state is a hodgepodge of different programs put together, no rhyme and reason in meshing them together, no rhyme and reason in meshing the care for the patient, no vision as to where we're going -- all at a time when next January the number of baby boomers turning 65 in this nation will be about 10,000 a month.

Ne want to establish a county nursing home demo program to convert county nursing homes into long-term-care settings.

We want to deal with the assisted living reimbursement rate. We want to deal with rightsizing the nursing homes. We want to up the reimbursement for buy-ins to Family Health Plus. And we want to take the penalties that are levied on individuals for Medicaid fraud and increase those.

This is a very extensive and I think comprehensive agenda, unlike the bill before us, which deals in a piecemeal way with so many of the budget problems, so many of the Medicaid programs. You don't know the full range of options when you're dealing with the healthcare budget in this fashion.

Senator Kruger talked about 1 40 percent of the total budget being addressed 2 3 tonight, between the appropriation bill and the Article 7 bill. It's absolutely 4 5 unprecedented that we have played touch football with this budget. We've abandoned 6 7 the conference committees that's our immediate 8 history in 2007. And every week we seem to have a new procedure -- you'll get a 9 10 scorecard, you'll get some type of conference committees in the future. Meanwhile, we're 11 12 locking people in without knowing the options. This bill does not make the 13 14 healthcare system go forward. It doesn't give 15 any opportunities for us to shape what's happening. And there's one provision in 16 particular that I think is particularly 17 18 unwise. There is a penalty given for readmissions of a patient to a hospital. 19 20 some people may say the federal government's doing that. Well, they are, for three 21 conditions: Heart attack, heart failure, and 22 pneumonia. 23 The bill before us would do it for 24

all conditions, and it would say that the

hospitals really have to change their mission. Right now their mission to the patient ends when the patient is discharged. If we now say 15 and 30 days out that they have to keep track of those patients and they'll be responsible for not getting paid if there's a readmission of those patients to the hospitals, then they're going to have to add staff, they're going to have to add computers, they're going to have to add databases they have to track. They have to make arrangements with everybody in their area -- arrangements that do not exist -- because they don't know if somebody who has been in their hospital is within a month in another hospital. So that doesn't exist whatsoever.

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All of this, by the terms of the bill, is supposed to be implemented by July 2010. It's ridiculous. And what's more ridiculous is not you who want to vote for this because you feel a gun is to your head, it is the Division of the Budget and the Governor who are saying we want to make these policies with these enormous changes as to what's going to happen in a hospital, who's

going to have to pay for that, we want to do that as part of the budget process.

That's wrong. It's not good health, it's not good planning, it's not good budgeting, and we should not be doing it.

We have also pending right now what's known as Kendra's Law, how we treat the mentally ill and whether we can go through a procedure to make sure that they have drugs, the psychotropic drugs that help the mentally ill.

Well, the bill says, you know, you don't have to deal with the behavioral health readmissions. But we don't know when that is going to take place. Suppose it only occurs after they're discharged? We don't know the full scope of it. Many of the times the readmissions -- as we know, this is a difficult and fragile population; they may be readmitted for something else. This bill leaves all of that undefined, unsketched out.

The last part is why do we start to start to fine the hospitals when we may not have people who pay attention to their discharge requirements and instructions?

This whole process is wrong. We need to change the Medicaid system. We need to make sure that it becomes a healthcare system. This bill doesn't do it. You're purporting to address the entire healthcare bill in this emergency extender.

It doesn't have to be done this
way. If you had had the conference
committees, you could have had this discussion
in public. You could have had it argued in
public. If you don't agree with this
amendment, you could have said it there.
That's what democracy is all about, to have a
public process, and you're not doing it. And
it makes me mad because we have an opportunity
to deliver better health for the people of
New York.

I would offer this amendment, and I would suggest that everybody should support it.

Senator Skelos.

SENATOR SKELOS: Madam President, again, this extender and the previous extenders that we've witnessed come before this chamber again have been negotiated in secret by the Governor, the Senate Democrats and the Assembly Democrats. It's obvious that there were negotiations, secretive negotiations over the weekend, because the extender bill has been dramatically changed from what Budget Director Megna indicated that it would be this past Friday.

Now, the extender, as has been pointed out by Senator Hannon, really does not go far enough in reforming and reducing Medicaid spending. And it includes no provision -- in fact, every Democrat just voted against the proposed amendment that would really help crack down on Medicaid fraud and said I'm not going to vote for it.

The Governor and the Senate

Democrats and the Assembly Democrats have

increasing the reestimation of Medicaid fraud by another \$300 million. Now, certainly we believe and it's been the position of this minority Republican conference that there are billions that can be obtained through going after Medicaid fraud. The latest figures show and today we've recommended where you could save approximately \$400 million through the amendment that was also defeated.

What's frightening is that state spending, as was indicated by Senator DeFrancisco, this April will be 4 percent higher than last April. That's \$400 million more, almost all of it due to an increase in Medicaid spending. And the danger is -- and many will say that, well, it's federal money. That federal money disappears next year. So the Democrats, you're already digging a hole into next year's budget.

Senator Kruger indicated that with the extender we are spending about 40 percent of our entire state budget. I guess the question I would have to ask would be how does Senator Kruger even know it's 40 percent when he has not indicated what the total spending

or fiscal plan will be in this budget.

So again, we have offered responsible amendments of over \$400 million to truly reform and start the restructuring that is necessary within the Medicaid system.

Again, I want to reemphasize that at the last five-way leaders' meeting it was agreed upon that Assemblyman Kolb and myself, our respective conferences would get the scoring or the marking, whatever you want to call it, as to the resolutions that were passed by the Democrat majorities and also a scoring of what had been agreed upon between the two majorities.

And of course that commitment has not been met, just like the Budget Reform Act of 2007 is being violated on a daily basis by both Assembly and Senate Democrats.

And I'm shocked by this because the great reformers, some of them not in the chamber right now, that were going to reform the way things were operating in Albany quite frankly is an embarrassment. You're embarrassing the public, and the dysfunction in Albany has only gotten worse.

So I would urge, again, the Senate 1 2 Democrats, rather than just saying "We want to do it, " do it. Let's start the joint 3 4 conference committees, get the Speaker on 5 board, let's start the negotiations, and this budget could be completed very quickly. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 8 Skelos will be recorded in the negative. 9 Senator Diaz, on the bill. 10 SENATOR DIAZ: Thank you, Madam President. 11 12 Today is the number-ten extension bill that we are doing. But meanwhile, I keep voting against my conscience, against what I feel, against what I would like to do, cutting services, cutting money to people that I'm supposed to be helping. Thinking that we are going to get a budget.

But nothing's done with the budget. There is no move, there is nothing happening.

And every week, 10 weeks, 10 weeks, 10 weeks:

You cannot shut the government. People will suffer.

And let me tell you what we're

doing today. I have no hospitals in my district. There isn't a hospital in my district, there is not one. So I'm safe, praise God. There is no hospital.

But the people that I represent,

Madam President, the people that I represent
in my district, they go to all different
hospitals in the Bronx. And today, Lincoln
Hospital will be affected by \$3 million.

Bronx-Lebanon Hospital, \$9 million.

Montefiore Hospital, \$10 million. North

Central Bronx Hospital, \$1 million. St.

Barnabas Hospital, \$6 million. Calvary
Hospital, \$346,000. Jacobi Medical Center,
\$2 million. Montefiore Hospital, \$13 million.

And so on and so on.

And then we have said, You voted for this, you have to vote for this or you will shut the government. Ten weeks. Ten weeks.

I'm going to vote for this today.

I'm voting for this one today. But I want
you, Madam President, to know that something
has to be done from here till next Monday,
because I am afraid, I am afraid that

government will get shut down next week.

Because I'm not planning to vote for any more
extensions. Either we fix the budget from
here to Monday or the Governor will get what
he wants, the Governor will get what he wants,
to shut the government.

So I'm voting -- my heart is broken. I'm voting for this today. Painful. Because we don't want to shut the government. How could we do that? Ten weeks. So tonight -- and people could go to my office and picket, demonstrate in front of my office. The editorial boards could write whatever they want about me. You could say whatever you want to say about me. I am not voting no more to cut and to hurt the people that I'm supposed to be helping. This is the last one.

Monday coming, I'm putting -- I'm saying it publicly, I'm telling the whole world, I'm telling my district and the people in my community, I am in an election year, you could kick me out, you could vote for my opponent. I'm not voting, no more.

So you got my vote today, Madam

President. And people are going to get hurt

1	and cuts are going to be done and health is
2	going to be suffering. Close to a billion
3	dollars cut in health.
4	So I hope that from here to Monday
5	the budget gets solved and we do something.
