"WHEREAS, Business aviation is a critical tool for companies in New York to support their operations, thus bringing new business, investment and jobs to this state. Business aircraft improve efficiency, save money and open up opportunities for rural areas not served by commercial aviation; and

"WHEREAS, Aviation and airports play a vital role in New York State's

businesses and communities that depend on general aviation of all types for mobility, access to medical treatment, economic opportunity, disaster relief, law enforcement, search and rescue, and also contribute to our national defense; and

On February 24, Anne Compoccia passed away in Lower Manhattan, where she had spent truly decades committing herself to the community in many different ways.

You know, one thing about a community, someone whose life is about making a community work and working for a community, is the number of different ways they do that over decades. The ups and downs over decades are too much to enumerate in a moment on the floor.

But there's no question that Lower Manhattan, Little Italy, the communities that have recovered from the September 11, 2001, attacks, that have thrived and changed over centuries, have been where so many of us, wherever we're from today, had our families begin down at the southern tip of Manhattan,

are better off because of the work that Anne Compoccia dedicated in many roles over many, many years.

Lower Manhattan, Little Italy -the entire state -- are less for having lost
her. And I wanted to take a moment on the
floor of the Senate to honor her and her many
years of work and the many accomplishments she
had, and express our gratitude as a state for
Anne and for all of the community leaders who
commit themselves to what is needed when it's
needed for a lifetime.

resolution is adopted. 1 2 Senator Libous. 3 SENATOR LIBOUS: Mr. President, I 4 believe there is a resolution at the desk by 5 Senator Gallivan, Resolution Number 996. 6 Could you please read it in its entirety and 7 call on Senator Gallivan. 8 ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: The 9 Secretary will read. 10 THE SECRETARY: Legislative Resolution Number 996, by Senator Gallivan, 11 12 paying tribute to the life and accomplishments of Joseph Elias Joseph, distinguished citizen 13 and devoted member of his community. 14 15 "WHEREAS, It is the custom of this Legislative Body to pay tribute to citizens of 16 the State of New York whose lifework and civic 17 18 endeavor serve to enhance the quality of life in their communities and the great State of 19 20 New York; and "WHEREAS, Joseph Elias Joseph of 21 22 Eden, New York, died on February 25, 2011, at 23 the age of 62; and "WHEREAS, Joseph Elias Joseph 24 25 distinguished himself in his profession and by his sincere dedication and substantial contribution to the welfare of his community; and

"WHEREAS, A long-time sheriff's deputy, and later a member of the sheriff's mounted division, Joseph Elias Joseph pursued many occupations over the years. He worked as a barber, was the owner and operator of KJ's Matchbox Diner, the proprietor of the private investigation firm J.J. Enterprises, the head of event security for the annual 'Jam in the Valley' country jamboree, and he and his wife began the 'Davis Ranch' in Eden; and

"WHEREAS, Upon his retirement in 2007, the county legislature proclaimed March 1, 2007, 'Joseph Joseph Day' in Erie County. Approximately 500 people attended his retirement party, and nearly 900 people attended the 'Joe Joseph Celebration of Life' event in May of 2010; and

"WHEREAS, Joseph Elias Joseph's commitment to excellence, and his spirit of humanity, carried over into in all fields of enterprise, including charitable and civic endeavors; and

"WHEREAS, He served as president 1 2 and chairman of the Sheriff's Office Badge and Shield Club and attended many community events 3 4 held by the Italian-American Police 5 Association, the Tonawanda Police Department, and the Badge and Shield Club; and 6 7 "WHEREAS, Joseph Elias Joseph is 8 survived by his loving wife, Ruby Davis-Joseph; two sons, Keith and Jeffrey; a 9 10 brother, Gregory; and three sisters, Regina, Rosemary, and Dolores; and 11 "WHEREAS, Armed with a humanistic 12 spirit, imbued with a sense of compassion, and 13 14 comforted by a loving family, Joseph Elias 15 Joseph leaves behind a legacy which will long endure the passage of time and will remain as 16 a comforting memory to all he served and 17 18 befriended; now, therefore, be it "RESOLVED, That this Legislative 19 20 Body pause in its deliberations to pay tribute to the life and accomplishments of Joseph 21 22 Elias Joseph, distinguished citizen and devoted member of his community, and be it 23 further 24 25 "RESOLVED, That a copy of this

Joe was a lifetime public servant who served with distinction. He was a dedicated member of his community. His friendliness, his character and enthusiasm inspired all who came in contact with him.

Joe always went out of his way to be with friends, neighbors, colleagues and members of the community. It was his natural element. He treated his community like his family, like he had known and loved all of them his entire life.

At the time of his passing, he remained active as president and chairman of the Erie County Sheriff's Office Badge and

Shield Club. He was dedicated to law 1 enforcement and to the service of others. 2 one way or another, law enforcement and 3 service was his life. Joe devoted so much of 4 5 his time to honoring and befriending men and women of law enforcement -- correction 6 7 officers, retired police officers, anyone who 8 gave part of themselves to protect all that is good in society. It's fitting that we honor 9 10 him today. Joe is survived by his widow, a 11 12 retired law enforcement officer, Ruby Davis-Joseph, who's watching us at home today. 13 She should know that she, her family, and Joe 14 15 are in our hearts and will always be. SENATOR DUANE: 16 Thank you, Mr. President. 17 18 Today, as we do every year, the Senate honors the memories of the young women 19 20 and men killed in the Triangle Shirtwaist This year has special and very 21 Factory Fire. 22 sad significance. This Friday, March 25th, will be the 100th anniversary of their cruel, 23 senseless deaths. 24 25 The Triangle Fire was the worst

industrial disaster in the history of

New York. The tragedy also marks a critical

moment in New York labor history and served as
a catalyst for much-needed reforms. And so on
this anniversary we honor the victims by
recalling not only the horror and the
heartbreak but the resilience and power of
their colleagues in fighting to improve
workplace conditions.

The 500 employees of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory worked six days a week without breaks. The doors were locked from the outside. Talking was forbidden, bathroom breaks monitored, and employees were even forced to buy their own needles and thread.

Despite a widespread protest that occurred in 1909, where the workers staged a walkout, Triangle management still refused to recognize a union and never met the demands to unlock the doors and to create functional fire escapes. So when the fire broke out in a scrap bin one Saturday, there was no alarm and there was no way out.

Hundreds of workers were left with no choice but to leap from ninth- and

tenth-floor windows. The newspapers of that day offered graphic, sickening, sad, violent descriptions of the scene. And the gruesome details will forever be in the minds, hearts, and memories of New Yorkers.

However, a century later, we are able to mark the legacy of what happened that day. And that legacy is in our child labor laws, in employee safety regulations, in 40-hour working weeks and collective bargaining rights. Those deaths, those horrible deaths, the legacy has served to bring fairness and dignity to workers regardless of age, national origin, gender.

You know, it may be easy and sadly it seems too easy now to take this history for granted. And it's maybe too easy to dismiss, to just ignore the place of labor in our history. But this history of good that came from a tragedy includes the legacy which we provide for immigrants and really those who are ignored and belittled, around the margins of our society.

And we're marking this anniversary especially so that we never forget our own

heritage as New Yorkers and that we never, ever forget the unthinkable struggles and tragedy of our ancestors.

Shortly after the fire, the factory owners went on trial for manslaughter. They were acquitted. No criminal charges, they were acquitted. They paid out \$75 per victim in a civil suit. In contrast, the insurance company reimbursed the owners nearly \$60,000 more than what was reported in losses. And two years later, when one of the owners was caught again locking the doors of his factories from the outside, he was fined \$20.

But again, the Triangle Fire was a galvanizing event for New York labor, and the day after that tragedy 15,000 shirtwaist workers demonstrated for better conditions. And the record exists of the editorials and the pamphlets that were written in Italian and German and Yiddish and probably dozens of other languages, demanding change.

And this terrible thing brought together Catholic reformers, socialist organizers, machine politicians and teenage girls who worked in factories. And they

joined together to fight for workers' rights.

And in response to that widespread organizing, based on the outrage of what had happened, this very legislature convened the 1911 Factory Commission which led to overhauls of fire code regulations, evacuation rules, sanitary requirements and over 30 total workplace-safety laws. Committee cochair Robert Wagner went on to author the landmark National Labor Relations Act.

A woman named Rose Schneiderman of the Women's Trade Union League told an audience at the Metropolitan Opera House the day after the tragedy: "I know from experience it is up to the working people to save themselves. The only way they can is by a strong working-class movement."

And New York's own Frances Perkins, later President Roosevelt's Commissioner of Labor, called the Triangle Fire "the day the New Deal began."

The reforms made in the years after the Triangle Fire illustrate for us the strength of the traditionally marginalized -- of women, of new immigrants, of the poor and

of the young. And the progress made on workers' rights in the Progressive Era and the New Deal and throughout the history of New York -- proud parts, parts of New York's history that we must remain proud of and hold sacrosanct -- shows us what we can achieve when people on the edges of society unite and speak.

And when people march together and organize together, they can demand of us in government what is rightfully theirs: A safe working environment, a living wage, respect. That's the legacy of the Triangle Fire. It's a legacy of collective action and social change, and it was literally forged in fire and blood.

And because of that terrible tragedy, the rest of us are able to live better lives and we have a chance to have future generations that will also have better lives. And we must not betray the lessons of the Triangle Fire.

Thank you, Mr. President.

ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: Thank you, Senator Duane.

SENATOR ROBACH: Yes,

Mr. President. Let me join my colleague
Senator Duane and others who are going to
support this on the 100th anniversary of the
Shirtwaist Fire.

And clearly, as my colleague

Senator Duane pointed out, horrific events

occurred to large numbers of people when

policies weren't in place and people weren't

working toward protecting those that may be

helping them share in profits.

And in this case, the loss of any life is critically important. But these were immigrants, many Italian and Jewish in particular, many women and young women that suffered from the terrible conditions that were allowed to exist right here in our state.

And I would certainly agree that there's no question this was a catalyst for much that changed, but even today should remain motivation for all of us to do all we can to have policies in place that keep working conditions as safe for everyone, even those on the job today, though things have

changed dramatically. 1 2 And I would applaud our own Department of Labor, who has also historically 3 4 kept this alive, had educational forums and 5 seminars as well as remembrance to let people know and have all those people that perished 6 7 not be completely in vain. 8 I would be remiss if I didn't 9 mention our own former colleague Serph 10 Maltese, who had three members of his own family, Italian immigrant women, who perished 11 in that terrible, horrific accident, and all 12 he had done to keep that memory alive too so 13 we could all not only not forget but use that 14 15 as motivation to help keep all of today's employees out of harm's way. 16 So I join my colleague Senator 17 18 Duane in this very important resolution and remembrance, especially on its 100th 19 20 anniversary. 21 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT O'MARA: 22 Thank 23 you, Senator. Senator Savino on the resolution. 24

I also want to thank Senator Duane for bringing this resolution. And I join him and Senator Robach and I'm sure everyone else in this room in what is appropriate for the New York State Senate to stop in its deliberations and recognize the importance of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire, not just for the tragedy that occurred 100 years ago, but for the advances in workers' rights that followed that tragedy.

Every advance in workers' rights began as a result of a tragedy. And I think it's particularly important that now, at this time, this 100th anniversary could not be coming at a more important time for working people in this country.

It would be very easy to turn the clock back on the rights of workers. As we speak, across the country in state houses and governors are looking to curtail the collective bargaining rights of public employees right now. Sadly, many private-sector employees no longer have a voice in organized labor.

we not only pause, recognize what happened on that day, reflect on how it should never happen again, but we should be ever mindful and vigilant that if the representatives of working people are stripped of their right to represent them, if they no longer have a viable labor movement in this country, if we say that unions don't have the ability to have automatic dues deductions so they can have an organized effort to counteract some of these antilabor governors and legislators across the country, we could have another Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire.

So I think it's very important that

Without a strong labor movement, you will see OSHA laws disappear just like that. Without a strong labor movement, we will see minimum wage laws disappear just like that. We will see working people forced in never-ending race to the bottom. That was the legacy of the Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire -- not only that we stop and recognize the tragedy on that day and the positive changes that came about for working people, but we do not allow their deaths to be in

vain, we do not turn back the clock in an 1 2 effort to somehow deal with a budget crisis that is not the fault of working people who 3 4 are struggling every day. Never before in 5 history have we needed a strong organized labor movement more than we need it today. 6 7 That is the legacy of the Triangle Shirtwaist 8 Factory Fire. 9 So I want to thank Senator Duane 10 for bringing this resolution, Senator Robach for his comments. I also think we should 11 12 recognize Senator Maltese, who held an event around this issue every year, for keeping it 13 foremost in our minds, but never more 14 15 important than it is on the 100th anniversary. He has been committed, he told me this morning, to working for NASA his whole life. Many of us I think as children loved that idea; the difference with Carlos is he continues to and has the talents and the skill to get there.

He is currently a senior in high school at Bard High School Early College. And he won't just be graduating from high school this June, he'll be graduating from high school and concurrently getting an associate's degree, heading off to college next year and from there hopefully on to graduate school to become an engineer and, I am certain, to meet his dream of going to work for NASA and becoming an astronaut.

You know, Carlos Valdez comes here today along with the 34 others who are being honored by the Boys & Girls Clubs of America, each one of whom stands out in their local

clubhouse. His is the Education Alliance
Clubhouse, known as the Edgies Clubhouse,
which every year sends a student. And each of
the 35 students were incredibly deserving.

Carlos wrote a speech about the power of youth and the power of youth to really make a difference. And his background, his commitment and his speech have really made him stand out. He will now be heading on to the Northeast Regionals, from there I'm sure to the nationals, and from there to an extraordinary future.

I would say as well that the

Educational Alliance Clubhouse now has two of
the last three statewide Youths of the Year.

And Amarilis Perez from Educational Alliance,
who runs the clubhouse, is due enormous credit
as well and is also here in the chamber with
us.

You know, it is hard for so many young people in New York to grow up. Senator Duane just spoke movingly about the history a hundred years ago, and others. The challenge continues to exist for so many. And for so many young people, because of the challenges

they face, it's just too easy to give up. But that's not true for Carlos, it's not true for the other Youths of the Year who are up here, it's not true for the other ones competing nationally.

And I think we as a Senate, as a body, should really take that lesson to heart and that message to heart. The work, the commitment, the faith that if he works hard and really gives it his all, he will be successful, is one that should be inspiring to all of us and to youths across the state.

I want to just quote here not from the resolution that we're passing in honor of Carlos today, but from his own comments about the Boys & Girls Club Youth of the Year. "The Boys & Girls Club means the world to me," he wrote. "At the clubhouse I have gained a family that supports my dreams and helps me cope with daily challenges I face in my community. They are there at the end of the day to reassure me of my special purpose in this world. It is a place that has taught me that nothing in life is unachievable."

Well, Carlos, I want you to know

1	nothing in life is unachievable if you

Mrs. Ross was on her way to her daughter's house when she was intentionally struck in the rear of her vehicle by three men who were out searching for an unsuspecting victim. And the impact of this staged accident caused Mrs. Ross's vehicle to leave the highway and crash head-on into a tree, causing her death.

And after the accident the three perpetrators, as is the case in these staged accidents, they were taken to a medical center where they feigned an assortment of injuries in order to collect on phony injury claims through the no-fault system.

So this bill will not only help to contain no-fault fraud and reduce insurance premiums, but it also will create safety for everyone on our roadways. It is critical that we take steps to crack down on the criminals who perpetrate no-fault fraud and harm innocent people like Alice Ross in the process.

Because no-fault fraud is on the

1	rise across the state, particularly in the
2	New York City area. In fact, it's estimated
3	that one out of every five no-fault claims in
4	the downstate area show evidence of fraud.
5	And overall, no-fault fraud cost New York
6	State residents more than \$241 million last
7	year in higher auto insurance premiums.
