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Senator Klein. 1 2 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, 3 before we proceed, I just want to recognize 4 this is a very special day for one of our 5 colleagues who we hold near and dear. She is 6 someone I consider a dear friend, and I know 7 all of us do. Today is Shirley Huntley's 8 birthday and anniversary. 9 (Applause.) 10 SENATOR HUNTLEY: Thank you. Thank you. Thank you. 11 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 12 Congratulations, Senator Huntley, on both the 13 14 birthday and the anniversary. 15 Senator Klein. 16 SENATOR KLEIN: Mr. President, at this time I move to recall Senate Resolution 17 18 Number 6298, which was previously adopted. I ask that the resolution be read in its 19 20 entirety and ask that Senator Parker, when he 21 gets here, be allowed to speak on his 22 resolution. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: The Secretary will read the resolution in its 24 25 entirety.

1	THE SECRETARY: By Senator
2	Parker, Legislative Resolution Number 6298,
3	mourning the death of Local 371 President
4	Charles Stephen Ensley, distinguished citizen
5	and devoted member of his community.
6	"WHEREAS, It is the custom of this
7	Legislative Body to pay tribute to citizens of
8	the State of New York whose lifework and civic
9	endeavor serve to enhance the quality of life
10	in their communities and the great State of
11	New York; and
12	"WHEREAS, Charles Ensley died on
13	Friday, June 18, 2010, at the age of 69; and
14	"WHEREAS, President of Local 371
15	for 26 years, Charles Ensley was born in
16	Birmingham, Alabama. He grew up amid the
17	civil rights campaigns of the 1960s, and some
18	of his principles came"
19	ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON:
20	Can we please have some order.
21	The Secretary will continue to
22	read.
23	THE SECRETARY: "And WHEREAS,
24	President of Local 371 for 23 years, Charles
25	Ensley was born in Birmingham, Alabama. He

grew up among the civil rights campaigns of the 1960s, and some of his principles came from his father, John, who in the 1950s led African-American workers against brutal opposition in a long battle for equal pay at the Birmingham News; and

"WHEREAS, Charles Ensley had unionism, equality and integrity in his DNA. Growing up in Birmingham as the youngest of four children, he learned the importance of individual goals as well as group goals; and

"WHEREAS, Charles Ensley graduated from Parker High School, at that time the largest black high school in the country. He later went on to attend Howard University in Washington, D.C.; and

"WHEREAS, Charles Ensley soon
married, and both he and his wife, Annette,
moved to New York City in 1965. He became a
caseworker in the Bureau of Child Welfare
Bedford-Stuyvesant office, and also provided
services in tutoring kids in Harlem and in
educating welfare rights groups; and

"WHEREAS, In 1982, after a hotly contested election, with more than 70 percent

of the vote Charles Ensley became president of Local 371 and began demanding more democracy and financial accountability in the union; and

"WHEREAS, Charles Ensley was an innovative, independent leader with high integrity. Possessing an amazing sense of humor and a quick wit, he fought with vigor and intelligence, and was proud of winning dignity and job protections for his members and never wavered in his steadfast determination to pursue a progressive agenda; and

"WHEREAS, Charles Ensley believed that diversity is a major source of the strength of the union. Regardless of race, gender, blue collar or professional, the common ground has been defending the rights of every single union member; and

"WHEREAS, Under Charles Ensley's leadership as a tough negotiator, Local 371 became the 'Mighty, Mighty Union,' and its membership grew from 9,000 to 17,000 members. He received numerous awards for his work, among them the prestigious Ellis Island Medal of Honor in 2001; and

"WHEREAS, Charles Ensley served on 1 a number of boards, including the AFSCME 2 3 International Executive Board. He enjoyed 4 jazz, theater, and reading that ranged from 5 Russian literature to the French existentialists, with a particular interest in 6 7 black history and the development of the black 8 novel. In addition, he was a collector of black art and surrounded himself with some of 9 the well-known and lesser-known artists from 10 around the world; and 11 "WHEREAS, Prior to his death, 12 Charles Ensley asked that everyone, 13 14 particularly Local 371 members, use time, 15 energy and resources in maintaining the Mighty, Mighty Union. He was a true asset to 16 society; and 17 18 "WHEREAS, Charles Ensley distinguished himself in his profession and by 19 20 his sincere dedication and substantial contribution to the welfare of his community; 21 22 and "WHEREAS, Charles Ensley's 23 commitment to excellence, and his spirit of 24 25 humanity, carried over into all fields of

enterprise, including charitable and civic 1 2 endeavors; and "WHEREAS, Charles Ensley is 3 4 survived by his wife, Annette, his sister, 5 Barbara Jean, his nephews, Bradley and Clarence, his niece, Imani, along with many 6 7 cousins; and 8 "WHEREAS, Armed with a humanistic 9 spirit, imbued with a sense of compassion, and 10 comforted by a loving family, Charles Ensley's life was a portrait of service, a legacy which 11 12 will long endure the passage of time and remain as a comforting memory to all he served 13 14 and befriended; now, therefore, be it "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 15 Body pause in its deliberations to mourn the 16 death of Local 371 President Charles Stephen 17 18 Ensley, distinguished citizen and devoted member of his community; and be it further 19 20 "RESOLVED, That a copy of this resolution, suitably engrossed, be transmitted 21 22 to the family of Charles Ensley." ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 23 Senator Smith. 24 25 SENATOR SMITH: Thank you very

much, Mr. President.

Colleagues, it is on very rare occasions you have the opportunity to celebrate someone's life. Normally when a person passes, obviously there is remorse, there is concern, your heart is broken, your spirit seems shattered because of the separation of that person's involvement in your life.

Charles Ensley was that person.

And while my heart is very heavy for someone who had a tremendous amount of integrity, a tremendous amount of independence, leadership, one who regardless of how one felt about a decision that he made, if he gave you his word for something, it was clear.

I can remember my first attempts at running for office when I was what you would call an insurgent and every single person was on the other side of the fence from me.

Charles Ensley was a person who stood up to not only the powers that be of DC37, but to all other labor supporters, and said "I'm going to be with this person." He took a lot of heat for it, as Senator Savino can tell

you, for years. But he was that kind of a person.

But I rise today to say to Charles that I will never forget your friendship, I will never forget what you stood for for the poor people of the City of New York.

Most people think union leaders represent those who are working. Yes, that is true. But Charles represented people who were not working. He represented a lot of people who felt as though nobody would speak up for them, and he would at times put his own personal integrity and his leadership of his particular local on the line.

I can't tell you of a finer local leader than Charles Ensley. I've known many of them, many of you know them. For those of you who have not had the opportunity to know Charles Ensley, you missed a real special person.

This resolution that we're going to adopt today is well worded. But if I had to describe its total explanation of Charles Ensley, I'd say it represents only 10 percent, because the emotion and the spirit of this

individual one could not capture in words. 1 2 So as I stand here today, I 3 congratulate my colleague Senator Diane Savino 4 for not only this resolution, but thank you 5 for introducing me to Charles. It was because of you that I developed this very special 6 7 relationship. 8 And I ask all my colleagues that 9 you will say a silent prayer for this 10 individual at some point during your day, because this is a loss to the people of this 11 12 state, no question about it. And Senator Diane Savino, my heart 13 14 goes out to you as well, because I know how 15 close you and Charles were. Thank you, Mr. President. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 17 18 Thank you, Senator Smith. 19 Senator Parker, on the resolution. 20 SENATOR PARKER: Mr. President, on the resolution. 21 We have not come to bury Charles 22 Ensley today but to celebrate his life. 23 this was a life certainly worth living. 24 25 paraphrase King, it is not where a person

stands in times of comfort but in times of challenge and in times of difficulty in which people are judged.

And certainly you found Charles
Ensley on the front lines every single time it
mattered. Every single time it was important
for somebody to stand up and do the right
thing, you found Charles Ensley at the front
and prepared to do the right thing despite
what everybody else said or what anybody else
did.

Similar to Senator Smith's testimony today, I have a similar testimony in which, when I ran for office and no one was ready to support me, Charles Ensley did the right thing and came forward for me.

And I share my condolences to you,
Diane, who I know you were very, very close to
President Ensley.

He was somebody who not only led the members of Local 371 of DC 37 with courage and dignity and a knife-cutting honesty, but somebody who saw himself as a leader of New Yorkers all over the state, particularly working men and women who were trying to just

make a way in the world. And people who 1 2 didn't have much. You know, the social service 3 4 workers union is a group of people who work 5 with the least of those in our society. And so he saw both the mission of helping his 6 7 actual members who were doing the work as well 8 as the clients that they served as his 9 constituency. 10 And I rededicate myself today to 11 those same principles of making sure that 12 every New Yorker, particularly the least of those in our society, are in fact cared for 13 14 and get the best possible representation they 15 can. We remember and honor the life and 16 legacy of Charles Ensley. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Thank you, Senator Parker. 19 20 Senator Liz Krueger. SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: 21 I too want 22 to rise to say that it is a real loss to us all for Charles Ensley no longer being on this 23 earth with us. 24 25 Like some of my other colleagues, I knew Charles a long time. I knew him long
before I even thought about running for
political office. I was running
not-for-profit organizations, working on
behalf of low-income New Yorkers, working side
by side with members of 371 -- sometimes not
always being in agreement with 371 and needing
to go in and talk to Charles about why what he
thought was the right answer for his workers
might not have been the right answer for the
low-income people of the City of New York who
his workers work with day by day.

I worked with him to argue against the fundamentally wrong policies of the Giuliani administration during those years, worked with him to improve federal law, state law, government regulations and policies that affected both his workers and millions of people in the City of New York.

And he never forgot why he had the job he did, that his job was to represent his members but to represent the fundamental core values of society and government's obligations to help those most in need.

And he was an amazing man. And so

hopefully none of us will forget the lessons 1 2 of Charles Ensley's life and what he actually did for all of us, whether we ever knew him or 3 4 not. 5 Thank you very much, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 6 7 Thank you, Senator Liz Krueger. 8 Senator Duane. 9 SENATOR DUANE: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. I also rise to speak in tribute of Charles Ensley. 11 12 On so many levels he was an amazing I want to say, because I don't want to 13 forget this, not least of which was -- I don't 14 15 want to say discovering, but recognizing, investing in, mentoring, supporting one of the 16 finest elected officials and union leaders I 17 18 have ever met or worked with, Diane Savino. And so for that alone, he deserves enormous 19 20 praise. Charles Ensley within his union was 21 a voice of conscience and reason and 22 23 determination. And he was a person who never forgot the mission of the members of his local 24 25 and of his union. And that was a combination

of making sure that his workers had the strongest possible voice for their well-being as well as making sure that the mission of their workers was also to serve people.

Because the members of that union are the people who are front lines in making life a little bit better and a little bit easier for people who need help. And in fact, for those of us who believe that government can make a difference in people's lives, these are the actual municipal workers who make a difference in people's lives.

To listen to Charles Ensley talk about case managers or social workers was -- it was a beautiful -- it was wonderful. I had the honor of working on the City Council when he would come and testify, and he was riveting and he was always on point and he was convincing and he was amazing.

Some of you know this, many of
you -- some of you may know it that, you know,
there were various things in the New York City
Council that I was known for, and here as
well. But the thing that I am most proud of
is the thing that I worked on with Charles

Ensley and, frankly, Diane Savino. And that was Local Law 49, which, when former Mayor Giuliani first tried to eliminate the city's Division of AIDS Services, now called HASA -- and then, when he failed at doing that, tried to, under the guise of reform, decimate it -- we were able to put that part of that agency, that department, into law so no mayor, no one could ever, ever, ever eliminate it or destroy it.

And Charles and Diane and people in the activist community -- it was the most amazing thing. And it is the model for how it is that we should provide social services.

And though it's now 13 years ago that that law was passed, it is a model for how social services should be provided. And I believe that Charles would agree with that.

Loyal, forceful, smart, funny sometimes -- just an amazing, just a giant, a lion in the labor movement for the people of the City of New York and for the people that he represented and for the people that he represented, the people that they helped every day. A tremendous loss.

But I think, as I think about it now, every day that we do something that impacts people through our social services or children and families legislation here, I'm going to think what would Charles do, how would Charles get this done, where he would find common ground.

He'll be tremendously missed and not forgotten. And, Diane, I am so sorry for your loss.

ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Senator Diane Savino.

SENATOR SAVINO: Thank you,

Mr. President. I am going to try and do this
without getting too upset.

The person that you heard Senator

Parker and Senator Smith and Senator Duane and

Senator Krueger talk about and you heard Tommy

read about is everything that they said he

was. But he's more than that. He is the

person who was principally responsible for who

I am today and why I'm standing here.

He was not just the president of my union -- although he was -- he was my friend, my mentor, in many ways a father to me in a

way my own father wasn't. So that's the personal part of Charles, and that's why it's a tremendous loss to me.

But for the people of the City of

New York, the people of the State of New York,

and more importantly for the labor movement,

it is a tremendous loss.

You know, we read every day about union leaders -- as a matter of fact, I think the Post did a story this week about the exorbitant salaries of union leaders and how they're not representing their membership.

You will never see anything remotely like that --

ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON:

Can we please have some order in the chamber.

Thank you.

SENATOR SAVINO: You will never see anything remotely like that written about Charles Ensley.

He was fiercely independent, fiercely proud, and actually had real disdain for those who would abuse the leadership of working people. He had a perverse sense that a union leader should never get too far away

from their membership.

And in fact he had a hard and fast rule that as the president of the union, particularly in a civil service union, he would not earn more than his civil service title. And in fact all of us who worked at the union office were in the same position.

And he would say, "Girl, if you want a raise, we'll negotiate it at the bargaining table.

And if you want a promotion, you take a civil service test."

He felt incredibly strongly that union leaders should not get that far away from their members, that you had to live under the contract to really understand what your union members needed. And in an age where union presidents are earning \$300,000 a year -- that would never have happened with Charles.

He was the person to demand honesty and integrity in his parent union. He was the one who uncovered the scandals at Council 37 which led to the administratorship and the eventual jailing of several union leaders for abusing the union's membership. He never gave

up trying to fight to improve Council 37.

And his loss is a tremendous loss not just for them, but for all of us. Because over the years, not just at the bargaining table and not just in the halls of government, he recognized his responsibility to improve the lives of the people that he represented as well as the people they served.

As I said, he is principally responsible for who I am today. He taught me everything I ever knew about unions, he taught me everything I ever knew about government.

And every day -- like you, Tom -- when I look at a problem I find myself saying what would Charles do. And the greatest loss to me right now is I can't call him and ask him.

But I know what he would do. And I think we all do. Any of us who were touched by his life would know what Charles would do. And so, as Kevin said, I will commit, every day that I'm in office or in public life, to continue in the tradition of Charles Ensley, who left this world a better place than he found it, left the labor movement a far better place than he found it.

1	And a voice who is so desperately
2	needed for working people has been silenced.
3	But it won't be as long as people like myself,
4	Kevin, and Liz and Tom and Malcolm, who knew
5	him, who worked with him, will be able to
6	continue his legacy.
7	Thank you.

Senator Little honors the passing of former

New York State Assemblyman James Preston King.

Senator Little.

SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you,

Mr. President.

I rise today and ask all my colleagues to join me as we recognize a lifetime of achievement by James Preston King. He truly was one of the most honorable public servants that I have ever known.

And in recognition of his public service, the Government Law Center at Albany Law School in April created the Lifetime Achievement in Public Services Award, awarded it to Jim King, and thereby named that award after him.

Jim King was a man of many talents and wore many hats. He had many titles. He was a Marine Corps general of the JAG Corps. He was an Assemblyman who left office in 1995, and I was elected to complete his term. He was a Court of Claims judge. He was chief counsel to the Secretary of State. He was a commissioner on the Lobbying Commission, a member of the Public Integrity Commission. He

was a professor at Siena College and Albany
Law School. He was a leader of the band and a
trombonist; many of us enjoyed his music at
one time or another.

But the titles that were most important to him were that of husband -- he was husband to Jane, who predeceased him after 47 years of marriage, and to Anne, his wife of the past three years. He was dad to three sons -- his son Jim, in Ticonderoga; his son David, who is a member of the Finance staff of the majority here; and his son Glenn, who works at the Attorney General's office.

In all of these things, Jim King was helping other people and always out to do what he could for others, and his entire lifetime was spent doing that in the many roles that he played. But I think, of all the titles that I like the best of Jim King, is that that I can use in talking about him personally, as being a friend.

So I thank you for recognizing him today and for honoring his family with a legislative resolution that we have passed and that I will forward to his family.

Thank you very much. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: 3 Thank you, Senator Little. 4 Senator Farley, on the resolution. 5 SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you very 6 much, Mr. President. 7 I also rise to support what Senator 8 Little had to say about one of the most remarkable men that I ever met. An incredible 9 10 person that grew up in modest circumstances, went into the Marine Corps, ended up as a 11 12 general, the adjutant general, a distinguished lawyer, law professor, Assemblyman, trombone 13 14 player. He had everything in the -- I never 15 saw anybody that was so diversified in his talents. 16 And not only on top of that, as he 17 18 served in the Assembly, I don't know anybody that didn't love him. He was the nicest man 19 20 to work with. From both sides of the aisle, Jim King was respected and loved. 21 He was a wonderful father with an 22 absolutely gorgeous wife and beautiful 23 children. And everything he did, he did well. 24 25 He served as an Assemblyman in my district,

and it was an absolute joy to work with him. 1 2 And Jim King, every time you met 3 him or had a dealing with him, you came away 4 feeling good. Jim King is a remarkable man 5 and somebody that really made quite an impact in this world. And I wish he and his family 6 7 all the best, because they can be very proud 8 of the legacy that their father left. 9 Thank you. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Thank you, Senator Farley. 11 Senator Leibell. 12 SENATOR LEIBELL: 13 Thank you, 14 Mr. President. 15 I just want to echo my colleagues' comments. Having served in the Assembly, I 16 served there with Jim King, and he truly was a 17 18 remarkable man with a wonderful family. I recall, when my children were 19 20 young, he and his wife Jane inviting our family to spend a weekend with him up in the 21 district, Betty. And it was a wonderful 22 weekend. 23 24 He was great with kids but also, as 25 has been noted, a remarkable career of public

1	service to New York State but also, before
2	that, to this country. He was a fairly senior
3	officer in the Marine Corps when he was
4	serving in Vietnam, and we often talked about
5	his experiences there.
6	He was a great public servant, a
7	great American, and he will be sorely missed.

Even Senator Skelos in 2008, 19 20 in our daily newspaper headline, "Skelos Backs More State Education Money for Yonkers," and 21 said that he would back rewriting the state 22 23 education funding formula for the city. 24 There was not an easy way to do it, 25 because anything you do triggers things for

other communities. So the superintendent, in 1 2 conjunction with other leaders in our 3 district, realized that one way to do it was to look at the increased enrollment. And over 4 5 the past year the enrollment has increased by almost 600 young people, and that's not 6 7 included in the formula. 8 So whereas the funding had been cut 9 in the City of Yonkers, there had been no 10 consideration for the increase. This allows for consideration going forward for the 11 12 increase in the student body and the 13 realization that Yonkers indeed is one of the Big Five, is unique, and certainly in this 14 15 respect should have all of its students counted. 16 So certainly I vote aye. 17 18 ACTING PRESIDENT CRAIG JOHNSON: Senator Stewart-Cousins to be recorded in the 19 20 affirmative. 21 Senator Farley, to explain his 22 vote. 23 SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you. 24 Nobody likes to vote against 25 anything for Yonkers. We are the "Gambling State" and no longer the Empire 24 25 State.

Why has that happened? Year after year a new gambling idea -- it began with the lottery in the '60s, an annual event, semiannual, and now every minute, depending on how fast you can scratch off a card. Super Lotto, Quick Draw, VLTs at racetracks, Indian casinos. On a per capita basis, we gamble more in New York State than any state including Nevada.

And that's money that's sucked right out of the economy. And if you don't think there's a price to pay for it, there is. In social services, in criminality, in disruption in local communities wherever these venues are.

There are all kinds of studies all over the country, including in New York by the New York State Council on Problem Gambling, that tell us the more opportunities you have, the more problems you create. And this amendment, if it ever became reality, constitutional amendment, would just be one more opportunity building upon all the others that have brought us to this state we're in.

And I will be voting no.

It is for those domestic violence victims that have to flee 6 7 the residence, their primary residence, 8 because they are being threatened. And so with this bill they would be permitted to 9 10 leave their primary residence, with the intention of coming back to that primary 11 residence when the situation is resolved. 12 As it is domestic violence, you 13 can't say it will be resolved in two months or 14 15 four months. But the intent is that the rent will still be paid and they will be coming 16 back to that residence. 17 18 SENATOR HANNON: Would the Senator yield for another question. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Oppenheimer, will you continue to yield? 21 SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Of course. 22 23 ACTING PRESIDENT SAVINO: Senator Oppenheimer yields. 24 25 SENATOR HANNON: So would it be

But suppose somebody is a victim of domestic violence. They, for reasons not necessarily related to that unfortunate circumstance, happen to either sublet, legally or illegally, happen to just not be there, and two or three years later decide that they want to go back to that residence. Can they then make some type of intent to return?

SENATOR OPPENHEIMER: Through
you, Madam President, it's written here in the
law that the victim asserts the intent to
return to the housing accommodation and the
victim, this domestic violence victim, will be
deemed to be occupying the unit as her primary
residence during that period of time. I think
the opportunity to sublet if she is occupying
the residence would not be possible.

SENATOR HANNON: Madam President, would the Senator continue to yield.

It says that if the copayment exceeds the usual and customary cost 13 14 of a prescribed drug, they can't charge you 15 that, that usual and customary cost. It's not defined. 16 There are other mechanisms in this 17 18 proposal that talk about the posted retail price and when the copayment exceeds the 19 20 pharmacy's usual and customary price. We have three separate standards in a bill that 21 exceeds about 31 lines. 22 23 If you really want to protect the individual customer of the pharmacy I think 24 25 you need a far better set of definitions, you

Further, this legislation only affects mergers when one of the two parties' gross annual New York revenues exceeds \$200 million. And further, this legislation would only cover residential mergers.

There are 11 specific public interest standards that the acquiring corporation must meet and that the PSC must find. And I'll be happy to go into those standard later in the debate.

Let me just give a little geographic history to this, if I may, Madam President. In the spring of 2008, FairPoint Communications purchased telephone networks in Vermont, New Hampshire, and Maine. They were saddled with a \$1 billion debt in the transaction and were wholly unprepared to operate the 1.7 additional landlines. In fact, it was widely acknowledged that since this conversion occurred with FairPoint, FairPoint had plagued their customers with many complaints and quality concerns.

What this bill is about, Madam

President, is essentially two things. One, it 1 is designed to balance the interests of 2 3 ratepayers and the investors, and to do it in 4 a fair way. And finally, this bill -- and 5 most importantly, why I've sponsored this bill and have over 21 cosponsors -- this bill will 6 7 strengthen the PSC's already existing 8 authority by creating standards to protect 9 consumers, to protect workers, and to protect 10 the local economy before it approves a sale or 11 merger. Most importantly, Madam Chair, and 12 most succinctly, it will ensure that New York 13 is not victimized by a bad sale. 14 15 Thank you, Madam President.
