(Whereupon, the assemblage recited 6 7 the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.) 8 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: If we could now bow our heads as we have our 9 10 invocation today by William Francis Murphy, the Bishop of the Diocese of Rockville Centre. 11 12 BISHOP MURPHY: Senator Robach, 13 thank you so very much. 14 It's an honor and privilege for me 15 to be here with you today representing the Catholic Bishops of New York State, who have 16 been here visiting with many people from 17 18 around our state, and our Catholic families, to speak with you and with others about the 19 20 important work that you do. And know that we pray for you every 21 22 But today it's my high honor to be able to pray with you as you inaugurate this 23 session of the State Senate. 24 25 I come from Rockville Centre, and

I'm the Catholic Bishop there. And as you all know, the State Senator is a good Greek

13	SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: There's a
14	report of the Finance Committee at the desk
15	dealing with four nominations. And I would
16	request permission to have those nominations
17	read.
18	ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: The

20	THE SECRETARY: Senator
21	DeFrancisco, from the Committee on Finance,
22	reports the following nominations.
23	As the Commissioner of the New York
24	State Department of Environmental
25	Conservation, Joseph J. Martens, of Glenmont.

ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Senator 1 2 DeFrancisco. 3 SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: I stand to 4 proudly move the nomination of Joseph J. 5 Martens for the position of Commissioner of 6 the New York State Department of Environmental 7 Conservation. 8 He appeared before not only the 9 Environmental Conservation Committee but the 10 Finance Committee, was unanimously recommended before this full body. And having moved his 11 nomination, I would ask the chair or the 12 president to recognize Senator Grisanti, the 13 chairman of the Committee on Environmental 14 15 Conservation to second the nomination. ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: То 16 second the confirmation, Senator Grisanti. 17 18 SENATOR GRISANTI: Yes, thank you, Mr. President. 19 20 I stand today to put forward to my 21 friends and colleagues the nomination of 22 Joseph Martens as the next Commissioner of the 23 New York State Department of Environmental Conservation. 24 25 I have met with Commissioner

Martens numerous times. He has gone through
the EnCon Committee with overwhelming,
unanimous support. He has an impressive
resume, numerous achievements and
accomplishments, and I believe he will enhance
the department.

He understands the challenges that lie ahead, and I believe he will be open to making sure that the department is more business-friendly, that regulation enhance business, not deter it, and that permits will be issued on a fast track and an overall better efficiency will be seen in the department as a whole.

I believe Commissioner Martens will be a strong voice for the environmental stewardship and for the preservation and enhancement of New York's natural resources.

As I said, he will be receptive to input on both sides of the aisle. I encourage you, if you have issues, to contact his offices.

And he has an understanding of the issues, and I have full confidence and I second the nomination.

And I also want to recognize he is

here with his wife, Katherine, and his three 1 children, Marcelle, Julia and Liam. 2 Again, I second the nomination. 3 4 Thank you. 5 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Thank 6 you, Senator Grisanti. 7 Senator Breslin. 8 SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you, Mr. President. 9 10 I rise to second and praise the nomination of Joe Martens to become 11 Commissioner of Environmental Conservation. 12 Anyone who observed the reactions 13 to this nomination across this state would be 14 15 truly unbelieving. From business interests, everybody praised the outstanding work that 16 he's done in his past and were delighted with 17 18 his nomination. From environmental groups, the same kinds of comments. And isn't that 19 the true middle part, when everybody applauds 20 21 a nomination. And I look forward to Joe Martens 22 being the most exceptional Commissioner of 23 Environmental Conservation this state has ever 24 25 known. And I wish him every success, and

1 hello to his family.

only on the permitting process of natural gas 1 2 drilling hopefully someday in this state, but along with all of the other key environmental 3 4 issues that are important to this state. 5 So I stand on this floor to give 6 Mr. Martens my support and wish him the very 7 best. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Senator Little on the nomination. 9 10 SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you, Mr. President. 11 I would be remiss if I didn't stand 12 and commend the Governor for his selection of 13 Joe Martens for the Commissioner of 14 Environmental Conservation. Joe has worked 15 with the Olympic Regional Development 16 Authority as chairman of that organization for 17 18 a few years, has done a great job there, certainly knows the North Country. 19 20 But more impressive than anything is his belief that the environment and the 21 economy can both be considerations when we're 22 working on many of these issues and 23 24 regulations. 25 So I look forward to working with

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him, I congratulate him and his family, and

Mattox to be Commissioner of the Department of Taxation. 21 22 This is not an easy job to fill, and this is not an easy time to fill it. I don't envy 23 24 you. I would urge the Governor to supply you 25 with State Police protection so that you don't

have -- I'm just kidding. 1 2 The gentleman is well-qualified. 3 He has a substantial background. He knows the 4 issues, knows it well, speaks well, is in my 5 mind a good person. I commend the Governor for this nomination and look forward to 6 7 working with him to help make a very difficult 8 job as easy as it could possibly be to better 9 the interests of the citizens of the State of 10 New York. 11 Congratulations. Mr. President, I second this 12 nomination. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: 14 Thank 15 you, Senator Marcellino. Are there any other Senators 16 wishing to be heard on the nomination? 17 18 If there are none, the question is on the nomination of Thomas H. 16	nomination of Joan M. McDonald as Commissioner
17	of the Department of Transportation.
18	Again, the Transportation
19	Department unanimously recommended her
20	approval, as did the Finance Committee.
21	Actually, today was very boring.
22	We should have more controversial candidates
23	than ones that are so highly qualified that
24	pass without much discussion. But I assume
25	that may happen someday, but not today.

We're proud to have these highly 1 2 qualified candidates. And I'd ask you to recognize Senator Fuschillo to second the 3 nomination. 4 5 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Fuschillo. 6 7 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: Thank you 8 very much, Mr. President and Chairman 9 DeFrancisco. 10 The Transportation Committee, as mentioned, did meet this morning. And it 11 12 wasn't boring, because we had a candidate that was highly qualified. And she brings 13 14 extensive experience in economic development 15 and transportation to the State of New York, and we complimented her on her willingness to 16 serve the people of New York State. 17 18 There are so many issues that are facing New York State with respect to 19 20 transportation, and we brought some of them

And it was mentioned 4 in the committee today, Mr. President, about 5 some of the regions that are literally being shortchanged -- Region 5 was mentioned 6 7 repeatedly, over and over, in the meeting 8 today -- but all regions. And we need 9 clarification on exactly what the regions are 10 getting. One of the things that I admired 11 12 most about Joan McDonald was her statement 13 today about how vital and critically important it is that we improve our infrastructure here 14 15 in New York State to get our economy going. We need to get this state back on the right 16 direction. 17 18 And I believe she is the most qualified individual to serve as the 19 20 Commissioner of Transportation in the State of New York, and I happily second her nomination. 21 22 Thank you, Mr. President. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator

SENATOR ROBACH: Yes,

Robach.

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Mr. President, let me too rise to cast my vote in the affirmative and applaud the Governor for this nomination.

Transportation is critically important anywhere in the state, especially in upstate New York. And I can attest to just last evening at 7 o'clock, I was on a conference call with the then Acting Commissioner, soon to be Commissioner, in order to work on a project, try to have some flexibility.

We're working together to make a big transportation work in our area that will not only be beneficial to transportation but to economic development and growth efforts of both Rochester Institute of Technology and the University of Rochester and of the traffic pattern. We very much look forward to working with you, Commissioner-to-be McDonald, and especially as it pertains to the Western New York community and Region 5.

And just to touch on what's already been touched on before, without pontificating, Region 5 has lost out on hundreds of millions of dollars in economic development because of a human error that occurred in the past. We

as a committee, we as a Western New York
delegation of Democrats and Republicans are

The Tourism Committee, as Senator

DeFrancisco spoke, met with Rose Harvey and,

through discussion about the issues that we

consider important in regard to Parks,

Recreation and Historic Preservation,

unanimously support the Governor's nomination

to this office.

Rose Harvey brings an education in forestry and environmental studies as well as work on various board of directors and advisory boards all dealing with forestry, open space, and natural resources. She has a lifelong appreciation of natural resources and open space and has spent her career working in the development of parks. She has raised the funding, designed the parks -- particularly urban parks in New York City, Newark and Baltimore -- throughout her career and has received many awards for her work in doing so.

She also understands that New York State's situation right now is not in the

development of new parks but in the 1 2 maintenance and keeping the accessibility of 3 the parks that we have and providing good 4 stewardship. 5 Most impressive in our discussions has been Rose Harvey's interest in working 6 7 with public/private partnerships in the 8 development of raising funds and interest so 9 that things can be done in this area. And she 10 has many ideas as to how, going forward, we can improve our parks, rehabilitate some areas 11 12 that certainly need to have some rehabilitation and some work done on them. 13 14 And it's with a great deal of 15 enthusiasm that I wholeheartedly second the nomination of Rose Harvey as the Commissioner 16 of Parks, Recreation and Historic 17 18 Preservation. 19 Thank you. 20 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 21 you, Senator Little. 22 Senator Serrano on the nomination. 23 SENATOR SERRANO: Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 I want to thank all of the members

here for voting to support this nomination.

And I want to echo the words of the chair of the Parks Committee, Senator Betty Little:

Yes, this is an outstanding nominee.

I had the good fortune of meeting with her yesterday and also listening to her speak today in committee. And she has such a strong grasp and such a full understanding of the importance of parks and how important they are for all of us here in the State of New York.

Last year we had what I believe and many agree was a wonderful situation where both sides of the aisle, regardless if we were Democrat or Republican, all worked together to ensure that state parks stayed open. We were facing some very devastating budget cuts.

The parks are a huge economic generator, but I think, more importantly, it's apparent that parks have a very transformative effect on people, on families, they give opportunity for people to have recreation.

And they just add so much to the lives of New Yorkers. They very much are the crown jewel of the State of New York.

And I feel very excited about the 1 2 ideas that Commissioner Harvey would put forth, and excited to work with her and under 3 4 the leadership of Senator Little on the 5 committee as we face the challenges that are ahead for us. But again, a wonderful 6 7 selection, and I look forward to voting for 8 her. 9 Thank you. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank 11 you, Senator Serrano. Senator Fuschillo. 12 SENATOR FUSCHILLO: 13 Thank you 14 very much, Mr. President. 15 Let me compliment Governor Cuomo once again for a well-qualified nominee. 16 impressed me greatly today when she talked 17 18 being Jones Beach, which I represent. I've always said that's the jewel of the parks 19 20 system. And she's already been surfing at Jones Beach, which I think is wonderful. 21 22 And I just want to emphasize what 23 Senator Marcellino had said in the Finance Committee, that it seems like the parks 24 25 throughout this state are the first to go when there's cuts and when there's deficits. And we know the economic impact to New York State by the visitors. And just in Jones Beach alone there's over 8 million visitors during the summer season. We know how critically important it is to the economy of New York State.

I want to emphasize what I said in the committee to Ms. Harvey. We can't afford any more cuts, especially in Jones Beach, as I stated, which is in my district.

I wish you well. You are well qualified. And you certainly have my support. Best of luck to you.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Marcellino.

SENATOR MARCELLINO: Thank you,
Mr. President.

I just wanted to thank not only

Ms. Harvey but all of the other commissioners

who have accepted the Governor's call to serve

the state. These are not easy times. The

economy is bad, the state's in deficit, we

have economic problems, cuts are everywhere,

everybody is pushing, everybody is trying

preserve and protect their own areas. So it's not easy. The tasks running the DEC,
Taxation, Parks and the DOT will not be easy jobs.

So again, I remember the Governor saying earlier in the year that he was finding it difficult to get highly qualified people willing to take on these responsibilities because of the difficulty of the times and the difficulty it poses in serving in the public venue. People have a tendency to look at their government and throw brickbats. They throw rocks. You don't usually get a thank you for what you do. You generally get yelled at.

Well, let me thank you for your service, thank you for your courage and your willingness to put your lives on hold, as your families will soon find out that you will no longer be theirs, that they will have to share you with the people of the State of New York. And the members in this chamber and the other house will probably be demanding a lot of your time and attention and calling you to meetings and asking you for your help in solving local

1 problems.

I urge you never to forget the greater good that you're doing, and that is to serve the people of this great state. While these may be difficult times now, we will get through this. And we will get through this a lot quicker because of people like yourselves who are willing to serve.

So once again, thank you, and God bless you and Godspeed.

11 ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator
12 Farley.

SENATOR FARLEY: Thank you,
Mr. President.

I rise in support of this commissioner because, you know, last year -- and I've been here 35 years -- I never saw such an outpouring of support for an issue than the possible closure of the parks. The people of this state absolutely rose up and said that cannot happen. And every legislator of both parties and in both houses rose to defend our parks. You are in charge of an area that the people of New York State demand that we protect and keep open.

I also want to put in a plug for 1 2 the Homes of Historical Preservation, which 3 are very, very modest in the cost to keep them 4 operating but are tremendous tourist providers 5 for economic development. And I know that we have a commissioner here that is going to look 6 7 out and monitor one of the areas that the 8 people of this state absolutely insist be 9 supported. 10 And I support you. Good luck. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Senator Gallivan. 12 SENATOR GALLIVAN: 13 Thank you, Mr. President. 14 15 I also rise to support the nomination of Rose Harvey as Commissioner of 16 Parks. We know the importance of the parks to 17 18 our citizens across the state, from Jones Beach to the western end of the state where 19 20 the district is that I represent. We have 21 seen the problems over the years, particularly 22 last year through this challenging budget 23 year. 24 Rose Harvey certainly comes very 25 well qualified. I was thoroughly impressed,

impressed with her eagerness, her background, 1 her willingness to take this effort on, and 2 her commitment to work with us to keep the 3 4 parks open. 5 So to the new commissioner, I wish you the best of luck. I look forward to 6 7 working with you to protect and preserve the 8 assets of our state that are important to so many of the citizens. 9 10 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: 11 Senator Larkin. 12 SENATOR LARKIN: 13 Thank you, 14 Mr. President. 15 You know, my colleague from Long Island, Carl, stole my thunder. 16 But, you know, today we're looking 17 18 for people who want to accept the challenges the four of you have done here. And we're 19 20 looking for you to give us guidance and help and help the Governor and help the people of 21 the State of New York. And each and every one 22 of you have something special to offer. 23 My newfound friend from DOT and my 24 25 newfound friend from Parks and Rec, we have a

challenge, we have a tremendous challenge in this area. As has been said here before, last year there were parks going to be open, parks going to be closed, parks this, parks that.

Nobody knew what was going on.

But with your talent and looking at your backgrounds, we're blessed. This is not an easy task to take on. There's no money you can just throw out there and make everybody happy with. You're going to make decisions that some of us will be saying, I thought she liked me or he liked me.

But what's most important is you said I accept this challenge, and I will show you that I'm capable of doing it. And based on what we heard from you today, we're blessed in the State of New York. And God bless you all.

And when a member has the floor, whether it's Senator Breslin or myself, we 14 don't need to hear other members coaching us 15 along. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 17 18 Senator Libous, you have risen, as I said, properly on a point of order, and your point 19 20 of order is well-taken. 21 Senator Breslin, let me -- Senator Breslin, let me finish. 22 23 SENATOR BRESLIN: We are not arguing the Rules report itself. We are here 24 25 procedurally.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Breslin, I am speaking. I will get to you in a moment.

I'm speaking on Senator Libous's point of order, and I am stating that the point of order is well-taken. Because the consideration pursuant to Rule 2 involving the Committee on Rules says the reception and consideration of its report shall always be in order.

The Rules report that is before the house concerns one bill. It doesn't concern a petition, it doesn't concern anything other than the Power for Jobs bill that was passed out of the Rules Committee. Therefore, Senator Breslin, Senator Libous's point of order is well-taken. And your comments, should you wish to comment on the acceptance of the Rules report, should be constrained to the parameters of the Power for Jobs bill.

SENATOR BRESLIN: I appeal the ruling of the chair and ask to be heard on that ruling.

that here in this chamber. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 3 Senator Breslin, the points that you are 4 raising have nothing to do with the Power for 5 Jobs bill that was reported out of the Rules Committee. 6 7 You are raising points that were 8 not properly before the Rules Committee. 9 There was a petition that was not properly 10 before the Rules Committee which was made very clear during the Rules Committee. The subject 11 12 of the Rules report that we are discussing here relates to one bill concerning Power for 13 14 Jobs. 15 We are on your appeal of the ruling of the chair. Do you wish to continue to be 16 heard on that? 17 18 SENATOR BRESLIN: I will defer 19 to --20 SENATOR GIANARIS: I wish to 21 speak on the appeal. 22 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 23 Senator Gianaris on the appeal. SENATOR GIANARIS: 24 Thank you, 25 Mr. President.

On the appeal of the ruling of the

chair, I'm confounded by your determination

that the Rules Committee, which produced the

one-bill report, is therefore stifling the

debate on this floor to that one bill, when

the Rules Committee that produced the report

produced that report in error.

There is a violation of Senate rules going on right now on this floor because a petition pursuant to Rule 7, Section 4 was presented to the committee properly, with the requisite number of signatures. The Rules Committee did not consider that petition, as required by the Senate rules, and the report that came out of that Rules Committee therefore is in error and we are on sound ground to challenge that report -- not because we're talking or not talking about the Power for Jobs bill, but because the report that produced it was done in complete contravention of the Senate rules.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Gianaris, the report of the Rules

Committee is properly before this house. The substance and the manner of that report is

consistent with what occurred in the committee.

The petition that you speak to that was presented to the committee was not properly presented to the committee and therefore is not part of the Rules report that came out of the committee. So the Rules report that is before this house right now is properly before the house, and it is limited to the one bill that was contained in that agenda.

Should you wish to speak to that, your points would be well-taken and in order. If you're speaking on appealing the ruling of the chair, you should limit your comments to the substance of the Rules report, which is the Power for Jobs bill.

SENATOR GIANARIS: But,

Mr. President, I'm appealing the ruling of the chair that the debate should be limited to the Power for Jobs bill, and you cannot silence me on that issue by your ruling. I'm appealing your decision, and therefore I can speak to the reasons I'm appealing --

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Gianaris, we are now dealing with 1 Senator Breslin's appealing of the ruling of 2 the chair. Should you wish to pursue a 3 4 separate appeal, then you can do so on a different occasion. 5 SENATOR GIANARIS: 6 Mr. President, 7 I am speaking on Senator Breslin's appealing 8 of the ruling of the chair. 9 I believe the ruling of the chair 10 is out of order. And I wish to speak on the fact that this is a continuation of a pattern 11 of behavior we've seen from the Senate 12 Majority -- and I for one do not intend to let 13 it continue -- where there is delay, there is 14 15 lack of sponsorship on proposals that are before the Senate. 16 This has become anything but a 17 18 democratic institution. We are here to discuss a number of issues that the public 19 20 asked us for, and the Senate Majority has continued to stifle the debate. That is what 21 22 you're trying to do again right here on the Senate floor. 23 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 24 25 Senator -- Senator --

I will not be 1 SENATOR GIANARIS: 2 silenced, Mr. President. I will not be 3 silenced. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 5 Senator Gianaris, I have the floor. The points that you are raising are 6 7 not germane to the Rules report. Should you 8 wish to speak about those types of issues, you may do so outside of here. If you want to 9 10 hold a press conference, do something to that 11 effect, you are perfectly entitled to do that. 12 But we are confining our components of this discussion to the germane aspects of the bill 13 that came out of the Rules Committee. 14 15 SENATOR GIANARIS: But, Mr. President --16 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Τf 17 18 you wish to speak about procedure and sponsorship, that's a separate subject for a 19 20 separate occasion. SENATOR GIANARIS: 21 Mr. President, 22 it's my understanding that when I'm appealing your ruling I get to discuss the reasons why 23 24 I'm appealing it. You can make your ruling, 25 and we can vote on whether the house agrees or

1	disagrees with
2	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: To
3	the extent that they are germane to the topic
4	that's before the house.
5	SENATOR GIANARIS: Well, then I
6	appeal your ruling as to whether it's germane.
7	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Well,
8	then you're going to have to wait, because
9	we're still on the appeal by Senator Breslin.
10	SENATOR GIANARIS: I'll be happy
11	to wait my turn.
12	SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr.
13	President
14	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Call
15	the roll.
16	SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President,
17	on the appeal.
18	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:
19	Senator Squadron.
20	SENATOR SQUADRON: Thank you,
21	Mr. President.
22	On the appeal of the ruling of the
23	chair that Senator Breslin put forward, let me
24	ask you, as an understanding of your ruling
25	before we vote on the appeal, what is the

purpose of a vote on whether or not to accept the report of the Rules Committee? If the purpose is, as you suggest, only to talk about the bill itself, is it simply an additional hour of debate on the bill itself? Or is it about something coming out of the Rules Committee, Mr. President?

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Squadron, I would refer back to a rule that was cited by Senator Breslin in a separate section, and by me as well: Section 2, the Committee on Rules.

The adoption of the Rules report is always in order, and its reception and consideration is always in order. I am constrained by speaking to the Rules report that was delivered to the full Senate for its consideration. The issues that Senator Breslin is raising are not part of that Rules report. The petition that was presented to the Rules Committee was not properly before the Rules Committee and was so ruled.

So we are speaking to the sum and the substance of what came out of the Rules Committee, the report concerning Power for

Jobs. Should you wish to be heard on that, that would be germane to the argument before the house.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, on your ruling, on the appeal of your ruling, which is where we are at the moment, citing the rule that is now bouncing back and forth around this chamber, the reception and consideration of its report shall always be in order. Debate on its adoption, debate on its adoption shall not exceed one hour.

Senator Breslin was bringing up a debate on its adoption based on the absolute flouting of the procedural rules of the Rules Committee, making this report completely flawed because there is an inability in the Rules Committee to debate a fundamental issue in this state that was in fact in order.

Senator Breslin was bringing that up.

And the rule that you cite, again, the reception and consideration of the report -- which is what we're doing now, receiving it and considering it -- shall always be in order.

The adoption, debate on the

adoption shall not exceed one hour. That's all Senator Breslin was saying.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Squadron, you are 50 percent correct. You are correct that there is a legitimate debate on its adoption. But the adoption and its debate centers around what is contained in that Rules report, not what is not contained in that Rules report.

So if you would like to speak to that, if you are uncomfortable with what happened in the Rules Committee, I am constrained in ruling on what is in the Rules report by the parameters of that report and not any other extraneous factors.

We have before us the Rules report, which was one bill, was properly considered by the Rules Committee, and is now properly before this house.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, just to make sure I understand you, you are saying that anything that is not in fact in the report may not be debated, so therefore all that can be debated is that which the Rules Committee approves?

This house in total, those members 1 2 who are not on the Rules Committee have no place, no right to say this Rules Committee, 3 4 with all of the powers that are imbued to it 5 in this house -- often too many, including putting in a bill that no one can cosponsor --6 7 all of those powers cannot be questioned by 8 the members of this house? 9 If they are shut down in the Rules 10 Committee, they will be shut down here on the floor because there is no room on this floor 11 12 to debate the process by which Rules Committee bills jump through all of the hoops that are 13 14 put in place to protect the people, to create 15 transparency -- those do not matter at the point that the Rules Committee has adopted its 16 17 report? 18 SENATOR LIBOUS: Excuse me, Mr. President. 19 20 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 21 Senator Squadron, excuse me. Senator Libous, why do you rise? 22 23 SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you, Mr. President. And Senator Squadron, please 24 25 bear with me.

I believe Senator Breslin has appealed the ruling of the chair. Now, we have often given members an opportunity to speak on the appeal. Senator Squadron is not speaking specifically to the appeal, he is talking about a procedure that didn't take place in a committee meeting.

So I would ask that he speak specifically to the appeal of the chair, which has to do with the appealing of the Rules report which is before us, and the Power for Jobs bill, which is the Governor's program bill. It has nothing to do with a lecture on how the committee system works here in the Senate or whether or not the clerk refused to accept the petition that never made it before the committee.

So we are on that appeal, and I would hope that we could stick to the appeal. I am all for the members of the other side of the aisle to express their views on Senator Breslin's appeal, not a lecture on how things should go through committee.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Thank you, Senator Libous. Your points are

well-taken.

Senator Squadron, please confine your comments to the bill that is contained in the Rules report that is before the house.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Well, Senator

Libous -- and I may not have been clear

enough, so thank you for pointing that out. I

do strive to be as clear as I'm able to be.

Mr. President, the debate at the moment is in fact on the ruling that you made and whether it's in order or out of order, based on the fact that Senator Breslin was trying to discuss whether the report that the Majority would like to put before the house is properly being put before the house.

And so the discussion we were having was on the appeal of your ruling that if the words "Power for Jobs" do not define all the discussion around this report -- not the debate on the bill, around this report -- that it would be out of order. So -- and I believe we have a half hour on that motion.

So to continue, the report of the Rules Committee was out of order because the meeting that provided that report was not

properly run because it did not allow for the debate on a very important petition. That was improper. Senator Breslin would like to debate whether or not to adopt the report of the Rules Committee on that basis.

And you, Mr. President, ruled that debating the appropriate adoption of that report is out of order in this house, that instead, in a new and I believe novel reading --

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Squadron -- Senator Squadron, I have indulged your comments, and I certainly respect your passion on the issue.

I have not said anything to that effect concerning the adoption of the Rules report. What I have said is that debate on the adoption of that Rules report is in order, consistent with what is contained in that Rules report. If there were 12 bills in that Rules report, every one of them would be germane for discussion, for consideration before this body. Things that are not contained in that report are not germane.

SENATOR SQUADRON: The Rules

report is produced by a meeting of the Rules

Committee. Let me ask you this. If there was
a meeting of the Rules Committee that was
clearly -- that did not have a quorum, let's
say, an improper meeting of the Rules

Committee, and that report was brought before
the house, would it be proper to debate
whether that was in fact a meeting of the
Rules Committee in talking about the adoption,
or would you have to talk about the bills that
were inappropriately placed on that Rules
report, Mr. President?

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Squadron, I am not going to deal in hypotheticals. I'm dealing with the facts that are before this house. And if you wish to speak any further on appealing the ruling of the chair, you're entitled to do so. I would caution that we are rapidly approaching a half an hour and we will be soon actually voting on the appeal advanced by Senator Breslin.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Well,

Mr. President, I assume certainly that if there were an improper or fraudulent meeting

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of the Rules Committee -- one, for example,

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 16 Senator Libous, your point of order is 17 18 well-taken. All those in, excuse me, in favor of overruling the chair --19 20 SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, 21 there's a 30-minute debate on each side of 22 this appeal. We have not hit 30 minutes in 23 favor of the appeal. And I'm debating the 24 appeal. 25 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Squadron -- Senator Libous, bear with me for a moment --

SENATOR LIBOUS: Sure.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: -- if you wish to speak to the content of the Rules report and the substance of the Power for Jobs bill, fine.

If you're going to continue to speak in a non-germane fashion concerning other factors not properly before this house, we will move to an immediate vote on the appeal of the ruling of the chair.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, under Rule 3, Section D, I am able to debate the appeal of the ruling of the chair for a half-hour on each side. I would argue that Senator Libous's comments as well as your own have been in terms of not rejecting the ruling of the chair. Senator Gianaris, Senator Breslin, Senator Hassell-Thompson and myself have spoken in favor of overruling the ruling of the chair.

And I do not believe we have reached a half-hour. I believe that is the point at which we can call for a vote on this.

1	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

4	chair, your comments must be germane to the
5	content of the Rules report before the house.

11	sorry, Senator Squadron, I could not hear the
12	last part of what you said.

14	what authority are you muzzling this portion
15	of the debate based
16	SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President,
17	point of order. Point of order.
18	SENATOR SQUADRON: based on it
19	supposedly not being germane?
20	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:
21	Senator Squadron Senator Libous, why do you
22	rise?
23	SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you,
24	Mr. President.
25	Senator Squadron, the President

ruled Senator Breslin's motion out of order. Senator Breslin then appealed the ruling of the chair. You are not debating his appeal of the ruling of the chair. We are to take the ruling of the chair appeal -- sir, if I may -- to a vote. Then you may stand when the motion is before the house whether or not to accept the Rules report.

Mr. President is not muzzling anyone. We are on a motion that Senator -- he appealed, your leader appealed the ruling of the chair. Therefore, we take that to a vote. Then, if it passes or doesn't pass, we will be on the motion itself as to whether or not to accept the Rules report. And I'm sure that the President would be more than happy to listen to your argument.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, to be clear, we are, as Senator Libous says, and we are in full agreement -- there's one item on which we are in full agreement in this house at the moment, I believe, which is that we are currently debating the ruling of the chair. We are debating the appeal that Senator Breslin put forward on the ruling of

the chair.

The issue is that at the point at which we get to the debate on accepting or rejecting the report of the Rules Committee, at the point that we get there, we must have the ability to debate that issue in its full -- all of the topics related to that issue, not simply, as Mr. President seems to have suggested, the bill itself that's contained within that report.

So, Senator Libous, if by unanimous consent we can agree that such debate will go on under the rules, as it would, a half-hour on one side, a half-hour on the other, and that we can talk about any topics relating to the Rules report, we would be happy to move beyond this appeal, on unanimous consent, and move on to that debate.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Libous.

SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, I believe he's asking me a question. And the answer to that question is absolutely not, because the rules before the house say that the subject matter needs to be germane to what

1 is before the house.

The President just made it very clear. Before this house was the reading of the report from the Rules Committee in which a bill is on that report by Senator Maziarz. The bill is the Power for Jobs bill, which is being introduced by the Governor. Okay?

Your leadership stood up and objected to the reading of the Rules report. We then let your leadership speak on that. But what happened was he didn't speak about the Power for Jobs. He, like you, sir, began speaking about procedures outside of this chamber that have to do with rules and other things.

Right now we would be more than happy to give you an opportunity to speak on the objection of the ruling of the chair as it pertains to the Rules report as it pertains to the Power for Jobs. Mr. President is suggesting that anything else is not germane. And I think that's pretty clear. I don't know how anyone could not understand that.

SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr.

President --

1	SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Point
2	of order. Point of order, Mr. Chairman.

If in the Rules Committee, once 13 it was called to order and Senator Breslin was 14 15 called upon in that Rules Committee meeting, he was allowed to bring up a subject, if the 16 subject -- however the result of that subject 17 18 was taken, that was -- should have been a part of what is reported as a part of the Rules 19 20 Committee. Therefore, we are in contention 21 22 that everything that comes before that Rules 23 Committee, until such time as that Rules Committee has been adjourned, should be 24

considered as part of the report that is given

to the desk. That is my appeal. 1 2 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Thank 3 you, Senator Hassell-Thompson. 4 Your point of order is not a point 5 of order. You were actually being heard on the appealing of the ruling of the chair. 6 7 All those in favor of --8 SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, 9 on the appeal. 10 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 11 Senator Squadron. 12 SENATOR SQUADRON: Look, Mr. President, we are fairly far down the 13 14 rabbit hole here. We are debating an appeal 15 on a debate about the report of a committee that most people in this state have never 16 heard of. 17 18 What we really should be doing -and again, I would offer to Senator Libous and 19 20 to my colleagues on both sides of the aisle, let's get unanimous consent that we're not 21 22 going to have an absurdly limited debate on this Rules report. Let's get unanimous 23 consent we're going to be talking on this 24 25 Rules report in terms of the process of the

1	Rules Committee in terms of the ways in which
2	we got this Rules report.
3	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:
4	Senator Senator Squadron
5	SENATOR SQUADRON: Let's get
6	unanimous consent

9	Rules report, and I Senator Breslin, I have
10	great respect for you not only as a member but
11	as the floor leader. If in some fashion I cut
12	you off from debate, accept my apology.
13	Should you wish to be the final speaker on the
14	appeal of the ruling of the chair, so be it.
15	Senator Breslin.
16	SENATOR BRESLIN: Yes, the final

If you wish to continue to go down 13 14 the path of speaking about matters that were 15 not properly before the Rules Committee, I will rule you out of order and continue to say 16 17 that your comments are non-germane. 18 SENATOR BRESLIN: I think I will rest my case. I think to the public and the 19 20 State of New York it's quite obvious what's happened here. You have silenced us. 21 Mr. President. 22 SENATOR LIBOUS: 23 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

I am not speaking about the 13 14 appeal Senator Breslin made. I am speaking 15 about the chair's ruling as to what we can discuss as it pertains to that appeal. 16 17 is a wholly separate issue. 18 You, at your own suggestion, had me sit down previously with the assurance that I 19 20 would have the opportunity to issue my own 21 appeal and have that discussion in due time. I waited patiently. The -- there was a -- the 22 appeal was concluded. And I now have issued 23 my separate appeal as you directed me to do. 24 25 Now you're telling me that I can't

speak on the exact issue you asked me to wait to speak on. How is that fair, Mr. Chair?

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Gianaris, I am being consistent. We had a motion before the house, there was an appeal of the ruling of the chair, and there was debate and a vote was taken. We are now on a motion to accept the Rules report.

Senator Gianaris, let me finish.

You are absolutely right, I did say that if
you had an appeal that you would like to make
on the ruling of the chair, that you could
make it at the appropriate time.

However, you have now gotten up and enlightened me as to what the context of that appeal was, and it is 100 percent consistent with what Senator Breslin advocated. And therefore I have listened to what you have to say, and I'm making a rule that you are out of order and what we should be properly discussing before the house is the acceptance of the Rules report.

SENATOR GIANARIS: Then with respect, Mr. President, I would like to move to appeal your order that I am out of order.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

You've already appealed that, and it's already been ruled on --

SENATOR GIANARIS: I have not.

You have just told me my appeal was the same
as Senator Breslin's. He did not appeal your
ruling that I was out of order. He was
appealing your ruling as it pertained to the
Rules report. I am appealing your order that
I am out of order in having this discussion.

And I'm entitled to speak on that,
Mr. President. No matter how many times you
try and stop me, I'm entitled to speak on that
on this floor as part of the governmental
process.

I'm an elected member of this body,
Mr. President. I demand to be heard. That is
why I've been sent here. And no matter how
many times you rule me out of order, the rules
permit me to appeal that ruling and discuss
it.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Gianaris, I realize that you, along with the other 61 members, are duly elected members of this body.

I believe that what you've brought 1 2 before the house right now is a dilatory 3 motion, which is inconsistent with the rules 4 of this house, and I am going to tell you that 5 we are going to move on to the motion as to the acceptance of the Rules report. 6 7 Senator Libous. 8 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, 9 I would like to appeal the ruling you just 10 made. At some point I'm entitled to speak in objection to a ruling of the chair. And you 11 12 cannot continue to stop me from doing that. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 14 Senator Gianaris, you are out of order. 15 SENATOR GIANARIS: I would like to appeal the ruling that I'm out of order. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 17 18 Senator Libous. 19 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, 20 I would like to point out that in fact the 21 Rules Committee and the report it produced is 22 no different than the legal doctrine of fruit 23 from the poisonous tree. There was a poisoned Rules Committee meeting --24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President. 24 25 Mr. President --

And you said we 16 17 would get to that. I believe that the person 18 transcribing here could read what she has been typing, which would verify that in fact you 19 said we would get back to the germaneness of 20 21 the point. 22 I'm just trying get a clarification from you, Mr. President. I have heard 23 24 colleagues say that activities that took place 25 in the Rules Committee -- which was on TV, and I was there -- where Senator Breslin attempted to bring a petition to allow a public hearing on redistricting did in fact take place. I don't think it's a debate. There were many colleagues, both sides of the aisle.

In committee, the chair rejected the petition but never explained why or the basis for it. There have been any number of attempts here today to get facts put into the record about what took place in the Rules Committee. And we're simply trying to establish where would you challenge a faulty process in the Rules Committee. I believe that is what Senator Breslin was trying to address, Senator Squadron, and now Senator Gianaris.

So I am asking you as the chair, since you seem to be overruling every appeal, where would the people of New York go to get an answer about when you try to apply the rules of the Senate to petition for a public hearing on any bill? This was an important bill on redistricting. Where would you go to get that resolved if, as we saw tonight, the committee chair, I believe, violated the rules

of the Senate Rules Committee. Then, when they brought their Rules report to the floor, it excluded that information.

And now I am watching a debate go back and forth as to whether it's germane to even raise on the floor when you would go through that process and have a fair hearing about what the rules of the Senate Rules Committee are.

Help me understand this, please.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Krueger, I don't think I'm in a position, nor anyone who stands up here, to be issuing points of clarification. And I'm certainly not going to engage in hypothetical discussions about where one should be going to seek appropriate redress, whether it's at the ballot box or at a press conference or at a public hearing.

I'm going to state this politely for the last time. The Rules report that is before the house contains legislation that was passed by the Rules Committee. That's -- Senator Breslin, let me finish, please. That is the sum and substance of what is before

this body for its consideration. Senator

Breslin had raised that -- no, Senator

Breslin, I will get to you, I promise.

Senator Breslin had raised certain points and appealed a ruling of the chair.

Senator Gianaris at one point had gotten up, and I asked him to wait since I felt at the time that he was issuing a separate effort to appeal the ruling of the chair. We had a debate, we had a discussion, we took a vote and the ruling of the chair was sustained.

Senator Gianaris then got up and raised points that I believed, in my capacity standing here, were exactly the same as Senator Breslin's. Now, he may -- doesn't have to like that ruling. You asked me to tell you what we did. That is, I believe, what we did. I'm not going to get into points of clarification or hypotheticals, as I said.

What we have before us is the acceptance of the Rules report.

SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you.

Again, I don't think it was a clarification.

And I do believe my colleagues are right to appeal the decisions of the chair.

Because if we can't fundamentally get an answer from the President Pro Tem of the Senate how we as elected Senators would be able to challenge what we believe is an incomplete and faulty Rules Committee report on the floor of the Senate, I'm sorry, it is not satisfactory to say "I don't have an answer." And it's not hypothetical, because many of us were in that room. It was on TV. We televise and tape our committee rules.

So you can say it's not in the Rules report being submitted to you as the President Pro Tem. But I can tell you there were a lot of people in the Rules Committee, and we watched exactly what happened. And there was more than one issue brought up in that Rules Committee, and it was the right to have a vote for a public hearing on redistricting. So I think the record does reflect that, and history reflects that.

And so I am sorry that the

President Pro Tem does not actually have any
ability to explain how the rules of the Senate
would be in fact applied, because I think it's
an important issue for us to deal with.

Therefore, 21 22 Senator Squadron's request for a hand count 23 when we vote is not out of order. ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 24 25 Senator Squadron did not make a request for a

hand count. Senator Breslin did, on a vote 1 2 that was taken approximately 15 minutes ago, 3 and we had moved past that. 4 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: That 5 was on -- but that wasn't the process, Mr. Chairman, by which Senator Libous said 6 7 that we were in this process. I think that 8 we've been here a long time, but not too long to keep track of where we are. 9 10 The vote that was taken was on 11 whether or not we supported the chair's 12 ruling. We have not voted yet. Yet Senator Libous called for a vote on the Rules 13 14 Committee. We're suggesting that when that 15 vote is taken, that it be done by a hand vote. That was the request. 16 17 And in case that wasn't clear, I am 18 making that request. And I will ask for other members to stand with me if I need to, to 19 20 support that vote, Mr. Chairman. ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 21 Thank 22 you, Senator Hassell-Thompson. 23 Senator Libous. 24 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, 25 point of order. What -- how can you --

1	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:
2	Senator Gianaris, excuse me. I just
3	recognized Senator Libous.
4	SENATOR GIANARIS: I would like
5	to make a point of order before you take the
6	vote without giving me a chance to make my

21	order, Mr. President, is to inquire whether
22	you have or have not announced the results on
23	the previous appeal of Senator Breslin. I
24	know that the debate on that was shut down
25	several minutes ago, but the results were

never announced. And I believe it's in order 1 2 for a member to request a hand count, since 3 the results were not announced. And we could 4 read the transcript back if --5 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Senator Gianaris, I'm very comfortable that 6 7 you are quite adept at listening. And I made 8 it very clear, after having taken a vote, ayes and nays, that the chair had been sustained. 9 10 If you didn't hear that, then I apologize. But the chair had been sustained, and we moved 11 12 on. And we've moved on now to the point 13 14 where we have also taken a vote on the 15 acceptance of the Rules report, which has passed as well. 16 SENATOR ADAMS: Point of order, 17 18 Mr. President. 19 I'm requesting a readback, please, 20 because I didn't hear you state that. Can we 21 please have the stenographer read back when 22 you stated that? SENATOR LIBOUS: 23 I'm sorry, Mr. President, I didn't hear that. 24 25 SENATOR ADAMS: I'm requesting a

readback. He stated that he announced the results. I didn't hear him announce the results. Can we have a readback from the stenographer, please.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Adams, this is the New York State

Senate. It is not a court of law. I don't

believe that we have engaged in readbacks

before.

I'm standing before you having pretty working knowledge of what I said myself, and I'm very confident that I was clear, very clear that the chair had been sustained after a vote was taken. And subsequent to that, that another vote was taken to accept the Rules report, which was accepted by a voice vote, the ayes having the vote.

SENATOR ADAMS: Okay, I understand this is not a court of law. I'm clear on that. However, the mere fact that we've never had a readback before, are you stating that's against the rules of this chamber, to call for a readback? I just want to get clarification on that.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 1 Yes. 2 Senator Libous. 3 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. 4 President -- Mr. President, point of order. 5 Even if you announced the results, which I certainly didn't hear, but even if you did 6 announce the results, there are empty seats in 7 8 this chamber. I believe a showing of hands is 9 appropriate to document and to verify your 10 judgment as to the vote of this chamber on the 11 appeal. 12 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Senator Gianaris, the vote has been taken. 13 The ayes had it. The vote -- we've now had 14 15 two separate votes on the appeal of the ruling of the chair and on the acceptance of the 16 Rules report. Your point of order is not 17 18 timely --19 SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, 20 we have not had a vote on this. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 22 Senator Squadron, I have the floor. 23 SENATOR SQUADRON: Mr. President, point of order. Point of order, 24 25 Mr. President. Point of order.

22	by Senator Breslin, the ayes had the vote on
23	that. That vote was taken approximately
24	20 minutes ago. That vote was in order and
25	the chair was sustained. Not too long ago we

had a vote on the acceptance of the Rules 1 2 report by a voice vote --3 Mr. President. SENATOR GIANARIS: 4 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 5 and that vote was carried as well. The Rules 6 report has been accepted. 7 SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, 8 with all due respect, I defy anyone in this 9 chamber to suggest that there was a second 10 voice vote called. I only called out once, 11 and I didn't hear anyone else call. I didn't even hear the vote called. 12 13 I would like to speak on the Rules 14 report, Mr. President. 15 THE PARLIAMENTARIAN: It's already been passed. 16 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 17 The 18 Rules --19 SENATOR GIANARIS: No, it has not 20 already been passed. There has not been a 21 single vote cast. Nor was a vote called for. 22 You cannot now pass reports without even 23 taking a vote. And I know you want to stop the debate, but you can't do it without even 24 25 voting.

Mr. President. I do want to thank Senator Libous as well for his consideration.

On the Rules report. We have before us a Rules report that has one bill on it. It is a Governor's program bill. At the Rules Committee which produced that report, there was a petition for a hearing on a second Governor's bill which related to independent redistricting.

The Rules Committee did not vote on that bill. The Rules Committee did not consider -- on that petition, rather. The Rules Committee did not consider that petition as required by the rules of the Senate. And yet we have before us a Rules report that came out of that Rules Committee which was conducted in contravention of the Senate rules.

As I began to say earlier, there's a legal doctrine called the fruit of the poisonous tree which says that what comes out of something that was conducted improperly or against the rules or illegally cannot be considered on its own because everything that it came from was improper.

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The Rules Committee that produced the report before us was conducted improperly. It was in direct violation of Rule 7 of the Senate rules. We had more than one-third of the members petition for a hearing on the Governor's program bill to establish a fair and independent redistricting process that the Senate Majority has tried to bottle up since the moment it was introduced. They have not allowed a single sponsor on it. They've tried to limit debate on this floor tonight as to the fact that the Rules Committee didn't even allow the petition to come up for a discussion.

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And now we have a Rules report, lo and behold, that was produced that has a bill on it that many of us will support -- myself included -- but does not reflect the Rules Committee abiding by the rules of the Senate, which would require a petition on the Governor's bill on independent redistricting.

Why the Senate Majority has spent so much time in the last two months trying to avoid even a public discussion of independent redistricting I think is, plain and simple, a direct result of the fact that each and every one of them promised to support that bill, or something very similar to it, and from the Wednesday after Election Day to today it's been one step after another to avoid discussion, avoid it coming up for a vote, avoid letting people sponsor it, avoid it as if it never existed.

It seems to me like the Senate

Majority would be happy to take that bill, my

redistricting bill, any other redistricting

bill that would go into effect for next year's

reapportionment and throw it in the round file

and never hear from it again and hope it goes

away.

And we hear about there's other issues, you know, like the budget -- which is obviously a critically important issue for this state. But there's no reason we can't deal with both issues at the same time.

I've heard discussion that it's not timely, it's not until next year. It may not be until next year, but we have to set up a process this year that would have the time to function and be in place to produce an

independent redistricting process for next year.

We have become a laughingstock as it relates to our districts. There are contests to name the shapes of our districts, that's how bad it's gotten, because we're picking who's going to vote for us rather than letting the voters pick who represents them.

And this Rules report that we're discussing tonight is just another example -- and perhaps the most egregious, from what I've seen on the floor tonight. Although I do appreciate and respect Senator Libous allowing me to speak on the Rules report. I hope that's a sign that as we go forward there will continue to be a robust public discussion on this issue and not a continuation of what we had seen previously.

The fact is reapportionment happens once every 10 years. It's happening next year. And solutions that kick the can down the road 10 years later will not satisfy the public, they will not satisfy the advocates that have been pushing for this, and they certainly will not satisfy me.

We have before us a Rules report that we debated these rules for quite some time when they were adopted. I remember that discussion. And many of us were not happy they were adopted, but here they are. And they were adopted with the proper amount of votes after an appropriate vote.

And now these rules that the Senate Majority adopted, over our objections -- which is the way it works -- are now being defied by the very Senate Majority that adopted them.

If you didn't like the fact that we could petition for a hearing on a bill, you shouldn't have included it in Rule 7 of the Senate rules.

But the fact is that that rule is there. And we abided by the rules that we all voted against. And we presented the petition pursuant to the rules that were drafted by the Majority. That petition was ignored. And then the Rules Committee produced --

SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Libous, why do you rise?

SENATOR LIBOUS: In all due

respect to Senator Gianaris, is his discussion germane to the Power for Jobs bill before us on the Rules Committee? We're talking about petitioning the Rules Committee, and Power for Jobs I believe is on the Rules Committee report.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Libous, your comments are well-taken.

Senator Gianaris, I appreciate your measured tone. I would respectfully request that you seek very much in earnest to keep your comments to the bill and the report that is before the house. There will be plenty of opportunities, and I'm sure that you are quite adept at seeking those opportunities and advancing them outside of this chamber to discuss issues that are not before the house today.

SENATOR GIANARIS: Mr. President, is that a ruling that my discussion is not germane to the Rules report?

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: It's a polite suggestion that your comments are straying from the contents of the report in the matter before the house, and that it would

be a prudent exercise for you to focus far more on Senator Maziarz's bill, which has to do about energy policy and economic development for the State of New York.

SENATOR GIANARIS: With respect,
Mr. President, I disagree with your
suggestion. Because as I stated, it's my
belief that the report that the Rules
Committee produced was in contravention of the
Senate rules and therefore the report itself
is not a valid report.

And as part of that discussion,

Mr. President -- this is what we've been

struggling with, or I have tonight -- as part

of that discussion I need to be able to make

the point of why the Rules Committee acted

improperly to justify why I think the Rules

report itself is not properly before the

house.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Senator Gianaris, I would again remind you that I think it would be a wise investment of your time and this collective body's time to constrain your comments to the Rules report.

If you want to comment about

something relating to procedure, I would do 1 2 that also in a measured tone. The subjects that you're raising for legislative 3 4 consideration have absolutely nothing to do 5 with procedure. Should you wish to change the procedure, you are well aware of how you might 6 7 do that outside of this body. 8 But if you want to speak to the procedural aspects of how the committee 9 10 operates, I think it would be relatively fair for you to do so. But if you want to talk to 11 12 legislation that is not part of that committee, I would suggest that your comments 13 would be out of order. 14 15 SENATOR GIANARIS: Well, Mr. President, in a measured tone, I 16 respectfully disagree. 17 18 But I think we're beating a dead horse at this point, so I would call for a 19 20 vote on the Rules report. 21 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: All 22 those in favor of accepting the Rules report 23 signify by saying aye. (Response of "Aye.") 24 25 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: And a

1	show of hands, please.

I thought we were within our right to use that as a means of having a voice in the proceedings in the chamber and in our house, and we were summarily rejected by the chair of the committee. And furthermore, you are now saying to us that we -- it was as if nothing happened in the committee meeting.

So my question to you is if we have -- if there is -- has been such an action taken within our body among ourselves that is clearly outside of the rules, who do we go to in order to address a grievance when that happens? And I would just like for you to tell me where we go from here in terms of appropriately addressing this grievance, since we've been summarily ruled out of order that we can't speak on it on the floor.

So where do we go with it? Who is in charge of making sure that the rules by which we do business in our house are actually followed by all of us equally and fairly?

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 6 7 Senator Maziarz, to explain his vote. 8 SENATOR MAZIARZ: Thank you very much, Mr. President. To explain my vote. 9 10 was actually going to get up and joke around 11 and say lay the bill aside for the day, but I 12 thought after we've been through all of this, we have to continue. 13 I just want to say that this bill 14 15 permanentizes the Power for Jobs program. As we all know, this program has been renewed on 16 an annual basis since 1997. It's been a real 17 18 detriment to companies that want to locate here in New York, that want to invest in 19 20 New York that want to hire people in New York, because of the uncertainty. 21 22 This bill gives those companies seven years of certainty. It permanentizes 23 24 this program, allows them to reapply after a 25 seven-year period.

Governor Cuomo has submitted this 1 2 as his second program bill. He's talked to me 3 personally about it on several occasions, 4 about the importance that he placed upon this 5 bill. I do want to thank my ranking 6 7 Democratic member, Senator Parker, who is a 8 cosponsor of this legislation. Because 9 Senator Parker, of course, who represents a 10 district in New York City, myself, from 11 upstate, many of my colleagues -- Senator 12 Gallivan, Senator Ritchie, Senator Grisanti, Senator Libous, Senator Griffo, and Senator 13 14 Kennedy, all of whom have cosponsored this, it 15 shows the wide-ranging support that we have on this particular piece of legislation. 16 Mr. President, I vote in the 17 18 affirmative. Thank you. ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 19 Thank 20 you, Senator Maziarz. Senator Griffo, to explain his 21 22 vote. 23 SENATOR GRIFFO: Thank you, Mr. President. 24 25 I can't tell you how refreshing it

is to be able to talk about an economic issue, something that really has a tremendous impact across every region of this state and across every segment of our society.

I want to thank Senator Maziarz for his leadership, and all the members of the committee; to Governor Cuomo, for making this an important program bill so early in this session. Because this is a program that is so important in revitalizing our economy, particularly the manufacturing sector.

This bill is going to be so important, as Senator Maziarz said, because it will provide certainty. Benefits were good, but the uncertainty was problematic. This bill now gives this permanency to the program. We all know that utility costs are a factor that hinder businesses in this state, and that's why this effort is so important today.

So I know that this program will be more reliable. It will increase the capacity for employers to grow their businesses. And it's a vast improvement over its popular predecessor.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:

Excuse me, Senator Griffo. 1 2 Just if we could have a little 3 quiet so that the member -- there are a number 4 of members who wish to explain their votes. 5 Please extend to them the same courtesy that you would like to receive in return. 6 7 Senator Griffo. 8 SENATOR GRIFFO: Thank you, 9 Mr. President. 10 So with that in mind, I am wholeheartedly in support of this bill and I'm 11 hopeful that we're going to reach a consensus 12 13 and deliver this bill into law this year. 14 Thank you, Mr. President. I vote 15 aye. ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Thank 16 you, Senator Griffo. 17 18 Senator Liz Krueger. 19 SENATOR LIZ KRUEGER: Thank you, 20 Mr. President. 21 I am also glad to stand to support 22 this bill and to vote for this bill and to 23 congratulate all the many Senators who were involved in finally getting Power for Jobs 24 25 resolved.

For the record, on behalf of the 1 over 320,000 constituents of my district who 2 sent me here to vote up or down on bills like 3 4 this, if we had fair, independent, 5 non-gerrymandered redistricting, all of us would have approximately the same number of 6 7 constituents to be voting yes or no on bills 8 on behalf of. 9 So tonight I'm glad to join my 10 upstate colleagues in supporting this bill. But sometimes my constituents aren't sure they 11 12 get the same count in this house. Thank you, Mr. President. 13 ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: 14 Thank 15 you, Senator Liz Krueger. Senator Hassell-Thompson, to 16 explain her vote. 17 18 SENATOR HASSELL-THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. President. 19 20 I would like the record to reflect that the vote that was taken and how I voted 21 did not reflect the fact that I did not 22 support this energy bill and the importance to 23 the State of New York, but rather that my vote 24 25 was taken as an objection to the process.

10	worked diligently on this issue for many, many
11	years. And it's critically important for the
12	economic revitalization of New York State and
13	Long Island.
14	Our priority in this conference has
15	been putting people back to work. This is
16	another step in the right direction in putting
17	New York State in the right direction. I'll
18	be voting in the affirmative.
19	Thank you, Mr. President.
20	ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Thank
21	you, Senator Fuschillo.
22	Senator Zeldin, to explain his
23	vote.
24	SENATOR ZELDIN: I also rise in
25	the affirmative. I commend Senator Maziarz

for his leadership with this particular issue.

Electric rates for businesses in

New York are twice as high as they are in

other states. On Long Island we have 35

companies that currently benefit from being

part of the current Power for Jobs program,

while there are new companies that may be able

to benefit from this new Recharge New York.

This bill has a wide range of support on Long Island, including the Long Island Association, Association for a Better Long Island, the Hauppauge Industrial Association, Long Island Forum for Technology, the Long Island Builders Institute, Long Island Contractors Association and Nassau Council of Chambers of Commerce, the Long Island Metro Business Action, and the Long Island Software and Technology Network.

Thank you, Senator Maziarz, for your leadership, and I proudly stand in the affirmative to support him in this effort.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN: Thank you, Senator Zeldin.

I would again just ask that we have some order in the house.
