18	piece of legislation that creates the Missing
19	Vulnerable Adult Clearinghouse. As we know
20	from numerous cases throughout the state,
21	those individuals who have been diagnosed with
22	Alzheimer's disease and other dementias, over
23	330,000 New York citizens now, have been known
24	to wander from their homes. And in fact
25	national statistics are indicating that those

who are missing for over 24 hours have nearly a 50 percent chance of suffering serious injury or not being found alive.

This bill establishes the clearinghouse in the Division of Criminal Justice Services, modeled after the Amber Alert. And this will provide a mechanism to coordinate local law enforcement agency response all over the state so that we make sure that when those who are missing, those who are vulnerable, that we have a system in place now to find them just as soon as possible and return them to their homes.

I encourage all my colleagues to support the measure, and I vote in the affirmative.

SENATOR KLEIN: I rise in support of this legislation, Madam President. And I want to praise my colleague Senator Valesky for coming up with a comprehensive approach for a very serious problem.

The stats are quite startling that

50 percent of Alzheimer's patients wander.

And unfortunately, when you look at the

50 percent of those Alzheimer's patients that
do wander, a very, very high percentage, close
to 75, are injured or never returned.

I kicked off a program earlier in the year within my Senate district in both the Bronx and Westchester, along with the Alzheimer's Association, which would allow individuals to be able to wear bracelets and necklaces where individuals can call when they're actually found.

We had a case in my district in Pelham Bay where a woman walked over 3 miles from her place of residence, and luckily she was found by a Good Samaritan and wouldn't have been returned home unless she had this necklace around her neck.

So I praise Senator Valesky for taking this beyond just my Senate district and having a statewide comprehensive approach to protect our loved ones. I vote yes.

This bill is a very, very simple bill which is meant to provide an appropriate 23 alternative for young people who are below the 24 25 age of 18 who get into a confrontation with a

parent.

Currently that young person will be treated under Article 8 of the Family Court Act, and the parent is able to bring an order of protection against a child who attacks them, and currently that child will be treated under Article 8 of the Family Court Act, which means that that young person could be charged with disorderly conduct, harassment in the first and second degree, aggravated harassment in the second degree, criminal mischief, menacing in the second and third degree, reckless endangerment, or assault in the second and third degree.

Now, obviously when a young person attacks a parent we want that parent to have some relief in the court. But we may not want the young person to be treated without consideration of that child's age or the circumstances surrounding this family situation. So what the bill does is allows a young person to be charged under Article 7, as a PINS, a person in need of supervision. With this bill, that young person would then have some protections as a child that they do not

have under Article 8. 1 2 For instance, if that child is charged as PINS, he or she can be assigned a 3 4 guardian, a court legal guardian, or a lawyer. 5 That child can receive services. The family could receive services. The child could be 6 7 placed in foster care. The child could be 8 placed under OCFS detention or hopefully as an alternative-to-detention case. 9 10 So there are many reasons why we would prefer that young people under the age 11 12 of 18 who have an altercation with a parent, that that child be brought to Family Court as 13 14 a person in need of supervision. That's what 15 this bill does. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 16 17 Thank you, Senator Montgomery. 18 Senator Saland. SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, Madam 19 20 President. Would Senator Montgomery yield to 21 some questions? ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 22 Senator Montgomery, do you yield for 23 24 questions? 25 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Through you,

And I believe 17 18 you alluded to that fact or certainly implied that your concern here was primarily that 19 20 these events that occur between a child and a parent or guardian under your bill not be 21 treated as a crime. 22 Is that correct? 23 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: 24 proposing that that case be treated as a PINS 25 case, a person in need of supervision.

the judge then has the option of kicking that 1 2 case up to a higher level. However, it starts 3 out as a basic PINS case. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 5 Senator Saland, do you wish Senator Montgomery to yield? 6 7 SENATOR SALAND: If Senator 8 Montgomery would continue to yield. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 10 Senator Montgomery, do you continue to yield? SENATOR MONTGOMERY: 11 I do, Madam President. 12 SENATOR SALAND: 13 Are you then 14 saying that under Article 7 there is 15 concurrent jurisdiction between the Family Court and Criminal Court? 16 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: 17 Madam 18 President, through you, I think that the difference that I'm -- the distinction that 19 20 I'm trying to make here is that we're not -we do not necessarily want the incident or we 21 want the child to be treated as a criminal 22 case. We want the option of the Family Court 23 24 judge -- the case starts as a person in need 25 of supervision. In the event that the judge

decides that it needs a higher level of 1 2 disposition, that Family Court judge has the 3 option to do that. But it doesn't start out 4 under Article 8 as a straight-up Family Court 5 or possibly criminal case. SENATOR SALAND: Would the 6 7 Senator continue to yield. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 9 Senator Montgomery, do you continue to yield? 10 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: I do, Madam President. 11 12 SENATOR SALAND: Senator 13 Montgomery, there's not a question whether it 14 starts out as a criminal case. Is it your 15 intent here that under no circumstance, under your bill, would a child who, for example, 16 threatened a parent with a shotgun, that child 17 18 would be treated, under Article 7, as a PINS and there would be no criminal jurisdiction? 19 20 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Madam 21 President -- would you repeat the question, 22 Senator? 23 SENATOR SALAND: Is it your intention that inasmuch as these otherwise 24 25 Article 8 proceedings would be treated under

Article 7, which is the PINS section, there would be -- that there'd be no criminal jurisdiction?

So in the example I gave you, a child threatens a parent with a shotgun.

Under current law, that I believe would constitute one of the degrees of menacing, and there could be a criminal proceeding brought.

There would be concurrent jurisdiction both in the Criminal Court and in the Family Court.

Under the PINS section, Article 7, there is no concurrent jurisdiction, there is no criminal jurisdiction.

So is it your intent that under no circumstance could a criminal proceeding, regardless of the actions of the child against the parent or the guardian, be treated as a criminal proceeding?

SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Through you,

Madam President, the -- in either case. In

the case that the judge determines to be

clearly more appropriately dealt with in

Criminal Court or in a higher part of the

Family Court, under Article 8 the judge does

have the option of moving that case into the

section that you're describing, Article 8. 1 2 But what this does is allows for 3 that young person to be dealt with, to be 4 provided with a different set of protections 5 that are not available to that young person under Article 8. If in fact the judge 6 7 determines that it's more appropriate that 8 that young person be dealt with under the Article 8 section, it is entirely at the 9 10 discretion of the judge to make that decision. 11 We're not removing the discretion of the 12 judge, as in any PINS case. SENATOR SALAND: Would Senator 13 14 Montgomery continue to yield, please. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Montgomery, do you continue to yield? 16 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: 17 Yes, Madam 18 President. 19 SENATOR SALAND: Senator Montgomery, under Article 7, if you know, does 20 the presiding judge in Family Court who would 21 22 be hearing this PINS case have the ability to transfer the proceeding to a criminal court? 23 24 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Through you, 25 Madam President, my counsel informs me that

this bill allows the parent to be able to file 1 a case as a PINS, but it does not deny them 2 the opportunity to also file the case as a 3 criminal case under Article 8. 4 5 SENATOR SALAND: If the Senator 6 will continue to yield. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 8 Senator Montgomery, do you continue to yield? 9 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Yes. 10 SENATOR SALAND: Could you or 11 your counsel point out the language, either in 12 this bill or in Article 7, that provides that option? Because I haven't seen it, to be 13 14 perfectly honest with you, and I've looked for 15 it. And I'd welcome somebody being able to point it out to me. 16 17 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: One second, 18 Senator. SENATOR SALAND: Thank you. 19 20 (Pause.) 21 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Through you, 22 Madam President, the parent makes a decision, makes a choice, and essentially the relief 23 that the parent is looking for is an order of 24 25 protection which they can receive under

Article 8, as I indicated. The parent wants to be provided some assistance, some relief, immediate relief from this situation, and the order of protection is available under Article 8.

This bill will allow for the same order of protection to be provided to the parent immediately. But in addition to that, they are able -- the child is able and the family are able to receive services that are not available to them under Article 8.

SENATOR SALAND: Madam President, would the Senator continue to yield.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

Senator Montgomery, do you continue to yield?

SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Yes.

SENATOR SALAND: If in fact that is your intent, Senator Montgomery, I'll invite you to look at lines 19 through 22, and I'll read them, for purposes of this record.

"Family offenses alleged to have been committed by child under the age of 18 against a parent or guardian shall be addressed in accordance with Article 7 rather than this article" -- which is Article 8 -- "of this

1 act."

So you are specifically saying that
Article 8, which affords that option to that
parent, does not control, but in fact
Article 7, which is the PINS article, does
control, where that option is not afforded to
that parent. The language is clear and it's
unequivocal. If your intent is otherwise,
then your language does not match your intent;
in fact, is totally contrary to what you have
claimed your intent to be.

SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Madam

President, through you, I take exception to

your statement there or your conclusions based

on this language.

The language simply, in this particular bill, says "Family offenses alleged to have been committed by a child under the age of 18 against a parent or guardian shall be addressed in accordance with Article 7 rather than this article." Which is Article 8.

Under Article 8, the differences in Article 8 and Article 7 are -- under Article 8, no services can be ordered by the

judge for the child. The child's interests and needs are not considered. The child, with the order of protection, cannot stay at home, cannot be placed. So that child is thrown out of the house, is not allowed to be in the home any longer, though the child maybe way underage. The child does not receive a law guardian to be assigned. And the child -- the only relief in that case is that the child be placed in an adult jail.

Under PINS, the child can receive services vis-a-vis the judge, in consideration of their needs, and an appropriate placement. There are options that the judge has for placement of that young person. They do receive a law guardian. And only in cases of absolute necessity would the child be placed in detention.

That is the difference, and that is why the bill removes those cases from immediately Article 8 into Article 7, as a PINS case, because it allows for a variety of services and considerations for that child that the judge does not have under Article 8. That's the only purpose of this legislation,

Madam President. 1 2 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, Madam President. On the bill. 3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 5 Thank you, Senator. Senator Saland, on the bill. 6 7 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, 8 On the bill. Senator. Madam President, notwithstanding 9 10 Senator Montgomery's passionate commitment to 11 children that she may have and be attempting 12 to deal with with regard to this Article 7/ Article 8 scenario that we've created, this is 13 14 an extraordinarily dangerous bill. This is a 15 bill which unfortunately the sponsor's intentions are belied by the language of the 16 bill. This bill very clearly says -- and it's 17 18 in Article 8, it is amending Section 8-12. And it clearly says that in the situation 19 20 involving a child and a parent, Article 8 does 21 not apply, Article 7 applies. Article 7 is the PINS section, 22 which, yes, provides a plethora of services 23 not normally provided under Article 8. 24 25 are circumstances, in some instances some

instances life-threatening circumstances, in which it's very appropriate for criminal jurisdiction to intervene. This would say in absolutely no circumstance could there be that kind of intervention.

There will be people were this bill to pass both houses and be signed into law, there will be people who will be badly injured, there will be people who will be possibly killed, there will be people who will be maimed, and there will no concurrent jurisdiction.

So I would assume, of necessity in a criminal case, there would be some effort, depending upon whether it's a truly violent crime, under one section of the law to enable a criminal prosecution, but there will be a host of other sections, all of which are defined -- the recklessness sections, the mischief sections -- in which nothing will be able to be done.

I would respectfully submit that there are other ways to accomplish what Senator Montgomery proposes to accomplish.

This is not the vehicle by which to do it.

This is not merely throwing the baby out with 1 the bath water, this is basically reordering 2 3 the entire system, reordering the entire 4 system and making it virtually impossible for 5 parents in any number of appropriate situations to be able to call upon the 6 7 criminal courts for some type of relief. 8 And to say that there are no circumstances under which an Article 8 offense 9 should be heard by a criminal court really is 10 11 a grotesque policy statement, and it's a 12 statement which should be denied by this body. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 13 14 Senator Savino. 15 SENATOR SAVINO: Thank you, Madam President. 16 Senator Saland, would you yield for 17 18 a question? 19 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 20 Senator Saland, do you yield? SENATOR SALAND: 21 Yes. SENATOR SAVINO: 22 Thank you. 23 Through you, Madam President. I've listened and I've read the 24 25 language on the bill, and so -- I mean, I'm

not totally sure I don't disagree with you with respect to the way the bill is drafted, and I think Senator Montgomery also heard that.

However, are you opposed to the intent of the legislation?

SENATOR SALAND: No, my concern is that there are circumstances under which these Article 8 offenses appropriately belong in criminal court.

You may recall, and it's probably before you were here serving, there was a time when somebody who, particularly a woman in a family offense case, had to make a choice as to whether or not she wanted to go to Family Court or whether or not she wanted to go to Criminal Court. And there was a 72-hour period within which she had to make that choice. We changed that law in 1994. I remember it well because it was part of the Family Protection and Domestic Violence Intervention Act, which I authored and every member of the house at that time was a cosponsor of.

We changed that law in order to

ensure that you had the ability to have 1 2 concurrent jurisdiction in these types of I don't know why anybody would want to 3 cases. 4 deny concurrent jurisdiction in these types of 5 cases. And if it's an unintended consequence and Senator Montgomery would like to have the 6 7 ability of more services in a situation 8 involving a child and a parent, that's what she should be doing, in my opinion. 9 10 I don't think this vehicle accomplishes that limited intent that she 11 12 described as being her intent. This is certainly far more of a blunderbuss approach 13 that throws everything out, because you're now 14 15 saying that Article 7 controls in those situations involving a child and a parent or 16 guardian. 17 18 SENATOR SAVINO: Thank you, Senator Saland. 19 20 On the bill itself. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 21 Senator Savino, on the bill. 22 23 SENATOR SAVINO: You know, I

cosponsored this bill with Senator Montgomery

and I support the intent behind the

24

legislation. And I think it's important for those of you who are in the room who really never spent a lot of time in the Family Court system -- as Senator Saland has, as I have, as Senator Montgomery has -- working within the child welfare system, I think it's important that we explain to people what the difference is between a PINS petition and a family offense and what the reality is for many parents who are dealing with what can be recalcitrant children to those who are capable of violence offense.

Many parents who have children who are adolescents are at their wit's end. And they've sought treatment, they've sought assistance, but they don't really know where to go. And there comes a period of time where a parent realizes that they may need protection from their own child, and they have one of two ways to go with this, depending on the offense that the child commits.

Many parents don't realize that
they have the ability to go to the Family
Court and apply for a PINS petition before the
child's behavior becomes so bad that they fear

for themselves and other members of their family. A PINS petition, though, provides something that a family offense finding will not provide to a parent, and what that is predominantly is access to services that they desperately need to deal with their recalcitrant teenager or teenagers.

If you apply for a PINS petition and you're granted that PINS petition, it gives you access to a caseworker from the local social service district. In the City of New York, it's through the Administration of Children's Services. You have a caseworker who is then assigned to work with you to deal with your child.

If you don't, if you only go the family offense route, you don't have access to that service. And that is what Senator

Montgomery is trying to provide. It shouldn't get to the point where parents are required to go and file a family offense petition and then have that child that they haven't figured out how to deal with, for a variety of reasons, now have a case that's pending in Criminal Court and Family Court because of the

concurrent jurisdiction. 1 2 That is the intent behind this 3 legislation. And if -- Senator Saland, I 4 think I heard you clearly, you support the 5 intent behind that. Your concern is behind 6 the way the bill is drafted, that the 7 unintended consequence of what could be a 8 legislative flaw could create a bigger problem for these families. 9 10 So I'm still supporting this bill. And I think we heard you clearly that the bill 11 may need some tweaks so that we achieve the 12 13 intent of the legislation which is so important for families who really need some 14 15 service. You don't want to become a parent who now says "I have nowhere to go but to 16 Criminal Court to find ways to deal with my 17 18 child." 19 Thank you. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 21 Senator Robach. 22 SENATOR ROBACH: Yes, Madam President. On the bill. 23 While I certainly agree with my 24 25 colleague Steve Saland and understand Senator

Montgomery's best intentions, I guess I look at it a little bit from the other way. I think that people who are dealing with this unfortunate incident with their children are at least going to get a crash course on what they have to do when they go through the system. And no one likes to go through that.

But when I look at it globally, I'm concerned with this bill because while I understand the intention, I think there's a bad consequence, that exactly what Senator Savino spoke about will get swept under the rug. If a young child is threatening violently his own parents, you can only imagine what might transpire when he's out of the house.

And ironically, I just came from a hearing on youth violence in the Office of Children and Family Services. I know what those results are. In the backyard of a friend of mine, Officer Anthony DiPonzio of Rochester, shot in the head by a 14-year-old nine months out of OCFS. No supervision, and clearly the wrong classification -- after the fact, finding out all these violent things.

I believe if his parents or parent, in this case, would have perhaps gone the other route and made a little bit more of a serious attempt to help this kid, it would not only stop that violence but it also ironically would have helped the individual, because maybe he would have been in a different place that wouldn't have allowed him to do this very violent, impulsive behavior.

You know, President Kennedy said it best, that the situation and crisis at hand should dictate the right government action.

And we have, unfortunately -- it saddens me -- an explosion of youth violence. I can't even understand how a 15, a 16-year-old not only killing people in authority -- you know, we had another woman in Lockport that had a blanket thrown over her and was beat with a hammer by kids she was taking care of every day, working for New York State government.

And then you hear about the other violence on women, young girls, young boys.

So I don't have a lot of constituents coming to me saying, "I'm worried that my kid is put in the wrong

classification." I more get "I'm worried that my kid's completely out of control and I don't know what's going to happen," and I don't want it to be after the fact when that young person is arrested.

So I think we just have to be very, very careful how we do this. And I think that there could be a better way to make sure, in the PINS -- which I fought very hard to get that legislation passed -- that people can get those services. But I don't think in any way, shape or form should we nor should we deter anybody from taking this growing number of young people, who unfortunately are almost -- are indicating violence or have committed some degree of violence, from classifying them or stopping them from prevailing more violence anywhere in our society, both on their family, to other young people, or to people in authority.

So I would encourage a no vote and say let's go back to the drawing board and try to get to your goal in a better way that doesn't put those young people or anybody in the general public at risk.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

2 Senator Montgomery.

SENATOR MONTGOMERY: Yes, Madam

President. I appreciate Senator Robach's

comments, and I just want to certainly agree

with him that we are now treating children who

have problems, who run into trouble and who at

a very early stage in their lives exhibit, in

one way or another, some need for some

attention that we don't provide for them, some

support, and to address them at a stage in

their lives when it would make a difference.

I agree with you.

And so the manifestation of these -- of issues that young people have at a very early stage is violence at a later stage that we don't understand and we can't figure out what to do about.

So you're right, Senator Robach. I certainly agree with you. And that was what was my intent with this legislation. But absolutely I agree with you that we -- this bill does not really help with issues related to family violence in a broader sense. It does not help in providing a support system

for families with children, with young people who are in trouble. It does not help to get them help and assistance and support at a time when it would be make a difference, where they would not be confronted with a violent teenager later in life.

So yes, you're right, it does not do, really, what we need to be doing in this house. But it was just aimed at hopefully making sure that we don't rush every young person into the criminal system, as opposed to giving ourselves an opportunity to do some of the things that you suggest that we need to do. We need to look at them individually to see what are the symptoms indicating what that young person needs at an early enough stage.

So what I would like to do, Madam
President, I would like to lay this bill aside
so that hopefully we can discuss this in a
larger context, and to pick up on some of the
issues that Senator Robach has raised with
regard to looking at our youngsters at an
early enough stage so that we can actually
help them and avoid them having to be either
PINS or otherwise. I accept that, and I want

1	to make sure that what we do is in the best
2	interests of the families that we want to
3	support as well as the children that we want
4	to support.
5	So I would like to lay the bill

971, by Senator Parker, Senate Print 2165B, an 1 act to amend Chapter 912 of the Laws of 1920. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 3 4 Senator Padavan. 5 SENATOR PADAVAN: Thank you, Madam President. 6 7 I rise to express a point of view 8 that would hopefully lead you to reject this 9 I am strongly in opposition to proposal. 10 legalizing what is referred to as mixed martial arts in the State of New York. 11 12 When the promoters advertise, show these combative sports on TV and elsewhere, 13 they refer to them not as mixed martial arts 14 15 but as ultimate fighting. Ultimate fighting. And that's exactly what they are. We're 16 teaching our children that you can rap 17 18 somebody in the back of his neck with your elbow, knee him in the groin, knock him down 19 20 and beat him up while he's on the ground, with blood all over the place, and that's perfectly 21 all right, that that's a sport. 22 Well, I suggest to you that it's 23 24 far from a sport. It is barbaric in every 25 sense of the word. Yes, it's being done

elsewhere in other venues, but that doesn't mean we have to do it in New York.

I have in front of me a memo from the New York State Catholic Conference, which strongly opposes this bill. And I'd like to just read a couple of sentences from it. "The fight involved knees to the groin, kidney punches, knees to the head, and a lot of the aforementioned choking. Please don't show our children that the well-being of the men and women caught up in this violent degradation are worth less than the animals such as Buster's Law that we have so diligently designed to protect animals."

We outlawed animal fighting in this state, which is ultimate fighting, because they fight to the death in most cases. Why the revenues, whatever they might be, that this particular active activity will generate so far transcend the message that we are generating by instituting it justifies passing this bill I am totally incapable of understanding.

So I would strongly urge that we reject this bill, that we listen carefully to

what others are saying in opposition, that we 1 teach our children that this type of contact 2 3 between human beings is just not acceptable 4 and certainly should not be viewed as a sport. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 6 Thank you. 7 Senator L. Krueger. 8 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you, Madam President. 9 10 I rise to share my concern, as Senator Padavan has, that this is a very bad 11 12 mistake for New York State. Mixed martial 13 arts encourages violence among our children. 14 There's no getting around the violence in the 15 sport. Medical experts agree participation can lead to permanent brain damage and 16 17 premature death. 18 Other sports are finally starting 19

to realize the dangers of concussions and acting to reduce them. But in mixed martial arts they wear no padding, they wear no helmets, they wear no protective gear, even like boxing.

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When other communities have acted to legalize, inevitably we have seen increased

injuries and, yes, some deaths that followed. And I share my colleague's concern that it encourages dangerous behavior by children who won't know any of the rules to follow to be careful, who will just be copying what they see going on on TVs.

The New York Times recently had an article discussing the concerns that this is increasing violence in our society, that even though supposedly the rules have changed in the modern version of mixed martial arts, it still results in serious danger and harm done to the people who participate.

The most forceful argument I've seen comes from the British Medical
Association, which is battling to ban both ultimate fighting and boxing, and they declared that "Doctors cannot stand by while violent fighting tournaments are allowed to take place. Large money can be earned by participants, promoters and others linked to the ultimate fighting, but no amount of money can compensate for permanent brain damage and premature death."

I know we live in a violent

society. I know you can't legislate against violence. I know that our children get mixed messages all the time -- some of them good, some of them towards violence. But I can't vote for a bill that would increase the number of legal activities that promote violence, that can cause serious permanent brain damage or death, and will be used as models by our young children about what are considered acceptable sports activities and unacceptable activities. I urge my colleagues to vote no.

Thank you, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Klein, on the bill.

SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you, Madam President. I rise in support of this legislation and commend my colleague Senator Parker for bringing this legislation to the floor.

Clearly we've heard a lot about this specific sport. And certainly if it were back in 1997 when New York State banned mixed martial arts because at the time it was completely unregulated and a dangerous activity and often compared to human

cockfighting, that certainly is no longer the 1 2 case right now. 3 Since that time, it's been 4 regulated, a regulated sport in 37 states 5 which created rules and guidelines to prevent the savagery once associated with this sport. 6 7 So it's come a long way. It is regulated very 8 similar to how we regulate boxing. It's very similar to how we regulate wrestling. 9 10 And I think the time has come for New York State to be the 38th state that 11 12 allows mixed martial arts. If you look at --13 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 14 Can we have order in the chamber, please. 15 SENATOR KLEIN: Thank you, Madam President. 16 If you look at the success rate of 17 18 the sport as far as a revenue generator in other states, it's outstanding. 19 20 pay-per-view for the events is off the charts. Neighboring New Jersey, in the Meadowlands and 21 22 other venues, packs arenas. This is something 23 that I think can do the same thing for

You know, I firmly believe that,

New York State.

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you know, people around our great state want 1 2 to watch this. And as long as it's regulated, which it will be under this bill, I think we 3 4 can generate an awful lot of revenue for many 5 regions around our state. I know Senator Griffo is supportive of this legislation. 6 Ι 7 know one of the top-ranked fighters is a 8 constituent of his. So there is this New York 9 connection. 10 I know the numbers are not quite clear, but it has been said we can generate 11 12 certainly in the first year upward of \$5 million. And of course in the legislation 13 14 there is a 10 percent tax on receipts on 15 ticket sales as well as broadcasting rights, and I think with time this can be a very 16 compelling revenue generator for the state as 17 18 well as a recurring one. 19 So I vote yes, Madam President. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 21 Thank you, Senator. 22 Senator Padavan, why do you rise? 23 SENATOR PADAVAN: Will Senator Klein yield to a question. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

21	allowed, other things like choking would not
22	be allowed under the legislation.
23	SENATOR PADAVAN: Madam
24	President, the fact that it doesn't say it is
25	not allowed doesn't mean that it is allowed.

It does mean it's allowed, because it's being done. You talked about those 37 venues. Turn it on, look at one of those fights going on in the cages. You will see choking, you will see kneeing, you will see people being hit while they're on the ground and blooded. And it is permitted by those regulations, which I assume are the very same regulations you are referring to.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

Senator Padavan, are you on the bill or --

SENATOR PADAVAN: Yes, I'm taking a second bite at the apple, if I may. Because the Senator is not going to yield, obviously, to the question that I'm asking.

It is not prohibited. These things are allowed. They are going on today. And I don't care about the \$5 million. But I do care about what we are teaching our children.

Now, I'm familiar with when we send our kids to learn judo, taekwondo and other martial arts, and I've been in those places, and I've seen what those children are learning, and it's great. But you don't, you don't knee somebody in the groin, you don't

hit them in the back of the neck with your elbow, you don't beat them up while they're lying on the ground, and you don't choke them.

And that's what this type of ultimate fighting will provide. And if you allowed some of these promoters to go further, they'd have the thumbs up or thumbs down part of it. But they don't go that far. But they certainly do allow someone to be beaten unconscious before that fight will be stopped.

It's not something I think this state, with all due regard to what's going on elsewhere, should permit to be happening.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Volker, on the bill.

SENATOR VOLKER: Madam President, you know, over the years I have spoken on a number of occasions on violence and television, and I'm the first one to say that it's almost uncontrollable. And when you start talking, for instance, about gun violence, it's kind of a laughable thing to me when people don't realize that the amount of violence, the number of people killed by fists and clubs and other means other than guns has

been rising at a dramatic rate.

I think violence -- and especially for our young people, that a great reason why we have so many problems in our schools has to do with what young people see on television.

And I know they can see it on the Internet and so forth. That doesn't make it any more right.

I've seen this ultimate fighting stuff. And if you think about it, boxing, a tough sport, but there are all sorts of rules that govern what can be done during a fight. Senator Krueger and Senator Padavan are right, that ultimate fighting is really about as far out as you can get without going back to the old gladiatorial system.

I realize that it's hard for us to control what our children see, what our people see. Many of us who have been involved in criminal justice are absolutely convinced that the amount of violence in our streets is directly related to what they see and to what is being produced by Hollywood and many other people and the dramatic nature of the bloody kinds of things that we are involved in.

Normally, I speak only where there 1 is terms of something that we can absolutely 2 3 stop. We can't absolutely stop this ultimate 4 fighting, but we can send a message to our 5 people here in New York that New York is not 6 ready to brutalize people in a public way. 7 And having watched these ultimate fights and 8 the way that they're done -- and I'll show you 9 one thing. Some people now out in the streets 10 are beginning to practice ultimate fighting. 11 And, you know, it seems to me that it will 12 only lead to more violence, to more problems, that we sometimes completely forget about. 13 14 So I'm with Senator Padavan and 15 Senator Krueger. This type of activity should not be legalized in New York, and we should 16 try wherever we can to curb violence on TV and 17 18 on the Internet. Because if we don't, it's very possible our society may be headed for an 19 20 even worse situation than we're in today. 21 So I'm going to vote against this 22 legislation. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 23 Senator Alesi, on the bill. 24 25 SENATOR ALESI: Madam President,

my colleagues, thank you.

I'm almost feeling a little bit uncomfortable saying that I am opposing this bill, because having watched ultimate fighting or whatever else you want to call in a more sanitized version, it literally turns my stomach. And for those people who are not affected in that way, I would broaden it and simply say this, that anyone that can get over watching this for any extended period of time has to become desensitized, desensitized to this kind of brutality.

And if there is any one thing we know about problems with young people and violence across this nation -- in fact, violence throughout the world -- it is that they have become desensitized to violence by watching violence on television, by watching people be killed by guns, by watching people be brutally beaten, to the extent where when they see it in real life, they're completely desensitized to it. It doesn't mean anything to them.

And for those people, many of whom are now involved in violent crime, a lot of

times I believe you can trace some of that violence back to the fact that they've been exposed to it over and over and over and over again so many times, they don't see it or feel it as violence.

Now, you can see this on television right now. And as Senator Volker said, yeah, can you catch it on the Internet. And there's no preventing that. Although the bill says if you're 16 years or younger you can't attend one of these events. But you can see them. And I guarantee you the more we see this, the more this kind of brutally is going to mean nothing to younger people. And I also believe that there will probably come a time where even though the bill does not address amateur bouts, you'll start to see amateur bouts that are not sanctioned happening in neighborhoods or other places.

This bill also says you have to be 18 years old or so. That's pretty young.

When you've watched ultimate fighting, 18 years old is pretty young to be in a situation like that, especially when the bill allows you to have a fight every 72 hours -- one fight

every three days if you can do it. If you can pass the physical, if your brains and your body aren't so beat up.

generator. And my best guess is this bill will be passed based on the fact that New York doesn't want to lose this great opportunity at revenue. But I truly and honestly believe that the more we expose people in our society to this kind of brutality, the more they're going to be desensitized to it and the more outside of the ring we're going to see this kind of activity in our streets and in our schools and places where we would like young people as well as people of older ages to feel safe.

This is going to erode the safety of our communities, our schools and our neighborhoods. And I have to vote no on that basis.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

Senator Leibell.

SENATOR LEIBELL: Thank you,

Madam President. Just to echo some of the

recent comments of my colleagues.

There has to be a distinction 1 2 between what's acceptable sport and what is 3 pure brutality. We have all discussed, and we have discussed it as a nation, the violence 4 5 that we see within our society. I have to 6 believe that encouraging something like this, 7 especially as some sort of an economic engine, 8 can only reduce our society to more and more 9 violence. 10 I mean, how many times do we discuss the injuries that come about from 11 sports such as football, the head traumas? 12 We've seen our professional athletes, how many 13 14 of them at a relatively early age are maimed 15 and crippled. Regardless of the dollars involved 16 for this state, this is a bad way to go. We 17 18 should be looking for ways to address violence within our society. Madam President, I'll be 19 20 voting in the negative. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 21 Thank you, Senator. 22 23 Senator Parker. Thank you, Madam 24 SENATOR PARKER: 25 President. On the bill.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 1 2 Senator Parker, would you yield to Senator 3 Lanza? 4 SENATOR PARKER: For Senator 5 Lanza, anything. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 6 7 Senator Lanza, on the bill. 8 SENATOR LANZA: Thank you, Madam President. And thank you, Senator Parker. 9 10 I'll be brief. As I listened to my colleagues Senator Padavan, Senators Volker, 11 12 Leibell, Alesi, I just want to say, Madam President, I couldn't agree more. We're 13 14 really living through tough times. Economic, 15 we're 75 or 76 days late with the budget here in this state. We've got so many important 16 social issues that we need to address in this 17 18 state and across the country. People who are impoverished, people looking for a job --19 20 there's so many things that we have a 21 responsibility here as a Legislature to 22 address. 23 And I just feel that we can do so 24 much better than legislation like this. 25 can't be the best that we can do.

And as I listen to the reasons that those who support this legislation offer up, it seems to come down to money. No one's saying anything good about this activity and this conduct. And I just happen to believe that money doesn't make everything all right, that just because you can profit from something it's a good thing.

And there are lots of things that we know that people profit from, whether it's the drug trade or others -- and I'm not comparing this to the drug trade. But I'm just saying that making money doesn't make right or make good or make decent. And this truly is a terrible message to be sending.

You know, as a father of three young children, I can tell you I think it's tougher than ever to raise kids the right way in a society where they are continually bombarded by all sorts of garbage and nonsense. And I think this will make it harder.

You know what the world needs now, as the song says, is more love. Some decency, some compassion. And that's what we should be

talking about. And that's what we should be delivering. We should not send this terrible message that it's okay to really brutalize human decency.

You know, there is a famous football player who went to jail because people were profiting and watching and enjoying dogs fighting. In this state you can go to jail if you let birds fight. Do we truly believe that birds and dogs are more important than people? I really think that that's the message being sent here. And it is truly a terrible one.

And for that reason, I'm going to be voting no. Thank you, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

Thank you, Senator.

Senator Parker, to close.

SENATOR PARKER: Thank you, Madam

President. On the bill.

I did not realize we had so many peaceniks in this chamber. But let me just -- I rise to, as the sponsor of this bill, just really to, one, clip some things that I think are misunderstood about this sport.

Mixed martial arts is a legitimate sport. It is a sport that has grown over the last number of years. You'll see, out of the 44 states in this great union that have sporting commissions, as Senator Klein indicated, 37 of them have sanctioned mixed martial arts as a legitimate sport.

What my bill attempts to do is to essentially bring us into the mainstream, is to address some of the concerns that people have in this chamber. I agree with almost all of my colleagues with their concerns I guess about violence in our society. I'm not clear that the legalization and regulation of mixed martial arts in the State of New York is going to add to that.

I think that if we are going to ban this, then we ought to be talking about an omnibus bill where we ban boxing from the state, where we ban hockey from the state, where we ban football from the state, where we ban lacrosse from the state. I mean, you know, we have three competitive hockey teams that play in and around the greater New York area and the State of New York, and this is a

sport, you know, where fighting and people losing teeth is part of the everyday activity. And we just celebrated the championship of that sport. Mixed martial arts is actually far more regulated than the fighting that many people in this room enjoy in hockey.

That being said, there's again some conceptions about the kind of striking that can be done. What we're doing in this bill is that we're regulating it. We're saying what can and can't be done. We're saying that there has to be a level of safety. We're saying there has to be a level of humanity in this bill.

Senator Padavan, some of the things that -- I certainly understand and really sympathize with some of your sentiment about this, because I know that you feel very, very strongly about this, as you do many issues that you speak about on this floor.

Striking to the back of the neck is not allowed. Kicking and striking people while they're down is allowed in certain circumstances, but it's not standing over somebody and then stomping them. That's kind

of not what happens.

Also the conversation kind of, you know, in this chamber describes an event that, you know, is almost like gladiarism {sic}.

All right? And that's not in fact what happens. There is in fact a referee. There is in fact somebody who monitors it. There is in fact -- you're right that there are submission holds in which people are allowed to tap out or in fact the referee can let people come out of it.

But when you look at the rates of injury -- and Senator Krueger spoke to this as well -- when you look at the rates of injury, particularly concussions, they're actually significantly and dramatically less in mixed martial arts than there are in boxing.

Significantly less. And why? Because actually most of the bouts are not decided by people pounding or punching or kicking.

And it's tightly regulated. We will be putting those regulations over to our New York State commission that I think we all trust to do the right thing as relates to regulating the sport. And I think that it

will be something that I think ultimately people will see as a very worthy sport.

engaging in doing training around the sport.

Even though bouts aren't allowed, people are still training in the State of New York.

Again, we want to bring all of that under regulation. We want to make sure that people are safe when participating in the sport, because this is a sport. And we certainly don't want our young people hurt or injured in any significant way in the sport.

And when people have spoken to the economic implications of this legislation, I think that people have frankly understated them. When you talk about the actual help to the economy in upstate New York by this legislation, you're talking about, to start, it will be \$5.2 million and another \$11.5 million in New York City because of the economic activity, both because of the actual events as well as people coming into town and the other kinds of things, the ancillary economic activity that surrounds a sanctioned bout.

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And so I ask my colleagues to, you

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an hour of valuable time here this afternoon when we should have been doing something about an important thing called the budget.

When you start to look at these innate actions that we see when we've taken the time to watch this on TV, now I know where all of the games in my city of Kingston and Newburgh, where they get all of their talent from watching this. We're not teaching young people how to be adults, we're teaching young people how to be hoodlums. Look what they do on this show -- pound one another, kick one another. My friend Carl Marcellino said they have those big boxing gloves, they have those leather hand gloves so they can hit and punch one another.

This is a disgrace, this bill is.

We should be ashamed of ourself as a

legislative body, putting this out here. The

next thing, we'll find a street fight in one

of our cities and everybody will say, well,

they do it on television. You people signed a

law to let it happen. This is a disgrace.

I will be able to look at my grandchildren this weekend and say "I don't

let you watch it on TV, and I didn't vote for 1 it in Albany." Why should you? 2 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 3 4 Order in the chamber, please. 5 SENATOR LARKIN: This is -- think 6 of what you're saying. I hear people in here 7 saying we've got to stop the nonsense in the 8 cities, we've got to -- and mostly the people from the City of New York talk about how we've 9 10 got to do something for the young people. Well, you're not doing anything. 11 12 And then when I hear someone say 13 this is going to be for the economy, are we 14 stooping that low to say we're going to have 15 this rough-and-tumble and it's going to help your economy? What about doing something to 16 create jobs, not create confusion? 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Larkin will be recorded in the 19 20 negative. Senator Griffo, to explain his 21 22 vote. SENATOR GRIFFO: Thank you, Madam 23 President. 24 25 While I appreciate and respect that

everyone here would have a personal perspective and a personal preference on any matter of sport, I think what we're dealing with today is the fact that this is an organized sport. It is an organized sport that currently exists and will continue to exist.

And what this bill will do is it will allow the State Athletic Commission to regulate the sport, to ensure things are done properly, and to pay attention to this sport in the way that everybody is expressing they would like to see that take place, to ensure safety.

And secondly, it allows New York
State athletes to participate in their own
state in a sport that they may choose to
participate in, no different than any other
professional athlete has that opportunity to
do in any other professional sport.

And it also enables this state to benefit economically during some very difficult, challenging times.

So for those reasons, I vote yes.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

Senator Griffo to be recorded in the affirmative.

Senator Diaz, to explain his vote.

SENATOR DIAZ: Thank you, Madam

President.

This is a legislation that I cannot support. I preach in my church, the church that I am the pastor, I preach against violence. And I preach against things that destroy our youth. And I try to teach my youth and people in my church that violence is never, never, never good and never takes us anywhere.

And this kind of sports, this kind of legislation sends a wrong message, a wrong message to all our communities -- especially, especially, especially in our communities.

And don't come and kill the messenger now. But our community needs better messages. Our community needs a message of peace, a message of -- not a message that promotes and creates violence and gives our children, our youth that mentality. We have too much movies, too much TV, too much negative TV, too much negative movies, too

much things going on in our communities destroying the minds and the behavior of our youth, of our people.

So this is -- this is -- honestly, this is not good for our communities. So I'm voting no, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

Senator Diaz to be recorded in the negative.

Senator Savino, to explain her

vote.

SENATOR SAVINO: Thank you, Madam President.

It is a rare day indeed when party-line votes are not actually party-line votes in this body. We're seeing the yeses on that side and the nos on this side, and yeses here and nos on that side, and I think it's very interesting to see the way this is turning out.

I've heard the argument on both sides that this is a revenue producer and that we're regulating this sport, and I've heard the argument that this is pure violence and we're just allowing people access to it on television. I tend to agree with the latter

argument.

You know, 2,000 years ago the people of ancient Rome used to gather in the Coliseum, along with the Emperor and the Roman Senate, and they would watch gladiators fight to the death and kill each other. And when they were done with that -- that wasn't entertaining enough -- they used to feed the Jews and the Christians to the lions.

That's what passed for entertainment in ancient Rome. And I'm sure the people who ran the city of Rome considered that an economic development program as well. There's not much difference between that and this.

I cannot support this. It is a barbaric -- and I don't want to use the word "sport," because I don't think there's anything sporting about ultimate fighting. It is barbarism portrayed on television for people so that they can watch it and be entertained. And at what point do we cross back over the Rubicon to start feeding people to the lions? Maybe we'll call that a way to save government money because we won't have to

buy food for the lions in the zoo. 1 2 I vote no on this bill, and I think that before we grasp at any dollar that we can 3 4 find in an effort to deal with our budget 5 crisis, we should take a good long look at what we're willing to do for \$5 million. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 8 Senator Savino to be recorded in the negative. Senator Thompson, to explain his 9 10 vote. SENATOR THOMPSON: Yes, Madam 11 12 Chairwoman. I rise in support of this bill. I know that many of my colleagues 13 14 have expressed some concern. But as 15 previously stated, this legislation will allow the State Athletic Commission to move forward 16 17 with the process. In Niagara Falls, this 18 would be great. I only request one thing, that the 19 20

first match is in Niagara Falls. I think it's a great backdrop. In fact, there's a boxing match in Niagara Falls on Saturday night.

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So this is really good. I think it will provide some economic opportunity. I think the state should receive more money,

actually, but it's a start. And I think it's 1 2 a good start, and I strongly support this 3 legislation. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 5 Senator Thompson to be recorded in the affirmative. 6 7 Senator C. Johnson, to explain his 8 vote. 9 SENATOR CRAIG JOHNSON: Thank you 10 very much, Madam President. I'm going to be 11 voting in the affirmative on this. 12 I've been listening very closely to the debate and the questions, and I'm struck 13 14 by some of the comments and observations. 15 not only permit boxing and hockey, but we promote pro wrestling. And while we as adults 16 know it's fake, our children certainly don't 17 18 know it's fake. And yet our children are actively -- there are instances where children 19

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is now running for the United States Senate based on the millions of dollars she's made on this sport that we as a state have done nothing to try and ban.

But I think what's even more
troubling is sitting here in the Senate today
listening to those who oppose this
legislation, which will provide regulation,
are outraged by the potential violence that is
going on, are going to vote against it, and
yet also voted against yesterday a
microstamping bill that would have helped
police end real gun violence in New York
State.

I haven't seen these instances of gangs of youth running in our streets, given the fact they can watch mixed martial arts on television right now, and yet we're trying to prevent our police from stopping the real problem of gun violence in New York State, when yesterday we couldn't pass that bill.

I'm going to vote aye on this piece of legislation. I thank the sponsor. I thank Senator Klein, who's been involved in this.

And I do vote aye. Thank you very much.

Senator C. Johnson to be recorded in the affirmative. Senator Saland, to explain his vote. SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, Madam President. My time is limited, so I certainly don't want to pursue the line of argument that was just thrown out there by Senator Johnson. Suffice it to say that this is a brutal, barbaric activity. I wouldn't even deem it to be a sport. And yes, there have

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

brutal, barbaric activity. I wouldn't even deem it to be a sport. And yes, there have been hockey players who have been prosecuted for their violence that has occurred within the hockey rink. And even professional football, a very violent sport, is making an evident because of the injuries that the athletes have sustained, either to try and avoid the multiplicity of concussions that have occurred or to provide some type of funding for those who in their fifties are substantially disabled, who are neurologically damaged to the point where they prematurely experience dementia.

And what we are effectively doing here, what is attempting to be done with this, is to give sanction to one of the most violent of activities, something that would probably be most closely related to in fact the gladiator analogy in the Roman Forum thousands of years ago.

This is nothing that we should condone. This should be uniformly condemned. And if the basis for our embracing this is the fact that it provides a source of revenue, then shame on us, how low could we possibly stoop?

I vote in the negative.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS:

Senator Saland to be recorded in the negative.

Senator Alesi, to explain his vote.

SENATOR ALESI: Thank you, Madam

19 President and my colleagues.

I think I've given my reasons for opposing this bill. Primarily because I believe that the more exposure our society gets to this, the more desensitized our people, especially our young people, will become to this kind of brutality. And you'll

see more and more of it in our streets and our schools and our neighborhoods.

But I'd like to point out one thing to my colleagues here. If you look at this bill, this bill doesn't just authorize ultimate fighting. It actually takes out a significant part of Section 5 of the existing law that sanctions professional wrestling, professional boxing, et cetera, et cetera.

This bill carves out a specific piece of the existing law that says you cannot have ultimate fighting in New York State. And under circumstances surrounding ultimate fighting, under the existing law, you could be fined up to \$20,000 or more, you could receive a felony, you could receive a misdemeanor or any other number of things.

So somewhere, somehow, sometime, somebody recognized that even though we have professional wrestling, which is theater, professional boxing, which is legitimate to some extent, we don't have, today, ultimate fighting in the law. It's illegal.

So this bill isn't just saying we can have it now, it's saying we're taking out

what exists in the law today. Felonies, 1 misdemeanors, fines up to \$20,000 or more if 2 3 you engage in this. Somebody had it right sometime. 4 5 And you know the most interesting thing about this? And I don't want to get too 6 7 soft on this whole thing, but you know the 8 only place that you specifically can't have ultimate fighting in a hall or some other 9 10 venue in New York State? You can't have it in a place that's used specifically for religious 11 services. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 13 14 Senator Alesi, how do you vote? 15 SENATOR ALESI: For religious Somebody must have their -- I vote 16 services. 17 no. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Alesi to be recorded in the negative. 19 20 Senator Stavisky, to explain her 21 vote. 22 SENATOR STAVISKY: Thank you, 23 Madam President. I've listened to the debate, and I 24 25 must tell you I'm not a big fan of these

type -- I don't think sports, necessarily.

But we watch revenue opportunities slip away.

We're constantly being reminded that we have a

\$9.2 billion deficit. People are watching

these activities, but they're watching it in

other states.

And I think it's time that we took advantage of the revenues that will be produced in New York State in something that will be recognized and supervised by the State Athletic Commission.

When I used to see the news at night and you watch some of the clips from the hockey games and you see the referee standing there on the ice, watching one player go after another with a stick, and they hit and they do all kinds of things, is this different?

This I think will be better regulated, better supervised, and certainly bring in some revenue that we desperately need in New York. I vote aye.

ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Stavisky to be recorded in the affirmative.

Senator DeFrancisco, to explain his

1 vote. 2 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I'm 3 going to vote aye on this bill. 4 And I wasn't expecting to speak, 5 but I couldn't help but have to stand up and comment on what Senator Savino said about this 6 7 is exactly like the gladiators in ancient Rome and we won't have to have food for the 8 animals. I mean, talk about rhetoric. 9 Ι mean, that's absolutely ridiculous. 10 11 These are consenting adults. In 12 some cases, people -- not only for the viewership that may enjoy this sort of 13 thing -- I don't particularly care for it, but 14 15 I don't care for "Real Housewives of New York" either. 16 (Laughter.) 17 18 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: And that doesn't provide too many stimulation for our 19 20 young people either. But it seems to me in some 21 instances this may be the only way to be 22 successful for some people who have to be 23 physically capable of doing these type of 24

25

things.

In fact, if we wanted to really 1 2 carry this to a very beneficial extreme, maybe 3 we could settle the budget crisis by Carl 4 Kruger and I getting into the ring rather than 5 going through what we do every week. 6 (Laughter.) 7 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Secondly, 8 I -- and it's going to be regulated. And one 9 of our most recent boxing commissioners, a 10 female, I can't remember her name, explained why she was in favor of it, because she 11 12 thought it would be regulated. 13 Lastly, the microstamping argument 14 is so ridiculous I'm not even going to reply 15 to that. 16 I vote aye. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 17 18 Senator DeFrancisco to be recorded in the affirmative. 19 20 Senator Padavan, to explain his 21 vote. SENATOR PADAVAN: 22 Senator DeFrancisco, many of the gladiators were 23 24 consenting adults, just as a matter of fact. 25 I too want to comment relevant to

the remarks in explaining his vote by Senator Johnson. I voted for the microstamping bill -- he's gone, he's not here -- and I'm voting against this bill. I don't see the correlation.

On top of that, many of my colleagues, irrespective of how they're voting on this bill, including those who are voting against it, have been advocating criminal justice measures in this state for a long time, only to be thwarted by inaction on that side of the aisle. So to start relating this issue to our records as it relates to dealing with criminals in this state makes no sense whatsoever.

And if you want to go another step further, the sponsor of the microstamping bill was the one who gave us the ceiling where we now have dozens of criminals whose background checks you cannot get and where a drug pusher could end up teaching in a school because that education institution will not be able to get a background check. You remember that whole scenario.

And he promised -- he's not here

either, right now. Oh, yes, he's over 1 2 there -- that he was going to amend the bill 3 to take care of that problem, and he never did. 4 5 So let's not be casting the brickbats in directions that they don't 6 7 belong. 8 The fact remains this is a barbaric 9 practice, it is something that teaches our 10 children the wrong idea about sportsmanship. Yes, many of our sports have potentials for 11 12 harm. But on the football field, they wear helmets and shoulder guards and all sorts of 13 14 things. Similarly in the hockey rink, in a 15 variety of ways. And as far as professional 16 wrestling, the kids I know know it's fake. 17 18 They all know it's fake. ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 19 20 Senator Padavan -- Senator Padavan, how do you vote? 21 SENATOR PADAVAN: 22 I vote no. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Padavan to be recorded in the 24 25 negative.

Senator Adams, to explain his vote. 1 2 SENATOR ADAMS: Thank you, 3 Mr. President -- Mrs. President. 4 I was sort of confused today; when 5 they said "ultimate fighting," I thought they were talking about our chamber when I first 6 7 heard it, to be honest with you. 8 But let me say this. I think Senator Padavan hit it on the head. Football, 9 10 hockey, wrestling, all of those sports have a 11 level of control because they are regulated. 12 When you permit regulations, then you can make sure that people are operating within the span 13 of control to limit the level of injuries that 14 15 takes place. So to vote nay when the ultimate 16 17 fighting is taking place, you're moving it out 18 of the span of regulating, allowing the commissioner to ensure that it falls within 19 20 the scope to protect the fighters, and make sure that the fighters reach a certain level 21 of testing, a certain level of 22 professionalism, and a certain level of 23 behavior. 24 25 So the arguments that are raised of

1	why we shouldn't do it is actually the
2	arguments of why we need to do it. We need to
3	regulate sports and make sure that sports are
4	actually performed in a proper manner to make
5	sure that from our young people all the way up
6	to the adults and the professional level is
7	done with a level of regulation. And that's
8	what our excellent society and system that's
9	in place to regulate the activity of athletes
10	in sports.
11	I vote aye on this bill, and I look
12	forward to having this here in the State of
13	New York.

All of a 21 sudden now the Theater Institute becomes the 22 issue of the day, we have to drop everything 23 else and deal with this now. No disrespect to 24 25 SUNY Albany, but somehow I don't think they're going to go out of business if this bill is not passed by 4 o'clock today.

On top of that, if you look at what happened at the Theater Institute, I don't feel that that has been resolved. We have a director who's resigned, there's new people put in, now the board is going to be juggled around. We don't even know if there's been any effort to get any of the money back from the woman who stole it and pilfered it, giving contracts to her family, buying rights to products that frankly she shouldn't have a right to -- criminal behavior. And here we are just throwing money at a problem that doesn't appear to be fixed.

It's the wrong way to go. We shouldn't be doing this in an incremental fashion. I'm going to vote no.

But clearly a very good friend of all of ours in this room, both sides of the 4 5 aisle, someone well respected by everyone, our former colleague Senator Serph Maltese, lost 6 7 two aunts and his grandmother in this fire. 8 And clearly I think it would be a 9 tribute to Senator Maltese, who every year in 10 March, even after he left the Senate, still comes back here for the ceremony honoring 11 those individuals who died in that tragic 12 fire. So I would certainly recommend that 13 Senator Maltese be on this commission. 14 15 And again, I think this is great legislation and I vote in the affirmative. 16 Thank you. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: Senator Maziarz to be recorded in the 19 20 affirmative. Senator Parker, to explain his 21 22 vote. 23 Thank you, Madam SENATOR PARKER: President. 24 25 As many of you know, this bill

creates a temporary commission to commemorate the 100th anniversary of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire of 1911. And of course this bill is to bring attention to that and create a temporary commission.

Some people may not know that the deaths of 146 immigrant women who were killed in that fire swept through the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory 99 years ago and marks the occasion on which New York changed forever. The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory fire was one of New York's most prolific industrial disasters.

And really what's most shocking about it was the discovery that the managers of the shirtwaist factory had ultimately condemned their valuable employees to a death sentence by locking the doors to the stairwells and exits in order to prevent them from taking cigarette breaks during their shifts. This resulted in many employees being unable to escape. And so of the 146 that perished, 62 persons jumped to their deaths as witnesses looked on and were unable to help.

Attitudes toward safety were as a

result dramatically altered, and from the 1 2 ashes of this horrific event emerged the 3 American Society of Safety Engineers. 4 This tragedy represents the need to 5 acknowledge the past in order to effectively deal with the challenges of our future. I'm 6 7 hopeful everybody will vote for it. 8 aye. 9 And I'm taking Senator Maziarz's 10 suggestion and I'm going to also suggest to our leader in fact that Senator Serph Maltese 11 be the Senate nominee to this commission. 12 13 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 14 Are there any other Senators wishing to 15 explain his or her vote? And I believe this is, instead of being something where we're 22 dealing with crime, we're dealing with 23 intellectual property. I don't think this is 24 25 appropriate to portray it this way. I think

this is just giving a leg up to people in the 1 industry who ought to be able to go into court 2 and sue without a statute like this, sue for 3 4 actual damages, proof we have a civil service 5 that works. I don't think we need to put this 6 in the criminal law. And for those reasons I 7 8 am voting against it. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT STEWART-COUSINS: 10 Senator Hannon to be recorded in the negative. 11 Are there any other Senators 12 wishing to explain his or her vote?
