It's my very unfortunate circumstance today to get up and talk about a young man from my hometown who graduated from the same high school that I graduated from many years ago, Tim Serwinowski. Tim graduated from North Tonawanda High School just three years ago. He was 21 years old. He joined the Marine Corps because he said he wanted to be with the best.

He came home just before his deployment to Afghanistan, and he went back to his high school and he talked to his teachers.

And in the North Tonawanda High School, in the library, they've put up the pictures of all of the former students who are serving in the armed forces. And he was very surprised and I think very proud of the fact that his younger sister, who will be graduating this Sunday from NT, his younger sister had brought in his photograph and his photograph was hanging up there on the wall, a wall that he walked by so many times when he was a student at North Tonawanda.

Tim felt it was important, it was important for people to step up and to do their part in the war against terror.

Tim is survived by his mom and dad, by several siblings. And I rise today, Madam President, to ask my colleagues to honor his service and his sacrifice. Today is Thursday. And Tim was killed by a sniper in Afghanistan just last Sunday. And his funeral is going to be held on Saturday back in North Tonawanda, a community that is so proud of his service, so proud of his sacrifice. A young man whose life was cut short by a sniper at such a very young age, who had so much promise, but who for the next several generations people in our great community will look up to.

We certainly offer our condolences to his mom, his dad, all of his brothers and sisters. But at the same time, we thank them for giving us Tim, for giving us a young man who wanted to do his duty for his country and his community.

13	explanation of the bill first?
14	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
15	Squadron, an explanation has been requested by
16	Senator Golden.
17	SENATOR SQUADRON: Absolutely.
18	This bill is a departmental put
19	forward by the State Liquor Authority. And
20	what it does is it makes it a whole lot easier
21	to define some things that are currently in
22	the Alcoholic Beverage Control Law,
23	particularly when an establishment has become
24	a focal point of police activity or has become
25	a focal point for noise, disturbance,

misconduct or other disorders.

Currently it's a very difficult standard. It's unclear exactly what it means. And in some cases it's been very, very difficult to pursue the specific focal points, the places that really do have problems, and leave the others aside.

What this bill would do is it would be very clear that if you have six police complaints within a 60-day period that are received by the local police force and forwarded to the State Liquor Authority, that would give the State Liquor Authority cause to pursue revocation of the license.

Any fraudulent complaints wouldn't count. Any complaints that were inaccurate or had errors wouldn't count. It would be a clear standards that the sorts of complaints that the police department feels are worth forwarding to the Liquor Authority would then give the Liquor Authority the right and the ability to pursue a revocation.

Right now, in fact, the incentive is too often, if you have some problematic patrons, is to push them out onto the sidewalk

a couple of feet from your storefront, because 1 2 it's very, very hard to then connect that to the knowledge of the licensee or someone with 3 4 managerial authority. And that's bad for 5 communities, it's bad for the Liquor Authority, it's bad for the good bar and 6 7 restaurant providers who are trying to do 8 things the right way. 9 This clear standard is an important 10 part of giving the State Liquor Authority the 11 ability it needs to separate the good 12 operators from the bad ones. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 14 Golden, would you like Senator Squadron to 15 yield? SENATOR GOLDEN: Yes, Madam 16 President, if he would, please. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Squadron? 19 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes, Madam 21 President. 22 SENATOR GOLDEN: Senator --23 through you, Madam President -- who would determine what was fraudulent, what's not 24 25 fraudulent in a complaint?

1	SENATOR SQUADRON: Well, the bill
2	defines clear and compelling evidence of
3	fraudulent intent on the part of the
4	complainant. Presumably the police
5	department well, certainly the police
6	department has the authority to make that
7	assessment, since they are the ones who are
8	forwarding the complaints to the Liquor
9	Authority. They're under no obligation
10	except in very rare cases, very, very serious
11	crimes, are they under any obligation to
12	forward the complaint to the Liquor Authority.
13	So the first answer to your
14	question is the police department. The second
15	answer is the Liquor Authority would have the
16	ability to make the determination. And the
17	third is that the establishment would have
18	that as a potential defense in the event that
19	they did end up in a revocation proceeding.
20	SENATOR GOLDEN: Thank you.
21	Through you, Madam President, if
22	the sponsor will continue to yield.
23	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
24	Squadron, do you continue to yield?
25	SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 1 2 Squadron yields. 3 SENATOR GOLDEN: In a community 4 board situation when the police department are 5 brought in and they do their quarterly or monthly assessments at the community boards 6 7 and the question's asked that they responded 8 to one of the local taverns and they've responded to, say, one tavern 15 times, that 9 10 would not be considered a -- one of those exceeding the number six, there would have to 11 actually be a complaint made that there was a 12 noise complaint or a fight at that location? 13 14 SENATOR SOUADRON: Through you, 15 Madam President, I'm having a little trouble understanding the question. 16 Fifteen calls -- again, these are 17 18 complaints sent by the police department to 19 the Liquor Authority. So if the police 20 department has 15 complaints to send to the Liquor Authority within that 60-day period, 21 22 that seems to me to be significantly more than 23 six. 24 SENATOR GOLDEN: Madam President, 25 if the sponsor would yield for another

question. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 3 Squadron, will you continue to yield? 4 SENATOR SQUADRON: Absolutely. 5 And just to clarify on the previous question, it's the sixth incident reported to 6 7 the Authority, is the language in the law. 8 I will yield to another question. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 10 Squadron yields. SENATOR GOLDEN: And who would do 11 12 the reporting? The complainant in the situation, such as a noise complaint, the 13 14 police department responds, he gets to the 15 location, they don't have the -- what do you call it, the decibel machine to study how loud 16 the premises -- who makes the determination on 17 18 noise? Do they actually need the decibel reader to be able to make that determination? 19 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, Madam President. On the very narrow question 21 22 of noise, as I'm sure Senator Golden knows, within the City of New York there are pretty 23 specific requirements in terms of when you 24 25 have a noise complaint having to do with our

local environmental protection agency. 1 2 So I'm sure in the case of the City 3 of New York, on the narrow question of noise, that would continue to hold and be unaffected 4 5 by this bill. As I said before, the reporting 6 7 authority is not the complainant, it's the 8 local law enforcement agency would do the reporting to the Liquor Authority. And they 9 10 would do it -- and again, in the bill here, in Line 6, if you're following along with me, the 11 12 sixth incident reported to the Authority by a law enforcement agency of noise or disturbance 13 or misconduct or disorder on or about the 14 15 licensed premises or related to the operation of the premises or the conduct of its patrons. 16 So in terms of sort of the broader 17 18 question that I think Senator Golden may be getting at, I don't think a noise meter would 19 be required for that broader definition. 20 SENATOR GOLDEN: 21 Okay. Thank 22 you, Madam President. On the bill. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Golden, on the bill. 24

I believe this

SENATOR GOLDEN:

commissioner is doing an outstanding job in trying to clear the backlog in the SLA and trying to move the process, and I think he's done a significant job at doing that. And I think he has been a good commissioner.

I just think that six complaints in 60 days I think is just unreasonable in certain neighborhoods where you have a series of locations on a given block or in Manhattan in a given row. The reason we put the laws in, the 250 feet, the 300-feet rule, is because of the number of bars that exist within a community. And with two or three or four on a block, they cause significant problems.

I believe that this is giving too much power to the State Liquor Authority. And I believe even though this individual that we have today, the commissioner, is doing a great job, I don't know what the commissioner that will follow him will be doing and how good and effective that individual will be.

So I will be voting no on this bill.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator

Golden will be recorded in the negative.

Senator Robach.

SENATOR ROBACH: I had one quick question, because this is really going to predicate my entire vote, I'll let you know up front. I'm not sure I got, from the questions back and forth, if I got the answer I'm looking for.

Would these six complaints -- I heard you use different words. Would this be founded complaints by some process or would this just be on the complaints and someone would be presumed guilty just by the six complaints, or in violation?

Because, you know, and I'll tell
you my concern, you know, this happens all the
time. There are, you know, places where
people move into a neighborhood, get a
reasonably good deal on a property or whatnot,
and then act like the facility or the place
that may play music even legally in the time
frame -- and their city permit in the City of
Rochester entertainment district, that then
say, you know, "We don't like the music."
They may call every day of the week. That

would give, if one person did that, that would be six complaints.

Now, if those complaints are founded and someone is in violation, they should accept the penalty. But if it's only predicated on complaints, then I think I have to vote no. Because that would almost be an incentive for even another competitor or businessperson to make the complaint if they knew that was the environment.

So it's very, very important to me that I clearly understand, before I vote, if this is based on complaints or on some finding and some process that someone is in violation of some portion of the liquor law or other very important code violations.

SENATOR SQUADRON: I'd be happy to yield for a question, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Thank you, Senator Squadron.

SENATOR SQUADRON: In response to Senator Robach, it's actually not a complaint at all that is the governing principle. It is upon the sixth incident reported to the Authority by a law enforcement agency. So it

is an incident report from the local law enforcement agency to the Liquor Authority.

SENATOR ROBACH: Okay. So there is no -- when you say "incident," that means there's no part of that process, there's no dialogue of yes, this is what was purported, but this isn't what -- there's no give-and-take portion or defense time for that business.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you,

Madam President. The law enforcement agency
is under no obligation to report a call or an
issue to the Liquor Authority.

The law enforcement -- this does empower law enforcement, which I know that I have colleagues who are significant supporters of law enforcement. This empowers law enforcement to make the determination that an incident, an incident report is worth forwarding to the Liquor Authority.

The number of incidents, by the way, the types of incidents that they're required to send to the Liquor Authority are -- it's a relatively small list:

Gambling, illicit drugs, prostitution. And

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violent crimes, weapons possession.

Please correct me if I'm wrong. 4 You said under this particular proposal it 5 would be easier to define a whole lot of activities that are currently difficult to 6 7 define. Is that correct? 8 SENATOR SQUADRON: I'm sorry, 9 would Senator Saland mind repeating the 10 question? ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 11 Senator 12 Saland, could you please repeat the question. 13 SENATOR SALAND: Certainly. I 14 believe when you were asked to explain the 15 bill you said that under this particular bill it would be easier to define a whole lot of 16 activities which are currently difficult to 17 18 define. Is that correct? SENATOR SQUADRON: 19 Through you, 20 Madam President, I may have said that. And if I did, I misspoke. 21 It would be easier to define 22 whether an establishment is a focal point of 23 24 police activity that engages in -- that leads 25 to these negative effects on the community and

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potentially engages in illegal activity.
SENATOR SALAND: If the Senator
will continue to yield.
ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
Squadron, do you continue to yield?
SENATOR SQUADRON: I'd be happy
to.
ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
Squadron yields.
SENATOR SALAND: Senator, I also
believe that you said any fraudulent
complaints or inaccurate complaints wouldn't
count. Am I correct?
SENATOR SQUADRON: I believe I
did say that, Madam President.
SENATOR SALAND: And if the
Senator will continue to yield.
ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
Squadron, do you continue to yield?
SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes.
SENATOR SALAND: And here I'm a
little fuzzy, so please help me.
I believe initially you said, in
response to a question by Senator Golden, that
the police department would determine, in

essence, the complaint. And then you went on 1 2 to say the Liquor Authority, and then you 3 named a third category. And I'm not quite 4 sure what that third category was. Could you 5 tell me? 6 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, 7 Madam President. The police department, as 8 I've said, in the vast majority of sorts of 9 incidents where there would be any question 10 can choose whether to forward the complaint to the Liquor Authority. The Liquor Authority 11 12 then is able to, they're not required, to bring a revocation proceeding. 13 And then I believe my best 14 15 recollection was that the third category was the one that Senator Saland asked about 16 previously, the fraudulent standard and the 17 18 inaccurate standard. SENATOR SALAND: If the Senator 19 20 would continue to yield. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 21 Senator Squadron, do you continue to yield? 22 23 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 24 Senator 25 Squadron yields.

Could you tell 1 SENATOR SALAND: 2 us the standard of evidence that might be used 3 or would be used in making the determination 4 as to whether in fact the complaints warranted 5 proceeding? 6 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, 7 Madam President, the standard by which the 8 Liquor Authority -- to clarify, the standard 9 by which the Liquor Authority would pursue a 10 revocation proceeding against an establishment? Is that the standard that 11 12 Senator Saland is asking about? SENATOR SALAND: 13 Through you, 14 Madam President. I will ask you by what 15 standard would the police determine whether or not to pursue the complaint or forward the 16 complaint to the SLA. 17 18 And, secondly, were the complaints forwarded and six of them to be received 19 20 within this 60-day period, what would be the means by which or the standard of evidence 21 that the SLA would use to determine whether or 22 not in fact there was cause? 23 24 SENATOR SQUADRON: To that single 25 two-part question -- and just a correction,

it's not complaint -- and I know I did use 1 2 that phrase, I just want to clarify -- it's incident. And there's a significant 3 4 difference, as I appreciate some of my 5 colleagues have helped us tease out today. The standard by which the police or 6 7 law enforcement, local or otherwise, would 8 send an incident to the Liquor Authority would 9 be, as I said, at their discretion. Except 10 for, again, a small and highly significant 11 list of very serious crimes. So I guess that standard would be one of law enforcement 12 discretion. 13 And the standard by which the 14 15 Liquor Authority would decide whether or not to bring a revocation proceeding would be 16 exactly as it is today. As you may know, this 17 18 is a new subdivision 4 in Section 118 of the Alcoholic Beverage Control Law, which is 19 20 revocation of license for cause. So the existing standard. 21 And that's here. 22 SENATOR SALAND: And please correct me if I'm wrong. 23 Senator will continue to yield. 24

Senator

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO:

Squadron? 1 2 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. 3 SENATOR SALAND: Would that be, 4 in effect, a mere preponderance of the 5 credible evidence? I believe it would be, 6 but, you know, I'm . . . 7 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, 8 Madam President, I think I'm going to have to defer to Senator Saland on this one again. 9 10 just want to clarify we're talking about existing law and the existing standard, we're 11 12 not talking about a changed standard. SENATOR SALAND: 13 Correct. Ι 14 realize --15 SENATOR SQUADRON: And it sounds to me like Senator Saland is familiar with the 16 current standard, and so I'll stipulate that 17 18 he is. 19 SENATOR SALAND: So as I look at 20 this new subsection 4, which parallels the language in the existing subsection 3 which 21 defines "cause," it says that there are a host 22 of things -- sustain a continuing pattern of 23 noise, disturbance, misconduct, disorder on or 24 25 about the licensed premises.

1	Some of these things are not
2	readily defined and really I have to believe
3	would amount to judgment calls on the part of
4	the police officer, would they not?
5	SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you,
6	Madam President. I believe subsection 3
7	actually references the powers and the
8	decisions of the State Liquor Authority, not
9	of the law enforcement. And in terms of that
10	judgment, that's one that's long established.
11	There's enormous case law about this law
12	that this bill that we're discussing today
13	is largely based on clarifying or correcting
14	where some of that case law has led.
15	SENATOR SALAND: Thank you,
16	Senator.
17	If the Senator would continue to
18	yield.
19	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
20	Squadron, do you continue to yield?
21	SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes.
22	SENATOR SALAND: I do understand
23	that part of it. But what you said was that
24	the police were going to be part of
25	determining what comes through the truth

filter, what is it that actually gets to the SLA.

And my question, then, is as the police attempt to determine these different classifications -- sustain a continued pattern of noise, disturbance, misconduct, or disorder -- there are going to be judgments that the police are going to have to make that aren't necessarily laid out hard and cold in a very easy pattern to follow. Is that correct?

SENATOR SQUADRON: Just to clarify it, I believe Senator Saland is now talking about the role of law enforcement in forwarding an incident report to the Liquor Authority in the proposed subsection 4 that we're discussing.

SENATOR SALAND: Correct. Your bill says that it will be presumed, upon the sixth incidence reported to the Authority by a law enforcement agency. And that's what I'm focusing on.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Right. And yes, I believe the law enforcement agency is given here some guidance on what sorts of incidents to forward to the Liquor Authority.

If the Senator 1 SENATOR SALAND: 2 will continue to yield. 3 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 4 Squadron, will you continue to yield? 5 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 6 The 7 Senator yields. 8 SENATOR SALAND: You go on to say, in the last few lines of your bill, that 9 10 "absent clear and convincing evidence of either fraudulent intent on the part of any 11 12 complainant or a factual error relied upon by the Authority." 13 Clear and convincing evidence is 14 15 certainly a standard that's higher than a mere preponderance of the evidence. And while it 16 is a higher standard, certainly when you have 17 18 a he said/she said situation, probably in each and every instance it's going to be extremely 19 difficult to establish clear and convincing 20 evidence. 21 And if, for example, with regard 22 particularly to the question of fact, if you 23 have an individual who allegedly was guilty of 24 25 being disorderly or engaging in misconduct and he maintains, "No, I wasn't there, I was at my apartment," and he is alleged to have in fact been a perpetrator of something that occurred that caused the misconduct, he has to prove it by clear and convincing evidence.

So if he says "I was in my apartment and I was there all night," and he doesn't have somebody in his apartment to document that he was there, then it's not clear and convincing evidence and the establishment winds up having to suffer because of that clear and convincing evidence standard.

Would it not be fairer to merely stick with the mere preponderance level?

Because effectively, you've raised the bar and made it extremely difficult for an establishment, particularly when third parties are responsible for the complaint, to defend themselves.

SENATOR SQUADRON: I understand
Senator Saland's concern, but I actually -- I
would take the conclusion to a different
place. The clear and compelling evidence of
fraudulent intent relates simply to whether

each or any of these six incidents that are forwarded along by law enforcement within a 60-day period are able to be used in a calculation of cause.

Which then takes us back to the existing subsection 3. Which, as you know, has under current law and would continue to have, if this bill becomes law, a standard of, you know, include the existence of a sustained, continued pattern of noise, disturbance, misconduct, disorder on or about the licensed premises.

So the standard by which any one of the six incidents is invalidated in terms of crossing the threshold to start considering whether or not to bring a proceeding, as you would under current law, is a little bit higher.

I don't believe that that actually makes the establishment -- the standard of defense for an establishment higher than it is today. It does mean that there's a higher standard to throw any of these six out once law enforcement has chosen to forward them along to the Liquor Authority.

Thank you, 1 SENATOR SALAND: 2 Senator Squadron. 3 On the bill, Madam President. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 5 Saland, on the bill. SENATOR SALAND: Madam President, 6 7 notwithstanding Senator Squadron's comments 8 with regard to the clear and convincing standard with the defense, clearly, by the 9 10 rules of construction, clear and convincing precedes both the fraudulent intent section 11 12 and the factual error section, separated by an "or." 13 If in fact the factual error is 14 15 merely one of a mere preponderance of the evidence, then it should be placed -- and I 16 hate to be too lawyerlike -- before the use of 17 18 the clear and convincing standard. 19 This really puts a number of 20 licensees at risk for events that may well be 21 beyond their control. It does set up the 22 opportunity, almost like a spite fence 23 situation, where someone can make repeated phone calls alleging some type of misconduct. 24 25 To the extent that the law enforcement

authority chooses to report them, they 1 certainly are doing what they're lawfully 2 3 obligated to do. But then to make it difficult for 4 5 the entity to defend themselves through the use of this clear and convincing standard is, 6 7 I think, a bit over the top and very 8 burdensome and could wind up with any number of licensees being punished due to their 9 10 inability to establish that higher evidentiary standard. 11 12 I would suggest that the bill certainly is well intended and certainly 13 should be in some form -- but not necessarily 14

certainly is well intended and certainly should be in some form -- but not necessarily this form -- used as a tool to deal with those hot spots that do cause problems in communities. But I think this bill needs a bit more work, notwithstanding the fact that it's at the request of the State Liquor Authority. And I would certainly intend to be voting in the negative, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Saland will be recorded in the negative.

Senator Lanza.

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SENATOR LANZA: Thank you, Madam

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1 SENATOR LANZA: -- in restaurants 2 and the like? 3 Senator Squadron, as has been said 4 here, we understand the intention here. And I 5 do believe that it's laudable. The question, though, turns on the distinction between those 6 7 who are truly committing violations and 8 creating a public nuisance as opposed to 9 frivolous accusations. And you've said a number of times that this is about incidents 10 and not complaints. 11 12 And my question is -- or my understanding, I should say, is isn't every 13 14 incident borne by a complaint? For instance, 15 I know in New York City, if a complaint is made by anyone about an establishment and the 16 police respond, whether or not they've made a 17 18 finding of fault or not, an incident report is created. Isn't that the case? 19 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, 21 Madam President, yes. 22 SENATOR LANZA: Would Senator 23 Squadron continue to yield. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 24 Senator 25 Squadron, do you continue to yield?

1 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 3 Squadron yields. 4 SENATOR LANZA: And so as Senator 5 Saland discussed, the due process protections that presently exist would perhaps fly out the 6 7 window here, because in the absence of this 8 being a finding -- let me present the question 9 this way. 10 If your intent is to target the violators, why not stick with a finding 11 12 standard as opposed to an incident, which really is nothing more than a complaint 13 standard? 14 15 SENATOR SQUADRON: First, just a point of clarification. It is not an incident 16 standard. It is an incident reported by law 17 18 enforcement standard. 19 So I said yes, quite simply, to the 20 question about in what cases incident reports are made up. We can't -- it would be a 21 22 mistake for us to then suggest that all incident reports will get forwarded by law 23 enforcement to the Liquor Authority. 24 25 SENATOR LANZA: Would Senator

Squadron continue to yield. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 3 Squadron, do you continue to yield? 4 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Squadron yields. 6 7 SENATOR LANZA: Senator Squadron, 8 there's nothing in this legislation that would prevent law enforcement from forwarding every 9 10 single incident report that they receive; is that correct? 11 12 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, Madam President, that is correct. 13 But then, again, I would caution 14 15 Senator Lanza and my colleagues from, from that fact, making the further leap that the 16 simple fact of incidents, six within 60 days 17 18 being forwarded to the State Liquor Authority, would lead to a revocation proceeding. 19 Ιt 20 wouldn't. In fact, the entire bill we're 21 22 discussing today does two things. It empowers locale law enforcement, and it clearly defines 23 or more clearly defines the words "for cause" 24 25 in existing law.

SENATOR LANZA: Would Senator 1 2 Squadron continue to yield. 3 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 5 Squadron yields. SENATOR LANZA: 6 Thank you. 7 You know, the problem that we're 8 having here is let's suppose -- you know, and everyone has different sensitivities. 9 Some 10 people can tolerate more than others. For 11 some, just hearing people congregating near a 12 restaurant or the catering hall might be enough to prompt a complaint. It might not be 13 14 fraudulent, it might not be maliciously 15 intended, it might just be that that person is offended by people congregating and making 16 some noise. 17 18 Under those circumstances -- and sometimes, as we know in communities, 19 20 sometimes people decide that they just don't like the fact that there's a restaurant down 21 22 the block or a bar on the corner or a catering hall near where they live. What's to prevent 23 someone from placing complaints, which then 24 25 lead to incident reports, and the police

department just wanting -- because these are difficult situations in communities, and leading to the police department, quite frankly, just wanting to wash their hands of the situation and decide to just forward every single complaint that they have about an establishment without establishing whether or not there's a finding of fault or not to the Liquor Authority to let them deal with it.

Under that circumstance, wouldn't it then require the SLA to revoke the license?

SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you,

Madam President, no, it wouldn't.

I would also -- Senator Lanza did ask as part of that, what would prevent that.

I mean, some of the steps along that way would be prevented by the good judgment of local law enforcement, among other things.

But to get to the conclusion where Senator Lanza was, and to say again, no, the Liquor Authority would not -- this is very important, the Liquor Authority would not be required -- I'll say it again, the Liquor Authority would not be required to revoke a license in the case that Senator Lanza

described in which we can't trust the good judgment of local law enforcement.

In fact, if you look at existing law, if you look at Section 118 of the ABC Law, revocation of license for cause:

"Any license or permit issued pursuant to this chapter may" -- I'm going to repeat that, although it's only listed in the law once -
"may be revoked, cancelled, suspended and/or subjected to the imposition of a civil penalty for cause, and must be revoked for the following causes."

Now, the following causes are not in the bill under discussion. They're very serious issues, as we've talked about before.

Then I'm going to take you into subsection 2 of Section 118: "Notwithstanding the issuance of a license or permit by way of renewal, the Liquor Authority may" -- again, I'm going to repeat "may", though it's not in the law -- "may revoke, cancel or suspend such license or permit and/or may impose a civil penalty against any holder of such license or permit."

So that's a long way of saying no.

1	SENATOR LANZA: Would Senator
2	Squadron continue to yield.
3	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
4	Squadron, do you continue to yield?

22	Alesi.
23	SENATOR ALESI: Thank you,
24	Madam President. Would Senator Squadron yield
25	for just a couple of questions?

10	you contacted directly by the SLA with this
11	request, or did you craft the legislation
12	yourself?
13	SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you,
14	Madam President, this is a departmental
15	pass-down by the SLA. And on which I worked
16	with them.
17	SENATOR ALESI: If you'll
18	continue to yield, then.
19	So working with them and through
20	them, answering their request to solve a
21	problem that persists primarily where?
22	SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you,
23	Madam President, I was quite pleased I work
24	with the SLA quite frequently, because in some
25	parts of my district I do have an absolute

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profusion of bars and restaurants that create 1 2 an incredible burden for some of my 3 constituents -- and in fact, I would argue, 4 and many of the local businesses in my 5 district would too, also create an incredible burden for those law-abiding establishments 6 7 that happen to find themselves in an 8 incredibly dense area with a justifiably, incredibly frustrated set of residents. 9 10 And it's very, very hard sometimes for the Liquor Authority, for local law 11 12 enforcement under current law to separate the wheat from the chaff, as it were. 13 14 So in terms of my personal 15 experience, to answer your question, I would say my district. 16 SENATOR ALESI: 17 Thank you. With 18 regard to those law-abiding establishments that you were talking about -- Madam 19 20 President, would the Senator continue to 21 yield? 22 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The 24 Senator yields. 25 SENATOR ALESI: Senator, I am

assuming that maybe there's a string of 1 2 establishments around, let's say, a very 3 condensed neighborhood in more of a highly 4 populated, vertically populated, dense area. 5 But it could be anywhere. It could be any place where there might be good operators and 6 7 bad operators, and that could apply in a rural 8 setting or an urban setting. 9 Would that be true? 10 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, Madam President, this law would apply 11 12 statewide, yes. SENATOR ALESI: 13 Thank you. Would 14 the Senator continue to yield. 15 SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 16 Senator Squadron yields. 17 18 SENATOR ALESI: Thank you, Senator. 19 20 So in a circumstance where you have 21 someone who complains because of a continuing and persistent problem, either with the 22 operation of the business or the conduct of 23 24 the patrons, who would be most likely person 25 or group, in your opinion or in the SLA's

1	opinion, to call the police and complain?
2	SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you,
3	Madam President, I'm not entirely sure I
4	understand the question. I certainly can't
5	speak for the SLA.
6	In the case of an incident, I would
7	assume someone who is either a victim of the
8	incident or is witnessing the incident.
9	SENATOR ALESI: Thank you,
10	Senator.
11	Madam President, will the Senator
12	continue to yield?
13	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
14	Squadron, do you continue to yield?
15	SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes.
16	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The
17	Senator yields.
18	SENATOR ALESI: So again, with
19	regard to operators that as you describe are
20	good operators, or those that are law-abiding
21	and conforming and all the rest of that, is it
22	conceivable to you or to the SLA that the one
23	calling the police might be one of those good
24	operators?
25	Because it has nothing to do with

the operation of the business and everything to do with the conduct of its patrons, who very well might have been drinking or partying somewhere else as a weekly baseball team or a biking group or some other group and have gotten themselves into a rowdy situation and systematically move on to another operation, and the one calling the police for the help is the actual owner of one of those good operations that you're concerned about.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you,
Madam President. As the former owner of a
liquor license and an establishment, I am all
too familiar with the risks of competitors or
bad operators trying to do all sorts of bad
things to other establishments. So yes, that
is conceivable to me.

I would also say, though, that under the ABC Law, proprietors are responsible for the good conduct of those who they're serving and who they have served, in fact. So that's a standard that exists, again, under current law and an entire section of the ABC Law.

And then, again, I would point you

1	again to this nagging "fraudulent intent on
2	the part of the complainant" phrase in the
3	proposed bill.
4	SENATOR ALESI: Will the Senator
5	continue to yield.
6	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
7	Squadron, do you continue to yield?
8	SENATOR SQUADRON: Yes.
9	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: The
10	Senator yields.
11	SENATOR ALESI: Thank you,
12	Senator. You made the point that those
13	operators are responsible for the good conduct
14	of their patrons. And through you, Madam
15	President, Senator Squadron, wouldn't you
16	agree that part of that responsibility would
17	be to call the police if patrons were
18	misbehaving to a level that it was annoying or
19	unsafe not only to the premises and the
20	operation of the business but also to some of
21	the other patrons that are there that are not
22	misbehaving?
23	Wouldn't the act of the owner
24	himself or herself calling the police be one
25	of those responsible acts that they're

required to do in the operation of their 1 2 business? 3 SENATOR SQUADRON: Through you, 4 Madam President, I actually have to admit it's 5 been a number of years and I don't recall if that's an affirmative obligation of the owner 6 to actually call law enforcement. 7 8 Certainly, as I said before, the condition of the premises and of folks who 9 10 have been served by you are your 11 responsibility. We can try to get 12 qualification on whether that affirmative obligation exists for the license holder. 13 SENATOR ALESI: 14 Perfect. 15 you, Senator. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 16 Senator 17 Alesi, on the bill. 18 SENATOR ALESI: The point, to be clear, is that there maybe an occasion or a 19 20 continuing set of circumstances -- and I can just use an example where a softball team or 21 22 biking group or some other group comes 23 regularly to a neighboring establishment, does their drinking, gets intoxicated, and then 24 25 moves on to another one, maybe just to get

something to eat.

But they're in a situation where they're intoxicated, where they're rowdy, where they're detrimental to the operation of a good, ongoing, well-managed, responsible operator. And that operator himself or herself finds themselves in a position on a regular basis of having to call the police, and maybe six times or seven times or eight times or 10 times in the course of 60 days.

And because of that, under this law -- because it doesn't say "the continuing operation and the behavior of its patrons," it says "or the behavior of its patrons." Simply by acting responsibly and trying to preserve the business that you've worked so hard for, to maintain a good reputation, that you put your life savings into, maybe, by calling the police you're actually, under this law, creating a situation with the State Liquor Authority that you absolutely would not want to.

And so the unintended consequences could be very detrimental to the business, number one. And number two, it might even put

some good operators in a situation where 1 2 they'd be reluctant to call the police. 3 Thank you, Senator Squadron. Thank 4 you, Madam President. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 6 Squadron. 7 SENATOR SQUADRON: A point of 8 clarification on Senator Alesi's comments on 9 the bill. 10 It sounds to me -- and I just want 11 to point Senator Alesi to existing law. 12 Senator Alesi is concerned about the existing subsection 3 of Section 118 of the ABC Law, 13 14 which is the responsibility -- which is the 15 fact that a license can be revoked for cause for a sustained and continuing pattern of 16 noise, disturbance, misconduct or disorder on 17 18 or about the licensed premises. With or without this bill, that's 19 20 an existing responsibility, that's an existing potential cause for revocation, unchanged by 21 It sounds like Senator Alesi may want 22 23 to review the next section. SENATOR ALESI: Madam President, 24 25 if I nay respond to that, I can tell you this,

first and foremost, through my own experience, that I know of an establishment which is a licensed cigar-smoking establishment, and the only reason in many cases people come to that is because after they've been out drinking and partying and doing everything they want to do all night, it's the one place they can go legally to smoke. And they bring their problems with them.

And so I can tell you, under those circumstances, that on a couple of occasions if the proprietor has felt it necessary to call the police, under this law the way it's written right now, that operator or other operators in those circumstances would be bringing down a difficult situation on themselves for doing the right thing and for acting responsibly.

So again, I thank the Senator for his efforts. But I can tell you that under these circumstances, it could create difficulty for honest and legitimate operators.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator DeFrancisco.

SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: On the bill. I don't have any further questions of Senator Squadron. I just want to point out a couple of things here that are, I think, very important.

Normally in this society when you're accused of something, the burden is on the person who's doing the accusing. And I think that's what our whole criminal justice system is based on. And I would think most people think that makes a pretty good idea.

And the standard under existing law for the ABC Board is that if there is this persistent pattern of noise, disturbance, et cetera, that's a cause, if proven, just slightly tipping the scales in your favor, preponderance of the evidence. Just slightly tipping the scales in your favor as a complainant. The board can revoke your business license, the board can go forward and issue various fines and so forth. But the system is it's not that hard to prove the preponderance of the evidence. But there's complaints, and somebody's got to prove that.

What this bill does is put

everything on its head. On six incident reports -- and I don't know how things are done in New York City, but I'm sure they're done properly in Staten Island, because Senator Lanza brought this up. The police, if they're getting complaints about a bar or a restaurant, are going to file the incident reports. They're not going to be subjecting themselves to harassment from somebody in the community because they won't even investigate and file a report. That's a report. That's not a finding, that's an incident report.

Under this bill, if there's six reports -- six reports, six complaints that are on a police paper, an incident report -- that are brought to the attention of the SLA, you're presumed, as a bar owner or restaurant owner, to have violated the law. And the only way you can try to disprove that -- you're presumed. You disprove it, you've got to prove by clear and convincing evidence that what was complained about was either fraudulent, somebody did it fraudulently, or there was a factual error.

I never heard of a legal standard

of a factual error. It's either factual or it's not factual. And I know our newest Attorney General clearly understands these burdens of proof. And while he's sitting next to the sponsor, he might want to explain them to him. Because this puts everything on its head.

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And if you don't think that competing bars call other bars and complain about them, I can tell you many incidents in the Syracuse area. And there are very sensitive people, as Senator Lanza said, who would rather not have the restaurant there or the bar there. If they know they have this law where it's presumed if they make these calls and their friends make six of these calls and the police come six times, that the proof has been done and the bar has to prove this incredible standard of clear and convincing evidence, disprove that they did anything wrong -- I just can't believe it. just can't believe that this is what the sponsor could possibly want. I can't believe that you want to flip the jurisprudence of this state on its head.

Now, let me give you an example of how you can handle this. Very simply, if the SLA really wants this bill or wants to do -- you know, the problem with the board has been, for my understanding, is complaints are sent in and they don't do a darn thing. They don't investigate them, they don't have the hearing.

Well, why don't you just require that the SLA do the job under the existing law? And if they do the job under the existing law, they don't need any more powers. They just have to prove their case by the preponderance of the evidence.

The problem isn't that it's not easy enough to prove their cases, the problem is they either don't have enough manpower or they don't investigate these to have enough hearings to get rid of the bad bar owners and restaurant owners. Because you don't want to lose the good ones. And Senator Alesi had some great points concerning this, that in many cases you're protecting your business by calling the police yourself.

So I would hope -- I mean, I know Senator Squadron has the pride of authorship

here. But maybe, maybe, with the consultation of the other lawyers or lawyers that are on the Democrat conference -- because I'm not so sure he'll listen to me -- to just go through this with him, sit down and make sure he understands what he's doing. Because this is a very, very bad law that sets the jurisprudence of this state on its head.

And for those who claim to want to protect the rights of the individual, the accused -- and many, many bills come up here every week about how to make the standard better for the accused and those who are convicted -- you are putting the accused on the defensive having to prove that the person, the accused, is not guilty by clear and convincing evidence.

So I would hope that Senator

Squadron would lay this bill aside, get some

advice from somebody who understands the way

the legal system works, and modify the bill so

that --

SENATOR SQUADRON: Point of order, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO:

Senator Squadron --1 2 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: -- modify 3 the bill so it makes sense. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 5 Squadron, what's your point of --6 SENATOR SQUADRON: Point of 7 personal privilege. 8 I'm new here, as Senator DeFrancisco points out. I didn't know that 9 10 only those of us who are members of the bar were qualified to put forward bills that 11 12 change the law as legislators. So I just wanted clarification from Senator DeFrancisco 13 14 on that point. 15 Thank you. SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Well, if 16 17 Senator Squadron was listening, maybe this is 18 part of the problem in drafting the bill, that he doesn't clearly listen to what people are 19 20 saying. I didn't say that he's not 21 22 qualified. Anybody can put a bill in. 23 doesn't mean it's going to be a good bill. What I'm suggesting is that he get somebody 24 25 with some legal experience that understands

what the burdens of proof are, the preponderance of the evidence, the clear and convincing evidence, and who has the burden of proof. And what this is doing is flipping that burden of proof on its head.

And I'm only saying that he should get some advice from whether it's staff or whether the other attorneys. And if he thinks after that getting that advice that this bill makes sense, then certainly he should go forward. But I think he's making a huge mistake by doing this, because it's a very, very bad bill.

Thank you, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Are there any other Senators wishing to be heard on the bill?

Senator Schneiderman.

SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: Thank you, Madam President.

I want to commend Senator Squadron on a good law-and-order bill. I want to commend my colleagues that support this effort to deal with a very serious problem in our criminal justice system, which is, quite

frankly, bars and other establishments that serve as a focal point -- and that's a term of art in the law -- for all sorts of criminal misconduct.

I remember when I was representing community groups during the crack epidemic that very frequently the base for crack dealers were in bars. And it was almost impossible to get the State Liquor Authority to take action. It was a ponderous proceeding. I agree with some of Senator DeFrancisco's comments, although they're at odds with his conclusion, that it is very hard to get the SLA to act.

Part of the reason is that the current law, which Senator Squadron is seeking to correct, has this bizarre standard in it that requires the SLA to prove that no one in management knew what was going on. It's very, very -- or that someone in management did know what was going on. So you have to be able to prove that someone in a defined category of management knew what was happening.

This bill simply says there's no management exception. The SLA does not bear

the burden of proof of showing and proving 1 that someone in management knew about this. 2 And it provides for a different standard. 3 All this bill does, ladies and 4 5 gentlemen, is create a permissible punishment with a hearing, and with the due process that 6 7 is provided under SLA hearings, if there is a 8 sustained pattern of conduct, and it provides additional definition in the law as to what 9 10 that pattern is. And, I'm sorry, if you have six 11 12 police incident reports to the Authority within 60 days, that doesn't mean the SLA has 13 14 to act. If they saw that it was the same 15 crank calling in six times and no one else had ever called in, presumably they wouldn't act. 16 You get to have a hearing in which you can 17 18 challenge what they're doing --ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 19 20 Senator -- Senator DeFrancisco, why do you 21 rise? 22 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: I would ask if Senator Schneiderman would be willing to 23 24 answer some questions. 25 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator

Schneiderman, would you yield to Senator DeFrancisco?

SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: Through you, Madam President, I'd be happy to. Let me just finish this point. And then it's always a pleasure to engage with Senator DeFrancisco in a high level of legal dialogue.

This is a good bill, Madam

President. All it does is remove a ridiculous requirement -- impossible under the law, I hope you will concede, Senator -- to require the SLA to prove that someone in management knew what was going on is a much steeper burden. And the problem we face, certainly in my community, is not the SLA running amok and throwing all these bars out of business, it's the inability of communities plagued by crime and violence to get the SLA to take any action against establishments that tolerate that.

So let's be clear what we're doing.

We're removing an impediment to action to help

our law enforcement authorities. We are

making it a permissible punishment, with all

the due process already provided under law for

SLA hearings, if there are six incident

reports within 60 days. This does not require
the SLA to do anything, it does not remove
anyone's right to a hearing, it does not
remove anyone's right to submit any legal or
factual argument. This simply removes a
barrier to any action. And our communities
are suffering right now because of the bad
establishments that use this loophole to stay
in business longer than they should.

So I support this tough-on-crime law-and-order bill, as I've supported so many tough-on-crime, law-and-order bills in the Senate --

(Laughter.)

SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: -- more often when the majorities were reversed, I will admit. But I think this is something that is, you know, in the legal world I came out of in corporate law, you called a no-brainer.

Gentlemen, if you were as creative in the invention of possible violations of due process for people when we're considering the laws against poor people of color who commit street crimes, I think we would have a lot

1	more grounds for agreement.
2	I think this is a good bill,
3	Mr. President. And I would yield to Senator
4	DeFrancisco for a question. I see he's
5	getting legal advice as well.
6	(Laughter.)
7	SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: No, for the
8	record he made a comment that I don't want to
9	repeat on the floor. It had nothing to do
10	with advice.
11	Senator Schneiderman, you would be
12	willing to answer a question?
13	SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: Yes, I
14	would be willing to attempt to answer your
15	studious legal inquiry.
16	SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Well, okay.
17	The current Section 118 consists of three
18	paragraphs. And this is a totally new
19	paragraph. Do you see that? Number 4 is a
20	totally new paragraph to Section 118 of the
21	ABC board. Do you see that?
22	SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: I do not
23	now, but I'm sure I will soon.
24	This is a new paragraph
25	SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Correct.

1 SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: -- under 2 the provisions that provide that a license or 3 permit may be revoked or a civil penalty may 4 be imposed, yes. This is a new paragraph that 5 provides further definition to the provisions of paragraph 3 that provide for the possible 6 7 action by the SLA against an establishment for 8 the existence of a sustained and continued pattern of noise, disturbance, misconduct or 9

disorder on or about the licensed premises

or its patrons which adversely affects the

related to the operation of the premises -- so

not just people wandering by -- or the conduct

health, welfare and safety of the inhabitants

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of the area.

Again, Mr. President, a crank call is not something that justifies a finding that the health, welfare and safety of the inhabitants of the area are being threatened. This provision provides definition to the for-cause standard and what constitutes a pattern of noise, disturbance, misconduct or disorder.

SENATOR DeFRANCISCO:

answer is yes, this is a new section?

22	it's through you, Mr. President, the
23	problem is not that the owner or operator has
24	to know about it. The problem is that current
25	law, and this is case law, requires the SLA to

prove that someone knew. 1 2 And as you know as an experienced 3 trial attorney and widely respected legal 4 scholar, that it is very difficult, virtually 5 impossible to prove someone knew something. It's a very, very high standard. So this 6 7 corrects something that is in case law, not in 8 the statute. SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: 9 And, 10 Senator Schneiderman, would you answer another 11 question? 12 ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: Senator Schneiderman? 13 SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: 14 I would be 15 very happy to. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 The 17 Senator yields. 18 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Do you agree that this bill changes the burden of 19 20 proof? SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: 21 Through you, Mr. President, this bill, eliminates the 22 23 current interpretation of the law in the courts that does impose the burden of proof on 24 25 the SLA to prove that someone in management

knew about the misconduct before any action 1 2 could be taken against a bar -- no matter how 3 many complaints there are, no matter how many bad incidents of misconduct there are. 4 5 Yes, so in that sense it removes this burden of proof from the SLA and provides 6 7 for a more objective standard. But it is all 8 under the provisions of Section 118 that are permissible, Mr. President, that enable the 9 10 SLA to move forward with process, with a hearing, and, you know, do not require it to 11 12 do anything. SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: 13 And, 14 Senator Schneiderman, would you answer another 15 question? ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 16 Senator Schneiderman? 17 18 SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: If it's as good as the last one, I'd be happy to, 19 20 Mr. President. SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Well, I'd 21 22 better not say anything. 23 Senator Schneiderman, under 24 existing law, in order to show cause to take 25 some type of action against the restaurant,

you have to prove it by the preponderance of the evidence.

And secondly, under this bill, if there's six complaints or six incident reports, the existence of this continuous pattern of noise, disturbance, misconduct is presumed; is that correct?

SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: No.

SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: Oh, it's

not?

SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: You're confusing two sections of the law, through you, Mr. President.

The revocation of license for cause provision which is at the beginning of the Section 118, the standard there is not being changed. The standard of burden of proof in SLA proceedings and hearings and moving forward for cause is not changed. Everyone has the same due process rights they have now.

The only thing this does is remove a bad judicial interpretation of law that makes it hard for our citizens to bring complaints, it makes it hard for our law enforcement officers to take action, it makes

it hard to keep our streets safe for our children because it imposes on the SLA this ridiculously high standard that they have to come in and find an employee, identify them, who's in management as defined by the case law, and prove that that person knew.

And it removes that. And I would respectfully submit this is an unreasonable burden on a law enforcement agency seeking to protect the public health and welfare. All of the existing requirements of due process still apply.

And again, this requires that the pattern -- this change does not affect the requirement that this pattern of misconduct -- noise, disturbance, misconduct or disorder -- adversely affects the health, welfare, safety of the inhabitants of the area. That's a finding the SLA must make. I still think this is a very difficult case for the SLA to make. It just removes the most ridiculous requirement, but it is still a hard case to make.

I don't think you need to worry so much about the due process rights of people

who engage in a sustained and continuing 1 pattern of noise, disturbance, misconduct or 2 disorder that adversely affects -- not might 3 adversely affect, not could adversely 4 5 affect -- adversely affects the health, welfare and safety of the inhabitants of the 6 7 area. 8 In my district there are bars whose 9 pattern of misconduct adversely affects the 10 health, welfare and safety of the area, and it 11 is hard as can be to get the SLA to take 12 action because of the standard removed by Senator Squadron's excellent law-and-order 13 bill. 14 15 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: I forgot my question, but it was certainly a wonderful 16 17 campaign speech. 18 Would you suffer another question and possibly answer it in some brevity so that 19 20 people remember the question. ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY: 21 Senator Schneiderman? 22 23 SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN: Well, I'm

of noise, disturbance, misconduct -- is presumed, under this bill, after the sixth incident report and the way it's disproved is for the bar owner or restaurant owner to prove -- the only way he can disprove it is to prove by clear and convincing evidence of either fraudulent intent on the part of any complainant or a factual error. Isn't that what the bill says?

SENATOR SCHNEIDERMAN:

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Through

you, Mr. President. That is correct. But all that goes into is the determination that the SLA can find cause to proceed. When the SLA finds cause to proceed, all the due process standards that exist in law are in place.

And through you, Mr. President, if

And through you, Mr. President, if there's so much concern over people's right to a hearing and right to due process, I assume everyone on the other side of the aisle that has raised these issues fully supports our efforts to substantially increase funding for indigent defense services, because there are a lot of people who aren't getting fair hearings in this state, Mr. President. I don't think that many of them are bar owners.

And I hope that there's equal support for due process rights and legal rights and the right to a legal defense for everyone in this state, and not just people who have certain connections.

21 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: On the

22 bill.

ACTING PRESIDENT VALESKY:

Senator DeFrancisco, on the bill.

SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: You know,

that's -- this is the law-and-order person who wants indigent defendants to be able to get defense. But he's okay with the concept that you're presumed guilty because there's six incident reports, and to prove your innocence you've got to prove it by clear and convincing evidence.

And anybody that reads this bill knows that that's what this says, irrespective of Senator Schneiderman's great concern for the citizens of his district.

Secondly, as far as the law and order business about the irrelevant comments he made concerning the indigent defense, I think he was a sponsor of the bill that sealed records of drug dealers, three prior drug deals -- three prior drug deals -- that now school districts cannot possibly learn about because he's more concerned about the defendants who have been convicted of drug offenses.

So if you want to start the rhetoric, I'd be more than happy to participate.

All I ask people to do is read the

1	bill and see if it says what I say it says
2	rather than rely on case law that has nothing
	to do with this bill because the bill does not

4	deal with the case law that Senator
5	Schneiderman claims. And I would hope that

And these are people that go to work, that could have their rest and could have their dream without listening to those noises. And sometimes foul languages. Sometime foul languages, Madam President.

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Yes, Madam 11 SENATOR ROBACH: President, to explain my vote.

> I think everybody has the same goal. No one wants bad establishments. one wants people to break the law. the difference is we're going by what the bill says and what it will do, which makes this now an issue of due process, not whether anybody wants illegal bars or restaurants violating the law.

> I would suggest I would be more comfortable if it was three incidents but they were really founded and people had the opportunity to go through the process, rather than six complaints.

I'd go on, furthermore, maybe the 1 2 City of New York should do what the City of Rochester does, which in addition to the SLA 3 4 law, if these problems are occurring that 5 spill outside the establishment, there is a point system that goes to closing any 6 7 establishment, whether it's a bodega, a store, 8 selling to underage people, but it's based on founded information with a process of who's 9 10 really doing what. And that has always been and always 11 12 will be the best way to separate the lawbreakers from the law-abiders, in business, 13 in life and anything else. 14 15 And so for that reason, while I appreciate the intent, I feel very compelled 16 to vote no and I hope we'll revisit this 17 18 issue. I vote in the negative, Madam President. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Robach to be recorded in the negative. 21 Senator Winner, to explain his 22 23 vote. Thank you, Madam 24 SENATOR WINNER: 25 President, just briefly to explain my vote.

I listened to this debate and I also listened to our conversations that we had and our discussions in the committee, which unfortunately this bill was not reported from. For some reason this bill was yanked out of the committee process and not given the type of deliberation that I think it deserved.

Because while I understand the argument that Senator Schneiderman is making with regard to the case law, the issue of scienter is the only issue that needs to be dealt with in this legislation.

This legislation, if it dealt simply with the issue of knowledge and the issue of participation by employees of establishments, would be a far better bill, rather than setting up some convoluted six-incident system which is subject to litigation in the end as to whether or not it is factually accurate to a circumstance where anybody who -- the SLA, who relies upon this legislation in order to attempt to revoke a license, now will be in the position to have to go in and defend whether or not the fourth incident report was in fact factual or not,

rather than saying that the bar itself is a 1 bad bar and should be shut down because of the 2 fact that those types of disturbs have 3 4 occurred. 5 The fact of the matter is if you just dealt with the issue of knowledge and had 6 7 the SLA do its job, then you would have a much 8 better proposal that this convoluted 9 six-incident type of situation, which I think, 10 based upon our discussions in committee, was certainly a bad, bad way to go about this. 11 12 And so for those reasons, Madam President, I think that this legislation 13 should be defeated. 14 I vote no. 15 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Winner to be recorded in the negative. 16 I would ask all the members who 17 18 would like to be recorded in the negative to please raise your hand again so the Secretary 19 20 can get an accurate count. Senator Alesi, to explain his vote. 21 22 SENATOR ALESI: Thank you, Madam President. 23 First of all, I am excited that 24 25 there have been changes at the State Liquor

Authority. And I think almost all of us here are excited by that, and we look forward to vast improvements there.

With respect to this particular bill, I would agree with Senator Squadron on one issue. It's not often I get a chance to debate the wisdom of two Harvard lawyers simultaneously. But he did say one thing that struck me. He said that as far as input on improving this bill, you don't necessarily have to be an attorney.

I would agree with that. As somebody who has operated businesses all his adult life across this state, I think that it would be prudent to understand that this isn't just about laws and the technicalities of laws, we're talking about business. Business. Business that relies on jobs, jobs that rely on purveyors and suppliers and everything else. It's part of our commerce.

Senator Squadron said right now it's very hard to tell the good ones from the bad ones. But this bill is not going to do anything to change that. This bill is going make it harder for honest, decent businesses

to continue to compete and survive.

I would love to help with some input that would just massage this bill a little bit so that we can protect those business and the people that depend on them for their employment. But right now I simply have to vote no. As much as I appreciate the effort to change the way things are, can't vote for this bill. Not good for business.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Alesi to be recorded in the negative.

Senator Diaz, to explain his vote.

SENATOR DIAZ: Yes, thank you.

This is a law-and-order bill. Law and order. It seems to me, Madam President, that a place that six times, six times -- one, two, three, four, five, six times -- the police have to come because of a neighbor calling because of something, a fight or something, it seems to me that something's wrong with that place. Something is definitely wrong with that place.

We're not talking about one time, we're talking about six times that the police has to come to that place to that area because

something is happening in that place. And this is a law and order.

See, I want to finish with something that maybe sounds crazy. If I divorce my wife once, I could blame her and I could say the woman was the bad one. And people might believe me. If I divorce my wife, the second wife, I could say the woman was the wrong one and people will say, Well, let me give you the benefit of the doubt. But if I do it three times, people are going to tell me, Something's wrong with you. You are the wrong one.

And when we're talking about six times, six times -- and let me count again:

One, two, three, four, five, six times that the police has to come to that place, and we are talking about decent people, that we have to separate the decent owners from the wrong people? Something is wrong there. Something is definitely wrong. That's a hangout place that brings trouble to the community.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Farley.

SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you, Madam President. I want to speak on this bill.

There are state-chartered banks and federal-chartered banks. And if there's any consistency on the Banking Committee, which I've been on for over 34 years, the members have tried to protect and nourish the state charters. As a matter of fact, our Superintendent of Banks has made it his highest priority.

This particular bill, in my judgment, drives a stake right into the heart of the state charters, no question about it.

When Chase flipped to its federal charter, we lost 25 percent of the funding of the Banking Department. You've got a big building right down here called KeyBank, as you come into the capital. They were concerned about the lack of us doing a wild card and a few other things. They flipped to the federal charter, moved to Cleveland, and thousands of jobs went

1 with them.

Let me just speak to this
particular bill. It was introduced in
response to complaints that three federally
chartered banks initially charged some victims
of a fire in Chinatown the standard bank fees
for replacing the locks in safe deposit boxes
and issuing new keys. I understand, after
some inquiries by legislators and so forth,
these three federal banks waived the fees.

Despite this fact that the issue was resolved in these cases, we are now presented with a bill that would prohibit any fees to gain access to safe deposit boxes for the individuals unable to access it due to an act of God, common disaster, emergency situation, et cetera.

Although I'm sympathetic to the people that were involved in the fire, I feel that this bill is an overreaction, to say the least, and will simply accelerate the shift of bank from the state charter to the federal charter.

I have several concerns. First, because of federal preemption. Everything

that we do only applies to state-chartered banks. It's ironic that this action of these federal banks, a bill was introduced that would single out state banks for new regulations and restrictions.

As banks grow larger and acquire each other, New York State has lost much of the jurisdiction over the banking institutions. This type of legislation gives another reason for banks to flip to a federal charter.

When I first came in here 34 years ago, New York was the center of -- New York City in particular was the center of the financial world. That is changing rapidly. This bill sends a message to our state-chartered banks that because some legislators are unhappy with the actions of a federal bank that they'll impose new restrictions.

Actually, the superintendent is going to have to rule on every fee or any change that could happen to a safe deposit box. Let me just say something about safe deposit boxes in banks. For many, it's a

traffic builder. For many, they give you a free safe deposit box if you have a checking account. For some, they have different fees for different things.

The superintendent is going to have to rule on every single fee to make sure that it's reasonable. This is an incredible burden on state banks only, and it's also a burden on the State Banking Department. I don't need to ask the sponsor if he checked with the State Banking Department, because I happen to know they're very much opposed to this.

This superintendent must make an arbitrary judgment on all safe deposit fees.

Incidentally, this bill takes place immediately. As a matter of fact, the effect means that start-chartered banks will not even be able to rent a new safe deposit box until the superintendent approves their fees.

You know, this is absolute insanity. It doesn't make any sense. And in the Banking Committee -- and Senator Onorato and Senator Hassell-Thompson, who served there for many years, and Senator Savino -- almost every member changed their vote from yes to

without recommendation. And of course many people voted no.

It's simply an issue that is not truly understood. And let me just say, you know, I waited around here to speak against this bill, because you know what, it really doesn't mean an awful lot because people are well-meaning and nobody likes to have to be charged a fee for anything. But it is just driving, again, more businesses out of New York State and going after the very people that we want to protect, the state charters. It's a very, very bad bill.

As I stand here now with this exciting debate that goes on, I'm missing my granddaughter's high school graduation, which is going on right now in Schenectady, where she's receiving a prize. This job really can wear on somebody.

But I would urge my colleagues,
many of whom I've served with for many
years -- it's one of the largest committees in
the Senate -- to vote no on this legislation.
It's not needed. I'm confident that the
superintendent opposes it. And I'm confident

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that anybody that understands anything about

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 13 Senator Saland. 14 15 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, Madam President. Madam President, would Senator 16 Klein yield to a question? 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Klein, will you yield? 19 20 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, Madam President. 21 SENATOR SALAND: 22 Senator Klein, is this modeled after the existing legislation 23 24 in New York City? 25 SENATOR KLEIN: Actually, no.

Originally I had legislation which New York 1 2 City adopted and promulgated it through their 3 I worked with the restaurant regulations. 4 industry and attempted to get some of the 5 concerns in this legislation that they could not get from the City of New York. 6 7 So the City of New York's law 8 that's in effect right now, or starting to come into effect, is a much stricter standard 9 10 than exists in this bill. 11 SENATOR SALAND: In looking at 12 the language in the bill, I see the grading system is to reflect the safety and sanitation 13 14 of the premises and food-handling practices to 15 ensure compliance with state and local health laws. 16 SENATOR KLEIN: Which -- could 17 18 you refer --19 SENATOR SALAND: I just read from 20 lines 13 through 15 of Section 1352-d. SENATOR KLEIN: Thirteen to 15? 21 SENATOR SALAND: 22 Yeah. 23 SENATOR KLEIN: "The provisions of the sanitary code to establish a grading 24 25 system that reflects the safety and sanitation of the premises and food-handling practices to ensure compliance with state and local health laws."

In other words, what this means is that it would be based on the existing inspection system of the local health department. If each county does not have a health department, it would be the State Department of Health.

SENATOR SALAND: And correct me if I'm wrong; I truly do not know the exact number. I believe there are about half a dozen, perhaps as many as ten counties, that don't have local health departments, and they default to the state.

SENATOR KLEIN: Correct. That's correct.

SENATOR SALAND: Let's assume for the moment two continuous counties have health departments -- for example, I live in Dutchess County. Right across the river is Ulster County. Orange County adjoins Ulster County to the south. Putnam County is to the east on the same side of the river and adjoins Dutchess County.

With each of those counties

promulgating their own separate health codes,

would that not create a system in which you

could have restaurants several miles apart

with conditions that are being graded

differently depending upon which side of the

border they're on?

SENATOR KLEIN: First of all, this is not in any way changing exist code enforcement or any type of inspection system that presently exists on the local level. Every county has their own separate system on how they determine what a failing grade is as far as their inspection is concerned.

The state is promulgating the A, the B, and the C, which is a statewide basis, which was something at the time that was requested by the state restaurant industry.

SENATOR SALAND: But will not -SENATOR KLEIN: They were afraid
of the confusion that you're talking about,
that it would be differently. That's why
we're actually having the State Department of
Health actually do what an A, what a B, what a
C -- but we're still leaving, of course, the

local inspections and whatever is deemed a pass or fail at the local level to stay intact.

SENATOR SALAND: Well, I'm a little confused. And, please, if you'll continue to yield. Based on your explanation, is there any reason, then, to include any reference to local health laws? Because what you're saying, I believe --

SENATOR KLEIN: Let me see if I can clear that up, Senator, for just one second. It addresses the concerns of certain restaurants where the standards for grading a restaurant must be promulgated by rules. So there's a statewide standard. Of course, there's going to be local deviations as well.

SENATOR SALAND: So there will be local deviations. Will that not -- if the Senator will continue to yield -- will that not, in effect, result in a deviation, to the extent to which your law requires ensuring of compliance with state and local health laws, that the local health laws be taken into consideration?

What a health inspector in Ulster

County may view as being in compliance with 1 2 Ulster County's health code and what one in 3 Dutchess County may view as being in 4 compliance with Dutchess County's health code 5 may not necessarily be the one and the same, and yet there's going to be a grade that's 6 7 going to be issued by that compliance officer 8 or inspecting officer. On the local 9 SENATOR KLEIN: 10 level. Because again, I'm not changing in any 11 way the local health department, the way they 12 impact their restaurants presently. wouldn't be fair. Because as you said, and 13 14 you did make the point, that every locality 15 has different standards, a different way of judging how clean or how sanitary their local 16 eateries are. 17 18 SENATOR SALAND: And if you'll continue to yield. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 21 Klein, do you continue to yield? Yes, Madam 22 SENATOR KLEIN: 23 President. SENATOR SALAND: 24 I'll go back to 25 my original question, then.

To that extent, it would seem to me that there at the very least would be the possibility if not the likelihood that you could have restaurants a mile apart, separated by a side county line, that could be graded differently depending upon what their -- how their local law and their local enforcement agents view the seriousness of whatever their

SENATOR KLEIN: That's not really the case, because the portion of the bill that you referred to, it deals with just -- it reflects the safety and sanitation of the premises and food-handling practices. So those are the most serious types of violations.

local laws may require. So you could have --

If you look at the numbers, when a restaurant fails, they usually fail because of serious health risks, which is usually vermin or failure to handle food properly. So it's important to make sure that the locality is required to make sure that the letter grade is based on those things. That's all we're telling the locality to do.

Again, so I don't think it would be

an adequate system to have the state determine 1 what an A or a B or a C was and take that 2 power away from the locality, which has their 3 4 own health department that does their own 5 inspections, their own inspectors, their own 6 grading. 7 I know for a fact in the City of 8 New York the way it works is there's a grading system of 1 to 28. If you get anything over 9 10 28, you fail. And usually the failures that I've seen, over 55 percent are because of 11 12 vermin, which usually --SENATOR SALAND: If you'll 13 14 continue to yield. I don't -- and correct me 15 if I'm wrong, I'm making an assumption. five boroughs of the City of New York don't 16 have five separate health codes. 17 18 SENATOR KLEIN: Correct. They 19

have one health law. I assume other large cities are the same.

SENATOR SALAND: In that sense. And again, if you'll continue to yield.

And I'll ask a question not knowing the answer. Are there any cities -- you mentioned large cities. Are there any cities

16	a fee of \$250. Which department gets that
17	fee?
18	SENATOR KLEIN: Up to \$250.
19	SENATOR SALAND: Which department
20	gets that fee?
21	SENATOR KLEIN: The local health
22	department. Because they're the ones that are
23	going to be required to do the reinspection in
24	that expedited fashion, which is between seven
25	and 21 days.

And during that time period, that 1 2 seven to 21 days, the previous letter grade 3 that's posted is the one that remains up. Not 4 the most recent one that's being appealed. 5 SENATOR SALAND: Again, if the 6 Senator would continue to yield. 7 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 8 Klein, do you continue to yield? 9 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, Madam 10 President. 11 SENATOR SALAND: And if you know, 12 because I certainly don't, what's entailed in these inspections? How long do they take? 13 14 SENATOR KLEIN: Again, it depends 15 on -- from county to county, locality to locality, they all have their own different 16 17 systems. 18 And again, I say this again, I thought it was very important to make sure we 19 20 give that power and keep that -- have that power remain with the locality. 21 I know New York City, you know, has changed theirs 22 where now, if a restaurant fails, they have to 23 24 be inspected every six months; if not, at 25 least once a year.

And, Senator, I 1 SENATOR SALAND: 2 think the chair is letting us go back and forth, so if that's okay with the chair --3 4 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Yes. 5 SENATOR KLEIN: It's fine with 6 me, Senator Saland. 7 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you. And 8 let's assume I'm a restaurateur and I have a dairy product, a bar of butter sitting out on 9 10 a counter, and somewhere within a foot of that 11 I have a dishrag or a sponge. Is that a violation? 12 SENATOR KLEIN: Again, this would 13 14 be up to the local health department. 15 Again, getting back to the experience that I had in pushing this for so 16 17 long around the state and more specifically in 18 the city, is the way restaurants fail, the way they're going to be failing under this system 19 20 is usually pest violations or failure to reheat or heat food properly. 21 Which, as you 22 know, are very, very serious violations. 23 It's usually not -- a restaurant usually does not fail for, you know, minor 24 25 violations like failure to post their

certificate of occupancy and things of that nature.

And again, that's why I was very clear to have it in the bill that it was sanitation and food-handling. Which again, the reason behind that is because foodborne illness, which is always increasing around our state, usually happens because of mice, roaches, rats near or on top of the food, as well as the failure to heat and reheat food. So those are the most serious violations. And the also the ones that pose a public health risk.

SENATOR SALAND: So if it doesn't impose a public health risk but it's an unsanitary condition, it's not covered by this?

SENATOR KLEIN: Well, again, if you build up enough points -- and I assume, again, other counties probably do it the same way where there's probably a cutoff. You know, you have a checkoff list. And the more points you get, the more likely you're going to fail. And then they're going to take, I assume, that point system and then have the

ability to turn it into a letter grade.

You see, one of the problems,
Senator, is there's some serious problems in
some restaurants, not only in the City of
New York but across the state. And I feel, in
something like this, information is power.

I'm not changing the way a restaurant is being
inspected. I'm not changing any way of
looking or determining how clean or how dirty
a restaurant is. I'm merely providing, I
think, a very easy system where people or
diners can vote with their feet. If you're
very comfortable about going to a restaurant
that just got a C, so be it. But I think the
public really does have a right to know.

And I do want to mention that the
City of Los Angeles has implemented this
system for about six years, about the same
time I started pushing for this legislation.
And they now have almost total compliance;
85 percent of the restaurants last year got an
A. Restaurants that got As, their business
has gone up anywhere from 35 to 50 percent.
And foodborne illness, which they do track in
the city and the state, actually has gone down

25 percent. 1 2 SENATOR SALAND: Thank you, 3 Senator Klein. Thank you. 4 On the bill, Madam President. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Saland, on the bill. 6 7 SENATOR SALAND: Madam President, 8 unlike the City of New York and unlike the 9 City of Los Angeles, the 58 counties that 10 comprise the rest of the State of New York, as distinguished from the five counties or 11 12 boroughs of the City of New York, largely have local health departments. As I said earlier, 13 perhaps half a dozen to 10, somewhere in that 14 15 area, do not. And in those cases, they rely on the state's health code. 16 In any number of areas, you could 17 18 have a system which would be anything but 19 uniform. You could have a system in which 20 grades would vary based on the particular local code or the predilections of the 21 22 particular inspector. I know from time to 23 time I have received in my district office inquiries from restaurateurs regarding the 24 25 enforcement or inspections by local

inspectors, at times alleging that they believe them to be arbitrary. Obviously, there's nothing that I can do about it. It's a county function, not a state function.

But my concern here could be that two restaurants, similarly situated both in terms of the types of menus they have, the types of prices on their menus, could be treated differently gradewise under this system simply depending upon who inspected them and who inspected them under what particular local code.

Notwithstanding the fact that we are giving the Health Commissioner the authority to create the general guidelines, we are dealing with also, simultaneously, local health codes as part of the formula, local inspectors, some of whom may view their responsibilities in terms of their authority to violate somebody differently -- varying degrees of discretion, varying degrees of zealousness.

So I would be rather concerned that this would wind up in a situation in which the playing field would not necessarily be leveled

1	but in many instances could be unleveled.
2	Thank you.

I'm having great difficulty finding what 1 2 you're saying in this bill. It does not say that at all. It doesn't differentiate between 3 4 one inspection or a reinspection or an 5 inspection because you're asking for an 6 appeal. 7 SENATOR KLEIN: Let me go through 8 the specific language. And you were pointing to line 21, which actually talks about --9 10 SENATOR FLANAGAN: Starting at line 23, where it says specifically "The local 11 health officer shall conduct a subsequent 12 inspection of such food service establishment 13 no sooner than seven days" --14 15 SENATOR KLEIN: Yeah, but you just skipped 21, Senator, which starts "For 16 any food service establishment receiving a 17 18 grade lower than A, the local health officer shall advise the establishment of its grade 19 20 and the fines upon which such grade is based." So in other words, that's when the 21 reinspection takes place, on a grade other 22 23 than an A. SENATOR FLANAGAN: So for 24 25 anything --

SENATOR KLEIN: So in other 1 2 words, if you get an A, why would you call for 3 an expedited reinspection. I think that's 4 what you're confused about as far as the 5 language. SENATOR FLANAGAN: 6 No, actually 7 I'm -- Madam President, through you, I'm not 8 confused at all. I understand exactly what 9 you're saying on line 21. 10 But if someone gets a B, an establishment gets a B, based on your language 11 12 there has to be an automatic reinspection of that establishment. 13 SENATOR KLEIN: 14 There does not 15 have to be. If the owner of the restaurant is happy with their B, they can accept the B and 16 17 post up their B. 18 SENATOR FLANAGAN: If I may, Madam President, through you, if Senator Klein 19 20 will continue to yield. You spoke about on expedited appeal within seven to 21 days. Again, I don't see that in the bill. And I'll specifically reference the section where it speaks to an appeal. Page 2, line 5 -- I'm sorry, starting on line 4: "The food service establishment may appeal such subsequent assignment of a letter grade" --

SENATOR KLEIN: I'm sorry, what page are you on, Senator?

SENATOR FLANAGAN: Page 2, starting at the end of line 4: "The food service establishment may appeal such subsequent assignment of a letter grade designation to the commissioner."

Now, the way you described it, you said that there would be an appeal within seven to 21 days. The way I read this bill, there is a potential reinspection between seven and 21 days and then an owner can ask for an appeal thereafter, and there is apparently, during whatever time frame that may be for that appeal -- which I think could easily extend well beyond 21 days -- that

What I'm doing here 5 is creating this appeals process which gives 6 someone the ability to appeal a bad letter 7 grade. 8 SENATOR FLANAGAN: Okay. And if 9 Senator Klein would continue to yield, Madam 10 President. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 11 Senator 12 Klein, do you continue to yield? SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, Madam 13 President. 14 15 SENATOR FLANAGAN: Thank you. Senator Klein, just the last couple of 16 questions I want to ask you relate to the 17 18 provisions for establishments to which this law does not apply. Now, obviously it's the 19 20 City of New York. 21 SENATOR KLEIN: Right. 22 SENATOR FLANAGAN: Okay. Which you had had some dialogue on. 23 But then there are -- looks like bars, some potential 24 25 education facilities, not-for-profits, things

of that nature. When you referenced --1 2 SENATOR KLEIN: I actually have, 3 if you want me to read through, what it does 4 not include. 5 SENATOR FLANAGAN: It's clear on 6 the second page. My question is, how similar, 7 if at all, is that to the system that exists 8 in the City of New York? 9 SENATOR KLEIN: The City of 10 New York, as I said earlier, is a much 11 stricter system. There's no appeals process. 12 In other words, if you get an A originally, 13 let's say, and then you get a B, you're stuck 14 with that B until your next inspection. 15 That's the most important part. The other part as well is I think 16 they also do an A, B, C and I think they even 17 18 go to a D and an F. I think that's really the key portion, the most -- I guess. The appeals 19 20 process is something that during my conversations with the restaurant industry 21 22 they were trying to get the City of New York to do before they promulgated their 23 regulations, and the city refused. But it is 24 25 contained in this bill.

SENATOR FLANAGAN: I get what

Senator Klein is trying to do. I know myself

I've just recently been doing a decent amount

of traveling, going into like a hotel, for

example, and you see the grading system -- and

it's more numerical than it is a letter. And

you see, you go, well, they got a 96, and you

start thinking 96 is pretty good. But, like,

what are the four points that they missed? So

I understand the intent.

But I would respectfully offer that on several of the points that I raised that what the sponsor is saying verbally is different from what's in the bill.

And I believe that creates several problems, not the least of which is that there is an inspection, and I believe a fair reading of this bill is that there would have to be a subsequent inspection. It doesn't say it has to be requested, it says the local health officer shall conduct a subsequent inspection within seven to 21 days, whether it's a B or a C or whatever the case may be. So I believe that creates a problem right there in and of

itself.

I understand the point about the appeals process, but I don't believe that there's any tight time frame in terms of how long an establishment may have to wait for an actual final determination on an appeal. Yes, there has to be a reinspection within seven to 21 days. And if there is an appeal, that can be filed within 30 days. But it doesn't say that it has to be finalized within 60, 90, 120 days. And I think that creates a problem.

Well-intentioned in many respects, but I think the language needs to be worked on to accomplish exactly what Senator Klein is trying to do.

Thank you, Madam President.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator
Hannon, on the bill.

SENATOR HANNON: Thank you,

Madam President. I want to address thoughts

on the bill in a little bit of a wider

context, because I think this is a bill that

is well-intentioned but it's not ready for

prime time.

I also find really ironic that

there is a memo of support for this bill from
the City of New York when the City of New York
is exempted from the bill. But that's exactly
the problem. Because the City of New York,
having worked with the health commissioner,
the prior health commissioner, the current
health commissioner I happen to think has a
pretty good health department. But it's a
funded department, it's a focused department,
they've dealt with restaurants quite well,
they've done trans fats, they've done menu
posting, things that have been really adopted
nationally. And I commend Senator Klein for
getting them to adopt this grading system.

But it's not appropriate, I think, for the disparate types of enforcement we have in different counties throughout the state. I mean different because some counties don't have a health department, some do. As Senator Klein said, they have different ways they'll do their evaluations. Even though I can't figure out how the differences county to county can be then made uniform by the State Health Department coming up with the uniform system. I think those are inherently in

conflict. I don't think that's been worked out.

The other part of this is what do
we do -- what are we so used to when we look
at guides to traveling throughout the states,
throughout other countries? We're looking for
quality recommendations. The difficulty is
here this is a sanitary recommendation.
People are going to confuse both. Now, yes,
sanitation is an essential ingredient in
quality, but it's not the only one.

And I don't think the public is going to be ready to know this, it's not going to be well enough publicized. People are going to think As might be great in terms of quality when all it has to do with is it's superclean. Well, a little bleach doesn't make good food.

Another problem is that the grades are supposed to sum up the many different points that go into the sanitary inspection.

But if there are different lists for what's a sanitary inspection in different counties, then an A in one county is not going to mean the same thing as an A in another county. And

as Senator Saland pointed out, they can be right across the border from each other and mean two entirely different things. Again, creating confusion in the public whom we are supposed to be trying to serve with this legislation.

The real difficulty I have is the cost of this system. Now, yes, I know, carefully explained by Senator Klein, that we're not doing anything new in terms of the different points of the inspection. But there is a cost to this system, because somebody has to sit down and figure out how are you going to do this on a state level, both in terms of the uniform standards and, second, in terms of how the state exactly is going to enforce it and, third, how the county's going to enforce it.

Because you have to do some type of computation. How one translates 50, 100 different points in an inspection into a letter grade is a fairly complicated process and I would suspect one that has to be reasonable and so that it would stand up in court. It's going to be a costly, costly

process.

May I point out that the budget submitted by the Governor would cut the administrative budget of the State Department of Health by 20 percent. At a time we're dealing with life and death decisions, rule making, surveillance of hospitals, nursing homes, home healthcare, administration of drug programs, we're going to then be saying, oh, no, put that aside, go to the letter grading system. I think that's misplaced.

And I don't know about the rest of the counties in this state, but I know in my home county of Nassau they are already facing a major deficit, over hundreds of millions of dollars, they're talking about an additional payment for pension costs next year increasing by \$50 million -- and we are going to start having them go around do letter grades.

Look, if there's a way to do this, you find a demonstration program someplace upstate with a willing commissioner, with a willing county. You show people how it can work, that starts to work the kinks out of the system, it starts to educate the public. Once

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again, it's a bill well-intentioned, but it's

Which actually, getting back 8 to what Senator Flanagan raised -- he's not here -- it also dictates that 7-to-21-day 9 10 reinspection. SENATOR RANZENHOFER: 11 What's 12 going to happen is I came from county 13 government, and we get more -- at least in my 14 area of the state, more complaints and more 15 questions about inspections of restaurants and all sorts of establishments. And the question 16 17 that I know I'm going to get when I go back 18 home is that the actual bill says that the reinspection is the thing that costs the \$250. 19 20 So when the local department is implementing this bill, they're going to start 21 22 charging \$250 for the reinspection, which you just said was free. So that's the problem I 23 24 have. 25 SENATOR KLEIN: The regulations

that are going to be promulgated by the State 1 2 Department of Health are going to actually 3 state all this. 4 SENATOR RANZENHOFER: Okay. But 5 is the reinspection then going to be free, not \$250. 6 7 SENATOR KLEIN: Correct. 8 SENATOR RANZENHOFER: Okay. Is 9 that going to be cleared up in the language of 10 the bill? SENATOR KLEIN: Correct. And I 11 12 know, Senator, you have a concern and I know Senator Hannon -- he's not here, but he raised 13 a cost to the local government. Which I 14 15 believe raising that is utter nonsense. I mean, again, we are not changing 16 17 the way a locality does an inspection. 18 not requiring that the county hire any more inspectors. We're not having them call in 19 20 experts to decide what an A or a B or a C is. The only cost would be a cardboard, a piece of 21 22 cardboard which would have an A, a B, or a C on it that you would post in your front 23 window. 24 25 SENATOR RANZENHOFER: I'm not

going to debate that point. I mean, I heard the arguments --

SENATOR KLEIN: But you did mention that, you know, cost was a concern. That's why I raised it.

SENATOR RANZENHOFER: It was a concern. And quite frankly, through you, Madam Chairman, again, having served in the county for a while, I know when this additional responsibility or mandate comes on that, you know, they will have to put more people on to do this type of work, especially if you have hundreds and thousands of restaurants in the community.

Now, they're doing the inspections anyway. But I know what they're going to tell me is that there is going to be more work for them, and more cost. And again, that's not the specific question that I had, and I certainly heard the debate between you and Senator Hannon.

But the debate that's going to happen and the questions that are going to be asked is the question on the reinspection.

Because you were saying -- and I guess it can

be cleared up later, but someone is going to take out this page and what they're going to say is, I know the intent is for the appeal to be \$250, but if they have this bill -- and, you know, what's going to happen is they're going to charge \$250 for the reinspection and then they're going to charge \$250 for the appeal. Even though it's your intent that it not happen, but the bill says that. And that's the concern that I have.

SENATOR KLEIN: Again, that will be answered by the regulations that will be promulgated by the State Department of Health.

Once again, the reason for this is that the Restaurant Association at the time wanted something that was going to be uniform.

SENATOR RANZENHOFER: Would you consider cleaning up that language in the bill to specify that the appeal costs \$250 and the reinspection is free?

SENATOR KLEIN: You know, again,
I'm pretty positive that when the Department
of Health promulgates these regulations, they
will be crystal clear. If we see, once this
law is implemented, there is a problem, I'm

always willing to come back and make an 1 amendment, Senator. 2 3 SENATOR RANZENHOFER: Thank you. 4 Thank you. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Owen Johnson. 6 7 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Thank you, 8 Madam President. I'd like to say a couple of words about this bill and then ask a few 9 10 questions of Senator Klein. The first question is, why is this 11 12 bill here? Maybe Senator Klein could respond to that. Why is the bill here and what the 13 justification for this bill? What is the 14 15 crisis which makes every restaurant in the State of New York or ever bakery, every pasta 16 17 place, every you name it -- everybody prepares 18 food anywhere, even the convenience store at a gas station, everybody has to comply with all 19 20 these regulations. What is the crisis that requires all this effort on the part of the 21 22 local health department and the State Health 23 Department? ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 24 Senator 25 Johnson, are you asking Senator Klein to

23	question. The question is through you,
24	Madam President.
25	ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator

Klein, do you continue to yield? 1 2 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, Madam President. 3 4 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Are these 5 letter designations now being used in New York 6 City? That's what I'm asking. 7 SENATOR KLEIN: The letter grades 8 will be A, B, and C. And again, it will be up 9 to the local health department or, for 10 counting that don't have a health department, the Department of Health, based on their 11 12 grading system, their system that they use -everyone has, I guess, a different system --13 14 on what would qualify as an A, a B, or a C. 15 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Yes. to follow up with a question, how large is the 16 sign? Where is it posted? On the front door? 17 18 SENATOR KLEIN: It has to be 19 posted in a prominent place at the entrance to 20 the restaurant. A prominent place. You know, front window, front door. 21 And the rules then that will be 22 promulgated once this bill becomes law will be 23 by the Department of Health. They'll have the 24 25 size, the size of the lettering, I guess the

24	regulations stating how you determine it
25	can't be capricious and every town have a

different grading system. 1 2 SENATOR KLEIN: Right. And those 3 are the rules that are going to be promulgated 4 by the State Department of Health. 5 SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: They'll 6 give us those regulations. 7 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes. 8 And actually, Senator, just to 9 follow up, local health departments, the way a 10 local health department inspects restaurants 11 in many cases is based on a statewide sanitary 12 code. SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: 13 You know, 14 there's an expense to all this activity. 15 you're going to include -- as far as I understand, you're going to include 16 McDonald's, Kentucky Fried Chicken, a service 17 18 station with a convenience store in it. Everybody is going to be regulated by this and 19 20 they're going to have to post all these signs. And I think --21 SENATOR KLEIN: The McDonald's 22 you're correct about, but not the convenience 23 24 store. The convenience store is regulated by 25 the Department of Agriculture and Markets.

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1	SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: In other
2	words, so they wouldn't be covered in this?
3	SENATOR KLEIN: They will not.
4	SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: And how
5	about IHOP, the pancake house?
6	SENATOR KLEIN: They would.
7	SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: They would
8	be.
9	SENATOR KLEIN: Yes.
10	SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: So some
11	would be and some wouldn't be.
12	SENATOR KLEIN: Well, no.
13	Restaurants, as defined in the legislation,
14	would actually, if a certain percentage of
15	your business is selling food, would be
16	covered. But in other words, a convenience
17	store or a grocery store, they're covered by
18	the State Department of Agriculture and
19	Markets.
20	Which, by the way, another piece of
21	legislation that I wrote years ago requires
22	supermarkets to post their most recent
23	inspection results. The law has been very,
24	very popular, has almost a hundred percent
25	compliance. And we didn't close down any, you

know, clean supermarkets by mistake.

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Again, it's merely educating the public, letting them know very clearly how clean or how dirty their local eatery is and allowing them to choose to go there if they want or not go there if they choose not to.

SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Well, I think you're mandating a lot more inspections and procedures than presently exist in the law, because every health inspector has to send a report to Albany. That's a lot of paperwork to send that up there.

SENATOR KLEIN: Senator, again, I'm not mandating any more paperwork or any more inspections. The only thing that we're doing is presently everyone is entitled to an inspection; some places do it every year, some places do it every six months. reinspection, as was stated before, is free. And then that third, which is really the appeal, that's the one we're charging for. So that may be the extra one, but we're doing this only if a restaurant wants it or not. Because I guess they want to be able to clear up their good name.

SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Another 1 question for the Senator. 2 3 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 4 Klein, do you continue to yield? 5 SENATOR KLEIN: Yes, Madam President. 6 7 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 8 Klein yields. SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: 9 I am 10 unaware of any epidemic of foodborne illnesses 11 which mandates this type of a, what shall I 12 say, New York Statewide program. I'm unaware of that. 13 Well, one of the 14 SENATOR KLEIN: 15 problems with that, Senator, is in the City of New York they do track foodborne illness, and 16 we've been seeing an increase each and every 17 18 year. It's also a very, very difficult type of sickness to diagnose. It's hard to 19 20 pinpoint what exactly you ate and the food you actually ate, what it had contact with that 21 22 caused you to get sick. Unfortunately, the State Department 23 of Health does not track foodborne illness. 24 25 So it's hard to track how prevalent it is in

other parts of the state other than New York.

SENATOR OWEN JOHNSON: Well, you know, one problem with the State of New York:

Too many rules, too many regulations, too many expenses. And this is just, in my view, an application, a statewide application of the authority of the state costing more expense and more money to deal with a problem which really doesn't exist.

And for that reason, I certainly am going to vote against this bill. Thank you.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator LaValle, on the bill.

SENATOR LaVALLE: Thank you,
Madam President.

Senator Klein, Suffolk County, as you may know, is the largest county outside of the five boroughs of the City of New York. I would tell you that our health department in Suffolk County is very, very active and very overworked. When we put this on their agenda of things to do, either other things that they're doing now are going to have to give way or more people are going to have to be hired.

There is absolutely no way that our health department can deal with all the things they're dealing with and add this on top of it. So you are adding a cost.

This is, as I read your bill -- and I understand it goes into effect one year from now so that people have an opportunity to gear up. But this deals with safety and sanitation of the premises and food-handling practices to ensure compliance with state and local health laws.

I will tell you that at least in the early years that, when people see a grade on a restaurant or a deli, they will think that that has to do with the quality of the food, you know, that they're going to get. So a restaurant with an A grading, wow, their food is very tasty, it's going to be very good. It will take probably time before they get into a mindset that it deals with sanitary issues.

I would say -- and I kind of smile as I read this, and just tell me if I'm wrong -- one of the exemptions is mobile food vending units. You know, some of the biggest

problems in my county that people complain about are the mobile vending units. You talk about sanitary conditions.

So we're going to pick on a restaurant that has been in business for many years -- and one of the things that I do, Senator Klein, and I know you do, and other members, you ask people in this economy: "How you doing?" "Well, we're hanging on. We're hanging on." I would say to you, in spite of the fact that this doesn't take place for one year, you are going to force out reputable eateries throughout this state.

I don't know what the answer is.

But in Suffolk County right now the sanitarians do a very aggressive job. But now what you have at stake here is a letter, the scarlet letter, that can put an eatery out of business.

I would say to you that here again we are putting in a law that is trying to get to those in the minority of businesses that don't do a good job, that are not careful. I think our county does a tremendous job, an absolutely tremendous job. I know some of the

sanitarians, I know how aggressive they are. 1 2 But I think this takes it one step over the top. So at a time when I think we need to be 3 4 supporting small businesses and protecting 5 jobs, I think this is but another nail in the demise of some reputable, long-serving 6 7 businesses. 8 Thank you, Madam President. 9 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator 10 Klein, to close. Thank you, Madam 11 SENATOR KLEIN: President. 12 I heard a lot from my colleagues 13 from the other side of the aisle. 14 15 Unfortunately, I have the utmost respect for them, but I think most of the arguments 16 opposed to this bill are either not true or 17 18 exaggerated. 19 I've been involved in this type of 20 issue for a long time. As I said earlier, I

issue for a long time. As I said earlier, I wrote the law which requires supermarkets to post their most recent inspection results. We have seen failures in supermarkets go down about 50 percent since the law took effect.

Originally, compliance was difficult, but now

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we have virtually 100 percent compliance with that law.

It's not too burdensome. It's posted. Individuals like it because, again, I think it's incumbent upon us as elected officials, it's important for all of us to always advocate transparency, education, letting the public know. Which they certainly have a right to know.

Senator LaValle went on and on about the cost and the burden. Presently, Suffolk County is one of the counties that posts on an Internet site the inspection results of restaurants. So what we're actually doing is transferring what they already do on the Internet, in case someone doesn't go on the computer to look up their restaurants, it will be posted -- the same posting, the same work that went into inspecting those restaurants, will now be in a sign that's very easy to read and decipher by customers.

Again, I also have been an elected official now for 16 years. And I have dealt with a lot of industries, dealt with a lot of

lobbyists. And I want to say I have never dealt with an association that has been more disingenuous than the State Restaurant Association.

This legislation was something that I worked on for the past year. The reason why the City of New York implemented their law before I got a chance to pass mine is because I waited around negotiating with the state Association, tried to get them the things that the City of New York refused to do. And when all of that is done, they still oppose this bill.

I think we all have to ask the question, what is the restaurant industry trying to hide? If a restaurant is clean, you take credit for it, increase your business.

If it's dirty, maybe you should fall by the wayside.

So I think, really, a vote against this piece of legislation is really a vote against the public. It's denying the public the opportunity to know how clean or how dirty their local eatery is.

I vote yes, Madam President.

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Senator Klein, I agree with a lot of the comments that were heard here today, and I think they raise legitimate concerns that during the year period that this becomes law, you should address them and they should be taken very seriously.

The public has a right to know, and that's why I'm supporting this legislation,

Madam President. I think the sanitary conditions of any food establishment is of the utmost importance before I walk into a restaurant.

Senator Klein, you mentioned the Restaurant Association, and you stated what are they afraid of, what do they have to hide, why do they want to hide something. I worked with them for many years when we developed the Clean Indoor Air Act. I don't think they have anything to hide. I think their concerns are legitimate.

I think over the year, if this becomes law -- I know the Assembly hasn't passed it yet; I don't know if they will -- I think you should work with the Restaurant Association. I did for many years before we

adopted the Clean Indoor Air Act where we banned smoking in restaurants. And I heard a lot of the same concerns about the industry, which was unfounded, and many of my colleagues that are still here fought me for three or four years on that bill.

But I will tell you, the Restaurant Association was a tremendous asset to me. And I hope that you'll see that they will be to you as well as you move forward with this legislation.

I'll be voting in the affirmative.

Thank you, Madam President.

SENATOR CRAIG JOHNSON: Thank you very much, Madam President.

I'm also going to be supporting this legislation. And I think what's very important is what Senator Klein is trying to do here, as Senator Fuschillo mentioned, is really inform the public. And this is just another way.

1 Because today, it's very simple.

If someone wanted to, they could go into any restaurant they may be eating in, walk in, look around, realize there's a problem, take out their BlackBerry, if they have one, take a photograph, maybe a Facebook page or a Twitter page, or go to one of the number of restaurant websites, like Dining.com, Urban Spoon, Chowhound, Zagat's, and put a review right online and let people know about maybe some unsanitary conditions. The public needs to know this information.

What Senator Klein is doing is the responsible thing in bringing in the Department of Health, having them establish standards, establishing a very simple system which allows for review and allows for appeals to enable the public the right to know that the establishment they're going to spend their money in and that they're going to eat food from is sanitary.

What's wrong with that? What is wrong with that? I don't see anything wrong with that. I think counties, notwithstanding the difficult times -- and I agree with

Senator Hannon that the county that we live in and love, Nassau County, has its difficult financial times. But at the same instant, the residents who live in that county have a right to know that the eating establishment where they go is safe and healthy.

I vote yes. Thank you very much.

ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Craig Johnson to be recorded in the affirmative.

SENATOR HANNON: At a point in time when health departments on the state level, health departments on the county level are being asked to do things that affect life and death, to impose a mandate, to impose a mandate when the budget proposed by the Governor cuts the State Health Department by 20 percent for administrative expenses, cuts the money that's given to local health departments, it is irresponsible to try to do this when the priorities ought to be elsewhere.

I vote no.

The standards aren't the same.

If you tell me across the county, across the state all of the standards were the same, that an A in Hamilton County means the same thing as an A in Nassau or Suffolk County, that's one thing. But that's not what's going to happen here. They're going to be different in each county because they inspect for different things. The standard is not uniform.

So we're adding to the confusion and we're not adding to the knowledge that I think Senator Klein wants to put out there, which I agree with. We have a right to know

if a restaurant is clean or not. That's 1 2 perfectly good. But the standard has to be 3 uniform throughout the state. It is not 4 currently, and this law doesn't make it so. 5 Therefore, I will be voting no. ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: 6 Senator 7 Marcellino to be recorded in the negative. 8 Senator Alesi, to explain his vote. 9 SENATOR ALESI: Thank you, Madam 10 President.
