resolution by Senator LaValle, congratulating the Rocky Point High School Varsity Cheerleading Team upon the occasion of capturing the National Championship in the Universal Cheerleaders Association's Medium Varsity Division.
"WHEREAS, Athletic competition enhances the moral and physical development of the young people of this state, preparing them for the future by instilling in them the value of teamwork, encouraging a standard of healthy living, imparting a desire for success, and developing a sense of fair play and competition; and

SENATOR GOLDEN: This obviously is a great time during the month of March that we celebrate St. Patrick's Day, and there are many parades, one being tomorrow, the 250th
anniversary of the parade with Mary Higgins Clark, who will be the grand marshal tomorrow, and she will march down that avenue, and proud, and pass the Archbishop, who will be on the steps of St. Patrick's Cathedral, as he is every year.

And this will be a great day for the Irish. Mary Higgins Clark, her parents arrived here the same as my parents, with a dollar in their pocket and a dream. And that dollar in their pocket and that dream came true for her and for my family as well. My brother was the grand marshal in the Mineola parade this past week, and my sister Eileen joined him, and she plays with Cherish the Ladies and he has the Golden School of Irish Dance. And I was gifted with having the -being the Queens grand marshal last year.

We have, coming up on March 27th and this week coming up, two other parades in Brooklyn that will celebrate Irish heritage and bring out the culture of the great communities of the City of New York, and proudly they will march down the avenues in Brooklyn and Queens and the City of New York
and across this great state, celebrating their Irish heritage and their religion.

And I commend and ask anybody who would like to join that resolution as we give that out and bestow that honor on the people of Brooklyn.

We have another resolution before us, Resolution 834, at the desk. May we please have the title read and call on Senator Little, please, and then move for its adoption.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: The Secretary will read.

THE SECRETARY: Legislative Resolution 834, by Senator Skelos, memorializing Governor Andrew M. Cuomo to proclaim March 2011 as Women's History Month in the State of New York and commemorating the New York State Senate's "Women of Distinction" tribute.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator Little.

SENATOR LITTLE: Thank you, Mr. President.

Each year when we celebrate women's history we celebrate the women in New York State's history who have made a significant contribution to our society and to our causes. And it goes without saying that many of those women's contributions went far beyond the
borders of New York State; they have become part of our lasting heritage. And they did so by fighting against stereotypes, prejudice and insurmountable obstacles.

Many of those women you know by name, certainly, and we have honored them before: Sojourner Truth, Harriet Tubman, Susan B. Anthony, Elizabeth Cady Stanton, Nellie Bly, the artist Grandma Moses, Barbara McClintock, and the "First Lady of the World," Eleanor Roosevelt.

New York State continues to be a place where women have had a major role. And as we approach September 11, 2011, we will mark the 10th anniversary of the unprecedented tragedy that befell our state and our country. And once again, we should remember the three women of distinction that we honored because of their service, their ultimate sacrifice in 2001: Moira Smith, a decorated New York Police Department officer; Captain Kathy Mazza, the first female commandant of the Port Authority Police Training Academy; and Yamel Merino, 2001 Emergency Medical Technician of the Year, all who gave their lives in that
tragedy in 2001.
We continue this tradition this
year by inducting three new honorees for the year 2011. Two of these women, as many before them that we have honored, have been first in their field.

Linda Richards, who was from
Potsdam, New York, and was the first trained nurse, will be honored. Her life span was 1841 to 1930.

Second, Susan Smith McKenney
Steward, who was the first African-American female doctor in New York State and was the third in our country. Her life span, 1847 to 1918.

And the third, who happens to be from my district, Mary Wiltsie Fuller. Mary Wiltsie Fuller was born in 1862 and was the daughter of a Troy industrialist and an advocate for women. Through her sponsorship of the Girls Friendly Society of the Episcopal Church in Troy, she became aware of the need for respite and recreation for the working women who worked in the Troy shirt factories.
At that time, many people called

Troy "the City of Women" because there were so many women -- young immigrant women, young women, older women, single women -- working to support their families working in these shirt factories. And certainly vacations and recreation were way beyond their means.

Realizing this, Mary turned to her friends Spencer and Katrina Trask about helping to find a location for her retreat for women. The Trask family lived in Tuxedo Park, Saratoga, and Lake George. They had land on Lake George that they had bought in a tax sale, and they agreed to allow Mary to establish a retreat for women on their land by leasing it to her in 1903. Mary then turned to many others to help with the support of building this retreat. The following year, 1904, Katrina Trask sold the property to Mary for one dollar and a bouquet of flowers.

There were about 50 friends who helped Mary raise the money for the renovations and contributed food and supplies for this home on Lake George. The name chosen for the home was Wiawaka, which is an Indian name for "the Great Spirit of Women," and it
officially opened July 4, 1903. And for a little more than $\$ 3$, a woman could spend a week on Lake George.

Mary lived and worked at Wiawaka until her death in Glens Falls in 1943. Wiawaka still exists. It is the oldest and longest continuously operated nonprofit retreat for women in America today. This past summer and the summer before that, it hosted female wounded warriors for a retreat on Lake George.

It is still available for a minimum
donation or what you can afford to pay for women to go and spend a week on Lake George. And it is still the recipient of local philanthropy. Josie Beckos-Wood of the Charles Wood Foundation has donated funds to this Wiawaka so that they can keep up the buildings and they can continue this tradition which has gone on for well over a hundred years of helping women find a space, a beautiful location for a retreat, and a place to renew their souls.

I would ask you all to take a
moment to look at the display in the Well
honoring all the women that we have honored in the past as well as these three women who we respectfully and gratefully honor this year. Thank you.

THE SECRETARY: Legislative
Resolution 873, by Senator Skelos, recognizing and celebrating the week of March 13-19, 2011,
as "Sunshine Week."
"WHEREAS, The pillars of democracy include government transparency, accessibility and accountability, resulting in an informed citizenry; and
"WHEREAS, Sunshine Week is a national initiative about the importance of open government and freedom of information; and
"WHEREAS, Sunshine Week seeks to enlighten and empower people to play an active role in their government at all levels; and
"WHEREAS, This Legislative Body understands and appreciates the value of access to information that it needs to make informed decisions, and the corresponding importance of access to government information by the citizens of this state; and
"WHEREAS, The free flow of information from the government to the people instills trust and confidence in our democracy and ensures that our government is accessible, accountable and open; and
"WHEREAS, We must continue to
educate and empower the public regarding their
right to access government documents, information and meetings; and
"WHEREAS, This Legislative Body
will hold joint budget conference committees in order to provide more openness and transparency to the budget process; and
"WHEREAS, Nationwide, during the
week of March 13 through 19, countless
citizens and others interested in open government will celebrate Sunshine Week; and
"WHEREAS, Sunshine Week is a
nonpartisan initiative whose supporters are conservative, liberal and every group in between, and its participants include print, broadcast and online news media, civic groups, libraries, nonprofits, schools and others interested in the public's right to know; now, therefore, be it
"RESOLVED, That this Legislative Body pause in its deliberations to recognize and celebrate the week of March 13-19, 2011, as Sunshine Week."

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Senator
Libous on the resolution.
SENATOR LIBOUS: Thank you,

Mr. President. I'm proud to stand before the body today and speak on this resolution.

Actually, what our goal is here is to have Sunshine Year, not just Sunshine Week. We certainly want to do all we can to open government up and make it as transparent as possible and make it available to all of the people that everyone in this chamber represents.

I think, as mentioned in the resolution, Mr. President, what's particularly special is that at 12 o'clock, as we speak on this resolution, at 12 o'clock we are commencing a number of the budget conference committees, legislation that was passed into law by this body in 2007 to open up the budgeting process and making sure that the public understands what's going to be in the final budget bill or legislation. Media cameras are in every one of the rooms as the meetings are commencing, as we are being telecast on the Internet and certainly viewed and heard by many.
Sunshine Week -- or, as I'd like to
say, every day is Sunshine Day in New York

State, as we have passed a number of different laws over the years to achieve that transparency and openness that is required from government and is expected and deserved to the people.

So again, this is not just a day, just not a week, and $I$ know my colleagues on both sides of the aisle agree with me that our goals in this chamber, both Republicans and Democrats, is to open things up in government and have the sun shine in every day so that what we do is extremely transparent.

ACTING PRESIDENT GRIFFO: Thank
you, Senator Libous.
Senator Valesky on the resolution.
SENATOR VALESKY: Thank you,
Mr. President.

I want to join Senator Libous in saluting Sunshine Week. And certainly Sunshine Week should be expanded to all 52 weeks of the year.

I want to, in addition to being very pleased this year that the budget process is actually in compliance with the Budget Reform Law of 2007 -- for the first time in a
couple of years -- which certainly is in the spirit of Sunshine Week and the spirit of openness and transparency. I would also suggest, though, the legislative activity that we've taken this week in many ways is in the spirit of Sunshine Week.

On Monday, two days ago, we had an open and honest discussion about redistricting reform for the first time ever in this State Senate, had an opportunity to have that discussion.

Yesterday, in the one-house budget that we passed -- I think it's very, very important to call this to the attention of the members of the Senate, because this is also in the spirit of Sunshine Week. There is Article 7 legislation that was included in yesterday's budget that we approved that does the following:

The creation of a Legislative Budget Office, whose primary responsibility is to provide individual members and legislative committees on a nonpartisan basis with information related to the budget process. That's sunshine in the budget process;

An independent executive director to helped head up that Legislative Budget Office, appointed for a six-year term. That's sunshine;

That the Executive and Legislature adopt budgets that are balanced in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. I would submit that that's in the interest and the spirit of the sunshine and a more transparent and open legislature;

And that the Division of the Budget adopt a five-year financial plan in accordance with GAAP.

We didn't have an opportunity to discuss that yesterday during the debate on the one-house Senate budget, but I think it's important for the record to reflect that the budget that the Senate approved yesterday advances budget reform from four years ago in the spirit of openness and transparency.

And I want the record to reflect that as we acknowledge Sunshine Week, and I look forward to all of our colleagues supporting the resolution.

Senator Breslin, why do you rise? SENATOR BRESLIN: Thank you, Mr. President. Point of order, please.

According to the Senate rules, under Rule 5, subsection 6(C), a bill must, when it goes to Finance, in order to get to the third reading, must go through Rules. If it doesn't go through Rules, our rules signify that it can be done by unanimous consent.

This particular bill did not go through Rules. And we have been more than willing to allow unanimous consent, but that was denied. And we feel that this bill is not properly before the house.

ACTING PRESIDENT FLANAGAN:
Senator Breslin, on your point of order, I would reference Rule 6, Section 6, which requires that all budget bills shall be given a number and shall be referred to the Finance Committee.

And it is the precedent in this
body that the Finance Committee reports budget
bills directly to third reading for consideration on the floor.

While you're citing a separate rule, the ruling that I'm making is based on Rule 6, Section 6. And I would respectfully tell you that your point of order is not well-taken.
