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2 I have the sad responsibility today of asking for a moment of silence and asking 3 4 my colleagues to join me in that, on the loss 5 of a life by a young Army fellow from my district. б 7 Benjamin Osborn, age 27, who's a 8 graduate of Lake George High School, was 9 killed in a combat mission on Tuesday in 10 Afghanistan. Ben had served three years in the Army. This was his second tour of duty. 11 12 He spent 15 months in Iraq. He had been in Afghanistan since April. 13 He leaves behind his mother and 14 15 father, Beverly and Bill Osborn of Lake George his sister and three brothers, and his new 16 wife, who he had just married in February of 17 18 this past year, Nicole LaPier of South Glens Falls. 19 20 Ben is a real hero. He was in a 21 combat mission; there were about 20 of them. 22 They were being assaulted by a larger Taliban 23 group. His command leader said "I need a

that gunner. And he lost his life.

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gunner," and Ben Osborn stepped forward to be

I spoke with his mother, Beverly, 1 2 this morning, and they are leaving at noon to 3 go to Dover Air Base, where they will receive 4 his remains sometime during the night. 5 But I'd just like to ask all of you to take a moment and offer a prayer and a 6 7 moment of silence for this family, who are 8 heartbroken by the loss of their son, but are truly proud about his service. 9 10 And we are very fortunate, all of 11 us, as we know, to have young men and women 12 who are willing to serve on a volunteer basis, to serve in harm's way and to be the person 13 14 who steps forward and says "I'll do that," 15 even though they know that the outcome could be the loss of their life, as it was for 16 Benjamin Osborn. 17 18 Thank you. And if you would stand and join me for a moment of silence and 19 20 remember this family in your prayers today. I hear all across my district strong concerns 21 22 with people that are already getting out, in the public's opinion, too early who have 23 committed murders, violent offenses. 24 25 I just went through a petition

drive for an individual in my community, Walt 1 2 Casper, let out at the earliest time possible, 3 who very meticulously planned out and murdered 4 his wife, the mother of his own children, 5 only -- shockingly -- to get out very, very early in the process. б 7 I think this bill would be much 8 better and do the job if it only affected 9 nonviolent felons rather than everyone in the 10 criminal justice spectrum, especially those who have already preyed, maimed and murdered 11 12 people in our community. Freshmen in high 13 school, over 50 percent have tried alcohol. 14 Seniors in high school, 35 percent have 15 knowingly got into a car with someone who is 16 under the influence. 17 18 I think this legislation will offer 19 important incentives for those who run liquor 20 establishments to make sure that their 21 employees take these classes. Because the 22 licenses that actually have been given, they can actually get 25 percent off on their civil 23 penalty if they attend these classes. 24 25 So I think it's the incentive

that's needed, because if you look at the 1 State Liquor Authority's programs that they 2 3 run around the state, they're not in very high 4 attendance. So we're not doing everything 5 possible to make sure we're adequately educating people to the problems of underage б 7 drinking and how to spot someone and make sure 8 someone does not purchase alcohol if they're 9 underage. 10 So of course I vote yes, Mr. President. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Klein to be recorded in the 13 affirmative. 14 15 Announce the results. This act shall take effect on the same date and in 11 12 the same manner as Chapter 95 of the Laws of 2010. 13 14 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Call 15 the roll. (The Secretary called the roll.) 16 THE SECRETARY: 17 Ayes, 61. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 19 bill is passed. 20 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 21 948, by Member of the Assembly Kavanagh, 22 Assembly Print Number 7917D, an act to amend the Vehicle and Traffic Law. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 24 Read 25 the last section.

1	THE SECRETARY: Section 3. This
2	act shall take effect on the 60th day.
3	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Call
4	the roll.
5	(The Secretary called the roll.)
6	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
7	Senator Squadron, to explain his vote.
8	SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you very
9	much, Mr. President.
10	This bill was written in response
11	to a tragedy that happened in my district in
12	Chinatown a little over a year ago where two
13	young children were tragically killed when a
14	delivery van ran them over.
15	This bill will not bring Hayley and
16	Diego back, but hopefully it will send the
17	message that careless driving is in many cases
18	as dangerous as other driving infractions on
19	the road, as reckless driving or other things
20	that can lead to tragedy. And it will send
21	the message that you need to exercise due care
22	and be incredibly careful when you're behind
23	the wheel, because the consequences of not
24	doing so can too often be tragic.
25	Hopefully this is a bill that won't

lead to lots of folks having increased 1 penalties, but instead will lead to lots of 2 3 folks driving just a little bit more safely and will save lives. 4 5 Thank you very much, Mr. President. б I vote aye. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 8 Senator Squadron to be recorded in the affirmative. 9 10 Senator DeFrancisco, to explain his 11 vote. 12 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Yes, I voted no because I think in the Penal Law the 13 14 theory is that if you're reckless or 15 intentionally causing various types of events, you should be found to be guilty of a criminal 16 offense. 17 18 This bill actually changes that theory that simply if you're negligent or 19 20 careless, you can be determined to be guilty of a criminal offense, because there's 21 provisions in here for a Class B misdemeanor. 22 I think that really changes 23 criminal law substantially, and it's a --24 25 although the offense here is only a

B misdemeanor, I think such a dramatic change 1 2 in philosophy as far as the criminal law is 3 concerned should be subject to some kind of 4 hearings or something if we're going to change 5 the law this dramatically, and that's why I'm voting no. б ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 7 8 Senator DeFrancisco to be recorded in the 9 negative. Senator Bonacic, to explain his 10 11 vote. 12 SENATOR BONACIC: Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 13 I think when you look on the face 14 15 of this bill, we certainly don't want cars hitting children or bicycles getting in the 16 17 way and hurting people. That's not the 18 problem with the bill. The problem is we're engaging in a slippery slope when you start to 19 20 criminalize acts of negligence. And that's the reason I'm voting 21 22 no, why I voted no in committee. 23 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 24 25 Senator Bonacic to be recorded in the

This act shall take effect immediately. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Call 17 18 the roll. 19 (The Secretary called the roll.) 20 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 61. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 The bill is passed. 22 23 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 1015, by Senator L. Krueger, Senate Print 24 25 6680, an act to amend the Social Services Law.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 1 Read 2 the last section. 3 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 4 act shall take effect immediately. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Call the roll. 6 7 (The Secretary called the roll.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 9 Senator Liz Krueger. 10 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you 11 very much. My colleagues, perhaps we're not 12 understanding the bill, for those of you who 13 are voting against it. This is a bill that's 14 15 pretty much a technical amendment to current public assistance social services law. 16 In social services law, for public 17 18 assistance recipients, they are allowed to have a car with a Blue Book value of up to 19 20 \$9,300. They might only have \$400 of actual equity in it. If they are looking for work or 21 working, they can have a car worth \$9,300. 22 If they are not, at this moment in time, looking 23 for work or working, the car's value can only 24 25 be \$4,000, although that can change from week

to week.

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2	Which means right now a woman with
3	a disabled child or a woman who had just given
4	birth who has a car that might have a
5	Blue Book value of \$6,000, with maybe equity
б	in it of only \$600, would not be allowed to
7	receive public assistance because she wouldn't
8	be able to or would have to give up her
9	car.
10	Now, in New York City this truly
11	doesn't matter. But for many parts of the
12	state, this will leave people with no
13	automobile to get food for their family, to
14	get to medical appointments, to a week later
15	be eligible to look for a job. They won't be
16	able to get a job, they won't be able to get
17	off public assistance.
18	For food stamps, we already have no
19	resource cap on one car. And in fact,
20	modernizing and simplifying this process again
21	is simply a fair and right thing to do. I'm
22	urging a yes vote by all.
23	Thank you, Mr. President.
24	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
25	Senator L. Krueger to be recorded in the

affirmative. 1 2 Announce the results. 3 THE SECRETARY: Those recorded in 4 the negative on Calendar Number 1015 are 5 Senators Alesi, Bonacic, DeFrancisco, Farley, Flanagan, Golden, Griffo, Hannon, Larkin, б 7 LaValle, Libous, Marcellino, Maziarz, 8 Nozzolio, Ranzenhofer, Robach, Seward, Skelos, Volker, Winner and Young. Also Senators 9 10 Leibell and Saland. 11 Ayes, 38. Nays, 23. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The bill is passed. 13 Calendar Number 14 THE SECRETARY: 15 1022, by Senator Savino, Senate Print 7451, an act to amend the Labor Law. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 17 Read 18 the last section. Section 2. 19 THE SECRETARY: This 20 act shall take effect immediately. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 Call the roll. 22 23 (The Secretary called the roll.) ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 24 25 Senator Bonacic, to explain his vote.

SENATOR BONACIC: On the bill, 1 2 just explaining my vote. 3 You know, daycare is something we 4 all seek. There's not enough daycare 5 facilities in the State of New York. You have working mothers that have to spend a good 6 7 portion of their paycheck for people to take 8 care of their children. 9 When you go in the direction of 10 start unionizing childcare, you're going to 11 start to drive the expenses up and up and up, 12 putting so much pressure on middle-class families where maybe both spouses are working 13 14 and they need someone to take care of young 15 children. For that reason, I'm voting no. 16 Thank you, Mr. Chairman. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Bonacic to be recorded in the 19 20 negative. Senator Savino, to explain her 21 22 vote. 23 SENATOR SAVINO: Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 Certainly I share Senator Bonacic's

concern about the cost of daycare and the lack 1 of access to affordable daycare. But I think 2 we need to be clear what we're doing with this 3 4 piece of legislation. 5 In 2007, the governor of the state at the time, Eliot Spitzer, extended б 7 collective bargaining rights to childcare 8 workers through an executive order. All this bill does is codify into law what has been in 9 10 practice since 2007. 11 The childcare workers were given 12 the right to organize through that executive order in an effort for them to help increase 13 the reimbursement rate for daycare providers. 14 15 The majority of daycare providers are not paid directly by parents. In fact, far too many of 16 them are paid through the voucher system 17 18 that's tied to the eligibility of the parent. So what this will do is codify into 19 20 law what's been in practice in the State of New York for the past three years. 21 22 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 23 Senator Savino to be recorded in the 24 25 affirmative.

Announce the results. 1 2 THE SECRETARY: Those recorded in 3 the negative on Calendar Number 1022 are 4 Senators Bonacic, O. Johnson, Ranzenhofer and 5 Skelos. 6 Ayes, 57. Nays, 4. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 8 bill is passed. 9 Senator Klein, that completes the 10 reading of the noncontroversial supplemental active list. 11 12 Senator Seward, why do you rise? SENATOR SEWARD: Mr. President, I 13 would ask unanimous consent -- we had fits and 14 15 starts in terms of starting session. I was on a lengthy phone call when the number of bills 16 went through. And I would ask permission to 17 18 be voted in the negative on Calendar Number 748, 848, and 948. All the 48s. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Klein, Senator Libous, Senator Seward 21 has asked for unanimous consent. 22 23 SENATOR KLEIN: We grant unanimous consent, Mr. President. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: With

unanimous consent, Senator Seward to be 1 2 recorded in the negative on Calendar Numbers 3 748, 848, and 948. 4 SENATOR SEWARD: At least I'm 5 consistent. б ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Yes, 7 you are. 8 SENATOR SEWARD: Thank you. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 10 Senator Klein. 11 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, 12 there's a resolution at the desk by Senator Antoine Thompson. I ask that the title of the 13 resolution be read and move for its immediate 14 15 adoption. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 Senator Klein, has this resolution been deemed 17 18 privileged and submitted by the office of the 19 Temporary President? SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, it has, 20 21 Mr. President. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 23 Secretary will read. 24 THE SECRETARY: By Senator 25 Thompson, legislative resolution commending

All in favor signify by saying aye. б 7 (Response of "Aye.") 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 9 Opposed, nay. 10 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 11 resolution is adopted. 12 13 Senator Maziarz, why do you rise? 14 SENATOR MAZIARZ: Thank you very 15 much, Mr. President. I, like Senator Seward, was also 16 out of the chamber on a phone call -- not 17 18 quite as long as his phone call. But if I could ask unanimous consent to be recorded in 19 20 the negative on Calendar Number 459, I would appreciate that, Mr. President. 21 22 Thank you. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Klein? 24 25 SENATOR KLEIN: Unanimous consent

is granted, Mr. President. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: With 3 unanimous consent, Senator Maziarz to be 4 recorded in the negative on Calendar 459. 5 Senator Klein. SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at 6 7 this time can we please go to a reading of the 8 controversial calendar. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 9 The Secretary will ring the bells. 10 11 The Secretary will proceed with the 12 reading of the controversial calendar. THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 13 14 28, by Senator Perkins, Senate Print 1145C, an 15 act to amend the Environmental Conservation 16 Law. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 17 18 Senator Libous. 19 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, I 20 have an amendment at the desk. I ask that you waive its reading and call on me, please. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 22 The amendment is here at the desk. The reading of 23 the amendment is waived, Senator Libous, and 24 25 you're recognized to speak on the amendment.

Thank you, 1 SENATOR LIBOUS: 2 Mr. President. This legislation is something that 3 4 I know that Senator Perkins has brought before 5 this body on a number of occasions. And on a number of occasions, I've spoken with Senator 6 7 Perkins on this and asked him if he would make 8 some amendments to it. 9 And I know that he has made some 10 changes, but I think the changes that were 11 going to be acceptable to those of us who 12 represent particularly upstate and those consumers around the state who depend on home 13 14 heating oil, we are very much concerned that 15 this bill is going to raise our prices. Mr. President, there seems to be a 16 lot of noise in the chamber. Thank you, 17 18 Mr. President. 19 And we're very concerned that our 20 prices for home heating oil goes up. 21 Now, the other day we passed a bill 22 that deals with the heat program for certainly 23 people throughout the state who are on a low income and have a problem with heating their 24 25 homes and doing renovations to their homes.

1	And quite frankly, this particular bill is
2	going to be devastating to everyone who heats
3	their home with oil in my district.
4	And the problem is that the price
5	from the refinery, the manufacturer, is going
6	to go up, because all we ask here is for a
7	little bit of time.
8	I think what Senator Perkins is
9	trying to do here is quite noble, and we
10	understand that the parts per million need to
11	come down in Number 2 oil. We agree with
12	that. The problem is we don't believe that it
13	can be done as quickly as the sponsor would
14	like it to be done, because the manufacturers
15	are telling us that they can't. And quite
16	frankly, it will take 18 months to two years
17	before they get permitted to be okay to do it.
18	So all we're asking in this
19	amendment and quite frankly, Mr. President,
20	this amendment is the same as a bill that
21	Senator Stachowski has in that would basically
22	say we'll take Number 2 oil to 500 parts per
23	million and change the date to 2014. We don't
24	think that's unreasonable to help people
25	throughout the state who are on home heating

oil.

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2	And many people do not have access
3	to natural gas that's a whole subject for
4	another day but quite frankly, they depend
5	on oil to heat their homes. And we talked
6	earlier about some of those areas that we all
7	represent in upstate New York that are
8	extremely rural. This bill will make it
9	prohibitive for them to afford home heating
10	oil.
11	So again, Mr. President, what this
12	amendment does, it does not say what we are
13	against what Senator Perkins is trying to do
14	to help folks environmentally. All it's
15	asking for is a little bit more time, to 2014.
16	Thank you, Mr. President.
17	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank
18	you, Senator Libous.
19	Those Senators voting in support of
20	the nonsponsor motion to amend Calendar Number
21	28 should raise their hands.
22	Announce the results.
23	THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 31. Nays,
24	30.
25	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The

motion fails. 1 2 Are there any Senators who wish to be heard on the debate? 3 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Yes, I would 5 like an explanation on the bill, please, from 6 the sponsor. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 8 Senator Perkins, an explanation of the bill has been requested by Senator Libous. 9 10 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you very much, Mr. President, and also Senator Libous, 11 12 for your appreciation of the significance of this bill that essentially is trying to reduce 13 the content of sulfur that has been so 14 15 hazardous environmentally and healthwise for so many of us, not only in the City of 16 New York but upstate as well, I might add. 17 18 And clearly we know that home heating oil is essentially the same as diesel 19 20 fuel, except there are virtually no limits to the level of sulfur that can be in it. 21 On 22 average, the current sulfur content in home heating oil is 2600 parts per million. 23 This bill will limit it to 15 parts per million 24 25 beginning in July 2012.

Now, originally, as you know, we were trying to do this as per 2011. As per the discussions we had, we extended it to 2012 and were hopeful there would be some kind of compromise that would be suitable, but in fact that's not possible at this point in time, apparently.

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8 Compounding the problem is the rate 9 at which New York consumes home heating oil. 10 With 2.6 million households using home heating oil, New York leads the nation in the amount 11 12 of home heating oil consumed. Most disturbingly, 79 percent of this consumption 13 14 occurs in the New York metropolitan region and 15 thus creates a localized pollution problem due to the increase in hazardous particulate 16 17 matter, which contributes to aggravated 18 asthma, increased cancer risks, heart and lung disease, and even premature death. 19 20 Over the last five years alone, asthma rates among New Yorkers are 21 22 consistently higher than the U.S. population as a whole. In fact 300,000 children in 23 24 New York City have been diagnosed with asthma, 25 and hospitalizations cost approximately

1	\$10,000 per visit and over 240 million a year.
2	This legislation will save money,
3	and in these times of financial hardship we
4	cannot afford to ignore this cost saver. This
5	legislation will not only serve as a cost
6	saver to the state, but also to individual
7	consumers and the heating oil industry.
8	So in conclusion, again, this
9	limits sulfur content in Number 2 heating oil
10	to no greater than 15 parts per million
11	beginning July 1, 2012, and it authorizes the
12	Governor, after consultation with NYSERDA, to
13	make exceptions by executive order for
14	considerations of scarcity.
15	I vote aye on this and encourage my
16	colleagues to do the same. Thank you very
17	much for your support.
18	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
19	Senator Libous.
20	SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you,
21	Mr. President. Would the sponsor yield for a
22	series of questions?
23	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
24	Senator Perkins, will you yield?
25	SENATOR PERKINS: Yes, by all

1 means. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 3 sponsor yields. 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you 5 Senator Perkins. 6 Mr. President, Senator Perkins just 7 mentioned that there's a high level of 8 pollution in the New York metropolitan area. 9 Senator Perkins, why did you not just make 10 this bill pertain to the New York metropolitan area, and why did you have it affect the 11 entire state? 12 13 SENATOR PERKINS: Because it's a 14 statewide problem. I just pointed out 15 particularly how it affects the New York metropolitan area. 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: 17 Thank you. 18 Mr. President, will he continue to yield? 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Perkins, do you continue to yield? 21 22 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes, sir. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 24 sponsor yields. 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Senator, if it's

a statewide problem, did you examine the 1 ramifications of this statewide problem to 2 those of us who have home heating oil 3 4 customers in rural areas of upstate New York? 5 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, б Mr. President, as you know, we surely did and 7 in fact had some negotiations with you and our 8 colleagues in the upstate area to try to be helpful towards that end. 9 10 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you. Mr. President, would he continue to 11 12 yield? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 13 14 Senator Perkins, do you continue to yield? 15 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes, sir. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 16 17 sponsor yields. 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: And, Mr. President, through you. Senator Perkins, 19 20 what did you change to be helpful to my upstate colleagues as it pertains to their 21 home heating oil constituents? 22 SENATOR PERKINS: Well, through 23 24 you, Mr. President, we obviously changed the 25 date. And we were hopeful that we could

change even more, but at this point in time 1 2 this is the best that we could do. 3 SENATOR LIBOUS: And through you, 4 Mr. President. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Libous. б 7 SENATOR LIBOUS: Senator, it is 8 the date that's the problem here. It is the dates that is going to increase the cost of 9 10 home heating oil to our constituents. So by changing the date I believe a year, how does 11 12 that help the refineries and those who produce the product to get up to speed within an 13 14 adequate period of time -- everyone's telling 15 us it's going to take three to four years; other states have said it takes three to four 16 years -- without increasing the cost of home 17 18 heating oil to those who depend on it? 19 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 20 Mr. President. Well, we did have the 21 negotiation in which we expected certain 22 changes to be made, as per the request. And at this point in time there's no evidence that 23 any efforts have been made to accommodate the 24 25 bill.

Mr. President, 1 SENATOR LIBOUS: 2 again, I guess I'll respond to that. I mean, 3 an effort was made just a few moments ago in 4 the form of an amendment to try to accommodate 5 the bill. But if the Senator would continue 6 7 to yield. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 9 Senator Perkins, will you continue to yield? 10 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes, I will. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 11 The 12 sponsor yields. SENATOR LIBOUS: Senator, what 13 14 effect is this bill going to have on domestic 15 home heating oil supplies for those of us outside of the metropolitan New York area? 16 SENATOR PERKINS: 17 Well, you know, 18 the bill includes an opportunity for the Governor, as I pointed out earlier, to make 19 20 exceptions by executive order if there's -for considerations of scarcity, number one. 21 And we also have been told that 22 some of the problems have been overstated in 23 24 terms of the scarcity. 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President,

would he continue to yield.

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2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 3 Senator Perkins, do you continue to yield? 4 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes, sir. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 6 sponsor yields. 7 SENATOR LIBOUS: Senator, I guess 8 I'm really concerned because I think it will 9 have a very negative effect on home heating 10 oil supplies. Because wouldn't you agree with me that by not giving the refineries time to 11 12 change over and meet the qualifications, that the supply will then diminish because they 13 won't be able to produce it to sell it because 14 15 it would not have met the qualifications of your bill? 16 17 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 18 Mr. President. You know, we have 2.6 million households in New York using home heating oil. 19 20 We believe that the producers will adapt to this new approach such that it will mitigate 21 22 the kind of concerns that you have. SENATOR LIBOUS: Would Senator 23 24 Perkins continue to yield. 25 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:

Senator Perkins, do you yield? 1 2 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes, sir. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 3 The 4 sponsor continues. 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: Senator Perkins, as I said before, I understand what you're б 7 trying to do. And I have said to you on a 8 number of occasions in the past that the issue here is the time. The issue is the time for 9 10 these refineries to be able to change over to meet the standards that you have in your bill. 11 12 And I have no problem with the standards, sir. But what do I tell a senior citizen 13 or a family of seniors, two folks in their 80s 14 15 that depend on, live in -- the other day I used Candor, New York. I guess I'll use 16 17 Bainbridge, in Chenango County. We'll switch 18 counties. Rural community; they depend on home heating oil or they don't stay warm in 19 20 the wintertime, because there's no way that 21 they can get natural gas or any other 22 alternative. 23 How do I tell them that the supply is now gone or the cost has doubled because of 24 25 a regulation that was put on by the

Legislature that just all they had to do was 1 give the refinery a couple more years to get 2 up to speed, but now the supply has been 3 4 limited because of that legislation? 5 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, Mr. President. б 7 Again, we're very sympathetic to 8 the concerns of the seniors and those who, from your point of view, would be adversely 9 10 affected. As I pointed out, again, there is a 11 provision for the Governor to respond to the 12 scarcity that you suggest, number one. Number two, I believe that the time 13 14 is now for us to move forward, having tried to 15 create the kind of accommodations that we believe will help us overcome the problems 16 that you're concerned about. And so I guess 17 18 we have an irreconcilable difference from that point of view. But I know that we have made 19 20 good faith efforts in the best interests of all New Yorkers to try to address your 21 concerns as well as the larger concern about 22 the reduction of sulfur. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Would the 24 25 Senator continue to yield.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 1 2 Senator Perkins, do you continue to yield? 3 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 5 sponsor continues to yield. SENATOR LIBOUS: 6 Senator, again, 7 you stress that you care very much about the 8 environment and sulfate, but yet in New York City many large residential folks and office 9 10 buildings use Number 6 heating oil. Why doesn't your bill include them? 11 12 SENATOR PERKINS: Would you 13 repeat the question, please? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 14 15 Senator Libous, would you mind repeating your question? 16 SENATOR LIBOUS: 17 Oh, yes. I'm 18 sorry, Senator. I said in New York City many large residential units and office buildings 19 20 use Number 6 formula heating oil. Why doesn't your bill include them? 21 22 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 23 Mr. President, I think that that is a concern that we will take a look at moving forward. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: So, Senator, you

stressed earlier, sir, that you were concerned 1 2 about the metropolitan area, but yet many 3 people in the metropolitan area will be exempt 4 and yet many people outside the metropolitan 5 area will now have a tremendous hardship. I don't see that as fair. 6 7 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 8 Mr. President, this bill is fair to the people of the State of New York as it puts us on 9 10 track to try to reduce sulfur for all in the state. And obviously it's a project, it's a 11 12 piece of legislation that allows for the Governor to intervene where necessary to make 13 14 up for any shortcomings such as the type that 15 you're talking about. SENATOR LIBOUS: Will the Senator 16 17 continue to yield. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Perkins, do you continue to yield? 19 20 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 21 22 sponsor yields. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Senator, 24 wouldn't you agree that it's more fair for 25 those building owners in New York City than it

is for the senior citizens and the poor folks 1 on fixed incomes who live in rural areas of 2 New York State? 3 4 SENATOR PERKINS: I'm sorry, 5 would you repeat yourself, please? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 6 7 Senator Libous, would you repeat your question 8 for Senator Perkins? 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: It must be my --10 is my mike on? Because usually I have quite a 11 melodious tone. I'm sorry. 12 SENATOR PERKINS: Well, today you might be talking a little lower because of 13 14 your concerns about the people upstate. 15 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, my question for Senator Perkins was wouldn't 16 you say that this legislation was more fair to 17 18 the building owners of New York City than it is to the folks on fixed incomes who depend on 19 20 home heating oil in the rest of New York State. 21 22 SENATOR PERKINS: No. Through you, Mr. President, no, I wouldn't say that. 23 And in fact, again, I think that if -- as I 24 25 point out to you, if exceptions need to be

made, the bill allows for the kind of changes 1 2 that if they're real, if they're -- then the Governor will be able to make those changes. 3 4 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. On the bill. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 6 7 Senator Libous, on the bill. 8 SENATOR LIBOUS: I'm going to 9 make an impassioned plea to all of my 10 colleagues on both sides of the aisle today. While I certainly and I believe everybody in 11 12 this chamber applauds the fact that environmentally, Senator Perkins has a goal 13 14 here, I think we all have that same 15 environmental goal. But the issue here is whether or 16 17 not these companies can get up to speed quick 18 enough, or will they eliminate the supply of home heating oil for those of us who represent 19 20 communities in this state that depend on it. I say it will hurt the supply. 21 The demand 22 will be great. Those who can get it will pay two and three times more than they've had to 23 pay this winter. 24 25 This bill is not fair to the people

outside of the New York metropolitan area. 1 As I said a few moments ago, Number 6 heating oil 2 is eliminated from this bill. Number 6 is 3 4 used by many, many massive residential centers 5 in the city -- high-rises, I guess, Senator Padavan, you'd call them -- and businesses in б 7 the city. 8 So while my colleague is being 9 extremely noble here on trying to provide a 10 better environment, he is not being reasonable 11 as to how he approaches that. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Perkins, why do you rise? 13 14 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 15 Mr. President, I'd like to ask you a question. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 17 Senator Libous, would you yield to a question? 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: As soon as I'm done, I'd be happy to. Thank you, Senator. 19 20 Okay? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 22 Proceed. 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you. So I 24 appeal to anyone here today, all we're asking 25 that we change the date, we get a couple of

more years. We want to meet the environmental 1 2 standards. 3 Now, let me go further to share 4 with you that there are other states who have 5 approached this and they have all had sufficient time to begin to make those 6 7 changes. It's here in many various documents 8 that I have. I'm not going to bore you by 9 reading them. 10 But I will tell you that for whatever reason, once again, New York State 11 12 has to be unreasonable. We have to be 13 unreasonable in this case to the homeowners, to the taxpayers, to the folks who live in the 14 15 communities or the rural areas of this state that depend on home heating fuel. 16 Mr. President, I would ask that my 17 18 colleagues vote against this. I would ask 19 that my colleague Senator Perkins amend the 20 bill to 2014. And I would tell you right here 21 that I will assure you that I will vote for it 22 when that time comes, and I believe that many 23 of our colleagues in this chamber would vote for it. 24 25 But right now we cannot put any

more additional burden on those folks who are 1 on fixed incomes who live in rural areas of 2 3 this state, because what this bill is going to 4 do, it is going to shut off their supply of 5 home heating oil. It is going to increase the cost tremendously for those who have the money б 7 and can negotiate the opportunity to get it. 8 So, Mr. President, I'm not being 9 unreasonable here, I just reach out to the 10 sponsor and ask him please, please amend this bill to 2014. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 13 Senator Libous, will you at this time yield to 14 a question? 15 SENATOR LIBOUS: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 Senator Perkins. 17 18 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you very much, Mr. President. 19 20 I just wanted to -- for the record, you are aware that the mayor, with regard to 21 22 your concern about New York City, is in the process of developing regs on Number 4 and 23 Number 6 healing oil. Are you? 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: I'm sorry?

Are you aware 1 SENATOR PERKINS: 2 that the mayor of the City of New York is in 3 the process of developing regs on Number 4 and Number 6 oil? 4 5 SENATOR LIBOUS: I'm not aware, Mr. President. But I am aware that there are б 7 no regs in this bill. 8 SENATOR PERKINS: Okay. Thank 9 you. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 11 you, Senator Libous. Senator Fuschillo. 12 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: 13 Thank you 14 very much, Mr. President. Would the sponsor 15 yield to a question? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 Senator Perkins, do you yield? 17 18 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 19 20 sponsor yields. SENATOR FUSCHILLO: 21 Senator, I 22 agree with the intent of your bill, and I think it's laudable, and I think everybody 23 else does, with the protection of the 24 25 environment. But I just want to ask you a few

questions.

2	I received a lot of memos and phone
3	calls in opposition. And when I read some of
4	them, where it says the two-year lead time
5	provided in this bill is simply not enough
6	another one says that it is virtually
7	impossible for the industry to meet so quickly
8	and extremely difficult.
9	My question to you is that on
10	Senator Libous's amendment, there were 31
11	members that said yes to it, Republicans and
12	two Democrats. And if Senator Morahan was
13	here God willing, if he was here the
14	amendment would have been approved.
15	If it's as simple as laying the
16	bill aside, amending it, agreeing to what 31
17	out of 61 members here in the house agree
18	to and you probably have a tremendous
19	amount of support as the sponsor of the
20	amendments to do it my question is why not
21	just lay it aside, amend the bill, and we'll
22	take it up and vote for it? And we'll have an
23	agreement, we'll have a law here that
24	everybody can agree with.
25	SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you,

Mr. President. I appreciate your interest. 1 2 However, I believe the bill allows for the Governor to intervene in some of the areas 3 4 where these concerns were raised. And I 5 believe the discussions that we had led us to including that type of provision so that we б 7 can move forward instead of delaying it. 8 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Thank you, 9 Senator. 10 Just on the bill, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 11 12 Senator Fuschillo, on the bill. SENATOR FUSCHILLO: 13 While I agree 14 with the intent, I agree with Senator Libous. 15 My concern in this environment, this economic environment, is that this may not be 16 attainable. And if you do that, you put the 17 18 industry at a tremendous disadvantage to do this. 19 20 I would ask Senator Perkins, as the 21 debate goes on and questions come, that in 22 this time he thinks about that and really 23 thinks about laying the bill aside and amending the bill to come back up to this 24 25 floor when he would probably have a tremendous

amount of support. 1 2 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 3 Thank 4 you, Senator Fuschillo. 5 Senator Marcellino. SENATOR MARCELLINO: б Thank you, 7 Mr. President. I'm not going to ask any 8 questions, Senator, because I think a lot of them have been raised and asked. What I'm 9 going to make is basically a statement. 10 11 States around us -- New Jersey, 12 Maine, Connecticut -- are moving back the time frame. New Jersey in particular, where the 13 14 refineries are that produce these products, 15 these home heating products. New Jersey is going in 2012 to 500 parts per million and in 16 2016 to 15 parts per million. 17 18 If New York insists and if you are successful and if we go to 15 parts per 19 20 million while New Jersey, upwind of us, is at 500, you gain nothing. You gain absolutely 21 22 nothing with respect to air quality, which is what you're trying to achieve. You're trying 23 to achieve a goal of clear air. 24 25 Now, I've got two children --

they're older now -- but asthmatics, and we 1 2 lived through it. When I taught in the City 3 of New York, we used to joke that we could see 4 the air we breathed. We were tough people, 5 going into the city, because you could see that haze, that bubble over the city that you б 7 could breathe. And asthma is a problem. We 8 all know that. Lung disease is a problem. We all know that. 9 10 This bill isn't going to solve your 11 problem. It's only going to raise the costs, 12 because the industry is going to pass the costs of changing their technology, changing 13 14 their pipelines -- because they're going to 15 have too. They can't use the same pipelines, they've got to flush them clean with the 16 product they have before they can put new 17 18 product in. So it's going cost them money. 19 20 That's going to go to your clients. That's going to go to the people who buy home heating 21 22 fuel all over this state. Why you're going upstate, I don't know. They don't have an 23 24 attainment, they don't have an air quality

problem. They're not the downstate region.

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We're the non-attainment area, downstate. 1 2 Upstate is not. 3 By forcing the state and thereby by 4 forcing the manufacturers to put the fuel into 5 the state, they're going to raise their costs б and they're going to pass it on to the 7 consumers. We cannot -- as Senator Fuschillo 8 rightly points out, Senator Libous correctly pointed out, this is not the time to do that. 9 10 This is not the time to do that. 11 You could get what you want 12 Senator, you could get what you want by simply amending the bill to go to 500 parts per 13 14 million by 2012 and then to 15 parts per 15 million by 2016, and we would vote for it. And you would get the same air quality 16 improvement you want but will not achieve by 17 18 this current bill. 19 I know what you want to do, 20 Senator, but the bill as written won't achieve your goal. That's simply science. 21 It won't 22 achieve it. Because upwind states are having a higher parts per million in their home 23 heating fuel, and the wind will blow the 24 25 particulates over our state, and particularly

in the downstate region, and we're not going 1 to get the benefit of the change. We're going 2 3 to get the cost, but we're not going to get 4 the benefit that you want to achieve. 5 So again, I would urge that we б perhaps take a step back. I understand when 7 you put a bill up, nobody likes to give 8 something up. You've got it in hand; nobody 9 likes to walk away from something. We've 10 produced it. You'll get the bill. You could do the bill this session. We're not going 11 12 away tomorrow. We're not leaving town next week. You know that. We're here. 13 This bill could easily be laid 14 15 aside, amended to the standards that I've just mentioned to you, aged accordingly or get a 16 message from the Governor, whatever is 17 18 required, and you'll get the votes to pass the bill. I'd vote for it. And I know many of my 19 20 colleagues -- I can't speak for all of them, but I know many of them would, would vote for 21 to it accordingly, and I'm sure you'd get two 22 more votes from your side at the very least 23 for a changed bill. 24 25 So I would urge you, Senator,

please, do the responsible thing. This is the 1 2 responsible thing. Let's put New York in line 3 with the states around us, because that's 4 important. Otherwise, everything you want to 5 get, you're not going to get because the б wind's going to blow it away. I would urge 7 that you do this, sir. I really would. 8 Unfortunately, if it doesn't happen, I'm going to vote against this bill. 9 10 I do not want to do that. I have 11 fought all the years I'm here and chaired this 12 committee, the Environmental Committee, when I was chair, and ranker now, I have supported 13 14 legislation on air quality. I have supported 15 standards. But we tried to do them in concert and make them regionally. We did the e-waste 16 bill, it took us a while because we wanted it 17 18 done regionally so that we didn't increase costs unnecessarily on anybody. And we got 19 20 what we wanted. We got a good e-waste bill 21 this year. We've done that before, we can do 22 it again. 23 Senator, please, be reasonable. Lay the bill aside, let's amend it, let's do 24 25 the thing. You'll get the votes. I will vote

for your bill as amended. I cannot support 1 2 this bill as it stands now. I will be voting 3 no. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 5 you, Senator Marcellino. 6 Senator Farley. 7 SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. 9 You know, I was rather surprised to 10 see the majority of this house vote for the amendment because of the concerns that they 11 have for the heating fuel that is in the 12 upstate region. 13 I have a very diverse district. 14 15 It's very urban, and about half of it is very rural, three counties that not only is rural, 16 there's no access to gas or any other kind of 17 18 fuel to heat their homes. And if I hear a complaint, particularly in the cold winter, 19 20 it's the poor and the elderly that are on fixed incomes that say what a burden it is to 21 try to heat their homes. And generally 22 23 speaking, these people live in homes that are not as well insulated as they should be, and 24 25 they turn the thermostat down.

You know, the other side, my 1 colleagues on the other side of the aisle, 2 3 you're very concerned always, and I applaud 4 you for that, for the poor and the elderly and 5 so forth. But you know, this is a tremendous burden on the poor and the elderly that exists 6 7 in the area that does not have access to 8 natural gas. And boy, there's a -- I think 9 that's almost everybody in the rural upstate 10 area. 11 And there's no question about it 12 that this is going to put a tremendous price on the cost of fuel oil because there isn't 13 14 any access and they're not going to be able to 15 conform. All that this house or this side and the majority of the house is asking for is a 16 change in the date, that Senator Stachowski 17 18 actually has been promoting. I think it's very reasonable. 19

And it boggles my mind, Senator, why this accommodation can't be made on behalf of so many people in this state. Because it doesn't affect just your area, it affects the entire state, and it hurts a lot of poor and elderly that are on fixed incomes.

And I urge people to vote against 1 2 this bill until it's amended. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 4 you, Senator Farley. 5 Senator Larkin. SENATOR LARKIN: 6 Thank you, 7 Mr. President. On the bill. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Larkin, on the bill. 9 10 SENATOR LARKIN: You know, I 11 don't want to rehash everything that's been said here. But, you know, in my district lots 12 of people say to me, Why don't we separate 13 from New York City? Everything that's done is 14 15 good for New York City, to h--- with the rest of the state. 16 Now, this bill is talking about 17 18 Number 6 heating oil to take care of all the buildings. But what about our people upstate? 19 20 What about them? What are we saying? 21 And, you know, the other thing, 22 Senator Perkins, that my people say is when are you going to sit down and act like human 23 24 beings and work together for a common cause? 25 This is common. Senator Libous, Senator

Fuschillo, Senator Marcellino said we will 1 support you. Why won't we sit down and show 2 3 the people of this state and this nation that 4 we're not ashamed to look at a bill and say, 5 you know, a little bit of this, it will show the American people and most importantly 6 7 New Yorkers that we're willing to work 8 together for a common good. 9 Now, by changing the date on 10 this -- nobody has convinced me on your side of the aisle that this is good the way it is. 11 12 Two of your members voted with us. If Senator Morahan was in good health, he would have been 13 here and we would have had the 32 votes and 14 15 then you would have had something bad. But what we're saying is don't be 16 17 afraid, there's nothing wrong with the bill. 18 I've been in this house 18 years, and I've seen bills pulled. And we made them better. 19 20 And we made the people proud of us that we were willing to sit back, make some changes, 21 22 and do something that was right. 23 Now, I'd like to ask you to think, every one of you on both sides of the aisle, 24 25 what's so wrong with saying hold it, hold it,

let's do something for the people. 1 Because 2 since January this year, we've done a hell of 3 a lot of nothing. We're 70-some days past a 4 budget. Here's an opportunity to show the 5 people that we're not going to profit New York City over the state, we're going to take care б 7 of the needs of the state as a whole, not 8 preferential treatment for New York City. Because that's exactly what people 9 10 are saying. I had a phone call while this debate was going on, and this dealer said to 11 "You know what, Bill? I think maybe I'm 12 me: going to shut down this year, because I don't 13 14 think you people care about us. You care 15 about yourself and not about the needs of the people of the State of New York." 16 I don't know all of the mechanics, 17 18 Senator Perkins, on how much this does and or how much that doesn't. I count on my 19 20 colleague Senator Marcellino, who's been the 21 expert on this for years. So why don't we 22 just say we're going to do one for the team? The team is the State of New York. "Team" is 23 not spelled with an I. And we can make it 24 25 sound not just good, but we can show the

people of this state that we're willing to 1 make amends and changes when it will profit, 2 benefit the rest of the state. 3 4 Thank you, Mr. President. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank б you, Senator Larkin. 7 Senator Little. 8 SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you, Mr. President. 9 10 I can say with confidence that the 11 area I represent has probably got the cleanest 12 air in New York State. Obviously, the fewest people per square mile and all. But certainly 13 14 not only does it have the cleanest area, but 15 it also has some of the coldest temperatures in the state. And if you watch the Weather 16 Channel during the winter months, I'm sure 17 18 you're all familiar with Saranac Lake, which is usually the coldest spot in New York State, 19 20 and that's in my district. We have so many people who have to rely upon oil heat because 21 22 natural gas is not available in a lot of places. Their only other choice is wood or 23 24 propane. And they also are on fixed incomes, 25 not huge incomes, and it's a real hardship.

So I think I would like to join, I 1 2 know I would like to join my colleagues here 3 today, Senator Perkins, in asking you if you would amend the bill, if you would take this 4 5 bill back. If the problem is in New York б City, amend it to just New York City. If you 7 believe it should be statewide, amend it to a 8 date that is reasonable. 9 We have been here since January. 10 We have a budget bill we haven't done yet. Ι 11 would guarantee we're probably going to be 12 here next week. You could bring the bill in on Monday with the amendments, and I believe 13 14 that you would get more support than you are 15 going to get for this bill today. And I really ask you to do this on behalf of all the 16 people of New York State, particularly for the 17 18 people of my district, who you would be creating a tremendous hardship by the passing 19 20 of this piece of legislation as it exists 21 today. 22 Thank you. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 24 you, Senator Little. 25 Senator LaValle.

Thank you, 1 SENATOR LaVALLE: 2 Mr. President. 3 Some four or more years ago I was 4 the sponsor of this legislation, so I'm aware 5 of the components that go into this. And it has been mentioned here one of the issues is 6 7 the effective date. The other issue is the 8 parts per million and at what points in time that will come in. 9 10 But there's one more component, and I would ask if the sponsor would yield to a 11 12 question. Senator Perkins? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 13 14 Senator Perkins, do you yield? 15 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, Mr. President, yes. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 17 18 Senator LaValle, the sponsor yields. 19 SENATOR LaVALLE: Through you, 20 Mr. President. Senator Perkins, one of the things that I recall on this legislation when 21 I had the sponsorship of it was a component 22 dealing with the technology of the oil burner 23 and changes that had to be made. Is that true 24 25 today? Will individuals have to make changes

in the nozzle or other parts of their system? 1 2 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 3 Mr. President, no. The answer is no. 4 SENATOR LaVALLE: No changes? 5 Okay, thank you. 6 SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you. 7 SENATOR LaVALLE: On the bill, 8 Mr. President. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 10 Senator LaValle, on the bill. 11 SENATOR LaVALLE: You know, as 12 I've said, I had the sponsorship of this legislation. And one of the key elements is 13 the effective date. I've heard my colleagues 14 15 here not peppering the sponsor with a whole lot of questions, but it's all about the 16 effective date. 17 18 So many times as sponsors of legislation, or even as chairs of committees, 19 20 we find that industry, you know, drags its feet and they get hard-nosed. 21 We as 22 legislators, on the other side, should not dig our heels in. Collectively, we have heard 23 that the 2014 date should be one that would 24 25 allow us to get where we want to get.

Senator Marcellino talked about 1 2 something -- and I had a situation today -- he talked about his children with asthma. 3 Ι 4 think I have over the years supported the Lung 5 Association and clean air measures. I called my daughter today -- I don't want to bore б 7 everyone here. She wasn't home, but I got my 8 grandson, who was home. I said, "Justin, what 9 are you doing home? You should be in school." 10 "Oh," he said, "my asthma is really bad today." 11 12 So I say that because every one of us has a family member who struggles with 13 14 asthma. And we want, as a policy matter, to 15 move toward cleaner air, cleaner air. And we

could do that, make a bold statement in this 16 Legislature by simply changing the effective 17 18 date from 2012 to 2014 -- two years -- to allow everyone to gear up. To do it and pass 19 20 legislation that is truly in the interest of all New Yorkers, all New Yorkers. 21 So, Senator Perkins, I ask you, as 22 23 many of the other colleagues have, make the change. Let's make together a bold statement 24

towards cleaner air. 2014 does it.

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Thank you, Mr. President. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 3 you, Senator LaValle. Senator Young. 4 5 SENATOR YOUNG: Thank you, Mr. President. 6 You know, heating your home is not 7 8 a luxury, it's a necessity. And the further north you go in New York State, the more 9 10 brutal weather becomes and the more brutal the winters become. And whether you're in Buffalo 11 12 or Olean or Watertown, Potsdam, wherever you go in upstate, as you drive around the 13 14 countryside you see the landscape dotted with 15 home heating fuel stations. And this hurts a lot of people if 16 this legislation is passed in the form that it 17 18 currently has. People are hurting across this state. They're hurting because they've lost 19 20 their jobs. Dairy farmers are suffering because of the dairy crisis with record low 21 milk prices. We have senior citizens who 22 can't afford to pay their bills now. We have 23 the working poor in upstate New York. 24 25 And I can't understand why my

colleague will not consider a simple amendment 1 to this bill that would make it palatable for 2 3 everybody, would make it work for everybody, 4 and would allow us to still have the goal --5 which is very laudable -- of having cleaner air. б 7 So I join with the pleas of my 8 colleagues who say to Senator Perkins please change the date on this bill. Don't hurt our 9 10 seniors, don't hurt the working poor, don't hurt our dairy farmers, don't hurt upstate 11 12 New York. Because if this bill passes the way that it is now, it will unfortunately do all 13 14 those things. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 16 you, Senator Young. Senator Padavan. 17 18 SENATOR PADAVAN: Thank you, Mr. President. I'd like to just address two 19 20 aspects of the discussion that we have had so 21 far. 22 First, the sponsor indicates, and rightly so, that the area of this state that's 23 24 most impacted by sulfur content is in the City 25 of New York. And why is that so? Because of

the concentration with high-rise apartments, 1 office buildings all over the City of 2 New York, particularly in Manhattan -- using 3 4 Number 4 and Number 6 oil predominantly, not 5 at all covered by this legislation. That's part of the problem. 6 What 7 the solution there is, I'm not sure, but it's 8 not solved. So when we talk about the sulfur content issue in the City of New York, let us 9 10 be clear that we're only dealing with part of that issue with this bill. 11 Now, at the same time, if I knew 12 with certainty, reasonable certainty, that the 13 14 capacity for producing this type of fuel 15 existed in this nation anywhere, and certainly in our region, I might have a different view 16 17 as to how I'm going to vote. But I've been 18 reading over all of the inputs that I've received, and from every source -- U.S. East 19 20 Coast refineries, Canadian and Virgin Island refineries, United Refinery Company, and so 21 22 on -- they're all telling us that they currently do not have the capacity to produce 23 this fuel in the time frame we are seeking for 24 25 them to accomplish.

Now, you know, there's the old 1 2 saying you can't stick a 10-pound weight in a 3 5-pound bag. It's not there. It's simply not 4 there. 5 Now, part of the problem that refineries have been experiencing is that 6 7 during the economic downturn, some of them 8 shut down their capacity, shut down entire refineries. Valero, the largest refiner in 9 10 this country, shut down one or more of their facilities because of the economy and the lack 11 12 of need, particularly in the manufacturing sector, of fuel. 13 14 Now, what we would be asking them 15 to do is to open up those refineries, and it takes a great deal of time to do that. You 16 just don't turn on a switch. It takes a year 17 18 or so to get a refinery on line. 19 In addition, in order to produce this type fuel, this Number 2 fuel, in the 20 21 configuration that we want it to produce it, existing facilities would have to be modified. 22 23 It requires reengineering. And I've been forced to go back to my college course in 24 25 organic chemistry to remember what that might

require with a petroleum organic product of 1 2 this sort. And it's not easy. That would take a great deal of time. 3 4 So on one hand, we don't have the 5 capacity. On the other hand, to produce the capacity, we need a lot of time to do it, and б 7 we certainly can't do it in the time frame 8 this bill requires. That's what all the refiners are saying. They're not saying they 9 10 don't want to sell this fuel, they're not saying they don't want to make this fuel. 11 As a matter of fact they might make more profit 12 with this fuel. They're say they can't. 13 Now, 14 you say they can; they say they can't. 15 This would be a terrible, terrible tragedy if we put into law a requirement that 16 17 people have to acquire, buy a product that's 18 simply not available. Then what do they do? There are countries in South America where 19 20 they sell fuel on the black market. They go 21 across national lines because of certain 22 regulations and restrictions and all kinds of 23 things. I don't think you want to do that. Ι think you're far too astute, intelligent an 24 individual. You don't want to do that. 25

So as has been asked here and been 1 asked in a very, I think, gentle way and in a 2 3 reasonable way and in a positive way, amend 4 this bill, give us the time to do what the 5 industry needs, and then we'll be home free. We'll achieve what we want to achieve. б And 7 maybe in the process we could also start 8 including some of those other types of fuels 9 that are polluting our environment in New York 10 City. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 11 12 Senator Perkins, why do you rise? SENATOR PERKINS: 13 I just wanted 14 to ask, again, a question of the Senator. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Padavan, do you yield to a question? 16 SENATOR PADAVAN: 17 Yes. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Padavan yields. 19 20 SENATOR PERKINS: I just want to 21 be clear that you did hear -- you point out 22 that the Governor has the opportunity to address some of the concerns that you brought 23 24 up in terms of the scarcity of the type --25 SENATOR PADAVAN: I'm sorry,

Senator, I'm not hearing you.

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2 SENATOR PERKINS: The Governor --3 the bill allows for the Governor to intervene, in consultation with NYSERDA, when it comes to 4 5 some of the concerns that have been addressed already. Like scarcity, for instance. 6 7 SENATOR PADAVAN: Well, I'm not 8 sure I understand fully what that means. But if there's a mandate of time on this -- excuse 9 10 us if we're breaking the rules here. But if there's a mandate on time in terms of when the 11 effective date is, I don't know what the 12 Governor is going to be able to do to undo 13 that either -- unless the bill allows him to 14 15 overrule that time frame at some future date. And I don't think that's in your 16 If it is, I'd be interested in knowing 17 bill. 18 that. SENATOR PERKINS: Okay. 19 Thank 20 you. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 Senator Alesi. 22 23 SENATOR ALESI: Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 I appreciate the points of view on

both sides of the aisle. And I have great 1 2 respect for Senator Perkin's efforts here. 3 Because as we all know, the main goal, over a 4 reasonable period of time while we're dealing 5 with elements of the environment, is to improve the environment. That's good for б 7 everybody. 8 But I think Senator Libous made a 9 compelling argument when he was talking about 10 a reasonable period of time, and some of my colleagues also in asking for just a little 11 12 more time before this is implemented. In fact, if you pay close attention to the bill, 13 it says this act shall take effect 14 15 immediately. That means as soon as the Governor signs it. Immediately. With the 16 date prescribed in there, obviously. 17 18 But I would like to ask if Senator Perkins would be kind enough to yield for a 19 20 simple question. 21 I'm sorry, Mr. President, I thought 22 you were going back to your seat to vote yes 23 with it. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 24 25 Proceed.

SENATOR ALESI: Mr. President, 1 2 would Senator Perkins yield? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 3 4 Senator Perkins, will you yield? 5 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 6 The 7 sponsor yields. 8 SENATOR ALESI: Thank you, 9 Thank you for your efforts. I think Senator. 10 there's no dispute that you're trying to do 11 something good here. 12 However, it's very, very clear to me and some of my colleagues that this just 13 14 makes this happen too soon. And because it 15 covers the entire State of New York and not just those areas that are defined as 16 non-attainment areas -- it covers the whole 17 18 State of New York -- that this has a very negative effect on those of us who live 19 20 upstate. 21 In this new Section 19, as you correctly point out, there is a provision that 22 says the Governor, by way of executive action, 23 can stop this temporarily from being put into 24 25 effect. You could also draw from that that

maybe while it's in effect, that he could 1 2 suspend it temporarily, although that's not specifically said in there. But he can do 3 4 this after consulting with NYSERDA. 5 And so my question to you, Senator, is this. I'm looking through all of those б 7 people who are in favor of the bill and who 8 are not in favor of the bill, and I do not see NYSERDA in here on any of these memos. 9 Where 10 is NYSERDA on this particular bill? SENATOR PARKER: I assume that 11 12 the Governor's support of this bill is significant in terms of NYSERDA's point of 13 14 view. But generally speaking, they don't 15 issue a position on this. SENATOR ALESI: 16 Thank you, 17 Mr. President. If I may continue. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Alesi. 19 20 SENATOR ALESI: If Senator Perkins would continue to yield. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 22 Senator Perkins, will you continue to yield? 23 SENATOR PERKINS: 24 Yes. 25 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The

sponsor continues.

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2	SENATOR ALESI: With all respect,
3	Senator, setting your assumptions aside, my
4	question was where does NYSERDA stand. And if
5	your assumption is that they haven't taken a
6	position on this, then could I conclude that
7	you haven't consulted with NYSERDA on this in
8	the crafting of this bill?
9	SENATOR PERKINS: Through you,
10	Mr. President, I have not personally consulted
11	with them about their position on the bill.
12	However, I do know that they have not sent any
13	communication in opposition either.
14	And again, I think that the support
15	of the Governor for the bill indicates that
16	there will be some support from NYSERDA as
17	well.
18	SENATOR ALESI: Thank you.
19	Mr. President, one other question,
20	if I may.
21	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
22	Senator Perkins?
23	SENATOR PERKINS: By all means.
24	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The
25	sponsor continues to yield.

SENATOR ALESI: Senator, as you 1 know, sometimes it's a little difficult to 2 3 hear around here. But I think when you were 4 responding to Senator Libous, you said 5 something about the mayor of New York. Ι think you said "Are you aware that the mayor 6 7 of New York" -- and then I couldn't hear the 8 rest of that. 9 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 10 Mr. President. Yes, the mayor of New York, who's in support of this bill, is also in the 11 12 process of developing regs on Number 4 and Number 6 oil. 13 14 SENATOR ALESI: I'm sorry, 15 Mr. President. In the process of what? SENATOR PERKINS: Developing some 16 regs with regard to Number 4 and Number 6. 17 18 SENATOR ALESI: Through you, Mr. President. Will he continue to yield? 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Perkins, do you continue to yield? 21 SENATOR PERKINS: 22 Yes. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 24 sponsor yields. 25 SENATOR ALESI: Senator Perkins,

why is he in the process of doing that? 1 2 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 3 Mr. President, I guess he wants to be ready in 4 time for the implementation of this 5 legislation. SENATOR ALESI: Mr. President, 6 7 through you. May I continue? 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 9 Senator Perkins? 10 SENATOR PERKINS: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 11 The 12 sponsor yields. SENATOR ALESI: 13 Senator Perkins, 14 is that because the area that we know as 15 Manhattan, which is in the non-attainment area, does this bill not apply to Manhattan? 16 SENATOR PERKINS: 17 Through you, 18 Mr. President, it does apply. 19 SENATOR ALESI: So it applies to 20 all of the areas in the non-attainment area, Through you, Mr. President. 21 then? 22 SENATOR PERKINS: Through you, 23 yes. SENATOR ALESI: 24 Thank you. 25 Mr. President, on the bill, if I

1 may. 2 Thank you, Senator Perkins for your 3 help. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 5 Senator Alesi, on the bill. 6 SENATOR ALESI: I think it's very clear -- and I don't know how many different 7 8 ways that we can say this. But I think it is 9 clear through this legislation that the 10 Governor is mentioned prominently in this bill, as Senator Perkins correctly points out, 11 12 as having the power to suspend this legislation after consulting with NYSERDA. 13 Ιt seems odd to me at this point that we have 14 15 had, at least according to the sponsor, no interaction with NYSERDA at all, and yet they 16 figure prominently into how this bill would 17 18 work as well. 19 And I think it's also compelling 20 for all of us to understand, and I'll say 21 slightly differently what all of my other colleagues have said, is that this bill 22 applies statewide and yet it refers in the 23 legislative memo to those areas that are 24 25 non-attainment areas. Meaning that they don't

meet the federal standards for healthy air. 1 Senator Little correctly pointed 2 out that in her district they have the 3 4 cleanest air in all of New York State. And 5 one might conclude from that that this would be beyond necessary from the environmental б 7 standpoint, but she also concluded -- and I 8 agree -- that this would have deleterious effects to those individual homeowners who are 9 10 going to have to pay significantly more price per gallon for this kind of heating oil. 11 12 And if you look at the contrast between those areas in the New York City 13 14 region that, maybe rightfully so, need to have 15 more help in attaining healthier air, those areas upstate that are going to be equally 16 impacted probably don't. 17 18 If you look at the kinds of homes that are being heated in upstate New York, by 19 20 and large we are not in a vertical society. Not most of our residential lives in high-rise 21 22 apartments, we live in single-family home. Ιf you think about that, a single-family home, 23 there is no synergy. You don't pick up any 24 25 advantage from your neighbor who's 200 yards

away as you do when you're living in a 1 vertical society and you have the advantage of 2 heating that whole vertical building with 3 4 maybe a thousand apartments in it. 5 So now while you have the coldest area of the state, as compared to New York б 7 City -- and whether it is in the Adirondacks 8 or if it's on the southern shore of Lake Erie or Lake Ontario where the Canadian wind, the 9 10 Artic Express, comes across and hits every one 11 of those single-family homes like a 10-cent razor blade -- I think that was the term I 12 remember hearing -- it is freezing cold. And 13 14 you have to turn the heat up. And when you 15 turn the heat up to keep your home warm, it costs you more money. And under this plan, 16 even though we don't really need it upstate 17 18 for air quality, it's going to cost even that much more. 19 20 Now, it doesn't matter whether we're middle-class or low-income people or 21 22 elderly, we're all going to be impacted negatively by a bill that really is designed 23 for New York City and the New York City 24

metropolitan area. And I applaud that. Love

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to help you with that.

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2 But all I'm saying is this. Ι 3 don't know if there's another way I can say 4 it. My colleagues have said it. Cut us some 5 slack. Every time we turn around, we're getting killed by New York City. I love б 7 New York City. I still believe it's the 8 economic engine of the state. And we desperately need New York City. We're all 9 10 part of it. But we should not be suffering under a bill that is meant to take care of the 11 non-attainment areas, which is mostly New York 12 City, when we live upstate, where it's cold, 13 14 where we live in single-family homes, and 15 we're going to pay more. Whether we're capable of paying more, whether we're elderly 16 and frail, or whether we're young families in 17 18 a single-family home trying to make life better, we're getting killed. 19 20 The mayor is working on something. I'm glad for that. But the mayor is from 21 22 New York City. So is the Governor. So is 23 everybody else that's running this state right Now, we were able to have some rational, 24 now. 25 in my view, some rational response from a

couple of the upstate Senators from the other 1 2 side of the aisle on that amendment. That tells me clearly that those two out of three 3 4 upstate Senators -- that would have embraced 5 the amendment that would have just put this off a little bit longer so that we could maybe б 7 be carved out or at least accommodated --8 understand how vitally important it is not to impact upstate New York so negatively when the 9 10 real intent of this bill is to do something for New York City. And appropriately so. 11 12 So, my colleagues, we're on the main bill. I'm simply asking again -- and 13 Senator Perkins is a dear friend of mine. 14 And 15 I enjoy his company, and I applaud his efforts. I'm simply asking, again, take a 16 step back, just amend this bill slightly to 17 18 help the people in upstate New York, come back with it Monday. I can't speak for my 19 20 colleagues, but I'd pretty much bet if I got them all in a room alone, they'd see life my 21 22 way. We'd support your bill. 23 Please, Senator Perkins, help us 24 out in upstate. 25 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank

you, Senator Alesi. 1 2 Senator Owen Johnson. 3 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Thank you, 4 Mr. President. 5 You know, I spent quite a few years in environmental activities, including being б 7 the chairman of the Environmental Conservation 8 Committee in the Senate. And I have always 9 had a strong interest in air quality and water 10 quality. When I started right off talking with DEC and other people, they said to me, 11 12 Well, you can do a lot of things and we should do a lot of things and we have done a lot of 13 things to clean the air, but unless you can 14 15 change the breeze coming up from Jersey, you won't make much difference in your communities 16 on Long Island. And that's probably true. 17 18 In any event, as you all know, automobile inspections and standards have been 19 20 ratcheted down and down. The cars are very clean. They've added ethanol to the gasoline 21 to make the air cleaner. And we're still in a 22 non-attainment area, with all we've done. 23 24 Now, we can't change the air coming 25 up the coast. We can't get a block of fresh

air and park it over our communities and keep 1 it there, because air keeps moving. Not only 2 3 around Long Island, obviously, or New York 4 City, but even in the Adirondacks. Senator 5 Little said they've got the cleanest air up there. But you know what? Their air is б 7 polluted by the midwest power plants, and they 8 have acidic lakes with no fish in their lakes because of the acid from the midwest power 9 10 plants. So we can't change a lot of the 11 12 surroundings. We should try to work together with our surrounding states, though, and get 13 the air as clean as we can by matching the 14 15 standards of the surrounding states, which has been proposed as an amendment here. Now, that 16 amendment should be adopted. We should match 17 18 that clean as we can. And what am I going to tell you here? I've got so many things to 19 20 say. In any event, the only discernible 21 benefit -- or change, I should say, not 22 23 benefit. The only discernible change from changing this little bit of air quality in 24 25 fuel, varying it lower than the surrounding

states, will not make our air one bit cleaner. 1 The discernible benefit, if you want to say, 2 3 or change is that we're going to pay more for our fuel oil. Now, that doesn't make an awful 4 5 lot of sense, does it, when you're not cleaning the air at all, you still have the б 7 same air coming from Jersey, the same air from 8 the surrounding states. That we should match their standard and that we could do that 9 10 inexpensively and avoid increased costs for 11 people who buy the fuel oil. 12 That's about all I can say. So I 13 think that the suggested changes by Senator Marcellino to match the other standards is the 14 15 right thing to do. It'll be doing the best we can for air quality at the moment, and we 16 won't be bankrupting our people. 17 18 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 19 Thank 20 you, Senator Johnson. Senator DeFrancisco. 21 22 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: I just want to stand up briefly. I'm not going to make 23 the same argument. I just want to state for 24 25 the record that I agree with Senator

Stachowski. I agree with him strongly that 1 2 this bill should not be effective until 2014, 3 and I support his bill, which was our 4 amendment. 5 And I agree with Senator Aubertine as well, who voted for that amendment, who б 7 obviously feels the same way, because he 8 represents an upstate community, that this 9 bill should not go into effect, the 10 requirement, until 2014. And I also agree with what I know 11 is Senator Valesky's belief in his heart that 12 it should be 2014. And I hope we have their 13 14 support when we vote against this bill. 15 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Thank 16 you, Senator DeFrancisco. 17 18 Are there any other Senators who wish to be heard on the bill? 19 20 Seeing none, the debate is closed. 21 The Secretary will ring the bells. 22 All Senators are asked to proceed to the 23 chamber for the purposes of a roll call. Senator Libous. 24 25 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President,

I'd like to call a slow roll call on this 1 bill. 2 3 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Seeing the required five Senators rise, the roll will 4 5 be called slowly. б The Secretary will read the last 7 section. 8 THE SECRETARY: Section 2. This 9 act shall take effect immediately. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Call the roll slowly. 11 THE SECRETARY: Senator Adams. 12 SENATOR ADAMS: Yes. 13 THE SECRETARY: Senator Addabbo. 14 15 SENATOR ADDABBO: Yes. THE SECRETARY: Senator Alesi. 16 SENATOR ALESI: 17 No. 18 THE SECRETARY: Senator Aubertine. 19 20 SENATOR AUBERTINE: Yes. THE SECRETARY: Senator Bonacic. 21 22 SENATOR BONACIC: No. Senator Breslin. 23 THE SECRETARY: SENATOR BRESLIN: 24 Yes. 25 THE SECRETARY: Senator

DeFrancisco. 1 2 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: No. 3 THE SECRETARY: Senator Diaz. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 5 Senator Diaz, to explain his vote. SENATOR DIAZ: б Thank you, Mr. President. 7 8 I'd just like to thank Senator Perkins, because the County of the Bronx and 9 10 the district that I represent is one of the more affected areas with asthma and 11 12 respiratory diseases. Even myself, the other day, I just found that I am with asthma too. 13 And that's what happens to people in the 14 15 district that I represent. So, Senator Perkins, thank you for 16 your concern and your bill. It helps -- even 17 18 myself will be helped with that bill. So thank you, and I'm voting yes. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Diaz to be recorded in the 21 affirmative. 22 Senator Dilan. 23 THE SECRETARY: SENATOR DILAN: 24 Yes. 25 THE SECRETARY: Senator Duane.

SENATOR DUANE: 1 Yes. 2 THE SECRETARY: Senator Espada. 3 SENATOR ESPADA: Yes. SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President --4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Libous. б 7 SENATOR LIBOUS: -- is this a 8 slow roll call? Are not members supposed to orally give their vote, or are we on a hand 9 10 vote? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: This 11 is a slow roll call. Members are voted 12 13 orally. SENATOR LIBOUS: First of all, we 14 15 can't hear any members voting. We only hear Tommy giving the result of the vote. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 17 Т 18 would ask that Senators project as they vote so that the Secretary may record the vote 19 20 accurately. SENATOR LIBOUS: In that vein, 21 22 Mr. President, could you please tell me how 23 the last three people voted? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 24 25 Senators Dilan, Duane, and Espada recorded in

the affirmative. 1 2 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 5 Secretary will continue to call the roll slowly. 6 7 THE SECRETARY: Senator Farley. 8 SENATOR FARLEY: No. 9 THE SECRETARY: Senator Flanagan. 10 SENATOR FLANAGAN: No. THE SECRETARY: 11 Senator Foley. 12 SENATOR FOLEY: Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 13 14 Senator Foley, to explain his vote. 15 SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you, Mr. President. 16 This bill is very, very important 17 18 to Long Island and that particular region of New York State. When I was chair of the 19 20 Health Committee in the County Legislature, we had plenty of testimony over a period of years 21 about the, let's say, high, high levels of 22 pollutants within that given region. 23 This particular bill that Senator 24 25 Perkins has put forward will in the short

term, mid-term, and long term help clean up 1 2 the air of our particular region. 3 I want to thank Senator Perkins for 4 putting this bill forward. Notwithstanding 5 the issue of the timing, the substance of this bill will enable Long Islanders to breathe б 7 easier as time goes on. That's why I strongly 8 support the bill and vote in the affirmative, Mr. President. Thank you. 9 10 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Foley to be recorded in the 11 affirmative. 12 THE SECRETARY: 13 Senator Fuschillo. 14 15 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: No. THE SECRETARY: Senator Golden. 16 SENATOR GOLDEN: 17 No. 18 THE SECRETARY: Senator Griffo. 19 SENATOR GRIFFO: No. 20 SENATOR ADAMS: Mr. President, point of order. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 22 Senator Adams, why do you rise? 23 SENATOR ADAMS: Point of order. 24 25 If I recall, in order to do a vote, you're

supposed to be in your chair. Senator Golden 1 2 was marching around somewhere. You know, he 3 disappears a lot when important votes come on. 4 So I just wanted to make sure that he was in 5 his chair when he made his vote. б (Laughter.) 7 SENATOR GOLDEN: Thank you, 8 Senator Adams. 9 (Laughter.) 10 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Golden to be recorded in the negative. 11 12 SENATOR GOLDEN: That's correct. Thank you. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 14 The 15 Secretary will continue to call the roll. THE SECRETARY: Senator Hannon. 16 SENATOR HANNON: 17 No. 18 THE SECRETARY: Senator 19 Hassell-Thompson. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 Senator Hassell-Thompson, to explain her vote. 22 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank 23 you, Mr. President. Let me project my voice loudly so that all can hear me vote in the 24 25 affirmative.

I, like Senator Diaz, represent the 1 2 Bronx, with the highest incidences of asthma. 3 And until we have found what the single cause 4 is, everything that we do has the 5 possibilities of adding to the rise in asthma 6 among our children as well as adults. 7 Therefore, loudly I affirm in support of 8 Senator Perkins' bill. 9 Thank you, Mr. President. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Hassell-Thompson to be recorded in the 11 affirmative. 12 13 THE SECRETARY: Senator Huntley. 14 SENATOR HUNTLEY: Yes. 15 THE SECRETARY: Senator C. Johnson. 16 SENATOR CRAIG JOHNSON: 17 Yes. 18 THE SECRETARY: Senator 0. 19 Johnson. 20 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: No. 21 THE SECRETARY: Senator Klein. 22 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes. 23 THE SECRETARY: Senator L. Krueger. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:

Senator Liz Krueger, to explain her vote. 1 2 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. Well, I sat and listened carefully 3 4 to the debate. And I guess I was confused by 5 a couple of things. But I am quite sure I am voting yes for this bill. б 7 Just for the record, the air moves 8 So whether we think we live in a around. slightly dirty area airwise or a clean area 9 10 airwise, the thing about air is it keeps moving everywhere. So it affects us all when 11 12 there's pollution. Second, it was made very clear that 13 14 if there is any shortage of the correct new 15 low-sulfur, high-efficiency fuel, that the Governor will have the power to extend 16 timelines with this legislation. 17 18 So with this legislation we're going to do what is needed for the 19 20 environment. It will be a win/win for all areas of the State of New York. Yes, my area 21 22 is a particularly high-danger area. But also 23 the fuel is more efficient, so you're actually going to burn less of it. So I'd even debate 24 25 the cost issue.

1	So yes, I'm happy to loudly
2	proclaim yes I support the bill. Thank you,
3	Mr. President.
4	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
5	Senator Liz Krueger to be recorded in the
6	affirmative.
7	The Secretary will continue.
8	THE SECRETARY: Senator C.
9	Kruger.
10	SENATOR CARL KRUGER: Yes.
11	THE SECRETARY: Senator Lanza.
12	SENATOR LANZA: No.
13	THE SECRETARY: Senator Larkin.
14	SENATOR LARKIN: No.
15	THE SECRETARY: Senator LaValle.
16	SENATOR LaVALLE: No.
17	THE SECRETARY: Senator Leibell.
18	SENATOR LEIBELL: No.
19	THE SECRETARY: Senator Libous.
20	SENATOR LIBOUS: To explain my
21	vote, Mr. President.
22	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
23	Senator Libous, to explain his vote.
24	SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President,
25	Senator Perkins, I like you, I think you're a

good legislator, but I'm disappointed today. 1 2 I'm disappointed. I'm disappointed in my other 3 4 colleagues, particularly those from downstate. 5 Over the last 22 years, I've voted for a number of major pieces of legislation that 6 7 helped people on Long Island and the City of 8 New York, because it's all part of the state. And I hear from my colleagues on the other 9 10 side of the aisle that we're one New York. Ι hear it often from my friend and colleague 11 Senator Smith and others. 12 Well, I'm disappointed. 13 We 14 explained to you that this bill hurts the 15 upstate rural communities, the consumers who heat their home with oil. This is going to 16 17 cost them more money. We're not being 18 unreasonable. We care about asthma, we care about air quality and control. And we asked 19 20 the sponsor on a number of occasions -- number one occasion, if it's a problem in the City of 21 New York and in Long Island, then make the 22 23 bill pertain to the City of New York and Long Island. But no, we're going to make this 24 25 statewide.

And then what do you do is you 1 2 impose restrictions. People will not get home 3 heating oil next year, I'm telling you. But 4 you won't care, because you'll be in the City 5 of New York. You don't heat, as Senator Alesi 6 and others said, your home with home heating 7 fuel. 8 So I'm disappointed. I'm very 9 disappointed. When we stand up and share with 10 you the differences -- because this is a different state, even though we're one New 11 12 York State. Upstate -- and I see that, Senator Hassell-Thompson. You don't have to 13 14 show me your watch. I have one. I know my 15 time is running out. But this is important enough for me for make a point. Shame on you 16 for not being open-minded enough to respect 17 18 those who don't live in the City of New York or on Long Island. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Libous, how do you vote? 21 22 SENATOR LIBOUS: I vote no. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Libous to be recorded in the negative. 24 25 The Secretary will continue.

THE SECRETARY: Senator Little. 1 2 SENATOR LITTLE: No. 3 THE SECRETARY: Senator Marcellino. 4 5 SENATOR MARCELLINO: No. THE SECRETARY: Senator Maziarz. 6 7 SENATOR MAZIARZ: No. 8 THE SECRETARY: Senator McDonald. 9 SENATOR McDONALD: No. 10 THE SECRETARY: Senator 11 Montgomery. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 12 Senator Montgomery, to explain her vote. 13 SENATOR MONTGOMERY: 14 Mr. President, to explain my vote. 15 I am voting yes on this. I'm quite 16 confused by Senator Libous, all due respect, 17 18 Senator. You chastise us because we say one New York, because we believe one New York. 19 20 But then, on the other hand, you say but leave us out, leave the upstate constituents out, 21 don't protect their environment. So I'm a 22 little bit confused by that. 23 I think this is really a good bill. 24 We really need this bill in the State of 25

New York. We are one of the highest users of 1 2 fuel oil for heating purposes. And we also 3 have pockets in our state where there is a 4 very high concentration of incidents of 5 chronic ailments related to pollution in the environment, auto and home heating and public 6 7 transportation and et cetera. 8 So this particular bill is an attempt to address part of that. It in fact 9 10 will reduce the cost of heating oil. I have a district that has a large number of 11 single-home owners, small residences, 12 essentially, that use this heating oil. 13 So 14 I'm extremely supportive and excited that we 15 have taken at least one small step to address this issue. 16 And, Mr. President, I therefore 17 18 vote aye for this bill. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 19 20 Senator Montgomery to be recorded in the affirmative. 21 22 THE SECRETARY: Senator Morahan, 23 excused. Senator Nozzolio. 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:

Senator Nozzolio, to explain his vote. 1 2 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 Mr. President and my colleagues, I 5 rise because I believe we are one New York. But I strongly believe that a portion of our б 7 state is totally ignoring the dramatic and 8 almost desperate economic crisis that exists 9 in upstate New York. And that this 10 legislation adds to the burden of doing business, of producing jobs, of making the 11 12 upstate economy work again. Government should not be the problem. 13 Here, with this legislation 14 15 ignoring the needs and the dramatic situation that upstate faces, is reason enough to vote 16 against the legislation. And, Mr. President, 17 18 that's why I wish to be recorded in the negative against the bill. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 Senator Nozzolio to be recorded in the 22 negative. 23 The Secretary will continue. 24 THE SECRETARY: Senator Onorato. 25 SENATOR ONORATO: Aye.

THE SECRETARY: Senator 1 2 Oppenheimer. 3 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Yes. 4 THE SECRETARY: Senator Padavan. 5 SENATOR PADAVAN: Nay. THE SECRETARY: Senator Parker. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 8 Senator Parker, to explain his vote. 9 SENATOR PARKER: Yes, Mr. 10 Chairman. First, let me just congratulate 11 12 Bill Perkins for his intrepid work and leadership on this issue. There is nothing, 13 14 frankly, more important than the stewardship 15 of our planet. And if we have not learned that from what's been happening with the 16 greenhouse effect and what's been happening 17 18 with the high asthma rates, when we see earthquakes and tidal waves and tsunamis and 19 20 all these other things that are happening, 21 this all is part of it. And not even a mention of the BP disaster. 22 Right? And so, you know, we know how 23 harmful this is. One of the things we ought 24 25 to do -- and as you have the chairman of the

Energy Committee in the Senate on your side of the aisle, you ought to interact with him to find ways that we can get people off of oil. We need to be moving away from this situation anyway.

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б In the same way that we have, you 7 know, stopped smoking in buildings, we have to 8 progress. And it's going to be difficult. 9 This is what we call the transition. And 10 transitions are painful, but they're 11 necessary. We need to be moving towards a 12 society where we are not dependent on, you know, foreign oil consumption, where we're 13 not -- our addiction to foreign oil has to be 14 15 broken. And if it has to be done, you know, cold turkey, then so let it be. 16 But there are lots of programs to 17

18 help people move to alternative energy and do 19 things that need to be done so they can heat 20 their homes. But certainly taking sulfur out is an important first step. I applaud you, 21 Senator Bill Perkins, and thank you so much 22 23 for doing this. And I really encourage my 24 colleagues to vote aye as I will be voting 25 aye.

1	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
2	Senator Parker to be recorded in the
3	affirmative.
4	THE SECRETARY: Senator Peralta.
5	SENATOR PERALTA: Yes.
6	THE SECRETARY: Senator Perkins.
7	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
8	Senator Perkins, to explain his vote.
9	SENATOR PERKINS: Thank you very
10	much. I'm going to be brief. But, Senator
11	Libous, I love you too. And I have a high
12	regard for what you do on behalf of your
13	conference. And I in no way question the
14	sincerity of what you're trying to do for the
15	people of your community or the people of the
16	state. I would urge you not to do the same
17	with me and my colleagues as well.
18	As you may recall, we had a
19	discussion earlier in which the date was
20	different than the date that you're talking
21	about now. The date that was offered was
22	1012. Now we're talking about 2014. So I'm
23	concerned about the moving target as we move
24	forward to correct what we all recognize is a
25	problem not just for New York City but for

New York State as well.

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2	And I believe that this
3	legislation, as a result of some of the input
4	that you have made and some of your other
5	colleagues have made, is a giant step towards
6	that end. We all are winners on this, no
7	matter what part of the state that we come
8	from. Your constituents will breathe better
9	and all of our constituents will save money by
10	virtue of this legislation. And if in fact
11	any corrections need to be made, thanks to
12	your input and others, the Governor is
13	available to take those into consideration.
14	So I think that we protest too much
15	and that we may be denigrating each other
16	unnecessarily in our passion to represent our
17	neighborhoods, to represent our areas. This
18	is good legislation. This is not intended to
19	be a problem for anybody. And in fact the
20	proof will be that it is not and will not be.
21	Thank you so much. I vote aye.
22	ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:
23	Senator Perkins to be recorded in the
24	affirmative.
25	The Secretary will continue to call

the roll. 1 2 THE SECRETARY: Senator 3 Ranzenhofer. 4 SENATOR RANZENHOFER: No. 5 THE SECRETARY: Senator Robach. SENATOR ROBACH: 6 Yes, 7 Mr. President, to explain my vote. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 9 Senator Robach, to explain his vote. 10 SENATOR ROBACH: I have to say I'm a little bit surprised and shocked by some 11 12 of the comments over there. 13 And you're right, while we all want to solve this, we also talk about words in 14 15 this chamber all the time: Cooperation, fairness, equity. And I really, I'm missing 16 it here. 17 18 Not only have you heard a very cogent reason not to make the people pay the 19 20 acute price who aren't in the area where the 21 greatest pollution is, but then even more 22 egregious to me, and I don't know if -- I hope this is omission and not arrogance and 23 unfairness, but then you don't include in the 24 25 bill 4 and 6 oil which heats Manhattan and all

the big property buildings, and those are 1 conveniently carved out of the bill, making 2 this tremendously unfair and quite frankly 3 4 adding a lot of hypocrisy to those speeches on 5 how you really want to solve the problem. Now, we could do this a different б 7 We could have changed the date, we could way. 8 have included those things. You're the sponsor of the bill. People have asked you, 9 10 we talked about it on this floor at great 11 length. And I appreciated all the comments 12 and listened to every one of them, unlike some 13 people. 14 But now there's really no choice. 15 What could have been something very good and inclusive is really something very exclusive 16 and something unfair to a certain part of the 17 18 state. And you're right, Senator Perkins, 19 20 there is a lot of frustration on my constituents and a lot of us over here that 21 that happens too much, we feel, where the 22 weight and the specialty always goes to one 23 portion of the state, which is rarely mine. 24 25 It's always that part in the southern part of

the state, New York City. And we could have 1 2 avoided that. 3 So before, you know, we all 4 celebrate, I hope, since we couldn't get you 5 to change it today, I hope we'll go back and revisit this and really make it a little bit б 7 better so everybody can stand -- and I have to 8 tell you, after listening to the debate today, anybody, whether they're either side of the 9 10 aisle, who votes for this for upstate New York is not looking out for the best interests of 11 12 their constituents. 13 I vote no. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 14 15 Senator Robach to be recorded in the negative. THE SECRETARY: Senator Saland. 16 SENATOR SALAND: 17 No. 18 THE SECRETARY: Senator Sampson. 19 SENATOR SAMPSON: Yes. 20 THE SECRETARY: Senator Savino. SENATOR SAVINO: 21 Yes. Senator Young. 1 THE SECRETARY: 2 SENATOR YOUNG: To explain my 3 vote. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 5 Senator Young, to explain her vote. SENATOR YOUNG: 6 Thank you, 7 Mr. President. 8 You're right, Senator Perkins, we 9 are very passionate about our neighborhoods 10 and about our communities. And that's why we 11 expressed our concerns today about how this 12 hurts our neighborhoods and our communities. 13 And you know, I respect you very 14 much. I respect Senator Montgomery very much. 15 But it sounds very disingenuous to me when you say that the people in our regions are winners 16 that this doesn't hurt the people in our 17 18 regions, that it protects them. It's not It's not true. People are hurting in 19 true. 20 upstate New York. We have an economic crisis going on. People have lost their jobs. 21 People can't afford to pay their bills. 22 23 And I can't believe -- in fact, I'm shocked that my colleagues, especially the 24 25 Democrats from upstate New York, would vote to

either raise home heating fuel prices or 1 2 create a shortage next year where people who depend on home heating oil aren't going to be 3 4 able to get it. How can you do that? And how 5 can you sit there and say that you're making people winners and not hurting people? You б are hurting people today. 7 8 I am shocked by this. I vote no. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 10 Senator Young to be recorded in the negative. Announce the results. 11 12 THE SECRETARY: Ayes, 32. Nays, 29. 13 14 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: The 15 bill is passed. The Secretary will continue to read 16 the controversial calendar. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 846, by Senator Stewart-Cousins, Senate Print 19 20 7400A, an act to amend the General Municipal 21 Law. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 22 Are there any Senators who wish to be heard on the 23 bill? 24 25 Hearing none, the debate is closed.

The Secretary will ring the bells. 1 2 The Secretary will read the last 3 section. Section 17. 4 THE SECRETARY: This 5 act shall take effect on the first of January. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Call 6 7 the roll. 8 (The Secretary called the roll.) 9 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 10 Announce the results. THE SECRETARY: In relation to 11 Calendar Number 846, absent from voting: 12 Senators Breslin, Golden, Marcellino and 13 Padavan. 14 15 Ayes, 57. Nays, 0. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 The bill is passed. 17 18 The Secretary will proceed with the reading of the controversial supplemental 19 20 active list. Members are asked to stay in the 21 chamber. 22 23 THE SECRETARY: Calendar Number 1001, by Senator L. Krueger, Senate Print 24 25 4526, an act to amend the Legislative Law.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 1 2 Senator Griffo. 3 SENATOR GRIFFO: Thank you, Mr. President. 4 5 As I look at this -- and I recognize, I think we all do, that if there's 6 7 anything flawed, it is the framework and the 8 process of the state budget. And the intent 9 here is noteworthy and admirable, but it's the 10 content that concerns me. And what I look at here is the fact 11 that we've talked about the idea behind this 12 13 is to model it after the Congressional Budget Office. And I think that is a good idea. But 14 15 unfortunately, some of the concerns that I find in this bill is it's somewhat modeled 16 after but I believe that we have to mirror the 17 18 Congressional Budget Office. If we are going to do this --19 20 SENATOR ROBACH: Can we have a 21 little order in here? I can't even hear. Can 22 we get a little order in here, Mr. President? 23 SENATOR GRIFFO: Thank you. If we're really going to undertake 24 25 this process, then I think that we should

really make an effort to mirror the 1 2 Congressional Budget Office to allow to us really do it properly. 3 4 Some of the concerns with this bill 5 is the criteria and qualifications and credentials of the director, deputy director, 6 7 and staff. There's no specific requirements. 8 It's very general in its statement of purpose. 9 Also, the term and length of 10 service of the executive director. At this point in time the bill specifies a seven-year 11 12 term, and there's really difficulty in determining how you may remove that director 13 14 if there was cause. 15 And the other thing would be that I don't believe there's enough significant 16 tasking for the assignments that would be 17 18 required and important in undertaking this responsibility. The Congressional Budget 19 20 Office has been in effect for over 35, and it has truly been a nonpartisan and professional 21 22 operation in Congress. 23 For instance, the director, if we talk about the difference again between what 24 25 is stipulated in the bill and what I think

would even make this a better bill is that the 1 2 director of the Congressional Budget Office 3 has to be approved without regard to political 4 affiliation and solely based on the fitness to 5 perform duties. There is no such requirement on qualifications for office set forth in this б 7 bill. 8 Also, the director of the Congressional Budget Office can be removed by 9 10 resolution of the House of Representatives and This bill does not provide for the 11 Senate. 12 ability to remove the director for circumstances that may be necessary. 13 14 So I think that, again, the intent 15 is good. I do believe that it's important. I had a bill, a similar bill talking about the 16 17 necessary independence -- an independent 18 budget operation so that we can have objective and professional analysis. But I think that 19 this really, while it's a beginning in the 20 right direction, doesn't bring us to where we 21 22 really need. 23 And when you know that we have had 78 days without a state budget here, when we 24 25 see that deadlines have been ignored, and when

we know that current laws have been violated, I think it's important that we go and do this right.

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4 And while this concept is good and 5 we should pursue it, I think we need to move forward with truly making this not a model of б 7 the Congressional Budget Office, but let's 8 mirror the Congressional Budget Office. The reforms are essential and necessary. I would 9 10 hope that we could respect the current laws before we move over to new ones. But if we're 11 12 going to do it, let's do it right, and let's truly model it after the Congressional Budget 13 Office, which has proven itself. 14 15 So that's my perspective, and I thank you for the opportunity to be heard, 16 Mr. President. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Thank you, Senator Griffo. 19 20 Senator Liz Krueger, on the bill. SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: 21 Thank you 22 very much. I just rise to explain a bit about 23 my bill. And I want to thank Senator Griffo 24 25 for his constructive comments. I know that

there was a hostile amendment that he had 1 earlier, but he pulled it back -- which was 2 3 his right -- which, again, looked at a number 4 of the pieces of the Congressional Budget 5 Office. It is true this is not an exact б 7 model of the Congressional Budget Office. In 8 fact, I don't think New York State could do 9 that right away. For one thing, it has a much 10 broader range of responsibilities at the federal level than the state. I think that I 11 12 couldn't get away with proposing we create a Congressional Budget Office at the state level 13 14 at this time because the economic cost would 15 be so dramatic. When they started the Congressional 16 17 Budget Office, they had a \$44 million price 18 tag for it and it had responsibilities beyond what I think we can have here. The federal --19 20 if we used the federal model exactly, we would have to reproduce legislative budget office 21 22 models or arms for the Department of Budget, Tax and Finance, the Comptroller's Office, 23 ESDC, ORPS. So this is a smaller model. 24 25 But I want to highlight that I

think we can get something started and then we 1 can see how it grows based on its 2 3 effectiveness. So I do appreciate Senator 4 Griffo's comments and some of the 5 recommendations that were made in his hostile. And I think that if we could pass this bill 6 7 and get a legislative budget office, we could 8 see all the potential of what we could do 9 together and we could grow it over the years. 10 What does it do? As Senator Griffo 11 pointed out, it's the idea of creating an 12 independent nonpolitical financial analysis and forecasting entity, as opposed to a 13 14 partisan, politically driven committee. It is 15 headed by a director who would be appointed by joint resolution of the Senate and Assembly 16 for a seven-year term, with hiring resting in 17 18 the director. We thought a seven-year term made 19 20 sense because it wouldn't be tied into any governor's schedule of coming in or going out 21 22 with governors and would allow -- I'm sorry, could I ask for a little quiet in the chamber? 23 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 24 25 Senator Krueger has requested order in the

chamber. 1 2 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you, 3 Mr. President. 4 The legislative budget office would 5 provide us all -- regardless of party, regardless of house -- with specific б 7 information about true cost estimates on 8 budget items, on legislative items, economic analysis for the state. 9 10 I hope that we will not only pass this bill but will also pass a piece of 11 12 legislation I believe may come up later in the week or next week for GAAP budgeting for the 13 state. In order for the state to truly move 14 15 into generally accepted accounting principle budgeting, we need --16 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 17 18 Senator DeFrancisco, why do you rise? 19 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Will 20 Senator Krueger yield to a question? 21 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Senator Krueger, will you yield to a question? 22 23 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Could I 24 just complete my description? And then I'd be 25 happy to take any questions.

Absolutely. 1 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: 2 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 3 4 Senator Krueger. 5 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you б so much. 7 In order to move successfully into 8 GAAP budgeting and other important budget reform, you really need to be able to have 9 10 objective information about what things cost 11 and what things are costing us over time. And 12 in fact the legislative budget office would empower the Legislature -- both houses, both 13 14 parties, because everybody would get the same 15 information -- to challenge now the de facto, I suppose the de facto positions of the 16 Department of Budget for the Governor. 17 18 Because if we don't have the information to challenge what the Governor's office is 19 20 telling us things cost or will cost or will bring in, we don't have the ability to be 21 22 equal players in budget negotiations and in 23 three-way legislation. This is a very successful model not 24 25 only on the federal level, as my colleague

Senator Griffo has highlighted, but is also 1 2 very successful in quite a few other states who have already implemented nonpartisan 3 fiscal offices. Nationwide, 44 state 4 5 legislatures have nonpartisan fiscal offices, including the City of New York, as the largest 6 7 city in the State of New York, having an 8 independent budget office. California created 9 the first nonpartisan legislative fiscal 10 office in 1941. Tennessee's Office of 11 Legislative Budget Analysis is the nation's 12 newest joint legislative fiscal. There are years of documentation 13 14 about why LBOs or IBOs work. Again, 44 states 15 have gone down that road. And I am hoping very much that even if we don't agree 16 completely on what the specific functions will 17 18 be over the long term, that my colleagues in both houses are going to want to move this 19 20 legislation and get us started. Because in 21 honesty, if other states have already gone down that road since the '40s, I think it's 22 23 time for New York State to give a successful 24 model a try. 25 And now I'd be happy to answer any

questions of Senator DeFrancisco. 1 Thank you. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 3 Senator Carl Kruger. 4 SENATOR CARL KRUGER: Thank you, 5 Mr. President. I guess, you know, confusion from б 7 time to time reigns. And the short title of 8 this is "creates the nonpartisan legislative budget office." Quite frankly, first we have 9 10 to recognize the fact that this is Albany, 11 New York, and not Washington, D.C. And this 12 is the State Legislature and not the Congress. And we have a legislative budget office, and 13 they call it the Senate Finance Committee in 14 15 this house. And the shared responsibilities are between the majority and my partner, the 16 ranking member on the minority side. 17 18 I think that this would be an intrusion. We already have a State 19 20 Comptroller. We have a mechanism and a 21 methodology where we can examine the budget, 22 where we can come to negotiated agreements. And quite frankly, I think that this takes us 23 in the wrong direction. 24 25 Thank you.

ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 1 2 Thank you, Senator Kruger. 3 Senator Fuschillo. 4 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Would the 5 sponsor yield to a few questions, Mr. President. б 7 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 8 Senator Krueger, would you yield to Senator 9 Fuschillo for some questions? 10 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. Certainly, Senator Fuschillo. 11 12 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Senator Fuschillo. 13 14 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Thank you, 15 Senator Krueger. In your memo you state that it's 16 estimated the operating budget will be 17 18 \$2 million. And is that money taken from the Senate Finance Committee and the Assembly Ways 19 20 and Means? SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: The 21 estimate is \$2 million, of which \$1 million 22 23 will come from each house. There's an assumption, despite my 24 25 colleague Senator Carl Kruger's concern, that

we would be doing away with the Finance 1 2 Committees or the Finance staff. That's 3 absolutely not true. But we would shift some 4 of the money from each house into a 5 legislative budget office. 6 Which would be doing, by the way, a 7 significant percentage of the work that now is 8 often duplicated in both houses because we 9 have no model for this. 10 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: What is the 11 budget of the --12 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Senator Fuschillo, do you wish --13 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Would the 14 15 sponsor yield for another question? ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 16 Senator Krueger, would you continue to yield 17 18 for Senator Fuschillo? 19 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Yes, of 20 course, Senator. ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 21 Senator Fuschillo. 22 23 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: So you're 24 going to be reducing the Senate's Finance 25 Committee's budget for staff, personnel,

administrative abilities by a million dollars. 1 2 Would that result in laying off employees in the New York State Senate that are currently 3 4 assigned to Senator Kruger's committee? 5 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: To answer your question, it would be a million dollars б 7 from each house. It wouldn't necessarily come 8 from the current distribution of how either house, either side, distributes their money. 9 10 Again, I would argue that the legislative budget office providing both 11 12 fiscal and to some degree legislative analysis, because so much of our legislation, 13 14 the analysis that needs to be done is based on 15 the financial cost of the legislation, that it would be a relatively minimal loss to any of 16 17 us for a much greater gain. 18 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Would the sponsor continue to yield, Mr. President? 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 21 Senator Krueger, will you continue to yield? 22 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Certainly. 23 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Thank you, 24 Senator. 25 In your memo you state that funding

for the legislative budget office will be 1 redirected from the Senate Finance Committee 2 3 and the Assembly Ways and Means. So I'll ask 4 again, are you going to be taking a million 5 dollars out of the budget for the Senate 6 Finance Committee? Because your memo says you 7 are. 8 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Aqain, I don't -- I would recognize that my memo may 9 10 not be exactly parallel to the legislation. Ι 11 don't believe the legislation requires it come 12 from the Finance budget specifically. And I believe, as we know, those are a moving target 13 14 as to how much money is put into any 15 subsection of Senate staff in any given year. SENATOR FUSCHILLO: 16 Thank you. 17 Would the Senator continue to yield, 18 Mr. President? ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 19 20 Senator, do you continue to yield? SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: 21 Yes, of course, Mr. President. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 23 Senator Fuschillo. 24 25 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Thank you,

Senator.

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2	In your I'll refer to the bill,
3	not the memo anymore, because I think the memo
4	is incorrect, based on your statements. But
5	it says here that "be charged with the duty of
б	rendering anticipated revenue forecast reports
7	to the Legislature and the Governor for the
8	purpose of facilitating passage of the state
9	budget in a timely manner."
10	SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: I'm sorry,
11	I couldn't hear you, excuse me. Could you
12	repeat that, please?
13	SENATOR FUSCHILLO: On page 2(c),
14	in Section 1 or Section 77(c), it says here
15	that they're going to render anticipated
16	revenue forecasts on the Governor's budget.
17	SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Yes.
18	SENATOR FUSCHILLO: In a timely
19	manner. What exactly does that mean? You
20	don't set parameters that after the budget is
21	produced by the Governor, within 30 days they
22	have to report to the Legislature. You just
23	state you leave it wide open that there's a
24	timely manner.
25	SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: We have

actual budget law that sets timeline for the 1 2 revenue forecasting for the budget each year. 3 So it would be that this responsibility would 4 shift to the LBO. It doesn't change the 5 timelines that we have in existing law in New York State. б 7 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Would the 8 Senator continue to yield, Mr. President? ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 9 10 Senator Krueger, do you continue to yield? 11 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Certainly. 12 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Now, your 13 title is laudable, "Nonpartisan Legislative 14 Budget Office." But I'm trying to think about 15 what isn't duplicated already by what Senator Kruger said in the Senate Finance Committee, 16 by the ranking member of the Finance Committee 17 18 in the Republicans, and also in the Assembly on both sides. 19 20 A report is submitted -- now this 21 is nonpartisan -- to the Temporary President, who's a Democrat right now, and the Speaker of 22 the Assembly, who's a Democrat right now. Why 23 wouldn't your bill include the minority as 24

well as in both houses, if it's truly

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nonpartisan? 1 2 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: That's a 3 legitimate concern, I agree. That was not my 4 intent, to prevent that material from coming 5 to either side, either party. 6 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Thank you 7 very much, Senator. 8 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you. 9 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Just on the 10 bill, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 11 Senator Fuschillo, on the bill. 12 13 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Again, I'll 14 state that the title "Nonpartisan Legislative 15 Budget Office" is something that is laudable and sounds great, but I don't really see how a 16 goal like that is attainable here. 17 18 And I don't know whether or not there is ample dollars to fund a \$2 million 19 20 another government bureaucratic operation here 21 in the State of New York when people are 22 calling for less government, they're calling 23 for reducing the size of government, we're calling for a cap on state expenditures. Yet 24 25 we're creating another office that seems,

1	Mr. President, as a duplication of services.
2	Now, there's no statutory
3	requirement that this legislative body has to
4	do anything with the reports, whether it's in
5	a timely manner or not. And that's not even
6	spelled out in the bill. But it concerns me
7	that it's really the party of power in a joint
8	legislative body, Assembly and Senate, that's
9	going to determine who heads up this, quote,
10	unquote, nonpartisan legislative budget
11	office.
12	Thank you very much, Mr. President.
13	ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON:
14	Thank you, Senator Fuschillo.
15	Senator Krueger.
16	SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you
17	so much.
18	My colleagues, based on the
19	concerns raised by Senator Fuschillo about
20	lack of detail in the draft of this bill, I
21	would like to withdraw it for chapter
22	amendments myself. Thank you.
23	ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON:
