

PROCEEDINGS 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: The 3 Senate will come to order. 4 I ask everyone to rise and repeat 5 the Pledge. (Whereupon, the assemblage recited б 7 the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: In 9 the absence of clergy, I would ask that we bow 10 our heads in a moment of silence. (Whereupon, the assemblage 11 12 respected a moment of silence.) 13 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: The reading of the Journal. 14 15 THE SECRETARY: In Senate, Monday, January 31, the Senate met pursuant to 16 adjournment. The Journal of Sunday, 17 18 January 30, was read and approved. On motion, Senate adjourned. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Without objection, the Journal stands approved 21 22 as read. 23 Presentation of petitions. 24 Messages from the Assembly. 25 Messages from the Governor.

Reports of standing committees. 1 2 Reports of select committees. 3 Communications and reports from state officers. 4 Motions and resolutions. 5 6 Senator Libous. 7 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. 9 At this time could we please adopt 10 the Resolution Calendar. ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: All 11 in favor of adopting the Resolution Calendar 12 signify by saying aye. 13 (Response of "Aye.") 14 15 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Opposed, nay. 16 17 (No response.) 18 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: The 19 resolution calendar is adopted. 20 Senator Libous. 21 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 22 Mr. President. Mr. President, I believe that 23 there's a privileged resolution at the desk by 24 25 Senator Young. May we please have the title

read and move for its immediate adoption. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: The 3 Secretary will read. 4 THE SECRETARY: By Senator Young, 5 Legislative Resolution Number 412, commemorating the 200th Anniversary of 6 7 Chautauqua County, New York. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 9 Senator Young. 10 SENATOR YOUNG: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 It's with great pride that we pass 12 this resolution today. As you know, 13 Chautauqua County is the furthest county west 14 15 in the State of New York. It's a land of great lakes and beautiful lakes, and it's a 16 place where people are just wonderful. 17 18 So I just want to say to everyone, thank you for your support today. We are 19 20 looking forward to an entire year of celebration honoring our 200th birthday in 21 22 Chautauqua County. 23 Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 24 The 25 question is on the resolution. All those in

favor signify by saying aye. 1 2 (Response of "Aye.") 3 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 4 Opposed, nay. 5 (No response.) ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: б The 7 resolution is adopted. 8 Senator Libous. 9 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, 10 Mr. President. I believe there is a privileged 11 12 resolution at the desk by Senator Hassell-Thompson. Could we please have it 13 14 read in its entirety and then please call on 15 Senator Hassell-Thompson, please. ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 16 The Secretary will read. 17 18 THE SECRETARY: By Senator Hassell-Thompson, Legislative Resolution 19 20 Number 411, honoring Sergeant Deon L. Taylor posthumously upon the occasion of his 21 22 designation for special recognition by the 23 New York Army National Guard. "WHEREAS, Members of the armed 24 25 services from the State of New York, who have

served so faithfully and courageously in wars 1 in which our nation's freedom was at stake, as 2 3 well as in the preservation of peace during 4 peacetime, deserve a special salute from this 5 Legislative Body; and "WHEREAS, this Legislative Body is б 7 justly proud to honor Sergeant Deon L. Taylor 8 posthumously upon the occasion of his designation for special recognition by the 9 10 New York Army National Guard, to be celebrated at its Black History Month Kick-Off 11 12 celebration on Tuesday, February 1, 2011; and "WHEREAS, This year's national 13 theme is 'An African-American Tribute to Our 14 15 Troops and Their Families'; and "WHEREAS, This special celebration 16 17 will include the name of Sergeant Deon Taylor 18 as a recipient of state recognition. This particular award was established as one of the 19 20 Empire State's highest honors for community service; and 21 "WHEREAS, Sergeant Deon Taylor grew 22 up in the Bronx, New York, dreaming about 23 making a difference in other people's lives. 24 25 According to his grandmother, Shirley Taylor,

'he always wanted to be a cop, ever since he 1 2 was a little boy he always wanted to help'; 3 and 4 "WHEREAS, Sergeant Deon Taylor went 5 to high school in Lewiston, Maine, where he was a notable athlete. After high school, he 6 7 joined the New York Army National Guard in 8 1997 and was based with the 27th Brigade 9 Combat Team in Syracuse. He later transferred 10 to the 1st Battalion, 258th Field Artillery in the Bronx; and 11 "WHEREAS, In 2003 Sergeant Deon 12 Taylor graduated from Old Westbury College in 13 14 Long Island with a degree in sociology and 15 criminology. He joined in New York Police Department in 2005 as a transit cop, and a 16 17 year later he was promoted to the Narcotics 18 Division in Brooklyn; and 19 "WHEREAS, Sergeant Deon Taylor 20 faced danger daily as an undercover narcotics 21 operative. Police Commissioner Raymond Kelly 22 said 'Deon Taylor made a difference in his 23 short time on the force. He took the most dangerous drugs off the streets, along with 24 25 obtaining crucial evidence that led to search

warrants. He did it all while remaining 1 2 modest, polite and respectful of others'; and 3 "WHEREAS, Sergeant Deon Taylor was 4 a dedicated family man who lived upstate with 5 his 8-year-old son, DaRue. He was truly a devoted, hands-on father. He also cared for б 7 his mother, Pamela; and 8 "WHEREAS, Sergeant Deon Taylor was a fire-direction specialist, zeroing in on 9 10 terrorist targets when he was killed in 11 Western Afghanistan on October 22, 2008, just 12 as he was nearing the end of his deployment 13 and planning an August wedding to his fiancee, 14 Caitlin Casey. Sergeant Deon Taylor 15 courageously served his city at home and his nation abroad; and 16 "WHEREAS, This Legislative Body is 17 18 moved with great respect and reverent esteem, and on behalf of all of the citizens of the 19 20 Empire State, to renew its tribute to the men and women of New York State who so 21 22 courageously served their state and nation in defense of freedom and democracy; now, 23 therefore, be it 24 25 "RESOLVED, That this Legislative

Body pause in its deliberations to honor 1 2 Sergeant Deon L. Taylor posthumously upon the occasion of his designation for special 3 4 recognition by the New York Army National 5 Guard; and be it further "RESOLVED, That a copy of this, б 7 suitably engrossed, be transmitted to Sergeant 8 Taylor's parents, Leon and Pamela." 9 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 10 Senator Hassell-Thompson. SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank 11 you, Mr. President. 12 I rise to thank this body for 13 14 allowing this resolution to be read in its 15 entirety. The parents of Deon Taylor are from 16 my district, and they are so pleased tonight 17 18 that the Governor is going to honor his memory at the African-American recognition ceremony. 19 20 And I wanted to be able to present this resolution on behalf of the State Senate, 21 in thanks to him for the life that he lived 22 23 and for the service that he gave to his country and certainly to the State of 24 25 New York. He made us proud.

So I thank you, Mr. President, for 1 2 allowing me to opportunity to address his 3 memory and to congratulate his family on being 4 the recipient of this award posthumously. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Thank б you, Senator Hassell-Thompson. 7 Senator Larkin, on the resolution. 8 SENATOR LARKIN: Thank you, Mr. President. 9 10 And I want to thank Senator Hassell-Thompson for putting this resolution 11 12 in. Too often we forget that young men 13 14 and women are sent daily on a mission in 15 harm's way. I see our good Deputy Minority Leader looking here; he can tell you his own 16 experience with his brothers. His brother was 17 18 a very well decorated Vietnam veteran, highly decorated, Silver Star and others. 19 20 But this is a case of a young man that we're seeing on a regular basis. 21 Last weekend there were eight Americans that were 22 23 killed. There was a NATO group killed. And, you know, sometimes we as individuals and as 24 25 group fail to sit and take a moment and

reflect on what commitment these young people 1 2 have made for this great country of ours. 3 If you look at Senator McDonald, 4 combat veteran, Vietnam, Cambodia. And then 5 we have young kids today, Iraq and Afghanistan, some of them on their third and б 7 fourth time. They've been wounded the first 8 time, maybe the second time. But on the third and fourth, the mailman comes up and says 9 10 "Your son was killed in action." 11 It isn't an easy thing. We don't 12 sometimes grasp what the nation we have is 13 doing and how we're treating our young people. 14 This is a National Guard person. A lot of 15 people say to me, Well, the National Guard, well, they're not in combat. Listen, I 16 remember them in combat in World War II and in 17 18 Korea and in Vietnam. This is a young life that has been 19 20 taken away from us. And you never really understand it. 21 22 My first killed in action was August the 4th, 2:30, 1950. I will never 23 forget it. And some commander of Taylor's 24 25 group will never forget it. And we as a body

should never forget.
